PREFACE AND SALUTATORY.

THE PUBLISHER TO THE PATRONS OF THE SANILAC COUNTY ATLAS

We greet you with congratulations, which we feel should be mutual on the completion of our arduous labors, editing, compiling, drawing, engraving and publishing the work now placed before you. The difficulties which attend the preparation of such a work by individual enterprise, can be understood only by those who have been engaged in similar undertakings. We believe, however, that the great labor and expense bestowed upon this Atlas, have been productive of highly remunerative results to you at least, as well as to all interested in the welfare of the county, if not to ourselves.

CO-OPERATION.

The compilation of the details of the maps has been attended with a vast amount of research and labor. We are happy to acknowledge the kind interest which has almost universally been manifested in the work through the county, and the cordiality and effectiveness of the co-operation of many who reside outside of Sanilac County.

UNITED STATES SYSTEM OF LAND SURVEYS.

It may not be out of place here to give a brief description of the United States System of Surveys applied to the lands of Michigan, which will also describe the general features, the uniform method for all the public lands of the United States.

PRINCIPAL MERIDIAN AND BASE LINES.

A meridian line running through the State from north to south, and a base line running across the State from east to west were first surveyed out. These two lines serve as base lines for all surveys in the State. The Michigan meridian was the first one located for the United States public lands before the State was organized, and is known as the *First Principal Meridian*. It forms the boundary between Lenawee and Hillsdale

Counties, passes through the middle of Jackson and Ingham, divides Clinton from Shiawassee and Gratiot from Saginaw, Crawford from Oscoda and Otsego from Montmorency, and passes through the eastern part of Sheboygan County, strikes Lake Huron, nearly south of the eastern extremity of *Bois Blanc Island*.

The base line for this meridian runs from Lake Michigan to Lake Huron. Along the northern boundaries of Van Buren, Kalamazoo, Calhoun, Jackson, Washtenaw and Wayne Counties.

RANGE AND TOWNSHIP.

After establishing the meridian and base lines, the surveyor proceeds to lay off the county into Townships six miles square. Having measured a distance of six miles along the base line to the east or west of the principal meridian, a monument is erected at the six-mile point, and another meridian is surveyed out from north and south from this monument. This strip of land six miles wide lying between and extending entirely across the State is called a Range. The range adjacent to the principal meridian is called Range 1 East, if on the east side, or Range 1 West, if on the west side of the principal meridian. The second six miles wide adjoining the first is called Range 2 East, or 2 West, as the case may be, and so in the same manner on both sides of the principal meridian, until the entire State is divided into ranges. These ranges are subdivided into Townships by east and west lines six miles apart.

The Township adjacent is called Township 1 North, if on the north side, and Township 1 South, if on the south side of the base line. The next Township 2 North, or 2 South, as the case may be, and so on to the northern and southern boundaries of the State. Portions of Townships which are not complete where the ranges are bounded by irregular lines, or bodies of water are called Fractional Townships. On the margin of the map of the county in this work will be found the number of the range and towns of the State passing through this county and at the top of the respective Township maps.

THE COMPILER.

SANILAC COUNTY.

THE LUMBER INTEREST.

In giving the history of Sanilac county, many things present themselves to us which would make very interesting reading matter, but which are necessarily crowded out for lack of space; hence, we shall content ourselves by referring to the condition in which it was found in 1834. At that time the entire county was one unbroken wilderness, untouched by the hand of the white man. It was heavily timbered with white pine, cedar, hemlock, maple, beech, birch, oak, ash, elm, basswood and hickory, with an occasional balm 'o gilead and cottonwood. A few natural fruits, such as the blackberry (in abundance), raspberry (black and red), various kinds of the wild cherry, strawberries, wild plums and the crabapple, with a plentiful growth of cranberries.

The forest, at this time, abounded with wild game, such as elk, moose, deer, bear, wolf, lynx, fox, otter, beaver, mink, marten, raccoon, muskrat, wild turkey, ducks and other smaller fowl.

The country was remarkably free from reptiles, there only being found the small striped snake, water snakes of several kinds, and the light spotted snake, commonly called milk snake. In a residence of over fifty years in the county, the writer has only known of some half-dozen of poisonous snakes having been seen or killed, and those consisting of the small rattler, usually called massauger.

The county is situated at the lower extremity and on the west shore of Lake Huron, adjoining St. Clair county, and is watered by the Black river running through the entire county from north to south, by Elk creek running through the southwest portion (having its rise in the southwest corner and running in a northeasterly direction until its junction with Black river), also by the north and south branches of the Cass river, which run in a southwesterly and northeasterly course until their junction, and by Black creek, Cherry creek and many other small streams.

It is bounded on the west by Lapeer and Tuscola counties, on the north by Huron county, on the south by St. Clair county and on the east by Lake Huron. The banks of the lake forming the eastern boundary are, on an average, 40 feet in height, affording a fine view of the lake.

The county embraces an area of about 972 square miles, or some 622,080 acres of land. The soil is very fertile, consisting mainly of sandy and clay loams, overlaid with a deep covering of vegetable mould, which makes it well adapted for the growth of hay, wheat, oats, barley, corn, pease and beans, as well as all kinds of vegetables.

ORGANIZATION.

A special Act of the Legislature of 1848, in force after December 31st of that year, authorized the separate organization of Sanilac county. Prior to the passage of this act, all of Sanilac and Huron counties, except Sebawaing, were attached to St. Clair county for legislative and judicial purposes, and were embraced in the then township of Lexington, together with the northern part of St. Clair county, composed of Township Nine and the south half of Township Ten, the middle of Township Ten being the southern boundary of Sanilac county as originally surveyed. Sanilac county as organized was composed of the then township of Lexington.

By an Act of the Legislature of 1848, the township of Worth was organized by detaching Township Nine, north of Ranges 13, 14, 15, 16 and fractional 17, east, from the south side of the old township of Lexington, and by the same act Sanilac township was organized from that part of the township of Lexington lying north of the north line of Township Ten, north of Ranges 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16, east.

The first Board of Supervisors was composed of three members, viz.: Peter H. Benedict, Worth; Clark M. Mills, Lexington; and Charles McMillan, Sanilac. The value of the county as equalized by the Board was \$169,369. The first county officers were elected at the general election held in November, 1849, and were installed January 1, 1850, as follows:—

PIONEERS.

The first white man who settled with his family in what is now Sanilac county was Joel Carrington (father of Mark Carrington, now of Port Austin, Huron county), who came into what is now the township of Worth in 1834. He came for the purpose of manufacturing deck planks for ship building, employing a considerable number of men, sawing the plank with whip saws, and while residing here cleared a small farm of about sixty acres.

The next settler was Reuben B. Dimond, afterwards Judge Dimond. He was the first Justice of the Peace, and held the first elective office in what now constitutes the county. He also taught the first school. His farm adjoined that of Carrington, which was in Section 6, Township 9, north, Range 17, east.

It is a matter of dispute as to who was the first white child born within the county, some claiming it to have been Dr. F. B. Galbraith, of Pontiac, son of the late Dr. John Galbraith, of Amadore; while others claim it to have been a son of Mrs. Charles Anderson, who resided near the Dimond and Carrington settlement.

Dr. Woodard, one of the early pioneers, came into the county sometime during the year 1835 or 1836, and built the first saw mill in what is now Sanilac county in the year 1836 on Section 32, Township 9, north of Range 16, east, which he afterward sold to Nathan B. Chase. Mr. Chase, above spoken of, built the first flouring mill upon the same site with the saw mill purchased from Dr. Woodard in the year 1840.

Reuben B. Dimond built the second saw mill on Section 13, Township 9, north of Range 16, east, in 1843; and the third was built by Ephriam Pierce on Section 29, in Township 10, north of Range 16, east, within what is now the village of Croswell.

In 1846 Hubbard & Lester built in the township of Lexington on the present site of Jno. L. Fead's woolen mill, the first steam saw mill; and were the first company to engage in lumbering on an extensive scale within the county. This mill was operated for several years and cut nearly all the pine timber in the immediate vicinity of Lexington, from which the company realized very handsome profits.

The first settlers to enter the county for the sole purpose of agriculture were Jno. Ryan, Ferdinand and William Leonard, Dr. Jno. Galbraith, William and George Smith, Isaac Lemon and Jno. Carroll, in the Township of Worth; and Jno. Hyde, Rev. Thomas Huckins, Dr. Miles Huckins, Hiram Haney and Lawson Bisbee, of Lexington, who came some time from 1837 to 1840. Among the first settlers of Lexington were also Jno. Smith, Reuben Simons and Jno. Hughes. Jno. Smith was probably the first settler, having come here as early as 1837 from Canada. He built a log house on the bank of Lake Huron, where he resided with his family, consisting of a wife and twelve children, until, in the language of Daniel Boone, "the neighbors became too thick for him" when, Arab like, he folded his tent and moved farther West, where there was more room.

While Sanilac county was heavily timbered with white pine of the very best quality, in the main, it failed to benefit the county as a county, or to benefit any considerable number of its inhabitants; the timber lands having been bought largely by non-residents who cut and run the timber to other parts for manufacture. The timber from the townships of Fremont, Speaker, Maple Valley, Flynn, Elk, Watertown, Washington, Bridgehampton, Custer and part of Marion, was run to Port Huron and Detroit for manufacture, and helped in a large degree to enrich those cities; while that from Austin, Greenleaf, Evergreen, Argyle, Moore and Lamotte was run down the Cass river and west to Saginaw for manufacture, likewise helping to enrich the citizens of that point.

The timber from the townships of Delaware, Minden, East Marion, Forester, Sanilac, Lexington, Worth and Buel, was largely manufactured on the shore and at Croswell; and during the period of such manufacture was of material benefit to the new settlers, as well as to the owners of the timber lands and mill owners. But, in the end, every person who made a fortune out of Sanilac county timber, with one exception, removed to more sunny climes.

THE PRESS.

The *Sanilac Leader* was the pioneer paper of Sanilac county, having been established at Lexington in 1854 by Joseph C. Wyllis, its publisher and proprietor. The paper when first started, was Democratic in sentiment, with Free-soil tendencies; but during the struggle in Congress by the Republicans to elect N. P. Banks Speaker in 1855, 1856, the *Leader* came out squarely as a Republican paper. This paper ably and vigorously advocated the election of Jno. C. Fremont to the presidency; and, it was, no doubt, largely instrumental in changing the political complexion of the county from strongly Democratic to overwhelmingly Republican. Mr. Wyllis continued the publication of the *Leader* as a Republican paper until some time during the year 1864, when he removed from the county.

The next newspaper was that of the *Signal*, which was started as a Democratic paper in 1856 and was published as such until 1858, when the office outfit was bought by some Republicans and the name changed to that of the *Sanilac Jeffersonian*, a Republican paper, under the control of Charles Waterbury, as editor. The *Jeffersonian* has since passed into the hands of Nims & Beach, afterwards to Watson Beach, and is now published by L. M. Houghton. The *Jeffersonian* has always been a Republican paper, and has had a decided influence in maintaining the Republican ascendancy in Sanilac county. It has been at all times fairly and honorably conducted, and has a circulation of about 1,000.

The publication of the *Croswell Democrat* was commenced during the month of March, 1880. The paper started with a subscription list of about fifty, which was rapidly increased until it now has a list of about 800. It was first published by Horatio Pratt, and was free-trade, anti-monopolist, semi-greenback, and free-silver coinage Democratic. The *Democrat* office was burned out in November, 1881. In 1886 the paper was sold by Pratt to Wilford Macklem, who in turn sold it to Williard Babcock and a Mr. Niles, who are now (March, 1893), its publishers and proprietors. The paper supported Hancock for the presidency in 1880, and the Union State ticket in 1882, Benjamin F. Butler for the presidency in 1884, and the Union Electoral State ticket. Since 1886 the *Democrat* has supported the regular Democratic ticket. It is fairly well conducted, and is the leading light of the Democratic party in this county.

The publication of the *Marlette Leader* was commenced during the spring 1878, as a Republican paper, has always been an advocate of the right, and its editorials has treated all public questions fairly and with ability. In its treatment of public men, as well as political issues, all have been fairly discussed by the *Leader* during its term of existence. It is a good local newspaper, and is well worthy of the support it has received at the hands of the public. Its circulation is about 700, and is now independent in politics.

The *Minden Post*, a small paper published at Minden, in the northern part of Sanilac county, was established in the year 1881, by J. H. Shults, its present editor and proprietor. This paper claims, as we believe, to be independent in politics. It once obtained the tax printing from Auditor-General Aplin, on the ground of its Republican principles; but, so far as the writer can judge, the paper is Democratic in its tendencies. It receives a fair share of public patronage.

The *Sanilac Reporter*, an offshoot of the *Minden Post*, was first published in 1883, in Port Sanilac. It claims to be independent in politics, and is fairly well supported by the public.

The *Sanilac County Republican*, a Republican paper published at Sanilac Centre, was established in 1886, by ———, and has since its commencement been successfully conducted, notwithstanding several changes in editors and proprietors. It is now owned and published by George E. English, who appears a successful manager, a painstaking editor, a vigorous and pleasing writer. Mr. English has succeeded in making the *Republican* the leading paper of the county, and it is fast becoming a power for good within the county, morally and politically. It has at present, a wide circulation, to which it is fairly entitled, being a neat, clean, readable newspaper, and should be found in every Sanilac county household. The writer bespeaks for the *Republican* a prosperous future.

The *Brown City Banner*, a newspaper published at Brown City, in the southwest portion of the county, was established in the year ——— by L. H. Howse. The *Banner* is a Republican paper, is well conducted and is entitled to liberal support. The writer is informed that it has thus far received a generous patronage, and is now a growing and prosperous enterprise.

There have been a few other attempts at newspaper publishing in Sanilac county, which have died natural deaths for want of support within a few weeks or months, hence require no further notice.

SANILAC COUNTY IN THE WAR.

While the Mexican War was prosecuted to its close, prior to the organization of Sanilac county, yet, what now constitutes Sanilac county did furnish some ten or twelve soldiers for that war, among whom were David E. Buel, Peter Shell, Stephen Thibedeau, Henry Shump, a young man by the name of Holister, and several others whose names are not remembered by the writer. But, when the firing upon the Star of the West, and the further unwelcome news of the attack on Fort Sumter by armed rebels was received, the patriotic fervor was touched, and at the call of the President, a company was raised and their services tendered the Government. The quota was, however, already filled, and not until after the disastrous defeat at Bull Run, and the President's call for 300,000 men, was an effort made to raise another company.

During the months of September and October Company D, Tenth Michigan, was raised and officered as follows:—

Many of these officers were afterwards promoted, and a few were assigned to other companies. The company was mustered into service in February, 1862, and left Flint (then place of rendezvous), April 22, 1862, having a full roster of 103 officers and men. The company participated in many battles, was considered as good as any in the regiment, and the regiment as good as any from this State. At the expiration of their term of service, most of the company re-enlisted as veterans until the close of the war. On the 24th of May, 1865, this company, with the regiment, participated in the grand review at Washington, was mustered out of service July 10th, at Louisville, Ky., arrived at Jackson, Mich., on the 22d, and was there paid off and discharged on the 1st of August.

When a further call by the President for more volunteers was made in July, 1862, setting forth the pressing need for more men at the front, another company was raised in this county, which was Company "K" of the 22d Infantry. Alexander G. Galbraith was Captain of this Company, Henry Briendenback, First Lieutenant, and John A. Simons, Second Lieutenant. The recruiting commenced July 15th. Within six weeks the company was filled to its maximum, and within another week was on its way to Kentucky, and from thence to Tennessee. On the 20th of September, 1863, the regiment was ordered to reinforce Gen. Thomas at Chickamauga, and by 2 o'clock P. M. of that day became engaged in the battle, where the regiment was so badly cut to pieces it was almost annihilated. Subsequently, the fragments left of this regiment was attached to the Engineer Brigade under Gen. William F. Smith until May, 1864, when it was detailed with the 9th Regiment, Michigan Infantry, as Gen. Thomas' Headquarter Guards, with plenty of duty escorting prisoners, guarding trains, etc., during the Atlanta campaign, after which it remained at Chattanooga, in engineer and guard duty, until June 28, 1865, when it was mustered out at Nashville, Tenn. Arriving at Detroit on the 30th, it was there paid off and discharged July 11th, its members having performed their duty on all occasions.

Sanilac county furnished nearly a company for the 6th Cavalry. Wesley Armstrong, of Lapeer, formerly a resident of Sanilac county, was the Captain of this company; Edward Potter, of Burtchville, St. Clair county, First Lieutenant; and William Creevey and George S. West, of Lexington, Second Lieutenants. The regiment was mustered into service October 13, 1862, having 1,229 men and officers. After the War of the Rebellion had closed, the regiment was ordered to Wyoming on an expedition against the Indians, and they carried the first flag that floated over Reno, on Powder river. In all its engagements, the 6th Cavalry lost seven officers and ninety-four men killed, thirteen men died of wounds and 260 of disease.

Sanilac county was likewise represented by a number of men in the 2d, 7th, 8th, 14th, 24th and 27th Infantry, and 2d, 3d, 4th, 5th, 8th, 10th and 11th Cavalry regiments. Their valor and steadfastness was none the less noticeable whenever called for service in the field, and the county can review the action of her citizen soldiers with just pride and emotion.

CHURCHES.

Rev. Thomas Huckins was the first minister of the gospel to enter the wilds of Sanilac County. It was his fortune to preach the first sermon about July 1, 1839; also, to solemnize the first marriage ceremony within the county, the contracting parties being James Hughes and Helen Ellsworth. He organized the first church society, and by the aid of this organization he succeeded in building what was then known as the Free-will Baptist Church at Lexington. This was the first church edifice built in Sanilac county, and is now known as the Congregational Church of Lexington. Sometime during the year 1841 a Mr. Noble, of Port Huron, a Methodist Episcopal clergyman, preached an occasional sermon in Sanilac county; but not until the year 1847 did the Methodist Episcopal denomination extend their circuit into Sanilac county, and not until 1855 did they build their church in Lexington, which was the second church built within the county. The Methodist Episcopal Church now has service in every town in the county, and many of them have costly church edifices. From these beginnings others in due time followed, so that now nearly all, or at least many other, Christian denominations are well represented.

The Regular Baptist was next to organize and established a church organization. Rev. Abram Sloat, the officiating clergyman, came into the county in 1850. About the same time Rev. Talmedy Waterbury, of the Congregational Church, located in Sanilac township, and there established a church. Elder Hiram Hayward organized a Christian Church at Amadore, Worth, about this time. Rev. John McClelland, of the United Presbyterian Church, organized a church in Fremont in 1862, and one at Davisville (now Croswell) in 1863. Rev. A. B. Flower, an Episcopal minister, organized the first church of that denomination in the county at Lexington in the year 1868, and another at Croswell at about the same time. The Advents came in the year 1869. Elder George Wright was their first minister, and to his indefatigable industry the society is largely indebted for their growth and present standing. The Roman Catholics, while not on the ground as early as many of the others, have by their energy outstripped all in their growth in this locality, and at this writing (1893), in the opinion of the writer, their members would equal at least one-third of the entire church membership of the county. The Methodist Episcopal rank next in number, while the Presbyterians, Episcopalians, Baptists, Christians, Advents and Congregationalists share the balance nearly equal.

EDUCATIONAL.

The first settlers of Sanilac county, although not highly educated, were men who appreciated the general school system of the State of Michigan. As soon as a settlement contained a sufficient number of children to warrant the maintenance of a school, a district was organized, school kept for three months, necessary returns made to draw the primary money, taxes voted and assessed for a school-house, and thus fully equipped and maintained a school such as the law directs. The first school in the county was taught in the township of Worth sometime during 1838 in a log house, one mile south of the village of Lexington. The first school-house built was in the northeast corner of the township of Worth, one mile from Lexington, in what was known as the Carrington settlement, in 1840. The next school was organized on the Lapeer road, two and one-half miles west of Lexington; the next on the Ridge road in the Hyde settlement; and from this time the schools of this county have been carefully cared for, fostered and encouraged, there being now within the county 143 school districts, which maintain a school at least eight months during the year, all of which are well managed and taught by teachers thoroughly qualified.

There are within the county some eight or more graded schools, in several of which some of the higher branches are taught, and the entire school property amounts to more than \$100,000.

Lexington has just completed a new school edifice at a cost of \$10,000, where a corps of able and competent teachers are employed. Professor Naylor being at the head. Twice have the school interests in the Northern and Western townships been sadly crippled. First, during the great forest fires of 1871, when ten school-houses were burned in this county, at a property loss of \$4,000, and some 300 children were deprived of school privileges for nearly a year. The second disaster was caused by the great fire of 1881, in which the county lost twenty-seven school-houses, distributed as follows:—

By this fire 1,400 children were deprived of school privileges for a considerable time, and some \$10,000 worth of school property was destroyed. The property loss was largely replaced by the Relief Committee.

There is at this time an enrollment of school children of nearly 11,000, and the schools are, as a whole, in a gratifying condition. Sanilac county is not far behind her sister counties in the State, many of which are much older and wealthier communities, as regards the standing of her schools.

FOREST FIRES.

Sanilac county has passed through two severe trials by fire, known as the great forest fires. In October, 1871, the first of those fires occurred, in which nearly every family north of Croswell and west of Lexington and Worth suffered more or less in loss of crops, buildings, fencing and stock. In not a few cases, human lives were sacrificed, either in the effort to save property or while endeavoring to escape. The fire also destroyed large tracts of valuable timber, consisting of pine, ash, hemlock, cedar and oak. This hastened the cutting of the tracts of timber destroyed.

The wind having blown down nearly all of the timber killed by the fire of 1871, which had been left standing by the lumbermen, and all this debris having become thoroughly seasoned during the next ten years, this part of the county had become one vast tinder-bed. When the fire was ignited on the 5th day of September, 1881, the wind was blowing a gale and soon scattered fire in every direction. All the west and northern part of the county became one solid burning mass, and if the first fire was disastrous, the second was trebly so. Everything within reach of the fire was consumed, such as houses, barns, stacks of grain, fences, live stock of every description, nearly all of the orchards and of the remaining green timber. Immense suffering was caused to the inhabitants. Over 150 persons were burned to death in Sanilac and Huron counties, some fifty-seven in Sanilac county alone.

Had it not been for the relief granted by the benevolent people outside of this county and State, this portion of the county must necessarily have been abandoned by the settlers for the time being. Having been aided by the humane and benevolent, the afflicted inhabitants set to work with a will to repair their losses, and in most cases have succeeded fairly well. Notwithstanding their great losses, the fires in many cases aided the new beginner very materially by subduing the forest and by clearing his land; and it is barely possible that the county is to-day as far advanced as an agricultural county as it would have been had the fires not occurred. Nevertheless, it entailed great losses and suffering, to say nothing of the great loss of life.

INDUSTRIES.

Agriculture is the principal industry within the county, and the husbandman is perhaps as well paid for his toil here as elsewhere. The soil produces abundant crops of wheat, hay, oats, barley, pease and potatoes. In many instances the yield of wheat is twenty-five to forty bushels per acre, two tons of hay, fifteen to twenty-four bushels of pease, fifty bushels of barley and other staples in proportion. Apples, pears, plums, cherries, strawberries and many other fruits can be grown with ease and in great abundance. Cattle, horses, sheep, swine and poultry can be raised and profitably kept by the agriculturalist.

The other industries of Sanilac county are those mainly incidental to an agricultural community, such as flouring mills, of which there are some ten or twelve; saw mills; several iron foundries; quite a number of saddlery shops; half-a-dozen cheese factories; and two woolen mills. One of these woolen mills is that of Jno. L. Fead, of Lexington, which enjoys a large business and manufactures much durable cloth. There are also quite a number of merchant tailoring establishments, which employ several persons each, and all seem to be prospering. In addition to the industries named there are a number of establishments for mending agricultural implements; likewise, numerous contractors and builders of houses.

RAILWAY.

The only railway which traverses Sanilac county is the F. and P. M. R. R., formerly the Port Huron and Northwestern. This railroad was built to Croswell in May, 1879, and was completed to Minden, near the north line of Sanilac county, during the year 1880. The Saginaw Division of this road, which traverses the southwest corner of this county, was built during the years 1880 and 1881, and has aided the growth of this county considerably. The Saginaw Division was changed from a narrow to a standard gauge during 1887. The Sand Beach Division still remains a narrow gauge, but, being fairly well equipped, answers every purpose, and is a great convenience to the people of the county, both as regards freight and mail facilities. The writer understands that this road was built at a cost of \$14,780 per mile, not including sidings, and that the capital stock of the company was \$1,090,000, divided into 1,090 shares. As to whether it has been a paying investment to the builders I am uninformed.

GROWTH.

At the organization of the county, in 1850, it had a population of 2,112; in 1890, the population was 32,589; and at this writing (1893), the population cannot be less than 34,000. The proceedings of the first Board of Supervisors shows an assessed value of property to the amount of \$169,369. The footings of the assessment rolls of the county for the year 1892 show a valuation of \$7,415,763, and equalized at the sum of \$7,628,100.

In 1850, the entire agricultural products of Sanilac county would have hardly been sufficient to support one-quarter of her population. At the present writing she produces sufficient for her own people and exports a very large amount of produce beside. During the year 1892 there was shipped 25,000 tons of hay, 16,000 to 20,000 barrels of apples, 200,000 bushels of wheat, 1,000,000 bushels of oats and 100,000 bushels of barley. Large numbers of horses, cattle, sheep and swine are annually shipped from the county, as well as great quantities of fruit, poultry and dairy products.

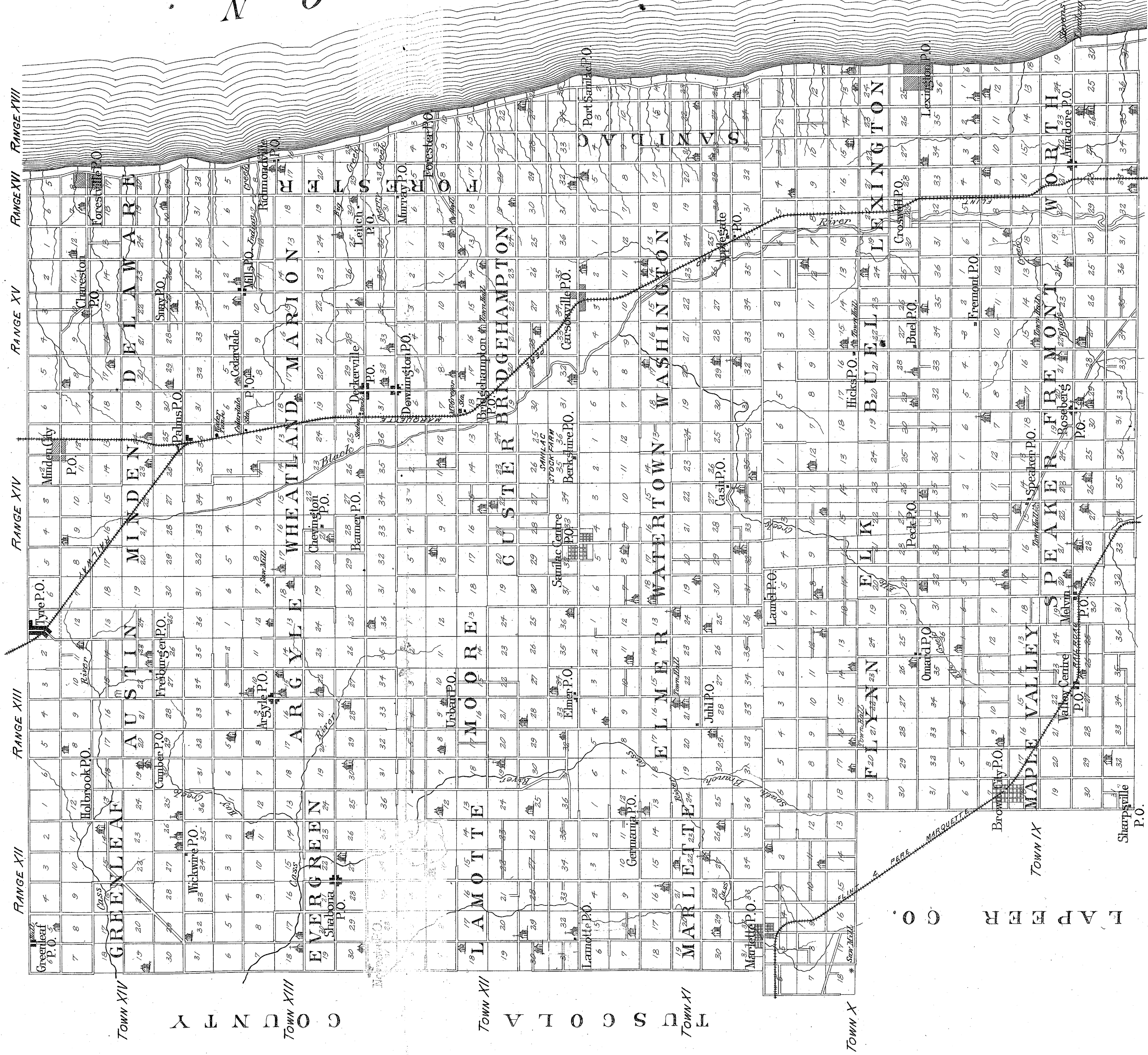

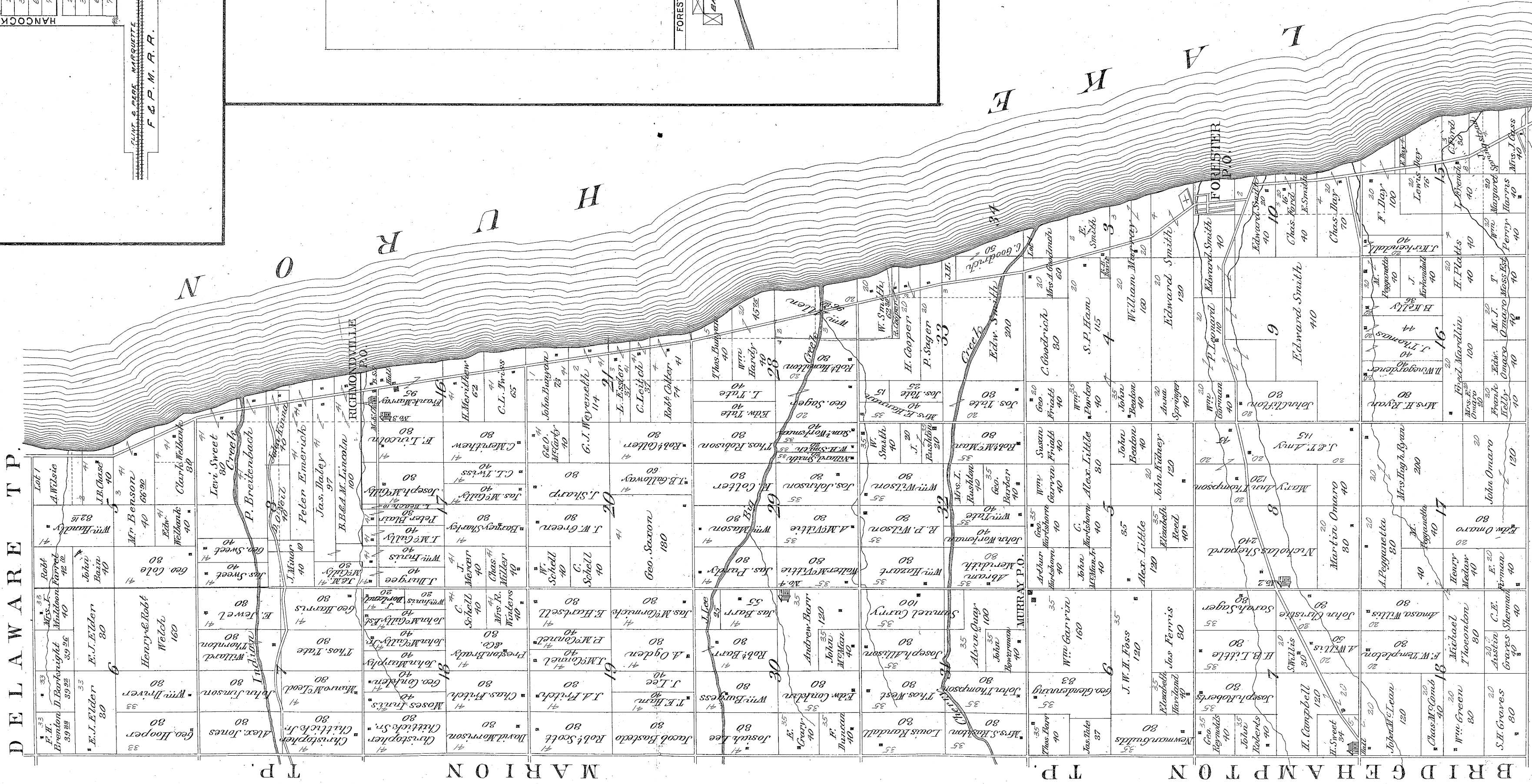
MAP OF THE VILLAGE OF MELVIN

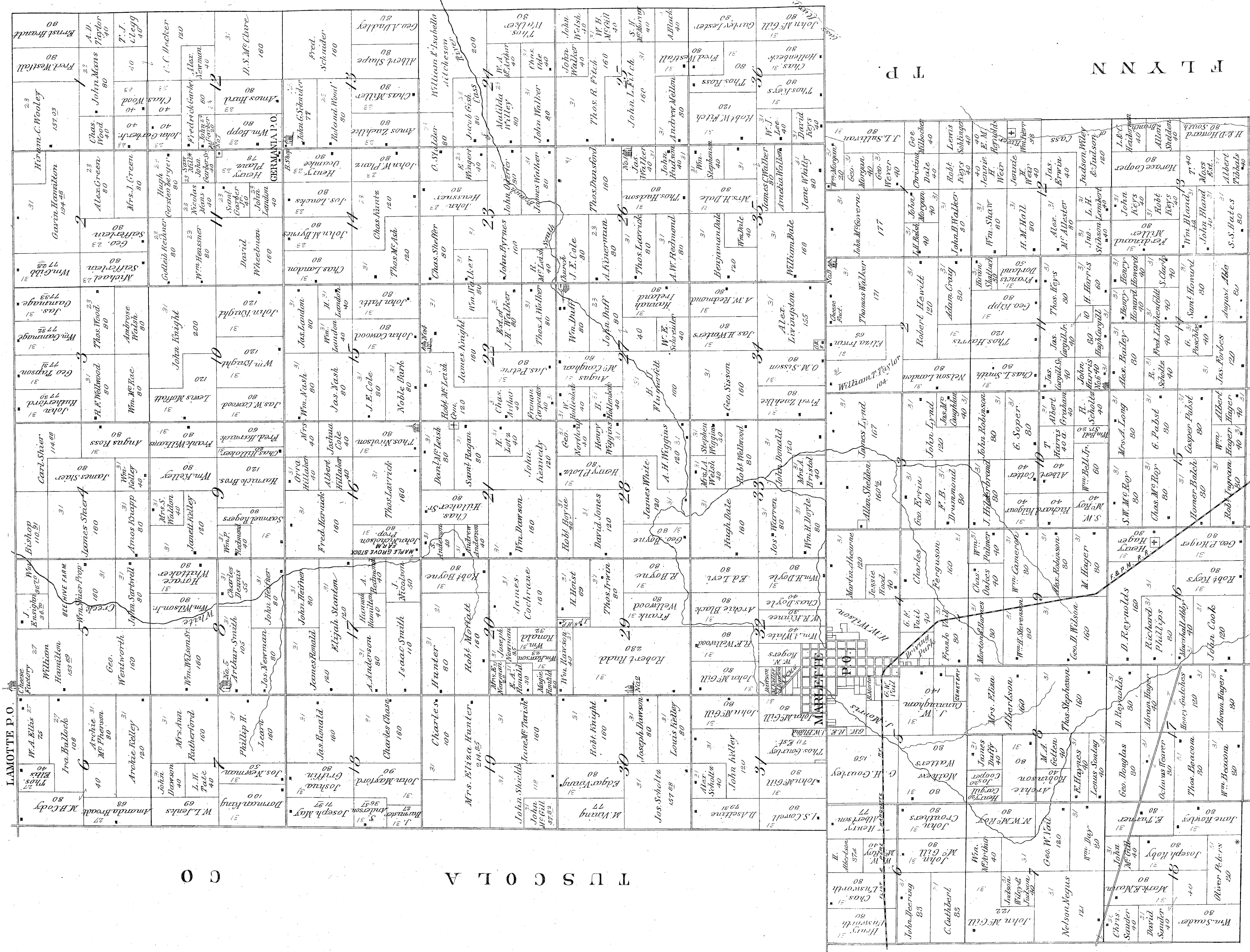
MAP OF MARLETTE

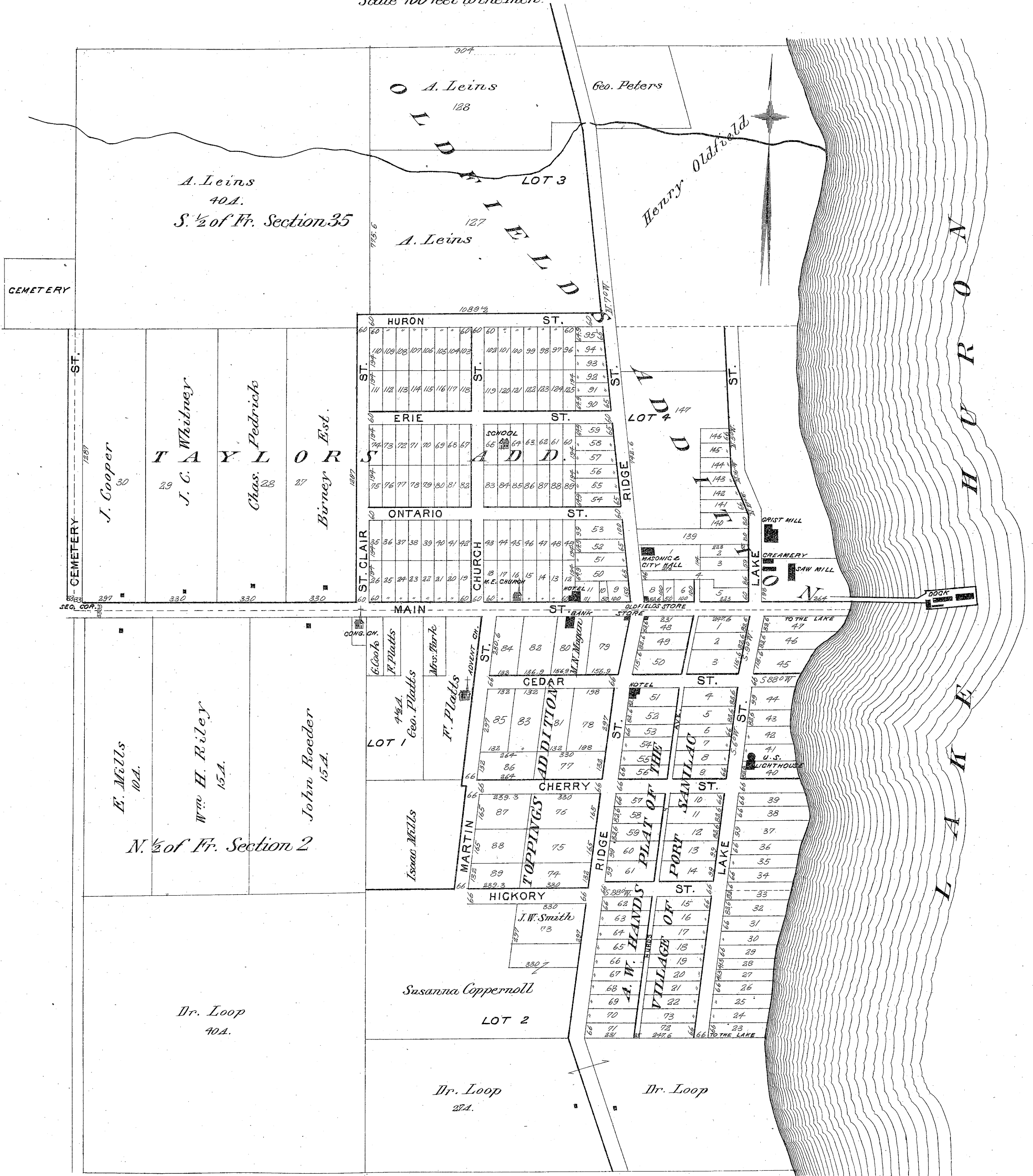
MAP OF THE

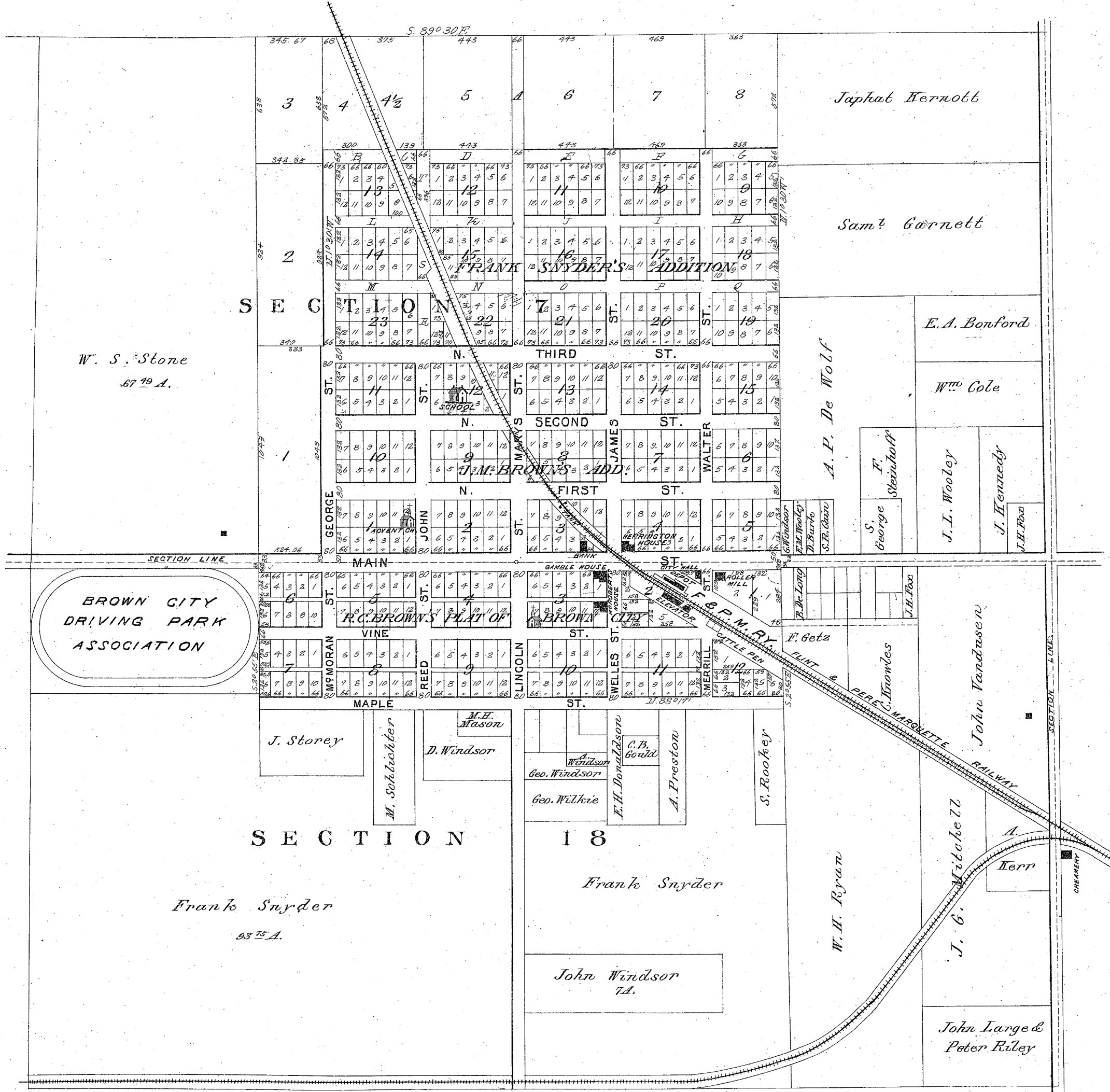
MAP OF THE

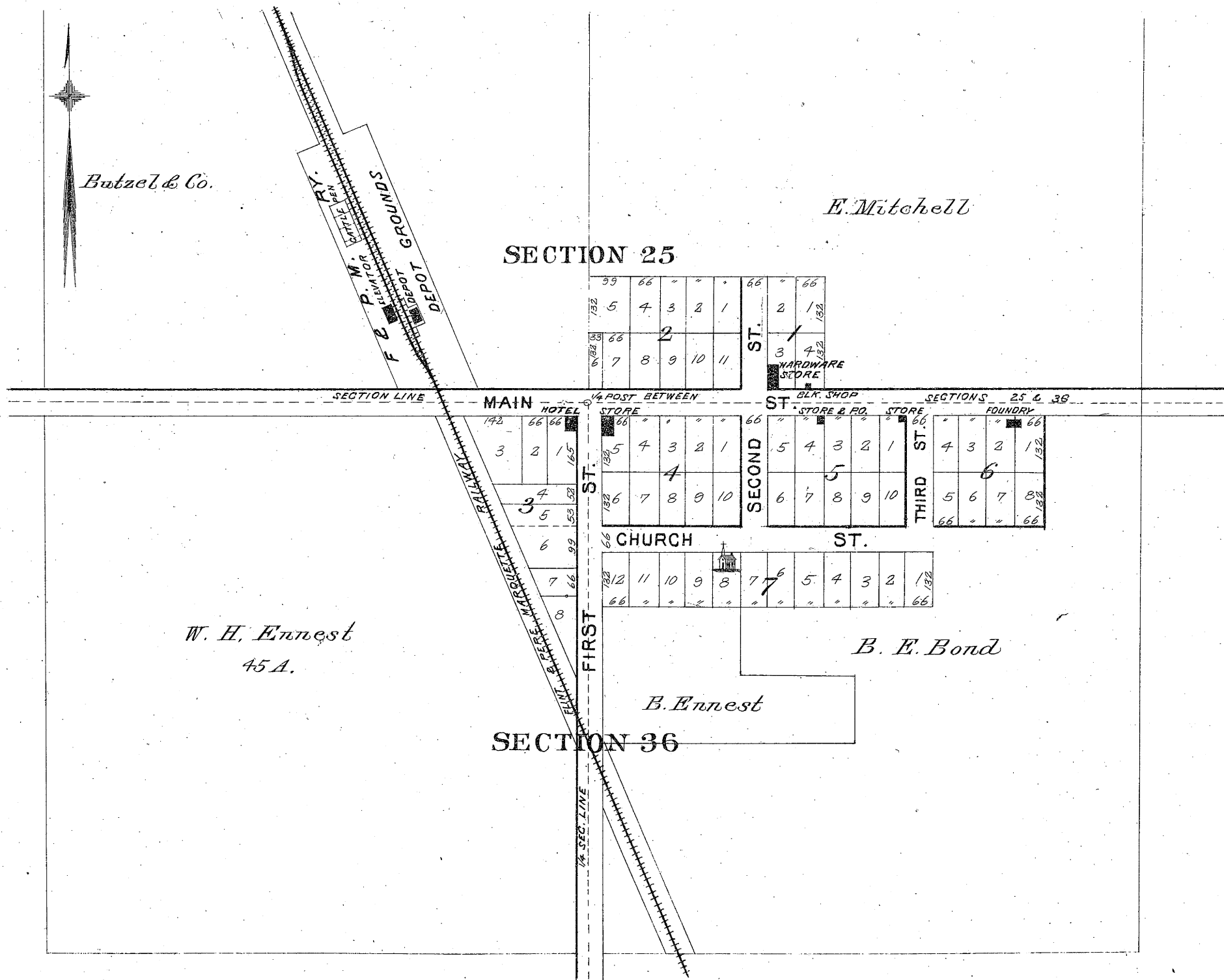
MAP OF THE

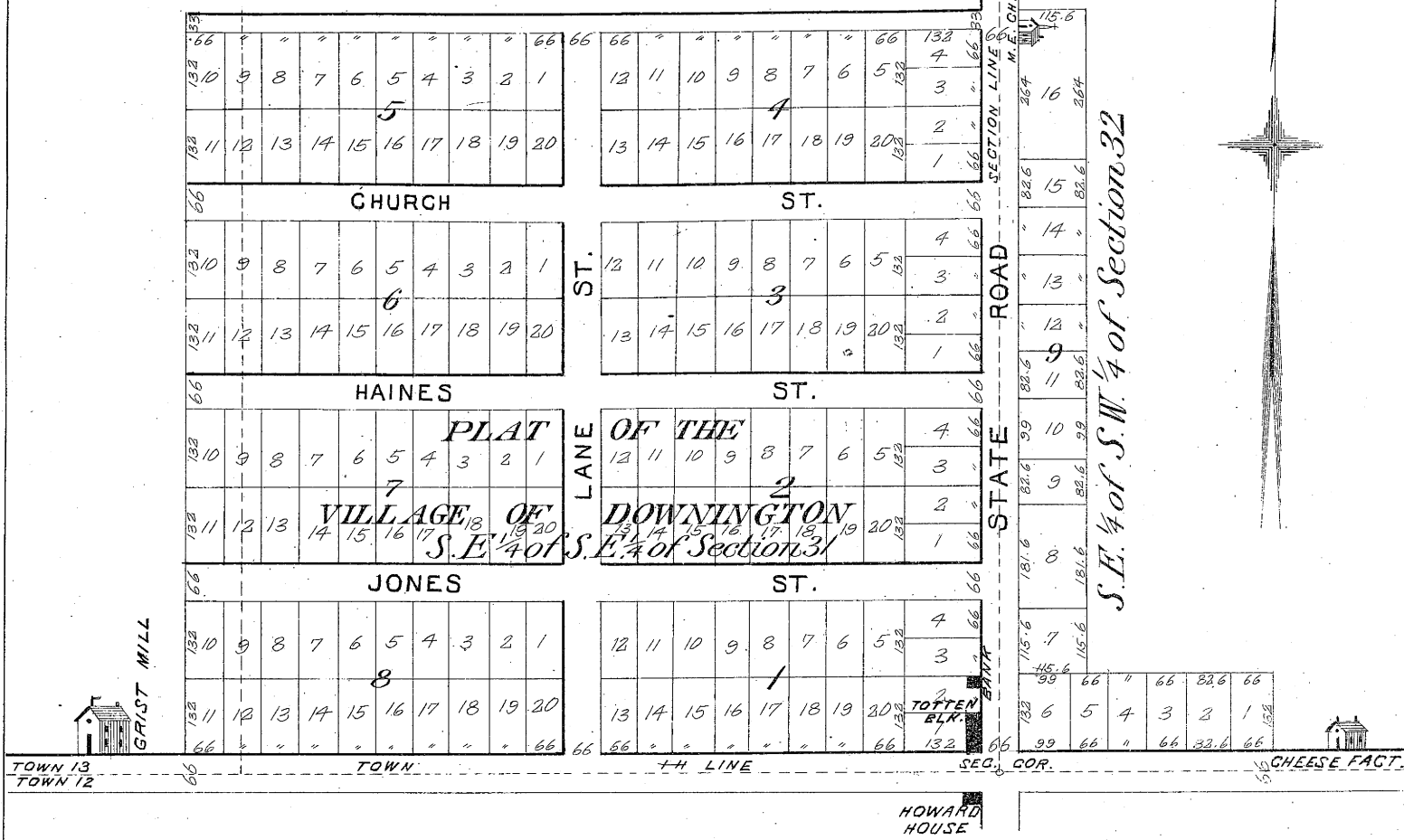
MAP OF THE

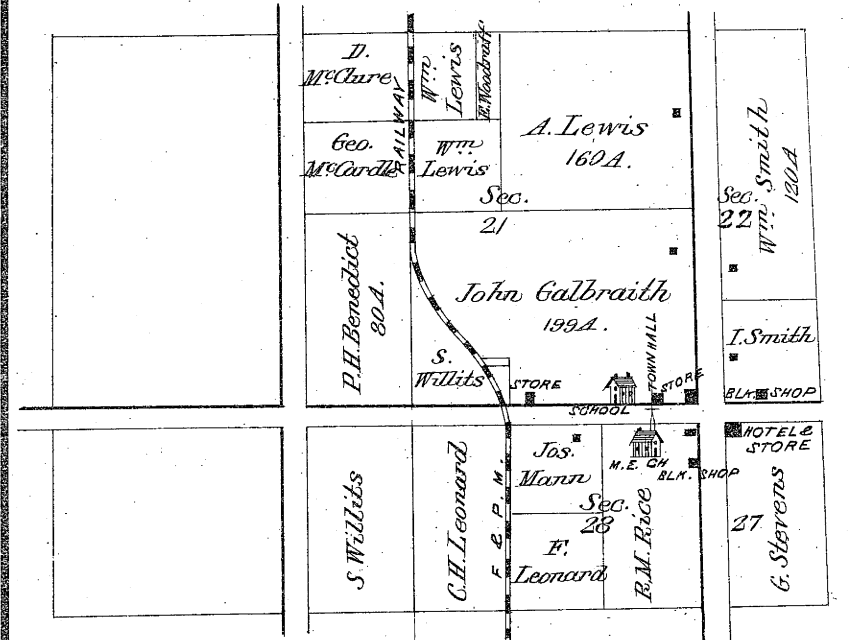

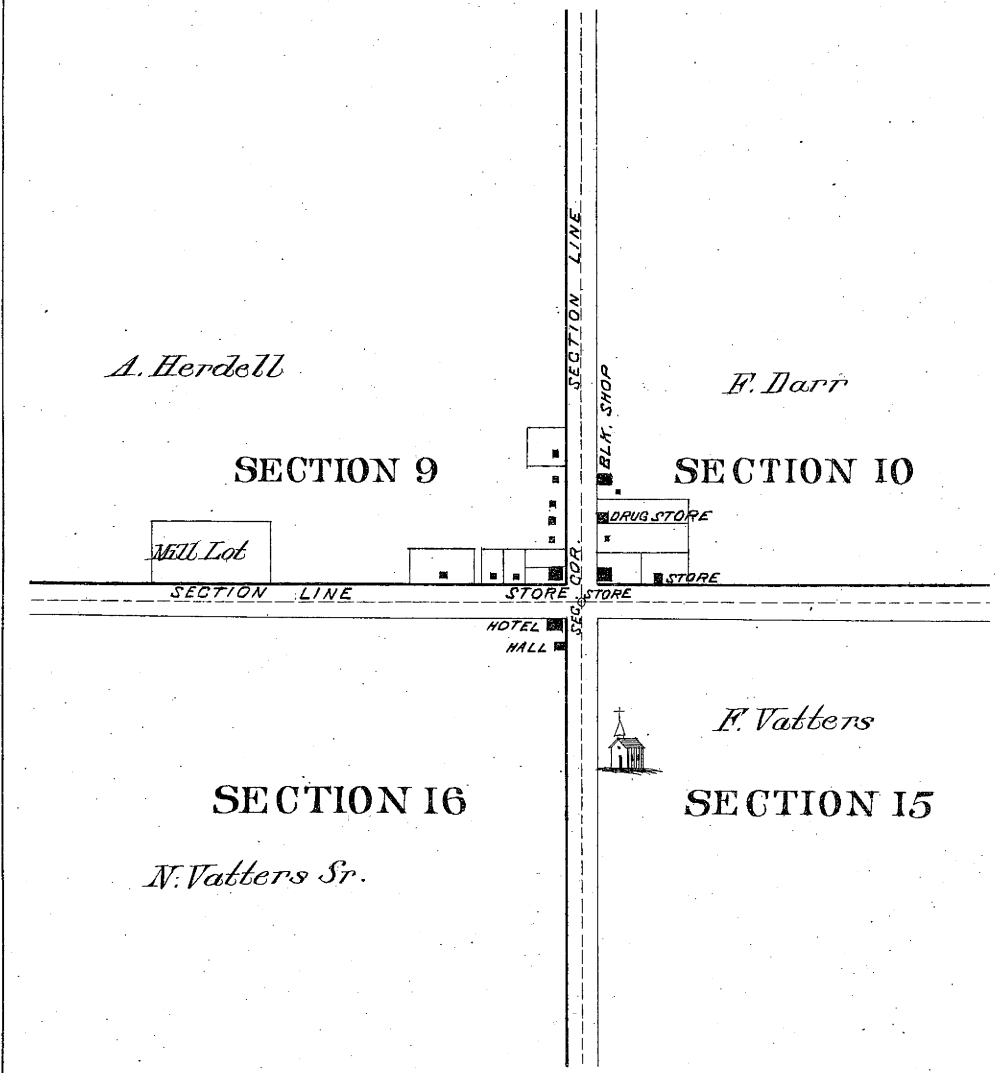
Map of the

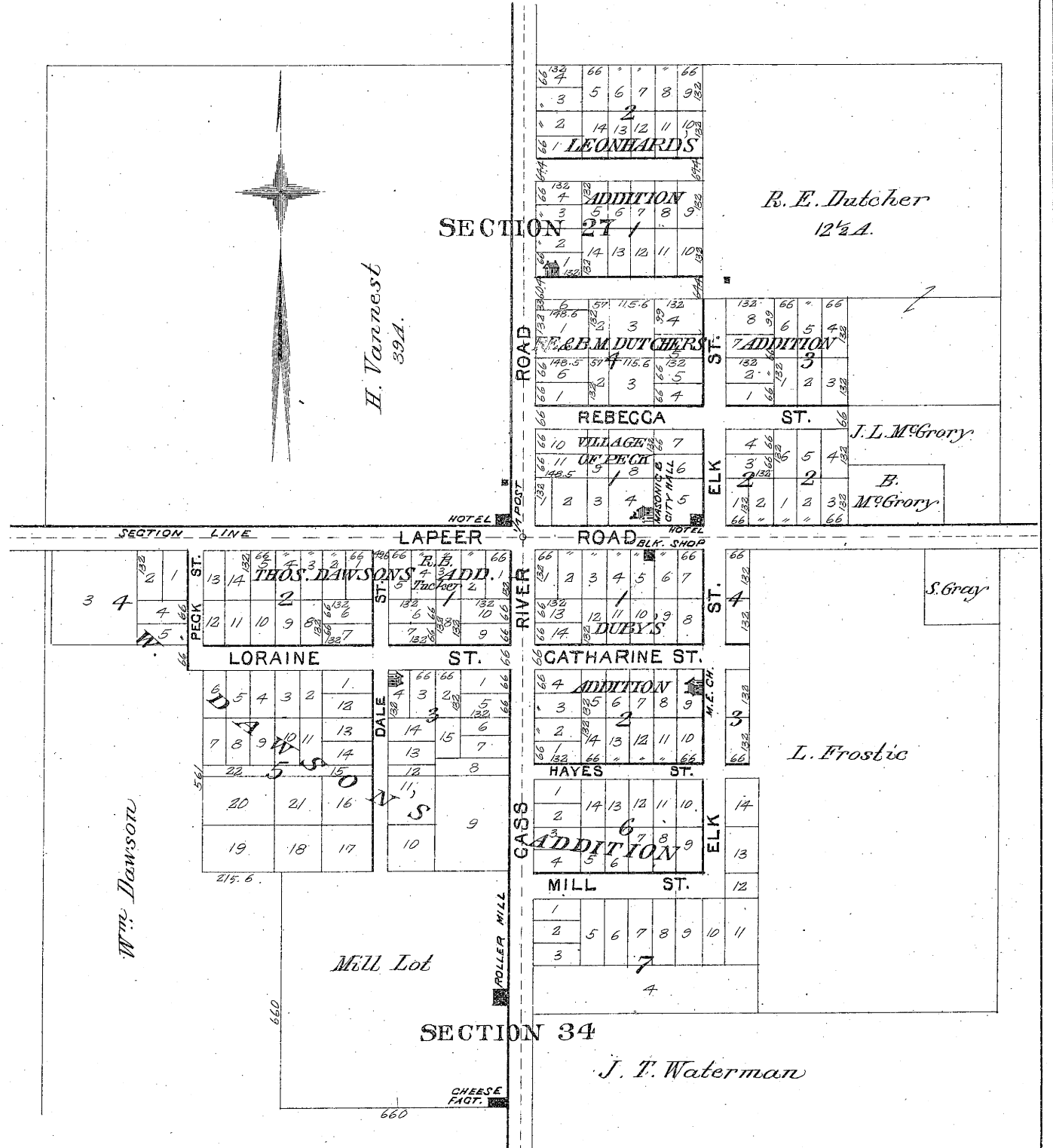

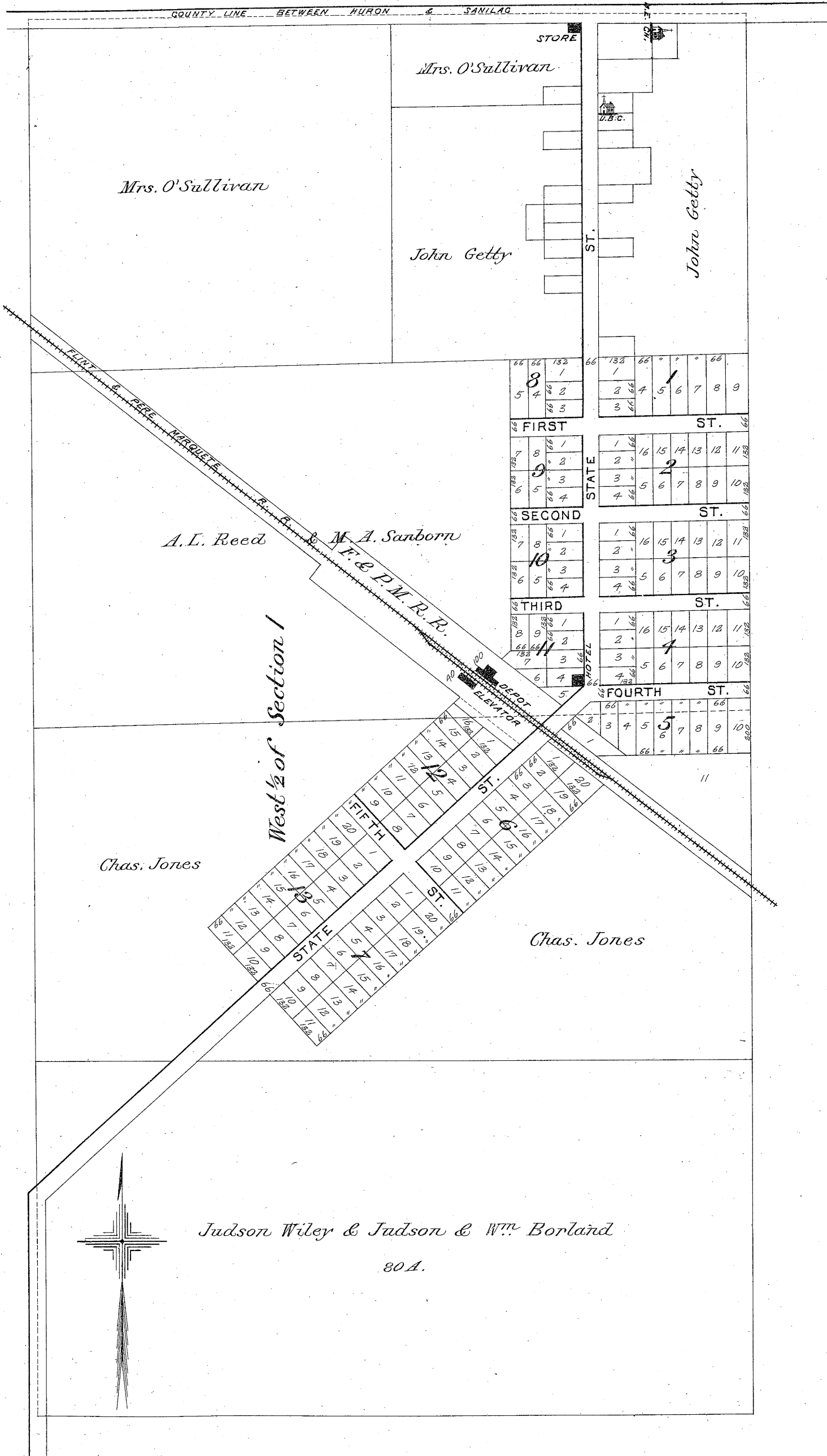
Map of the

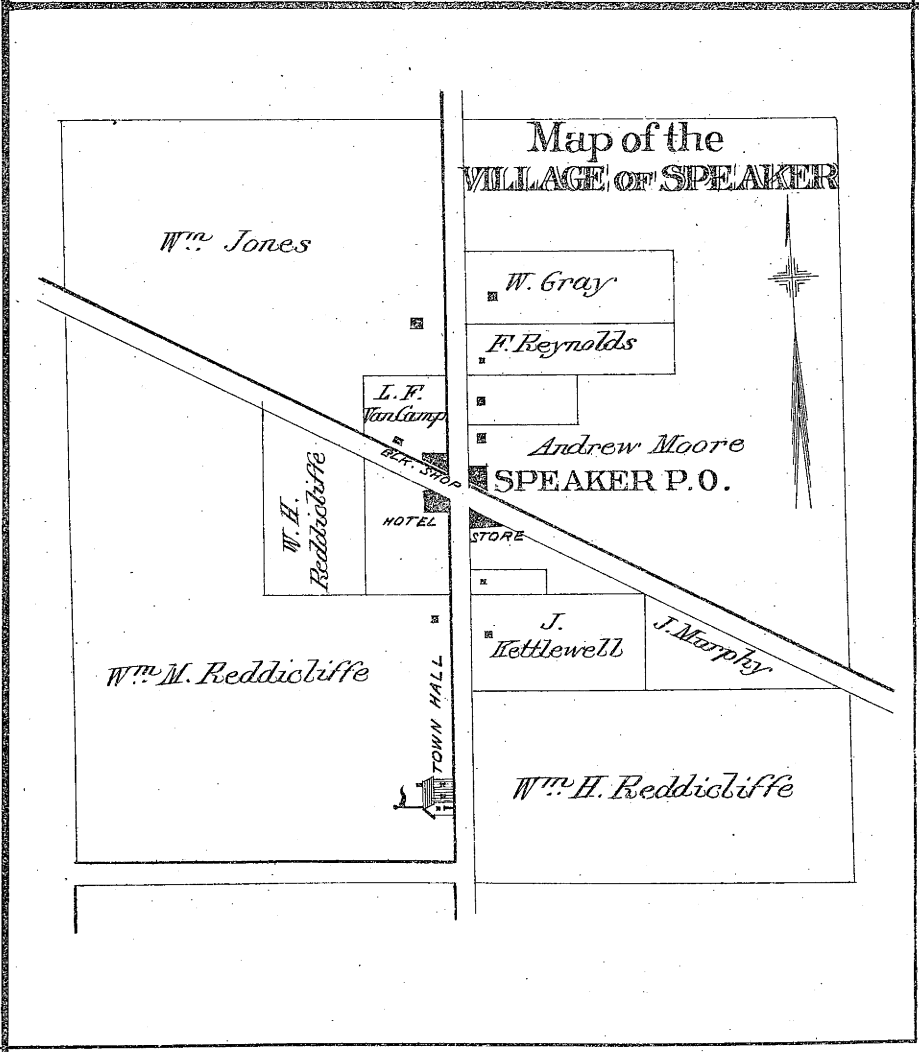
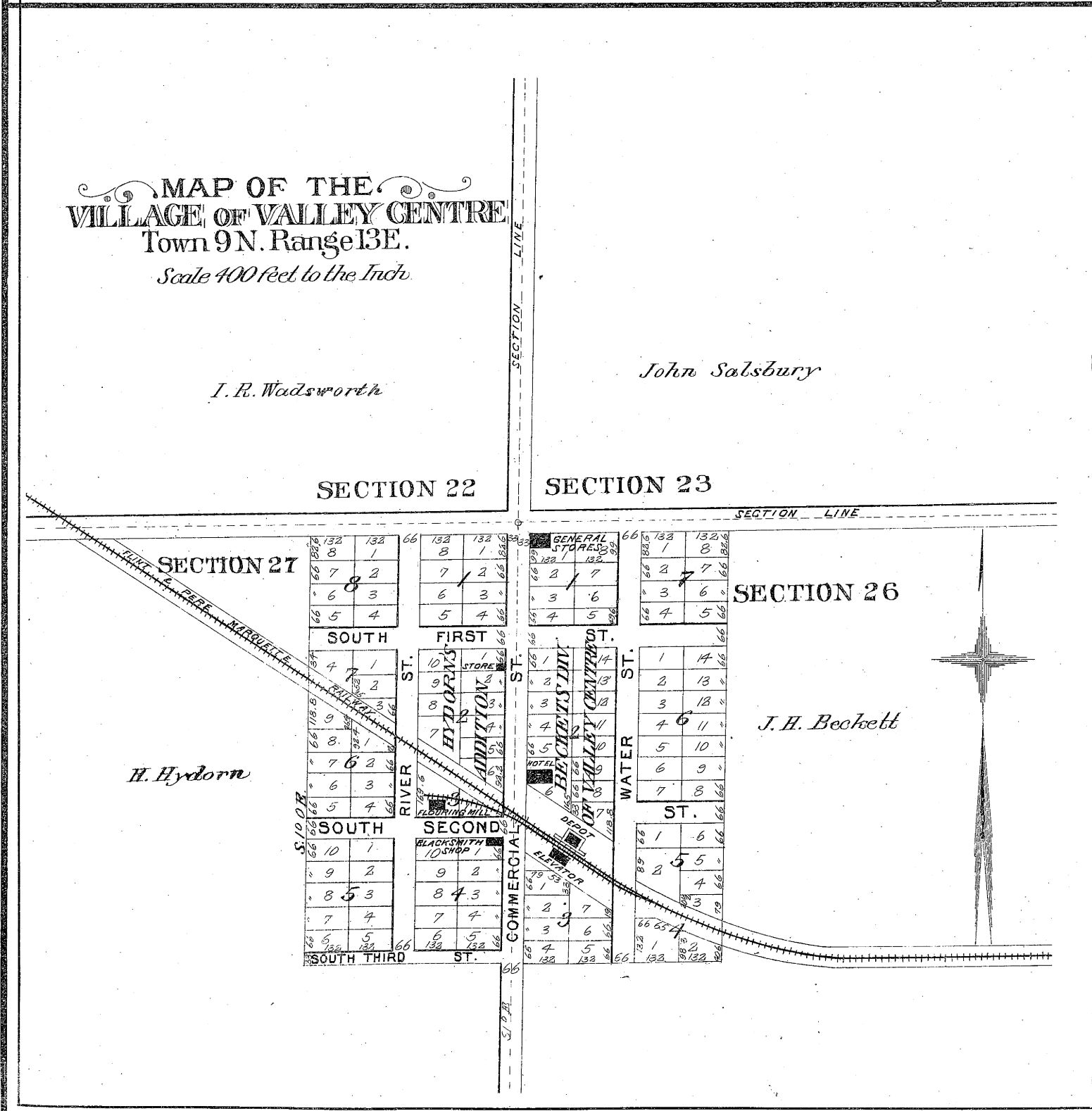
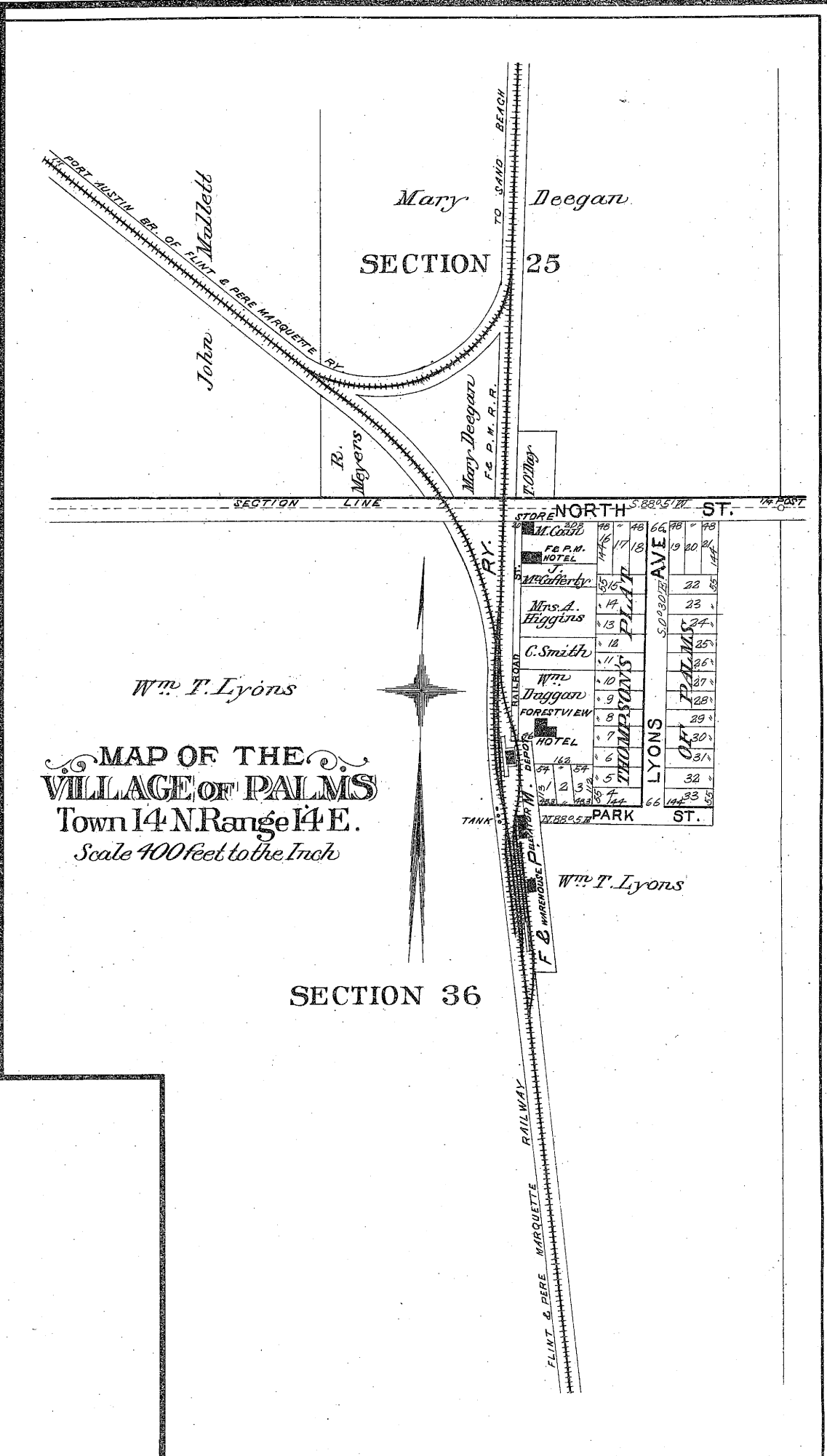
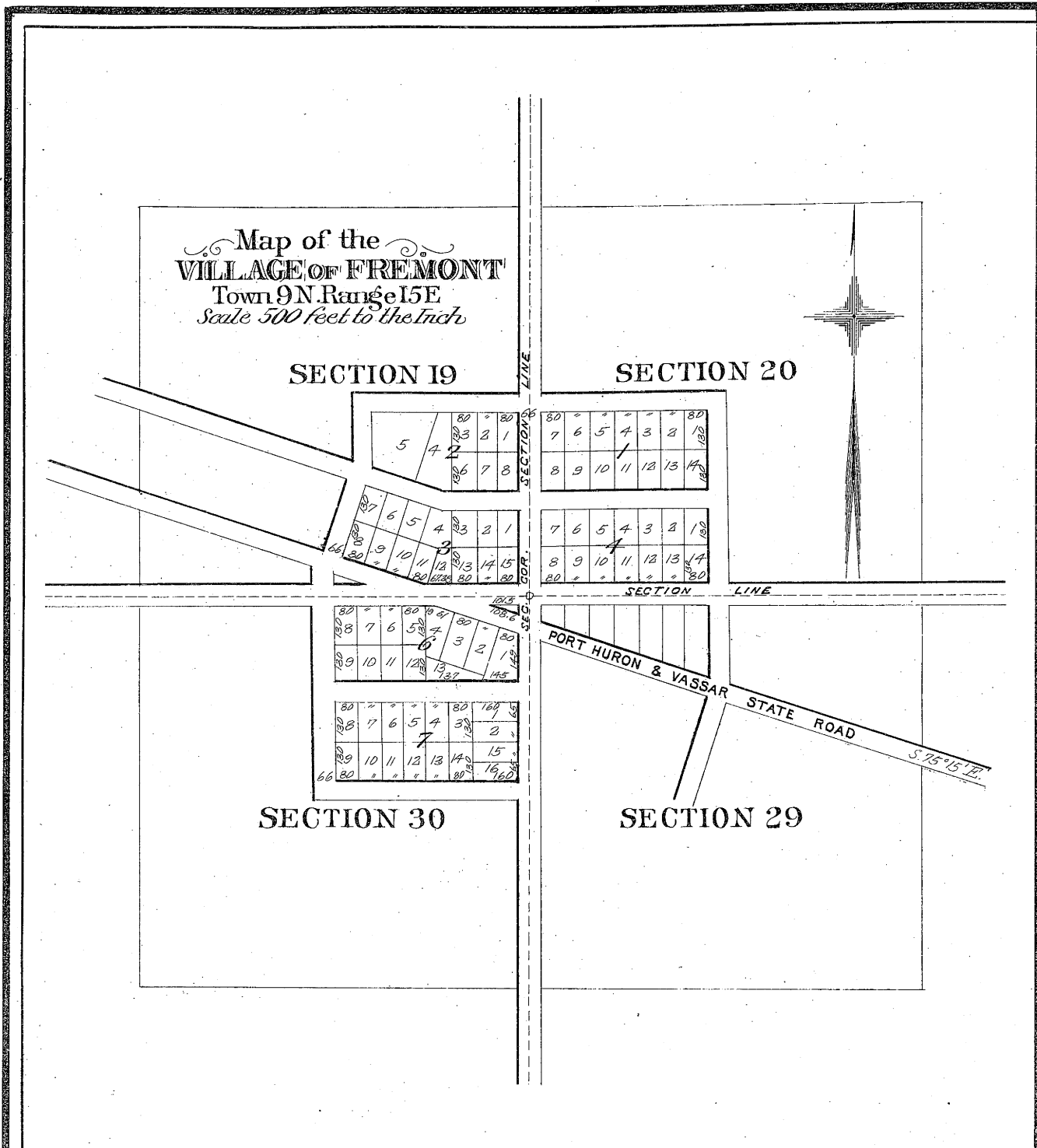


MAP OF THE VILLAGE OF PECK

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GOVERNMENT LANDS—HOW THEY CAN BE OBTAINED.

Of agricultural public lands there are two classes—the one class at \$1.25 per acre, which is designated as *minimum*, and the other at \$2.50 per acre, or *double* minimum. The latter class consists of tracts embraced within the alternate sections of land reserved to the United States in the Acts of Congress making grants within prescribed limits of the lines of railroads, or other works of internal improvements, to aid in the construction thereof, such reserved sections being doubled in price. Congress passed an act, approved June 15, 1880, the third section of which reduces to \$1.25 per acre any such lands, then subject to entry (meaning in this connection ordinary cash entry of offered lands), which were put in market at the enhanced price prior to the 1st of January, 1861. Title may be acquired by purchase at public sale, or by ordinary "private entry," and by virtue of the pre-emption, homestead, timber culture, and other laws.

BY PURCHASE AT PUBLIC SALE.

This may be done where lands are "offered" at public auction to the highest bidder, either pursuant to proclamation by the President, or public notice given in accordance with directions from the General Land Office.

BY "PRIVATE ENTRY," OR LOCATION.

The lands liable to disposal in this manner are those which have been offered at public sale, which were then not sold, and which have not since been reserved or otherwise withdrawn from market.

The applicant will first present a written application to the Register for the district in which the land desired is situated, describing the tract he wishes to purchase, giving its area. Thereupon the Register, if the tract is vacant, will so certify to the Receiver, stating the price, and the applicant must then pay the amount of the purchase-money.

The Receiver will then issue his receipt for the money paid, in duplicate, giving to the purchaser a duplicate receipt. The Register will then issue his certificate of purchase. At the close of the month the Register and Receiver will make returns of the sale to the General Land Office, from which, when the proceedings are found regular, a patent or complete title will be issued, and on surrender of the duplicate receipt such patent will be delivered, at the option of the patentee, either by the Commissioner at Washington or by the Register at the District Land Office.

These lands can also be located with land warrants issued under the Act of Congress of March 3, 1855, and previous acts, giving public land as a bounty for military services rendered prior to the passage of the acts in former wars of the republic. The bounties given by law for military services in the late civil war were not given in *land*, but in *money*.

Agricultural College scrip and land warrants can be used in locating lands at "private entry," but when so used are only applicable to lands not mineral, which may be subject to private entry at \$1.25 per acre, and are restricted to a technical "quarter-section"—that is, land embraced by the quarter-section lines indicated on the official plats of survey; or they may be located on a *part* of a quarter-section, where such part is taken as in full for a quarter; but they cannot be applied to different subdivisions to make an area equivalent to a quarter-section. The manner of proceeding to acquire title with Agricultural College scrip is the same as in cash and warrant cases, the fees to be paid being the same as on warrants. The location of this scrip at private entry is restricted to *three* sections in *each township* of land, and *one million acres* in *any one State*.

It can also be used in payment of pre-emption claims in the same manner and under the same rules and regulations as govern the application to pre-emptions of military land warrants; this, too, without regard to the quantity located in a township or State.

In payment for homesteads commuted under Section 2301 of the Revised Statutes, this scrip is also available. The fees required to be paid to both the Register and Receiver of the land district when lands are located with land warrants is fifty cents to each for the first forty acres and fifty cents each additional for each twenty acres added.

CIRCULAR INSTRUCTIONS TO REGISTERS AND RECEIVERS.

RESIDENCE OF APPLICANT.

1. The applicant *must* in *every case* state in his application his place of *actual residence*, and the *post-office address* to which notices of contest or other proceedings relative to his entry shall be sent.

SECOND FILINGS AND ENTRIES.

2. A party making a legal filing or entry under any one of the foregoing acts exhausts his right under that act and cannot thereafter make another filing or entry under said act.

ALTERATIONS IN APPLICATIONS.

3. Applications to amend filings or entries should be filed with the Register and Receiver and be by them transmitted for the consideration of this office. Registers and Receivers will not change an entry or filing so as to describe another tract or change a date after the same has been recorded.

RELINQUISHMENTS.

4. Entries and filings made for the purpose of holding the land for speculation and the sale of relinquishments are illegal and fraudulent, and every effort in the power of the Government will be exerted to prevent such frauds and to detect and punish the perpetrators.

5. The first section of the Act of May 14, 1880, provides that when a pre-emption, homestead, or timber-culture claimant shall file a written relinquishment of his claim in the Land Office, the land covered by such claim shall be held as open to settlement and entry without further action on the part of the Commissioner of the General Land Office.

6. This act refers to *bona fide* relinquishments of *bona fide* entries. An entry fraudulent in its inception is not an entry capable of being relinquished. It is an entry to be canceled upon a proper showing of the facts and circumstances of the case, whereupon the land will become subject to proper entry by the first legal applicant.

7. Purchasers of relinquishments of fraudulent filings or entries should understand that they purchase at their own risk, so far as the United States is concerned, and must seek their own remedies under local laws against those who, by imposing such relinquishments upon them, have obtained their money without valuable consideration.

SETTLERS ON UNSURVEYED LANDS.

8. Homestead and pre-emption settlers on unsurveyed lands are allowed three months after the filing of the township plat of survey within which to put their claims on record. Accordingly no party will be permitted to make *final proof* in any case until after the expiration of said three months.

THE HOMESTEAD LAWS.

9. Homestead entries can be made for not more than one quarter-section, or 160 acres of land.

10. The Land Office fees and commissions, *payable when application is made*, are as follows:—

11. When a person desires to enter a tract of land upon which he has *not established a residence and made improvements*, he must appear personally at the District Land Office and present his application, and must make the required affidavits before the Register and Receiver.

12. He must then establish his actual residence (in a house) upon the land within six months from date of entry, and must reside upon the land continuously for the period prescribed by law.

13. In the case of a single person, the actual residence must be established within the same time, and must be continuously and actually maintained for the same period.

14. The homestead affidavit can be made before the clerk of the county court only in cases where the family of the applicant, or some member thereof, is *actually residing* on the land which he desires to enter, and on which he has made *bona fide* improvement and settlement, and when he is prevented by reason of distance, bodily infirmity, or other good cause, from personal attendance at the District Land Office.

15. In such cases the applicant must state in a supplemental affidavit the facts of such settlement, improvement and residence; what acts of settlement have been performed, and when made; the nature, extent and value of improvements; what member or members of his family are residing on the land, and the length of time such residence has been maintained, and the cause, specifically, why the applicant cannot appear at the local office.

16. A false oath taken before a clerk of a court is perjury, the same as if taken before the Register or Receiver.

17. The period of actual inhabitancy, improvement and cultivation required under the homestead law is five years.

18. In case of the death of the homestead party, before making final proof, the widow succeeds to the homestead right.

19. In case of the death of both father and mother, the right and fee inure to the minor children, if any.

20. A homestead right cannot be devised away from the widow or minor children.

GOVERNMENT LANDS—CONTINUED.

SOLDIERS' HOMESTEADS.

21. A Union soldier or sailor of the late war is entitled to a deduction from the five years of the length of time (not exceeding four years) of his military service. But the soldier (or his widow, as the case may be) must actually reside on the land at least one year before final proof can be made.

22. In case of the death of the soldier, and the death or remarriage of the widow, the minor children of the soldier, by a duly appointed guardian, are entitled to the privileges of the father.

23. Neither the guardian nor the minor children are required to reside upon the land, but the same must be cultivated and improved for the period of time during which the father would have been required to reside upon the tract.

24. The soldier may file a declaratory statement for a tract of land which he intends to enter under the homestead laws. The fee is \$2, except in the Pacific States and Territories, where the fee is \$3.

25. This statement may be filed either personally or by an agent, and the soldier is thereafter allowed six months within which to make his entry and commence his settlement and improvement.

26. The entry can be made only by the soldier in person at the Local Land Office, and he must commence his settlement on the land within six months after the filing, and must continue to reside on the land and cultivate it for such period as, added to his military service, will make five years. But he must actually reside upon the land at least one year, whatever may have been the period of his military service.

27. Entries cannot be made for a soldier by an agent or attorney.

28. After a declaratory statement has once been filed, whether by an agent or otherwise, the soldier cannot file again. His rights are exhausted by the first filing, and if he does not, within six months, make his personal entry at the Land Office and commence his settlement as required by law, he obtains no right to the land.

29. A soldier's homestead declaratory statement for a tract of land does not prevent anybody else from making an entry of the same land, subject to such right as the soldier may acquire by virtue of actual residence on the land and full compliance with law. If the soldier does not establish his residence on the tract as required, the next comer may take the land.

30. Soldiers are not entitled to land, nor to bounty land warrants, for their military service in the late war, nor can title to land be obtained for them by agents or attorneys. All representations to the contrary are false, and soldiers and sailors are warned against imposition by parties who offer to locate land for them, or to sell their rights.

FINAL PROOF.

31. A settler desiring to make final proof must file with the Register of the proper Land Office a written notice, in the prescribed form, of his intention to do so, which notice will be published by the Register in a newspaper to be by him designated as nearest the land, once a week for six weeks, at the applicant's expense.

32. Applicants should commence to make their proofs in sufficient time so that the same may be completed and filed in the local office within the statutory period of seven years from date of entry.

33. The final affidavits and proof should be made before the Register or Receiver, but may be made before the judge, or, in his absence, before the clerk, or a court of record in the county and State, district or Territory, in which the land is situated. If in an unorganized county the proof may be made in a similar manner in any adjacent county in the same State or Territory.

34. When proof is made before the county officers mentioned, the same must be transmitted by the judge or clerk of the court to the Register and Receiver, together with the same fees and commissions that the land officers would have been entitled to receive if the proof had been made before them and the testimony reduced to writing by them.

35. The Land Office commissions, payable at time of making final proof, are as follows:—

36. The fees for reducing testimony to writing in making final proof are, in the former States, 15 cents, and in the latter States and Territories, 22½ cents for each 100 words. No other Land Office fees than those stated in this circular are payable or allowable in homestead cases.

COMMUTED HOMESTEADS.

37. Homestead entries can be commuted to cash only after actual inhabitancy of the land by the homestead party, and his improvement and cultivation of it of for a period of not less than six months.

38. A person who commutes a homestead entry cannot move from the tract and settle upon other public land in the same State or Territory as a pre-emptor.

39. Proof of settlement and cultivation for the prescribed period is to be made in the same manner as in pre-emption cases.

40. A person commuting a homestead entry when he has not actually resided upon the land and improved and cultivated it as required by law, forfeits all right to the land and to the purchase-money paid, and in addition thereto renders himself liable to criminal prosecution.

THE PRE-EMPTION LAW.

41. The qualifications required of a pre-emptor are that he (or she) shall be a citizen of the United States (or have declared an intention to become such); over 21 years of age or the head of a family; an actual inhabitant of the tract claimed; and not be the proprietor of 320 acres of land in any State or Territory.

42. A person who has removed from land of his own to reside on public land in the same State or Territory, or who has previously exercised his pre-emption right, is not a qualified pre-emptor.

43. Lands included in any reservation, or within the limits of an incorporated town, or selected as the site of a city or town, or actually settled and occupied for purposes of trade and business and not for agriculture, or on which there are any known salines or minerals, are not subject to pre-emption.

44. If the land is surveyed, but has not been "offered," the declaratory statement must be filed within three months from date of settlement. If upon "offered" land, the filing must be made within thirty days.

45. If the land is unsurveyed at the time of settlement, the declaratory statement must be filed within three months after the date of filing the township plat in the local office.

46. Failure to file a declaratory statement within the time prescribed makes the land liable to the claim of an adverse settler who does file notice of his intention at the proper time.

47. The Land Office fee for filing a declaratory statement is \$2, except in the Pacific States and Territories, where the fee is \$3.

48. A pre-emption filing can be made only by an actual settler on the land. A filing without settlement is illegal, and no rights are acquired thereby.

49. The existence of a pre-emption filing on a tract of land does not prevent another filing to be made of the same land, subject to any valid rights acquired by virtue of the former filing and actual settlement, if any.

50. On offered lands proof and payment must be made within twelve months from date of settlement.

51. If the land is unoffered, proof and payments may be made within thirty-three months from date of settlement.

52. A failure to make proof and payment as prescribed by law, renders the land subject to appropriation by the first legal applicant.

53. The requirements of actual inhabitancy and improvement must be observed as strictly under the Pre-emption Law as under the Homestead Law.

54. Failure to inhabit and improve the land in good faith, as required by law, renders the claim subject to contest and the entry to investigation and cancellation.

55. Final proof in pre-emption cases must be made to the satisfaction of the Register and Receiver, whose decision, as in other cases, is subject to examination and review by this office.

56. Publication of notice to make proof is required as in homestead cases.

57. The final affidavit must be made before the Register or Receiver, or before the clerk of a court of record in the county and State or Territory where the land is situated. If in an unorganized county, the proof may be made in a similar manner in any adjacent county in the same State or Territory.

58. The pre-emptor is required to make oath that he has not previously exercised his pre-emption right; that he is not the owner of 320 acres of land; that he has not settled upon and improved the land to sell the same on speculation, but in good faith to appropriate it to his own exclusive use; that he has not made any contract or agreement, directly or indirectly, in any way or manner, with any person whomsoever, by which the title he may acquire from the United States shall inure in whole or in part to the benefit of any person except himself.

59. Any person swearing falsely forfeits all right to the land and to the purchase-money paid, besides being liable to prosecution under the criminal laws of the United States.

THE TIMBER CULTURE ACT.

60. A timber culture applicant is required to make oath that his entry is made for the cultivation of timber and for his own exclusive use and benefit; that he makes the application in good faith and not for the purpose of speculation, nor directly or indirectly for the use or benefit of any other person or persons whomsoever; and that he intends to hold and cultivate the land and to wholly comply with the provisions of the act.

61. Claimants under the timber culture act will be held to a strict compliance with the terms and conditions of the law.

GOVERNMENT LANDS—CONTINUED.

REVISED STATUTES OF THE UNITED STATES.

62. Not more than one-quarter of any section can be entered under this act.
63. Where 160 acres are taken, at least five acres must be plowed within one year from date of entry. The following, or second year, said five acres must be actually cultivated to crop or otherwise, and another five acres must be plowed. The third year the first five acres must be planted to trees, tree seeds or cuttings, and the second five acres actually cultivated to crop or otherwise. The fourth year the second five acres must be planted to trees, tree seeds or cuttings, making, at the end of the fourth year, ten acres thus planted to trees.
64. Perfect good faith must at all times be shown by claimants. Trees must not only be planted, but they must be protected and cultivated in such manner as to promote their growth.
65. Final proof may be made at the expiration of eight years from date of entry. It must be shown that for the said eight years the trees have been planted, protected and cultivated as aforesaid; that not less than 2,700 trees were planted on each of the ten acres, and that at the time of making proof there are growing at least six hundred and seventy-five (675) living trees to each acre.
66. Where less than one-quarter section of land is entered, the same proportionate amount of plowing, planting and cultivation of trees must be done as required in entries of 160 acres.
67. If the trees, seeds or cuttings are destroyed in any one year they must be replanted. A party will not be released from a continued attempt to promote the actual growth of timber or forest trees. A failure in this respect will subject the entry to cancellation.
68. Only an applicant for the land under the timber culture or homestead laws can institute a contest under the third section of the Act of 1878.
69. Contestants have a preference right of thirty days after cancellation in which to make entry of the land.
70. The Government will at any period, upon proper application to contest, or upon its own information, investigate alleged fraudulent or illegal timber culture entries, or alleged failure to comply with the law after entry, and such entries will be cancelled upon sufficient proof either of illegality or failure to comply with the law.
71. The Land Office fee for an entry of more than eighty acres is \$14; for eighty acres or less, \$9.

CAUTION TO APPLICANTS.

Persons making filings or entries under the homestead, pre-emption or timber culture acts, are cautioned that the laws authorize entries to be made only for the use and benefit of the party making the same, and that entries or filings are not allowed by law to be made for the benefit of others nor for speculation, but all entries must be made in good faith and the requirements of law must be honestly and faithfully complied with.

SEC. 2246. The Register or Receiver is authorized, and it shall be their duty to administer any oath required by law or the instructions of the General Land Office, in connection with the entry or purchase of any tract of the public lands; but he shall not charge or receive, directly or indirectly, any compensation for administering such oath.

SEC. 5392. Every person who, having taken an oath before a competent tribunal, officer or person in any case in which a law of the United States authorizes an oath to be administered, that he will testify, declare, depose or certify truly, or that any written testimony, declaration, deposition or certificate by him subscribed is true, willfully and contrary to such oath states or subscribes any material matter which he does not believe to be true, is guilty of perjury, and shall be punished by a fine of not more than two thousand dollars, and by imprisonment at hard labor not more than five years; and shall, moreover, thereafter be incapable of giving testimony in any court of the United States until such time as the judgment against him is reversed.

SEC. 5393. Every person who procures another to commit any perjury is guilty of subornation of perjury, and punishable as in the preceding section prescribed.

SEC. 5540. If two or more persons conspire either to commit any offense against the United States, or to defraud the United States in any manner or for any purpose, and one or more of such parties do any act to effect the object of the conspiracy, all the parties to such conspiracy shall be liable to a penalty of not less than one thousand dollars and not more than ten thousand dollars, and to imprisonment not more than two years.

SEC. 5479. If any person shall falsely make, alter, forge or counterfeit, or cause or procure to be falsely made, altered, forged, or counterfeited, or willingly aid or assist in the false making, altering, forging or counterfeiting, any bond, bid, proposal, guarantee, security, official bond, *public record, affidavit or other writing* for the purpose of defrauding the United States, or shall utter or publish as true, or cause to be uttered or published as true, any such false, forged, altered or counterfeited bond, bid, proposal, guarantee, security, official bond, public record, affidavit or other writing for the purpose of defrauding the United States, knowing the same to be false, forged, altered or counterfeited, or shall transmit to, or present at, or cause or procure to be transmitted to, or presented at, the office of any officer of the United States, any such false, forged, altered or counterfeit bond, bid, proposal, guarantee, security, official bond, public record, *affidavit or other writing*, knowing the same to be false, forged, altered or counterfeited for the purpose of defrauding the United States, shall be punishable by a fine of not more than one thousand dollars, or by imprisonment at hard labor for not more than ten years, or by both such punishments.
