## MINUTES

### REVISED CONSTITUTION OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION, U.S.A., INC.

#### PREAMBLE

Whereas, it was the sense of the Negro Baptist of the United States as represented in several Baptist organizations convened in Atlanta, Ga., September 28, 1895, and known as the Baptist Foreign Mission Convention hitherto engaged in Missionary work on the West Coast of Africa; the National Baptist Convention which had been doing missionary work in the United States; the National Baptist Missionary work on the West Coast of Africa; the National Baptist Convention that these organizations should unite into one organization for the purpose of putting into effect the benevolent intentions of their constituents by eliciting, combining and directing the energies of denomination: therefore said organization did unite and agree upon certain fundamental principles of organic rules, which as amended from time to time, are as follows:

#### ARTICLE I—NAME

This organization shall be known and styled as the National Baptist Convention of the United States of America.

#### ARTICLE II—OBJECT

This Convention by uniting Baptist churches and other Baptist organizations, such as may desire an organization of this kind, shall undertake to promote home and foreign missions; to encourage and support Christian education; to publish and distribute Sunday school and other religious literature; and to engage in whatever other Christian endeavor is required to advance the Redeemer's kingdom throughout the world.

#### ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of this Convention shall be representative, annual and life.

Section 2. Representative membership shall be composed of messengers from churches, associations, district conventions and state conventions all known to be in harmony with the purpose of this Convention. These organizations shall pay into the treasury of this Convention sums as are set out in sections of this Article.

Section 3. Basis of Representations, (a) Churches with 200 to 500 members, \$25.00; 500 to 1,000 members, \$35.00. (b) Churches above 1,000 members, \$50.00 paid in as representation, not to exceed two messengers. (c) District State Convention, \$50.00. (d) Associations \$35.00.

Section 4. Life Membership—Any person who is in good and regular standing in any Missionary Baptist church that is a member of this Convention may become a life member by the payment of the sum of \$200.00 into the treasury of this Convention.

Section 5. Annual Membership—Any person who is a member of a church that is in good and regular standing with this Convention may become an ANNUAL member of this Convention by payment of the sum of \$10.00 into the treasury of this Convention. Said ANNUAL member may engage in the discussion of the Convention but not vote.

Section 6. Associations and State conventions shall elect their messengers to the National Convention in their annual meeting preceding the Convention and certify said messenger to the secretary.

Article 3 would be so amended that section 7 would read as follows:

"Since the convention is primarily a fellowship, and since the fellowship owns the corporation, membership in the fellowship does not give to any individual

member or group of members equity or special property rights in the assets of the corporation. The annual representation fees are designed primarily to carry the expenses of the convention and to help in its work in general and cannot be construed as capital investment in the corporation.

Section 8. The question of the rights and privileges of membership are settled only by the convention itself or its Board of Directors in the convention's absence.

Section 9. No member or group of members of the convention shall have the rights to use the civil courts to settle matters regarding membership rights and convention procedures. In these matters the convention itself is the supreme court from which there is no appeal. The majority vote of the fellowship is therefore binding on the individual, the convention and the corporation itself.

#### ARTICLE IV

Voting in this convention shall be by the delegates assembled without reference to member organizations, states or sections of the country, and shall be by voice, or show of hands, or standing.

#### ARTICLE V

##### OFFICERS AND THEIR ELIGIBILITY

"Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be a president, a vice-president-at large, our (4) vice-presidents, and a vice-president from each of the states and territories from which messengers, to this Convention may come, a secretary, four (4) assistant secretaries, a treasurer, a statistician, a historiographer, an editor and an attorney, all of whom shall be selected at each annual meeting of this Convention and shall hold office until their successors shall have been elected."

#### ARTICLE VI—BOARDS

"Section 1. BOARD OF DIRECTORS. The Board of Directors shall consist of the president, vice-president-at-large, the four (4) regional vice-presidents, the vice-president elected by the Convention from the various states and territories represented at each annual session, the secretary, the treasurer, the attorney, the editor, historiographer, statistician, the assistant secretaries of the Convention, annually, fifteen (15) of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The Board of Directors shall organize by electing a chairman and a secretary, who shall perform the duties usually assigned to like officers. It may, if so desired, create from among own body such sub-committees as it may deem proper and make such rules and regulations not inconsistent with the Constitution of this Convention as it may deem necessary.

It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to complete the unfinished business of the Convention; and to adjust such matters, as may be referred to it by the Convention and to fill any vacancies which may occur in the roster of the Convention, to nominate and fix the time and place of the meeting; to enforce the orders of the Convention or any of its Boards; to examine and pass on, and recommend all claims against the Convention; and during the recess of the Convention have entire charge of its affairs.

Executive Committee of Board Directors. There shall be an Executive Committee of nine (9) consisting of the president, secretary, treasurer and six others whose duty it shall be to look after any unfinished business of the Board of Directors or of the Convention, and to transact any urgent matters demanding immediate attention of the Board, and report same to the Board of Directors.

The chairman and corresponding secretaries of the several Boards shall be accorded the floor of the Board of Directors and the privilege to speak on and discuss all questions but not to vote.

The Board of Directors shall meet at 8:30 a.m., the first day of the Convention: first, for more perfectly arranging for the sessions of the Convention; second, to hear any suggestions from any state convention looking to the good of the work of the Convention; third, the newly elected Board shall meet during the recesses

or after the adjournment of the Convention to wind up any unfinished business of the Convention.

"Section 2. OTHER BOARDS. The work of this Convention shall be done by boards. There shall be elected at each annual meeting as many Boards as may be necessary to carry out the objects which this Convention may undertake to foster, all of the members and officers of which Boards may remain in office until their successors shall have been elected. Each of these Boards shall consist of one member from each state or territory from which messengers to this Convention may come, and eight additional members from the state or territory in which the Board is located, provided that the twenty-four (24) members of the Controlling Board and the four (4) members of the Holding Board of the American Baptist Theological Seminary, and who are appointed by this Convention according to the plan of co-operation between the Southern Baptist Convention and this Convention and by which plan said Theological Seminary is operated, shall by virtue of their office, be, and the same are hereby made members of the Educational Board of this Convention and provided further that a Board of Managers may be constituted under this section for the purpose of conducting the affairs of the national organ of this Convention, and that the status of said Board of Managers shall be the same as that of other Boards of this Convention. Each Board is hereby given power to nominate its own officers; and to appoint its own employees, subject to the approval of the Convention or the Board of Directors.

The compensation of its officers and employees shall be fixed by the Boards. But the salaries of the officers of the Boards shall be passed upon by the Board of Directors, and before becoming effective shall be ratified by the Executive Board of this Convention. During the interim of the Convention each Board shall have sole management of the affairs connected with the business for which it is created; but such management shall be in strict accordance with the constituted provision adopted by this Convention and with such other instruction as may be given by the Board of Directors of the Convention or by the Convention. Each Board is hereby authorized to make its own by-laws and to fill any vacancy occurring in its membership during the interim of this Convention. But all such by-laws must be in harmony with the laws and regulations of the approved by the Convention.

#### ARTICLE VII—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The duties of the officers of this Convention shall be in general terms, such as recognized custom devolves upon them, and which are suggested or indicated by the name of the office together with such other duties as may be required of them by this Convention.

Section 2. The treasurer of this Convention shall receipt for all money turned over to him and shall pay out same only upon order signed by the president and attested by the secretary. At each annual meeting he shall submit a written itemized report of receipts and disbursements.

Section 3. An auditor shall make annual examination and audits of the books and accounts of all Boards of the Convention and such officers that have the handling of finances of this Convention. For this purpose he shall have full and free access to all books and records in the custody of the same and shall report his findings to this Convention at its annual meetings. But nothing in this section shall be so construed as to prevent Boards and officers involved from having a survey and audit may be necessary.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the statistician to gather statistical data for the denomination as represented by the Convention by procuring such statistics from churches, district associations, and state conventions participating in this Convention and from denominational schools within the domains of this Convention as will contribute to this end, and report the same to this Convention, annually.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the historiographer to gather all historical data bearing on the rise and progress of the National Baptist Convention and publish the same. He shall work in harmony with all Boards in pursuance of the ends set out above.

## ARTICLE VIII—SUBSIDIARY BODIES

Section 1. The Woman's Convention, Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention; Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. Congress; and the Baptist Laymen's Movement are and the same are hereby recognized as subsidiary bodies shall work in harmony with this Convention, contributing as they are able to the general needs of said Convention.

Section 2. The subsidiary bodies shall make annual reports to this Convention and said reports are hereby subject to the approval of said Convention.

## ARTICLE IX

All Board members and missionaries and agents appointed by this Convention or by any of its Boards shall be members of some church in union with the churches composing this Convention.

## ARTICLE X

The churches, district associations, state conventions, and other organizations composing this Convention, shall have the right to specify the object or objects of which their contributions shall be applied. But when this right has not been exercised the Convention shall make the appropriation at its own discretion.

## ARTICLE XI

In addition to the powers granted to and vested in this corporation by operation of law, this corporation is also hereby given the express and exclusive right, authority and control over the management and properties of the following auxiliary Boards, which were heretofore created and established by the National Baptist Convention of the United States of America, prior to its incorporation, namely:

The National Baptist Publication Board, incorporated under the State of Tennessee;

The Foreign Mission Board of the National Baptist Convention, incorporated under the laws of the State of Kentucky;

The Baptist Young People's Union Board, incorporated under the laws of the State of Tennessee;

The Woman's Auxiliary Board, incorporated under the laws of the District of Columbia.

That said auxiliary Boards and their officers and directors shall have and exercise no power or control over the affairs and properties of said Boards independent of this corporation, and said Boards shall forthwith amend their charters so as to show that each and all of said Boards are under and subject to the jurisdiction and control of this corporation. And this corporation shall have the exclusive right and power at its annual session, or at such other time as shall be provided in the by-laws to nominate and appoint the officers, managers or directors for each and all of said auxiliary boards.

## ARTICLE XII

Missionaries appointed by this Convention or by any of the Boards must, previous to their appointment furnish evidence of genuine piety, fervent zeal in the Master's cause and talents which fits them for the service for which they offer them.

There shall be an annual meeting of this Convention, the same to be held at the time and in order stated in the by-laws of this Convention.

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual session by a two-thirds vote of the members present provided that such a vote is taken without regard to the total enrollment, and provided further that no amendment may be considered after the second day of the session. All amendments before being presented to the Convention for adoption, must have been presented to the Executive Board of this Convention for its consideration.

All constitutions and laws or parts of constitutions and laws in conflict with this Constitution are hereby repealed and are of no force and effect.

This Constitution shall take effect upon its adoption.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

The committee considered Article VI, Section 1 of the Constitution with reference to the Executive Committee, and recommended that the above Article VI and Section 1, shall be so amended as to read:

"The Board of Directors shall have power to create from its own body an Executive Committee consisting of nine members to wit: President, Secretary, Treasurer, and six others to be selected out of the Board, with full power and authority to transact such business as may be referred to it by the Board, reporting their action in detail to the directors for information and approval. The Executive Committee shall not have power to transact any new business not referred to it by the Board of Directors."

Further:

The office of auditor is hereby discontinued.

The following Constitutional amendments were presented by the Board of Directors and approved by the Parent Body in the September, 1939 session at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania:

Article V Section 2—Provides "That the Board of Directors shall also have the power to investigate and suspend any officers or members of the Board when deemed necessary for the good of the service, subject to the approval of the Convention in annual session."

Article VI, Section 2—This article reads "The work of this Convention shall be done by Boards." Amended, "The work of this Convention shall be done by Boards subject to the will of the Convention."

Article VII, Section 2—Further, the article states, "The compensation of its officers and employees shall be fixed by the Boards etc." Amended to read "The compensation of officers and employees of Boards shall be fixed by Boards, subject to review and approval by the Board of Directors whenever it is necessary."

Article VII, Section 1—Amend by changing "B. Y. P. U." to "B. T. U."

Dear Brethren: April 5, 1886, an open letter to the Baptist clergy and laymen was issued by Rev. Wm. J. Simmons, an American Baptist, asking if we should have a National Convention to discuss questions of interest to our beloved denominations. At that time the following reasons were given:

1. To promote personal piety, sociability, and a better knowledge of each other.
2. To be able to have an understanding as to the great ends to be reached by the denomination.
3. To encourage our literary men and women, and promote the interest of Baptist literature.
4. To discuss questions pertaining especially to the religious, educational, industrial, and social interests of our people.
5. To give an opportunity for the best thinkers and writers to be heard.
6. That, united, we may be more powerful for good and strengthen our pride in the denomination.

Having been solicited to write the Call by many whose names and endorsements are here unto affixed, the Call is hereby made by their advice and solicitations for said convention to meet in St. Louis, Mo., August 25, 1886, 10 o'clock a.m., in the First Baptist Church, and the pastor thereof is hereby requested to serve as a Committee of Arrangements, with power to select his associates.

Wm. H. Steward, Louisville, Ky., and Rev. R. H. Cole, 2609 Goode Avenue, St. Louis, are hereby requested to serve as a Committee on Transportation.

JOURNAL OF THE MID-WINTER SESSION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS  
 OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST LAYMEN'S CONVENTION

Held in the California Room of the National Baptist Bath House and Hotel  
 Hot Springs, Arkansas, January 22-24, 1963

TUESDAY AFTERNOON

The house was called to order at 4:00 o'clock by President Jordan. "Pass Me" was sung and F. L. Cotton of Florida presided. W. M. Everett of Indiana led prayer. Dean Henderson Green read Rev. 3:21, 22, and made appropriate remarks.

"I Need Thee" was then sung; Vice President Cotton turned the meeting over to President Jordan. The president then announced the order of business. The agenda of the meeting was read by Lee G. Davis, New Jersey and adopted. Registration was the next in order, and after registration the Committee on Resolutions was appointed as follows: The John L. Webb Foundation, John Z. Hamilton, R. H. Anderson, W. M. Everett, F. L. Cotton and J. L. Lennox.

The Treasurer's report was read and approved, showing gross receipts of \$4593.46 and disbursements of \$4448.81 for a balance of \$144.65. The report was approved. The Executive Secretary's report was read by Acting Secretary Lee G. Davis and approved. Adjourned until 8:00 P. M. tonight.

TUESDAY EVENING

The meeting was called to order at 8:15 and C. A. Davis, New York, led in prayer. President Jordan made remarks and took up the agenda, planning the program. Most of the session was devoted to planning the program. We then closed with dismissal by Elmore Baker, Illinois.

WEDNESDAY EVENING

The meeting was called to order at 5:00 o'clock by President Jordan. Vice President S. L. Jones led the devotions and J. Z. Hamilton, Kansas, led in prayer. The Committee on Resolutions read the following: 1—Full Page, \$50.00; ½ page \$20.00; ¼ page, \$15.00; 2—patrons, \$1.00 in addition to the sponsors' page; 3—have 100 copies of the souvenir programs printed. 4—the sponsors, \$3.00; 4—add a state worker from each state; 5—the state bringing in the highest amount above \$100.00 would be awarded the gold pin. All the above was adopted. All the above was passed subject to the wishes of the Parent Body.

The President urged all to work hard to increase the finances of the Convention. He asked S. W. Nichols, Alabama, to make contract blanks and send to each state member. The President further asked all state presidents to secure and send to his office by May 1, bids on the souvenir programs. He further asked that bids be in by June Board Meeting.

At this point Dean Green was asked to speak to the body. He stated that he thought the Department of Christian Education needs some revamping and that he has been working in that direction.

The banquet next claimed our attention. J. L. Lennox of the entertaining city was called to report on plans for the banquet and other activities. He reported that all sessions would be held under one roof. He had no information concerning the price of tickets nor the menu. M. C. Moses, chairman of the Banquet Committee was called on for a report. He had no definite report or knowledge of the number of tickets to expect and could not possibly give a guarantee two weeks in advance. After some discussion it was decided to guarantee Bro. Lennox 200 meals and promised to take care of 25 over this number. Many of the brethren present pledged to become responsible for the sale of tickets. By motion it was agreed that the chairman of the banquet committee would have the tickets printed.

The question of the ten million dollars educational program initiated by the Parent Body was discussed, and finally it was agreed that we subscribe to pay \$10,000 over a period of ten years, the first payment of \$1,000 to be paid at our annual session in September, 1963. The budget committee was asked to add this amount to the already approved budget. Benediction by J. L. Lennox.

#### THURSDAY AFTERNOON

The house was called to order at 2:30 o'clock by President Jordan. R. L. Drew of Mississippi led in prayer. The president then proceeded to explain methods by which we are to pay our pledge to the Education Foundation of the Parent Body. We are to pay \$1,000 each year for ten years.

The Committee is as follows: H. S. Dixon, Georgia; John H. Bumpas, Missouri; F. L. Cotton, Florida; M. J. McMillian, Mississippi; J. L. Lennox, Ohio; C. A. Davis, New York; L. G. Davis, New Jersey; S. L. Jones, California; Elmore Baker, Illinois; Garland Williams, Kansas. All checks, money orders, etc. are to be sent to the treasurer and made payable to the National Baptist Laymen's Convention. The President will send follow-up letters to stimulate interest in the project. Check for \$1.00 was reported for S. C. Boyer, Arizona for subscription to the Baptist Layman.

The matter of registration fees was discussed and it was agreed that in the January and June Board Meeting the registration fee for districts will be \$50 and that for state, \$10.00.

There was much discussion of our procedures in enrolling our messengers and it was agreed that we have an enrollment and a finance committee. R. L. Drew of Mississippi was appointed as permanent chairman of the Enrollment Committee, he is to report his staff to the President. The President stated that he has turned over to Secretary Jemison of the Parent Body all the program material.

At this point Chairman Drew asked the President for a clarification of his duties as chairman of the enrollment committee. A pledge of \$100.00 was made to the Parent Body on the concessions for the Convention at the World's Fair, to be held in New York City in 1964, 1966. \$50.00 was paid and the balance is to be paid by March 15. The following made pledges to send the following amounts to President Jordan by March 15: S. L. Jones, \$10.00; C. A. Davis, \$5.00; J. L. Lennox, \$5.00; A. Jordan, \$10.00; R. L. Davis, \$10.00; Chas. Helm, \$5.00; H. S. Dixon, \$5.00.

Total Receipts, \$324.00. Disbursements, \$320.75. Balance, \$3.25.

## BOARD MEETING, TUESDAY AFTERNOON

Cleveland, Ohio, September 3, 1963

Board of Directors, National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc.—President Jackson called the board to order.

It was moved and seconded that a committee be appointed to formulate a message from the convention for publication—Dr. E. A. Freeman was named chairman.

Rev. M. C. Cole moved that a message be sent to the President of the United States—there were many seconds, motion carried.

President Jackson suggested that appropriate messages be sent to the governors of the states. It was moved and seconded that this be done. Motion carried.

Also, a message was to be sent to United States Congress—Rev. W. M. Whit moved and Rev. L. S. Beauchamp seconded—motion carried.

Secretary Jemison was called upon to read a message for the consideration of the Board of Directors. This message dealt with the matter of civil rights and the role the convention should play.

Rev. Y. B. Williams of Virginia offered motion that a commission on Civil Rights be established. Rev. Roy Love seconded the motion which was carried unanimously.

It was moved and seconded that a committee on business or resolutions be appointed to hear matters and satisfy them if possible, if not the matter would be brought to the convention—motion carried.

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. William King of Baltimore, Maryland.

## NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION CIVIL RIGHTS COMMISSION

PRESENTED BY: Dr. J. H. Jackson, President of the National Baptist Convention, U. S. A., Inc.

TO: The Board of Directors

The following proposal was unanimously adopted by the Board of Directors of the National Baptist Convention, U. S. A., Inc. on Tuesday, September 3, 1963.

This legislation is presented not because the National Baptist Convention has not been interested in the work of civil rights. It has throughout its history participated in this great struggle. Our founding fathers revolted against injustice and used the resources at their command to fight the demon of discrimination and segregation.

The records will show that in the last ten years this convention has been most diligent in assisting others in this noble struggle, but it is our belief that the time has now come for us as a denomination to write civil rights into our program and into our convention budget, for we believe that the moral and spiritual influence of the Christian religion will have much to give to this worthy struggle.

Because of the nature of the struggle today, we must ally ourselves with our people and stand where they stand, and suffer where they suffer, and struggle by their sides. This responsibility cannot be imputed to other groups nor delegated to our friends, we must help bear the cross of civil rights and carry upon our own minds and hearts some of the responsibilities for the present struggle of our people and for the future destiny of our young.

## I. THE PURPOSE

The purpose of the National Baptist Convention Civil Rights Commission may be stated as follows:

- a. To work for first-class citizenship in the United States of America on all levels for all people.
- b. To advocate, defend, and uphold the letter and spirit of the Federal Constitution and to keep the struggle in the framework of law and order.
- c. To work for better human relations at the local level as well as on a national scale in a spirit of justice and goodwill.
- d. To seek to eliminate any form of racial discrimination in housing, education, and employment, and in all civic, cultural relationships.
- e. To seek to reduce racial, sectional and class tensions through dialogue, better understanding, and tolerance.
- f. To seek always to carry on the struggle for civil rights according to the highest laws of the land and in harmony with the American ideals of freedom and democracy, and in the light of and by the influence of the Judeo-Christian moral and spiritual standards of life.
- g. To make full use of the conference method in negotiating differences and in an attempt to solve community problems before they become serious social conflicts.
- h. To seek to bring people of the local community closer together so that the struggle may be carried on by people who love the community and who have manifested that love by living and rearing their families in said community.

## II. PROCEDURE

1. To seek to organize small advisory committees in local communities with Negro and white leaders working together.  
To work directly with heads of the Chambers of Commerce, businessmen, as well as public officials. Said committee should become a permanent team to work on community problems.
2. Such a group should set up goals and work for the realization for the same without the glamor of publicity and without confusion and violence. We should study well the plan of Dallas, Texas and use that as a sample or pilot project.

## III. NATIONAL CONTACTS

We suggest that the National Baptist Convention will seek a closer contact with the deliberations of Congress in Washington, by the selection of a representative to make contact with congressmen and senators and representatives in the respective branches of government. He will become conversant with all measures regarding first-class citizenship and will share the same with pastors and leaders throughout the United States, and when it is necessary, will help to arrange conferences in the nation's capital for leaders of the Convention who, along with others, may wish to make personal petitions to our national leaders in Washington.

## IV. VOTER REGISTRATION

Said Commission shall also specialize in soliciting new registered voters and shall ask each state convention to carry on such a program, and each local church to solicit among their members, new registrants for voting purposes. The ballot is the key to the struggle and we must not rest until we get it; and once all of our people get the ballot, they must not rest with it, they must use it to help build a stronger and better America.

### V. WORK FOR A DIVISION OF LABOR

If occasions arise when adults must object to unfair educational policies, and if the conditions require them to react through the pressure of protest, we must encourage our children to remain in school and use to the best of their abilities the available educational resources for their growth and development. The youth of our land are the potential soldiers for tomorrow, and tomorrow belongs to the best trained mentally, morally, and spiritually among us. However important a picket line may be, the most important place for growing minds is in an institution of learning until their talents and capacities have been fully developed.

### VI. TO ENCOURAGE THE DEVELOPMENT OF OUR OWN RESOURCES IN COMMUNITY BUILDING

1. While we must continue to struggle for better housing, the right to purchase where our money can buy, and the freedom to live unmolested in the property that we buy, we must also commit ourselves to the task of doing all within our power to make the communities in which we rent as constructive, as beautiful, and as inviting for living as possible. We shall organize more block clubs for the purpose of beautifying our blocks. Those of us who cannot move to other communities because of economic reasons may lend ourselves to the great task of beautifying the spots where we are.

2. As a church, we should approach this struggle in goodwill without in anywise opposing the constructive labors of other civil rights groups, for each organization approaches life as it sees it. There should be charity in differences, fellowship among those who have adopted different methods, friendship among opponents, but always loyalty to the nation itself.

3. We call upon each local church to do all within its power to locate jobs and job opportunities for our people. We also call upon our people to seek to create jobs by wise use and wise investment of capital.

4. We must create a budget for a suitable staff and for an executive director as early as possible so that fulltime can be given to working among our young people and teaching them the fundamentals of first-class citizenship.

### VII. SUPPLYING EDUCATIONAL MATERIAL

We shall ask that civil rights material will be published and furnished for our churches, Sunday Schools, B.T.U.'s, and Missionary Societies by our Sunday School Publishing Board and our B. T. U. Board. Christians must be more conversant on the issues of our civic life and on all problems affecting the people of this nation. Our young people must be so trained that they will not be easily misled by any type of Anti-American and anti-church propaganda.

Dr. Jackson began by giving a brief resume of events leading to the emancipation of the American Negro. He indicated that the Negro is a part of this nation. The oppressor, the oppressed and the nation itself were the three things to which Dr. Jackson addressed himself in dealing with the Negroes right to first class citizenship. He laid special emphasis on "Protest by Production".

"No compromise on the laws of the land," said the President. He proceeded to talk about the picket line put up around his church. He stated that he crossed the picket line to preach the gospel.

Dr. Pelt of Chicago offered a motion that Dr. Jackson would be reelected to succeed himself for the next twelve months. Dr. Licorish of New York seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously after Dr. Roland Smith of Atlanta and Dr. A. L. James of Chicago spoke.

Dr. Brown offered the motion and seconded by Dr. Burrough that all other officers will be reelected to succeed themselves.

Governor Rhodes of Ohio gave words of greetings on behalf of the people of Ohio. Presentations were made to Dr. and Mrs. Jackson.

Benediction by Rev. Lucas from Dayton, Ohio.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION, September 5, 1963

Dr. Hampton, Presiding

2:15 p.m. Song service led by Mrs. Franklin.

2:20 p.m. Rev. Wilmore A. Carter of Washington brought the devotions. The convention bowed in silent prayer at the request of Rev. Carter. Rev. Carter's message centered around the question "What Lark I Yet?" One thing is needful, think of somebody else and there is a strong possibility of moving into a larger and greater freedom. Rev. Carter then led us in prayer as he brought his message to a close.

2:30 p.m. Rev. W. R. Matthews, the President of the State Baptist Convention of Michigan, presented Rev. E. A. Rundless of Detroit, Michigan to deliver an address "Freedom: the Promise of Democracy." Sin, ignorance and selfishness are stumbling blocks that stay in the way are handicapping to freedom. If men are freed from these he becomes free indeed. The message was well received.

3:30 p.m. President Hampton presented Michael Baranyay, former Director, Baptist Theological Seminary, Budapest, Hungary who delivered an address "What God Is Doing in Hungary Through Baptists." The Hungarian Baptists have a seminary in Budapest with 16 students where the doctrines of Baptists are taught. The message was good and well received.

The Harmonies, singing group from Bessemer, Alabama was presented and sang "Jesus Is the Light" and "Keep My Soul I Pray."

3:45 p.m. The reports of the Secretary, Statistician and the Historian were adopted.

Motion prevailed that Dr. Hill would take charge of the offering for the Education Foundation. Motion prevailed that the report of Dr. Hardmon, Dr. M. S. Gordon and Fred Black be heard at another time and that the convention hear the sermon by Dr. R. M. Pitts of North Carolina.

Rev. Pitts was presented by Rev. Sherrell of North Carolina after the convention sang "Lift Him Up." Before Rev. Pitts rose to preach, Mr. Bradley sang "Amazing Grace, How Sweet the Sound." After preliminary remarks he took his text from the Scripture "I must work the works of him that sent me while it is day," John 9:4, subject, "The Christian Ministers' Work of One Day." God gives us one day to do the works assigned to us. God is a man of one day. One is a short time for a man to work; Jesus had no waste.

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ANNUAL ADDRESS OF PRESIDENT J. H. JACKSON DELIVERED AT THE  
EIGHTY-THIRD ANNUAL SESSION OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST  
CONVENTION, U.S.A., INC.

September 5th, 1962—Public Auditorium—Cleveland, Ohio

Mr. Chairman, Delegates, Ladies, and Gentlemen:

One hundred years ago this great nation was in the throes of a bitter and devastating civil war. This conflict was between the north and the south, costing the former more than twelve billion dollars, and the latter more than four billion. Fields and homes were destroyed, the progress of the nation arrested, and the advancement of American culture greatly impeded, and some of the best flowers of manhood, north and south were cut down and withered in the heat of conflict before the day of maturity.

In an attempt to bring to a halt this cruel struggle, President Abraham Lincoln issued the historic Emancipation Proclamation. It was strictly a war measure aimed at those states still in rebellion. On September 17, 1862 the president gave his warning just after the battle of Antietam. He waited for one hundred and five days but no state responded in the affirmative, and hence the threatened declaration was issued January 1, 1863. It was not for the purpose of the emancipation of all slaves as such, but for the purpose of stopping the war and saving the union. For Mr. Lincoln had said in his inauguration address March 4, 1861: "I have no purpose, directly or indirectly to interfere with the institution of slavery where it exists. I believe I have no lawful right to do so." But soon the logic of events changed his mind and he discovered that the protection and the preservation of a free Republic was inextricably related to the emancipation of the slaves, for he could not save the union without interfering with the institution of slavery within said union; for said Lincoln on another occasion: "By giving freedom to the slaves we assure freedom to the free." We today rejoice in this noble act and embrace this proclamation as one of the great documents of human history, and treasure it as a mark of a beginning in new frontiers of freedom and as the first gray streak of dawn after a night of servitude with its all-abounding horrors. By this single stroke of his pen Lincoln set free three million fettered human beings and gave to them the most precious of all gifts—freedom, the ownership of themselves. In this act the nation had at long last (after a hundred years) included the Negro in the Declaration of Independence which declares that all men are created equal. That is, they possess the equal natural right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. Then followed the 13th Amendment to the Federal Constitution in 1865 outlawing slavery in all parts of the United States and proclaiming all American Negroes free. One year later the 14th Amendment gave to former slaves the full rights as American citizens, and early in 1868 Congress passed the 15th Amendment giving and assuring the Negro the right to vote.

It is most fitting that we pause here to recognize and to celebrate these historic achievements in the nation's life and give thanks to Almighty God for the blessing of liberty and for the goods bequeathed to us as a race and as a people under the stars and stripes. The words we speak today would be meaningless and empty gestures if not supported by the facts of history. In our feeble way we have strove to help the nation grow and come to new heights of power. With horny hands we have felled the trees, cleared the forest, tilled the soil, and have had a share in the cultural pattern of American life. With the nation we have suffered, and as soldiers our sons and daughters have gladly died, and their sacred remains rest in the earthly bosom of many nations scattered around the world, and ~~we~~ have perished in many ~~ways~~ and their invisible particles have found their place in the watery niches of the Seven Seas. We still appreciate our flag and pledge our allegiance to this Republic, and are dedicated to the highest ideals for which it stands. We are a part of this nation. We are her sons and daughters conceived in the matrix of liberty and born as heirs of this blessed country nestled between two oceans, refreshed by evening dews, and protected by the God of all the earth.

We do appreciate all the achievements of the past one hundred years as reflected in the nation as well as the growth of our race. We know that we have a great country and a great nation. The conscience of America has not allowed any reprisal

of her constitution that would negate the achievements of the past or totally block the upward thrust of the democratic process. The economic, political, and cultural growth of our nation has been phenomenal and comprehensive, and we as a race have shared in this growth. We have built homes, reared families, educated children, produced some scholars, business men, scientists, artists, religious leaders, and thousands of just plain good people. Though handicapped on many fronts we have already made significant contributions to American life. Now when the history of the nation is read the story of the struggles, growth, determination and achievements of our people must be recounted. And where there has been inequality of opportunity, the Negro as a race has not surrendered or turned away from the struggle to nurse his wounds; nor has he grown bitter in soul, but he has been at the task of seizing some opportunities and partaking in degrees of the nation's culture. It is true that much remains to be done, but much has been accomplished for which we are grateful and eternally thankful.

As great and as worthy is our nation in her purposes and her achievements, we must admit that there remains after one hundred years much more land to be conquered and much work still to be done before the nation can fulfill her mission and her destiny. Her achievements we delight to recount, and her glories we shall always praise. But her failures and unfinished labors we remember with regret, disappointment, and sorrow.

#### Some Unfinished Business

We read our nation's history both as idealists and as realists. We regret that there remain many shameful spots on the nation's life and character. We must confess that there are many promises unfulfilled, and the nation is still partly free and partly bound with chains. As a race our rights are still restricted, and the slaves have been emancipated only in part; for after one hundred years the ghost of the past still haunts us, and the demon of injustice brandishes his sword, and many unjust judges still occupy the sacred bench. We have exchanged the chains of slavery for the cursed ropes of segregation, and the weights of servitude for the burdens of discrimination. Hence after one hundred years, legally and morally, the nation is in many respects where it was in 1863. The Republic is still divided between north and south. The great rebellion still goes on, and the Civil War has not been completely closed. The cry for deliverance is heard in every hamlet, village, and town of the United States. In this struggle there are three principle parties: first, the would-be master or the oppressor; second, the oppressed; and third, the nation itself.

#### I. The Labors Of The Oppressor

Since Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation there have been those in America who have labored to reverse this noble decision and to take from the Federal Constitution the sacred amendments safeguarding the rights of all American citizens. These oppressors have skillfully manipulated the Constitution for the past one hundred years in order to defend their dogma of segregation and to justify their sins of discrimination. They have twisted the laws of the several states to give themselves a hiding place behind STATE RIGHTS while they deny the civil rights of millions of Americans. These oppressors have set up what is often called a SOUTHERN WAY OF LIFE in contrast to the American way of life. For a hundred years they have bolted and barred the doors of institutions of learning and denied to others access to the ballot box. In the name of democracy they have stolen the liberty from others and have forced one tenth of the nation's population into the jim crow class as second rate citizens, and have blamed them for their weaknesses, laughed at their shortcomings, and cursed them when they failed. These oppressors have often taken the laws in their own hand and have slaughtered others without repentance. Some have taken public offices as governors of states, senators and congressmen of the United States, and with uplifted hands have sworn to defend the nation against enemies foreign and domestic, and to carry out and uphold the principle of the Federal Constitution; and then have defied the verdict of the Supreme Court, and have lived in contempt of the same and have written on the statue books of the



several states, laws to hinder the free operation of some of the highest laws of the Federal Government.

These are the children of former masters, and the offspring of those who profited by chattel slavery. For them the Emancipation Proclamation interfered with their accepted way of life, and the constitutional provisions giving freedom to all are out of step with their dreams and thoughts. They have formed and they are still forming secret societies to by-pass the laws of the land and to continue their practice of segregation. Their voices are heard still in the sacred halls of Congress, and after one hundred years they still are not ashamed to employ the filibuster to impose the will of the minority on the majority and to further defeat the growth of justice and freedom. They would put property rights before personal rights, and the caste of color before the sacred cause of the nation. After a hundred years they are still determined to withstand all efforts to make America a free Republic in deeds as well as words. Against these oppressors the lovers of freedom have fought and are still fighting a heroic battle, and must, and will continue this fight until they are subdued and all Americans are free.

#### The Struggle Of The American Negro

Though unlettered and unlearned, when the day of emancipation broke and the light of freedom dawned upon them, these humble former slaves rushed forward, and with their puny efforts claimed the precious gift that had been bequeathed, and sought to preserve and to protect this jewel of freedom that they so much loved. For a hundred years now, they have waged an incessant battle against their oppressors and have labored, but in vain, to receive all the rights offered and promised. This struggle has expressed itself in many and varied forms, but historically it has never been the voice of request, of reason, persuasion, and the pressure by protest.

These protest pressures have expressed themselves in the form of boycotts, acts of civil disobedience, economic reprisals, and mass parades. The purposes of these pressures are clear:

1. To secure immediate deliverance from the perils, penalties, and shame of segregation.
2. To gain first-class citizenship in every aspect of American life.
3. To shock the conscience of America and goad the majority into action against injustice.
4. To expose these sins within the United States to the world in order that the whole nation might repent in shame and change her ways, enforce her laws, respect all men, and grant to all citizens first-class rights, first-class opportunities, and first-class responsibilities.

#### Some Dangers In Pressure By Protest

However, we must admit there are some dangers in pressure by protest.

1. Since it is designed to change the minds of others for the better, if it does not accomplish this end immediately, we may tend to become discouraged and bitter.
2. Our limited economic resources will handicap us as a minority if this type of battle is long and intensive.
3. If pressure by protest should remove all barriers and win for the American Negro all victories against their oppressors they still must face the long and arduous task of building their economic fortunes, getting better training in the professional and scientific fields, and acquiring the type of preparation that is most essential in this age of automation and under the spell of atomic science.

#### Pressure By Production

Here members of the Negro community seek to solve some of the problems they face by producing some of the things they desire and thus making them available not only for their own race, but for the community both colored and white.

They are led to organize capital, build stores, and produce those things that are needed and acceptable and appreciated by first-class American citizens. Pressure by production has some disadvantages:

1. It requires more time for victory than pressure by protest.
2. It does not satisfy at once the impatient spirit of the oppressed, and at times it seems to move too slowly.
3. It is not as popular and is less glamorous than pressure by protest. But there are some distinct advantages in pressure by production:

1. It need not wholly negate pressure by protest. That is, while we build for ourselves and become a competitor with others we may also make known the acts of injustice and the sins of discrimination.

2. Pressure by production is designed to improve the lot both of the oppressed and of the whole community. If the white community does not accept or respond to pressure by production the Negro community would still be successful in lifting its own economical and cultural standard, thereby blessing themselves and the community in which they live.

3. If the desire is that we will not trade where we are discriminated against, production gives us a place to trade while we await a change in policy in stores that discriminate and segregate. The truth is, one can wait longer before going to such a store when one has access to a store where none of these negatives are encountered or practiced. It is not enough to give the order that we will not buy groceries and clothing where we are discriminated against. We must provide a place where groceries, clothing, and shoes may be purchased, and such stores should be built by cooperative effort so that they will attract the best people among all citizens of the United States, and the service should be high class and the goods of the highest caliber.

It is not too much to ask that on the level of production we build some of the finest restaurants and cafes by cooperative effort; for any restaurant that is clean and first-class with food well-bought, well-seasoned, and well-cooked, will attract hungry people in spite of the color of their skin. Pressure by production will not allow us to be satisfied just to eat in another's restaurant or to be employed in a store owned by other people. Here we labor to change the relationship from customer to owner, to that of owner to owner. That is to say, in pressure by protest we leave the store in the hands of our white friends and seek only the chance and the right to spend our money there. In protest by production we purchase a store and become a store owner as our white friends and welcome all races and peoples to become our customers. It is not economically sound to invest our money in such a way that we weaken ourselves as an economic group and make economically stronger, a segregating and discriminating group. The day must come when in the field of business Negroes will compete with their white neighbors as they now compete in sports, in the arts, and in the professions.

In the scientific field we need not wait until another discovers the formula, creates the patent, and acquires the copyright. The book of knowledge is open. The highway of wisdom is available. The temple of creativity is not locked. Let us go in, and with the raw materials available increase the numbers of those who are the producers of new commodities, the creators of new implements; for it is now a matter of record that where the science of medicine is known and the art of healing is possessed, men of all colors and classes will knock at the door and seek admittance to the physicians' office if his skin is black as a thousand midnights. Learn well your song, and drink deeply from the Pierian springs of inspiring music and the world will bow at your feet and will delight to sing of your greatness as it has already done for Roland Hayes of yesteryears, and of Marian Anderson of a more recent date. To young Negroes I say, let not the opportunity slip. Remember the possibilities of creativity in the days of thy youth, spend well the hours of the search, study, and thought while the years of maturity are not yet and the days of rush, conflict, and contest are not upon you. Fix your eyes now upon the highest mental, moral, and spiritual star, and go forward and upward to the winds of fate light of the same. Open the sails of your human potentials to the winds of fate and set them for sailing towards life's highest and most lofty goals, and make sure of possessing inner motor power and fuel that will guarantee the continuity of the

voyage though the waves of discrimination are high and the mad-caps of prejudice are breaking fast, and howling storms beat and tug at your ship with dreadful, ferocious, and merciless power. It is good to fall heir to accumulated wealth and to contend for and get one's share in the legacies of the past, but it is much better to be armed with the genius to invent, the ingenuity to produce, and the eternal spirit to create; for in this context, a Thomas Edison finds an abiding light as the sun goes down, and a Henry Ford releases the horseless chariots in the streets and a gifted Alexander Bell bridges the chasms of distance and puts all covenants in speaking range of their neighbors.

While we shall do all within our power to overcome every obstacle, remove every hindering stone, and to come to the full stature of first-class citizenship in the country, we will not forget however, to work with our many allies that are now at hand in this great undertaking. Our allies are all American citizens who are dedicated to democracy, also the Federal Constitution, the courts of the land, and every agency of government working for the full realization of the American dream. The nation herself then has a task in this matter of completing what has been so nobly begun.

#### The Task Of The Nation

The United States must not and cannot stand idly by and leave this contest in the hands of the segregators and the segregated and await the outcome of this crucial battle between the oppressors and the oppressed. It is the nation's responsibility to assure and guarantee freedom to all of its citizens. Too long has the nation delayed, too long has she postponed direct and immediate action, too long has she left the struggle in the hands of others, and too long has she relegated the task of the achievement of civil rights to a secondary place in her life and action. The nation must act and act now. If she doesn't act, the present conflict will breed more confusion, and the present battle will end in a tragic defeat for the nation. If America does not solve the problem of civil rights constructively she will lose her moral leadership of the free world, and will deny her own assumption of justice and liberty. The suffering of one part of the nation reflects itself in the affliction and penalty of the whole.

If one-tenth of the nation's population must be kept in chains, then the other nine-tenths must live and rear their children in the sight of and in the fear of encroaching poverty. And if part of a democracy must be afflicted by the pangs of segregation and discrimination, then all must live near the dreadful camp of ignorance and spend their days suffering from the same diseases with which the pain is inflicted. If the rich robs the poor, they must be taxed to guarantee relief for their needy victims. Remember, the jailer himself is in a sense a prisoner with his prisoners, and the hangman who springs the trap himself dies a thousand deaths.

Be not deceived by vain platitudes; follow not the way of pseudo philosophy and unsound political dogmas. Learn well the lessons that life has taught, that time has revealed, and history has preserved; for truth is one, justice is indivisible, and freedom cannot be kept in separate compartments and preserved in fractions. The liberty of no people can rest on the broken lives of others, and the eternal security of a nation cannot be built on the bending backs of slaves or the broken bodies of the oppressed and the bleached bones of the slaughtered. In the interest of herself and for the preservation of her own soul, our nation must solve the problem of civil rights and give to each American citizen the portion of goods that rightly belongs to him.

Our nation cannot forsake her highest ideals nor forget her most lofty dreams and pluck up the foundation stones of freedom and truth on which our fathers builded. America must not suffer her sacred documents promising human dignity and freedom to be burned in a furnace of envy and hate. She will not fall herself or mankind. She has travelled too far on the load of democracy and freedom to ever turn back to the slime and scum of human servitude and any form of chattel slavery.

The task belongs to America. She must destroy intolerance, discrimination, and segregation, and remove every particle of this cancerous tissue from her body politic. The sore of the past must be healed and purged of germs or America will

be destroyed by these diseases. The nation must win the battle of civil rights by doing the following:

1. First, the nation must realize that there shall be no compromise of the basic law of the land. All criminals must be apprehended and brought before the Bar of Justice. The guilty must be punished and the innocent set free. For one hundred years the Federal Constitution has been compromised and indeed flaunted to appease those who were guilty of godless prejudice, and as a result there are many complications and troubles that the nation faces today.

2. The nation must also adopt a new system of education designed to lead men and women into an appreciation of the rights of all its citizens even though there may be some that they may not like or admire. An opportunity for the best possible education must be extended to all citizens without qualifications.

3. In the third place the nation must remove all the barriers to first-class citizenship and extend to all equality of opportunity and protection under the law. The right to vote must be extended to all without modification and without intimidation. In his country we must do the following:

- a. Give to all citizens of voting age the vote without restriction.
- b. Establish uniform rules for voting all over the nation.
- c. If there are to be qualifying questions let them also be uniform and approved by the Federal Government.
- d. If there are to be set questions let them be prepared by the Federal Government.

e. Let the Federal Government protect the voting of all citizens by refusing to permit the registrar of any state, county, ward, or precinct to tell what questions should be asked and what policies should be set up to determine the qualifications for voting.

f. The nation should manifest at least the same type of concern for its first-class voting citizens as it does in preparing our foreign born to become naturalized citizens.

The nation must not take lightly the responsibility of training its citizens and helping them to become efficient and loyal members of a democratic society. There are too many isms seeking to invade our country, and too many potential enemies within for the government to take lightly the task of making first-class citizens out of all of her people. The nation must do all within her power to heal the wounds of the past, to correct the political errors and economic blunders of days gone by, and to release the full strength of the mental, moral, and spiritual resources of this great Republic. Already a strange ideology is attacking us, and foreign agents prowl and lurk about our streets seeking to wreck the nation at any cost. These enemies cannot be easily detected until the full light of freedom is turned on in every nook and corner of the country, in every alley and street of our cities, and in every house on highways, and in isolated fields. America now has the strength for the task, let her use it. She has the wisdom, let it be employed now. She has the theory, put it in practice; for the greatest battle of the nation will not be fought on foreign soil, but on our own sacred soil. It is a domestic battle for the rights of men, for the justice and equal opportunities that have been so long promised and not given. America can win this battle, and if she wins it her potential enemies once they seek to invade her, will meet a nation with more than a hundred and eighty million patriotic souls dedicated to her protection, her security, and her life.

We must tell our congressmen and the governors of our several states that the civil rights struggle is not a racial struggle alone. It is the struggle for the very life of the nation. When a civil rights bill is before the United States Congress or any similar bill that has to do with the nation's character and life, it should receive priority because of what it means to the future of this great Republic. There will be little use to concentrate on secondaries if the primary things of the nation are overlooked and lost. It is not wise for groups, nationalities, and races to strive for that which is peculiar to them when the nation's life is at stake. It is a most serious blunder for Americans to talk about the purity of race and the preservation of the Caucasian tradition when the whole nation is threatened from within.

When the ship at sea is on fire and a bucket brigade is necessary to help extinguish the flames, any passenger is ill-informed or wrongly directed if said passenger seeks to protect his state room and to exclude himself from joint struggle of passengers and crew to save the endangered ship, or, all aboard including the captain, his crew, and passengers will go down together to a common grave beneath a foaming sea. After a hundred years the nation's life is in danger, the ship of state is on fire. The chief executive, the Congress of the United States, and all citizens black and white must join the bucket brigade to put out the fires of prejudice, hatred, and inequality or else all shall perish in the crucial defeat of the nation.

America must not delay in this noble venture and must not ask the searchers for freedom to delay their efforts and to dismiss the quest; for they could not stop if they tried, and the desire to achieve freedom could not be dismissed if the nation willed it. This desire is as natural as hunger, thirst, rest, and repose after the labors of the day.

We cannot shrink from it to ease the labors and the duties of the state. The nation knows well that there can be no compromise at this point between the citizens and the state. Freedom is a gift from God and its seeds are planted deeply in the souls of men by the Divine Hand, so that no human agency can pluck them out, and no flood can wash them away, and no heat or power can destroy them. The decrees of masters cannot enslave freedom, and the threats of demagogues will never change it, biting dogs cannot gnaw it away. Mobs will never lynch it, swords cannot separate it from the delicate tissues of the human soul, charging guns will not eliminate it, dungeons will never destroy it, fires have not consumed it, and hell with all of its power will never put an end to it. Freedom will never slumber in the graves of honored heroes, for even if crushed to the earth, it will in the course of time rise again; for it is immortal in its nature, divine in its origin, and eternal in its purpose.

#### Citizens Responsibility

In calling the nation to its task we seek not a substitute for the responsibility of citizens. What is secured and given by the nation must be appropriated and harnessed by citizens. While it is true that the nation cannot destroy the desire for freedom and no external circumstances can blot it from the human spirit, it is equally true that no external power alone can set a people free. Therefore, we must be warned against the temptation to rely too much on what the state can do in order to make us free. Each emancipated citizen must somehow write his own charter of independence and rise to the occasion by accepting his responsibility as a citizen. The defeat of segregation is not the end, and the mere destruction of discrimination does not render a people independent. For it is possible to win the battle against slavery and oppression, and lose the victory of freedom. A deliverance from the land of bondage must place upon liberated souls the responsibilities of growth and new developments in order to carry well new duties and to perform new tasks.

When ancient Israel embarked upon a journey of freedom, for awhile all went well. It seemed that all the forces of nature worked for her defense, and by a strange miracle of Providence they escaped the prison house of Egypt without having trained soldiers to withstand the ready armies of Egypt. They left Pharaoh's cruel dominion against his studied judgment and political consent. By a pillar of cloud they walked by day, and a pillar of fire by night until they stood at the waters of the Red Sea. In hot pursuit of them were the armies of Egypt, Pharaoh, his horsemen, and his chariots. But at the appointed time the angry waters claimed the fighting army; and the king, his chariots, and horsemen went down to utter defeat and death. Then Israel stood emancipated on the other side of the sea. Now Pharaoh was dead and there were no masters against whom to express their hostility and envy, and they finally turned and complained against their leaders who had brought them from the land of bondage in sight of the land of promise. Some stood in sight of Canaan but kept the appetites of Egypt. They had been delivered from the chains of Egypt but longed for the customs and flesh pots of the old land of bondage. They were emancipated but still dependent on the life in Egypt, and for forty years they wandered in the vast wilderness, some longing to return to things of the past, and others lacking the courage and faith to venture while the land of promise was so

near. The call to us today is, let us go up at once and possess it, for we are well able to overcome it.

#### The Responsibility Of The Church

As a church our convention must draw nearer to the problem that is creating tensions and help if possible to guide the nation to the desired solution. To this end I wish to make one recommendation.

I recommend that the National Baptist Convention will create a Civil Rights Commission, and that we would suggest to every state convention to create a similar commission and extend the work of said commission down through associations, district conventions, and into the local church. As soon as possible, a budget should be created that will provide an adequate salary for a full time executive secretary of said commission.

The civil rights struggle has reached such a crucial period that our convention should do more than stand by as an observer or raise collections upon request, or blindly follow every leader in the civil rights field without study and thought. Many civil rights organizations and leaders have taken on an anti-church attitude, anti-religious disposition, and carry on anti-Christian propaganda. Some are anti-democracy, oppose the freedom of speech, and have resorted to picketing churches.

While we must always be for civil rights with all our soul, mind, and strength, we must not leave our people as the helpless victims of those who would use them for selfish purposes and who would labor to keep them in chains. We must always oppose discrimination and segregation in every form and work for first-class citizenship with all our might. But we must labor incessantly to give to our people Christian assistance, Christian fellowship, and Christian guidance in this hour of crises.

Those of us who love our race, our nation, and our church, and who have accepted Christ as our guide must work not only for the salvation of our great country, but for the salvation of all mankind.

This Civil Rights Commission must explore every field and aspect of the problem and work on the local level and try as nearly as possible to aid in taking the steps to solve many of these problems before they burst forth into dangerous tensions and conflicts. We must also work with business executives, politicians, and all classes in an attempt to help find a solution to all of our racial problems in the American way. We must also work on the national level with representatives in the nation's capitol. While we will not seek to negate or oppose the legitimate work of any other civil rights groups, as free Americans and as an independent religious organization, we will reserve the right to express our own point of view in the struggle.

It is the democratic right and Baptist privilege of any individual member to leave any church and join another church of his choice and have fellowship with any organization in which he finds personal satisfaction and encouragement. But we as ministers should not blindly lead our people away from the church and put them in the hands of others who will damn them and then teach them to curse the church. If we do not face our responsibility as a denomination and take this new venture in the interest of the civil rights of our people, history will condemn us, and future generations will scorn the records that we leave. It is unfair to ourselves, to our race, and to our nation to secretly participate in the great struggle for civil rights as we have done in the past without our people knowing our contribution and our concern. We must not only win the battle against segregation, we must win it within the framework of the nation's life, in respect and appreciation of other people as well as ourselves, and without viciousness or mob violence.

The church is commissioned to go into all the world and make disciples of all nations. This commission puts upon us the responsibility to become prophets of social justice, apostles of universal freedom, champions of goodwill, and messengers of the redemptive gospel of Jesus Christ. This commission has always called the messengers of the Cross to the hazardous, the dangerous, and unpopular, but we must go. Our heathen world today is not beyond the seas but is close at hand. The jungle spirit is in the cities and towns of our country and moves among the learned and the unlearned. It is committed to the destruction of nations, the desecration of

human character, and the subjugation of human personality. The call of God is still fresh, the demand is still urgent. We must go in faith, in dedication, and in courage.

#### A Concluding Word

The struggle for freedom must go on until the goal is reached and all are completely free. There must be no compromise with tokenism, no counsel to go slow. We must go as fast as we can and employ every constructive method to arrive at the goal, but as we struggle we must always remember that we struggle not against the nation, not against the established institutions of America, and not against the American way of life. We struggle only against those evils and those social and political men that have denied to men their rights as American citizens, and which are damning the soul of the nation. We must not allow ourselves to be swept off our feet by rabble rousers and by hate mongers. We must study carefully the issues of the day and make a sane and intelligent approach and not be lost in emotionalism.

We must at all times encourage the fight for freedom. While we want our rights now, we must not follow any group of leaders black or white who seek to lead us into rebellion against our nation and the just laws of the land. We must not join any anti-American propaganda and help to carry on an anti-white campaign and stir up hatred, ill-will, and prejudice against any person or groups in this country. We must not allow our race to be used by any foreign ideology as a secret means of opposing the larger freedom and for the defeat of democracy. There is present among us already a strange spirit, and it has brought into our midst some strange peoples and strange groups. They have attached themselves to many of our worthy civil rights movements. They are in many of our conventions and associations, and some have taken membership in our churches. They say they want us to be free but they are hypocrites and liars. They are not interested in our freedom nor in the welfare of the nation. They are opposed to every established institution in America; family life, free education, freedom of speech, freedom of the press, and the freedom of religion. They oppose the constructive improvement in the nation's life. They would not use any of the tools at hand to improve and correct the failures of the nation. They confess the sins of the nation for confusion but not for correction.

As the president of your convention, more than one I have been the target of the attacks of this foreign spirit during the past twelve months. Because I have spoken about freedom and the American way of life and the Christian approach to our problems, I have been constantly called by secret agents and asked to keep quiet with threats if I did not. They have sought to dictate whom I should invite to speak in my local pulpit. They have had the audacity to come to the Olivet Baptist Church at 3101 S. Parkway, and throw a picket line around the same on Sunday morning, hoping to check the worshippers, and suggested that I should not cross the picket line even to preach. Picket lines have served many noble purposes in the battle of labor in this country, and they have done much to improve the economic lot of many. But oh strange picket line that casts itself around the church of God! I need not tell you that I crossed the picket line. Any picket line that is thrown between the preacher and his pulpit, between Christians and their church, must be crossed, and we must walk heavily as we cross. I crossed the picket line to preach. Think of it! In free, liberty-loving America where we believe in the separation of church and state, on June 30, 1963, I crossed a picket line to reach the pulpit to preach. Four days later I was trapped at a public freedom rally in Grant Park, Chicago, Illinois, held by the National Convention of the National Association For The Advancement of Colored People, and along with the mayor of the city I was booted from the stage. I had been invited by the executive officers of the association and felt duty bound to accept. About three minutes after I had felt the stage I found myself shut off from relatives and friends, surrounded by strange people with strange actions so much so that it appeared that I was now in a strange country. They shouted slogans, vituperating epithets, and even threats of death. It was a battery of policemen who rescued me amidst shouts of "kill him, kill him."

This is a new tyranny and a new threat to freedom. As one comes to a rally dedicated to freedom, one is seized by a mob with threats of death. Why such actions? Who has the answer to these questions? I have received advice and a counsel of caution, but what is the crime committed, and what is the offense of which I am guilty? I confess here and now that I am a lover of my race and a devout and patriotic citizen of my nation, and I have no desire to change such loyalty. America is my country. With its imperfections, with its shortcomings, America is my country. Washington, D. C. is my national capital, and to no other far-away city in the world do I look for security and earthly protection. My capitol nestles on the Potomac and shall be there as long as the nation wills it so.

As a committed preacher of the gospel of Jesus Christ I cannot retreat from my task, for it is impossible to forsake a calling that comes from above. The Master has fixed it so. The request has come that I keep quiet, but I cannot. For a preacher of the gospel to retreat from truth is an act of desertion, and to deny the God who made, saved, and called him, is the highest treason, and to be silent in danger is to betray the Christian message of the Cross, and is an open revolt against the power of that burning fire shut up in the bones of the saints of God. And his refusal to testify will transfer the message of redemption to the feeble wings of destiny, leaving the rocks to proclaim the Divine Presence, and trusting babbling brooks to praise Him by playing harp music over the rough hewn faces of jagged stones. If the preacher does not speak dumb nature will, and if the redeemed of the Lord proclaim not the sacred story the heavens will declare it and the earth will groan it.

The Master commands us fear not what men may do to our bodies, and worship not our physical frame, for as the creature of time we are born to die while our souls go back to dwell with the God who gave them. We must work the works of Him that sent us while it is day, for the night is sure to come when no man can work.

Oh pleasant night when day is done.

Oh rich reward when the race is run,

What joyous hours when the end has come.

His presence makes the unknown well known, and His love makes the strange places home. So He that brought us together twelve months ago has brought us together again, and He who is with us today will be with us twelve months hence, for He never leaves us alone. When haunted by solitude, when friends are gone, when plagued by the solemn hours of despair, in a tearful night He is always there and He has never left us alone.

Since I gave to Jesus my poor, broken heart,

He never has left me alone.

Since I for the home-land eternal did start,

He never has left me alone.

I cannot say and I will not say that all of us will meet twelve months from now, but I can say we will not be alone. I cannot say that my Master will bring me back to this hour twelve months hence, and I raise no question with Him. While this fellowship is sweet and this annual meeting most refreshing, I am satisfied to be with Him wherever He leads; for if I am not here I will be there, and if not in this land of threats, of sickness, sorrow, and death, I shall be with Him and others in that homeland of the soul.

**THE OFFICIAL MESSAGE OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION,  
USA, INC. TO ITS MEMBER CHURCHES AND THE NATION**

The National Baptist Convention in its 83rd Annual Session in Cleveland, Ohio again re-emphasized the supreme place that the Christian religion has in the modern struggle of mankind. There is little or no hope for better race relations, fellowship and peace among nations without the quality of life proclaimed by Jesus Christ. A deeper consecration and dedication to the cause of Christ is still the urgent need among believers as well as mankind in general. The foundation of a free society rests on the implementation of the principles of the Christian religion into all areas of human relationship. There is but one real and lasting salvation and true freedom, and that is the life of God within the soul. The true society of God which our world needs so much today will not be miraculously ushered in by the proclamation of any sudden cure. Man today must be committed to more than the mere gaining of material value. He should be motivated by the spirit of God giving total direction to his entire being. Nothing short of the sharing of life, the spirit of love, and brotherhood, the personal consecration of ourselves to our God and our fellow man will make a good society.

**On Civil Rights**

The struggle for civil rights and first-class citizenship is the responsibility both of the state and of the church. The answer to the problem is not less freedom, but more freedom; not only through the agencies of the state, but through Christ. The present practices of segregation and the denial of equal opportunities to citizens based solely upon race is diametrically opposed to the principles of Jesus to which we are committed, and his redemptive message to mankind. We believe in freedom; freedom of mind, freedom of the will, and freedom of the soul. The church under the command of Jesus Christ its Redeemer and Lord, is directed to serve in a positive way all the facets of human society. Its pronouncements must forever be in harmony with the will and purpose of the Kingdom of God under the direct leadership of the Holy Spirit. The actions of the church in its relationship with men must outwardly demonstrate the inward presence and power of the Spirit of God within the soul of the church. As Christians who make up the church, our task is to live in the life and power of the self-giving divine love of Jesus Christ our Lord. Our lives must be kindled and aflame with that passion that completely possessed Christ, thus giving us a Christian love for our fellow-man that is real, practical and dynamic, showing itself in the beauty and joy of service. We must continue to work for freedom and Civil Rights until every blot of segregation and prejudice has been erased from the scene of our beloved America. We must consistently urge our representatives in the Halls of Congress that the National Government has a responsibility to act and to act now in granting freedom and Civil Rights to all of its people. We must do this because we love America, we love our God, and we love our fellow-man. Christians must struggle for freedom until all men, are completely free through Jesus Christ.

**Our Future Outlook**

Sensing the need for a more direct involvement in the struggle for freedom and with a deep desire to help give spiritual direction to our nation and world, we have everwhelmingly accepted the recommendation presented by President J. E. Jackson to establish within the organized structure of the National Baptist Convention a Commission On Civil Rights. The National Baptist Convention through this commission will work for the following purposes:

1. First-class citizenship in the United States of America on all levels for all people.
2. To advocate, defend, and uphold the letter and spirit of the Federal Constitution and to keep the struggle in the framework of law and order.
3. To work for better human relations at the local level as well as on a national scale in a spirit of justice and goodwill.

4. To seek to eliminate any form of racial discrimination in housing, education, employment, and in all civic, cultural relationships.

5. To seek to reduce racial, sectional and class tensions through dialog, better understanding and tolerance.

6. To seek always to carry on the struggle for civil rights according to the highest laws of the land and in harmony with the American ideals of freedom and democracy, and in the light of and by the influence of the Judeo-Christian moral, and spiritual standards of life.

7. To make full use of the conference method in negotiating differences and in an attempt to solve community problems before they become serious social conflicts. To seek to bring people of the local community closer together so that the struggle may be carried on by people who love the community and who have manifested that love by living and rearing their families in said community.

Dr Jackson gave in his annual message the following directive:

"The church is commissioned to go into all the world and make disciples of all nations. This commission puts upon us the responsibility to become prophets of social justice, apostles of universal freedom, and messengers of the redemptive gospel of Jesus Christ. The call of God is still fresh, and the command is still urgent. We must go in faith, in dedication, and in courage." Until full freedom is realized, we shall remain committed to the struggle. Christians must never compromise, for with faith in God, confidence in our fellow-man, and a firm faith in the future of our nation, victory for right is assured.

**Summary**

Whether applying pressure by protest or pressure by production or whether in demonstrations, mass marches, or quiet reasoning around the conference table, we urge that the following three determining standards will always be recognized:

1. That the Federal Constitution will be the legal standard.
2. That the American philosophy of freedom will regulate all efforts and actions.
3. That the Spirit of Christ will be accepted as the ultimate standard of moral and spiritual aspirations.

While we see the urgent need for a commission on civil rights within the organized structure of our denomination, it is our hope that the nation's serious and uncompromising application and practice of its own principles of justice, equality, and fair-play will make it absolutely unnecessary to continue existing organizations for civil rights, or the creation of new ones for the attainments and the security of equality of opportunity for all citizens.

The call today is for deeper personal commitment to the moral and spiritual of Jesus Christ and the social applications of the ideals of His Kingdom Now. The truth is, the call of the National Baptist Convention to its local churches and to all Christendom and to the nations of the world is to a **NEW CHRISTIAN MANIFESTATION**.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF SECRETARY T. J. JEMISON TO THE EIGHTH  
THIRD ANNUAL SESSION OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION,  
U.S.A. INCORPORATED, MEETING IN CLEVELAND, OHIO

September 3-8, 1963

Mr. President, members of the Official Family, delegates, and visiting friends of the National Baptist Convention, U. S. A., Inc., it affords me a great deal of pleasure to make my Annual Report to you as your General Secretary. I approach my task with deep humility and with a keen sense of the responsibility for the High Office that you saw fit to elect me to in Miami of 1953.

It has been twenty-two (22) years since we have been to Cleveland. I remember the Cleveland Convention with great pride for it was here then that my late lamented father, Dr. D. V. Jemison was elected President and I was by his side as a mere Seminary Student At Virginia Union University.

The succeeding years have been kind to me and I have watched the Convention grow by leaps and bounds. As the Convention has grown so have the responsibilities of my office. I want you to know that I have endeavored to be the kind of Secretary that you could be justly proud of.

The growth of our Convention under the Leadership of President J. H. Jackson has been unprecedented in our long Eighty-three year history. Never before has such harmony existed in all of our Commercial Boards and auxiliaries.

As your Secretary, Keeper of your Records, I want to assure you that all is well. Have no fear, we are, as a body steadily moving forward. We have paid our quota of \$3000.00 in the Baptist World Alliance and our quota in the World Council of Churches of \$5,800.00. We have a \$10,000 Scholarship at Roosevelt College in Chicago, and we have paid \$1,750.00 to three different colleges to encourage young Baptist students to stay in school and prepare for the future. We have more life members on record today than ever before in the history of the Convention. Yes, have no fear brethren, we are moving forward.

During the year as your Secretary I had stimulating visits to the following Conventions: Texas Baptist, Dr. S. T. Alexander, President; General Florida Baptist State Convention, Dr. J. A. F. Finlayson, President; Arkansas Consolidated, Dr. F. I. Guy, President; East Mississippi, Dr. E. W. Wallace, President; and the National Capitol Convention, Dr. W. C. Cole, President. I am happy to state these Conventions are all moving forward with vigorous programs and dynamic leadership.

We are again indebted to Dr. D. C. Washington and his staff at the Sunday School Publishing Board for publishing our 62 minutes. We mailed all of them out by the middle of last month. President Jackson, Officers, Members of the Board of Directors, and Messengers that have gathered in Cleveland, Ohio, I am pleased to submit the Annual Report of the Sunday School Publishing Board, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1963.

"And there is yet very much land to be possessed."—Joshua 13:1

The challenge to achieve the unachieved, to attain the unattained, or to possess the unpossessed, is one of the most effective forces which influence human behavior. We make little or no progress when we satisfy ourselves with past performances, but must constantly reach upward and outward to new fields of endeavor, if we are to utilize our full potential for growth. Just as a sense of purpose gives direction to the life of an individual, so does the defining of goals establish guide lines for the operation of an organization, or an institution, whether it be religious or secular.

In keeping with our chartered purpose, your Sunday School Publishing Board has continued to devote itself to the advancement of our Christian faith through the publishing and distribution of religious literature, and the development and improvement of Christian Education progress among our constituents.

Realizing that changing times make new demands upon us, we have sought to bridge the gap between the actual and the ideal in all phases of our operation.

#### PERSONNEL

The Sunday School Publishing Board has some one hundred and ten full time employees, and benefits from the part time services of numerous others who make special contributions to various phases of our work. The Executive Director and his Administrative Staff supervise the programs of the various departments, namely, the Editorial, Production, Sales, Business, Christian Education and Building Divisions. We have gained great inspiration from the keen interest and our Board evidences in our operation, and are especially appreciative of the effort of our Chairman, Dr. W. T. Crutcher, who maintains an office in our building in Nashville. The entire personnel of the Sunday School Publishing Board have lent full cooperation and support to our program during this past year, as together we have labored to "possess new land" in advancing the kingdom of God through the printed word.

#### THE EDITORIAL DIVISION

During the past year the Editorial Division has been keenly aware of the needs and demands of the National Baptist constituency. Bible study lessons have been carefully written, critically edited, professionally published and regularly presented each quarter on schedule in keeping with these needs and demands in harmony with the Board's policy of expansion and development. The Editorial Division introduced three new publications: SONGS THAT SING, a collection of songs by J. Robert Bradley, Director of Church Music, and two books of sermons by D. C. Washington, Executive Director.

Manuscripts have been developed by outstanding scholars, both clergymen and laymen, who are devout, consistent and fundamental in Baptist doctrine. Working with a wide range of lesson materials, our writers have been faithful, treating subject matter with discretion, projecting and relating it appropriately to the social and spiritual essence of Christianity. They have articulated the message of

the Baptist Church and its basic concepts with clarity through their ministry with the written word.

In addition to the standard and basic Christian Education materials, there are many other teaching and learning aids offered by the Board that need wider circulation in our churches and among our workers. Some of these are: OUR DAILY BREAD—a quarterly devotional daily meditation, written by prominent pastors and lay persons of our Convention; ACTIVITY and STUDY BOOKS for JUNIOR and INTERMEDIATES—supplements to the quarterlies provided for these age groups; VACATION CHURCH SCHOOL LITERATURE and SUPPLIES—a contemporary, Bible centered, teaching and learning curriculum for the Vacation Church School program; THE PASTOR'S PACKET—complete, factual, up-to-date materials for the progressive pastor for use in working with new members, the sick and shut-ins, the troubled and distressed, and a growing membership, and a DATE BOOK FOR 1964 FOR MINISTERS. While these are enjoying steady sales increases, they need special attention as well as wider circulation among our patrons.

#### PRODUCTION DIVISION

In the Production Division, we have sought to maintain a high quality of work while effecting whatever economics were possible to enable us to hold selling prices down, in spite of increased costs of paper, ink, labor and factory overhead. Maintenance becomes more expensive as machinery ages, and it becomes necessary to replace outmoded equipment when parts are no longer available, or when limited performance threatens work schedules. During the past year our Sunday School literature and Sunday School Commentary were available on time. We have also done a vast amount of printing for the National Baptist Convention and its auxiliaries, including the Minutes of the Convention, Placards for the \$10,000,000.00 Educational Program and accompanying leaflets, Minutes, Programs and other matters for the National Congress, the Mission Magazine, published quarterly for the Woman's Convention, and the National Baptist Voice, published monthly. As we secure additional equipment, we will be in a position to increase our offerings as well as to do more work for the denomination.

#### SALES DIVISION

Our Sales Division proudly announces our new CATALOGUE OF PUBLICATIONS, available now! It illustrates and describes the offerings of the Board, with price quotations and materials carried under several headings. This CATALOGUE is designed to make our work more effective throughout the nation.

We urge you to write for a CATALOGUE so that you may be informed as to all of the many aids to Pastors, Sunday Schools and Church Workers.

For your convenience, we operate Book Stores in Los Angeles and in St. Louis. Any item carried by the Board may also be purchased at either of these outlets.

In spite of the fact that some of our Churches have withdrawn their patronage since the 1961 Session of the National Baptist Convention, our Sales for the past year reflect a slight increase. We are making every effort to reach the unreached and look forward to even larger orders from you, our patrons. May we also take this opportunity to thank you for your loyal support of our efforts, and to express appreciation for your generous patronage.

#### BUSINESS DIVISION

A business institution must have operating capital with which to build up inventory, maintain its physical surroundings, and to replace outmoded equipment. Like most business organizations, the Sunday School Publishing Board has had to meet some of its heavier financial commitments by resorting to long term loans. However, these obligations are being retired systematically, and we enjoy a good credit rating.

We operate under the Federal Wage Hour Law, affecting firms dealing in interstate commerce, and so must comply with the new Wage Increase made effective September 3, 1963. This automatically increases our entire payroll, as proportionate adjustments must be made in order to maintain the proper differential in rates applying to different job classifications. In addition, the cost of Social Security and other fringe benefits will rise correspondingly.

The delinquent accounts of some of our Distributors pose a serious problem for us. Although we have sought diligently to collect all outstanding accounts, some still remain open on our books. The failure of Distributors to pay on time necessitates much of our short term borrowing.

In spite of the fact that the increase in sales was slight, management practiced economies in Production Costs, General and Administrative Expenses, etc., so as to reflect a net profit of \$95,919.75 for the year. This made it possible to pay on some long standing obligations, thus improving our financial status.

#### MORRIS MEMORIAL BUILDING

During the last fiscal year, we have continued painting the interior of Morris Memorial Building. Currently, the outside windows are in process of being painted, as we must keep the Building on par with other buildings in the Capitol Hill Redevelopment Program. The Sunday School Publishing Board operated Morris Memorial Building for the National Baptist Convention at a cost of almost \$4,000.00 above the rent collected from Building tenants, and the rent allocated for the portion of the building occupied by the Sunday School Publishing Board.

#### THE DIVISION OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Division of Christian Education serves as the yardstick for measuring denominational progress in the development and training of Christian leaders. The past year saw a marked increase in the number of Leadership Training Schools accredited, and in the number of instructors certified. Departmental statistics for the year are as follows:

The increase in certificates of progress awarded indicates wider participation and interest in leadership development among our Churches, but "Yet there is Room".

The Sunday School Publishing Board has trained workers who can be made available to assist in planning and conducting area workshops and training schools. This service is designed for you—our constituents, and we urge you to visit our Booth here at the Convention, and pick up a "Fact Finding Survey Blank", which will assist us in ascertaining your needs, so that we may set up schedules for study and for fellowship in your area.

In the future, we anticipate broadly delegating responsibility to the Members of the General Board, for the crystallization of a major overall program of reaching the unreached. General Board Members in the respective states would be expected to coordinate their efforts on the state level, thus, making it possible to

to meet with and serve a wider constituency. A number of advantages would be derived from such a procedure—the General Board would have a stronger and more direct relationship and responsibility in the total program of the Board, and Churches and lay workers would be proportionately strengthened. The Board itself would progressively move into the direction of evaluation and permanent progress in achievement and the accomplishment of plans and programs.

#### THE S. N. VASS AWARD

The S. N. Vass Award, to the pastor or lay leader, for special achievement in Christian Education, has gone unclaimed for another year. We bring this award to your attention in the hope that your churches may be sufficiently encouraged to seek the S. N. Vass Award for the next year. We urge you to write to the Department of Christian Education, Sunday School Publishing Board, requesting the various points of evaluation. Study these points carefully, so that you may be able to begin to gather pertinent information and materials relative to the Educational Program of your Church, and the activities of the Pastor and outstanding Lay Leader. A report of your activities should be sent in to the Sunday School Publishing Board by August, 1963, accompanied by supporting data, such as Programs, Bulletins, Brochures, Plans, etc., which will give an impartial Committee basis for judgment.

To be eligible, a Church must be cooperating with the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., and using the literature of the Sunday School Publishing Board.

#### "POSSESSING THE LAND"

The true image of the Sunday School Publishing Board must be made known. We have got to distinguish between the Sunday School Publishing Board being a publishing house and OUR PUBLISHING HOUSE. Clarification of the Sunday School Board is not only a matter of interpretation, but more fundamentally a problem of basic concept of doctrines and practices. If as a denomination we adhere to certain tenets and practices, it is a natural consequence that the instrument for unification, coordination and cohesion must be regarded as the mountainhead to which we look and resort.

All of us have a role to play as creators of a climate favorable to the growth of the Sunday School Publishing Board. We operate in a highly competitive field and must strive to upgrade our own image. When we buy materials from the Sunday School Publishing Board, we are in truth reinvesting in our own future, for this is your Publishing House and we must encourage the use of our own materials.

For the past year, our Music Coordinator, Mr. J. Robert Bradley, has been on the field serving in State Meetings and in other areas of religious work. He served in Illinois, Alabama, Indiana, Texas, New Jersey, Wisconsin, New York, Ohio, Tennessee, Kansas, Kentucky, Missouri, West Virginia, Florida, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Arkansas, Oklahoma, North Carolina and Mississippi, to name a few states. His services are available for your State Sunday School Congress, or other Conventions, as a service of the Board.

We have participated in Leadership programs at Conventions and Congresses in Alabama, Georgia, Tennessee, Kentucky, Mississippi and Arkansas, among others. The services of our Staff are available for your state and area meetings.

#### NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OBJECTIVES

The Sunday School Publishing Board continues to give complete cooperation to the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc. During last year we contributed \$1,438.87 in support of Convention objectives.



We have printed the NATIONAL BAPTIST VOICE and paid the salary of the Office Manager.

We have borne the office and secretarial expenses of Miss Prunrose Funches National Field Worker, as well as paying her expenses for traveling, her salary and other incidentals.

#### AUDITOR'S CERTIFICATE

We have examined the financial records of the Sunday School Publishing Board a subsidiary of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963 and now submit as our report the exhibits schedules and comments listed in the preceding index.

#### SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances to enable us to render an independent accountant's opinion on the fairness of the representations in the statements showing the financial position of the company at June 30, 1963 and its operating results for the year then ended. The extent of certain procedures employed, including sampling of transactions was based principally on our review of the system of internal control and the efficiency of its functioning.

Cash in banks was independently reconciled and bank balances were confirmed by direct written communication with the depository. Customer's accounts receivable were reviewed and requests were sent to the customers for confirmation of book balances.

Physical inventories were taken by management. We reviewed their method of inventory taking, checked the extensions of their inventory sheets and checked their cost by use of ratios of prior years, raw material invoices and consistency of cost methods employed. All major additions to fixed assets were vouchered and found to be properly classified.

All notes payable were confirmed by communicating directly with the holder. Accounts payable were reviewed and requests for confirmation were mailed to us. A representative number of the confirmations were received and they were in agreement with the records.

Federal tax returns were examined and reconciled with the records. We made sufficient tests of the operating accounts to satisfy us that accepted accounting practices had been followed, and that the transactions had been properly and consistently classified.

#### ACCOUNTANT'S OPINION

In our opinion the accompanying balance sheet and related income statement fairly present the financial position of the Sunday School Publishing Board as of June 30, 1963 in accordance with generally accepted accounting standards.

#### COMMENTS

##### Operations

Net income for the year amounted to 95,918.75, as compared with \$22,320.74 for the preceding year. Exhibit VI shows the operating profit for the years ended June 30, 1963 and 1962, and comparisons in both dollars and percentages.

The percentage of gross sales represented by cost of goods sold decreased by 56% over the corresponding percentage in 1962. There were several cost reduction factors involved.

1—Reduction in size of eight (8) quarterlies from 6 by 9 to 5 1/4 by 7 1/2.

2—Three quarterlies were cut from production.

- (a) Junior Cycle Grade
- (b) Intermediate Cycle Grade
- (c) Senior Cycle Grade

3—Cut in number of pages used.

- (a) Senior Quarterly—44 to 48
- (b) Intermediate Quarterly 64 to 48
- (c) Junior Quarterly 48 to 32

4—Change in type of paper and ink used without a resultant effect in the quality of production.

Percentage wise there was a 6.8% increase in net profit for the year and \$73,599.01 increase dollar wise. Another factor affecting current and future cost is the recent new hiring policy of only hiring specialized personnel over the age of thirty (30) years.

Each bank account was reconciled by us and compared with the ledger account. Written confirmations were obtained from the depositors. Total receipts for the year amounted to \$1,099,522.73 against disbursements of \$1,075,455.31.

##### Accounts receivable \$109,086.87

Statements of accounts at June 30, 1963 were mailed, under our supervision, to all accounts over \$100.00 and to a randomly selected number under \$100.00, to customers with requests that they confirm the correctness of their accounts directly to us. As of the date of this report 65 per cent of the accounts are confirmed.

There was an increase of \$13,024.40 in the 90 day old and over accounts from that of the prior year.

The previous year audit list \$28,344.40 of the over 90 days old account as being delinquent and difficult in collection. We re-examined these accounts and find that \$3,744.42 has been collected during the current year. We recommend that a reserve be set up to cover the potential loss from the current net worth.

Physical inventories were taken by employees of the board under the instruction and observation of management. We reviewed the method of inventory taking and test checked the inventory count sheet.

#### Fixed Assets—\$792,658.46

The additions to the fixed assets account amount to \$13,751.96. A description of these changes appear in exhibit IV. Invoices for all additions to the fixed assets during the year under review were examined, and in our opinion they represent proper charges to these accounts.

#### Prepaid Expenses \$10,815.73

All items are properly computed and are shown in the balance sheet in accordance with accepted accounting practice. An examination of the insurance policies submitted to us show that the physical property is insured for casualty risk for over one million dollars.

We examined schedules of notes and accounts payable. These schedules were satisfactorily compared with the subsidiary ledgers and the supporting documents were reconciled and confirmations were prepared and mailed under our supervision. Purchases and delivery records were examined to determine that current inventory and services are properly reflected, where applicable, in the payable accounts.

Net Worth \$1,710, 748.53

There was an increase in the net worth of \$78,559.03. The items causing this increase are reflected in Exhibit V.

Dr. J. H. Jackson our esteemed president, officers, members, and friends of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc.

It is with a deep sense of gratitude that I present to the Eighty-third Annual Session of our great fellowship the annual report of the National Baptist Training Union Board.

As our attention has been focused this week on the theme "FREEDOM THROUGH CHRIST," we have felt anew the impact of the great pronouncement of John 8:36: "If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed."

A paradoxical element that pervades and characterizes the content of the Christian faith is freedom, for freedom is not free. The New Testament writers, thinking of Christ's sacrifice, went into the marketplace for a description and said that Christ had bought us for a great price. They went into the slave mart and said that Christ had paid a ransom for our liberation. They went into the law court and said that Christ had borne the penalty which we deserved. They went into the temple and said it was Christ's blood, his sacrifice of life, that saved us. Freedom is ours but it has been paid for with a great price.

Herein is another seemingly paradox-freedom that has been paid for by Christ bestows upon one not absolute freedom but the right to choose to become free. Freedom of thought and freedom of action are paid for by decision, devotion, and discipline. The editorial of our third quarter magazine, "The Baptist Training Union Leader," says "Freedom does not mean the right to do what one chooses to do, but it means the privilege of choosing to do what is right (Christ-like)."

#### Rich Heritage

Baptists have a rich heritage of freedom of which we National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., are justly proud. It is with pride that we boast that each Baptist church is its own sovereign body; that each believer is his own priest; that each member can read and interpret the Bible for himself; that the Founder of our churches was Jesus Christ himself and that the pattern of our polity and practice is that of the New Testament churches. One should especially be proud to be a member of a church that is in the direct line of succession from the day Jesus said "Upon this rock I will build my church," and of Pentecost, the birthday of the church, and of the churches that the disciples went throughout the New Testament world establishing.

Do you realize that if by the default the Baptist churches fail to teach about our great heritage, we are within one generation of becoming extinct? Do you realize that it is one of the chief functions of the Baptist Training Union to propagate the Baptist heritage? Baptists must use their freedom to become responsible for and responsive to their Christian heritage.

#### Our Accomplishments

In addition to maintaining our offices in the Morris Memorial Building, Nashville, Tennessee, we have agencies in Birmingham, Alabama; Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; Indianapolis, Indiana; Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; Raleigh, North Carolina; Chicago, Illinois; St. Louis, Missouri; Washington, D. C. as well as in the states of Louisiana, South Carolina, Tennessee, Michigan, New York, Mississippi, and California.

We also have a full time Field Representative, Rev. George Thomas, who is serving the area of, Indiana, Kentucky and Mississippi.

Since our last meeting we raised salaries of all workers, renewed our interest in hospitalization and other employee benefits. We have published two books *The Missionary Worker's Manual*, by Dollye Cunningham and *Baptist Training Union Handbook* by Vada P. Felder, and had for delivery on time and circulated more than one hundred thousand quarterlies per quarter. The Board has contributed \$1200 to the salary of the Publicity Director of the Convention, and to this meeting we brought to the Educational Foundation five thousand (\$5,000.00), the first installment of our \$50,000.00 pledge.

The National Baptist Training Union Board realizes the main business of the Board is to furnish the convention with adequate printed resources that will help them with their group-centered program of experiences which give balanced emphasis on the combination of **knowing and knowing how**. It is our desire to assist the churches with their on-the-job personalized training so that those of the membership may become servants worthy of the name Christian.

The next part of the report will be given by the Director of Baptist Training Union Publications, Mrs. Vada P. Felder, a very efficient and dedicated Christian who holds a Master of Religious Education degree from one of the leading Universities of the nation. The widow of the late Rev. O. P. Felder has the experience and training that eminently fit her for the position.

#### Evaluation Of Self-Study

On June 1, about three years after, I returned to the National Baptist Training Union Board as Director of Publications.

With Dr. Jackson present, the Board of Directors of our Convention, meeting in Fairfield, Alabama, (outskirts of Birmingham) June 19, 1963, approved a syllabus of "Philosophy, Proposed Goal, and Program to Reach Goal" as submitted by the Director of Publications.

Since the approval of the philosophy, proposals, and program by the Board of Directors, considerable time has been given to the evaluation of a self-study of Training Union structure, curricular materials, and program projection of the department of publication of the National Baptist Training Union Board. This self-study which was begun in 1958 brought into focus the orientation of Training Union work in the total program of the churches.

Undergirding the self-study were at least two concepts:

- (1) The recognition that modern Christian education is concerned with the development of the individual who is always a "whole person." Therefore, the effectiveness of his Christian growth depends upon the extent to which the Training Union, Sunday School, W. M. U., Laymen's Movement, and other auxiliaries in the church coordinate their curricula and activities to make a forceful impact upon the individual.
- (2) The self-study further recognizes that in keeping with modern Christian education, the concern should be more with the growth and development of individuals rather than with the perpetuation of a stereotyped form of organization. The Training Union structure of organization is remarkably detailed, but every detail of organization is designed to help the church member in his growth. Structure is not an end in itself, but a means toward the end of a trained membership from the self-study these implications have been drawn.

- (1) That thought could be given to expanding the Sunday School Baptist Training Union Congress into a Christian Education Congress which would provide guidance for leaders of all phases of church educational programs.
- (2) That a manual on "Improving the Total Program of Baptist Churches" should be written. This should be a joint project of the Training Union Board, Sunday School Publishing Board, Woman's Convention, and all other auxiliary bodies that provide guidance for the growth of the

membership of our Convention. It is hoped that the churches will continue to depend for guidance almost exclusively upon the materials produced by our publishing boards.

- (3) The implication is always present that, in many churches the Board of Christian Education rather than the Training Union has assumed the major responsibility of aiding persons designated as "leaders" in the acquisition of insights and skills related to special types of service in the church. But it is the Training Union which must promote the program of the church for the development of the church members. A well-informed church membership is needed to stand behind a well-developed leadership. Ever mindful one must be that "leaders come from the crowds and not from the clouds."

#### Curriculum Changes

A planned program of experiences called "curriculum" includes both age-level study material and suggested activities. Follow-through activities are extremely vital. Another has said "A person learns 10% of what he hears, 50% of what he sees, 10% of what he says, and 90% of what he does."

The curriculum consists of four age-level quarterlies, a quarterly magazine, and several study course books.

Beginning during 1964, in addition to the information below, the quarterlies will contain the Bible Reader's Course. The course for all above the Junior Unions will be based on a plan whereby one may read through the major teachings of the Bible approximately twice during each five year cycle. The Junior Bible Reader's Course offered in a two year cycle, will be comprised of readings selected especially for Juniors. The suggested readings will be carried in the Daily Bible Reading section of each weekly session. Included also will be a prayer calendar which lists for daily prayer either a missionary, denominational leader, or special event.

Productive learning is like walking up steps one at a time rather than trying three at a leap. An adequate training program should be aimed like an arrow and not scattered like buckshot. In light of that, the program material in quarterlies, which provide resources for group learning experiences, will be organized around certain basic areas. (See the brochure on "Philosophy, Proposal, and Program" for a discussion of these, or refer to page seven of the July, 1963 National Baptist Voice).

Certain standardized work will be presented in the Junior and Junior High Quarterlies, the mastery of which will serve as a deciding factor in the God and Country Award, God and Community Award, the E. W. D. Isaac Award, and the Lucie E. Campbell Williams Medallion as well as the content material for local, district, state, and national tournaments.

#### Baptist Training Union Handbook

In light of the place of the Training Union in the total program of the church and the need to bridge the gap between principles that abide and categories that change, the Board released on June 1, *The Baptist Training Union Handbook* by Vada P. Felder. This simply written, 164 page book with eight chapters, index and appendix attempts to give a newer approach to an ever-present task of helping people learn to fulfill membership responsibilities in the church and church related activities.

Chapter 1, in an ABC fashion, gives seven suggestions to follow preparatory to establishing or "resurrecting" a Training Union.

Chapter 2, gives eight steps for setting up the Training Union. There are as many members of the Training Union as the church has on the membership roll. The church meets on Sunday at six p.m. for training just as it met at 11 A.M. for worship. A person may choose to sing in the choir if he has the talent or to work on an usher board if he has the physical stamina, but he joins the Training Union when he joins the church. He only has to be placed in a group

in a union. A church that fails to organize on paper a Training Union with every member an officer or committee member and to make personal contact to have each member functioning is derelict of duty.

Chapter 3, gives new dimensions in program and programming. Program is people in training in the privileges and responsibilities of church membership. This chapter not only gives the elements of the program but steps that the Program Committee should follow in planning and presenting the program material printed in the age level quarterlies.

Chapter 4 presents six steps in detail for enlarging the Training Union while Chapter 5 discusses beneficial records: the meaning and purpose of, the Eight Point Record System, and how to make use of records.

How does one keep every Sunday evening from being the same old thing? Chapter 6 denotes fifteen pages to the discussion of ideas of how to have successful Sunday evening sessions. Ten techniques of group participation are explained.

Chapter 7 gives many practical suggestions for carrying on the Training Union in churches with inadequate space. Other suggestions include types of Bible quizzes; sword drills; how to use effectively stories, pictures, plays, skits, verse choirs; and directions for guidance for the use of many creative activities.

Chapter 8 contains keystone elements for a healthy Training Union. The author devotes thirty-nine pages to answers to questions people ask like: Promoting Day procedure, installation service, effective planning meetings, audio-visuals, visitation, church library, recreational activities, work with exceptional persons, and many other pertinent elements.

In order that every member of the church may have his own copy, the National Baptist Training Union Board has made arrangements in reconciling budget to sell the copies for \$1.00 each. Only ten thousand were printed in the first run. Get your copy before you leave the building.

#### Our Promise

The department of publication of the National Baptist Training Union Board National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., promises that by the close of 1964 the Training Union materials will be the best curricular materials on the market for the churches that comprise the convention because:

- 1 They will be the only curricular materials written by and for members of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc.
- 2 They will be the only curricular materials that offer units that teach the rich heritage and program of our convention, including the founders, great leaders, objectives, and cooperative results.
- 3 They will be lively, interesting, keyed to age levels of understanding and will provide the frame work for a liberal education in the basic areas of Christian growth in personal and social attitudes in a five year cycle.
- 4 The quarterlies will provide suggestions and resources for personal involvement for successful group learning experiences.
- 5 The Baptist Training Union Leader will carry timely editorials, news, and comments, and resource material for annual or periodic special emphases in order that the congregations may focus attention upon particular aspects of the Christian faith and mission as well as the denominational life of the convention.
- 6 The recommended study course books, which include the Baptist Training Union Handbook by Vada P. Felder, will be geared to meet the need of "Trained Workmen" of the church.

Rev. C. R. Williams, the faithful and conscientious Executive Secretary, will conclude the report with a summary excerpt from the statement presented by the Convention-chosen certified public accountant who has audited our books.

#### Summary Of Auditor's Report

Our report last year revealed that for the first time in fifteen years we were able to close the fiscal year in the black after having paid all bills and workers without borrowing a dime. In fact the 1962 financial report more than doubled the 1951 report the year I became acting secretary during the illness of Professor Isaac.

This year God has richly blessed us. The report reveals: All Accounts Payable were paid in full and checks issued as of June 30, 1963. Gross Income—\$137,656.01. Brought to this meeting of our Convention for the Educational Fund, \$5,000.00, as per our promise, January, of this year at Hot Springs Board Meeting, and \$500.00 for my personal pledge. Total amount brought to this the 83rd Session of our Convention, \$5,500.00.

**CONSTITUTION OF THE WOMAN'S CONVENTION, AUXILIARY  
TO THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION, U.S.A., INC.**

**Preamble**

We, the women of the churches connected with the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated, being desirous of stimulating, developing and transmitting the Missionary spirit of service and giving, among the women, young people and children of the denomination, by prayer, study of the Bible and Missions, do associate ourselves together in a national organization for the purpose of studying, promoting and giving to the causes of missions and Christian education and human welfare at home and abroad.

**ARTICLE I—NAME**

The organization shall be known as the Woman's Convention, Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated.

**ARTICLE II—OBJECT**

The object of this Convention shall be to study and promote home missions, foreign missions, Christian education and general welfare of the women and children in the United States of America, in Africa and throughout the world.

**ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP**

Section 1. The membership of this Convention shall consist of state and district conventions, missionary societies, other organizations of the church, young people's organizations and children's bands of Baptist churches appointed by said organizations to attend and represent them in the Convention; and life and annual members.

Section 2. Any missionary Baptist Woman's state or district convention, local missionary, young people's organization or children's band of churches connected with the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated, may become members of his Convention by paying the required representation fee.

**ARTICLE IV—REGISTRATION**

- (a) The annual registration fee for each messenger shall be two dollars (\$2.00).
- (b) The annual registration fee for each officer, state president, mem-

bers of the Board of Directors and each chairman and co-chairman of a committee, shall be five dollars (\$5.00).

(c) The registration fee for annual membership shall be two dollars (\$2.00) and one dollar additional, for special annual membership badge. An annual membership shall be extended the courtesy of the floor, but not the privilege of voting.

(d) All officers and all members of the Board of Directors shall receive without additional cost, registration card, kit containing the record, badge, program, digest of reports, important recommendations and all general information about the annual meeting.

(e) All messengers shall receive a registration card, a kit containing badge, program, digest of reports, important recommendations and all general information about the annual meeting without additional cost.

(f) The life membership fee shall be twenty-five dollars (\$25.00), and each life member shall receive a certificate and badge. Life members who give one dollar (\$1.00) annually shall receive program and the record.

#### ARTICLE V--REPRESENTATION

Section 1. The following annual fees shall be paid:

- (a) State Convention—fifty dollars (\$50.00)
- (b) District Convention—twenty-five (\$25.00)
- (c) Missionary Societies—ten dollars (\$10.00)
- (d) All organizations are entitled to two (2) delegates for each five dollars (\$5.00)

Section 2. All representation, registration and enrollment monies brought to the Convention shall be paid through the convention business office and receipted for by the treasurer of the convention. A memorandum receipt may be given by committee chairman of committee members, but the official receipt must come from the treasurer.

Section 3. Representation money shall not be designated by the organization paying in the money. The Board of Directors or Executive committee shall disburse equitably and in keeping with needs of the causes for which the convention is responsible all representation money above the authorized expense of operating the convention.

#### ARTICLE VI--OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the convention shall be: a president, first and second vice president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, a corresponding secretary, treasurer, an assistant recording secretary, pianist, assistant pianist, organist, legal adviser, director of music, national director of the Young People's Department, Eastern, Western, and Southern regional directors, and Board of Directors, composed of Presidents of State Conventions.

Section 2. The officers shall be elected at each annual meeting of the convention and shall hold offices until their successors shall have been elected and qualified.

Section 3. Officers shall be nominated by a Nominating Committee of seven—one from each of the five regions, a chairman and one selected at large—by the president and voted on by the convention.

Section 4. There shall be a Board of Directors. It shall consist of the officers of the Woman's Convention, heads of departments, chairman of standing committees, and state presidents, fifteen, of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The president and recording secretary of the Woman's Convention shall be chairman and secretary respectively, of the Board of Directors of the convention.

Elected officers of the Woman's Convention (including the elected officers

of the Young People's Department) and the State Presidents constitute the Board of Directors.

Section 5. Executive Committee: The Board of Directors shall have power to create from its own body, an Executive Committee of twelve members consisting of the President, Vice President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, National Director of Young People and five others to be selected out of the Board of Directors with full power and authority to transact such business as may be referred to it by the Board of Directors of the Convention, and to transact any urgent business demanding immediate attention of the Board. Five members shall constitute a quorum. The Executive Committee shall report its action in detail to the Board of Directors at the next Directors meeting.

The Executive Committee shall recommend compensation salaries or honoraria to the Board of Directors for consideration and final action.

Section 6. The regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held as follows:

- (a) During the mid-winter session of the Board of Directors of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated.
- (b) At the same time and place that the Board of Directors of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated, holds its meetings, for the purpose of making the program for the annual meeting of the Convention.
- (c) The afternoon before the opening of the annual meeting.
- (d) At any other time during the annual meeting when called in session by the president of the Convention.

#### ARTICLE VII--ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting for the election of officers and transaction of business shall be held each year at the same time in the same city as the meeting of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated.

Officers shall be elected Friday afternoon of the annual meeting. The roster of officers to be elected shall be presented by the chairman or secretary of the Nominating Committee in the regular session of the Convention, Friday afternoon, and voted upon in that same session by the registered delegates to the Convention.

#### ARTICLE VIII--CONDUCT OF MEETINGS

Every session of the Woman's Convention shall be opened and closed with appropriate worship.

#### ARTICLE IX--REGIONS

The National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., divided the country into five regional or district groups, embracing the following states:

- North Central—Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, West Virginia
  - Southeastern—Alabama, Florida, Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia
  - Western—California, Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah, Washington, Wisconsin, Wyoming
  - Southwestern—Arkansas, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas
  - Northeastern—Delaware, District of Columbia, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Virginia.
- At each of the regional meetings of the National Convention, the Woman's Convention will hold a Christian Workers Institute.
- The presidents of the State Conventions, included in each region constitute a Regional Board of Directors, with a chairman, vice chairman, recording and corresponding secretaries and a treasurer.

These officers shall be elected bi-annually, at the meeting of their respective regional conventions.

Their duties shall be those usually performed by persons in similar positions. The Regional Board of Directors shall:

(a) Help to select the church and arrange for the entertainment of the women who attend the regional meeting.

(b) See that information Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention is given the proper circulation.

#### ARTICLE X—SUBSIDIARY BODY

The Young People's Department, consisting of Red Circles, Y.W.A.'s Children's Bands and other similar organizations shall be recognized as a missionary body to the Woman's Convention. The subsidiary body shall be under the sponsorship and supervision of the Woman's Convention-guided and supervised by one National director and three Regional Directors, elected by and out of the membership of the Woman's Convention.

#### ARTICLE XI—OBJECT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S DEPARTMENT

The object of the Young People's Department shall be to enlist, inspire, train and prepare the youth of the denomination for participation and leadership in the various activities of our churches, and to bring them together in the bond of fellowship, cooperation and mutual interest that will make them a blessing to the world.

#### ARTICLE XII—MEETINGS

The annual meeting of the Young People's Departments shall be held at the same time and in the same city as the annual meeting of the Woman's Convention.

The place of the meeting of the Young People's Department shall be arranged by the Committee on Annual Convention—Arrangements in consultation and cooperation with the committee of the Woman's Convention on Annual Convention Arrangements.

#### ARTICLE XIII—MEMBERSHIP

The membership classification in the Young People's Department shall be:

- (a) Sunshine Band Circle (Ages 5-12 years)
- (b) The Junior Girls of the Red Circle (Ages 13-15 years)
- (c) The Senior Girls of the Red Circle (Ages 16-18 years)
- (d) The Y.W.A.'s (Ages 19-25 years)
- (e) The Young Woman's League (Ages 19-25 years)
- (f) The Young Matron's League—Married Women up to 25 years of age

#### ARTICLE XIV—REPRESENTATION

- (a) State Convention—Twenty Dollars
- (b) District Convention—Ten Dollars
- (c) Local Circle—Five Dollars
- (d) Children's Band—Two Dollars Fifty Cents
- (e) State and District Conventions and Local Circles shall be entitled to two delegates for each Five Dollars
- (f) Children's Bands shall be entitled to one delegate for each Two Dollars Fifty Cents (\$2.50) paid in for representation.

#### ARTICLE XV—CAUSES

The cause to which the Young People's Department shall devote its interests shall be Christian Education; home and foreign missions; recreation and health (A national camp) and a scholarship fund. All contemplated projects shall be presented by the national director to the Women's Convention for consideration or action.

#### ARTICLE XVI—FINANCE

The national directors shall appoint a capable Business Committee of five (5) to supervise and direct the financial affairs of the Young People's Department, to make full reports of all receipts and expenses to the young people in session; and to report to the Woman's Convention in session on Saturday morning of the annual meeting of the Convention to turn over all monies to the Treasurer of the Woman's Convention through the Finance Committee, to be paid out as designated in the report of the Young People's Department. Funds raised by the Young People shall not be used to promote the general work of the Woman's Convention.

#### ARTICLE XVII—OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

Section 1. Directors: The Directors of this department shall be a national director and regional directors. There shall be a director for each state who shall have general supervision of the work of their respective states in cooperation with their state Convention.

Section 2. Duties of the National Director: The national director shall have general supervision of the work of their respective states in cooperation with the work of the entire Department.

Section 3. Duties of the Regional Directors: It shall be the duty of the regional directors to form local or state organizations and build up the work in their respective regions in harmony with the program and plans for the Young People's Department and in harmony with the Women's State Convention and local missionary societies of their respective regions. The responsibility for any special program or project may be assigned to a director for development or execution.

#### Section 4. Officers:

(a) Officers of the Young People's Department shall be a president and second vice president, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer, pianist, director of music and historian.

(b) The term of officers shall be two years.

#### ARTICLE XVIII—CONSTITUTION OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S DEPARTMENT

The Constitution of the Young People's Department or any amendment thereto shall be subject to the approval of the Woman's Convention before presented to the Young People's Department for acceptance.

#### ARTICLE XIX—AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting, sixty days previous notice having been sent by the corresponding secretary of the Woman's Convention, to each state through its state president. The proposed amendment or changes shall be definitely stated in said notice.

## BY-LAWS

The following by-laws are adopted for the government of the Convention and for the efficient conduct of its business.

## ARTICLE I—CONVENTION MANAGEMENT

The president shall notify members of the Committee on Convention Planning and Management when to report for work, at the place of the annual meeting. Preparatory to the opening of the annual meeting, said persons will arrange for enrollment and other business that will insure the smooth and efficient running of the Convention.

## ARTICLE II—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall preside at the annual meeting of the Woman's Convention and at all meetings of the Board of Directors; shall appoint all committees, not otherwise provided for; shall organize new societies; shall be an ex officio member on all standing committees. She may, through the corresponding secretary call special meetings of the Executive Committee, when in her judgment needful or at the request of at least five (5) members of the Executive Committee. In her absence, a vice president or one of the state presidents may be selected to preside. State Presidents may be selected to preside. State Presidents shall represent the interest of the Woman's Convention and Boards in their states, in cooperation with state boards, or state conventions.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the corresponding secretary to send the corresponding secretary of each state convention and to local societies, three months before the annual meeting, a blank for the report of these organizations, and from their reports. The corresponding Secretary shall compile her annual report for the National Body. She shall conduct the correspondence of the Executive Board, and is authorized to organize local societies.

Section 3. The recording secretary shall keep a faithful record of all proceedings of the annual meetings. She shall prepare all minutes and records of the board and the annual meeting for publication in the record. All persons or committees handling any funds of the Convention shall turn copies of said receipts or financial reports over to her for inclusion in the annual financial report of the Convention. She shall read the printers proof to insure accuracy of the Record. She shall have the Record shipped to them in kits and she shall mail out other Records on order or request. She shall be assisted in this work by the assistant recording secretary.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the assistant recording secretary to notify all chairman and members of standing committees of their appointments within thirty days after the Convention closes on printed forms provided for that purpose.

It shall also be her duty to assist the recording secretary in the discharge of her secretarial duties, and in her absence keep records of all proceedings and attend to such other duties as her official relationship requires.

Section 5. The treasurer shall be adequately bonded by the Executive Committee and said bond shall be paid for out of the funds of the convention and kept in the office of the recording secretary, the treasurer shall receive all money collected on the field by any representative or through any office of the Convention.

She shall keep a regular account of all receipts and disbursements in well-bound records, and report same to the Convention in regular session to the Board of Directors or whenever requested by the Executive Committee. Designated funds and authorized bills shall be paid within thirty (30) days unless otherwise ordered.

Any remaining representation money above the authorized expense of operating the Convention shall be divided as authorized by the Board of Directors, equally between a selected National Denominational School and National Trade and Professional School for Women and Girls, Washington, D. C. and sent by the treasurer to said schools within thirty (30) days after said authorization. The treasurer's books shall always be open to the inspection of the Executive Committee.

She shall pay out no money without an order from the recording secretary, signed by the president. Her accounts shall be audited annually by a certified accountant.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the historian to gather and record the facts pertaining to the work, development and achievements of the Woman's Convention, and also to present the stories of the lives of those women of the denomination who have made outstanding contributions in Christian service. She shall report or feature her work, as historian, by-annually.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the parliamentarian to instruct and guide the Woman's Convention in correct parliamentary rules and usages (according to Roberts' Rules of Order) when called upon, by the president or the body for instruction or ruling.

Section 8. The duties of any other officers, elected by the Convention, shall be such as usually appertain to the office to which they are elected, together with any other duties that may be assigned to them by the Convention.

Section 9. Appointment to chairmanship of committees shall be made on the basis of the financial rating of the states and active interests and participation in the general or special work of the organization. As far as possible there shall be an equitable distribution of offices and committee appointments in the states.

## ARTICLE III

The Convention shall support and operate the National Baptist Missionary Training School, Nashville, Tennessee; the National Trades and Professional School, Incorporated, Washington, D. C. and the "Carrie V. Dyer" Hospital at Monrovia, Liberia, West Coast Africa, and such other institutions, as have been endorsed by the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated.

## ARTICLE IV

A concise report of the work of the Woman's Convention shall be made to the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated in annual session, through the president or corresponding secretary or someone empowered by the Woman's Convention to do so in arrangement with the President of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated. The treasurer shall make a summary report of finances.

54. Mrs. Tyree told us about our President, Dr. Ross, who met her first Executive Board and was well received. The Board was happy to have her on the Board. We were further informed that the Woman's Convention put in \$782 in World Day of Prayer for the first time. The date has changed to November 4, for 1963. The Worship Committee chaired by Mrs. L. M. Haynes, was asked to promote the World Day of Prayer. The offering helps the Baptist World Alliance Program.

55. Mrs. Gaillard stated that she was asked to sit in on the meeting of 1964 World Day of Prayer. The 1963 programs are ready. She also said that she met Mrs. McMurray, the newly-elected president.

56. President Ross represented us in Assignment: Race. She spent four days trying to find out what we can do about the Race question. A Catholic Priest told of the Catholic Attitude.

57. Communications were read by President Ross of those who could not be present among whom were Mesdames Jenkins, Alma Johnson, Bernetta Whitfield, Bertha C. Winston, Ethel H. Barnes, and Ethel Robinson who sent \$50.00, for Louisiana General State Convention.

58. The Retreat for Foreign Missionaries will be reported by Mrs. Gaillard.

59. Dr. Ross asked if we could afford \$1.00 per month from missionary societies to the President, 584 Arden Park Blvd. on Retreat for upkeep.

60. Mrs. Williamson asked about the budget that was already turned in.

61. This financial report was given which extends from January to December 31, as follows: The Retreat \$10,777.68, not included in Mrs. Coleman's going about speaking and keeping it beautiful. She sent to Mrs. Coleman \$500 per month, to help save the Retreat because of the heavy fuel bill (one or two hundred dollars), over \$1100 for taxes; \$560 or more for the first half of year; had to pay heavy interest, but hope to get tax exemption.

Mrs. Gaillard further told of the many expenses among which a roof was included Jan. 11, 1963, a total of \$13,034.46 was paid and Rev. Harvey paid \$12,750.00, making a total of \$25,784.40. The check cleared the bank before she left. She spoke of how much Mrs. Coleman was doing personally that she should not have to do such as waxing floors on her knees, etc.

The Chicago convention cost \$130.95; \$534.00 Electric; decorating building \$389.00; organ \$175; piano \$145; Offices \$155; Treasurer had to remain 3 days later.

62. Mrs. Ballew said they were supporting two foreign missions and asked if they should to which President Ross said that she couldn't tell them.

63. Mrs. Georgia Gayden of Brooklyn, N. Y. spoke on the literature and asked us to have patience.

64. President Ross stated that a plan for decreasing financial expenses would have to be made. There will have to be some changes in chairmanship.

65. Mrs. Burrow of Maryland had to leave but assured us that if assigned anything she assured us of the cooperation of Maryland.

66. Mrs. Spraggins-Atkins was asked to stand, chairman of Deacons' Wives committee. She asked for 500 deacon's wives and \$5.00 each for the ensuing year. She has 49 names on her committee but not all respond. She asked her members to continue to perform their obligations but do the extras to help raise finance.

67. Mrs. Phillips, co-chairman of the ministers' wives also asked for 500 ministers' wives to register with \$10.00 each. She assured us that there was no conflict between the ministers' wives of the Woman's Convention and the Ministers Wives Fellowship for Retirement.

68. Mrs. C. C. Coleman, new chairman of Home and Family Life Committee asked for Volunteers who wanted to work on the committee.

69. President Ross said that we have no constitution by which to go at this time. It is not in print for it needs revising. She further asked us to read it and see what it needed. She reemphasized the fact that the Convention has to operate under a budget and there will be one soon. To the committees: it takes entirely too much money to operate them for what you raise. We need to avoid shortages. No woman will receive money twice for working on two committees as we have had in Chicago. She asked us to consider the honorariums paid officers and workers.

70. Mrs. Wilhelmina Cole spoke on the annual session which is to convene in Cleveland next September. She asked us to write for reservations: Mrs. Elsie Bank, Chairman of housing, 7019 Zoeter Avenue, Cleveland 3, Ohio. Telephone: Utah 1-7813.

Mrs. Cole assured us that the people of Cleveland will be responsible for expenses. They have elected the hotels, screening, etc. Single room \$2.00 per night and double room \$4.00; hotels, 1315 E. 8th St. Olmstead within walking distance, Superior and E. 9th Street, Club-Hilton is on the Public Square. She is asking that the expenses be free for Dr. J. H. Jackson and Dr. M. O. Ross.

71. President spoke on the Camp. Mrs. Trimm told why she could not be there. The program will be as follows: June, July, Camping; August—Leadership Conference. She expressed hope for a retreat for ministers' work. An attractive program for the camp needs to be worked out. We spent approximately \$22,967.11 for camp. We paid \$9,000 on the mortgage; we owe a balance of \$23,966.32.

72. Mrs. Rosa Kimp expressed wishes for the greatest conference for leadership, young people directors, national leadership conference—2nd week in August.

73. Mrs. Trimm spoke on the camp and senior retreat and asked all to go back home and ask for support for it.

74. The President asked for names of chairman and co-chairman of each committee who needed stationery.

75. Mrs. S. C. Holley, First Vice President, was presented to talk of the financial set-up. She asked to do more pre-registration—enrollments for churches, etc. She asked us to come to Cleveland with our receipts in our hand.

76. Mrs. Rosie Hill spoke of how easy her committee on Home and Family Life pre-registered. She asked all officers to register with \$10.00 each.

77. Mrs. Edwards was asked for more press coverage. Miss Funches was asked to give report to youth Conference in Beirut, Lebanon.

78. Miss Funches outlined the prizes for the trip contestants as follows: First prize, complete trip to the Holy Land with the highest amount over \$1000; second prize, only transportation; third, 1/2 transportation; and fourth, 1/3 transportation.

79. Dr. William Harvey, III, Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board who helped to pay the Retreat out was presented by Dr. Ross. He stated that it was a pleasure and a privilege to come to our assistance in a trying and would call on us later to help in Foreign Missions.

80. Prof. Grinstead was presented who helped them plan the program for the camp. He is the director of the Baptist Student Union and told something of the scope of his work and felt that Constantine should be something to pattern after.

81. Dr. Ross expressed appreciation to all ministers who had come in especially of Dr. Nance of St. Louis, who was presented. She asked him to help get the recommendation through so that the teachers may attend. Dr. S. D. Ross, her husband, was also recognized.

86. Mrs. Shaw spoke of her first convention in 1906. She was impressed today with the Board meeting. Mrs. Shaw is president of Ohio Women's convention.

86. Mrs. L. S. Weatherspool paid tribute to Dr. Ross as a Georgian and also a classmate of hers and wanted to assure her that Georgia was behind her and proud of her.

87. Dr. Ross expressed her appreciation to all for the great meeting.

4. The President observed that too many letters are being returned to her office which means that we need a new mailing list. She asked the presidents to do a better job back home on the interpretation of the National Program, and that our National Program has to be a definite part of our state programs. She encouraged the use of loyalty boxes.

11. Mrs. Sarah Williamson Coleman, Education Director of the Foreign Retreat and her assistant, Mrs. Baker spoke on the Retreat at 1022 Maryland Avenue, N. W., Washington, D. C.
12. Mrs. Viola Harris made a comment on the timeliness of the Retreat program and asked if there was any way the Retreat could take care of the Retreat other than the Retreat Committee. A Love Offering was suggested.
13. Mrs. E. W. Tyree made such observations as Miss Gene Roper and others visiting the Retreat.
14. Mrs. Wilhelmina Cole of Cleveland, Ohio asked if her women of Ohio might take the Retreat as a State project, and asked if the treasurer would send every penny to the Retreat. The answer was "Yes."
15. It was observed that the camp would have to be promoted also. A nice camp was held this year.
16. Mrs. Zoe Anderson Barron, Chairman of the Camp, made a report concerning the workers and the cooperation given from such as Mesdames Drinks, Tatum

- and others. She especially mentioned Wisconsin as bringing some thirty-nine young people to camp. Mrs. Trudie Trimm also had remarks.
17. Mrs. Holley explained the registration set-up at the auditorium. All registrations will be held in the auditorium. The Young people will register on the fourth floor; committees in the ball room. Miss Funches added a note on the young people's luncheon to be held in the Gold Room in Hotel Sheradon-Cleveland for \$5.00 per plate. Reports from Beirut, Lebanon would be made.

#### IN RETROSPECT

- Can any year more eventful be than Nineteen hundred and sixty-three?
- When nations through misunderstandings stir others unduly by their demands.
- In all of this, are many meetings at which leaders are requested to, at least, bring greetings.
- This says nothing of the waiting home base where charity begins ere the outer space.

I am grateful indeed to the officers of this convention and to all who have helped to carry forward this convention's work. We rejoice and shall ever be grateful to Almighty God for leading us in the saving of our Foreign Mission Retreat last January involving a sum of \$25,000; and for providing for us to keep our Youth Camp notes of \$9,000 per year up-to-date and make, at least, the necessary repairs on the property. What good news greeted me on my return from the Beirut Conference! The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention had made us a generous gift for the National Youth Camp and Senior Retreat.

This year afforded your president the rich, rewarding, and never-to-be-forgotten visits with the Florida Baptist Women, Mrs. Susie C. Holly, president; the New-England Baptist Women, Mrs. Elizabeth Thomas, president; the American Baptist Women, Mrs. Stanley I. Stuber, then president; the North American Baptist Women's Union, Mrs. Maurice B. Hodge, then president, but now Mrs. William McMurry, our special guest here at Cleveland; and the Baptist Women of the Bahama Islands, Mrs. Henry Stewart, president. Later in this session, I shall say more about the Bahama Baptists.

You will be interested, I am sure, to know that you were a part of a Summit Conference at Casahopie, Virginia, called by Dr. Dorothy I. Height, president of the National Council of Negro Women. This too will be discussed later in this convention session. Two other unusual, and challenging experiences were: the

luckey. Director of Community Witness Department of the American Baptist Annual meeting of the Western Baptist Bible College at Kansas City, Missouri, presided by our Reverend William M. Singleton; and the Annual Retreat of the Baptist Students' Union, held at Grambling College, Grambling, Louisiana—where your president was requested to address the assembly on the subject: "Called from Confusion to Conviction". Mr. S. E. Grinstead is General Director of the Union.

#### OUR YOUNG PEOPLE

It was inspiring, enlightening and enriching to me as I traveled a few weeks ago with some of our young people to the 5th Baptist World Youth Conference held in Beirut, Lebanon. This was an interracial group led by Miss Jean L. Convention, and Mrs. M. O. Ross, president of the Woman's Convention Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc.

There were fourteen of us in the party which included two American Baptist ministers, Dr. Bruce H. Lambert, Rochester, New York; and Reverend Keith Tennis, Lockport, New York; our National Youth Director, Mrs. Zee A. Barron, and our Western Director, Miss Primrose Funches. Others were Mrs. Carol Dokes and her daughter Carol of Patterson, New Jersey; Mrs. Georgia Carter of Danville, Kentucky; Misses Kitty Trumbull of Concord, New Hampshire; Bettina Monroe of Baltimore, Maryland; Arnette Edwards, San Francisco, California; Earline Anderson of Mound Bayou, Mississippi; and Mrs. Davene Ross McKinney of Detroit, Michigan.

All of these contributed to the contents of this address. Our Conference report will be available to you in brochure form at this session. Please procure one.

Tonight one year ago, in speaking about our youth, I said, I quote: "The old adage, 'the Youth of today will be the Leaders of tomorrow' still holds true. Only as the church deals responsibly with its youth today, will it prepare them to assume the responsibilities that awaits them tomorrow". This I can only underscore.

As young people grow up in this world of such rapid change; in a world which has become a neighborhood through improvement of communication; in a world on the move, where our commercial planes have a capacity of flying 700 miles per hour, and space ships circling the globe at the rate of 18,000 miles per hour; in a world with her great population explosion; in a world we call strange because we think it is both magnificent and terrible, and full of dangers and possibilities; in a world where there is much tension among individuals, among families, among communities, and among nations, these young people seek to find their role in the midst of this complexity.

In this, they need advisers who are no longer looking at the world wistfully remembering the "good old days", but advisers who see things in the here and now and can help youth make some basic decisions.

Often youth leaders are heard to say: "I cannot get my young people interested in the work. They just will not serve on programs. In many instances the young people are not to be blamed, but their directors might well be blamed.

May I share briefly an article taken from the Baptist Leader, written by Jim LaRue. The title of the article is "Awareness". The writer takes the position that to be effective, the adult worker with youth must achieve a high level of awareness. The leader must come to a new level of awareness with regard to his relationship with youth. In fact, he needs to undergo this new awareness on at least five levels.

##### 1. Awareness of Self

Too often in working with youth, we tend to be more concerned with having something for young people instead of being something to them. Young people are excited by adults who have become concerned about what they can be to young people.

##### 2. Awareness of Youth as Persons

This calls for a new appreciation of youth. They are not things; they are not threats; they are not the explosive generation; they are not all careless;

directionless, ambitionless, and self-centered. They are persons who must be treated as such.

### 3. Awareness of the World

The third level of awareness is concerned with renewed sensitivity to the world in which we live—awareness of the world. As the young person develops, he begins to relate not only to those around him in his daily activities, but also to nations and peoples around the world through the books he reads, and the news he hears. His plans for the future depend largely on the climate of the world situation.

### 4. Awareness of Our Faith

If we as adult workers with youth are guilty of not knowing too much about ourselves, or youth, or the world, how much less do we know about that which supposedly undergirds all of our activity as Christians, namely our faith?

Sooner or later each of us must become concerned not only with stating that we are women of faith, but we must also seek to articulate our faith in words and deeds as we seek to transform love into justice.

### 5. Awareness of Continuing Growth

The fifth level is concerned with the fact that one never really arrives—awareness of continuing growth. We are never once and for all Christian. We are constantly growing in the freedom and love that are ours as Christians. Even as we are seeking to become Christians, so we must seek to become the kind of adult workers with youth who minister adequately to youth in troubled time.

## "FREEDOM: THE CHRISTIAN WOMAN'S CONCERN"

Today we have been singing—

"Oh, freedom!  
Oh, freedom!  
Oh, freedom over me!  
And before I'll be a slave  
I'll be buried in my grave  
And go home to my Lord and be free."

These words were once spoken by Frederick Douglass, and the song as we have sung it, was arranged by the late Mrs. Willa M. Townsend.

I believe that song expresses the sentiments of the women who lived in the DARK days of slavery: Sojourner Truth, Phyllis Wheatley, Fanny Williams, and others of their celebrated contemporaries. It expresses the yearnings for freedom of the women who lived in the DAWN of the day: S. Willie Layten, Mary Church Terrill, Nannie Helen Burroughs, Mary McCloud Bethune and Charlotte Hawkins Brown and their peers of the DAWN. The freedom song expresses the burning desire of the women who live in the DAYLIGHT of today, the days of striving for full freedom: Rosa Parks, Daisy Bates, Arthurine Lucy, Vivian Malone and Widow Evers.

But I hasten to add and to emphasize the fact that in the DARK of the day, in the DAWN of day, and in the DAYLIGHT of present social upheavals, there are, and always have been tens of thousands of Negro women who have longed for freedom, toiled for freedom, prayed for freedom, cried for freedom, reverently hummed and sung the freedom songs. The women whose names I have called became celebrated and known to all of us, but their number is only a drop in the bucket. This statement does not purport to detract from their great status; instead, it is the preface of a fuller and truer account of the evolution of the freedom-singing and freedom-marching Negro women runs into the millions. I speak with reference to the legion of unsung heroes. You do not know the names of all of them. No single individual could. You know a few of them, and

I know no more than you. We sit with some of them in this auditorium today. These unsung heroes and crusaders for freedom are so important that I think I should list a few of them here. I shall have to give them fictitious names because their real names have never gone beyond their church rolls and the ears and mouths of their relatives, friends and neighbors:

1. Mrs. Elizabeth Williams, who went to the fifth grade in a rural school of Valdosta, Georgia, mothered 10 children and went to an early grave cooking in white homes and taking in washings in her frantic attempt to give every one of her children not just a high school education, but a bachelor's degree at Payne College, an institution which she never had time nor money to visit.

2. Mrs. Esther Moore of Rural Alabama, who never learned to write her name, and whose husband deserted her and her five children after seven years of marriage, lives today in Birmingham, Alabama with one of her daughters who is a registered nurse and an owner of considerable real estate in that city. Esther keeps her daughter's small store while she is at the hospital, and reminisces with visitors of how she plowed a mule 10 and 12 hours a day to make her fatherless children professionals, thereby freeing them from a life of drudgery which had been her lot.

3. Mrs. Jessie Neal, who cooked and cleaned for two homes, her own and the home of a white family, in order that her meager earnings and those of her sawmill-working husband could free their four children from some of the disadvantages that in here in the status of a Negro in twentieth-century America. Today one of the sons is a physician, another a high-ranking government employee, and the two daughters are teachers in Chicago high schools.

4. Mrs. Velmar Bonne and her husband migrated from rural Mississippi to Detroit in the 1930's for better opportunities for their two sons and four daughters. The future looked bright after her husband had been employed in an automobile plant for 10 years, but arduous work soon took his health and suddenly the family was left husbandless and fatherless. Like most Negro wives and mothers, Velmar had never known the luxury of household servants and leisure time. She was determined that the early death of their father would not rob her children of the opportunity to enjoy a better life in America's color-caste society. Out of her house she went—into any kind of respectable work she could find. After years of toil when she had miraculously finished paying for the family house and pushed 6 children through college, she lay in a hospital dying with a smile on her face, surrounded by her family and friends. A visitor couldn't resist the urge to ask her how she had accomplished the impossible. "I don't know, except that the Lord jes had and answered ma prayers. I prayed that He would let me see my children freed a little more than I wuz." She went to her grave an unsung hero, except to her 6 children who know so well that no Sojourner Truth, Rosa Parks, or Arthurine Lucy ever loved and sought freedom more than this obscure soul.

The list is so long, great, illustrious, impressive and noble that I can hardly stop. Kindly permit me just one more:

Mrs. Lucille Brown, Pleasant Grove, South Carolina, third grade education, cook and domestic worker in white families, waitress and cook in second-rate restaurants, cotton picker and laundress, always nursing, baby-sitting and taking in washings on the side; faithful church worker, though the occupational life just described permitted attendance only at an occasional night service. Lucille's husband was killed in a tavern shortly after the birth of their fifth child. When she asked her small children what they wanted to be when they grew up in adulthood, two said they wanted to be lawyers, one wanted to be an undertaker, and the other two teachers. This woman had no better sense than to think that she could help her children realize their aspirations, and she did! (That she could help her children realize their aspirations, and she did! Today aspirations being more her own than the children in the first place.) Today one of her sons works directly for freedom in the NAACP. Many people throughout the United States know of his crusade for freedom, but less than a few know who started the ball rolling. "I jes wanted them not to have to sweat and scrub, and bend and bow, and grin at white folks all their life lak I done."

The list goes on for miles and miles—it runs through Georgia, Virginia, Tennessee, Arkansas, Louisiana, Michigan, New York, Ohio—every state, every city, town, village and through southern tenant farms. It includes you sitting here now. Your hearts have leaped for joy as I have called only a small part of the roll. Have you found it difficult to stay in your seats and hold your peace? You felt a strong impulse to shout, to cry, to scream out or otherwise express yourselves as I told the story of your life under some other name. Some of you unsung heroes have not been quite as successful as Velmar, Lucille and the others; your children have quit school and gone astray. In spite of prayers and toil, the money for school and music lessons just wasn't there. Sickness and accidents prevented dreams from coming true. But there were still the millions of Negro women praying, working and fighting in their own quiet and private ways for freedom for their children and their race. The sons they desperately sought to make gentlemen and doctors were made dope addicts instead by modern cities of Sodom and Gomorrah; daughters who were to become schoolteachers had to give up college because the wages of a hotel maid just would not pay tuition. But a great fight was put up before these souls surrendered to their dreaded plight. Their names have never been called; they have never been praised nor received even minor laudation. Indeed it is their good lot that they worked not for praise—they labored for freedom—not for themselves, but for others. They have been so busy praising the names of celebrities in the freedom fight that it has never occurred to them that the little hard-earned private advance which they have made in the Great March is even more noble than that of the famed. Thanks to heaven God knows their hearts, their works and their frustrations, and shall greatly reward them in due season.

Finally, it is well-nigh inconceivable that any one will ever relate the story of the uncelebrated Negro woman's hard grinding fight for freedom any better than, or as well as, Langston Hughes in his stirring and telling poem, "Mother to Son."

"Well son, I'll tell you:  
Life for me ain't been no crystal stair.  
It's had tacks in it,  
And splinters,  
And boards torn up,  
And places with no carpet on the floor . . . Bare,  
But all the time  
I's been a . . . climbin' on,  
And reachin' landin's,  
And turnin' corners,  
And sometimes goin' in the dark  
Where there ain't been no light.  
So boy, don't you turn back.  
Don't you set down on the steps  
'Cause you finds it's kinder hard.  
Don't you fall now . . .  
For I's still goin', honey,  
I's still climbin',  
And life for me ain't been no crystal stair."

#### CIVIL RIGHTS

On the morning of July 2nd, this present year, I received a telegram from President John F. Kennedy, inviting me to a White House Conference on Civil Rights. I regarded this invitation as of such importance that I deferred leaving the country with the Ross-Luckey Group en route to the Baptist World Youth Conference held in Beirut, Lebanon, and attended the White House Conference.

I found at the White House three hundred American Women of all races. No group of women was to be more affected by this meeting than you of our National Baptist Convention.

The following are highlights of the meeting:

1. President Kennedy welcomed three hundred women in the East Room of the

White House, and said that the fifty million women in the organizations they represented constitute a tremendous potential for developing understanding and influencing public opinion.

In his remarks, the President emphasized his great concern that everyone understand that the question of the attainment of civil rights by Negro Americans is one of grave national concern, and that this administration is attempting to provide means by which these rights can be secured in an orderly way. The discrimination against Negroes must be eliminated so that all people have an equal chance in American society. The meeting of women was the latest of several conferences which have been held to secure the cooperation of citizens in this matter. Many important changes have flowed from these meetings and it is hoped that by the end of September, it will be possible to show measurable progress.

The President reported that the administration is operating in various ways to deal with the problem of Negro needs. First, through the Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity chaired by Vice-President Lyndon Johnson, the Government is seeking equal opportunity for Negro citizens in the 20 million jobs affected by Government contracts. Second, the Federal Government itself has established fair employment policies in the filling of Federal jobs. Third, a comprehensive legislative program on the civil rights problem has been submitted to the Congress.

The President asked participants to aid him upon their return home by:

1. Eliminating school drop-outs by promoting a program designed to get all educable children back into school and to keep present enrollees in school;
2. Participating through their organizations and membership in the work of human relations committees in their communities, or where none exist, by securing the establishment of such committees;
3. Establishing leadership training for all women in inter-group cooperation;
4. Supporting where conviction and program permit, all or part of the proposed legislative program on civil rights, especially the public accommodations section;
5. Opening their organizations to women of all races.

The President expressed the wish that the conference would consider itself a continuing committee which would work in liaison with the Assistant Secretary of Labor, Mrs. Esther Peterson, the White House, and the Department of Justice, to maintain contact as organizations and individuals and to stimulate action. The President asked Mildred McAfee Horton, former President of Wellesley College and former Director of the Waves to, serve as the Chairman of the continuing committee.

#### 2. Actions Taken at Evening Meeting

In response to a suggestion it was agreed that the women convened by the President would constitute a continuing committee to be called the National Women's Committee for Civil Rights.

The committee voted to ask the President to appoint a Negro woman to serve as co-chairman with Mrs. Horton as symbolic recognition of the concept of equality which is the committee's motivating purpose.

The committee adopted, with two abstentions, one of which was the National Home Demonstration Council, the following resolution:

"WHEREAS, The President of the United States, aware of the crisis in racial relations in our country, today called a conference at The White House of leaders of women's organizations, and;

"WHEREAS, These women, representing 50 million American women, responded to his eloquent plea to provide leadership in their communities, to alleviate tensions, and to eliminate discrimination in all areas of our American way of life,

"THEREFORE be it resolved, that this group shall do all within its power to create public understanding of our moral responsibilities and to implement the President's Civil Rights Program."

Women were urged to share their thoughts and suggestions by mail with the chairman so that the committee can move quickly to secure progress by the end of summer as requested by the President.

The meeting was adjourned with the discernable consensus that the day's experience had been a moving and significant one.

My recommendations on Civil Rights are elsewhere in this address.

In order to implement the Emancipation Proclamation issued one hundred years ago, my fellow citizens and I must give ourselves to Education, Evangelization, Human Relations, and Dedication.

#### EDUCATION

One can be no more free than he knows how to be. This knowledge must be both secular and Christian.

Thus it must be our concern to see that people, especially Negroes, are lifted to higher intellectual levels. It must be our concern to encourage Negroes to take advantage of all opportunities for personal improvement. Encourage people to push ahead in the matter of becoming cultural and refined.

Emancipation certainly must not be divorced from Christian education. It must teach the old and the young how to live together in the home, Church, school and society. Education fails to educate unless it teaches the members of society how to live, play, worship and work together.

An intelligent Christian knows that he is to "live as a free man" exercising his freedom, taking responsibility, and remembering that as a Christian he has a duty both to be good and to do good.

Encourage people to push ahead in the matter of becoming cultured and encourage education, become more concerned about the school drop-outs, encourage drop-outs to return to school, challenge young people to higher education, and work toward education for all people.

#### EVANGELIZATION

Emancipation is still in process—a process all too slow and incomplete. The goal is full freedom for every person, everywhere. It comes only as the individual worth and integrity of every person is fully understood and honored and respected.

For this, we need the example and teachings of Jesus Christ. Above all others, He taught that God is the Heavenly Father of us all; that to offend, or injure any of His little ones is a grave offense in His sight. "His eye is on the Sparrow, and I know He cares for me"—these are words every person in the world ought to sing.

We are convinced that it was this Christian concept of man's worth before God, that motivated Abraham Lincoln in his historic declaration. We believe that the spirit of brotherhood—wherever and to whatever extent it is found in the hearts and affairs of mankind—results then from the loving heart of God, as incarnated in Jesus Christ. The leaven of this Gospel has been working in human society for these 20-centuries, and some of it has gradually soaked in. But we still have a long way to go.

Since emancipation is thus linked with Christianity, one way, and the best way to have more emancipation is to have more Christianity.

The way to have more Christianity, is to have more and better Christians. The process of making the Gospel known and winning new and deeper commitments to Christ and the Christian cause, is an activity we call evangelism. This includes getting people saved—securing from them this first, basic decision for Christ and the Church. But true evangelism, as it is currently understood, goes much farther than simply this. Its purpose is "the new creature in Christ Jesus".

Thus it includes the nurture and development of Christian character. This means: actions and attitudes that are distinctly and recognizably Christian. Let us then have more of evangelization, concerned about the whole man, and all men.

As the people of the world become more completely evangelized—more truly won to Christ and His gospel—we shall then see emancipation and evangelization marching forward hand in hand, and shoulder to shoulder, into that bright and blessed day of Brotherhood and Justice when "His will shall be done on earth, even as it is done in Heaven".

#### HUMAN RELATIONS

"To err is human" and because of this universal tendency our relationships with our fellow human beings have been far from perfect. Working on this premise a better understanding must be attained through inter-group, inter-faith, and inter-racial facets.

Words cannot achieve this goal, but a (1) Closer fellowship between ethnic groups, not token, but on a larger scale; (2) A feeling of dependency upon each other regardless of race or color; (3) A belief in the oneness of man through brotherhood must be sincerely worked for, prayed for, and practiced.

Differences of whatever kind can tend to separate humans. Both an evaluation and re-evaluation of our thoughts, deeds, and actions toward others may result in a plan of action which will tend to bring about emancipation of both racial groups from their inhibitions, fears and un-brotherly love—A new set of relationships must prevail.

Perhaps only then can the divine quality of forgiveness for one hundred years of second class citizenship be possible.

Dr. Albert Schweitzer says: "Man is a part of man. Man seeks after man. Man depends on man".

The love of God must flow freely from us to other people. We must be free to share each other's woes, bear each other's burdens, and often let flow the sympathizing tear.

#### DEDICATION

Without "real dedication" the cause is lost. When one is dedicated he gives his all. Our all is needed in this Centennial Year. We want to be sure that we are doing all in our power to be prepared and ready to take our places in society. We want to be sure of our "self-image" and proud of our heritage. "Real dedication" for the cause will give us these assurances and aid in our struggle for full Emancipation.

Dedication calls for a giving of one's self. It calls for a willingness, a readiness, to involve one's self in the lives of others. No one can hold back and sit on the side line as a spectator and call herself dedicated. Freedom or emancipation does not mean isolation from everyone else. Freedom implies responsibility. The dedicated person recognizes her responsibility toward others and welcomes opportunities to be a part of the lives of others. There is a tremendous need for women who will dedicate themselves, give of their talents, their time, their strength, and to give themselves to make emancipation a reality for everyone. Dedication demands a high price, not always of money and material possessions, but of personal strength, of understanding, of real humility, giving one's self without any limit, without any stopping. When one is tired and tempted to stop, when one is discouraged because of disappointment, that is the time to keep on working and giving. In the face of misunderstanding and suspicion, a greater dedication is needed instead of withdrawal into one's self.

On the other side of the ledger, dedication is highly rewarding. He who would enjoy his life most, must give it to others. Individuals who commit suicide have usually come to the point or juncture in their lives where they prefer death to life;—their lives are yielding far more displeasure than pleasure. The meaning of both life and death for them has changed. In almost all of these cases, research has revealed that these individuals have lost their relatedness to others. The suicide notes they leave often include the Statement, "I have nothing to live for." The more accurate and meaningful statement should, "I have no one to live for." As long as a despondent mother has a child, a troubled wife has a husband whom she loves, an incurably sick missionary has hundreds of wrecked lives whom she

considers to be dependent upon her for their salvation—such dedicated persons will hold on to life with supreme tenacity—not for themselves, but for others. The great Greek poet, Milton, after asking himself if God demanded service of him in his days of blindness, answers his own question by concluding that God does not need man's service—man himself needs service for a richer and fuller life. "God does not need man's works—His state is Kingly. Thus Milton saw that the old, the blind, the sick, lame, deaf, and dumb as well as those with best talents must serve mankind in order to realize the greatest joy of living.

Tonight we listened to the song: "I Walked Today Where Jesus Walked". How moved we were by the concord of its sweet sound! To me it was a reminder that in all of our endeavors to achieve justice, freedom, and human dignity, that we must remember always that we are His witnesses and must in all of our walk—walk where Jesus Walked.

A few weeks ago, I walked physically over many places where Jesus walked. It was certainly with mixed emotions that I went again to Bethlehem, to Nazareth, to Jerusalem, to Jordan, to Gethsemane, to Calvary, to Olivet, and to Galilee, and stood in some places where Jesus stood and knelt where He knelt, and felt His presence there.

I had been to these places several times before. I went to Gethsemane as a young girl when the cup was a little too much to drink. I have had to return several times with the dreaded cup as a troubled mother, the wife of a minister who had placed the problems and salvations of mankind above his own welfare, as a neighbor to despondent families, as your humble servant in the position which places me before you here—with so many cups I have returned to Gethsemane to many times, and I know I shall have to go again and again. I have visited Nazareth, and I learned through personal experience years ago that "Something good can come out of Nazareth". Many of you have come out of Nazareth. I have so often gone to Jerusalem and walked on streets strewn with palms: just as many times, I have returned and got jeers and mocks from the same people who paved my path with palms. I went to Calvary before I knew there was any such geographical location. I have had to return throughout the years, always meeting you there under the onerous weights of your crosses. We must all go again before full daylight appears. But our hearts are lifted, for we are crossing Jordan. Our ancestors in the bondage of slavery who first sang of our crossing Jordan are looking from heaven as we near the shore. Truly we have come through something—a march of superlative vicissitudes.

But we now stand facing the rising sun of a New Century of Freedom, of human dignity, of Divine existence. We must not stop—no never! Let us march on till Complete Victory is won—Victory over unintelligent discrimination, Victory over senseless segregation, Victory over racial bias, Victory over poverty and economic inadequacies, Victory over ignorance, Victory over vice and crime, Victory over political corruption, Victory over international conflicts, Victory over meanness, and intolerance, Victory over fear and hate, Victory over sickness and diseases, Victory over sin. Let Us March On!

### RECOMMENDATIONS

#### Annual Session—Cleveland, Ohio—1963

Under the influence of the National Conference on Religion and Race, and the President's Conference with National Women leaders on Civil Rights I recommend the following on Civil Rights:

##### 1. Civil Rights

—Study the President's Civil Rights proposals carefully so you are well informed. Herewith we are including an analysis which is the best presently available. It can be a very useful tool for individuals and groups. The bills themselves may be had by writing to your Senators or your Congressman: S. 172 and H. R. 7152.

—Visit, telegraph, telephone or write to your Senators and your Representatives strongly presenting your views on this legislation. The memorandum will

give you help in deciding on whom to concentrate your efforts. "A letter a week" campaign by many individual citizens is a worthy idea.

—Enlist as many other voters as possible to do the above—by conversing with other citizens, by group meetings in your home, church or other organizations, by door to door solicitation. THIS is the summer—and fall, if it takes that long—to accomplish a too long delayed, broad federal attack on discrimination in the name of morality, religion and public order and welfare.

—Join with local civil rights groups in mounting an educational campaign via letters to the newspapers, display ads, radio and TV, speakers' panels, sermons, demonstrations, etc., etc.

### TRIENNIAL ASSEMBLY OF THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The Triennial Assembly of the National Council of Churches met in December 1-7, 1963, bringing together church leaders from every part of the nation. It offered a challenging perspective from which to view the road that lies ahead in 1964, and beyond. The general emphasis "Servants of the Eternal Christ." Each registrant was given a source book to use in the section selected which made the statement "As Servants of Christ, registrants are invited to participate in a search for Christian policy and then to follow this discovery wherever the Holy Spirit may lead." This set the spiritual climate for a fruitful meeting and we were told that we were expected to "study", "pray", "discover", and share in the quest for new understanding, and, with these fresh insights, help plan for the Churches' servant role in the decades ahead."

The urgency of the continuing racial crises within American life was like a scarlet thread through every part of this perspective. It emerged in almost every action, every discussion group and every prayer from the beginning of the assembly to its end.

In adopting the broadest program for racial justice in its history, the Assembly outlined concrete courses of action, calling all churches to:

1. Open membership, worship and fellowship to all regardless of race;
2. Select pastors and other church leaders without regard for race or color;
3. Develop integrated programs and group meetings and provide for the interchange of membership between congregations predominantly of one racial group;
4. Adopt an open policy of recruitment, employment and promotion of staffs in health, education and welfare institutions (applying a like principle to governing boards and clientele);
5. Require fair employment practices in church construction contracts;
6. Remove investments from enterprises that discriminate;
7. Unite in the support of "Civil" rights legislation and organization established to work for racial justice;
8. Remember to act always in a spirit of love and reconciliation.

A moving picture of the change and devotion with which both Negro and white people are facing danger and even death as they serve in the freedom movement was presented by Dr. Robert Spike, executive director of the Councils recently established Commission on Religion and Race. He told of a rally held in a city where hundreds of freedom workers were in jail and where those who came were bandaged, bruised and marked with tear gas burns still there was no hatred but rather hope as they sang, witnessed for our Christ and prayed.

In its message to the churches, the Assembly stressed the moral imperative for the churches to work more urgently for a World order under law; to actively support the United Nations and adequate aid for developing countries.

Church people were called also to an awareness of technological change as a decisive factor in today's world and to a deeper concern for those who are affected adversely by it: "Minority groups who find it increasingly difficult to be employed, young people who have never had a job, older workers who are replaced by technological advances, families seriously disrupted by the changing patterns of daily life.

There was a clear recognition that the real test of Christian Unity as we confront the mission of the Church in the world will be in the local community. Local congregations and councils of churches were therefore called to engage in joint theological study, Bible study, and prayer toward that end. The Rev. Carl W. Segerhammer a West Coast leader of the Lutheran Church in America declared that the cost of ecumenical fellowship at the local level must be paid in the coin of surrendered pride, desire for truth, commitment to Christ and His Church and the servanthood of those surrendered to the Saviour."

Dr. R. H. Edwin Espy, newly elected executive of the National Council of Churches, described the way to ecumenism in these words of St. Paul: "Speaking the truth in love."



The new Climate of dialogue between Roman Catholic and Protestant Churches was reflected in the announcement that for the first time any where Roman Catholics and Protestants in Great Britain next year will begin using the same version of the Bible with full approval of their respective churches. The particular Bible will be the Revised Standard Version.

In all these emphasized the meaning of the Assembly theme: "Servants of the Eternal Christ", became increasingly clear. President Irwin Miller declared in his opening message, "There is no calling in this day or any day comparable in demand, excitement or reward to the calling of servant of our Lord, Jesus, How noble a privilege to be in our own time and place in the living extension of His will, His spirit, His purpose!" Every position taken by the Assembly was entered into with an awareness that as His servants we are called to an unhesitating obedience to His will. The message to the churches finally adopted by the Assembly stated in its conclusion: "The sum of it is the call to renewal through obedience. If the church is really to be the contemporary servant of the eternal Christ it will mean the radical rendering of its life and practice. . . . It will mean a renewal of the Church not by our hand but by God's hand."

#### THE UNITED CHURCH WOMEN SECRETARIAL CONFERENCE

By MARGERY B. GAILLARD

The United Church Women Secretarial Conference was held on November 6-8, 1963 in the Inn, Montreal, N. C. at the Presbyterian School with Mrs. Theo P. Wallace, presiding, introducing the members present.

The Secretarial Conference offers an opportunity where we come, able to talk with one another and learn to understand one another. There were 60 women present representing 16 denominations. It is composed of staff members of U. C. Women and heads or Representatives of National Bodies. Each session opened with a brief worship. Mlle de Dietrich from France was the guest of the Conference. A noted Bible scholar who lectured daily.

The Church is an institution. A divine organization by God. He established the church and gave commission to the Disciples. Wherever Christians are the world over—All are one in Christ. We have set up barriers, not God.

There were discussions on The Role of Women in the gathered and scattered church. Such questions were asked, What peculiar gifts do women have to offer? What is the purpose of women's groups in the churches? Is any situation complete unless men and women are together? How can women be equipped to take their full place in the church?

Reports from the small groups discussing the above:

(a) the gathered church:

We haven't discovered true partnership ("Takes two to laugh")

We haven't as women learned to bury the ego, to be objective for good of the whole.

We need theological education of both men and women.

We must be more desirous of being a part of the wholeness of the Church.

We must be willing to face change in women's organizations.

We must better all human relationships.

(b) the scattered church:

There should be freedom for each man and woman to make his or her own contribution.

Women need to realize how culturally imprisoned they are. (Women in politics and church deal only with women.)

Church cannot attain full strength without women's contribution.

Our responsibilities:

To develop a sense of community.

Help make persons sensitive in human relationships)

Help women equip themselves.

Provide inner resources when in gathered church relationships.

Realize that walls of churches can be as effective barriers as Berlin wall. Hold no more conferences on role of women without men also in attendance. Holy communion was conducted the last morning by Rev. Mossie Allman Wyker, assisted by Velma Dreesse, Lois Montgomery, Emily Gibbs, and Sarah Parrott. Mlle de Dietrich gave continued Bible lessons on "The Church of Tomorrow" and "The Church as Institution."

Mrs. Wallace conducted a general discussion session on plans for the future. She posed the question: What new avenues are open to women of the communications through the channel of United Church Women? The following are comments and suggestions which were made:

- (1) Bible study is not enough. We want to get women involved together and find ways to share ideas, helps, suggestions for local women. Why should Bible study have a denominational approach? Focus Bible Study in depth on the nature of the Christian Church, the study perhaps written by a Negro and a white woman.
- (2) Are we dealing with too many things in a surface way? Have we gotten down to the depths of our concern enough to have roots in it?
- (3) Think further about our work on the local level—the lack of feeling of a commitment and an understanding on the part of many women.
- (4) Find ways in which we can move on out from meeting into the community for action.
- (5) Look at the gift God has given to the Church and especially to church women.
- (6) Fundamentally we all need help in the understanding of our faith and all that we do emanates from that. Secretarial Conference is a place where we come and talk with one another and learn to understand one another. Appreciation was expressed by Lois Montgomery. Mrs. Wallace closed the meeting with prayer. It was a rewarding, rich experience and I thank you.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS FROM WASHINGTON, D. C., WORKSHOP December 9-12, 1963

1. Recommended that a national campaign to work through every news media and teach that the Bible does not teach segregation.
2. Recommended that our national leaders give study to how small groups can use their time more effectively in praying together.
3. Recommended that we observe the Baptist Women's Day of Prayer together.
4. Recommended that similar workshops on the inclusive fellowship be held, inviting a partially new list of women each time, in order to extend this experience to a different group of women each time and involve women in the local situation representing various geographical areas and a variety of professions and other responsibilities in daily vocation.
5. Recommended a committee to study needs of the two groups (ABC—NBC) and how some needs can be met through joint projects.
6. Recommended that we contact key persons of other races as a means of setting up dialogue.
7. Recommended that we seek some common denominator whereby we may help to improve relationships and avoid tragedies. People in small groups from several churches meet to share common concerns and interests and that many small groups be started for this purpose.
8. Recommended that we invite persons of other racial groups to participate in church related activities. Exchange speakers on topics of common interest such as missions, community concerns, etc.
9. Recommended that exchange meetings of small and large groups—all such meetings to be planned cooperatively.
10. Recommended that invitations to annual national meetings be extended between the Conventions to the women.
11. Recommended that exchange visits with families, home, church, weekends or evenings, etc.
12. Recommended that where communities have begun some program and relationships have been built between groups to build on this and coopera-



tively seek a solution to community problems. Encourage participations in interfaith groups in the community.

13. Recommended that we plan exchange of delegates to the annual summer conferences of the two groups at Constantine, Michigan, and Green Lake, Wisconsin.

14. Recommended that the joint preparation of brochures on such topics as guidelines for inclusiveness, etc.

Note: These recommendations are addressed to the Boards of National Council of American Baptist Women and of the Women's Convention, Auxiliary, NBC, USA, Inc.

TO THE WOMAN'S CONVENTION AUXILIARY TO THE

CLEVELAND, OHIO, SEPTEMBER 4-8, 1963

To President Ross, Officers and Members of this great body, I beg leave to submit the following report concerning The Retreat For Foreign Missionaries and National Headquarters for the Missionary Committee of The Woman's Convention Auxiliary to The National Baptist Convention U.S.A., Inc.

The Most Advanced Step ever taken by any Negro organization for the welfare of its workers in Foreign Mission Service, when they come to America, became official on Monday afternoon June 29, 1953 with the dedication of The Beautiful Retreat for Foreign Missionaries, presented to the Foreign Mission Board of The National Baptist Convention U.S.A., Inc., by the Woman's Convention Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention U.S.A., Inc., and Miss Nannie H. Burroughs, President, originator of the idea of the "Retreat."

In the brochure printed June 1953, the late Miss Burroughs, quoted from her 1952 Annual Message, "Since the Foreign Mission Board is in the business of selecting and sending Missionaries to Africa and other countries; and since these missionaries serve their definite periods of time; and whereas, during their services they come to this country from time to time, on business or on furlough and since a number of them do not have permanent residences in this country, the Foreign Mission Board should have permanent headquarters—to be used as a retreat or rest center for missionaries who are in America on business or furlough, under the direction of the Foreign Mission Board. An organization representing the highest social and religious ideals should certainly have a Christian fellowship center. It should be a place for rest—and for recuperation, and for interracial and inter-denominational fellowship."

The retreat was purchased and furnished by the Woman's Convention for the Foreign Mission Board, as a token of their interest in the great cause of Mission at a cost of one hundred and ten thousand dollars, February 1953, under the leadership of the late Miss Nannie Helen Burroughs.

January 1963 we found a balance of \$25,500.00 due on the mortgage note payable on or before January 29, 1963. At this point, the great challenge faced Mrs. Mary O. Ross, President of The Woman's Convention. With only two weeks ahead of the scheduled date to meet success or failure, President Ross called upon the dedicated women of this great convention to answer the call. In Kansas City, Missouri, 1961, Mrs. Ross said, "How can we best honor the life and work of this intrepid leader? Surely not with song and speeches, not with mourning and tears, and not with stone or drapings but with a resolution to meet the obligation by paying the existing mortgage of \$25,000.00." With the determination to succeed in spite of time, the women answered the call, and President Ross, by hard work, a rigid discipline of self, and much endurance, achieved the victory.

January 11, 1963 a conference was held on the above date, 2:30 p.m. at The Retreat for Foreign Missionaries, 1022 Maryland Avenue, N.E., Washington 2, D.C. concerning the payment of the mortgage note of \$25,500.00 on the property of The Retreat.

The following persons were present: Mrs. Mary O. Ross, President of The Woman's

Convention; Mrs. Margery B. Gaillard, Treasurer of The Woman's Convention; Mrs. Sarah Williamson Coleman, Director of The Retreat for Foreign Missionaries; Mrs. Eunice Veal Baker, Co-Director of The Retreat for Foreign Missionaries, and Dr. William J. Harvey III, Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board, presiding.

Dr. Harvey, in his opening statement, acquainted the committee with the moral and financial obligations that lie ahead for the Woman's Convention and the Foreign Mission Board, once the note is paid off.

Dr. Harvey asked Mrs. Ross, in view of the fact, the note will be paid off within a few hours and the property deeded to the parent body, "What then will your interest be?" Mrs. Ross replied, "certainly we would want to share as in the past under an agreement to keep it under joint operation." Mrs. Gaillard concurred with the statement made by President Ross, that we continue as in the past under an agreement to keep The Retreat under joint operation, The Woman's Convention Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., and the Foreign Mission Board of the National Baptist Convention.

After reaching a mutual agreement, as to OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE we next reviewed the purpose which sets forth joint occupancy.

PURPOSE:

1. A RETREAT for the Missionaries under the Foreign Mission Board of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., when they come to America on furlough, for study, or on business incident to their work in connection with the Board.
2. THE HEADQUARTERS for the Missionary Committee of the Woman's Convention Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., for the National Missionary activities of The Woman's Convention in cooperation with the Foreign Mission Board.
3. A FOCAL POINT for intellectual, interracial, and international relations in missions.
4. A LIBRARY to promote a program of education on Africa.
5. A NATIONAL BUREAU OF MISSION for collecting, assembling, and distributing missionary information.
6. HOLD CONFERENCES and special fellowship meetings with returned missionaries.
7. ANNUAL THREE-DAY INSTITUTE for the purpose of teaching and acquainting missionary workers and the general public with the social, racial, and political aspects of African life. Scholars and specialists in the field, will teach African life and history.
8. TO BE KEPT as "The House Beautiful and Useful" in Christian service.

THE OBJECTIVES:

1. To develop the religious ideals of brotherhood, that justice shall become the basis of human relationship.
2. To acquaint churches and missionary groups of program, progress and needs.
3. To set up an annual budget for operating The Retreat.
4. To promote the expansion program.

HOW OBJECTIVES ARE TO BE OBTAINED:

1. By appointment of National Retreat Chairman
2. By support of The Woman's Convention.
3. By support of The Foreign Mission Board.
4. Through life memberships of the Woman's Convention.
5. By contributions from churches.
6. Through special annual programs of The Retreat.
7. Specials Gifts.

## 8. And President Vesper Hour and monthly regulars.

Dr. Harvey, directed the next question to Mrs. Sarah Williamson Coleman, returned missionary and Director. "For what purpose is The Retreat now being used?"

1. As an open door for missionaries under the Foreign Mission Board of the National Baptist Convention U.S.A., Inc. when they come to America on furlough, for study or on business incident to their work in connection with The Board.
2. Serve as a meeting place for organized religious groups.
3. Missionary President Vesper Hour.
4. Groups—sight seeing tours.
5. Phao Goldman, African Friends (Monthly).
6. A resident center for ministers, missionaries and those engaged in Christian education.

The following missionaries visited The Retreat in 1962 and made use of all facilities for rest and recuperation.

1. Gladys East
2. Sarah Cyrus
3. Viola Reddish
4. Josephine Singletary
5. Dr. D. S. Malekebu
6. Shirley Huff who sailed for Liberia in January.

Dr. Harvey and Mrs. Ross, calling attention to members of the committee concerning transfer of property were in agreement that once the property was paid for it would automatically be transferred by deed to the parent body—The National Baptist Convention, for the sole use and benefit of The Foreign Mission Board. With the understanding that if the property is sold or the project is discontinued, for any reason, the money from the said sale should be put in a trust fund, to be used only for the purpose intended by the donors. I refer you to page 114 in The 1953 National Handbook of The Woman's Convention.

Dr. Harvey commended the co-director and bookkeeper, Mrs. Eunice Veal Baker, and the Director, for their untiring services here at The Retreat, and to Mrs. Ross and Mrs. Gaillard for their fine co-operation for not only meeting a promised obligation but for continuance of joint operation of The Retreat for Foreign Missionaries.

Following the adjournment of the conference, the committee members paid the note of \$25,500.00 at Riggs National Bank, Washington, D.C. Thus the unfinished task of the late Miss Nannie Helen Burroughs was completed under the administration of Mrs. Mary O. Ross.

Let us move forward, accepting the responsibilities with the privileges.

During the administration of President Ross another milestone has been reached. With new visions, new horizons, we dedicate ourselves anew to the task that confronts us. She has chartered our course, and we are to move on toward the great goal of good. We have changed the format of the past, and launched new projects for peace not in the stratosphere, not in outer space, but in the hearts of men.

To the President, Officers and Members of the Executive Board

## GREETINGS:

I would like to render a somewhat free style account of my brief Stewardship as Executive Secretary of The Retreat for Foreign Missionaries. I have no desire to usurp authority, but only the desire to present a blueprint of the pattern I have found through research for our heritage. An Idea! An Ideal! A Retreat!

We are about to embody an ideal. We must be sure that the thing we are creating is always kept worthy of the spiritual idea that has inspired it. There are five things on which it must depend. We must be Sound. We must be Sincere. We must be Safe. We must be Steady. We must be Efficient.

My report will consist of Factual Events—Analyses of the Problem for Continued Progress.

All Board members should understand the purpose of The Retreat, and its history. In order to do our best job, and put forth our best effort, we must have a clear picture of the entire retreat. This means knowing what we have accomplished and where we are going.

The Retreat must give to its individual Board members four guideposts to follow: Orientation, Information, Participation, Recognition. Our Retreat is a source of INFORMATION. It provides for each member ORIENTATION, RECOGNITION of each member is reflected in an atmosphere of friendship, fellowship and hospitality; if its programs challenge the members' PARTICIPATION, then every meeting, every project, every achievement will be an occasion of which to be proud!

When every Board member is acquainted with the purpose and objectives of the Retreat you will want to accomplish, to achieve and to be of service to the community and indirectly to the world of which we are an integral part. To re-

alize our aims and our goals, to put into action our national and international program we must have vision which is the blueprint to guide us in our program activities, our plans and our endeavors.

Proverb 29:18—"Where there is no vision, the people perish." Just as God has furnished us with many sources of knowledge, varied materials with which to work a beautifully organized program for The Retreat with dedicated leadership; so he can give to us that divine relation, vision. When we look to Christ for vision, we then will have a course to steer by—we are no longer a voice in the wilderness, we know where we are going, and have assurance that Christ will lead us with certainty and fulfillment.

For two years I have given my services to The Retreat. I have worked hard and observed much. I have lived within The Retreat for the past two years, and I am inviting you as Board members, and members of this great and mighty Convention to join with me in sharing the responsibilities and challenges that lie before us.

The Retreat for Foreign Missionaries is now out of the experimental stage and its program and affairs must be promoted and directed by those with training experience and ability to interpret its purpose, program and services in relation to The Missionary Committee of the Woman's Convention, The Foreign Mission Board and the parent body, The National Baptist Convention U.S.A., Inc., thus making The Retreat for Foreign Missionaries a participating part of the whole structure. The National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc.

The accomplishments of The Retreat for the past two years here in the Nation's Capital should convince every member of this Convention that you have the satisfaction of devoting your life to great cause and purpose bigger than yourself.

We are entering a decade which could be the most significant in the history of the world. If the pioneer women of The Woman's Convention were alive today they would call upon you to unite your efforts and support The Retreat for Foreign Missionaries because it is your channel of representation throughout the world. Now we have reached the big question. How shall we finance "The Retreat"? You have been given the purpose and objectives—and what has been accomplished without a standardized budget, and now it becomes the concern of every individual as to whether you will accept or reject this report. Since the report is based on facts it is my intention to persuade you to implement the recommendations that follow as fast and as thoroughly as feasible. We must, of course, consider our means of doing this. We shall have to take into account time, money, acceptability to our convention and others concerned or involved. We ask for a push button decision because the need is urgent.

The report is with you and consider it your own.

In concluding, may I call to your attention:

- No. 1 The present situations
  - A. Insecurity—inadequate budget
- No. 2 Roadblocks
  - A. Misunderstanding
  - B. Content to follow the same old pattern
  - C. Lock up information

No. 3 What we would like to accomplish—the 8 point purpose

A. Budget

1. National Baptist Convention U.S.A., Inc.

The Parent Body

2. Woman's Convention

3. Foreign Mission Board

4. Missionary Headquarters all Circles and Missionary Societies functioning through their Headquarters

5. Weekend retreats

6. Retreat Guild in every city

The present certainly challenges our intelligence, and wisdom. The roadblocks are stepping stones to success when understood.

The accomplishments of The Retreat shall have no end.

We have a gigantic task to perform and a program to put into effect. This program must be supported financially so the work may go on. We have humanitarian obligations that we cannot pass by, we have calls that must be answered, we have religious and educational movements we must help. We must have assistance to meet the need.

Let us look to God for divine guidance, insight, and a sense of looking ahead—all these are principles embodied in vision for "Where there is no vision the people perish."

I may not have done all that was expected of me in such a short span of time, but at least I have today that inward satisfaction, and the conviction of my soul that I have done my best.

AFTER THE EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING—WHAT?

How do we get action on retreat recommendations? At this point those attending this Board meeting have come to a consensus of opinion and judgment as to the nature of the problems they confront and constructive things that should and can be done about them, therefore, the follow up for this purpose should be placed into the hands of a continuing committee with authority to see that they are properly presented to all interested organizations such as the parent body, The National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., because of their relationship to "The Retreat." The Woman's Convention and Foreign Mission Board who share equally in operation and maintenance.

The committee should report to the Board of Directors at this convention the acceptance of responsibility for carrying out in part or whole the items of action recommended by the Board.

The next step—we ask the presiding officer to appoint a Budget Committee to review the Retreat budget and submit same to the Executive Board of Directors for ratification at this Convention.

We earnestly ask your most careful consideration for immediate action because we cannot find other means to operate such a program that is so far reaching without united effort.

We further recommend the immediate registration of all Circles and Societies at the Retreat and the Executive Secretary be empowered to follow through the registration.

We further recommend the Organization of Retreat Guilds to support the Retreat in every state and city interested in the Retreat.

My Dear Ladies:

While watching the telecast today, the spirit of the "March on Washington" movement has created an awareness of a new and growing revolution which seems to be stirring within the hearts of the peoples of this Nation. It was indeed an exciting experience to see history-in-the-making, and observe the look of positive determination which veiled the faces of those militant leaders. Analogous to those expressions brings to my mind the expressions of you ladies who too, I feel, are seeking to promote a righteous cause.

I shall never forget my experience at the Retreat for I certainly was impressed not only with the gracious elegance of the building, but more so with the spiritual beauty which was radiated from your hearts. I greatly admire your fortitude, your spirit of concern for the future of the Retreat and the relentless fervor and zeal with which you carry forth your work. Women of vision! I feel this is one of your most marked characteristics, and it is primarily because of this quality that I have become inspired by your efforts.

As I evaluate what I saw, heard, and discussed, I have drawn several conclusions, none however are fixed or permanent, but conclusions nonetheless. One is

concerned with the promotion of your ideas. Your ideas and future plans for the Retreat I consider to be of tremendous value, and filled with great potentialities. I have reached the conviction that wide-scale promotion must be augmented in order for your aims to be accomplished. Not only wide-scale promotion but also an approach which can seek to motivate women into feeling a responsible role in the on-going program of the Retreat. Another thing I have noted and would like to share with you is this need for organizational structuring of those ideas into pragmatic implementation. By this I mean, a systematic plan of procedure whereby a channel can be supplied through which your ideas may be transmitted to those whom you seek to reach. In our talk, I learned of the handicaps and barriers which block any practical attempt to bring the Retreat to nation-wide attention of women of the convention. It is my belief, therefore, that strategy must be developed wherein women can be reached on a large scale, inclusively and systematically.

I have observed strategies used in this modern technological age, and it seems that if people are to be "sold" on an idea, or even attracted to an idea, they must first be confronted with that idea, not once, but many times before it "sinks in" and takes hold to their thinking. Then, a clear cut way is planned and provided whereby the people may take advantage of the ideas so offered. In like manner do I feel these same principles could be applied in matters concerning the Retreat. Mrs. Baker's excellent ideas of a Guild Retreat, as we all agreed, fits beautifully into the design of bringing the missionary circles of the local churches into active, personal involvement with the Retreat program. However, if this is to be achieved, I feel there must be wide-scale promotion of the idea; informing all missionary leaders of states and presidents of district meetings of the proposed plan, not once, but several times, each time requesting that they bring it before their groups, giving them the opportunity to put forth serious thinking. Following this period, of orientating the women to this idea, then send out follow-up information showing how each Society can become personally involved.

Oh, I know this sounds like a lot of work, and perhaps too much, but I personally believe that the fruits of such labor will be greatly rewarding. For it is my conviction that unless there can be improvised careful and systematic planning wherein women within the convention can be confronted on a wide-scale and motivated into becoming involved, there will be little response, with unorganized and random support. A well organized plan of promotion takes time, but in this day and age I feel it is of utmost importance if you want positive and lasting results. This would involve a great deal of work and time (of which I know you are already overburdened). But I would be willing to give assistance with the typing, mimeographing and mailing if it is to be done.

These are ideas, and only ideas. They may be of value, and then they may not. They have been written for your consideration. As you continue in your endeavor, I want you to know that you have my support, and I would be most happy to work along with you in the formative stages of developing a program.

May God's presence continually be with you, and may your efforts be blessed, as you serve in His Name.

The 1963 Mission Study Class of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc. is now history, but its effect will go on and on, finding outlet and service through those who were privileged to attend these early morning classes the four days of the Convention.

The spirit of devotion to the cause, the quest for knowledge, and the eagerness to share in worth while Christian experiences pervaded the atmosphere. Mrs. Blanche N. Carter of Santa Monica, California, Second Vice President of the Convention and Chairman of the Department of Education served as General Director, and presided over the 2 hour sessions each morning, beginning promptly at 8 a.m., and closing at 10 a.m. After a period of Devotion each morning, the instructors were presented. They were superb in the presentation of their subject matter, and lead the audience in participation and a sense of acceptance of what was offered in the fifteen minute lectures each morning.

Rev. F. G. Sampson, Pastor of Mt. Lebanon Baptist Church of Louisville Ky. taught the subject of the Bible, using as his text, The Biblical Background of the Christian World, by Edmund Soper. Dr. Sampson is a well qualified leader, having been trained at Bishop College, Howard University, and Va. Theological Seminary. Each message was filled with deep and meaningful information on the Bible and its importance to the individual Christian.

Mrs. L. S. Weatherspool, president of the Women's Auxiliary of Georgia Baptist State Convention, taught from the subject of Stewardship-Text—"Stewardship for Today's Woman," by Helen K. Wallace. She emphasized the importance of using all that we are and all that we possess as gifts from God to be used in His service.

Rev. H. Beecher Hicks, Pastor of Mt. Olive Baptist Church of Columbus, Ohio, used as his subject "What Baptist Believe," as text "These Folks Called Baptist," by J. H. Heflin. This was Dr. Hicks first year on the faculty, and he gave excellent account of himself as one well prepared for this subject. He is a product of Leland College in New Orleans, La. and Oberlin Theological Seminary. His lectures emphasized the basic principal of the Baptist Church.

Mrs. J. M. Amos Chism, a past president of Texas Baptist State Convention, and a leader in her state and city Dallas, taught the subject "Missionary Methods," using "How" by N. H. Burrough and "Methods for Missions," by Blanche N. Carter as her texts. Her positive way of emphasizing, planning, organizing and working the program of the Missionary Society as a vital part of the Church program was well received.

Our special guest this year was Dr. John B. Falconer, Supervisor of West African Missions for the National Baptist Convention. We were indeed privileged to have Dr. Falconer bring first hand information on the work in West Africa and to point up some of the needs of the Missionaries on the field. We were made aware of our lethargy as Christians in the support of the foreign mission work. He also emphasized prepared Missionaries. He brought with him his lovely wife, and Mrs. Virginia Ankrum, a Missionary who has served in Africa. Mrs. Ankrum, a graduate of Temple University sang for us "He's Got the Whole World in His Hand," in an African dialect, in a most beautiful rendition.

The 1963-64 Missionary Themes for Home and Foreign Mission as given by the Council of Missionary Education of the National Council of Churches, were presented by Mrs. F. D. Haynes of 3rd Baptist Church, of San Francisco, and Mrs. O. C. Maxwell of the Mt. Olivet Baptist Church of N. Y. City, respectively. Both women gave brief, but interesting book reviews on the themes. Mrs. Haynes on Home Mission, theme: "The Changing City Challenges the Church," from the text "These Cities Glorious," by Janssen.

Mrs. Maxwell on the foreign mission theme, "Southern Asia," from the text "Christian Issues in Southern Asia," by Devanandan.

Music is always a very important part of the Mission Study Class. Miss Daisy Young of Washington, D. C., National Director, was always on hand with appropriate songs for the audience and special numbers. Mrs. Katherine Lindsey of Los Angeles, California, National Organist, and her Assistant Mrs. Helen Hensen of Little Rock, Arkansas, also Mrs. Harriell Dyer of Little Rock, Arkansas on the Marimbo, provided spirit filled instrumental music for the singing. A choral group supported the audience.

The General Director was ably assisted by Mrs. Mary Whitener of Laurens, S. C., and a group of loyal women who worked with willing service to make the 1963 Mission Study Class a benediction for those who attended.

Greetings:

"NEW OCCASIONS TEACH NEW DUTIES"

We find these words of the poet true in the lives of the National and Western Directors of the Young People's Department. A new occasion has imposed a new duty upon us—that of combining our Annual reports.

We are living in an age of change, of unheard of events and activities; of new and vital experiences; of miraculous developments, and we as individuals are swept along with the tide, as it were.

A few years back we were amazed when we heard that a person had been abroad. It seemed almost as much a miracle to hear that a person had walked where Jesus walked and had stood on the hill where Jesus was crucified as to read of Jesus himself walking on the water. A person who had been baptized in the river Jordan was looked upon almost as a saint. It was out of the realm of possibility to think of ever having such an opportunity yourself.

Thanks be to God—All things are possible, if you only believe. We know how true this is, because God and you made it possible for Western Director Primrose Funches to make the third trip and National Director Zee Anderson Barron the second trip to The Holy Land and other countries on the continents of Europe, Asia and Africa.

Since we shared this wonderful, unusual privilege together as roommates, seatmates and traveling companions, we decided to give you a combined report of some of our experiences rather than the usual type of Annual Report.

The main purpose of our trip was to accompany a group of Young People to the Sixth Baptist Youth World Conference in Beirut, Lebanon, July 15-21, 1963.

We would like to share with you, not only the conference experiences but the entire tour.

We were part of a fourteen-member, integrated, tour-group led by President Mary O. Ross of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated and Miss Jean Lee Luckey, Secretary, Department of Christian Friendliness, American Baptist Home Mission Societies.

Our group boarded a K.L.M. Royal Dutch Airlines Jet at New York Idlewild International Airport on July 3, 1963 bound for London, England via Amsterdam, Holland.

We arrived in London on July 4, 1963. While Americans were following President Kennedy's advice to Ring Freedom's Bell, we were touring the capital city of our Mother Country—thinking of those who lived and died to make our country free and resolving anew to help keep it free. We couldn't help thinking of the American Revolution that was taking place that very day to free all of the citizens in the United States.

This had to be brief reflective thought, because we were following our

gaffe to historic St. Paul's Cathedral, Westminster Abbey, Park Lane, Piccadilly, Dicken's Old Curiosity Shop, Trafalgar Square, London Bridge (that was not falling down), The Towers, Lord Mayor's Residence, the Queen was in residence, so according to custom we saw the famous Changing of the Guards. We saw Buckingham and St. James Palaces.

One of the religious highlights of the London visit was an evening Fellowship meeting and Social at the renowned Bloomsbury Central Baptist Church with Rev. H. Howard Williams and his congregation.

On July 5, we left London by Jel for the gay and wonderful city of Paris, France. There is a song which begins The first time I saw Paris... We could write a new song and say the second time—the third time I saw Paris it gave me the same thrill—it was the same carefree, gay, beautiful, wonderful city.

We lived in the Brebant Hotel located on Boulevard Poissonniere in the heart of "gay Parcc." We could sit on our balcony and watch the hustle and bustle, the leisurely strolls, the warm embrace of lovers on the Boulevard; the long line of theatre goers across from our hotel, the flower vendors, the candy stalls where they are permitted to make and sell candy 4 times per year on the streets, and the patrons in the sidewalk cafes eating and sipping their French Vintages.

Although our view was fascinating, we left it to tour old and new Paris. Among the places visited were the Louvre Museum where we saw all of the famous works of sculpture and art, including the beautiful lady with the smile—Mona Lisa—who was back at home in her spot in The Louvre. We saw the perfect-Rose Window and all of the wondrous, beauty of The Louvre. We drove down Fishing Cat Street—the narrowest street in Paris—went down Opera Square with Opera house built in 1862. Opera Square is the only one in Paris not planted with trees. Saw the Charm of Paris—its Parks and 300,000 trees; saw people in the Cafe Dela Paix. Visited The Pantheon, the 300 year old observatory; saw the first sketch of the Statue of Liberty by Eiffel, saw his famous Eiffel Tower which weighs 7,000 tons and towers 1,000 ft. into the air and has the world's largest elevator—holds 70 people. We passed the new Unesco building built by Italian, American and French Architects in the shape of the letter Y and decorated by Picasso and other artists. We saw the house where Moliere lived and wrote and the one where Chopin died in 1849.

We visited the famous Sorbonne University and saw students taking exams that are held in July. We visited Montmartre—the Artists Colony, the oldest place in Paris. Passed down Pigalle Square with its 45 Cabarets—where life starts at 10:00 p.m. and goes until 4:00 a.m. 365 days per year. Saw the famous Moulin Rouge shaped like—a windmill, passed Van Gogh's Gardens and the "Maison" where he rested and painted. Visited the church of the Madelaine, Sacre Colur, Palais de Justice, Luxembourg Palace and Gardens, Place Della Concorde, Champs-Elysees, Arc de Triomphe, The Palace of Versailles and the Cathedral of Notre Dame by day and night.

On Sunday morning July 7, 1963 we had the unique opportunity to attend a Baptist church where the services were conducted in French. The minister, Pastor Henri Vincent, had been educated in America and knew Miss Luckey, so he obliged us by translating a part of his sermon in English.

We realized more emphatically the fact that in Christ there is no East, no West, no North, no South but one great fellowship divine as we sang the songs of Zion together—each in his own tongue, and as we went to the front and joined a circle and partook of the Lord's Supper, we felt very keenly the command—"This do in remembrance of me."

We met many of the local Baptist, among whom was an African student from Cambodia. We were greeted by tourists from America some of whom were from The Southern Baptist Convention, U.S.A.

On Sunday night we took a boat ride down the historic Seine river,

which divides Paris into two parts, and saw Paris by night. Our boat stopped in front of the beautiful, historic Notre Dame Cathedral. There we saw a spectacle which we shall never forget—"Le Feerie de Notre Dame." The Illumination of Notre Dame—commemorating its 800th Anniversary. As the choir sang and hand played, the Priests and Nuns inside of the church told the story of the history of France and the relation of Notre Dame to it. Portions of the Cathedral would light up as they spoke. We listened to Victor Hugo, Alexandre Dumas, Joan of Arc, Napoleon and all who contributed to the history of France. Finally the Cathedral was one brilliant, beautiful, glowing, spectacle of light.

Time won't permit us to mention other interesting historic features of this fashion capital of the world. We must move on to Zurich, Switzerland, our next stop.

The beauty of Switzerland has been sung for centuries by the greatest poets, writers and philosophers: The virtue of its climate and its spas has been acknowledged by the medical masters of the world. The fame of its products and technical skill has spread across continents. But there is something else hard to describe, but easy to feel the moment you are there. You seem to relax completely. You breathe freely—you seem to see yourself and the world with fresh eyes.

You sense immediately the fact that with all its order, its cleanliness, its laws, Switzerland has never become standardized. Its 5 million citizens speak different languages; 10% Swiss, 73% German, 20% Italian and 10% Romanch; have different religions: 40% Catholic and 55% Protestant; different views, traditions, hobbies, but this proves to be no obstacle to a basic common ideal. People in Switzerland stick to their natural instincts.

We were told—Switzerland used to be in Europe; now Europe is in Switzerland. There is something of every European Country woven into its pattern and all nations are represented in Swiss hotels.

The shopping is not limited to watches, cheese, chocolate, music boxes and handkerchiefs. You can buy anything found in any other country but they are all of quality—you can buy many expensive things in Switzerland but you will never buy "cheap" things. The Swiss are thrifty and practical; yet we went down Bahnhof Street in Zurich where the prices are said to be the highest in the world. We saw Jel Moll store which has 1,000 employ-

We learned Zurich is a commercial city of 70,000 persons. It has a Bank credit secret. The government is not allowed to ask of the bank what your account is—how we wish that were true of America.

We saw the very elegant looking University and the Technical School of Research nearby. We passed through Stiel Forest and learned half of Zurich is surrounded by forests. All animals inhabit the forests but none are wild. We saw the first modern elevator factory of Europe in a city of about 5,000 years old.

We walked across the covered chapel bridge with the historical paintings overhead; we crossed the wooden mill bridge, we stopped at an 18th century Baroque style church. We visited the Cathedral of Luzern—the "Hof Kirke" and then the famous Lion Mountain with the life-like sculptured lion by Thorwaldsen. This monument commemorates the French body guards of Louis 16th of France. The dying lions are symbols of courage. According to history no Swiss Soldier can fight or defend any country. The only exception to this is the use of Swiss body guards now to defend the Pope in Vatican City.

We saw the Musician Wagner's house at the foot of a 7,000 ft. mountain; saw a house high upon a mountain where Sophia Loren, and Audrey Hepburn had beautiful homes with mountain views.

We wound around the mountain enroute to Lucerne where we spent an interesting day. We ate dinner at Hotel St. Niklansen and relaxed until

2:00 while our guide swam. After more sightseeing we ate lunch at Hotel Eden around 5:00.

We visited the Swiss museum, visited all of the sights of Lucerne such as William Tell's country, saw famous Swingli monument on the roadside—we recall he was the famous Protestant Reformer.

According to most of the members of our group, Switzerland was the one place they would like to call home. It took first place for clean streets, beautiful flowers and trees, picturesque houses, scenic mountains, good food and friendly people.

On July 10, 1963, we arose at 5:00 a.m. and left Zurich by Swissair Jet at 7:00 a.m. for Rome. We stopped 30 minutes in Geneva, Switzerland, bought souvenirs and embarked for Rome. We had breakfast aboard and finally landed and were met by our guide who took us down on Oelander highway through a rural section until we reached the Italian Baptist Orphanage, run by Mrs. Moore who was formerly with the Southern Baptist Convention.

The lack of much needed facilities at the Orphanage made us realize anew the need of larger contributions to Missions. Each one of us vowed to do more. We were treated kindly and the children were friendly so our stay was endurable.

After lunch we went on our first tour which took us to many of the famous historic sights of The Eternal City, Rome—built in 275 A.D. on 7 hills all surrounded by walls. We saw the main Basilicas such as St. Mary's, St. Paul's and St. Peter's. We saw the Palace and Body Guards of the President. Stopped and made pictures at the Trevi Fountain dedicated to Venus and made famous by the beautiful "Three Coins in a Fountain". Passed the famous Keats and Shelley Memorial House and the Protestant Cemetery where Keats is buried. Saw what is left of Caesar's Tomb, saw Castle Angelo and crossed over the 300 year old bridge that crosses the Tiber River.

Next we visited The Vatican—smallest city-state in the world. There the present Pope Paul lives on the second floor in the Residence portion of St. Peter's in St. Peter's Square—and at noon on Sunday comes to the window to bless the people in the Square. This was not Sunday so we missed this experience, however, both of us had the privilege on previous visits so we were not cheated.

We saw the Swiss Guards on duty and stopped on our way to look at the Holy Door which is opened every 20 years. We saw again the beautiful paintings, huge dome and sculpture of Michael Angelo. We revisited the Pope's altar with its 160 foot canopy. We witnessed again the bronze Statue of St. Peter whose toe has been worn clean by the kisses of the Catholics in the 700 years of its existence. We gazed again in amazement at the Mosaic of Transfiguration by Raphael done by one of his pupils. We saw the Memorial Monument of Pope Pius X. Saw the statue of Pope Gregory who changed the calendar.

This time some of the beauty of this largest church in the world was marred by the 3,000 seats in the Nave for the Bishops who will attend the continuation of The Ecumenical Council.

We left St. Peter's and drove to the 2000 year old Pantheon, the most perfect ancient monument in the world. This "House of old gods" is a pagan temple built in honor of Augustus Caesar. At one time it housed a statue of each of the mythological gods. Now it has shrines of virgin saints, the tombs of all the kings of Italy and the tomb of Raphael the painter. As one leaves the interior he looks up at the opening in the doomed ceiling. This aperture was left by the pagans to let the unknown god come and go at will. We returned to our rooms at 6:15, tired but still awed by the grandeur and glory of Rome.

On July 11, we started our second tour to see more of the most ancient ruins in the world. After we boarded the bus we were happily surprised to see President Ross. The sight of her was like a refreshing rain after a long drought; we applauded her heartily. She accepted with her usual gracious smile. After she boarded the bus she told us of her historic meeting with President Kennedy, at the White House in Washington, D. C.

We drove down the old Appian Way and saw the ruins of the Roman baths. Saw where the old chariot races were held and the film Ben Hur was made. Visited St. Paul's outside of the walls with its very beautiful mosaic facade with Christ in the center, Peter, St. Paul other Disciples and Shepherds on sides. We went inside and stood prayerfully and looked at St. Paul's Tomb. We left St. Paul's and visited Borghese Gallery built in memory of the Borghese family. We saw there all of the paintings and sculptures of Bernini.

Before our departure for our second tour of Rome on Friday morning, July 12, Rev. Lambert gave us the Biblical background of our tour in Rome. Among other things he said—Rome isn't very Biblical but it is full of Christian history. The people who built all of the Basilicas were reaching upward for something to express their adoration. They also wanted to leave their names in monuments. We Americans are activists—were not much for rituals. The Catholics are not bothered by applied christianity—they are ritualistic.

We left the chapel and visited the Colosseum, the most famous ruin in the world, the scene of many gladiatorial battles. We saw the Catacombs where the branched bones of Christian martyrs lie and where 3 stories underground you reach a chapel used by the monks. We stopped by St. Paul's church which was once a Roman prison where Paul was chained in an underground dungeon. We could have stayed a month in Rome but we had to move on. However, we climaxed our visit by going to see an opera.

We were lucky to hit the opera season and get tickets to see the Opera Aida presented in an ancient open air amphitheatre that seats 10,000 persons. It was full. It was a marvelous spectacle. The stars were all Italians, but the opera is one we all know and love, so we enjoyed it immensely.

On July 13, 1963, we flew by Jet to Athens, the historic capitol of Greece. There we visited the National Archeological Museum, the Royal Palace, the Arch of Harriad, the Olympic Stadium and Acropolis—"High Town"—towering high above the city with its ruins of the famous Parthenon, Erechtheum, Temple of Wingless Victory and Kurytids. We went across the road to Aeropagus—Mars Hill where Paul stood and delivered his famous letter to the Athenians. We saw the Statue of Greece crowning Lord Byron, the poet.

We left Athens by Swissair Jet and arrived in Cairo, Egypt on Saturday night. On Sunday morning we had our usual Sunday morning worship in one of the rooms of the Cosmopolitan Hotel. After Services we set out to see some of the world's richest treasures from the times of the Pharaohs, such as the fabulous Jewels and relics of King Tutankamun in the Egyptian museum.

We drove across the Nile to the desert. We rode a camel across the sands to view the fabled Pyramids and Sphinx, the last remaining of the Seven Ancient Wonders of the world. After a refreshing pause at the Mensa House Oasis we returned through the new residential areas in Roda Island where nearly we saw the place where Pharaoh's daughter found Moses in the bulrushes.

We were anxious to get to Beirut for the opening of the conference so we left Cairo ahead of schedule. This time we missed the visits to the Mosques and the bazars, but we could recall our previous visits when we heard the plaintive cries of "baksheesh" mingling with the day's final call to pray from a nearby minaret as we hurriedly drove to the airport.



We arrived in Beirut, Lebanon on Sunday Evening, July 14, 1963 and went directly to the Biarritz Hotel overlooking the beautiful Mediterranean. This hotel was our home for 9 days.

Beirut is a white-washed, red-roofed-blue-shuttered city of green gardens and purple bougainvillea, built on the rim of the Mediterranean where that sea makes a great elbow between republican Turkey and Islamic Egypt. It is an exciting east-west-modern-oriental, Christian-moslem European-Arab seaport metropolis shaded by pines and palms. Beirut has the sea pounding in at her front door and the snowdraped Lebanon mountains and the 400 precious Cedars in her back yard.

The modern influence was felt as we viewed the luxurious hotels situated above the bay or facing the Mediterranean, the new ultra modern apartment and office buildings with their high rents. Thousands of American cars darting everywhere aided by screeching brakes and loud honking horns. Someone said all you need to know in order to drive a car in Beirut is how to blow the horn.

The camel caravans, donkeys, and horse-drawn carts that we saw in great numbers on previous visits have almost all been replaced by trucks and buses. You can still see Moslem Women with black veils masking their faces, but wearing high-heeled pumps and walking side by side with Palestinian, Syrian or Druze women in colorful, embroidered costumes. You can still see Black baggy trousersed whiteshirted Turk and Armenians rubbing shoulders with sedate Lebanese in pin-striped blue suits and red turbans.

Beirut is important in education. It has many good schools but the American University is outstanding. Its student body of nearly 5,000 comes from 50 countries without regard to sex, color, race, religion or nationality. It is the pride of Beirut, of Lebanon, of the Middle East.

The fact that Beirut is the "Gateway to the Holy Land", added lure to the 1963 World Baptist Youth Conference. Almost all of the 3,000 delegates visited the Bible places before or after the meeting. We visited after the meeting.

#### The Sixth Baptist Youth World Conference

The Baptist Youth World Conference meets every five years. Previous meetings were held at Prague, Czechoslovakia, Stockholm, Sweden, Zurich, Switzerland, Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, and Toronto, Canada.

This is the first time Baptists have ever held a world meeting in the Middle East. Though the Baptist World Alliance reports a total Baptist membership of 25,198,025 in 115 countries, the greatest strength of the denomination is in North America. There are 695 Baptists in the whole of the Middle East and 400 of those are Lebanese Baptists.

The 3,000 delegates in attendance came from 52 countries. Some of the countries were Australia, New Zealand, Hong-Kong, Union of South Africa, Germany, Great Britain, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Canada, U.S.A., Malaya, Ceylon, three delegates from Russia, Burma, Indonesia, Pakistan, Liberia, Nigeria, Argentina, Nicaragua, Mexico, Yugoslavia, Poland, Austria, Italy, France and Spain, as well as from Middle Eastern Countries including Jordan and Israel.

The evening meetings were held in the Sports City Stadium. The 150 discussion groups were held daily in various places including: Unesco Hall, American University of Beirut, Evangelical Church, Armenian Evangelical Baptist Church of Muscitbeh, Phoenixia Hotel and other places.

The Conference delegates were welcomed as messengers of love and peace by Premier Hasbeed Karami, Prime Minister of Lebanon, The Hon. Charles Saad, of the Parliament, Rev. Joseph Costa of the Lebanese Baptist Convention and Antoine Khoury from the Lebanese Baptist Youth Convention.

The Conference Chairman was Dr. Willie Wickramasinghe of Ceylon and Dr. Robert S. Benny of Washington, D.C. is Associate General Secretary and Youth Secretary of the Baptist World Alliance.

Dr. Benny gave the first address in a series of 13 programs scheduled. Dr. Benny told us "to start a chain of reaction of Christian love and compassion which would encircle the globe." He said, "the Christian gospel was meant to be spread around the world like fissionable material—each atom igniting every other one it touches, every Christian witnessing to everyone he touches." He said daily discussion-group sessions would give cross fertilization of ideas on the conference theme, which was: "Jesus Christ In A Changing World." Chief speakers and lectures included Dr. Charles Malik, former President of the UN, Dr. Jas. F. Soren, Pres. of Baptist World Alliance, Dr. Emmanuel A. Dahunsi of Lagos, Nigeria, Dr. Joseph Nordenhang, Gen. Sec'y of B. W. A., Dr. William A. Lawson of Texas Southern University and The Wheeler Avenue Baptist Church of Houston, Texas who filled his own place as Lecturer and delivered a dynamic address in place of Dr. Martin Luther King who could not appear on Sunday Evening. Dr. Lawson was far the most popular lecturer because of his masterful presentation of "A World of Persons Living with Person." Other speakers were Miss Renuka Mukerji, President of Woman's Christian College at Madras, India, Dr. Robert A. Hingson, Medical from Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio and Dr. Theodore F. Adams, Past President of the B. W. A.

Messages of greetings were read from President John F. Kennedy, U.S.A. and Prime Minister Nehru of India.

We of the National Baptist Convention were pleased to see our own Dr. O. Clay Maxwell, his son, Dr. Lovelle A. Maxwell, Dr. E. C. Estell and Dr. Edward Hill who served as our Noon-Day speaker last year, among the officers and leaders of the Congress. Mrs. Bessie S. Estell served as one of the Discussion group leaders.

Dr. James Cayce, Dr. S. Leon Whitney, Dr. Williams of Louisiana, Dr. Burt of Michigan and many others were among the conferees. In fact there were around 300 persons from the N. B. C., U. S. A., Inc.

The women were well represented too. President Mary O. Ross, Mrs. Pauline Campbell of Detroit, Mrs. Alice Hill of Louisiana, Mrs. Zoie Smith of Indiana, Mrs. Carter of Kentucky among more than 50 others. From the Young People's Department we noted, Director Sadie Booker of Michigan, Past Officer Fankie Reeves of Michigan, National Youth President, Patricia Trivers of D. C., National Secretary Paulette Givens of Michigan, National Cor. Sec' Bettina Monroe of Maryland, National Sec'y of Enrollment Committee Earline M. Anderson, Member Arnette Edwards of Calif., Past Officer Davene Ross McKenney of Michigan and of course Directors Barron and Funches.

From this number named, and of course there were hundreds whom we can't name, we expect great results. We agree with Dr. Benny that every man is responsible for the part of the world to which his influence reaches.

The Conference Music was very inspiring and uplifting. Dr. William J. Reynolds of U.S.A., directed the Mass choir and congregation in singing such songs as "Let All the World in Every Corner Sing," "In Christ There Is No East or West," "I Have Decided to Follow Jesus," "I Know Whom I Have Believed," and "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." Three of the most impressive musical renditions was The singing of How Great Thou Art by a Russian Baptist, two Negro spirituals by Rev. Williams and Rev. Maxwell of the National Baptist and The Hallelujah Chorus by the choir and audience as the 52 countries stood and displayed their flags.

The delegates from North America met in a Fellowship and gave impromptu songs, skits and speeches one night after the General Session. Mrs. Pauline Campbell, Youth Director of Congress presided for our Na-

tional Congress and presented all of the Officers and Workers of the N.B. C., U.S.A., Inc., and a group of our young people presented us with a song and recitation. Our Patricia Trivers recited "The Prodigal Son."

#### Byblos and The Cedars

Two of the places that every visitor to this land of peace and love tries to see are: Byblos and The Cedars of Lebanon.

We took the scenic 25-mile drive up the Lebanese coast from Beirut, along the eastern shore of the Mediterranean Sea to Byblos or Jebail.

Jebail, as the Arabic road sign reads, is the town's original Semitic name, meaning "Little Mountain." Early Egyptian records write it Gubla or Gehal. The Bible calls its people Gebelites, and the Crusaders Gibelet. When the Greeks began to trade there, they found Egyptian Papyrus in use and when asked its name were told—Papyros. From this they derived "Pulpos" and eventually, byblos," calling the town after the product. Eventually the common noun became "lilio," for lily, and it is from this we derive our word Bible.

You can imagine our joy and amazement as we roamed through this city said to be 7,000 to 9,000 years old—founded long before the Phoenicians who gave it the name and who produced our first alphabet there. We saw what is said to be the first inscription written in a cave by the Phoenicians. We explored the ruins of the Castle of the Crusader Lords of Gibelet. We went inside the only Sarcophagus left intact.

We left Byblos awed by its antiquity, its contribution to civilization—to communication. Other languages couldn't communicate philosophic things, they could draw houses, men etc., but being world traders the Phoenicians had to invent a means of communication. We left wondering what the world would be like if they had not taken the science of many languages, combined them with signs and developed an unlimited language. Without Byblos there would perhaps be no Beirut Conference and we would not be in the Bible Land.

Our thoughts were long, long thoughts as we left and passed through olive gardens, fig and banana groves and wound around and around the mountain until we reached the ancient "Cedars of God"—the Cedars of Lebanon—7,000 feet above sea level—way above the clouds. There are only 400 Cedars left and they are guarded by almost sacred, security measures. When we looked at them we thought the poet who wrote, "The groves were God's first temples" must have had those Cedars in mind.

We left the Cedars stopped at a Chalet for dinner and drove to Telesiege where some of us had the rare privilege of taking a Ski lift and riding 11,000 feet through the clouds to the top of the mountain which we found covered with snow. We played in the snow, picked mountain flowers and took the lift down again. All the way up I (Zec Barron) kept repeating to myself—I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills from whence cometh my help. I felt so near to Him there. I seemed to gain a new kind of strength as I climbed higher and higher.

Enroute home we passed through B charrey, the home of Kahlil Gibran, the great Lebanese prophet.

Because of the Border dispute and the war in Syria we were not permitted to cross the border into Damascus this time, so our Agent chartered a Special plane which took us directly to Jerusalem Jordan.

July 23, 1933 found us in the Holy City, Jerusalem with its 12 gates that we sing about. As we started out on our first tour of Jerusalem Jordan, our guide told us: The present city of Jerusalem is divided into the old city within the walls, and the new city which dates back to the last half of the 19th century. The walls were built by the Turks. The monotony of

the walls was relieved by 34 towers and eight gates; Jaffa, New Gate, Damascus, Herod's, St. Stephen's, Golden, Dung Gate and David's or Zion's Gate.

We entered the City by St. Stephen's Gate. We learned that the city is approached at present through 4 of the eight gates.

We entered a courtyard in which is located the Church of St. Ann; at the entrance we noted an Arabic Inscription over the door and the gospel of St. John 5 in 130 different languages on the wall. After reading the one in English, we went inside and saw the Pool of Bethesda (John 5:1-16) where Christ healed the Paralytic.

We went next to one of the most important and interesting spots in old Jerusalem—The Dome of the Rock—Mt. Moriah, Gen. 22:1-14. We covered our feet and went inside the Mosque. We saw the sacred rock on the exact spot where Abraham prepared to offer Isaac. The Dome of the Rock is sacred to the Mohammedans because they believed Mohammed ascended to them over this rock. It is sacred to the Jews and Christians because of the connection with David, Elisha, Solomon and Abraham.

We went down a winding street which descended in deep degrees to a lane leading to the Jew's Wailing Wall. We saw refugees from Morocco and Algeria living in the openings in the walls. After the Mohammedans took over Jerusalem, they used to permit the Jews to come outside by the thousands and weep and wail on these walls over the destruction of their Temple in A.D. 70. They no longer have to wail on these walls; they built homes and Temples in the New Country Israel.

Every traveler to Jerusalem, Jordan is restless until he visits "Via Dolorosa"—although it was our second and third visit we, too, had a restless urge to go the way of the Cross" once more. We wanted to walk again where Jesus walked. We wanted to carry again the weight of sin, of prejudice, of injustice which we brought on our shoulders from America and lay it on the place of suffering of our Lord and pray that it and our spirits be lifted and that we may come away with a new song on our lips and a spiritual fullness instead of the emptiness of sorrow and injustice.

After a brief stop in one of the Chapels of St. Ann to hear the guide explain the designations and stations placed by the Catholics, we start—our climb. We must remind you that all along the way commercial shops have been built and the wares and trapping of sin and greed line the way, but a Christian shuts his eyes to these and walks as we did, in spirit with our Lord and Master. Yes, we looked and saw the Arch of "Ecco Homo—Behold the Man," "Via Dolorosa—Way of Sorrow," inscribed over the Roman Arch we paused momentarily at the site of Pilate's Judgment Hall; then moved on to the place where He bore the cross. We reached the spot where our Lord fell the first time under the weight of the cross; then where it is said He met His Mother; and then the sacred spot where Simon the Cyrene took up the cross and carried it for our Lord. Next where some believe Veronica wiped His face and the imprint of His face was left on her handkerchief; then where our Master fell the second time, and where He addressed the Women and told them "Daughters of Jerusalem" "Weep not for me." Then on to the spot where Christ fell the third time and where they stripped off His clothes, and then the spot where He was nailed to the Cross and it was planted on Calvary Hill. By this time we were bowed in sorrow under the weight of the cross, but we remembered "He is not here—He is Risen as He said—so we threw our shoulders back and looked at the stone of A-ointment, went inside the tomb; came out and looked at the rock which was said to have been rent by the earthquake. As we came out two songs were ringing in our hearts—"Calvary"—"Surely He died on Calvary" and "He Lives"—"Christ Jesus lives today." He walks with me" and "He talks with me along life's narrow way." We went back to our hotel silently meditating over the reality of it all.

In the afternoon we went to Bethany; Jordan River and the Dead Sea. In Bethany we saw the site of Mary and Martha's home; saw the tomb of Lazarus. We went inside of the Greek convent on the spot where Mary and Martha lived when Jesus visited them.

We went down the Jericho road until we reached the Good Samaritan Inn. The ruins show a well and other things that prove it was a Caravan City. Some theologians think the man referred to in the parable might have been Jesus himself.

We went on to Jericho, the oldest city in Jordan. As we traveled we saw, Bedouin tent dwellers and Refugee Camps at the foot of the mountains. We went up to Old Jericho and stood on the spot that is 3,000 years older than the Pyramids. As we stood there we could see the Mt. of Temptation on the left and down below Elisha's Well where women were drawing water.

Down the Jericho road we finally reached the Allenby Bridge which crosses the famous, sacred river Jordan. There we for the second and the third time stood on the river Jordan—the banks were not stormy, but we could visualize the storms of anger and hate, the weight of sin and shame not His own but ours that were washed away when John baptized our Lord in this quiet, peaceful, blue stream. We went down and bathed our hands, faces and feet in these sacred waters and came back up singing . . . "Oh who will come and go with me, I am bound for the promised land."

There were peddlers on the hillside selling holy water and pictures of the river. We yielded to the human urge, made purchases and then drove on to the nine mile long Dead Sea—the lowest spot in the world, 1300 ft. below sea level. The water three times saltier than Salt Lake in Utah. Nothing can live in it. Neither can one drown in it due to the density and saltiness. We saw the spot where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found recently.

On July 24, we went to the Garden of Gethsemane. Gethsemane means—hard pressed. There is a beautiful Church of All Nations in the Garden. Inside the church is the rock upon which Christ knelt in agony and prayed that the cup may be removed, if it was His Will. On our first visits we could kneel on this rock and pray, but this time, there was an iron grill shaped like thorns so we could only stand and look as we relived our Master's agony. Out in the garden we saw the 3,000 years old olive trees. . . "that were kind to Him." We saw the beautiful, well kept flowers in the garden; snapped pictures and left.

We went next to the top of the Mount of Olives where we got a view of the entire city of Jerusalem. We went inside the Church and saw the footsteps that are said to be the footsteps of Jesus imprinted in the concrete.

We came down from the Mount of Olives and traveled to Bethlehem for one purpose—to see again the spot where our Saviour was born.

We passed the fertile fields of Boaz where Ruth gleaned; where David and other Shepherds tended their sheep, and finally reached the Church of The Nativity which marks the spot where Christ was born in Bethlehem of Judea. We went inside and knelt in Adoration as we beheld the star that marked the spot where our Lord and Christ was born. This was a sacred, significant moment in our lives.

Returning to the hotel after this morning experience, we passed by a chapel that stands over a church built by St. Jerome-Eusebius, the historian; the Church of St. Catherine is where, the Christmas bells are rung. We went down into the grotto and saw the tomb of St. Jerome.

Some of us were anxious to visit the Temple of St. Peter and The Garden Tomb. We had this opportunity. In the Temple we went down in the cave where Christ was perhaps a prisoner before his trial in the house

of the High Priest. We had brief service—Arnette was asked to read Psalm 88 and Rev. Lambert prayed. We went outside and explored the ruins of the Temple.

We left and went to see The Garden Tomb, Golgotha. Many people especially Protestants believe this was the real Calvary because of its green hill, "Place of a Skull," and native tombs and rocks seem to fit the scripture. There are no candles, tapestries, lights etc., to attract or detract. The tomb and skull face are just as they were discovered. Whether this is really the Holy Sepulchre is a matter of conjecture. We left asking where is Calvary? Is it on the sight of The Holy Sepulchre or here in The Garden Tomb? The answer? We believe each person has the answer in his heart. Does it really matter where? We know He died—we know why—we also know that He arose from the dead and that He lives forever more. That is the important thing.

We left Jordan on that note and crossed no man's land through the Mandelbaum Gate to Israel.

Our time was short in Israel as we hurriedly visited Nazareth where our Lord spent his boyhood. We walked through the streets where He must have played as a boy. We drove along Ainkarem and the valley of Jezreel to Tiberias, located on the Sea of Tiberias. We went down to the Sea which is a part of the Sea of Galilee and bathed our hands and faces in this sacred stream.

We returned through Cana of Galilee where Christ turned the water to wine. We passed through Halfa and saw the place of Elijah's sacrifice on Mt. Carmel.

We passed through Caesarea of Philippi where the Jews first heard and accepted Christ; where Paul was kept 2 1/2 years and where Agrippa said "...almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." Luke joined Paul in Caesarea and collected much of his gospels there.

We went next to Tel Aviv—"Hill of Springtime" where "Shalom"—peace—is the watchword. We spent the night in this beautiful, modern, new city of 1,700,000 people—Jews, Non-Jews and Arabs. Hebrew is the official language of Israel but English is common, as are Yiddish and French; almost everyone speaks two languages.

In fact, Palestine—The Holy Land—has the most diverse population in the world. It has sixty spoken languages yet there are not many more than one and a half million people.

It is the home of the Christian, Jewish and Moslem religions.

Its history is one of invasion and conquest. There is hardly a great nation of the past or present that has not invaded this little strip of land that hugs the Mediterranean with its back to the desert. It carries the ruins of all the great peoples and great empires it has borne.

This tiny country contains all the world's history. To the followers of Christ it is the spot where the founder of their religion suffered death and was buried and returned to life. To the Jew, in whatever alien city he works, the "Land of Israel" signifies the home of past glory, the site of the Temple which for nearly two thousand years has been enshrined in the memory and prayers of that scattered nation. To the Mohammedan, Palestine signifies a place intimately connected with the life of his Prophet, in addition to those of the Prophets Moses and Issa (Jesus).

It was a lovely land as Christ knew it nearly two thousand years ago; it is a lovely land today. As you stand in the Garden of Gethsemane and look at the Mount of Olives, or look at the silver panel of the Dead Sea backed by the purple hills of Moab and Gilead; as you look and see the Holy City and the Hills of Judea rolling away to "Ain Karim, Bethlehem and Hebron; as you stand and watch the Blue waters of the Jordan or bathe your face in the beautiful Sea of Galilee, you think truly this place is God's land, and you feel it is no great distance from Heaven itself.

We reluctantly left the Holy Land for Amsterdam "The Venice of The North"—our last stop before New York and home.

In Amsterdam, Holland we visited The Rembrandt house where the famous painter lived and worked and The Rijks Museum where we saw his paintings and those of Van Meer and other famous Artists. We saw the Anne Frank House, The Stock Exchange and Royal Palace.

We took a pleasant and leisurely canal ride and saw Amsterdam under the lights.

After Sunday morning services which included an evaluation of the Beirut Conference and the Holy Land, we left our hotel and drove through the clean, flower buleeked, streets of Amsterdam to Schipol Airport. We spent a few minutes shopping in the world famous Tax Free Shopping center there and then boarded our K.L.M. Jet number 461 at 2:00 p.m.

A wise poet has said, "he who would wealth from the Indies bring must wealth to the Indies take." Your directors carried with them abroad a back ground of knowledge, training and experience in the Bible, and in teaching of sacred and secular literature; a wealth of information and inspiration gained from the previous trips, and a yearning to gain new insights. We hope we have brought back a wealth of information and inspiration that will help to fill the Emptiness of National Young People.

#### Appreciation

We both want to express appreciation to all of the Directors and Young People for their wholehearted cooperation this Convention Year and during this session.

We wish to thank President Ross and the Senior Women for their interest, guidance and support in the Young People's Program and for making this wonderful trip possible.

We pledge our continued, unstinted service to the cause of National Youth Development.

We pray God's richest blessings upon all of you.

### THE EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF MRS. BERTHA C. WINSTON NATIONAL EASTERN DIRECTOR YOUNG PEOPLE'S DEPARTMENT OF THE WOMAN'S CONVENTION AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION, U. S. A., INC.

At The Little Theatre Cleveland Auditorium Cleveland, Ohio September 3-8, 1963

#### REPORT

President Ross, Officers, Members of the Woman's Convention, Fellow Directors, Delegates and Friends of the Young People's Department—  
GREETINGS!

Today marks my 18th Anniversary as Eastern Director of the Young People's Department. I was elected September 7th, 1944 in Dallas, Texas. Since that time many changes have come about in our department, in our lives, in our society. At that time, the automobile and the train were the most existing modes of travel. It took several days travel by rail to reach Dallas, Texas, to attend our great National Convention—yet we persevered and withstood the hot climate and enjoyed a great session.

There our Director Emeritus, Mrs. Etta Versa Frye, was elected National Director of the Youth Department your humble servant was elected to step into the position Mrs. Frye had held for 20 years. In these 18 years I have found great joy in serving the grandest young people I have ever known. We have labored together with God, and have been permitted to see the department grow from a mere membership of five or ten young persons to several thousand. For this we are grateful to God our heavenly Father.

Today our young people are emerging into a new world—a changed society. I am taking a new look at youth today. I must think of them moving as Christian Youth in a changing society. I must visualize what their responsibilities will be in this changing world. I must see them working together with God in a changed society. In my vision I see them as Sharpe says:

Each is given a bag of tools,  
A shapeless mass,  
A book of rules;  
And each must make  
Ere life is flown,  
A stumbling block  
Or a stepping stone.

Just as favorite creations of fiction writers are richly talented characters, who in their stories turn their exceptional capabilities sometimes to evil ends or, a lawyer perhaps, who uses his knowledge of legal loopholes to obstruct justice, or a sculptor who uses his sensitive touch to break into safes and vaults—or other equally dramatic episodes, though often with sad endings, are the every-day lives of real people, who let their God-given talents die, like unattended grapes on the vine. It came to fruitfulness but lacked the one thing to reach the point of usefulness. God has a given plan for each of us; and to that end, He has endowed us with different kinds and varying amounts of talents. It is our duty to learn what those talents are and how we may develop and use them for the spread of His Kingdom. Without His guidance, our allotted days on earth can be a block of aimless wandering and wasteful living. Especially do we need the knowledge that God is God in this changing world, where permanence seems to have lost its place, as changes in every area of life, socially, geographically, and politically take place each day.

It is our duty through Bible reading, and prayer to learn a step at a time—the way we should go—a full set of instruments are here for our use: the Church, the Bible, Prayer. Let us start using them today, remembering that eternal principles do not change. God's word and His commandments do not change. "The wages of sin is death," does not change, but most things do change. The auto-

mobile and the horse and buggy both use wheels, but the automobile is not a horse and buggy. It is one of the laws of life that new comes out of the old.

And so young people, friends, let me felicitate you who are here today to give an account of your stewardship through the years, and you who are here for the first time. It is gratifying to see that in this changing era, we have youth who are dedicated to the work of the Master. Who still take time from your busy schedules to come apart and join together from all over the country to be inspired and refreshed, encouraged and reconsecrated because you know that you are not alone in this great work of establishing God's kingdom on earth. That as we are working for a Christian world in our state, you are doing likewise in yours, that as I am striving in my portion of land—across the way you are working on yours and someday our forces will meet with the work all done and ready for the Master's harvest. Thank God for each of you. Keep on praying, keep on Believing.

#### The World and Society

Let us notice some of the ways in which the world and society have changed. In the first place the world has become a smaller place in which to live. The countries that used to be considered far, far away—countries like China, India, and Japan are now practically in our own back yards. So much has happened in the last ten years that the whole face of the world has practically gone through a renovation. This is a fact both youth and adults must realize to become effective leaders today.

#### Christian Concern

The world, it is said, is living, growing and therefore changing physically, consequently, every living being is changing on a changing planet. Therefore, it is necessary that our program must change to meet the needs of a changing world. The freedoms which the Constitution provides for us must be made real. Remember, the Indian says to the white man—"We do not want your religion—it is on paper, but you do not practice it." Young people are challenged as laborers together with God, to be builders, to be examples of His precepts at work or play, because as Christians we are God's children and as the Chinese say, "A picture is worth a thousand words." The following Prayer Poem by Georgia Harkness expresses the concern of each Christian in each of life's facets:

O God of life, by whom our lives are given,  
Quicken our sight to see Thy gracious hand  
In all the good for which great souls have striven  
And help us humbly by Thy power to stand.  
O God of toil, who callest us to labor  
Within the common life of mills and marts,  
Help us to see each human soul as neighbor;  
Grant us the gift of understanding hearts.  
O God of peace, in whom all men are brothers,  
Speak to this sundered world by hatreds rent;  
Teach us to praise Thee by our love of others,  
And give us peace, whose strength by strife is spent.  
O God of might, high over class and nation,  
Who dwellest in each seeking, contrite soul,  
To Thee we look in hope and adoration;  
Lead on in triumph to Thy gleaming goal.

#### Education

The great need of our time is more Christian young people, dedicated, enthusiastic young people of drive and competence, who will take time, prepare themselves to meet the demands of the new world. Minding one's own business and letting the other fellow fight his own battles is a policy of the past. We must rid our minds of such thoughts and open it to a one world concept. The other fellow must be

touched some how. He must be reached. Christian youth must accept the opportunities and responsibilities of reaching others. It can't be done by the thousands of school drop outs in our society today. We must make the doings of these drop outs our business, their reclamation and rehabilitations, a part of the Church program. It can be done by youth through their programs. Give to this restless generation a purpose in life. Do we have a program to effectively reach the urban depersonalization, cultural differences and conflicts, invasions (racial, national and cultural) difficulties? Youth must study to know the needs of the peoples of the world. Obey our Lord in our daily living, so that people everywhere may learn of Jesus Christ and own Him as Saviour and Lord.

If we are to have a better world we must pray and work for it—and remember "Deeds," "Faith," "Action," "Doing," are necessary to complete our prayers.

#### Activities

September 27th, 1962—I was a delegate to an all day Conference on School Drop Outs and Employment Problems of Youth.

This Conference was held in the Lord Baltimore Hotel, and sponsored by the Maryland Commission for Children and Youth, and our Governor. The keynote speaker was Dr. Daniel Scrieber, Director, National School Dropouts—Education Association. Over 30 workshops were held discussing:

What are the Facts?  
How do They Affect you?  
What can you do About It?

us Parents—Teachers—Counselors—Youth—Church Leaders.

I was a part of Workshop No. 10—on What are the Responsibilities of the Church for the Social Problems Caused by Out-of-School, Unemployed Youth? How it affects the Church school, community and the home. Great emphasis was placed on the importance of Churches encouraging youth to stay in school to safeguard their future.

In October, I accepted the invitation of the High School faculty to become Class Mother to some of the classes. A tea was given honoring and presenting Class Mothers. This was a most rewarding experience, the specially prepared program inspiring.

I attended and advised in many young people's meetings, various groups in many Churches. Too numerous to mention each one separately, but all for the same purpose of preparing youth groups to meet the challenge of today's world.

The Annual Board Meeting of the New England Convention, held at the School of Religion in Newark, New Jersey, was another rewarding experience. There, all states of the Eastern Division were represented. I had the opportunity to meet many young people from the various eastern states. We had a small meeting with the State Directors that were present.

In April, I held a Workshop attended by over 200 young people from the various eastern states. Our own Mrs. Charlotte Turner of New Jersey and Mrs. Ruth Wells, of Pennsylvania, assisted in this effort.

I was the guest speaker for Woman's Day, at the Mt. Moriah Baptist Church, Rev. W. L. Greene, Pastor, and also at the Community Christian Church, Rev. W. L. Whitfield, Pastor, a Panelist at our own Woman's State Convention, Aux., United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland, and attended the New England Baptist Missionary Convention, the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention and the Mt. Bethel Baptist Association in Arlington, Virginia.

We were happy to send the Y. W. A. President of our Young People's Department of Maryland to Beirut, Lebanon, to the Baptist World Conference. At least three young people from the eastern division attended this Baptist World Alliance.

We have endeavored to expose our youth to every opportunity to attend conferences and workshops that they may realize that God is calling them to service. He is calling today as of yore, "Go home to thy friends and tell them how great things the Lord has done for thee."

God hath not promised skies always blue, Flower-strewn pathways, all our lives thro'; God hath not promised sun without rain, Joy without sorrow, peace without pain. But God has promised strength for the day, Rest for the labor, light for the way; Grace for the trials, help from above, Unfailing sympathy, Undying love.
