Thus they support the price when it is lower than it should be and reduce it when it is too high. To say that the operations of speculators exaggerate price fluctuations is to say that they buy when the price is high and sell when it is low. If they actually operated this way they would consistently lose money and wouldn't stay in business very long.

Speculators thus exert a steady ing influence on market prices, and to prohibit their activities is to remove a useful economic stabilizer. Yet they are sometimes regarded in political circles as parasites whose elimination involves no real loss to society.

Serves Good Purpose Trading in onion futures was outlawed by federal legislation in 1958 and the same fate may be in store for potato futures. The alleged abuses in the trading of these contracts should not be the cause for eliminating a practice which serves an economic purpose.
