Open Claremont Conservation Area In June

The new Claremont Conservation Area will be officially opened on June 29 to coincide with the 150th anniversary celebrations of Pickering Township.

The new conservation area is located north of No. 7 highway, near Kinsale.

Provincial, Municipal and Conservation Authorities will be on hand for the opening at 2:30 p.m. of this 400 acre park.

As well as the opening there will be exhibits, displays and other highlights featured.

This will be the second Metro Conservation Park in operation in Pickering Township.

Free Vocational School Stated For Pickering Twp. In Near Future

Pickering Township, it appears, will have a new 14 room vocational school, added to the new Dunbarton school at no cost to the taxpayers.

These 14 rooms will be built as an addition to the present new school and equipped at no cost under a new government scheme that has been publicized lately in the daily press.

The Pickering District High School board have received tentative approval already on the new vocational school. Their architect is already busy on plans.

Under this new scheme of assistance, the Federal Government will pay 75 per cent of

the cost and the balance Education will carry the balance.

Mr. A. R. Lewis presented figures of estimated future enrollment for the department and he and several board members were asked to appear before the department.

The vocational school, which many have advocated for this area for some time, appears close to becoming a reality.

As the board has not yet received definite approval, no indication of starting time for construction can be given as yet. We have been told that to qualify for the grant the school must be up and in operation by 1963.

School Costs Amount To 60% Of Tax Total

The total tax roll for the Township of Pickering will be \$1,461,882 in 1961. Out of this figure, \$823,748.00 will be required for the operation of schools, or almost 60%. An amount of \$638,134 will cover other services. The total tax roll in 1960 was \$1,047,498.00. The township's total assessment is slightly in excess of \$18 million.

The residential rate shows an increase of four mills. It was 21.3 in '59; 22.5 in '60 and 26.5 in '61. The County rate has shot up from 8.9 mills in 1959 to 13.7 in 1961. It was 10.5 in 1960. The High School rate has levelled off at an even 16 mills, a sizeable boost from 11.82 of 1960. It was 9.37 in 1959.

The Church Street Blockade

While the construction work on lower Church Street in Pickering Village is going on, the road has had to be closed for the men to work.

It would appear that this work will continue for many weeks and the blockade will be kept up.

Two areas are suffering as a result of this road closing. One area is Squires Beach and the other is Pickering Village.

Several Pickering businessmen have received calls from customers on the other side of this blockade, asking when they will be able to get through. The businessmen of the village are concerned about this road closing, because it is costing them money. Their customers are going elsewhere, rather than take the time and go to the extra expense of travelling miles out of their way to get to the village.

Township council members, concerned over the matter of fire protection at Squires Beach, are asking the Department of Highways to open Station Road as a temporary measure until Church Street is open again.

If the township and village councils would both bring some pressure to bear on the provincial department, maybe something could be accomplished that would alleviate this present situation.

To open Station Road for a few months is certainly going to assist a number of people, possibly even in emergency. We feel the Department of Highways, properly approached, would certainly agree and do what they can do help the situation.

But it must be done at once.

When?

When are the court authorities going to step so hard on drunk drivers, that drinking people will be afraid to get behind the wheel.

Last Friday night, two middle-aged Scarboro people, were struck head on by a blind-drunk driver.

This driver was eastbound on the Base Line on the wrong side of the road. He approached a police cruiser, who was put into the ditch, then crashed into the car of two innocent people.

Police said the drinking driver had to be tied down, he was so violent, saving and dirtying himself all over hospital cots, ambulance cots and hospital beds.

One witness at the hospital said it was like trying to subdue, some kind of dirty animal.

Meanwhile the couple he crashed into were in critical condition in another room.

Its time something was done about these people by someone who has the authority to do it. Sane people are getting a little tired of the leniency with which these drunk drivers are being treated in court.

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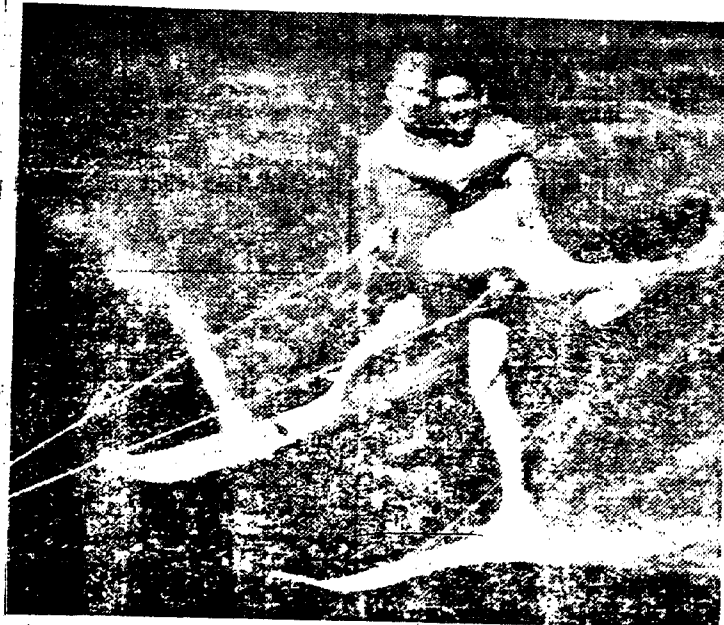
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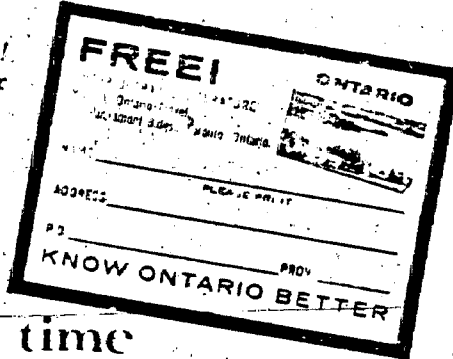
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REPORT from PARLIAMENT

M.P. ONTARIO RIDING



Parliament Hill this week was preparing for President Kennedy's visit. The President was scheduled to address both Houses of Parliament, an honour reserved for the most important Heads of State. Parking has been prohibited on Parliament Hill for the occasion and indications are that many thousands of visitors will be on hand to see the President and Mrs. Kennedy arrive. Meanwhile, special work crews were busy this week, trimming the lawns and putting final touches on the annual Parliament Hill spring cleaning in anticipation of the Presidential visit. In the House this week, the

Prime Minister paid tribute to the space flight of U.S. Astronaut Shepard. He described the flight as an "outstanding achievement".

With morning and Saturday sittings in full effect, the House was despatching a heavy volume of business this week.

The Prime Minister made it plain that there would be further legislation forthcoming as soon as the order paper was cleared away.

Items still to come would include amendments to the Unemployment Insurance Act.

Speaking on Monday I said that a number of committees had been working on the Act that amendments would be presented to Parliament as soon as these studies were completed. The Act was last amended in

1958, when two new classes were included and the benefit period was extended from 36 to 52 weeks.

When I was in the United States, I found, in discussion with officials there, that proposed extensions to their scheme would result in a possible benefit period of 39 weeks.

At the present time, in Canada, a person who was qualified to receive both regular and seasonal benefits would have a potential benefit period of up to 76 weeks.

In discussion in the House on this matter, the report of the Unemployment Insurance Advisory Committee was referred to. In the latest report it is pointed out that one of the most serious drains on the Fund has been the seasonal benefit

provision.

Naturally, a great many recommendations have been received on this point and are under study.

One of the important items which has been before the House in recent days has been, of course, the massive sale of wheat to China.

One of the results of this transaction which should make itself felt almost immediately and continue over the next two years will be to provide employment for many thousands of Canadians.

Employment will be provided in shipping, of course, and for labour and dock workers in East and West Coast ports.

Further employment will be provided in rail shipping and in additional box car require-

ments.

As the full effects of the orders are felt, it is estimated that there will be increased orders for farm equipment and machinery.

An announcement of considerable significance was forthcoming on Tuesday from the Minister of Veterans Affairs. Honourable Gordon Churchill announced that a reduction would be approved in the small holding acreage requirement under the Veterans Land Act below the present minimum of two acres.

Legislation would be brought forward to permit financial assistance for the establishment of a veteran on a small holding where the area was at least one half acre in extent.

Veterans already established on a small holding would be permitted to dispose of such surplus land as he might have, so long as he retained one half acre.

Speaking on behalf of the C.C.F. Party, Mr. H. W. Merritt, member for Kootenay West, pointed out that the announcement would be "welcomed by thousands of veterans in Canada, who up to this time have been denied the opportunity to dispose of surplus land because of the difficulty of meeting the former acreage requirement."

He added: "I was very pleased to hear the Minister say that arrangements are being made for veterans who are already settled to dispose of any surplus acreage above that amount."

New Stamp At Post Office

On June 28th, 1961, the residents of Pickering, Ontario, will be able to purchase a new special commemorative 5-cent postage stamp marking the tenth anniversary of the Colombo Plan.

The stamps will go on sale at the Pickering, Ontario, Post Office where they will be of interest to all postal patrons, and especially to stamp collectors.

The Postmaster General, the Honourable William Hamilton, in announcing this special stamp, pointed out that the Canadian Government has contributed to the Colombo Plan, particularly in the development of Hydro-Electric Power, transportation and communications facilities, in south-east Asia.

The Postmaster General also stated that not only the countries which receive the assistance but the countries which contribute benefit from the Colombo Plan. Canada, while contributing over \$275 million, had benefited, because practically all this money had been spent in Canada for the purchase of equipment and supplies. The Colombo Plan enabled Canada to recognize its obligations to the less prosperous nations of the world, and help to raise living standards in other countries, as well as increasing prosperity at home.

The new stamp portrays two figures holding a blueprint in front of a huge Hydro Power Plant. One figure is clothed in western garb. The other wears a turban and tropical clothing typical in the South East Asian countries. In the top left corner appear the words "Le Plan de Colombo", and along the bottom of the stamp, are the words "Postes Canada Postage".

Thirty million of these stamps will be printed and the commencement of their sale on June 28th, 1961 is in time for the official anniversary of the Colombo Plan, which started on July 1st, 1951.

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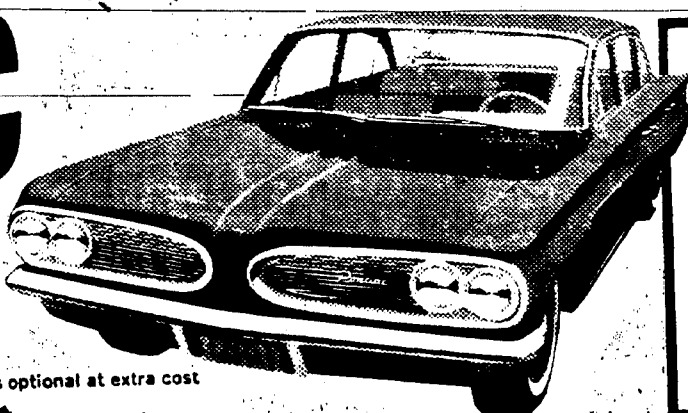

Greenwood School Faces Grave Problem

The school attendance problem that may tax the accommodation of the Greenwood Public School to the limit in September, still faces the members of the Trustee Board in spite of a ratepayer's meeting in the section on Friday night. No concrete decision was reached by the residents on whether additional classrooms should be added to the present century-old structure or if an entirely new building should be erected. It has been estimated that close to 70 pupils may enroll at the opening of the September term.

The proposal to create a school area and transport the students from both the Greenwood and Kinsale sections to an enlarged school at Brougham, was firmly rejected by the persons present. Fire Marshall's Office have not condemned it," he questioned. He expressed a fear that if the structure should catch fire, it might be difficult for the children to escape. He noted that the Dept. of Education no longer favoured the building of new rooms on an old building. Speaking for himself, Mr. Moore said that little would be gained by re-opening the discussion at another ratepayer's meeting. 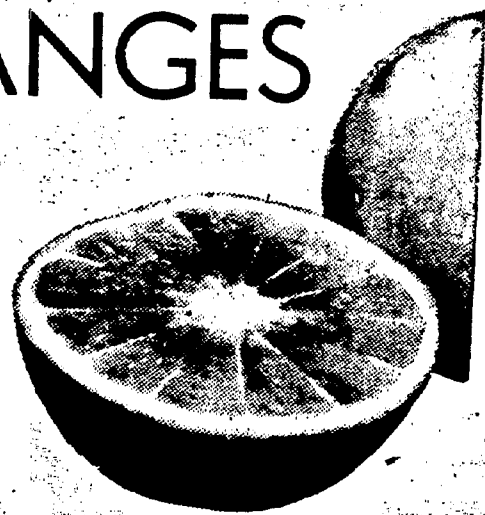
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
