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Assessor faces fund pinch

Tyler contract payment causes financial woes

Monongalia County Assessor Mark Musick said he was going "back to the drawing board" after a Wednesday work session with the County Commission to

discuss a recurring shortfall in the assessor's valuation fund.

According to West Virginia State Code, the valuation fund was created to cover costs associated with property valuations. Up to two percent of all the taxes the county collects the previous year are placed in the valuation fund.

Kelly Palmer, the county's chief tax deputy, gave some insight into why the valuation fund is coming up short.

"The first year that the assessor's office signed the contract with Tyler Technologies, the contract was for more than what was available to them. So, since the inception of this contract, we have been two months behind. We always are paying May and June out of the next fiscal year, and so that fund will always be two months behind."

Basically, the money that should be in the account to cover those two months was used to

cover last May and June.

Palmer went on to say that the money in the valuation fund went toward covering payroll in the assessor's office, as well as payments to Tyler Technologies.

Musick asked the commission to consider supplementing the assessor's budget by \$123,500, or \$61,750 for each month — May and June — in order to end the cycle. The new fiscal year begins July 1.

He wouldn't mind smoking nets on an NBA team somewhere. He's already cultivating a pretty consistent 3-point shot to get him there.

"I'm kind of tough with that," Jason said.

Trouble is, he's also kind of short.

"I can't dunk," the 11-year-old deadpans, before breaking into a grin.

But, he's got a fallback, which notches him above all the pro athletes out there who don't.

Jason can't go vertical over the rim, but he can jump columns of numbers — just like a LeBron James alley-oop. He's a math whiz.

And guys who know num-

5 dead, 5 injured after Calif. shooting rampage

Gunman's wrath lasted just more than 10 minutes

SANTA MONICA, Calif. — The gunman, dressed all in black and carrying a semi-automatic rifle, walked calmly through the Santa Monica College campus after killing his father and brother at their home and another man near the school, authorities said. He would kill a woman outside the library moments later, before dying from police gunfire.

Trena Johnson, a longtime administrative assistant working in the dean's office, heard gunfire and looked out the window around noon Friday. Students were jumping out of windows of nearby buildings to get away. A man in black with a "very large gun" shot a woman in the head outside the library.

"When I saw her shot in the head and she fell to the ground, we ran out the back door," Johnson said. "I haven't been able to stop shaking."

Before the rampage was over, five people, including the gunman, were killed and five more were wounded, police said.

The violence, which lasted a little more than 10 minutes, started about a mile away when the gunman began shooting at a house, and it caught on fire. Two bodies were later found inside, police Chief Jacqueline Seabrooks said.

Two officials said the killings began as a domestic violence incident, and the victims in the home were the gunman's father and brother. The officials spoke on condition of anonymity, because they were not authorized to publicly discuss the case.

As flames rose from the house, the man, wearing what appeared to be a ballistic jacket, carjacked a woman at gunpoint and directed her to drive to the college campus, having her stop so he could shoot along the way, police said.

He wounded one woman in a car who was in critical condition late Friday. He fired on a city bus where three women were left with minor injuries. One had shrapnel-type injuries and the two others had injuries not related to gunfire. They were treated at a hospital and released.

The gunman also fired on police cars, bystanders and pedestrians, police said.

From there, the chaos shifted to Santa Monica College, a two-year school with about 34,000 students located among homes and strip malls more than a mile inland from the city's famous pier, promenade and expansive, sandy beaches.

Colenda to lead United

WVUH falls under system's purview

Christopher Colenda, WVU's Health Sciences Chancellor, has been chosen as the next head of

WV United Health System — the state's largest healthcare provider, which includes WVU Hospitals, United Hospital Center in Clarksburg and Camden-Clark Medical Center in Parkersburg.

Colenda takes over Jan. 1, 2014 as President and CEO for the retiring Tom Jones.

WVU will launch a search for a new Health Sciences Chancellor as a result of the hire.

"United Health Care has a tremendous opportunity to make a difference in the lives of West Virginians," Colenda said in a Saturday interview with *The Dominion Post*.

WV United Health System was created in 1996 and includes several hospitals across the state, including Ruby Memorial Hospital. Colenda said he was very grateful the system's board selected him to lead the organization.

At first, Colenda said, he was

While nurses rushed out and her children looked on, Jones delivered her baby in the family's minivan Thursday — just feet from the front door of Northwestern's Prentice Women's Hospital in downtown Chicago.

A doctor leaving work assisted with the front-seat delivery, calling out for gloves and blankets.

"All I could do was hold onto the dashboard and the side of the car" and push, said 30-year-old Jones of Calumet City.

Funding cuts hurt nonprofit

The Morgantown Area Youth Services Project (MAYSP) has provided counseling to at-risk youth in Monongalia County since 1996, but is threatened by budget cuts.

Kids sent to MAYSP are on probation for truancy, drug possession or other offenses.

Founding member Danny Trejo said the annual budget of almost \$200,000, will be cut in half, to about \$100,000 as of July.

Morgantown is not continuing its \$10,000 grant this year, Trejo said.

The Monongalia County School Board is considering eliminating its \$39,000 annual contribution.

These cuts are forcing MAYSP to reduce staff. Now with just four full-time social workers, Trejo said, one will have to be cut if BOE funding is lost.

Staff have taken pay cuts and reduced their

paid hours to continue helping young people.

Man's body found in Cheat river

ROWLESBURG — The body of a Monongalia County man who went missing on the Cheat River early Saturday was recovered by dive teams Sunday afternoon.

Jimmy Taylor, 29, of McKinney Cave Road, had been camping with his brother near the Cheat River early Saturday. His body was recovered at about 1:15 p.m.

Robert Taylor, 27, of Tunnelton, told police he and his brother were in the river early Saturday morning when his brother was swept away by the current.

A Morgantown man accused of swimming across the Monongahela River to evade police is facing three misdemeanor charges.

Thomas Oliver Casella, 29, is charged with fleeing

Emergency responders combed the river for two days after a Granville police officer saw Casella jump into the river early May 26. A helicopter also aided in the search.

Casella told police he ran because he was intoxicated, had marijuana in his pocket and feared he would be arrested.

Terra Alta man charged in death

KINGWOOD — A Terra Alta man accused of murdering his father was indicted by a Preston County

grand jury on Tuesday.

Robert Dale Tasker, 42, has been in Tygart Valley Regional Jail since his arrest in January for shooting William Howard “Butch” Tasker Jr., also of Terra Alta.

Tasker is charged with first-degree murder by firearm, burglary and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

Groundbreaking held for two schools

BRUCETON MILLS — Two new school construction projects kicked off in Preston County on Tuesday, with groundbreaking at Bruceston School and for a new West Preston Middle School at Valley Elementary.

Bruceston School improvements include a new administration entrance, a new cafeteria with a stage that opens to a new gymnasium, the conversion of the existing kitchen/cafeteria area into four new pre-kindergarten classrooms and the installation of a new automatic sprin-

kler system.

The West-Valley project will accommodate 722 students in grades pre-kindergarten-eighth. It will more than double the size of the existing 50,000-square-foot school.

Scotts Run PSD takeover OK'd

Morgantown Utility Board's acquisition of the Scotts Run Public Service District gained approval from the Monongalia County Commission on Wednesday.

Action was delayed until this week to clarify where Scotts Run PSD board member John Morris lived.

Assistant Prosecutor Phil Magro, who advises the commission, was asked to review the issue.

Commissioners Bill Bartolo and Eldon Callen said they were satisfied with his findings that Morris is serving legitimately.

The acquisition now goes to the state Public Service Commission (PSC), for its action.

Operator in Philadelphia collapse deaths turns self in

PHILADELPHIA — A heavy equipment operator with a lengthy rap sheet who is accused of being high on marijuana when a downtown building collapsed onto a thrift store, killing six people, surrendered Saturday to face charges in the deaths, police said.

Sean Benschop faces six counts of involuntary manslaughter, 13 counts of recklessly endangering another person and one count of risking a catastrophe. A warrant had been issued for his arrest and police had been searching for him.

Authorities believe the 42-year-old Benschop had been using an excavator Wednesday when the remains of the four-story building gave way and toppled onto an attached

Salvation Army thrift store, killing two employees and four customers and injuring 13 others.

Deputy Mayor Everett Gillison said a toxicology report showed evidence that Benschop was high on marijuana. That finding, combined with witness statements and evidence from the scene, led to the decision Friday to raid his North Philadelphia home and later seek an arrest warrant, he said.

Benschop didn't return phone messages left by The Associated Press at numbers listed in his name.

Benschop, who also goes by the name Kary Roberts, has been arrested at least 11 times since 1994 on charges ranging from drugs to theft to weapons possession, according to court records.

“Being this is my first go-round, I would like to reconcile my account there and start fresh,” Musick said. “We’re trying to redo the record here. That’s what we’re trying to do is get into July and start fresh and move forward.”

Former assessor Rodney Pyles contracted with independent consulting firm Tyler Technologies in 2010 for \$1 million for county-wide reappraisals, according to *The Dominion Post* archives.

The 2010 reappraisals resulted in a backlash, as many property owners balked at valuations far beyond previous assessments. One extreme example saw a parcel of land increase in assessed value by 5,400 percent.

The process ended in the County Commission sitting as a Board of Equalization and Review to try to

resolve a long list of disputed assessments.

It was during that time, according to Commission President Eldon Callen, that these irregularities began to surface.

“This should have never happened in the first place. This is outrageous that this has happened and it took the reappraisals and everything blowing up to find out what the heck was going on,” Callen said.

Even though the commissioners did acknowledge that none of these issues occurred under Musick’s watch, they did not seem inclined to grant the request for additional money unless the assessor’s office was willing to repay it.

“I’ll tell you what I can see as a feasible solution. We go ahead and give you the money to get you through June, but you give it back to us in next year’s budget,” said Commissioner Bill Bartolo.

Bartolo went on to say

that he didn’t agree with the commission’s decision in the past to provide money to cover the shortfall and bristled when Musick referred to it as a “standard that has already been established.”

“There was reckless disregard for the taxpayer’s dollars in the past. Not an established acceptable practice,” Bartolo said, adding that “it’s not the amount as much as it is the procedure. You disassemble the integrity of the valuation fund when you supplement that with other than what the legislature has directed to go into that fund.”

Before leaving office, Pyles signed a second contract with Tyler Technologies for \$500,000 annually to keep property values updated. He said the contract held a termination clause that would allow the incoming assessor to opt out of the deal. Tyler Technologies is still working with

the assessor’s office.

“I know it’s your discretion to contract out. I have no problem with your discretion to contract out. But if contracting out for services impacts your budget, then I have trouble giving additional funds to contract out,” said Bartolo.

Musick explained that hiring and training employees to take over for Tyler Technologies would not be substantially cheaper.

“If you look at replenishing what you have with staff, your’re probably paying, maybe not quite the same, but not far off. You’ve got to replenish your staff.”

Musick said he would need to sit down and go through everything again. He said he would “look at some of my options and present them back” to the commission.

Pyles did not return calls to his home in time for this report.

surprised that they selected him, but became more and more excited as the negotiations progressed.

The move not only shows a vote in confidence in him, but also in the great collaboration he has had with Jones, Colenda said.

They felt it was important to make the announcement six months before he takes over, Colenda said. That will allow time for him to help refine the system’s strategic plan and to have a clean handoff. Colenda said he will continue to serve as chancellor and joked that he will be chancellor until he isn’t.

Colenda joined WVU in 2009 after serving as Dean of the College of Medicine

at Texas A&M Health Science Center. He has also worked at Michigan State, Wake Forest and the Medical College of Virginia or Virginia Commonwealth University.

During the past few days, Colenda said he has been making calls to university health sciences administrators — and others outside the operation — to alert them to the change. United is based out of Fairmont and Colenda said there are no plans to change locations.

WVU President Jim Clements also serves as board chair for WV United Health System. He said the nominating committee and executive committee were unanimous in their decision to hire Colenda. He added there is a national

push to go with medical doctors in these types of CEO positions.

“I think he is very highly qualified based on his background,” Clements said.

Outgoing President and CEO Jones said he didn’t play much of a role in the selection, only offering advice when the board asked. He called the hire excellent and said Colenda has experience serving on the board.

“I think the board made an outstanding selection,” Jones said.

Colenda’s background, which includes serving as the head of a health maintenance organization, makes him qualified and shows he knows how to improve care while lowering cost, Jones said. He added that Colenda has a vision,

works well with others and listens.

During the transition, a major part of the work will be introducing Colenda to people who work with the system, such as legal staff, lobbyists and regulatory people, Jones said.

Colenda said that each of the Untied System’s hospitals have a positive relationship with their communities.

“They’re extremely well run,” the 61-year-old said.

The goal is to build on that relationship between the community, the community health care providers, the hospitals and the academic side, to provide the first rate, top quality care, Colenda said.

The biggest challenge facing the Untied System is health care reform, which

goes beyond the Affordable Care Act, or “Obamacare,” Colenda said.

“It’s about coordination on services and providing access at the right place and right time,” Colenda said.

As he leaves the Chancellor position, Colenda said there are four major highlights from his time at WVU. The first is the creation of a joint operating agreement between the clinical practice arm of WVU’s medical faculty and WVU Hospitals to create WVU Healthcare.

Another is the creation of the School of Public Health, which held its first commencement ceremonies this year, Colenda said. The third is the creation of the West Virginia Clinical and Translational Science Institute, which is

funded by a \$19.6 million grant from the National Institutes of Health and money from other sources.

The final part is working with the general university to bring health sciences more into the fold, which Colenda said he feels will be his sustained legacy.

“We really have become one university,” Colenda said.

There are no details yet on the search committee for the chancellor position, Clements said. But, he said WVU will find another strong candidate to lead health sciences, and there was a good pool of candidates when Colenda was selected.

“Chris was my first big hire,” Clements said. “He’s done so many good things.”

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Plant closures show industry's struggles

LOS ANGELES — The decision to close California's San Onofre nuclear plant is the latest setback for an industry that seemed poised for growth not long ago.

In Wisconsin, a utility shuttered its plant last month after it couldn't find a buyer. In Florida — and now California — utilities decided it was cheaper to close plants rather than spend big money fixing them and risk the uncertainty of safety reviews.

Meanwhile, the low cost of natural gas is discouraging utilities from spending billions of dollars and lots of time to build nuclear reactors.

New technology allows drillers to extract more gas within the U.S., increasing the supply and pushing down prices. In states where utilities operate as monop-

olies, they are reluctant to ask their regulators for permission to build enormously expensive nuclear plants — or even fix old ones — when it so cheap to build gas-fired plants.

In places where utilities sell power into the open market, the low prices don't offset the financial risk of building expensive and time-consuming nuclear plants.

Autopsy set for body that may be Iowa girl

BOONE, Iowa — Authorities planned to conduct an autopsy Saturday on a body found in a river that is believed to be that of a 15-year-old girl who was abducted more than two weeks ago.

Investigators are confident that the body a fisherman found Friday night in the Des Moines River near Boone is that of Kathlynn Shepard, who was abducted in Dayton, about 20 miles north of Boone, on May 20 along with a 12-year-old girl who later escaped and called 911.

The clothes on the body matched what Kathlynn was wearing the day she was taken, and authorities also found zip ties that matched those used to restrain the younger girl who escaped.

Free gun initiative begins in Houston

HOUSTON — Houston resident Cheryl Strain's inexperience with guns was apparent as she struggled to load shells into a 20-gauge shotgun.

Over the piercing blasts of gunfire in the shooting range, Strain's instructor, Dan Blackford, patiently directed her on how to use her thumb to shove a shell all the way inside the barrel and feel it click.

"Now we got a round in the chamber ready to go," Blackford said as he positioned her body on the right way to hold the shotgun. "Look down your sight, put that BB right in the middle of your target and press the trigger."

Strain's northwest Houston community of Oak Forest is the first neighborhood in the country being trained and equipped by the Armed Citizen Project,

a Houston nonprofit that is giving away free shotguns to single women and residents of neighborhoods with high crime rates.

FBI: Wife tried to frame husband

TEXARKANA, Texas — Shannon Richardson had been married to her husband less than two years when she went to authorities and told them her suspicions: He was the one who had mailed ricin-laced letters to President Barack Obama and New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg threatening violence against gun-control advocates.

When investigators looked closer, they reached a different conclusion: It was the 35-year-old pregnant actress who had sent the letters, and she tried to frame her estranged husband in a bizarre case of marital conflict crossing with bioterrorism.

Especially the ones with engineering in the blueprints.

Before, Jason was having trouble finding his way.

Steve is a former police officer who made detective working the gang unit in Atlanta. He knows too well what could happen to the drowning-on-dry-land kids.

He got used to seeing them, guys not much older than Jason, being carted off in the backs of cruisers or zipped up in body bags.

He worked a few high-profile cases, where he got to stand up next to the police chief and mayor during press conferences.

But he got out before he got cynical ... or shot.

"I'd come home at the end of my shift, and I'd tell my wife, 'I just saw a kid take his last breath.' I loved being a cop, but after a while, you start thinking that there has to be a better way to do this."

Taking it on faith

A musing like that can turn into a mission — especially for a guy who isn't shy about expressing his religious faith.

After lots of praying and reflection, Steve left the force. He and Dawn, and their three children, Abbey, Hunter and Garrett, moved in at Eagle Ranch, a Christian-based home for troubled youth in rural Georgia.

Steve and Dawn became live-in house parents there, and it was at Eagle Ranch where Steve started a new version of "To Protect and Serve."

He set to working with kids who came from the mean streets.

And kids who didn't have fathers (or permanent roofs over their heads).

And kids who came from good homes, but found themselves tracking in the shadows, by way of depression, addiction or just-plain teen angst times 10.

The work was gratifying. So much so, that he heard the calling for more.

He started thinking about the place he was born.

He grew up in Atlanta, but he's a native of the Mountain State, where his family goes back generations.

While he never lost his love for West Virginia, that sense of place wasn't tempered by overly nostalgic, or idealistic, pastoral mountain memories.

He knows that the state is often at the bottom of the quality-of-life measurements that the social scientists use ... and he knows that a kid without something to stand on here can be even more disenfranchised, since the mountains can isolate just as much as they nurture.

The mission grows

So, the family left Eagle Ranch for the place John Denver sang as being "Almost Heaven."

They had the idea of starting their own version of Eagle Ranch.

That rugged, tree-lined tract at the end of the road would be the place here. They had just \$400 left in their bank account when they closed on the property 10 years ago.

Once the land was theirs, they put one foot in front of the other — quick.

The idea was to line up backers and benefactors. A business plan was written. Fundraising commenced. People fell in for the project that the couple wanted debt-free, so it would always be there, with no danger of foreclosure.

Everybody came forth, Finn said.

Everybody. Private donors. Corporations. Big-box stores.

"A lot of good people," Finn said. "A lot of good people."

Finn and family live in a trailer at the end of the road going up the place. Every morning, when he drives up, it's the same thing.

"I just shake my head and say, 'Can you believe it?'"

A day at the ranch

These days, Chestnut Mountain Ranch is the daytime home to eight young men, counting Jason. They spend around eight hours a day there, studying — there's a schedule of classes — playing basketball and going on supervised hikes on the grounds.

Construction is under way on "Joy House," the first of many facilities for the boys so they can become full-time residents.

A not-good alternative

Finn is projecting stays from a year to a year and a half, while residents gain their footing.

On a recent muggy Wednesday, Clay Jarrell, a genial North Carolinian who also moved his wife and kids here from Eagle Ranch, talked a little about the mission while Steve finished up some yard work.

While there is a faith-based component, there's also no preaching, Jarrell said.

Many activities are set up to represent the structure that some of the boys are lacking in their lives away from the ranch.

There are duties and chores to be done, he said, since responsibility garners self-worth and mutual respect.

Meals are at a table in the kitchen, for fellowship and community.

And there's patience.

"Sometimes, I'll have my kids here," the father of two said, "and one of the boys will get in my face and yell, or storm off. I tell my kids that sometimes other kids don't have it very well, and they just have to learn how to deal with things."

"It's not an orphanage," Steve said.

"We're giving these guys a template," Jarrell said.

Mikey likes it. He's a 14-year-old who has been coming to the ranch for more than a year.

He used to get into trouble a lot.

"I was fighting with other kids at my old school," he said. "I love it here."

What does he think he'd be doing if he wasn't spending his days at the end of Ponderosa Ponds Road?

"Honestly, I think I'd be in juvie or foster care."

It doesn't take long for children at Chestnut Mountain Ranch to happily say quickly that they aren't "being sent away because they're in trouble," says Clay Jarrell, who directs counseling services there.

"It's about reaching children and restoring families," Jarrell says of the facility for troubled boys near Morgantown. "And it's not just your son that's coming here. You're coming here, too."

The ranch sits on more than 200 wooded acres at the end of Ponderosa Ponds Road.

While the ranch is faith-based, don't expect a Bible boot camp, he said. Ranch-goers attend classes and learn from a curriculum delivered by credentialed teachers that mirrors that of West Virginia's public school system.

As part of the admissions process, attendees must have undergone testing within the past year by a licensed psychologist, using all the standard measurements of benchmarks, such as the Weschler Intelligence Scale for Children or the Woodcock Johnson Psychoeducational Battery.

Parents or caregivers are part of the process, too, joining in during sit-down interviews with Jarrell.

That's so he and ranch staffers can get an idea about home life and other factors that might be causing a disconnect in school and at home.

"It's not about blame," he said. "We're all in this together."

Students receive individual attention on learning projects and other exercises that make creative use of all that acreage.

"We didn't want to make it seem like a school," Finn said. "The ranch and the grounds are the school."

East German artist Willi Sitte dead at 92

BERLIN — Willi Sitte, one of East Germany's most eminent artists and a key representative of Communism's preferred socialist realism painting style, has died at 92.

The head of the Willi Sitte Foundation, Hans-Hubert Werner, told German news agency dpa that Sitte died on Saturday morning after a long illness.

Sitte's paintings depicted factory workers or farmers as glamorized

ideals of Communist heroes. Among his famous works are voluptuous, often nude women.

He was the president of East Germany's association of visual artists from 1974 to 1988 and also a member of the ruling party's central committee. After the fall of the Berlin Wall in 1989 and Germany's unification, Sitte was seen in a more controversial light because of his closeness to the Communist regime.

Intelligence chief defends Internet spying program

WASHINGTON — Eager to quell a domestic furor over U.S. spying, the nation's top intelligence official stressed Saturday that a previously undisclosed program for tapping into Internet usage is authorized by Congress, falls under strict supervision of a secret court and cannot intentionally target a U.S. citizen. He decried the revelation of that and another intelligence-gathering program as reckless.

For the second time in three days, Director of National Intelligence James Clapper took the rare step of declassifying some details of an intelligence program to respond to media reports about counterter-

rorism techniques employed by the government.

"Disclosing information about the specific methods the government uses to collect communications can obviously give our enemies a 'playbook' of how to avoid detection," he said in a statement.

Clapper said the data collection under the program, first unveiled by the newspapers *The Washington Post* and *The Guardian*, was with the approval of the secret Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act Court and with the knowledge of Internet service providers. He emphasized that the government does not act unilaterally to obtain that data from the servers of those providers.

Obama: U.S., China must develop cyber rules

RANCHO MIRAGE, Calif. — President Barack Obama told Chinese President Xi Jinping on Friday it is critical to reach a "firm understanding" of how they will work together on cybersecurity, a contentious issue between the world powers.

The Chinese leader said China itself had been a victim of cyberattacks and agreed the two countries share concerns about the security issue.

Obama and Xi met for more than two hours at a 200-acre desert resort at the opening of a two-day summit, their first face-to-face talks since the Chinese leader took office in March.

Describing the issue as "uncharted waters," Obama said it is critical that the U.S. and China develop rules for cybersecurity and arrive at a "firm understanding" of how to work together on security issues.

Although Obama said he and the Chinese leader had yet to delve fully into discussions about cybersecurity, he said advances in technology have created a need for clear protocols about what is and isn't acceptable for governments to do.

"They're going to have similar concerns," Obama said of the Chinese.

Pushing back against the notion that the controversy over widespread government surveillance by the U.S. undercut his credibility to take on China over cybersecurity, Obama insisted the two issues were different. He said concerns over hacking and intellectual property theft shouldn't be confused with the separate debate over how governments collect data to combat terrorist threats.

"That's a conversation that I welcome," he said.

China, too, has major concerns about cybersecurity, Xi said, calling new technology a "double-edged sword" that can drive progress but can also cause headaches for governments and their regulators. Although he said China has been victimized by cyberattacks, he did not specify who may have perpetrated him.

Speaking more broadly, Xi said he and Obama believe the two countries can approach each other in a way "that is different from the inevitable confrontation and conflict."

Obama said China's "peaceful rise" is in the interest of the United States.

Putting a positive spin on what has been a troublesome issue between the U.S. and China, Xi said cybersecurity is an area for the two nations to work together pragmatically. He said he was pleased that the U.S. and China have established a working group to discuss cybersecurity and called for the two nations to pay close attention to the issue as they work to resolve it going forward.

He invited the U.S. president to come to China for a similar meeting, pledging to continue talking by phone and exchanging letters with Obama.

Emerging from the first working session of their two-day summit, Obama and Xi avoided direct confrontations but signaled the significance of the issue in their relationship.

Hours earlier, with temperatures surging above 100 degrees, the two leaders walked together under a shaded walkway as they marked the start of their desert meetings. Underlining the desire for an informal summit free of the formalities that mark official state visits, Obama and Xi greeted one another in white shirts and suit coats, but no ties.

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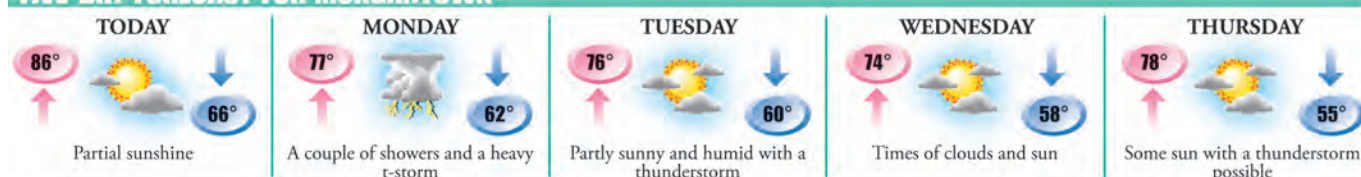
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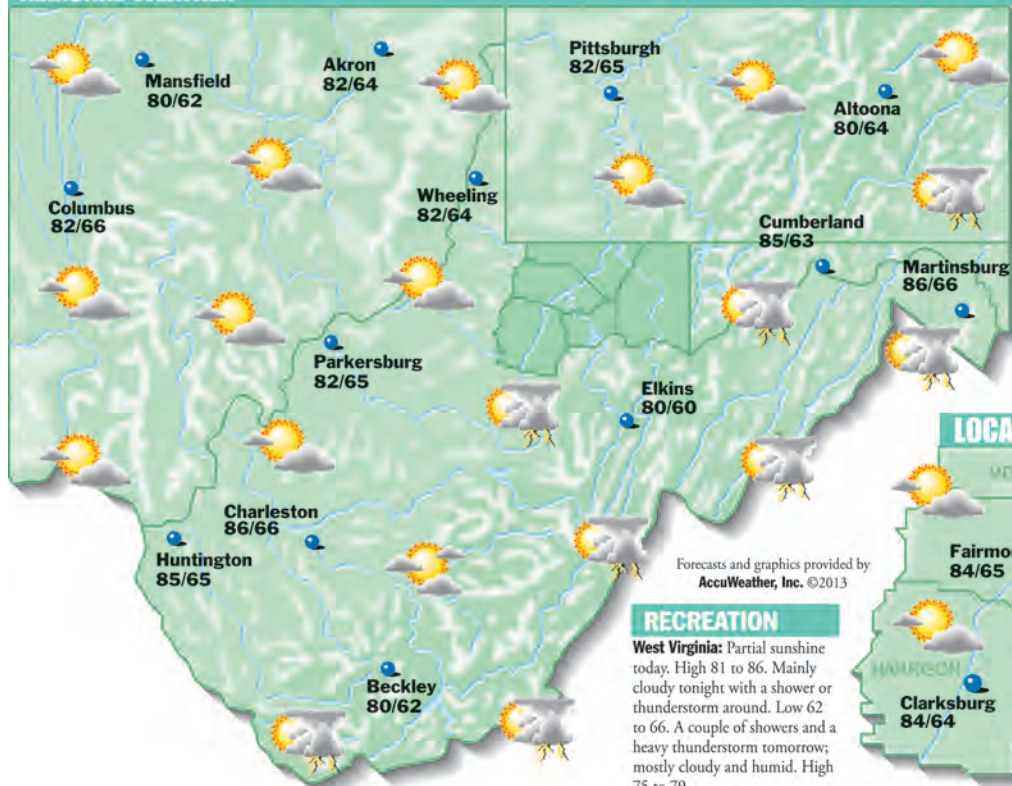

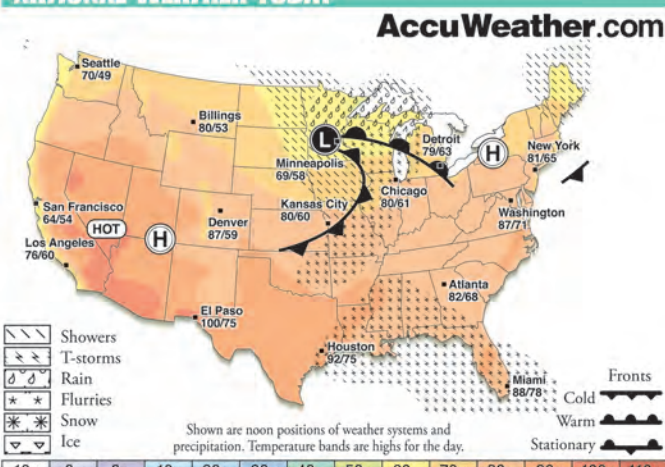

Bloom: District response wrong

Commissioner says rights trump harm to Mon schools

Monongalia County Commissioner Tom Bloom argues that his First Amendment rights outweigh any harm to Monongalia County Schools in his efforts to attend commission meetings.

Last week, Bloom filed a re-

sponse to the school district's answer to his efforts to seek an injunction to prevent Mon Schools from interfering with his efforts to attend meetings and functions. Bloom alleges that the district would not allow him to use flex time or unpaid leaves of absences for half-days to attend the Wednesday meetings.

The district's response to Bloom's motion was grounded on two points: Bloom could not demonstrate he could win the case on merits, and he did not meet the requirements to be awarded an injunction, accord-

ing to Bloom's response. But, Bloom and his attorneys called those contentions "erroneous."

Bloom continued to state that the district previously allowed employees to use flex time to attend non-school business events on school time.

The district claimed Bloom's request was not clearly defined, but Bloom's response says he's been subject to a moving target of directives from Superintendent Frank Devono through Bloom's immediate supervisor, Morgantown high school Principal Robert DeSantis.

The school day ends at 2:30 p.m., and if the district would allow Bloom to take his lunch at the end of the day, he would only have to use one hour of flex time for nine months to attend the 1 p.m. meetings, the response alleges.

Mon Schools also argued that 17 of 55 West Virginia counties hold their commission meetings after 3 p.m., but Bloom stated that means a majority of counties hold theirs in the morning.

Bloom also argued that he

Scouts haven't lost sponsors over change

Gay youth admitted beginning Jan. 1

On May 23, the national council of Boy Scouts announced it had amended its membership requirements to admit gay youth, effective Jan. 1.

But it's too early to tell whether the change will cause local troop organizers, most of them churches, to withdraw from the program.

"We have gotten very little contact from local churches to date," said Mountaineer Area Council BSA acting Executive Dale Holbrook.

"A couple have called with questions or concerns, but as of now, none have officially said they elect to pull their partnership."

The council's website reports Cub and Boy Scout groups are sponsored locally by eight churches and the Brookhaven Volunteer Fire Department.

Sponsors are St. Mary Roman Catholic Church, First Christian Church and the Morgantown Ward, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

The remaining five are United Methodist churches: Suncrest, Westover, Avery Chapel, Cheat Lake and Community.

Mountaineer Area Council covers four North Central West Virginia counties, including Monongalia, Marion and Preston.

Holbrook said more than 1,400 youth are participating in about 100 Cub Scout packs and Boy Scout troops in the council territory.

"In talking with some of the volunteers, about five to six adult volunteers have said they are going to resign" over the new requirement, Holbrook said.

The council has "at least 500 registered volunteers."

Since the new standards don't take effect until Jan. 1, "as the fall goes on, we will know where churches stand better than we do

would not "abandon his duties" to attend the meetings and provided his work time logs to show he works many hours above the 37.5 hours per week normally required.

The response also argues that the district policy contains no restrictive language, which would prevent him from taking unpaid time.

The restriction by the district cause "irreparable harm" to Bloom's First Amendment Rights of speech and association, the suit alleges. Bloom also states that the district has not shown a compelling interest to place restrictions on him.

Bloom added that the right of an elected person seeking a minor accommodation to attend meeting would not adversely affect the district's operation.

today," he said.

"The Catholic Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston has not taken a position as a result of that decision," said Bryan Minor, diocese spokesman.

"If a local parish has taken a position, I am not aware of it. As far as the diocese and the bishop's office, nothing has changed," he added.

"There's been a wonderful relationship between the Boy Scouts in West Virginia and our parishes and local schools," he said. "We wish nothing but the best for the scouts, particularly as they prepare for their jamboree."

Local Methodist ministers have been at the West Virginia United Methodist Conference state meeting in Buckhannon. The issue was not on the agenda.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (LDS) has taken a formal position in support of the National Council, said Richard Waldron, 1st Councilor for the Clarksburg, W.Va., Stake, which has about 13 congregations.

"The church has decided to go ahead and continue supporting the Scouts, and to continue to make the Scouts the activity arm of the church for young men," he said.

The statement, posted on the church website, notes that for the past 100 years, LDS "has enjoyed a strong relationship with Boy

"As in the past, the Church will work with BSA to harmonize what Scouting has to offer with the varying needs of our young men. We trust that BSA will implement and administer the approved policy in an appropriate and effective manner."

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Turkey PM's party rules out early elections

ISTANBUL — Tens of thousands of people thronged Istanbul's Taksim Square Saturday, and thousands more turned out in central Ankara as protests that have presented Turkey's prime minister with the first serious challenge to his leadership entered their second week.

Hours earlier, Prime Minister Recep Tayyip Erdogan's governing party dismissed the protests, which have spread across the country, as an opposition attempt to topple the government, and rejected calls for early elections.

The protests, sparked by outrage over a violent police action to oust an environmental protest in Taksim Square on May 31, quickly spread to 78 cities across the country. Three people have died — two protesters and a policeman — and thousands have been injured so far.

The protests have become a general condemnation of Erdogan, whom

people angered by what they say are Erdogan's increasingly authoritarian ways and his intervention in private lives. They point to attempts to curtail the selling and promotion of alcohol, his comments on how women should dress and statements that each woman should have at least three children.

A devout Muslim who says he is committed to upholding Turkey's secular tradition, Erdogan vehemently rejects charges of autocracy and points out that he enjoyed 50 percent support in the last elections in 2011.

The protests began as a sit-in at Taksim's Gezi Park to prevent a redevelopment project that would replace the park with replica Ottoman barracks and a shopping mall. The mall idea has since been scrapped, with Erdogan recently saying an opera house, theater and possibly a museum would be built instead.

Erdogan said Friday that the protests must end immediately. However, they show no signs of abating.

many consider to have grown authoritarian in his 10 years in power, and accuse of trying to introduce his religious and conservative mores in a country governed by secular laws.

He convened the leadership of his Justice and Development party to discuss the

protests Saturday afternoon.

Speaking after the meeting, party spokesman Huseyin Celik said rumors that the 2015 general elections would be moved forward were "totally baseless, totally unnecessary, made-up and imaginary." Celik also accused the

main opposition party of trying to topple Erdogan through illegitimate means, "having failed seven times to beat (the Justice party) in the ballot boxes."

The head of Turkey's nationalist party, Devlet Bahceli, had called for early elections for Erdogan to

reaffirm his mandate.

"The prime minister's stance and the tumult have deepened the crisis," Bahceli told reporters. "The prime minister's time is up, we believe he has to renew his mandate."

Number of Indians killed in Brazil continues to rise

SAO PAULO — The number of Indians killed in Latin America's biggest country has been rising since 2002, a Brazilian indigenous rights group said Saturday.

The Roman Catholic Church-backed Indigenous Missionary Council said 452 Indians were killed between 2002 and 2010, compared to 167 killed between 1995 and 2002. The council said conflicts between ranchers and Indians who claim their ancestral lands are being occupied to plant crops and raise cattle account for most of the killings.

The council's executive secretary told CBN radio that the increased killings are mostly due to government delays in the demarcation of indigenous territory.

Meanwhile, the head of Funai, Brazil's federal indigenous affairs agency, tendered her resignation on Friday, amid rising Indian-rancher tension in

central-western Brazil.

Funai said in a brief statement posted on its website that Marta Maria do Amaral Azevedo resigned to undergo medical treatment.

Earlier this week, soldiers of the elite National Force were sent to the state of Mato Grosso do Sul, where hundreds of Terena Indians occupied a ranch they say is on ancestral lands.

The Indians were also protesting a proposed constitutional amendment that would reduce the role played by Funai in demarcating land for Indian reservations.

Under the proposal, Congress and other federal agencies such as the government's agricultural research institute would also have a say in the demarcation of indigenous territory.

The amendment is backed by the congressional caucus of rural property owners, which says the present demarcation system reduces their production possibilities.

Candidate vows to reset Iran's foreign ties

TEHRAN, Iran — Iran's former top nuclear negotiator, a candidate in next week's presidential elections, vowed Saturday he will reset the country's economy and reverse President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad's foreign policy stance if elected.

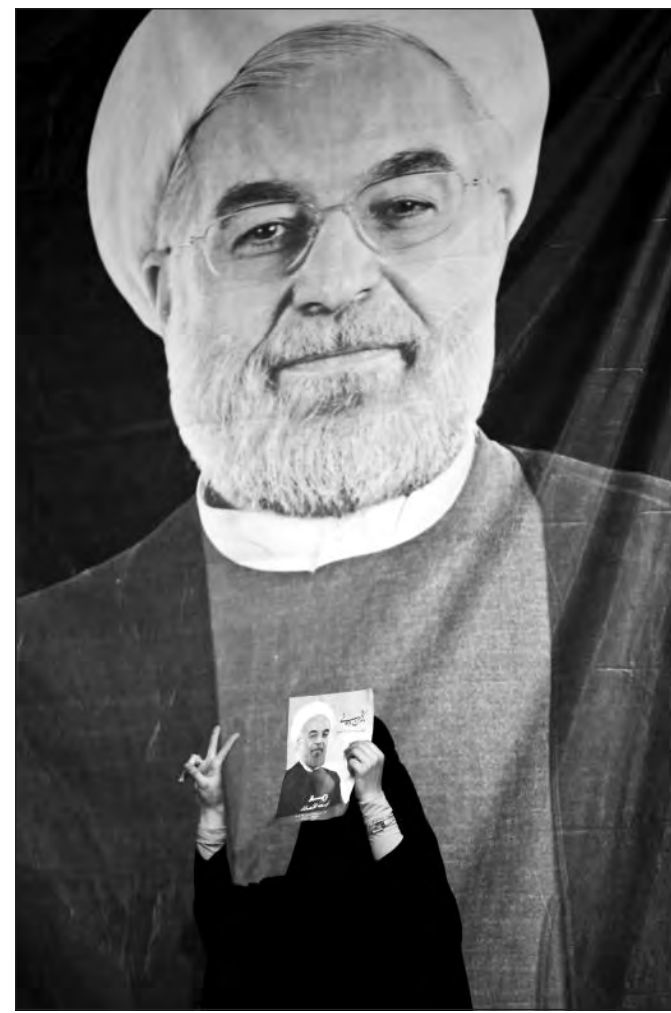
Addressing a campaign rally in Tehran, Hasan Rowhani said his priority in foreign policy would be to "reconcile" with the outside world and distance Iran from Ahmadinejad's combative, hardline style.

Iran's president does not have control of central issues like nuclear policy, but a president who has a close relationship with Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei can wield influence.

Rowhani blamed Ahmadinejad for Iran's ailing economy, saying his mismanagement and hardline policies brought punishing sanctions for Iran.

Rowhani is one of eight candidates approved by the Guardian Council, Iran's election overseers, to run in the June 14 race to pick a successor to Ahmadinejad.

"We won't let the past 8 years be continued. They brought sanctions for the country. Yet, they are proud of it," he told a cheering crowd. "I'll pursue a policy

of reconciliation and peace. We will also reconcile with the world."

Iran is living under U.N. sanctions over its refusal to halt uranium enrichment. The West imposed oil and banking sanctions, deeply cutting Iran's revenues.

Rowhani says Iran should protect its nuclear achievements and work to get sanctions lifted through

constructive interaction with the outside world.

"Despite all the problems, we will break sanctions through people's assistance, unity, national solidarity and consensus among authorities."

Rowhani said one of his top priorities will be to improve Iran's economy.

"My plan is to save the country's economy," he said. Iran's currency, the rial, has lost more than half of its value in the past year. Inflation stands at over 30 percent and unemployment more than 14 percent.

The symbol of Rowhani's campaign is a "key" and his campaign headquarters is nicknamed "Government of Produce and Hope."

"We will unlock all the locks which have been set on the life of people in the past eight years," Rowhani said, while holding a key in his one hand and a purple ribbon in his other hand. His campaign uses purple as its official color.

"I'll restore national dignity and pride to Iranians," he said, prompting some 10,000 supporters to rise to their feet. "To the gentlemen (Ahmadinejad) who brought the country to where it is today, the people don't want you."

Rowhani's main rivals are conservative candidates backed by hardline clerics, including top nuclear negotiator Saeed Jalili, Tehran Mayor Mohammad Bagher Qalibaf and former foreign minister Ali Akbar Velayati.

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Sudan orders oil pipeline closed

KHARTOUM, Sudan — Sudan's official news agency says the country's president has ordered the closure of pipelines exporting South Sudanese oil.

SUNA quoted President Omar al-Bashir as telling a public rally in the capital Khartoum on Saturday that the move was in response to South Sudan's funding of rebels fighting his regime.

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Man may face manslaughter over Paris activist's death

PARIS — Thousands of supporters marched in grief and anger Saturday to honor an anti-fascist activist who died after a brawl with far-right militants, as authorities opened a manslaughter probe against a 20-year-old man suspected of delivering the fatal blow.

France's Socialist government also took a first step toward banning a far right group that the suspect and four alleged accomplices had claimed ties with, according to the Paris prosecutor.

The death of 18-year-old Clement Meric, a student at Paris' prestigious Sciences-Po political science university, has renewed concerns that far-right groups are on the rise in France and across Europe.

However, late Saturday, an investigating judge rejected Molins' effort to pursue a murder investigation, and instead filed preliminary charges against Este-

ban for "deadly blows" — which amounts to violence leading to death without in-

tention to kill, said prosecutors' office spokeswoman Agnes Thibault-Lecuire. If convicted Esteban faces up to 15 years in prison.

A fifth suspect, a 32-year-old woman named Katya, was handed preliminary charges for complicity in group violence, she said.

Molins said the suspects acknowledged links to an ultranationalist group known as "Troisième Voie" — or Third Way, Molins said. None of the suspects had a prior criminal record, though Esteban was known to police for possession of banned weapons in Paris in May 2011, he said.

Militant extreme-right groups have become increasingly visible in France, and the government said after Meric's

death that it wants to ban them.

Extreme-right groups have gained attention in numerous European countries, particularly Greece, where the Golden Dawn party, broadly vilified for alleged Nazi sympathies and violence against immigrants, holds seats in parliament. Last month, the World Jewish Congress said it's greatly concerned about the emergence of what it called neo-Nazi parties in places like Greece, Hungary and Germany.

On Saturday, demonstrators poured into the streets of eastern Paris to honor Meric, chanting "we don't forgive, we don't forget" and marching behind a banner that said he was "forever in our memories, forever in our hearts."

Gunfight leaves 7 dead in Libya's Benghazi

TRIPOLI, Libya — A gunfight between protesters and former rebels aligned with the military in Libya's eastern city of Benghazi left seven people dead on Saturday, a health official said, the latest episode of lawlessness to hit the North African country.

The clashes also left 37 people wounded, according to the doctor in the city's main hospital. A security official said the fighting broke out after protesters stormed a base belonging to Libya Shield, a grouping of pro-government militias tasked to maintain security. The protesters were demanding the militias to give up their weapons and submit to the full authority of Libya's security forces.

Libya is going through a rocky transition after its bloody 2011 civil war. The central government remains weak and has been challenged by powerful militia groups, initially formed of ex-rebels who fought dic-

tator Moammar Gadhafi's forces during the war. Successive governments have relied on them to maintain security, but they have also been blamed for ongoing violence and the government has struggled to enforce its authority over them.

Security remains elusive in the country, still awash with weapons from the war and prone to violent escalations over private and political affairs.

Last week, for example, a personal feud sparked clashes between tribes of African and Arab origins in southern Libya, leaving five people dead. A security official said warring factions fired light weapons and rocket-propelled grenades at each other.

Benghazi was also the site of an attack last September that killed Ambassador Chris Stevens and three other Americans.

Both officials spoke anonymously because they were not authorized to speak to the media.

Dominican official denies report of bird flu outbreak

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic — A Dominican official says Haiti erroneously reported that his country has an outbreak of avian flu when it cited the disease as a reason for imposing a ban this week on the import of Dominican meats, chicken, eggs and other goods.

Dominican Ambassador in Haiti Ruben Silie said in a statement on Friday that there's no evidence of bird flu in the country, which shares the Caribbean island of Hispaniola with Haiti. He added that the World Health Organization declared the Dominican Republic free of bird flu three years ago.

The Dominican Ministry of Agriculture also said that it hadn't received any notification from Haiti on the ban.

Haiti's Ministry of Commerce issued the indefinite

ban on Dominican food imports this week following the death of five people.

Dominican health official Rafael Schiffino said on Tuesday that five people died, including two pregnant women, of swine flu, not avian flu.

Health authorities started this week to administer flu vaccines to pregnant women, senior citizens and children to avoid an epidemic.

Dominican government records show that the Dominican Republic sells 25 million eggs and 8 million chickens a year to Haiti, many of them in markets along the border.

The indefinite ban threatens Dominican businesses, said Manuel Escano, president of the Dominican Association of eggs producers.

If Haiti keep banning the chicken market, "we'll lose 75 million pesos (almost \$2 million)," said Escano.

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5 students earn Kidder Scholarships

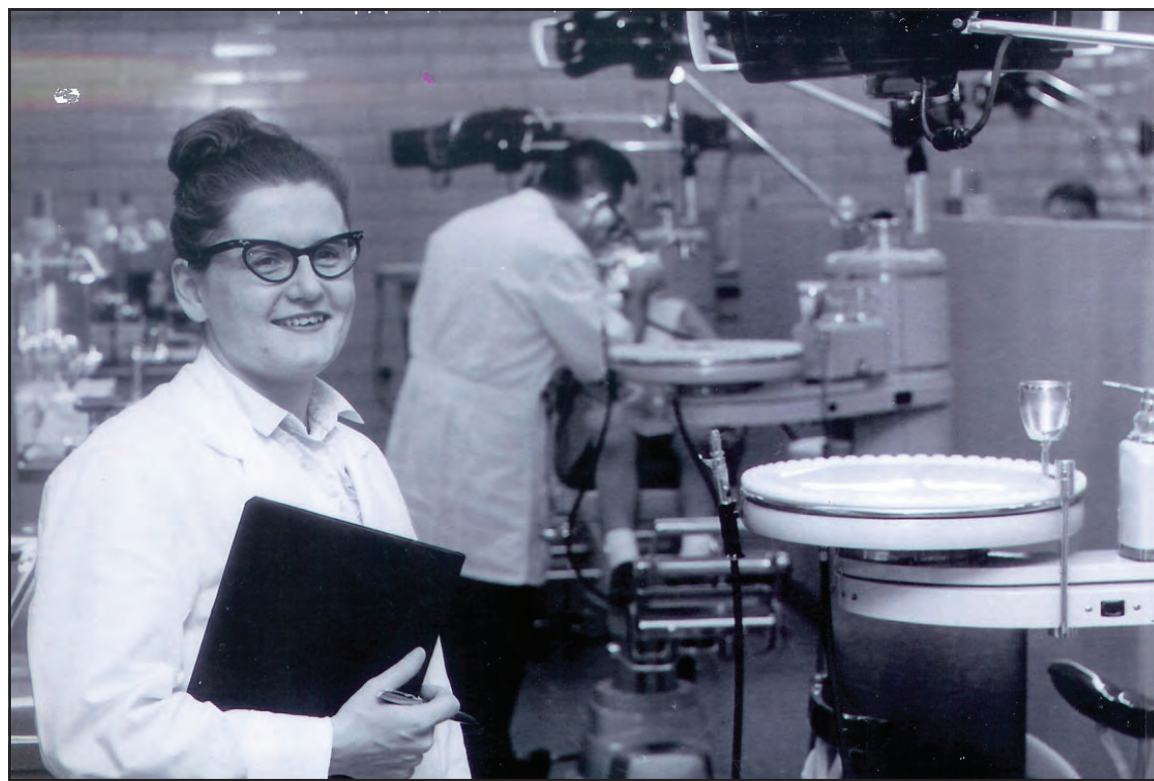

water issues, and the other is about the USS West Virginia, one of the battleships that sunk during the bombing of Pearl Harbor. The USS West Virginia project is a collaborative project with the other students in the class."

In addition to GPS-related courses, the School of Art and Design weaves community and environmentally driven components into much of their programming, including core-curriculum courses, school-wide projects and visiting lectures.

First female dental grad leaves legacy

Positive, confident, soft-spoken, patient. Of all the words the three grown children of WVU School of Dentistry's first female graduate use to describe their late mother,

there's one they agree speaks volumes about her character.

"She was unflappable," said Paul Waitkus, the eldest son of Nancy Waitkus, D.D.S., who was recently remembered by fellow WVU dental school classmates at their 50th class reunion.

Growing up working in her family's rural Webster County 4-H camp, young Nancy learned to use her natural talents early on. She started out working in the camp's kitchen, was later a counselor and took on photography duties as well, taking group shots of the campers to sell as mementos. Her photography business earned college money and helped develop the "can do" spirit with which she was raised. When she came to WVU, the high school valedictorian majored in home economics, a typical course of study for young women in the late 1950s.

"Mom adored her brother John Paul, who was in dental school at the University of Maryland," Paul said. "He said, 'You're bright, good with your hands. You could do this.'"

The senior undergrad completely changed her direction, completing all the necessary prerequisites to enter dental school. Her approach

to her dental school education was similar to the way she took on her camp jobs: she did what she needed to do, with a smile on her face and an easygoing demeanor. As the first and only woman in the program, Nancy would sometimes encounter an unpleasant person who felt she had no business attending dental school, each of whom she would simply ignore.

"She let it roll off her like water off a duck's back," said Mark Waitkus, Nancy's younger son.

Waitkus met her future husband, a WVU engineering student named Alexander Waitkus, when he ended up as a patient in her classmate's student chair. The pair married during Nancy's last semester. She practiced dentistry in Roanoke, Va., until the couple returned to Morgantown, where Alexander attended dental school. As an assistant clinical professor, Nancy taught at WVU for seven years in the late '60s and early '70s. A chair in the school's pediatric clinic was later named in her honor.

Nancy practiced pediatric dentistry in a city clinic in Rochester, N.Y., while her husband continued his dental education. The pair eventually went into private practice near Richmond, Va. Nancy taught at the Medical College of Virginia for 20 years, until 1997.

Mark grew up with his mom caring for his teeth and said he still has a hard time visiting other dentists, due to

his mother's gentle and reassuring nature. Adored by her young patients, she routinely treated children other area dentists deemed too difficult to treat due to mental or physical challenges.

"There was a need for someone like my mom," Mark said. "She was kind of a catch-all for patients other dentists didn't know how to handle. She was this tiny woman who was patient enough to do it and would naturally put people at ease."

Though Nancy was a true trailblazer and role model for girls with dreams of becoming dentists, she never viewed herself as one. Her family is quick to note she was a very humble, unassuming and hardworking person who never set out to make a feminist statement or be treated differently from anyone else.

"My mother was the embodiment of the highest ideals of 4-H: Head, heart, hands and health," Pamela Waitkus explained. "She was a mom, a wife and a dentist. She gave time to the schools and community to promote good oral health. I saw her do all of this and knew I could do anything I wanted to do."

Nancy retired from dentistry in 1998 and passed away in early 2002. Her family has established an annual scholarship in her memory. The award's recipients will be female dentistry students from West Virginia, with preference given to Webster County natives.

Players learned more than just hoops at WVU

CAM THOROUGHMAN WILL NEVER forget his initial meeting with **Bob Huggins**.

It was the spring of 2007, and he was one of eight freshmen who had joined the WVU men's basketball team eight or nine months prior. Gone was **John Beilein** and his intricate offensive system, and in was, well, let Thoroughman finish the story.

"I think I remember (Huggins') words from our first meeting as, 'This might be the hardest thing you've ever done in your whole life,'" he said.

The reaction?
"A lot of hesitation to that, scared almost," continued Thoroughman, who is in town as a celebrity coach for the Bob Huggins Fantasy Camp. "During the season, you're around these guys all the time. For somebody to come in and say those words, it's like, 'Oh, you know what.'"

Some may say Thoroughman and his teammates had no choice but to buy-in that day, but that's not true. There's always a choice. And if you don't think a team can fracture, rather than unite, under the WVU head coach's tough-love approach, well, just think back to this past college basketball season.

We now know the rest of the story. Five of those freshmen (**Wellington Smith, Da'Sean Butler, Jonnie West, Joe Mazzulla** and Thoroughman) fulfilled their eligibility at WVU, which seems remarkable considering the current state of the program. That class was the glue that held the Mountaineers together through the transition and into the 2010 Final Four.

Listening to Thoroughman, it's clear that group of players never felt privileged. They instead spent their careers trying to prove themselves. They wound up falling in love with a coach who pushed them to their potential with a shared blue-collar approach.

"Our mindset is we better show what we're worth," Thoroughman said. "He didn't pick us, he didn't recruit us here, so if we don't show him we're worth something, he'll obviously get the guys he wants."

"I think a lot of us guys were going to do whatever it took to get a 'W' at the end of the day - that's what we cared about. We cared about each other, and if that meant you go set 10 screens and don't shoot the ball the whole game and we get the 'W,' then that's what we're going to do."

They became willing and moving pieces as Huggins put the puzzle together. It's not easy and not always fun, but it has been a rewarding experience for those who have played an entire career for Huggins.

A brotherhood exists among WVU players and Huggins' players, and that's what has made his fantasy camp so popular. Those former players enjoy coming back.

And as Thoroughman, who now works for Marathon Petroleum in Robinson, Ill., dwells on his life experiences, he realizes that his mindset has made all the difference. Logic says he - a 6-foot-6 undersized post-man with bum knees playing in the bruising Big East - had no business logging meaningful minutes on a Final Four team.

Yet, he did what was asked and it somehow worked.

If only Huggins knew how to bottle up that Thoroughman grit and could force incoming players to drink it. His team didn't have it last year, but at least Huggins can relive those days for a weekend.

It was the first time since 2007 WVU has had four or more players taken in the draft.

MOUNT MORRIS, Pa. — It's safe to say winning overall Saturday was a big deal for Team Monster Energy/Kawasaki racer Ryan Villipoto.

In every one of the past five years, the winner of the High Point National at 450cc has gone on to win the overall pro motocross class championship. That includes Villipoto in 2011

leaders' group expected to tee off at about 11:10 a.m.

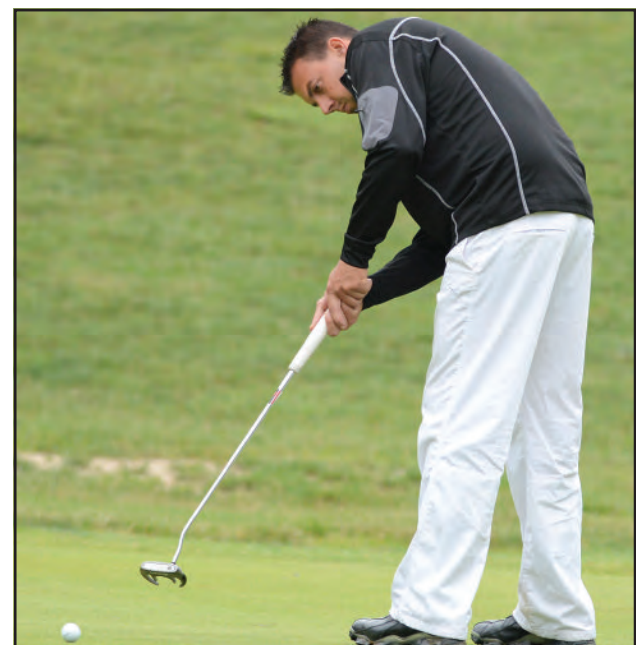

Stewart riding high at Pocono

LONG POND, Pa. — Tony Stewart ducked through a tarp-covered tent in the garage and was off to the No. 14. "Make it two in a row, Tony!" a fan yelled as Stewart hustled through the Pocono Raceway garage.

With a second practice session on tap, Stewart had little time Saturday to dissect why his car is suddenly one of the ones to beat.

But it sure is.

Stewart is coming off his first win of the season at Dover and his second straight top-10 finish, results that have thrust the three-time Cup champion into the No. 1 wild-card spot in the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship.

For an added boost, Stewart was one of the few drivers who participated last month in an open Pocono test in the Gen-6 race car. With practice and qualifying washed out Friday, Stewart and crew chief Steve Addington have additional resources on hand to help master the 2½-mile triangle track.

And there are more reasons to think Stewart can keep the push going at Pocono. His last win here in 2009 was his first as a car owner at Stewart-Haas Racing, and he finished fifth and third at the two Pocono races last season.

No Cup driver has won consecutive races this season, but a confident Stewart has always been a dangerous Stewart. That could be the difference Sunday.

"It's definitely momentum that we need right now," he said. "It's hopefully quieted some of the rumors that were a big drama at the shop for us. So, getting that calmed down was as much of the problem as anything."

Stewart used his post-race news conference at Dover to sternly deny he was ever considering giving Addington the boot because of a slow start that had the team mired around 20th in the points standings. Addington, who took over as Stewart's crew chief last season, appreciated that his boss backed him so publicly. Addington made a late pit call to take two tires at Dover that was one of the defining decisions at Dover.

"It's good to get that hopefully behind us," Stewart said. "Now we can get back to work again and worry about stuff that we should be worrying about."

Like making sure this two-race uptick is the start of a summer surge and not just a brief respite from a mediocre season.

Serena's French drought ends

Tops Sharapova for first Open title since 2002

PARIS — Two hours before her French Open final, Serena Williams practiced on center court, the stands deserted as she whacked one winner after another to the distant sounds of a brass band playing on the plaza.

When the music stopped, the seats filled and the match began, Williams went on defense, relentlessly chasing down one shot after another to defeat familiar foil Maria Sharapova. With a 6-4, 6-4 victory, the No. 1-ranked Williams won her first French Open championship since 2002.

"Eleven years," Williams said in French during the trophy ceremony. "I think it's unbelievable. Now I have 16 Grand Slam titles. It's difficult for me to speak because I'm so excited."

Then the national anthem played for the first American singles champion at Roland Garros since Williams' previous title.

Williams whacked 10 aces, including three in the final game, and the last came on match point at 123 mph — her hardest serve of the day. She then sank to her knees, screamed at the sky and buried her face in the clay.

The victory completed her rebound from a shocking loss to 111th-ranked Virginie Razzano in the first round at the French Open a year ago. Since that defeat she's 74-3, including titles at Wimbledon, the U.S. Open, the London Olympics and the season-ending WTA Championships.

Both finalists swung with their typical aggressiveness from the baseline, but Williams' superior

serve and defense proved the difference. She silently ran side to side whipping groundstrokes with little apparent strain, while Sharapova often found herself lunging after the ball to stay in the point, with each shot accompanied by her familiar shriek.

When Williams once summoned a grunt herself to match Sharapova's volume and pound a winner, the crowd responded with a laugh.

Sharapova completed a career Grand Slam by winning Roland Garros last year, but she's still looking for a breakthrough against Williams, who has won their past 13 meetings since 2004.

"I played a great tournament and I ran into a really tough champion to-

day," Sharapova said.

Lately Williams beats everyone. She extended her career-best winning streak to 31 matches.

At 31, she became the oldest woman to win a major title since Martina Navratilova at Wimbledon in 1990 at age 33. Her 11-year gap between Roland Garros titles is the longest for any woman.

Williams, who has a home in Paris, is already thinking about winning again next year.

"I love Paris," she said. "I spend a lot of time here. I live here. I practice here. I think I am a Parisian."

Williams also congratulated Sharapova during the ceremony.

"She played a beautiful final," Williams said in French. "She's a great

champion. I hope to be with her again next year."

"Merci beaucoup," Sharapova responded with a laugh.

In an all-Spanish final Sunday, Rafael Nadal will try to become the first man to win eight titles at the same Grand Slam event when he plays first-time major finalist David Ferrer.

The women's final, the first between No. 1 and No. 2 at a Grand Slam tournament since 2004, wasn't as close as their rankings. It has been 12 years since the most recent three-set women's title match at Roland Garros.

Playing in hazy, warm weather, the finalists took ferocious swings from the start. With fans perhaps fearful that Williams would win quickly, they began shouting encouragement toward Sharapova after she lost the first two points.

She overcame four break points to hold in the opening game and led 2-0 before Williams began to assert herself. It took Williams 17 minutes to win a game, but then she swept four in a row.

After Sharapova took the next two for 4-all, Williams surged at the end of the set, taking the lead for good by winning eight of the final 10 points.

Sharapova had to dig in again to hold at the start of the second set, fending off five break points, and it was all downhill for her from there. Williams easily held serve all the way to the finish.

She improved to 16-4 in Grand Slam finals. She leads all active women with her 16 major titles and is sixth on the all-time list. Margaret Court holds the record with 24.

Williams improved to 43-2 this year, including 23-0 on clay. Now comes the switch to grass, and she'll be a heavy favorite to win Wimbledon for the sixth time.

Nadal seeks eighth French Open title

Faces Ferrer in all-Spanish final

PARIS — His words catching in his throat, Toni Nadal called it "really a miracle" that his nephew is back in the French Open final.

Seriously? Miraculous? More like expected, given that Rafael Nadal is 58-1 for his career at Roland Garros, a seven-time champion who will become the only man with eight titles at one Grand Slam tournament if he beats David Ferrer in today's all-Spanish final.

Here is what Uncle Toni, who has coached Rafa since age 4, meant: They harbored doubts about whether a return to the top was possible after Nadal was sidelined for about seven months with a left-knee injury.

There were times, the younger Nadal said, when "it was impossible to think that I would be here."

After ousting top-seeded Novak Djokovic 6-4, 3-6, 6-1, 6-7 (3), 9-7 in a taut and terrific semifinal that stretched across more than 4 1/2 hours, the third-seeded Nadal referred to his time away, saying, "When these kind of matches happen, you suffer, but I really enjoy these moments, no? I really enjoy suffering, because what's harder is when I am in Mallorca last year and I had to watch these kind of matches on the TV."

As Nadal began accumulating Grand Slam ti-

ties, the biggest question was how long his body would be able to withstand his always-on-the-move playing style.

Citing bad knees, he decided not to defend his Wimbledon championship in 2009, just weeks after losing to Robin Soderling in the fourth round of the French Open (that remains Nadal's only defeat at his favorite tournament). Nadal's left knee was what held him out of action from last June, when he lost in the second round at Wimbledon, until this February. He missed the London Olympics, the U.S. Open and the Australian Open.

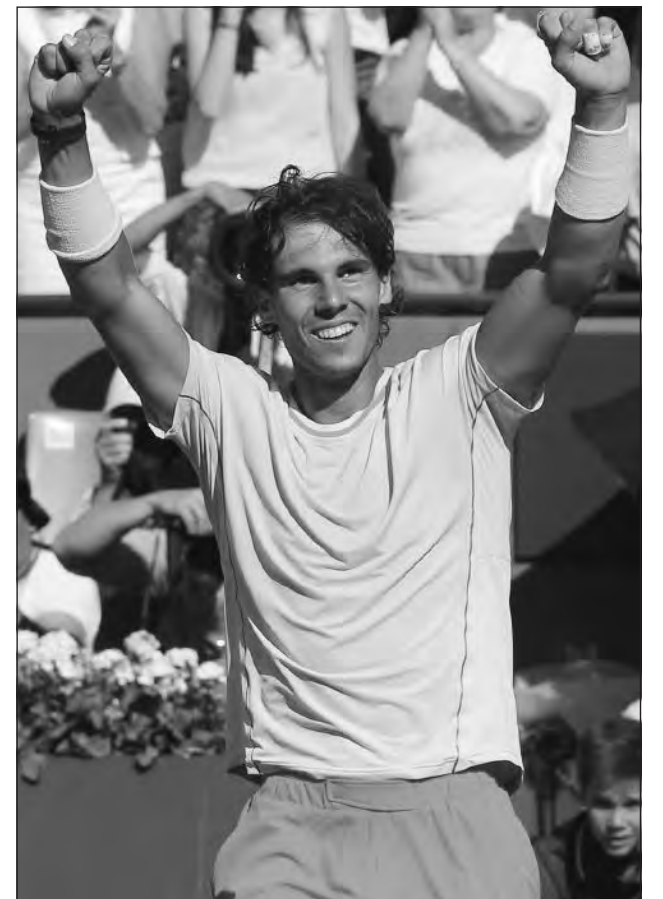
Since returning to the tour, Nadal is 42-2 with six titles, reaching the finals of all nine tournaments he's entered. He's on a 21-match winning streak.

Nadal, who pulled out of next week's grass-court tuneup at Halle, Germany, citing the need for rest ahead of Wimbledon, wears a thick wrap of white tape below his troublesome left knee for each match.

"There are weeks when I feel better, weeks when I feel a bit worse," Nadal said. "Sometimes you're more positive; sometimes you're more negative."

Nothing makes him happier on a tennis court than winning at Roland Garros. And no one has done that more frequently than Nadal.

His victory over Djokovic in an epic filled with lengthy exchanges and moments of real drama was Nadal's 58th in a French Open match.

Penguins enter summer with questions galore

Team fell apart against Boston

PITTSBURGH — Ray Shero left little doubt at the trade deadline, with the Pittsburgh Penguins general manager telling anyone who would listen his team was "all in" for the Stanley Cup after giving stars Sidney Crosby and Evgeni Malkin accomplished sidekicks in Jarome Iginla and Brenden Morrow.

The roster built to book-end the championship the franchise won in 2009 instead went bust against Boston in the Eastern Conference finals.

Four games. Four losses. Two measly goals over nearly 14 periods by the NHL's highest scoring team. Exactly zero seconds when they held a lead. Instead of a ticker tape parade, the Penguins face a summer filled with question marks and soul searching.

"You feel like with the

expectations that we have on ourselves, that the team has for this group, no question you're going to look at

this as a missed opportunity," coach Dan Bylsma said.

One that could lead to

significant changes on the ice and on the bench.

Bylsma insisted before Game 4 that he didn't feel as

though he was coaching for his job. But the sweep by the Bruins — the first time Pittsburgh had gone out so meekly in 34 years — leaves him just 3-4 in postseason series since leading Pittsburgh to the Cup four months after he inherited the job.

Each of the previous three springs, there were reasonable excuses. A mild Cup hangover in 2010. Injuries to Malkin and Crosby in '11. A wild and emotional first-round loss to Philadelphia last spring that played like an anomaly.

Not this time. The Penguins posted the Eastern Conference's best record during a lockout-shortened season and went 8-3 during the opening two rounds against the New York Islanders and Ottawa Senators. They averaged 4.27 goals — the highest mark midway through a postseason in more than 20 years. And they received solid play in net from journeyman Tomas Vokoun, who went 6-1 in his first seven starts

after replacing Marc-Andre Fleury in Game 5 of the Islanders series.

Crosby, Malkin, Iginla and defenseman Kris Letang were among the playoff scoring leaders. They were heavily favored to beat the Bruins, who needed a miracle to escape a first-round upset by Toronto.

It never happened. Not even close. Boston's defense took away the swaths of open ice that allowed Crosby and Malkin to operate. Goaltender Tuukka Rask took away the rest.

Pittsburgh's lowest goal total over a four-game stretch during the regular season was nine. They didn't even manage a quarter of that versus the Bruins. Malkin and Crosby didn't collect a point. Letang was an ugly minus-7 and Vokoun briefly imploded in Game 2.

Two more defeats awaited in Boston. The season and the series fittingly ending with Rask stuffing Malkin one final time.

Burnett, Pirates beat Cubs

CHICAGO — Only the complete game and shutout eluded Pittsburgh Pirates pitcher A.J. Burnett in a stadium where he loves to pitch.

Burnett pitched into the ninth inning and Pedro Alvarez and Russell Martin homered to lead the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 6-2 win over the Chicago Cubs on Saturday.

"You program yourself," Burnett said after coming within two outs of his team's first complete game this season. "You want to finish what you started."

Burnett (4-6) gave up four hits and three walks with five strikeouts in 8 1-3 innings to improve to 5-0 in his career at Wrigley Field. He had a shutout until Alfonso Soriano's two-run home run to left

with one out in the ninth ended a string of 18 straight scoreless innings by Pirates pitchers.

"It was the only ball that hung," Burnett said of the shot by Soriano. "He did with it what you're supposed to do with it. I go back a long way with Soriano. ... I've gotten him a few times, he's gotten me."

"But you know, you can bury that pitch right there and I've buried it."

Burnett held the Cubs hitless until Nate Schierholtz's double down the line in right leading off the fifth. He threw 112 pitches and left after Soriano's home run.

Burnett did not want to come out after allowing a single to Anthony Rizzo before Soriano's home run, and despite a mound conference, manager Clint Hurdle said he had no intention of removing his starter until 115 pitches or some runs scored.

"You've got to give men an opportunity to do certain things no matter where you are or who it is, and he's earned that opportunity," Hurdle said. "There's been many games he's given us everything he's had."

Burnett threw a one-hitter in his last start at Wrigley Field last July 31. He lost the no-hitter in the eighth inning with two outs in that outing.

"It's a good place," Burnett said. "It's a good environment. A day game, too."

"You come to Chicago and Wrigley Field, even as a Marlin I enjoyed coming here a long time ago. So it's fun to get out and play against these guys on their field in their stadium."

Soriano's homer was the 379th of his career, tying him with Orlando Cepeda and Tony Perez for 64th on the all-time list.

once and don't sign a pro contract doesn't preclude from drafting again. A lot has to happen, so we'll see how it goes."

That said, all indications are Musgrave, the reigning Big 12 pitcher of the year, and Carley, who sat out last season after transferring from Air Force, will be back to anchor the Mountaineers' pitching staff. Casas is also expected to enroll at WVU.

"I'd put as close to 100 percent without being rude to Phillies who drafted me," Musgrave said Saturday night, when asked what the chances were that he would return to college.

Musgrave and Carley each have two years of eligibility remaining, and both cited their desires to complete their college de-

Musgrave, of Nutter Fort, said he received calls from a few teams Friday before rounds 3-10 of the draft. He told all inquiring teams of his wishes to return to school, which likely factored into his fall in the draft.

"I spoke with Harrison about two weeks before the season ended," Carley said. "With both of us coming back, it's going to be really hard to take a series from us. We're on the same page with the direction we want to go. I look forward to pitching with him. I think it should be a 1-2 punch with

us. I am excited."

three-putted twice, which you can't do," he said. "Then the back nine is a little tougher and I shot 2-under, which is OK, nothing spectacular. I didn't play my best, but I think I played good enough to be right there to have a chance to win."

Taje, who plays several times a week with Enslén at Duck Hollow Golf Club, in Uniontown, was pleasantly surprised to finish the day just one shot behind his friend.

"He's steady; he doesn't make any mistakes," Taje said. "You have to make all birdies and no bogeys to beat him. This will be the first time I've shot any decent score to actually keep myself with him."

Hole No. 2 was problematic for Taje, as he carded a triple-bogey, but he finished the next seven holes at one-under for a two-over par 38 on the front side. Then he eagled No. 11 by hitting a 3-wood around the corner, then hitting a 60-degree wedge to tap in at about two feet.

"That was a good turnaround and put me at two-under and kept the mo-

mentum going," said Taje, who birdied one more hole to finish the back side at 3-under par 33.

All the golfers agreed putting was the key to success on the relatively short course.

"I putted really well today and that's odd for me," Taje said. "I didn't have a three-put. If I put that well tomorrow and eliminate the mistakes, I can play pretty good."

Ken Roczen said the track suited him very well in the first moto and he took advantage of that taking a first place finish in the 250cc with a four second lead over Marvin Musquin. Despite what seemed to be a hard-fought victory, Roczen wasn't pushing his hardest in the first moto. He said he "was trying to save some energy for the second moto."

The sun came out before the second moto at 450cc. The track dried slightly and seemed more predictable and less extreme for racers who could find those deep lines on the turns.

James Stewart Jr. took a solid lead out the gate and held it until the fifth lap when he took a wide line and hit a pole-marker. According to Stewart this snapped his brake-rotor and locked up his front wheel. He was forced off the track and out of the race.

Villipoto didn't know what was going on with the 2008 class champion at the end of the fifth lap, but he was gaining on Stewart before he pulled off.

"I was making a run down the left side of the straight away, and when I got next to him is when he seemed to kind of let up," Villipoto said. "I didn't really know anything had happened."

It was right before that point when Villipoto served up a taste of what has made him so good this season. He hit the inside of a turn, snuck ahead of Dungey with a chancy pass and began to distance himself from the other top racers just before Stewart ran into trouble.

"I thought it was a good pass," Villipoto said, "close, but clean."

Dungey trailed closely for the next few laps and made a few attempts to gain back control of the race. Villipoto let nothing up, and after 12 laps, pulled comfortably away from Dungey.

Villipoto held on to a solid lead over Dungey through the remaining four laps to secure a second moto win and an overall event victory. Dungey, placing second in both motos, took second overall on the day. Despite the disappointing day, Dungey felt confident moving forward.

"Things are moving in the right direction," Dungey said. "We have to work on some things, but everything is going good."

The second moto at 250cc was a tight contest from the very beginning as Marvin Musquin shot out to an early lead but Ken Roczen remained within a second behind throughout the better part of the race. With two laps to go Musquin distanced himself from the first moto winner and sealed an overall event victory with a (2-1) finish. The overall victory at High Point didn't make any points up for Musquin in the overall class race, but he realizes individual moto wins are going to be the deciding factor for 2013.

"I am winning overalls," Musquin said, "but I have to win some motos to get some points on Roczen and Tomac."

Roczen who finished (1-2), took second overall on the day but will retain the point-lead for the overall class championship. Eli Tomac, a Team GEICO Honda racer, placed third overall on the day with a (3-4) finish and remains in second place overall in the points race.

Roczen says his second motos haven't been the best this season, but he placed

some of the blame for Saturday's second moto loss on racers who fell behind and were lapped by himself and other leaders.

"I was never really in that spot where I could really even try to make a pass," Roczen said. "Sometimes there would be lappers or something that hurt me quite a bit. I think riders really have to get there stuff together because I think the lappers have been pretty bad this year."

In the Women's Motocross Championship, Jessica Patterson took an easy first moto victory and came out on top over second place finisher Sayaka Kaneshiro. After the one-two finish in the second moto, Patterson took the overall event victory in the second round of the WMX championship at High Point.

"I got a kind of bad start today in both motos," Kaneshiro said. "I have to work on that, and I'm going to try that at the next race at Southwick."

At the moment Villipoto remains in the series lead at 450cc with 193 points overall. He has won 7 of the first 8 motos this season and doesn't seem to be slowing down. High Point National is only the fourth event on the circuit, and with 18 motos left it is a very long season.

If these racers can take anything from past years, it's that the round at High Point Raceway in Mount Morris is a crucial stop along the trail to an overall class championship. For Dungey, it doesn't matter though. He already has his sights on the next round and getting back into a groove.

"We have a couple things we could work on and get better at for sure," Dungey said. "Budds Creek will be a good place to get back to after a couple weeks off of working on things."

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Spurs' Green grateful to be in NBA Finals

He traveled long road to league

MIAMI — Danny Green smiled as he stepped behind the interview podium and a crowd of reporters gathered around him to talk about the NBA Finals.

On a San Antonio Spurs team that steps into the spotlight reluctantly, and occasionally petulantly, Green seems only too happy to entertain questions and relay his story.

No one wanted to talk to him in Slovenia. There were rarely demands for interviews when he was playing in Reno or Austin. His phone rarely rang after he was cut first by Cleveland and twice was cast off by these Spurs.

Now that Green has cemented his status as a pivotal role player for San Antonio in the finals, he can be forgiven for enjoying a little bit of the attention that so many of his teammates shun.

"It's been a long journey," Green said. "It's been a roller-coaster ride for me. I'm very happy and blessed to be here and have this opportunity, and I just want to take advantage of it."

Green scored 12 points in San Antonio's Game 1 victory over the Miami Heat, hitting four 3-pointers and taking turns defensively on stars Dwyane Wade and LeBron James.

He is in the first season of a three-year deal that will pay him close to \$12 million and starting for a team that is going for its fifth championship. Not bad for a guy who played 28 games and was cut three times in his first two seasons in the NBA and openly wondered if he had what it took to play in the top basketball league in the world.

"I'm very proud of Danny," Spurs point guard Tony Parker said. "We had him, then we cut him, came back, cut him, came back, and he just showed a lot of toughness mentally. It's not easy to make an NBA team. And Danny is very important in what we do."

After a standout career at North Carolina, Green was picked in the second round by the Cavaliers. He played sparingly in 20 games as a rookie, becoming fast friends with James, who was still one year away from making the jump to Miami.

He was waived by Cleveland before the next season started and picked up by the Spurs. Green lasted less than a week in his first go-around in San Antonio, but was brought back for the final month of the season before the NBA lock-out left him without a team that summer. Green went overseas to play in Slovenia and also labored through NBA Development League stints with Reno before getting another shot with the Spurs.

"Some days you wake up and don't realize where you're at and you go, 'What the hell am I doing here?'" Green said. "That happened in a couple of cities, places. Reno, some places overseas."

Spurs coach Gregg Popovich and Tar Heels coach Roy Williams harped on him constantly to refine his game. He worked tirelessly with Spurs player development specialist Chad Forcier to improve his shooting form. What used to vary wildly from one shot to the next turned into a smoother, more consistent release.

"The business has helped me grow a lot; the organization has helped me grow. My teammates, everybody has played a key part in who I am today," Green said. "I've learned a lot, been a sponge and just continued to take criticism in stride in good positive energy."

James chuckled when asked to compare the Green he saw as a teammate to the one who was drilling 3-pointers to beat him in Game 1 — the implication being that there's really no comparison at all.

"I've seen the talent he had," James said. "He showed the talent when he was in North Carolina. Once he got to Pop, Pop gave him confidence. You get the opportunity, you go out and make the most of it."

James' best doesn't always lead to wins

MIAMI — With six simple words, LeBron James explained the philosophy behind the way he now plays the game.

"I've done more and lost before."

Such was the response to a question presented to him Saturday — one day before he and the Miami Heat take on the San Antonio Spurs and try to even the NBA Finals at a game apiece — about the perception that he needs to be more aggressive at times.

It was almost as though he was waiting for such a query, because he had his answer at the ready.

In short, James has put up awesome numbers in past playoffs but never got the awesome result he sought for nearly a decade until last season, when he and the Heat won a title.

"When I was in Cleveland we played Orlando in the Eastern Conference fi-

nals and I think I averaged 38, 36, or whatever I averaged," James said, referring to the 2009 series where he averaged 38.5 points, 8.3 rebounds and 8 assists. "I guess I should have done more in that series as well. But I can't. ... I do what's best for the team. What's best for the team, it doesn't always result in a win."

Case in point: Orlando won that series in six games.

Case in point again: James had a triple-double, one of the longtime gold standards in defining an outstanding all-around basketball game, in Game 1 of these finals against the Spurs — an 18-point, 18-rebound, 10-assist effort. But it came in a loss in which he took only 16 shots, so the second-guessing was predictable and prevalent.

And on Saturday, James' style of play got defended — not just by those on his side, but also by the guy leading

the other side.

"He's a grown man," Spurs coach Gregg Popovich said.

"He doesn't need any of you to tell him anything. He knows more than all of you put together. He understands the game. If he makes a pass and you all think he should have shot it, or he shoots it and you think he should have made a pass, your opinions mean nothing to him, as they should not mean anything to him."

James will be judged by history when he leaves the game. But for now, he's judged against his own history.

Perhaps the most memorable game of his Miami tenure was Game 6 of last season's Eastern Conference finals at Boston, when he put up a 45-point, 15-rebound effort to simply dominate the Celtics and force a Game 7 — which the Heat won for a trip to the NBA Finals. It's often forgotten

that he scored 45 points in a playoff game at Boston once before, in what was the final game of Cleveland's 2007-08 season.

"The Game 6 in Boston, I mean, that was LeBron James Show," Heat guard Dwyane Wade said.

"We did our job defensively, but we gave him the ball and got ... out of the way. That was the moment, us being able to go into that game and for him to perform the way he did and us being able to dominate the way we did, that was the moment I said, 'Yeah, we're a championship team.'"

Still, Wade was asked, isn't it unfair to expect that level of James in every game?

"Well, yeah," Wade said. "But LeBron can do whatever he wants. He can control the game in any number of ways."

He'll have his chance tonight.

NFL coaching staff sizes know no limits

Join the club.

Not the head coaching fraternity — with only 32 jobs in the NFL, it's one of the most exclusive groups in sports.

Instead, try getting a slot on a pro coaching staff. By opening kickoff in September there will be more than 600 coordinators and assistant coaches, as well as assistants to the coordinators and to the assistants, judging by current rosters.

Including the head coach, Jacksonville and Tampa Bay top the list with 23 underlings. The thinnest coaching crews are in Pittsburgh, with 15 overall, and, perhaps not surprisingly considering Bill Belichick's involvement in nearly everything Patriot, 16 in New England.

"You look at the game, and the way the game has evolved, it has become specialized," says Andy Reid, who moved to the Chiefs after a superb 14-season run in Philadelphia, which like Kansas City has 22 assistants this year.

"You break it down and you have red zone, short yardage, nickel, and then you have all these different personnel groups, and so you try to hire teachers to teach all these things you

want to do."

With no salary cap for coaching staffs, guys like Reid can do just that. He has former Vikings head coach Brad Childress as a "spread game analyst."

Reid's successor in Philadelphia, Chip Kelly,

moved up from coaching the Oregon Ducks. His staff includes a sports science coordinator.

"You really have one, possibly two coaches at a position," Reid explains. "Special teams is big, so you have two coaches there.

Secondary, you have two coaches there; one coach works with the cornerbacks, one coach works with the safeties. They're offering the same voice but doing two different positions. Offensive line you break into halves,

guard-center and tackles, however it works. You're OK there. And on down the line."

Each team has control of the number of assistants on staff, unlike, say, baseball, where MLB rules allow for a manager and seven coach-

es to be dressed for games. The NBA permits the head man and three assistants on the bench — essentially a front row of chairs — and more in a second row. The NHL has no limits.

In major college football, NCAA rules allow nine assistant coaches who can give on-field instruction and recruit.

There is no limit on the number of non-coaching staff members football programs can have, but when it comes to on-field activity, they can only chart statistics.

Stefani leads St. Jude Classic

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Rookie Shawn Stefani overcame a quadruple bogey and shot a 4-under 66 on Saturday to take the third-round lead in the St. Jude Classic.

The 31-year-old Texan blew a two-stroke lead with the quadruple bogey on No. 11, but rebounded with four birdies over his final five holes to move back atop the leaderboard. He had eight birdies to go with that quadruple bogey to reach 12-under 198 at TPC Southwind.

Harris English was a stroke back after a 69, finishing out of the lead for the first time this week.

Scott Stallings, Patrick Reed and Nicholas Thompson were 8 under. Stallings had a 67, Reed shot 64, and Thompson had a 66. Phil Mickelson was another stroke back after a 65.

Thirteen players shot at least 4 under on a day with easier pins on the small, firm greens.

This is just the 16th tour event for Stefani, who earned his way onto the PGA Tour by finishing sixth on the Web.com Tour money list in 2012 in a two-time win season. He did play in the U.S. Open in 2009 at Bethpage but missed the cut there. His best fin-

ish so far came at the Tampa Bay Championship when he tied for seventh in March.

Stefani went off in the final group with English, who had a share of the lead after 18 and had the lead to himself after 36 holes.

English opened strong with two birdies in his first three holes to become the first to get to 12 under here this week. But the 23-year-old English bogeyed Nos. 5 and 8 with his

playing partner getting his third birdie on No. 9 to take the lead to himself.

Stefani hit his approach on the par 4 to 7 feet to set up the birdie, helping him make the turn at 11 under. He then birdied No. 10 rolling in a 12-footer to go to 12 under with a two-stroke lead over English.

Then the rookie ran into trouble on the island green of the par-3 No. 11.

Stefani hit into the water short of the island green on

the par-3 No. 11, took his drop and then hit into the back bunker where he had a buried lie. He managed to get the ball out but didn't clear the slope, so the ball rolled back into the bunker. He pushed an 8-footer past the hole 4 feet before finally salvaging a quadruple bogey.

But Stefani birdied No. 14 and got a big par save on No. 15 after his tee shot rolled into the water near the green. He took a drop,

then chipped in from 49 feet to avoid dropping another stroke and stay within a shot of English with a big smile of relief.

Stefani finished with a 3-footer for birdie on No. 16, a 17-footer for birdie on No. 17 and capped his round with an 8-footer on No. 18 just after English made a 14-footer to move back into the lead for a few moments.

English had plenty of luck himself.

On the par-4 12th, his approach to the green went left and bounced off the top of a grandstand and hit off a woman before rolling into a greenside bunker. English saved par by hitting his shot within a foot of the hole to stay at 10 under.

PITTSFORD, N.Y. — Overcoming rain and a muddy course, Morgan Pressel shot a 2-under 70 on Saturday to take the lead after two rounds of the LPGA Championship.

At 6-under 138, Pressel had a two-shot lead over top-ranked Inbee Park and Chella Choi. Park shot 68, while Choi, the first-round leader, struggled with a 73.

The final two rounds will be squeezed into a 36-hole marathon today at Locust Hill Country Club to determine the winner of the tour's second major. The change in schedule came after nearly five in-

ches of rain fell Thursday, forcing officials to postpone the first round.

Pressel hasn't won since claiming the Kapalua LPGA Classic in 2008. The American is attempting to end a string of eight straight majors won by Asian-born players.

Regions Tradition

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — David Frost birdied the 16th and 17th holes Saturday en route to a 6-under 66 and a one-stroke lead over Fred Couples after the third round of the Regions Tradition.

Frost, the South African who won the Toshiba Classic in March for his fourth Champions Tour title, had four birdies on the final eight holes to move to 12-under 205 in the major championship.

Couples shot a bogey-free 68.

Sixty-one-year-old Morris Hatafsky, third-round leader Duffy Waldorf and Michael Allen were two strokes back. Hatafsky had a 67, Waldorf shot 71 and Allen bogeyed the final hole for a 69.

Two-time defending champion Tom Lehman was five strokes back after a 69.

The final round will have a two-tee morning start because of expected rain.

Will Rutgers' donors return?

School has been through period of turbulence

PISCATAWAY, N.J. — Incoming athletic director Julie Hermann must win over supporters of Rutgers' sports programs after a recent run of embarrassments and controversies made the Scarlet Knights the punch line of late-night shows.

Several backers said over the past two days that while they believe donations to the athletic department might take an initial hit because of the blunders made in the aftermath of the firing of men's basketball coach Mike Rice, they feel boosters will resume contributing.

While still upset about the forced resignation of popular former athletic director Tim Perneti, the Rutgers faithful want to put the controversy behind them and look forward to joining the Big Ten Conference in 2014.

"I absolutely feel all the donors will come back," said Dr. Michael Kerner, a Springfield-based gastroenterologist who attended Rutgers and is a season ticket holder for both football and basketball. "Maybe not all, but the overall majority. No one wants to hurt the teams. People at some point will move on."

Hermann, who spent three days on the Rutgers campus this past week visiting coaches, administrators and Big Ten Commissioner Jim Delany, is keenly aware that fundraising is going to be one of her biggest concerns in the new job. The boosters were firmly entrenched in Perneti's corner.

"When I was awarded the job, I was told that would be a tough challenge and I believe it is going to be a tough challenge," Hermann said Wednesday. "Has it been made harder? No doubt. Am I going to have to work double-time to connect with the people who are passionate about Rutgers? I am."

Hermann had dinner with some big boosters Thursday night and made a good impression by all accounts.

Rutgers grad Dr. Gerald Costa, a surgeon and hospital administrator, believes donations to the school probably will drop in the short term.

"If a company makes a

bad product or toys that Hasbro makes are faulty, what's the bottom line? Stocks drop and income starts drying up. She (Hermann) has to prove herself. I think she will," said Costa, who plans to continue to contribute.

Still, there is work to be done.

Lou DeFalco, an accountant who attended Rutgers and lives in Scotch Plains, was upset with the decision to push Perneti out. He noted that the former AD orchestrated Rutgers' entry

into the Big Ten, sold the naming rights to the stadium and had increased fundraising and was working on plans to expand the Rutgers Athletic Center, the home of the basketball teams.

DeFalco said Perneti followed all the university's protocols in handing the Rice situation and never attempted to "sweep anything under the rug."

"They made a decision and then they rolled up on the wrong people," DeFalco said.

N.C. State rallies past Rice

Schwarber, who also had a two-run homer in the fourth, put Indiana up 7-6 with his hit in the seventh.

Indiana (47-14) can advance to its first College World Series with a win on Sunday. If the Seminoles (47-16) win, a deciding game would be played Monday.

The Hoosiers' big inning came against relievers Gage Smith (4-2) and Billy Strode, who gave up just three hits in the inning but the Seminoles committed two throwing errors.

Mississippi State 11 Virginia 6

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. — Adam Frazier went 6 for 6, Hunter Renfroe was 4 for 5 and they each drove in three runs Saturday to help Mississippi State beat Virginia in the first game of the Charlottesville super regional.

The Bulldogs (47-18) pounded Virginia pitching for 20 hits and benefited from uncharacter-

istic sloppiness by the Cavaliers, who made four errors that led to six unearned runs.

Virginia (50-11) had 11 hits, but also hit into four rally-killing double plays.

Kendall Graveman (7-5) went 5 1-3 innings for the Bulldogs, allowing nine hits and all six runs, just four of them earned.

.22 ammo vital to shooting sports, difficult to make

THE LITTLE .22 CALIBER is the most popular round in the world. It's also the most versatile when it comes to uses. It's used in training, practice, competition, plinking, small-game hunting and even personal defense. No other caliber comes close to matching its versatility. It's the bedrock of the shooting sports.

But this caliber is also the hardest to manufacture. It's the product of technology from the 19th century. Yes, it's been around for a long time. Manufacturers produce these average quality rounds by the millions. I say average quality because of the problems inherent to this bullet. It's a real art and science to load a high quality match round as compared to the ones we see on the shelf, if you can find them nowadays.

The manufacture of these shells is fraught with problems, such as how to get the primer into the rim of the shell. It's a very different process than jamming a primer into a center fire rifle case. The rimfire priming material is a wet primer pellet that includes finely ground glass. The glass is hard on the bore of the gun, but without it, the priming powder will not function. These pellets are inserted by hand. The moisture content of these pellets must be kept within very narrow limits or the process will fail.

Once the pellet is in the bottom of the case, a steel pin is inserted, and the case is spun at about 10,000 rpm for a few seconds. This spreads the priming material out into the rim. The priming material will sometimes leak up the sides of the case, due to the ground glass wearing on the spinner pin. This can hurt the ignition and interior ballistics of the shell.

Another problem manufacturers have in making these shells is finding a suitable powder. The powder must ignite easily, have high energy and have a burn rate that leaves a minimum of unburned propellant. There aren't many powders that meet all of these qualifications.

The next problem encountered by manufacturers is with bullet lubrication. These cartridges require a synthetic-based wax for lubrication. Also, what works one day may not work the next, based upon variations in humidity, temperature, bullet hardness and powder variations. Bullet hardness that is controlled by the amount of antimony added to the lead may cause a lead buildup in the rifle bore, which causes inaccuracy.

As if all of this is not enough, crimping the case around the bullet is also a challenge. If it's too tight, the internal pressures when the powder explodes may be too high. This will cause inaccuracy and leading of the barrel.

Keeping in mind this long list of problems with modern day manufacturing, you must remember that these shells were originally designed for and loaded with black powder. The development of today's smokeless powders have caused many of the ignition and burning characteristics not found with black powder.

And yes, as with most ammo, these little .22 rounds are hard to find nowadays, even though the manufacturers are running at full capacity 24/7. This is because of the panic buying going on today with all types of ammo. Remember, most everyone who owns guns has a .22. And I've heard that the price has risen by up to 70 percent in some places. I can't confirm this for our area, since I haven't purchased any in a few years.

How long will the shortage last? Who knows? The same thing happened four years ago. People feel that they may not be able to buy it, so they get all they can when it's available. And you can't blame the feds for this shortage, because they are not stockpiling .22 ammo like they are some other calibers.

Pa. doctor, guide rescue baby moose from river

MISSOULA, Mont. — A Pennsylvania doctor on a guided fishing trip in southwestern Montana went home with an amazing tale of hauling in a 25-pound lunger — a baby moose she helped rescue from rushing waters.

Karen Sciascia, of Red Hill, Pa., and a guide were fishing the Big Hole River recently when they spotted a cow moose with a calf trying to cross the river.

"We were watching this adult female struggling back and forth, and we didn't see a baby until we got close," Sciascia told the *Missoulian* for a story published Thursday. "Mom kept pushing — the current was pretty swift. The mother bolted and took off across the river. She was trying to get across the main portion of the channel, and even she struggled."

When the calf stepped off the gravel bar into the water to follow its mother, it was swept downstream.

"It was small, and the river was swift," Sciascia said. "We lost sight of the baby. It was hurtling downstream and was being pushed by the river. It was too small to ever fight the current."

Sciascia and guide Seth McLean, with Four Rivers Fishing Co., in Twin Bridges, followed downriver, finally spotting the tiny moose's nose just above the water.

"We got up alongside it, and I just grabbed the little bugger. I scooped it up from the river under its front legs," Sciascia said.

"I tried to hold it out, not wanting to get my scent all over it, but it was basically limp," she said. "It was breathing, and with my hand on its chest, I could feel its heart beating real fast."

McLean rowed the raft upstream and snapped a photo before they dropped off the calf at the side of the river.

The mother had disappeared into the woods but returned to the river after hearing the crying of her young calf. It sounded like a puppy, Sciascia said.

"When we last saw her, we were heading downstream," she said. "The mother was heading toward it. She had come out of

the woods and was heading toward her baby."

Four Rivers Fishing posted the story, titled "Of Moose and Men," on its Facebook page Wednesday.

"It was cool to be in the right place at the right time," Sciascia said.

Must-have fishing gear for canoeists

Many paddlers heading into the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness in the next week or two will eat fish every day. Walleyes, lake trout and northern pike are among primary delicacies available to BWCAW visitors, with smallmouth bass thrown in as an option as needed.

Most canoeists who paddle the area bring too much of everything, fishing gear included. Because I prefer to cross portages as few times as possible, with as little on my back as possible, I pack lightly. But I never shortchange myself in the fishing department.

My must-haves on boundary waters trips include:

- Two rods, both of which are in rod cases, except when

fishing. Preventing breakage is the obvious reason for the cases. But staying organized on portages is as important.

- Two reels, both spooled with new line, with extra spools, also carrying new line. I also carry replacement line.

- Jigs in sizes 1/8 (quantity 6), 1/4 (12), 3/8 (12) and 1/2 (6) colored chartreuse, white and black. And because early season boundary waters fishing often is in fast water, I'll bring along a half-dozen small swivels and attach them 2 feet or so from the jig. This prevents line twisting in fast water and while retrieving; also, Twister Tails and various fake baits such as Gulp! or Trigger X.

- Five of Diamonds spoons, quantity 4, varying sizes, with leaders, for trout trolling.

- Lindy Rigs or other live

bait rigs, with sliding sinkers and spinners. Mostly, I use these with freeze-dried minnows at campsites. Tip: Cast the bait to nearby deep water, allowing it to sit on the bottom. Secure your rod and open the bail of your spinning reel. Wait for a laker to strike and run.

- Chartreuse No. 5 Shad Raps (quantity 4). Vary the size, color and brand to suit your preference, but No. 5s always have produced for me. Paddle slower or faster to vary lure depth. Leaders will help prevent lure loss and facilitate quick lure changing.

- Floating stick or crank baits (perch color) to take smallmouth bass; also, a couple of poppers to take smallies on the surface, and two Fat Rap-style baits.

- A fillet knife.

GO FISH! (W.VA. DNR)

Monongahela River

Large crappie were being caught this past week in the Star City area. Look for them around trees lying in the water. Fishing should be good in the Morgantown tailwater for hybrid striped bass and white bass. The shoreline from the Morgantown lock to the mouth of Deckers Creek is always a good place to fish. This is also a good time for large catfish. Sauger and walleye usually begin feeding at dusk in the tailwaters. Jigs with minnows are always good baits, but 3-inch plastic grubs will also be productive. Boaters should try drifting from the dam to Deckers Creek using jigs and minnows or trolling deep running crank baits.

Cheat Lake

Large pumpkinseed sunfish are abundant on the shoreline opposite Sunset Beach Cove, up to the I-68 bridge. Channel catfish are doing well and 2- to 3-pounders are abundant throughout the lake. Night crawlers on a number 6 hook with a 1/2- to 1-ounce egg sinker cast into 25 to 35 feet of water will catch catfish. The best area for yellow perch is from the Sunset Beach Cove to the I-68 bridge. Walleye are now more abundant from the town of Canyon upstream to the head of the lake. Good walleye stockings in 2010 and 2012 should now be producing 13- to 15-inch fish. The new Ices Ferry fishing and boating access site is also open for bank anglers and launching canoes/car-top boats (no trailers).

Tygart Lake

Eleven fish were tagged in the lake for the Cabela's Fish for Millions contest and three have been caught. Get details at cabelas.com/fishformillions. The lake is at the summer level. Water temperature is 76 degrees at the surface, 76 at 10 feet, 66 at 25 feet, 62 at 50 feet and 60 at 75 feet. Walleye prefer a temperature about 70 degrees. The coves will be warmer than the main lake and the heads of coves are good places to target bass, crappies and sunfish. Bass tournament success has been good. The tailwater temperature is 60 degrees. There are lots of trout and walleye in the tailwater. Walleye fishing is best during higher flows (1,500 to 5,000 cubic feet per second) and trout fishing is best at low flows (less than 1,000 cfs). Call 304-265-5953 for daily lake and tailwater conditions.

Stonewall Jackson

The lake is at summer pool and clear. Fishing is good. As water temperatures warm, fish move to shallow water. Bass are being caught in and around cover. Bluegill and crappie are hitting live bait. Before heading to the lake, call 304-269-7463.

Tale of two budgets?

WVU's outlook doesn't reflect human priorities

So, which is it WVU? Are you going to stop putting dots over "i"s to save ink?

Or fly in a consultant — from Texas, of course, on a private jet — to cross every "t"?

The university's Board of Governors approved a plan last week to cut costs as funding shrinks.

Yet, everybody who's anybody got a gazillion dollar raise lately, and ain't no price high enough to keep WVU away from you or that lot near you.

We did some calculating of our own about WVU's current budget year, and held it up to the coming budget year and were struck by the differences.

Oh sure, we know about the \$13.3 million loss in state funding and the nearly \$5 million cut in federal money that's coming WVU's way.

Yet the university in recent times could budget for:

- Purchasing more than \$70 million worth of property in just the past two years.

- Building everything from parking lots to a complete transformation of the Evansdale campus.

- Anteing up enormous raises for a select few. Clements, Holgorsen, Huggins and Luck certainly got a good deal.

- Providing millions in loans from the university's general fund to the Athletic Department to keep it solvent. Huh?

- Chartering private jets on athletic recruiting excursions.

- Opening facilities that some in the private sector complain compete with them.

- And then there's all those worrisome attorney fees to be paid.

And now we're told there won't be enough money to budget for:

- Freezing tuition hikes for students, already graduating with an average \$20,000 millstone around their neck.

- Or giving overworked staff a raise and continuing to short-change many faculty.

- Filling vacant positions that have already been on hold a while.

- Keeping campus housing affordable to thousands of students.

- Reining in fee increases for graduate students in health sciences.

- Maintaining Printing Services in the Mountainlair and elsewhere.

All right, WVU may be the best bargain among flagship state universities. But in case no one's paying attention our state's residents are not leading any per capita income categories. At least not in this country.

No one doubts these are tough times in academia. They're tough times everywhere, including households, especially every student's household, as well as in Charleston.

Yet, if WVU is going to table raises and increase tuition, its budget should reflect its academic mission and the best interest of students, faculty and staff — to the letter.

Required documents to renew license inane

West Virginia has an inane method to renew drivers' licenses. My daughter had problems. My wife had problems. Now, the problems I face seem insurmountable.

I wrote to the state's Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) protesting this idiocy. I sent a copy of my letter to three elected politicians, who have not replied yet.

I had a birth certificate that was not acceptable as well as my expiring West Virginia driver's license; my Social Security card; my original Selective Service (draft) registration (issued a few days after my 18th birthday); my DD (Discharge from Active Duty) 214 honorable release from active service in the U.S. military; my re-registration as a veteran with Selective Service;

my honorable discharge from service in the U.S. military; an expired U.S. passport with my name and photo on it; my West Virginia voter's registration; a West Virginia tax receipt with my name and address; utility bills with my name and West Virginia address on them; an old driver's license from long ago with my name, photo and vitals on it; my West Virginia EMT license with photo; and other valid documents from several federal, state and local agencies relating to me.

The staff in the local DMV even knows me, personally.

Yet, this was not sufficient to renew my West Vir-

ginia driver's license.

I was told that West Virginia was merely complying with federal legislation from 2005, or thereabouts, that required this exhaustive documentation.

Now, the media has reported that Connecticut has passed legislation that will give driver's licenses to illegal immigrants who have lived in that state for more than 90 days, and who have some type of document to identify them.

Is Connecticut in the same country as West Virginia? I am not an illegal immigrant.

Why am I having this problem? Why won't the elected politicians respond?

A local magistrate was not able to find the code sections, if any, that control this unacceptable method.

Please, curb geese

So, which came first: The park user or the droppings?

Still, I think the first question to ask is, what's wrong with having decorative Canada geese in parks — walking with us on cement walkways or grassy areas where children play and families have picnics? Goose droppings, that's why. Because geese have a rudimentary digestive system, they eat often and expel undigested remains in short order.

When startled, they unload their whole system at once. Adult geese produce one to three pounds of droppings per day. We don't tolerate dog droppings, why do we feed the birds and encourage them? Those who feed them should pick up after them.

In Morgantown, the river trail from McQuain

By the way, they are perfectly capable of finding their own food and, as wild animals, should do so.

Park to the south is thick with goose droppings in areas where the animals can walk up from the river to grassy spots.

Notice the word, "walk." Geese will stay away if they cannot take their young, so a very simple fence along the water (even a few wires strung along at the right height) will keep them away. The grassy area along Hazel Ruby McQuain park behind the bandstand is usually free of geese because of the fencing, however, they sometimes get through when the gate at the north end is left open. This spot, where the land slopes down to the river, is a place where people come to feed the geese. This feeding swells the

population beyond what nature intended.

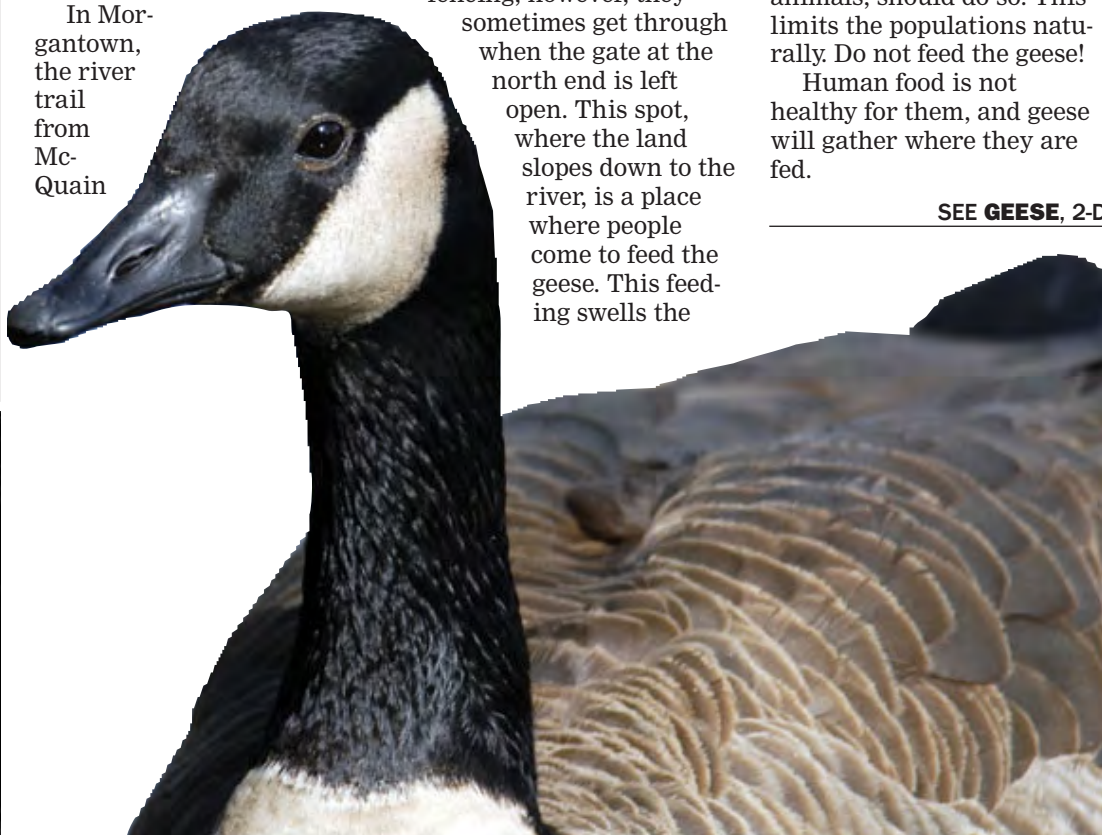
South of Morgantown, the trail is really nasty for walkers and bikers all along the new water treatment plant to Greer. Pounds of two-inch long goose droppings litter the trail, making a slippery slalom course for bikers. The birds don't walk on the wooden bridges, where the trail is gravel or where the riverside is covered with huge rocks, and there is little grass along the sides to eat.

I have seen towns try to keep them away with fiberglass models of "dead" birds. This works for a few days before the geese catch on and then the fakes must be moved. Owl faces and streamers help, but if people feed the animals and there is mowed grass (deep meadow growth and bushes deter them), they will get used to anything.

By the way, they are perfectly capable of finding their own food and, as wild animals, should do so. This limits the populations naturally. Do not feed the geese!

Human food is not healthy for them, and geese will gather where they are fed.

Second try at shield law echoes first

AN IRONY OF TIMING twice has put U.S. Army Pfc. Bradley Manning in the headlines at critical moments in gaining congressional approval of a federal shield law that would protect journalists and their confidential sources.

On Capitol Hill, there's new-found White House support and congressional action behind proposals for the first time to provide legal means in federal courts for journalists to keep secret their confidential sources and unpublished information. President Obama called for passage of federal shield law in the wake of two controversies in May involving Department of Justice moves to seize journalists' data.

A long-standing goal of many journalism organizations for years, an earlier version of a shield law gained U.S. House approval in 2009. But it died the next year in the Senate, in large degree because of the then-breaking controversy surrounding Manning and his leaking of secret military reports and diplomatic cables to the online organization Wikileaks.

Just as this latest attempt at the shield law gathers steam, along comes Manning and Wikileaks again. Just a few miles from the Capitol, in a military courtroom at Ft. Meade, Md., Manning faces court-martial proceedings about the Wikileaks disclosure. Prosecutors say classified information from that unprecedented disclosure then went from Wikileaks to Osama Bin Laden and others, endangered American lives and harmed relations with U.S. allies.

The Manning trial raises anew not only the previous specter of the massive Wikileaks disclosures, but the fear that any source protection in federal courts will make it just that much more difficult to find and prosecute those leaking documents that threaten American lives and the nation's safety.

Such fear will just add to an already complex issue of defining who is covered by the revived "Free Flow of Information Act" — in effect, answering the root question of "Who is a journalist?"

Wikileaks describes itself as "a not-for-profit media organization" that provides "an innovative, secure and anonymous way for sources to leak information to our journalists." That self-definition could not be further from one favored by some members of Congress.

Currently, two potential definitions are on the table: In the Senate bill, gathering information to distribute it to the public is all that's required — which might or might not include Wikileaks. In the House version, there is an added condition: Newsgathering must be done "for financial gain or livelihood." Wikileaks is funded by contributions for its work, but is that the kind of income the bill's sponsors have in mind? And then there are bloggers and student journalists, many of whom neither work for commercial enterprises or are paid for their work. Would they be included or excluded by the proposed shield laws.

Both House and Senate versions exclude for "agents of a foreign power." As *Washington Post* national security write Walter Pincus noted in a recent column, such a definition would exclude journalists working for organizations tied to terrorist groups, but might it also exclude "... the BBC, Agence France-Presse and some Russian government-owned services?"

Some First Amendment advocates see any description of a journalist as a form of government licensing. And, as Pincus mused, such a law could be used by a future administration to exclude reporters or media outlets disliked by government officials.

Congress should keep in mind that while recognizing an ultimate need for national security, the goal should be to keep our fellow citizens as well-informed as possible.

EpiPens' use in schools will help save lives

"We had to rush my son to the hospital when he was 18 months old. He had eaten just two Reese's Pieces. In 15 minutes, his eyes and throat swelled and he got hives. He could have died. I am so grateful our Legislature passed a bill that will cause EpiPens to be distributed to our schools."

That is what a friend of mine explained when she thanked me for the bill that will allow trained school employees to administer life-saving treatment in cases of severe allergic reactions. I understand why she wants this — my daughter was rushed to the hospital when she stepped on a yellow jacket's nest.

One of government's primary roles is to provide for public safety. Our Legislature took a tremendous step forward for our children with the recent passage of the Epinephrine Auto-Injector Act. Passed unanimously, House Bill 2729 was signed into law by Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin, and will become effective July 8.

According to the National Institute of Allergies and Infectious Diseases (NIAID), anaphylaxis is a serious allergic reaction that involves more than one organ system (for example, skin and respiratory tract).

Anaphylaxis can begin rapidly and can cause death. The leading cause of anaphylaxis is food allergy, especially to nuts, but medications, insect stings and latex can also cause life-threatening allergic reactions as well.

Food allergies are a large and growing public health problem. Nearly 6 million or 8 percent of children in the United States have food allergies (one in 13). Undiagnosed children account for nearly a quarter of anaphylactic reactions. Severe allergic reactions result in approximately 1,500 deaths annually.

Schools have made positive efforts to reduce exposure to allergens, but accidental contact can still happen, which is why it is important that epinephrine auto-injectors become more accessible.

Epinephrine is the first-line of treatment for anaphylaxis, according to the NIAID. It gives immediate relief for life-threatening allergic reactions, allowing affected individuals more time to seek additional emergency medical treatment.

Mylan Pharmaceuticals has generously offered to supply this medication, commonly known as EpiPens, without charge to any public, private or parochial school in the state following passage of the legislation and promulgation of rules.

Mylan already does this for more than 20,000 schools in other states with similar laws and rules. Thank you, Mylan.

Allergic reactions resulting in the deaths of school children in Virginia, Illinois and Massachusetts, prompted legislation in those states similar to our newly enacted law in West Virginia.

As a sponsor of our bill in West Virginia, I was pleased to join with other sponsors from our area, including Delegates Charlene Marshall D-Monongalia, and Amanda Pasdon, R-Monongalia. Sens. Jeff Kessler, D-Marshall, Roman Prezioso, D-Marion, and Bob Beach, D-Monongalia, sponsored a companion bill in the Senate.

Support from the West Virginia Board of Medicine, the West Virginia Medical Association, the West Virginia Academy of Family Physicians, and the state Department of Education's Office of Healthy Schools helped achieve passage of HB 2927.

Our bill allows the school nurse or other trained personnel designated by the school to store and administer epinephrine auto-injectors in emergency anaphylaxis situations.

Immediate parental and EMS notification is also required. So long as school personnel are properly trained, EpiPens may soon be taken on school trips or be accessible at sporting events when school nurses aren't normally present.

Our purpose in passing this new law is to ensure that West Virginia schools are prepared to address the risk of severe allergic reactions, so that emergencies do not turn into tragedies.

Now I'm told I need to install a back flow prevention valve on my end of the line to stop any back up from the pumping station if the power should go out. It seems that I'm the lowest one on the line and if there was a problem, I would be the first to know it.

So I ask you do you think that I should be responsible for their screw ups again?

I believe that since their engineers should have caught this sooner that they should be responsible to fix the problem and not the homeowner.

I am an old, retired man who lives on Social Security. There is no compensation for my inconvenience or the damage done to my property because I have no rights, as I've been told. If you don't like it, we will just take it from you.

I contacted the PSC and others and was told they do not interfere with local government.

So if you would like to hear the rest of the story, just come to my house and park in the church parking lot.

I have no driveway thanks to the Public Sewer Commission and the local government.

Here's what has been happening in Pennsylvania:

From the Internet (the italic comments are mine) "... the resident [Canada goose] population in Pennsylvania has grown from approximately 2,400 from 1955-60 to more than 150,000 in 1993." (*Can you imagine what it is now, in 2013? Or what our area goose population is?*) ... Because harvest restrictions that protect the migratory populations also have protected the resident population, Pennsylvania has recently established special hunting seasons to target the resident population of geese. These seasons take place when migrant populations are not in the state." (*There are no local natural predators except hawks.*)

From another site: "To reduce food for a short period, treat grass with chemical repellents. Anthraquinone triggers a strong, harmless digestive irritation and teaches geese to avoid treated areas. Methyl anthranilate is a grape flavoring in our food. To geese, it just tastes really bad. Repellents must be reapplied after heavy rains or when growing grass is mowed, so plan their use when it can be most effective.

BOPARC needs to use all these deterrents: Fences, grape sprays, scary owl faces, streamers, noise (the bird sounds under the Westover Bridge seemed to work last year).

And perhaps BOPARC should put up more little cans and plastic bags used for dog droppings but mark these for geese?

Most important, however, would be signs and fines for feeding the birds. This may not be popular with some, but please think of human park users — do we come first or do the geese?

Continuing past with no regard for future

The line taken by Corky DeMarco, and Dennis Xander, quoted in *The Dominion Post's* May 30 article, "Fairmont oil, gas training center opens," makes you wonder which planet they are living on. The same for Rep. David McKinley, R-W.Va., in articles appearing elsewhere in the news.

It is well known by scientists studying warming of the earth that enough fossil fuel is already accessed to take Earth beyond the point it will become uninhabitable.

Right now you can see most of the ice melted off the Arctic Ocean, the melting permafrost, the retreating glaciers, the methane bubbling up in far north soils and lakes. We have earlier spring growth of plants and later in the fall, so there is a longer growing season, which has been recorded, and the decline of snow melt which supplies water for cities in the western United States is beyond the obvious. Drought, super storms, all this is conspicuous.

Ninety percent of the heat retained by carbon dioxide has gone into the ocean, and it has been measurably warmed all the way to the bottom, miles down. It has been made more acid by the dissolved carbon dioxide, which is affecting coral reefs.

The jet stream is weakened, so we have extreme meandering. Northern air is dragged south alternating with tropical air



Q&A: Understanding the SEC's money-market reforms

Money-market funds: You might know them as a safe place to park your cash and perhaps gather a tiny bit of interest in the process.

But in Washington, D.C., money funds have been the subject of high drama since the 2008 financial crisis. At issue have been years-long efforts by the Securities and Exchange Commission, to reform the rules under which these funds operate in order to avoid investor panics of the sort that occurred a few years ago. Those efforts have been dogged by opposition from the mutual fund industry.

Wednesday marked a milestone in the saga, with the SEC releasing proposed new rules for the industry. The commission's intent: To help shield the financial system from shocks that could put the economy at risk. The details of the reform effort can get technical pretty fast. Here's a Q&A overview of what's going on:

Q: What's the purpose of reforming the money-market fund industry?

A: Money funds are more than a safe place for mom and pop to put their cash. These funds have \$2.6 trillion in assets, most of that from corporations, banks and governments. Corporations rely on the funds as a source of short-term financing, making them a major part of the machinery that keeps the country's financial system running.

The effort to reform the industry's rules springs from the 2008 financial crisis, when the risk of investor "runs" on money funds became clear. In September of that year, the oldest money fund — and one of the biggest — experienced a decline in value. That might not seem like a big deal, since mutual fund values fluctuate with the market all the time. But investors have long expected money funds to maintain a stable value of \$1 per share. When the Reserve Primary Fund "broke the buck," dropping from \$1 to 97 cents in value, investors panicked.

Within days, investors had yanked some \$300 billion from funds similar to Reserve Primary, helping to bring the short-term credit market to a standstill. Companies struggled to find the funding needed to make

payroll and meet other critical expenses. Only intervention by the Treasury Department, which offered to insure the funds, prevented a potentially disastrous chain reaction. Avoiding a replay of this scenario is the SEC's goal.

Q: What is the SEC proposing?

A: The commission has put forward two proposals. The first requires the riskiest kind of money funds to switch from the current system, in which they use a "fixed" share price of \$1, to a "floating" share price that fluctuates with the market. Money funds invest very conservatively, but the value of the assets they hold does, on rare occasions, move up and down ever so slightly.

Traditionally, when portfolio values have fallen, the parent fund companies have stepped in to prop up the value of the shares. The company that ran the Reserve Primary Fund was the exception — it didn't have the resources to prop up the fund's \$1 "net asset value."

The idea behind the floating share prices, or floating NAVs, is to de-stigmatize changes in fund value. "The idea was to have the NAVs float, and train investors to understand that they'll fluctuate," says John Rekenhauer, vice president of research at Morningstar, Inc. That,

in theory, would make panics less likely. The floating NAV proposal would not affect the two safer flavors of money funds, known as retail and government funds.

The SEC's second proposal attempts to more directly discourage investors from making runs on money funds. It envisions a stable share price but includes charging investors a fee for redemptions during times of stress and giving fund directors the ability to temporarily suspend redemptions for up to 30 days.

The two SEC proposals may ultimately be adopted separately or combined into a reform package.

Q: To what extent would all this affect average investors?

A: With the proposal just unveiled, the industry is still deciphering what its impact might be. Even if certain funds' NAVs end up floating, their range of volatility is expected to be minimal.

It's important to note that at this stage, the proposals are just that — proposals. Up next is a public comment period, which could lead to revisions. The money-fund industry is certain to weigh in vigorously. In part because of the 2008 scare and in part because of paltry yields, money-fund assets have plunged from \$3.9 trillion to \$2.6 trillion over the past three years.

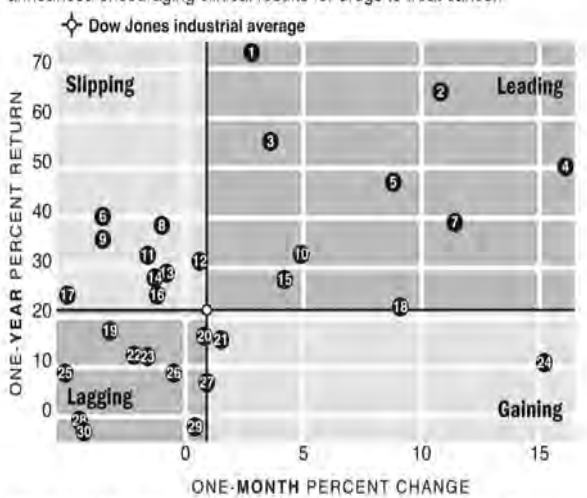

A sinking feeling

Utility stocks have gone from first to worst.

After soaring 18.4 percent through the end of April, they've since plunged 9.6 percent. It's a similar story for telecom companies, and makers of toothpaste and other consumer staples. Since the beginning of May, these three groups are the worst performers of the 10 sectors that make up the Standard & Poor's 500 index.

Expect the trend to continue, strategists say.

Consumer confidence is at its highest level in almost six years, and home prices soared 12 percent in April compared to a year earlier — their biggest jump since 2006. That's pushing investors toward stocks that do best in a strong economy, such as financials. Defensive stocks rallied early in the year, when doubts about the economic recovery were high.

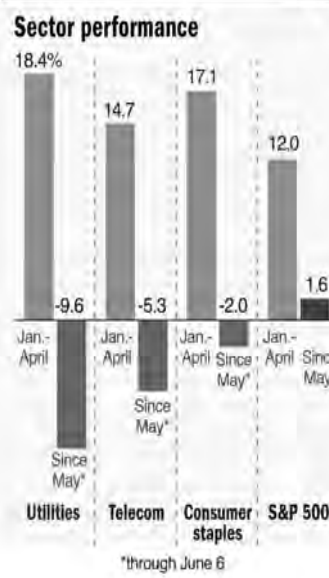


Defensive sectors tend to be big dividend payers. S&P 500 stocks that pay dividends rose 2 percent in May, only a third of the 6 percent gain for non-payers.

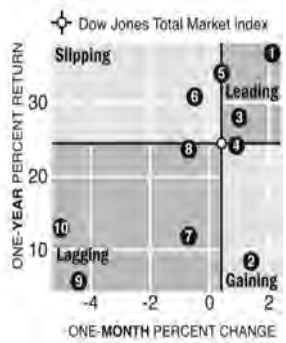
Utility, telecom and consumer staples stocks remain the market's most expensive relative to their earnings and other valuation measures, says Goldman Sachs strategist David Kostin. He suggests better values can be found in the financial and industrial sectors.

Playing defense

After leading the market early in the year, defensive sectors are now trailing.

Oil and gas

Employers picked up their hiring during May, and investors expect the stronger job market will lead to more people driving to work and more goods being shipped around the country.

Those forecasts for stronger energy demand helped the price of crude oil rise back above \$96 per barrel on Friday, its highest settlement price in two and a half weeks. The wholesale price of gasoline also rose.

Oil and gas stocks benefited, returning an average of 1 percent last week. That compares with a 0.7 percent return for the overall market.

In particular, companies that provide pumping and other services at oil fields had strong gains, returning an average of 1.5 percent.

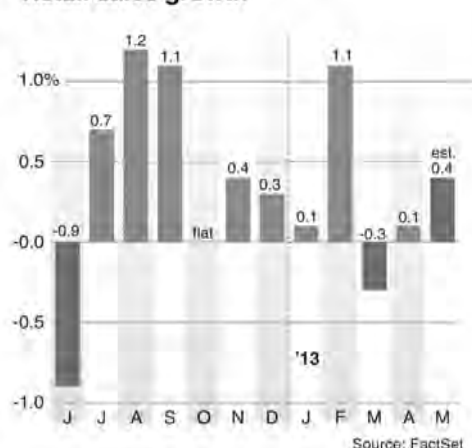
For the week of June 10

Shoppers have continued to spend this year, despite worries that higher tax rates would force them to cut back.

On Thursday, economists expect a report to show that growth in retail sales accelerated to 0.4 percent in May from 0.1 percent in April. The expected increase comes as shoppers are at their most optimistic in years: The consumer confidence index rose in May to its highest level since February 2008. Rising prices for homes and stock portfolios mean shoppers are feeling more comfortable.

Costco Wholesale (COST) has already said that revenue in May at its stores open more than a year rose 5 percent. It's a key measure because it strips out the effect of store openings and closures. Stein Mart (SMRT), a fashion retailer, said revenue at its stores open more than a year surged 8.2 percent last month. It credited strong demand for linens and ladies' sportswear, among other items.

What do you think of Tesla Motors?

Japanese stocks have stumbled since hitting a peak on May 22, but not by enough to knock ProFunds' UltraJapan (UJPIX) from the top spot for one-year fund performance. The fund has more than doubled over the last year, returning 115.5 percent, because it seeks to offer investors double the daily return of the Nikkei 225 index before fees and expenses. The Nikkei is up 49.1 percent over the last 12 months on hopes that aggressive stimulus from the Bank of Japan will invigorate the world's third-largest economy.

BAD OMEN?
Warnings from companies about the strength of their quarterly earnings have been coming more quickly than usual. Video game retailer GameStop, for example, said late last month that it expects to earn up to 7 cents per share in the second quarter. That was below the 8 cents that analysts had been forecasting. GameStop is one of 76 companies in the Standard & Poor's 500 index that have given a lower-than-expected forecast for second-quarter results, according to S&P Capital IQ. To be sure, another 19 companies have offered higher-than-expected forecasts. But the ratio of 4:1 for discouraging-to-encouraging profit forecasts is worse than the 10-year average of 2:1.

HIGH-FREQUENCY DOMINATION
The computers have already taken over. The growth of high-frequency trading has slowed in recent years, but it still dominates the market. Last year, 51 percent of all shares traded in the U.S. were handled by high-frequency traders, according to estimates from the Tabb Group and World Federation of Exchanges. These kinds of traders are fully automated, and they're making trades in fractions of a second. To be sure, high-frequency traders' share of the market is down from 55 percent in 2011 and a peak of 61 percent in 2009. But it's still well above the 21 percent that they controlled in 2005.



STILL UPBEAT
The stock market has slowed since reaching a peak on May 21. But Wall Street remains undeterred, with many strategists sticking with their forecasts for continued gains in 2013. Credit Suisse strategists even raised their forecast on Wednesday. They expect the S&P 500 to end the year at 1,730, up from their prior forecast of 1,640. That would be a 7.5 percent climb from Wednesday's close. They say that stocks still look cheap relative to bonds and that lower commodity prices should help the global economic recovery continue.

Sitka rock quarry wants to expand

SITKA, Alaska — A Sitka rock quarry wants to nearly double its size.

The Baranof Island Housing Authority is seeking permission to expand its quarry at the end of Indian River Road, *The Daily Sitka Sentinel* reported.

The organization is seeking permission from the city planning commission to increase the size of the Indian River Uplands Rock Quarry from 18.8 acres to 36.

Safety precautions, additional rock needs and future development are the reasons behind the request.

The company said the

current rock walls formed by excavation are too steep. It also leaves the area unsafe for future development.

"BIHA desires to perform additional rock extraction to eliminate the steep rock walls surrounding the quarry floor and construct wider benches, resulting in an overall flatter slope that would provide multiple benefits: A safer finished product, a more attractive property opening up more options for future redevelopment of the site, while, in the process, creating a rock source to help meet

BIHA and the communi-

ty's future project need," a letter to the commission reads.

There's an estimated 95,000 cubic yards of rock still available at the site. Expansion would nearly triple that amount.

Sitka City Planner Maegan Bosak says the proposal was only up for consideration and last week's meeting, and there will be plenty of opportunities for the public to weigh in before any final decision.

"This will probably be on the agenda for another three or four meetings so we welcome anyone's comment on it," Bosak said.

Shuttered GM plant to be razed in downtown Indy

INDIANAPOLIS — A shuttered General Motors Corp. stamping plant that once employed more than 6,000 workers near downtown Indianapolis will be demolished this fall after failing to attract a buyer.

The property owner's redevelopment manager, Bruce Rasher, told *The Indianapolis Star* that after consulting with commercial real estate experts, it was clear the 102-acre site's well-worn buildings were hampering efforts to sell the property.

The site's owner, Revitalizing Auto Communities Environmental Response Trust (RACER), was created to clean up and market properties owned by GM before its 2009 bankruptcy.

Despite the site's prime real estate, no buyers have come forward interested in turning it into a new industrial business. There have also been no takers on an alternative proposal to build a mix of condos, shops and offices suggested by planners affiliated with the Urban

Land Institute.

That project was expected to take 10 to 15 years and cost \$300 million.

Demolition of the 2.1-million-square-foot factory and several smaller support buildings is expected to start this fall and likely take about six months.

Prime Site Brokers principal Clint Fultz said tearing down the buildings is a good idea, even though that step won't necessarily speed up the sale.

"Most people who look at that site can figure out

what they want to do with it two years down the road," Fultz said. "But tearing the buildings down won't hurt."

He said that demolition likely will put an end to any hope of adding industrial jobs because those types of businesses would have planned to use the existing buildings.

Fultz said that RACER's best bet is to market the site's proximity to downtown's bustling businesses, crowded hotels, booming sports venues and popular tourist attractions. He said

the city and developer need to think ambitiously about redevelopment plans with a site so close to downtown.

City officials support the decision to demolish the buildings and find a new developer.

Mayor Greg Ballard said in a Friday statement that his administration is "working shoulder to shoulder with the RACER staff to attract a buyer who will bring jobs and dynamic redevelopment to this prime location."

Canal dreams

Nicaragua canal fast-tracked with Chinese boost

MANAGUA, Nicaragua — For centuries, tycoons and adventurers alike have dreamed of building a canal through Nicaragua between the Pacific and Atlantic oceans and riding a boom in international trade to new riches. Up until now, however, all comers were forced to admit defeat when faced with the sheer challenge of building a man-made river through dense, hilly jungle.

Now, the old dream is attracting a new hopeful, and this time from the other side of the world.

The Hong Kong-regis-

tered company, HK Nicaragua Canal Development Investment Co. Ltd., is working with the government on a massive canal project experts say could take 11 years to finish, cost \$40 billion and require digging about 130 miles (200 kilometers) of waterway.

President Daniel Ortega has rushed approval of the canal through Nicaragua's congress, prompting some legislators to call for more careful consideration of the project's costs and benefits, both environmental and economic.

Ortega presented the proposal Tuesday and

hopes to submit it to at least an initial vote on Monday, with final approval planned by next Thursday.

The opposition Sandinista Renovation Movement, which split in 1995 from Ortega, has demanded more information about the developer's while questioning the hurry.

"If this information isn't forthcoming, we can assume this is a swindle, a deal with a front company to get a concession, and then sell the rights to someone else," the party said in a statement. "It's a corrupt deal to make a lot of money with fake investors."

Congressional leader Rene Nunez, an Ortega supporter, said the canal's potential benefits to Nicaragua's economy explained the urgency.

In 2006, canal proponents said freight traffic demand would outstrip the capacity of even an expanded Panama Canal by more than 300 percent by 2025. They now say the waterway could create 40,000 construction jobs and essentially double the per-capita gross domestic product of Nicaragua, one of the poorest countries in Latin America. The government plans to grant the Chinese company a concession for 100 years.

But never once have I seen them fight. Which, hey, you gotta admit is something.

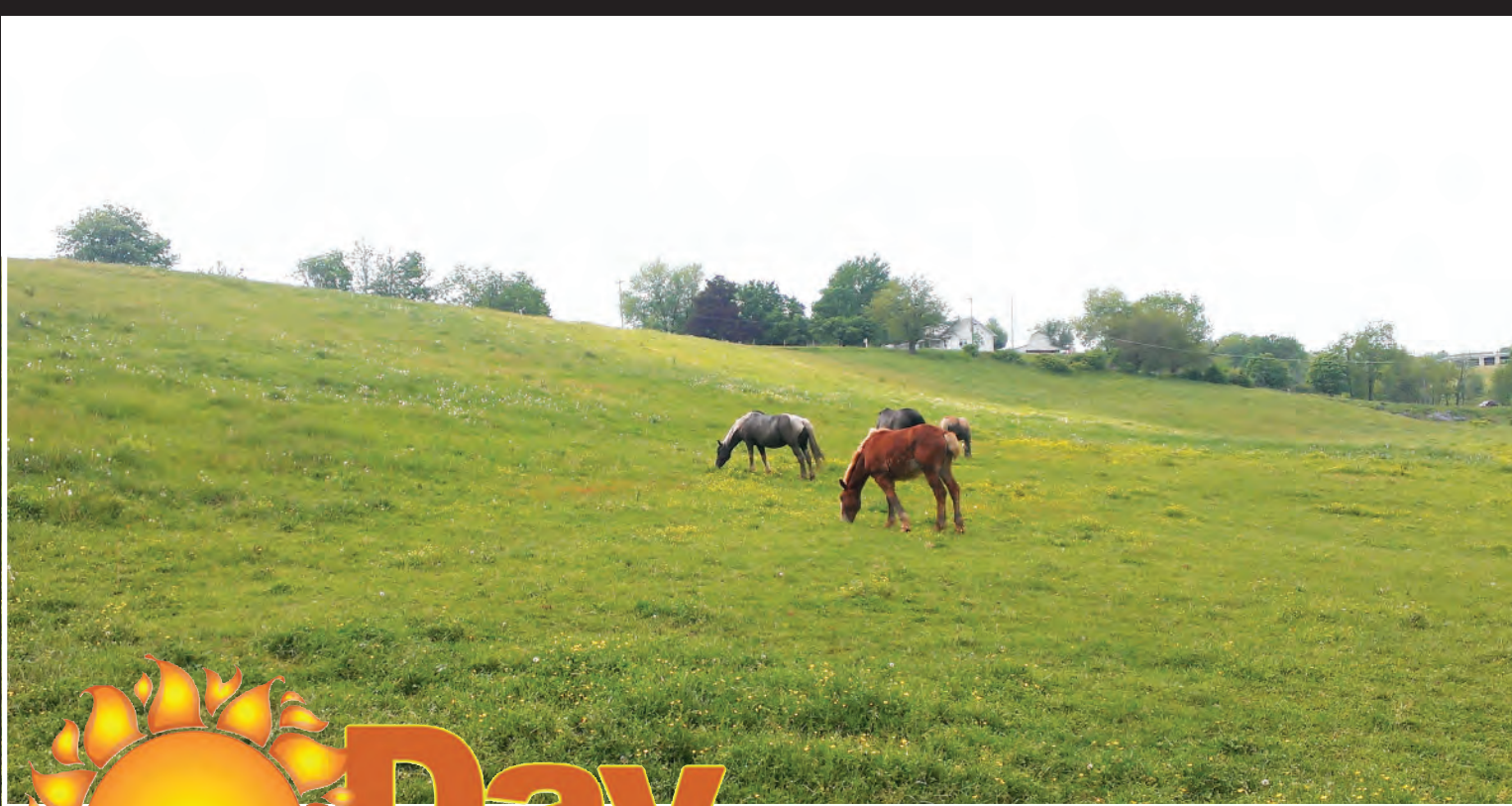

sunrise to sundown, much like the Amish themselves.

So that's how I found myself behind the wheel of my Pontiac with a large, fat-free cappuccino in the cup container, making my way into the heart of Ohio's Amish Country.

When I arrived, I was ready for breakfast and to sit back for a moment and take in the area's sites — vast, green fields dotted with horses, cows and goats — and sounds — the clop, clop, clop of horse-drawn buggies.

Boyd & Wurthmann Restaurant

This little restaurant in downtown Berlin is billed as a regular hangout for the locals, and on this particular morning it was buzzing with customers.

Throwing away my low-fat diet for the day, I decided to splurge a little and order a breakfast of sunny-side-up eggs, bacon and toast. And it was magnificent.

Miller's Bakery

For a girl who's been on a diet, walking into Miller's Bakery was like heaven. Fresh pastries, including whoopie pies, cookies of all sorts and cheese tarts — in flavors such as cherry, blueberry, lemon, pineapple and red raspberry-filled the shelves of the bakery.

And folks with a serious sweet tooth could pick up their favorite sugary snack with a visit down Miller's candy aisle.

Plus, if you visit in the morning, all of the baked goods are nice and fresh, and the smell is beyond enticing.

Hershberger's Farm & Bakery

One of the first things I noticed about this sprawling complex was the goats hanging out on the roof. Yes, goats, not birds, on a roof. The animals, who are able to climb up ramps to the top of their enclosure, have a birds-eye view of the entirety of Hershberger's collection of buildings.

And quite a view it must be, seeing as how Hershberger's is huge. The farm and bakery sells flowers, bird baths and adirondack chairs, among other outdoor items. But inside the main building is the plethora of food items from bags of Amish noodles to cheese to fresh produce.

While looking around the store, a blackberry jel-

ly roll caught my eye from the freezer case. Since I couldn't help myself, I snatched it up, paid for it and placed it in the cooler in my car. It was later thoroughly enjoyed.

Sol's in Berlin

The parking lot of Sol's was packed with cars the Monday I visited, but once I entered one of the buildings, I could understand why. Every type of craft you could ever think of seemed to be somewhere in this large maze of a building.

There were gourd birdhouses, pottery pieces, primitive items, Amish dolls and "welcome to our home" signs among other crafts, too numerous to mention. Heck, I even found a WVU-themed bean-bag toss game for sale.

Heini's Cheese Chalet & Amish Country Mall

It was pretty close to lunchtime by the time I arrived at Heini's, but after seeing the array of samples available, I knew there wouldn't be time, nor a

need, to stop and eat a meal.

Instead, toothpick in hand, I made my way down the refrigerated section of the cheese house, sampling bits of cheddar, colby and Swiss. And I was awfully tempted to buy a big chunk of smoky cheddar, but I resisted in favor of my already waning diet. So instead, I picked up a small hunk of pepperjack.

Heini's also has a cheese-making tour that visitors may take. Inside the main building, there are a few viewing windows that face the cheese making area, so that you can physically watch your favorite cheeses being made.

Tis the Season

Celebrating Christmas in July a little early, I visited Tis the Season in Berlin, where it's literally the holidays year round.

The best word I can use to describe what I found inside this building is magical. Glowing lights everywhere you turn, glittering tinsel and bright ornaments await visitors to the yuletide village. Head

up the stairs and around the corridors, and it's easy to become lost in this holiday wonderland.

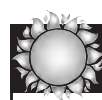
But it's a great place to stop for a quick visit if you're like me and you love the spirit of the Christmas season.

Yoder's Amish House

The most fascinating leg of my journey came, appropriately, when I visited Yoder's Amish House.

There, I met Robert Hamsher, a Mennonite who takes visitors on a tour through two houses on the property, one of which was built in 1866. He started the tour with a quick rundown of where the Amish and Mennonite faiths originated. In the 16th century, two priests, one from Germany, the other from Switzerland, converted to Anabaptism and were kicked out of the Catholic Church because of their beliefs. The Mennonite and Amish faiths evolved from this division.

"Mennonite and Amish, our basic beliefs are the same. We're Anabaptists



TIPS

- Don't visit on a Sunday. Most of the businesses in Amish Country are only open Monday-Saturday.
- Leave early in the morning if you're only going for the day. Most of the businesses are open early, but they'll close around 5 or 6 p.m., which is when you should probably be thinking about heading home.

- Take a few moments to experience Amish life by riding in a buggy. And while the Amish don't like to be photographed or videoed, they are more than willing to talk with visitors and answer questions. A buggy ride is the perfect time to do so.

and we're non-resistant, but our lifestyles are totally different," Hamsher said.

Discussing the plain dress of the Amish, their church (they hold religious ceremonies in their houses, not church buildings) and their basic beliefs of leading a simple life free from modern technology, Hamsher led me through the two Amish homes on the Yoder property.

One of the highlights of the tour was a trip through the kitchen, where two women were baking up a variety of goodies, including fresh bread and cinnamon rolls. On my way out, I couldn't help but purchase a chocolate chip cookie and a chocolate brownie.

After that, it was over to the barn, where I was introduced to a menagerie of farm animals, including a baby mule who followed me around as I petted beagle puppies and talked softly to the large horses.

Also on the farm was a model schoolhouse. Learning about an Amish education was particularly interesting, as the schools are usually only one room and serve children from first through eighth grade. Amish children are able to quit school after they finish eighth grade, because the Amish believe that because they'll be working on a farm, they won't need further education.

Finally, my last adventure at Yoder's was catching a ride in a horse-drawn buggy with Abe Yoder, an Amish man who wouldn't let me take a photo of or videotape him, but was more than willing to talk about the 116-acre farm. And I have to say, the Amish buggies make for a surprisingly smooth ride as we traveled out through green pastures and by grazing horses.

Walnut Creek Cheese

One of the last stops of the day, I loaded up my shopping cart at Walnut Creek. The prices here are unbeatable. I purchased lunch meat at \$2.99 a pound, ground beef for around \$3 a pound and a bunch of basic spices at bargain prices.

Walnut Creek is basically a grocery store, although it's made up of several conjoined stores where you can buy other items, such as kitchen tools and flowers.

I waited until I arrived at Walnut Creek to buy Amish noodles, which I've got to tell you are mighty tasty in some beef or chicken broth.

And I also picked up some of the fat-free bulk candy, including those darned Smartie lollipops to which I'm addicted.

Dutch Valley Restaurant and Bakery

Legs exhausted, wallet nearly empty and a long drive ahead of me, I decided it was time to call it quits in Amish Country. But there was one final stop, and that was to grab dinner at Dutch Valley.

This large restaurant is the perfect last stop on an Amish Country journey, as it is right on the way out of town.

I filled up on the plethora of goodies offered at the buffet, and then took my tired self back to the car and drove home.

Obviously, as previously mentioned, I wasn't planning to stick to the low-fat diet on my trip. After all, a visit to Amish Country wouldn't be complete without sampling some of the food.

Let's just say it's a good thing I'm not much of a morning person or that I don't live closer to this Ohio oasis. If I did, I'd probably weigh 500 pounds.

'Secret Life' finale leaves fan puzzled and angry

"THIS WAS PROBABLY the worst mistake I've ever made," I remarked to Jason after watching the abysmal final episode of the ABC Family show "The Secret Life of the American Teenager."

For five seasons — which amounts to 121 hours, or roughly five days of my life — I've struggled to watch this terrible excuse for a show.

And while trying to figure out just what word or phrase I wanted to use to describe "Secret Life" and its finale, I was accosted by my husband, who, after watching the ending himself, rattled off a series of terms: Abominable, beastly, careless, dissatisfactory, erroneous, inadequate, substandard, all among them. However, "not good" about sums it up in my book. That's about the creativity level of this show's producers anyway, and just what they deserve for their half-hearted, or rather completely empty-hearted, attempt at a finale.

The strangest thing is, I honestly can't tell you why I spent five days of my precious life watching a show about a pregnant teenager and her friends/enemies. The only reason I can fathom is that once I start something, I like to see it through to the end. Even if it is a juvenile show about a bunch of California teenagers obsessed with hooking up.

What should have been a finale ended up being mostly a regurgitation of clips from the past five years, woven into a very sparse storyline, in which Amy, the main character, decides to go off to college in New York City. In doing so, she leaves behind her child, yes her child, who will live with his dad, whom Amy decided not to marry, even though she's been insistent upon tying the knot for at least a season and a half.

The rest of the hour-long finale was flashbacks and quick, unbelievable resolutions to stories: This couple got together, so did that one, this one

didn't and then the girl danced because she was happy about the relationship ending.

This is quite possibly the worst piece of rubbish I've ever seen on TV, which makes it all the more pathetic that I spent so many years investing in its totally unrealistic, often non-existent storylines. I'm embarrassed of course to admit this egregious error in a newspaper column, but what's worse is living with myself after watching "Secret Life" for five seasons, knowing how it all ended.

The only positive is that **Shailene Woodley**, who played Amy, now has a budding movie career — no thanks to "Secret Life's" writers and directors, I'm sure. But the show obviously got her name on the showbiz list. Now, she can move on to bigger and better things. She can only go up from here, and I'm sure she realizes that fact.

To ABC Family and the producers of the show, I must apologize for myself and the other schmucks who despite the awful episodes, continued to watch through the years thinking "Secret Life" would get better, giving the show Nielsen ratings it didn't deserve. Historic ones get a second shot at life

HACKENSACK, N.J. — The majestic oak that sits on the corner of Cedar Lane and Palisade Avenue in Teaneck, N.J., is headed for the chopping block, but the historic tree may live on, if experts can manage the tricky feat of cloning it.

The practice of cloning plants and trees — producing genetically identical copies — is nothing new. From impatiens at the local nursery to cherry blossoms in Washington, plants and trees have been cloned to replicate desirable traits.

"It's been done for thousands and thousands of years," said David L. Kidwell-Slak, a horticulturist in the floral and nursery plants research unit at the U.S. National Arboretum. "It's really the primary way people have domesticated any plant."

But matching the 250-plus-year-old red oak might be more challenging, according to tree experts. That's because oaks are among the most difficult plants to clone. Callery pear, American holly, Atlantic white cedar, yellowwood and birches are easier to clone through cuttings, said Mike D'Errico, the executive director of the state's Society of Certified Tree Experts.

Typically, about 6 inches of the branch tip, called soft wood growth, is cut, dipped into a rooting hormone to stimulate root growth, then put into a moist, warm environment.

Depending on the plant, the stem cuttings will form roots and be ready for replanting within weeks or months, said David Slaymaker, a professor of molecular plant biology at William Paterson University.

The fourth largest Red Oak Tree in New Jersey is located, for now in Teaneck. Officials, such as Todd Mastrobuoni, a consultant and tree preservationist for North Jersey Tree Experts, are deciding if the tree, standing next to a nursery school and an intersection, must come down.

"The new plant is genetically identical to the plant the cutting came from, since it was actually part of that plant," Slaymaker said.

The cuttings can also be grafted onto another plant. The results will be genetically similar, although the roots will belong to another tree.

A second, slightly more expensive and modern method of plant cloning is through tissue culture. In this process, young tissue is cultured in a sterile environment and treated with plant hormone to stimulate root growth.

If the Teaneck oak is saved through cloning, it would not be the first time that a tree of historical and emotional significance has been propagated for future generations.

Some of the cherry blossom trees around the Tidal Basin in Washington are clones of the original gifts from Japan in 1912. The Archangel Ancient Tree Archive has been cloning and archiving the genetic material of the world's oldest species, studying their

genetic makeup to discover the secret to their endurance, and replanting some of them.

Bergen County is planning to cut down the northern red oak, following a report that concluded that extensive decay, termite damage, the aftereffects of a lightning strike five years ago and the loss of 40 percent of its root system all weakened the tree. It increased the likelihood that it or its limbs will fall and hurt — or kill — someone.

The tree has special significance in some corners of the township. Through the years, many have fought to save it from developers. An ordinance this year gave it official historic status.

The ordinance explained, "The tree was standing before the birth of our nation and before George Washington's retreat over the Hackensack River at Historic New Bridge Landing."

The Puffin Foundation, which made a donation to Bergen County to take care of the tree in perpetuity, is working with tree experts to keep the oak's lineage alive.

"Nobody wants this tree to go down," said Todd Mastrobuoni, a certified tree expert, master arborist and tree risk assessor, who suggested cloning it. "And, at least, if we can come up with a way to give people something — that it's not a total end to it — it will be worth the time and effort."

The Puffin Foundation's tree experts contacted Jason Grabosky, an associate professor of ecology, evolution and natural resources at the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station at Rutgers University. Grabosky said the group is considering three methods to increase the chances of success.

They will try taking terminal cuttings from the tree and using growth hormones to initiate rooting; try taking small branches and storing them in an environment with adequate humidity, a process that would induce the branches to use their stored carbohydrates and force them to grow shoots; and try using the sprouts that will be generated once the tree is cut down.

Dog who pees indoors needs housetraining, not a 'time out'

Q: My 1-year-old Dachshund is lovable, but won't stop peeing in the house, no matter how many times a day I take him out. The veterinarian says when the dog pees indoors, I should give him a 'time out' in his kennel. Alas, I never catch him. But when I do find the pee, all I have to do is look at my dog and he runs to his kennel. He even closes the door behind himself! If he doesn't stop peeing indoors, I'll be looking for a new home for him. I hear your radio show on my way to work, but can't call in, so email will have to do. — J.C., via cyberspace

A: You act as though your dog is peeing indoors on purpose, which can't possibly be true, notes certified dog behavior consultant Darlene Arden.

"Either there's a medical explanation, which I assume your veterinarian has ruled out, or your dog is simply not quite house-trained," said Arden.

The problem with giving your dog a time out in his kennel is that there's no way for him to associate going in there with what you do want him to do. Clearly, your dog is smart — smart enough to know that when you're angry, he should head for the kennel. Your dog piddles in corners of the house because he's learned that it makes you mad when he pees indoors — but that doesn't mean he knows to pee outdoors.

Arden, author of "Small Dogs, Big Hearts: A Guide to Caring for Your Little Dog" (Howell Book House, New York, NY, 2006; \$25.99), explained, "Take your dog out on a leash to the same place at a time when you think he's got to go. When he goes, jump up and down like an idiot. Your neighbors will think you're crazy, but your dog will love the attention and the special treat you use only for this purpose."

If you must leave all day and you're still unsure of your dog's housetraining, leave him in a bathroom or behind a gate in the kitchen with a pee pad. Arden understands your frustration, but points out that most house-training errors are operator errors.

However, if your dog only piddles when you're not at home, then we're potentially dealing with an all-together different issue; see a dog behavior consultant or veterinary behaviorist.

Concussions affect sexes differently

ATLANTA — Girls may suffer fewer concussions than boys, but the effects can last longer.

Those findings, by kinesiologist Tracey Covassin of Michigan State University, were among the surprising conclusions reported at a recent summit on sports concussions that drew neurologists, epidemiologists and trainers from around the country to an Atlanta conference room.

Weeks earlier, Gov. Nathan Deal had signed "return to play" legislation requiring Georgia's youth athletes who suffer concussions to be cleared by a health professional before returning to the field of play.

The proposed law received vocal support from the families of Georgia's injured athletes, including Paige Havens of Lawrenceville, Ga., whose daughter Rachel, 15, is still feeling the effects of a concussion from the fall of 2011.

Also advocating for the law was Cassie Bruce, of Lawrenceville, whose 16-year-old son, Caleb, sustained a concussion at a football game last fall.

While football still causes the most concussions, girls' soccer has also emerged as a dangerous place for head injuries, even ahead of boys soccer.

Speaking at the Buckhead J.W. Marriott hotel before a group of about a hundred sports and medical professionals, Covassin said that in a survey of concussed Michigan athletes, girls' symptoms, including headache, fatigue, reduced visual memory and reduced verbal memory, were higher than boys' symptoms eight days after an injury.

Covassin said that male athletes had greater neck strength and a higher body mass index, which might help explain their resilience. But neither boys nor girls understood the symptoms of concussions well, she said: 13 percent thought "chest pain" was among the warning signs.

The task of recognizing concussions and treating them correctly was a focal point for the conference.

Dr. Julie Gilchrist, an epidemiologist with the Atlanta-based Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), spoke about the CDC's "Heads-Up" initiative, an educational program begun in 2005 to teach coaches, athletes and parents about the signs and treatment of traumatic brain injury.

More than 800,000 coaches have completed the online training developed by the CDC, said Gilchrist.

That increased awareness has probably contributed to the 57 percent rise in emergency room visits for concussions from 2001 to 2009, Gilchrist said. Greater attention to traumatic brain injury among professional athletes and soldiers has also pushed that trend.

Now, thousands of football players are suing the National Football League to be compensated for brain injuries they received on the field in an era when players were expected to take a hit and shake it off.

Did Einstein believe in God?

Q: Among all the questions you receive about the conflict between science and religion, you seem to take the accommodationist route, insisting there is no conflict, and misquoting Albert Einstein in a way that makes him seem religious. How can you a) ignore direct conflicts between science and religion (age of the universe, first life on earth, etc.) and b) consistently distort Einstein's pantheism and disbelief in a personal god? — N, via godsquadquestion

A: I'm quite fond of quoting Einstein to make the points that one can be smart and be religious, and be a scientist and be religious. I usually choose the famous Einstein quote supposedly written in response to a letter from Gandhi that contained the query, "Dear Einstein: What do you do?" Einstein supposedly replied, "Dear Gandhi: I trace the lines that flow from God."

I've also quoted Einstein's supposed comment on the need for a creator God in the universe: "How could so great a symphony as the universe have no conductor?" Or my abso-

lute favorite possible-Einstein quote" "There are only two ways to live your life. One is as though nothing is a miracle. The other is as though everything is a miracle."

I love these comments, but I try to be an honest and honorable thinker, so I also usually add that I haven't been able to totally confirm the accuracy of these famous Einstein quotes.

Recently, a letter Einstein wrote a year before his death to philosopher Eric Gutkind was auctioned off in England that casts a shadow, as does your probing question, over my enthusiastic but possibly misguided attempts to make Einstein a proof text for a universe created and sustained by God. In that letter, he wrote:

"The word God is for me nothing more than the expression and product of human weaknesses, the

Bible a collection of honorable but still primitive legends which are nevertheless pretty childish." The letter proves that Einstein was not conventionally religious, but it doesn't prove he was an atheist. In fact, Einstein was angered by assertions that he was an atheist. He said, "In view of such harmony in the cosmos, which I, with my limited human mind, am able to recognize, there are yet people who say there is no God. But what really makes me angry is that they quote me for the support of such views."

In a 1940 essay on science and religion in the journal *Nature*, Einstein wrote: "Conflicts between science and religion have all sprung from fatal errors. Even though the realms of religion and science in themselves are clearly marked off from each other, there are strong reciprocal relationships and dependencies ... science without religion is lame, religion without science is blind ... a legitimate conflict between science and religion cannot exist."

Following Einstein, Stephen Jay Gould, the

late paleontologist, philosopher and evolutionary biologist, in a 1997 essay, called the domains of science and religion Non-Overlapping Magisteria (NOMA). Each has its own domain of human thought, and problems only arise when the natural boundaries of each discipline are breached — when science tries to refute religion or when religion tries to refute science.

There are many ways to the truth, just like there are many ways up a mountain. I think Gould was less religious than Einstein, although Einstein was certainly not conventionally religious.

The religious ideas I've taken from Einstein (and similarly Spinoza) into my own faith are first and foremost the religious idea of awe. From Psalm 19's powerful spiritual insight — that "The Heavens declare the glory of God." — to Einstein's idea of cosmic harmony, there is the foundational belief (and it is a belief, not a fact) that where there is order, there must be an orderer.

This spiritual tenet is the foundation of all religious beliefs, but it is not

the end of all religious beliefs. After the belief in the order of the universe, there is a belief in the moral order of the universe — Martin Luther King's belief that the universe "arcs toward freedom." It is the heroic and hopeful belief that despite the evidence of evil, goodness has an edge and has a stronger claim on our common future.

Einstein, Spinoza, Gould and you, dear reader, believe in the God of the philosophers as opposed to the God of the Bible. I believe that both are in truth the one true God who made heaven and earth and who made us "but little lower than the angels."

As for our Einstein debate, John Brooke, emeritus professor of science and religion at Oxford University, said of Einstein: "He was rather quirky about religion."

I could not have said it better ... or shorter!

Cheerios stands by TV ad showing mixed-race family

NEW YORK — A mom sits at her kitchen table when her grade schooler saunters up with a big box of Cheerios.

"Mom," says the girl. "Dad told me Cheerios is good for your heart. Is that true?"

Cut to dad waking from a nap on the living room couch with a pile of Cheerios on his chest (where his heart is) crunchily cascading to the floor.

The message is in line with the company's Heart Healthy campaign, except this 30-second ad features a black dad, white mom and biracial child and produced enough vitriol on YouTube last week that Cheerios requested the comments section be turned off.

This week, the company is standing by the fictitious family, which reflects a black-white racial mix uncommon in commercials today, especially in ads on TV, at a time when interracial and interethnic couples are on the rise in real life, according to 2010 U.S. Census data, brand strategists and marketing consultants.

"The reality is that in general most big companies don't want to take a

lot of risks," said Laura Ries, who has written five books on marketing and brand strategy and consults for companies large, small and in between.

"The ability for nameless, faceless people to get on the Internet is out there, and companies don't like it when people yell at them," she said.

Camille Gibson, vice president of marketing for Cheerios, said it's the first time the ad campaign that focuses on family moments has featured an interracial couple, with General Mills casting the actors to reflect the changing U.S. population.

"We felt like we were reflecting an American family," Gibson said.

As a large company, Minneapolis-based General Mills is used to getting some degree of negative feedback and wasn't surprised by the comments on YouTube, she said. But it was the first time the company requested the site turn the comments section off because of the vitriol.

Another site, Reddit, filtered out negative comments on a thread started with a comment in support of the ad. The site left Cheerios defenders' remarks online.

The national ad will

continue running as scheduled for several more months and Cheerios isn't planning any changes, Gibson said. She declined to say whether the campaign would feature interracial ads going forward.

Overall, Gibson said, the feedback has been overwhelmingly supportive: "Consumers are actually responding very positively to the ad."

With millions of ad dollars at stake, how seriously do big companies such as Cheerios take racist backlashes? Very, said Allen Adamson, managing director of the branding firm Landor Associates, but caving to critics is just as dangerous to a company as large as Cheerios.

"Advertisers for many years always took the safe route, which was to try to ruffle no feathers, and in doing so, became less and less authentic and real," he said. "To succeed today, big brands like Cheerios need to be in touch with what's authentic and true about American families."

Those families include married couples of different races and ethnicities who grew by 28 percent in the decade between 2000 and 2010, from 7 percent to 10 percent, Census data

shows.

"The traditional approach depicting the old 'Leave it to Beaver' family, while offending no one, is not very realistic," Adamson said.

Actor Charles Malik Whitfield, who portrays the sleeping dad in the spot, thanked supporters of the ad and sees an opportunity for opening a dialogue with its detractors.

"Let's not pretend racism doesn't exist. Let's not pretend that we've come so far. Let's be conscious of and appreciate the noise, and the negativity, because there's so much work to be done," he said in a telephone interview from Los Angeles.

Cheerios is not the first brand to show a black and white couple with a biracial child. A TV commercial for Blockbuster recently featured a white mom, black dad and biracial son enjoying a rental on the couch. As far back as 2009, Philadelphia Cream Cheese and its "spread a little joy" campaign had a black man and white woman (no wedding bands) enjoying a bagel breakfast in bed.

Think carefully before posting Facebook photos

Q: I broke up with my ex about three months ago and he still has pictures of us on Facebook. I just started dating someone else and it seems inappropriate to see pictures of me with my ex all over the Internet. It feels like harassment. Will a restraining order help? Is there some sort of ex-etiquette associated with social media?

A: It sounds as if you are looking for a rule, like the 10 rules of good ex-etiquette (which can be found at bonusfamilies.com, key word: Ten rules) that depicts the proper behavior associated with break-ups and social media. For example, "60 days after a break-up it's good manners to remove all evidence of the relationship off social media." That would be nice, but it's doubtful people would follow the rule. Everyone moves at their own pace, and there may be extenuating circumstances associated with the break-up. For example, a partner has died and the picture is an

important memory, or the couple has children together and the pictures posted include the children. Or, your ex may not have wanted the break-up and finds it comforting to view the pictures of the two of you together. I understand the latter is irritating, but certainly not against the law.

As a disclaimer, I'm not an attorney or a judge, but I have seen your request come across judges' desks on quite a few occasions. My impression is that what you describe is far from harassment. He's not threatening you, and three months ago the pictures were just fine, so there's not much you can do short of simply asking him to remove them. If he declines, however, that's just the way it will have to be. Old pictures of the two of you posted on Facebook are not grounds for a restraining order: "Unfriend" or block him, and you won't have to see his posts. Since it's doubtful he's posting new

pictures of you, that means you're checking his page to see if the pictures are still posted. Stop it and move on.

It's important to note, however, that Facebook posts that threaten or bad-mouth or depict questionable behavior are admissible evidence in divorce or custody hearings. If you have a grievance with an ex, the last place to air that dirty laundry is on a social media website. And, if you

have kids who are your "friends" or even parents of your kids' who are your "friends" who may pass on what you posted to your children, consider the harm you do when you badmouth your children's mother or father in a public forum.

Sales process has more than one negotiation

BEYOND THE SALE PRICE, there are multiple negotiations during the buying and selling process.

The first negotiation is on the sale price. Sellers provide their asking price, which is not set in stone — even with new construction. Buyers can make a formal written offer for whatever price they feel the home is worth.

Your real estate agent can help you figure out the home's value by looking at recent comparable sales in the same area. Your offer will not only include the price, but the terms of the contract: Closing date, earnest money amount, home warranty, inspections, loan, appraisal, survey, etc. The terms, along with the price, are all negotiable.

The buyer will make an offer; the seller will then make a verbal counter-offer, accept, or simply reject the buyer's offer.

Counter-offers continue back and forth until both parties come to an agreement on all terms. When that happens, the changes are made to the contract. Once both the buyer and seller sign, it is an official legally binding contract.

Contingencies in a contract must be met in order for the property to close and transfer ownership. With the home inspection contingency, the buyer has the right to have the home inspected at their expense. From the inspection report, the buyer can request repairs from the seller. This is where the negotiating begins. The seller can: Agree to make the repairs; they can make certain repairs requested, but not all of them; or they can offer money in lieu of repairs. Discussion continues until both parties come to an agreement, or until they agree to disagree and cancel the contract.

Other inspection contingencies include the radon and pest inspection. If treatment is required for either one of these two issues, the buyer will request treatment, and so begins the negotiation process again.

One of the most common negotiated contingencies is the appraisal. A buyer's lender will require an appraisal. Should the home not appraise for equal to or greater than the contract price, the sales price must be re-negotiated.

Both parties in an agreement should be aware of the possible need to negotiate and set themselves up accordingly. A pre-home inspection can help sellers be aware of any high ticket repairs that will need completed before putting the home on the market. Not only will this provide sellers with a more accurate net profit, but it will help buyers feel more confident about purchasing the home.

Remember, when negotiating, you want to respond as quickly as possible. Also, try your hardest to provide a counter-offer so the other party knows what you want, ultimately leading to a faster agreement.

Power up your kitchen's dead zones

Smart use of space is a goal in most homes, but the space between the upper cabinets and countertops is precious. You need to plug in the mixer, keep the iPad close to follow that recipe you discovered online, and be able to grab the cumin and chili powder. Never mind square feet — inches matter here.

And now there are attractive and innovative ways to free up counter space and make the most of every inch, whether you're remodeling or just updating.

Among the options are smartphone and tablet docks, back-splash storage systems and power strips that can add receptacles, lighting and other items.

"With all our clients, increased counter space is usually their primary interest," said kitchen designer Carol Lindell, owner of Design Centers International in Charlotte, N.C.

Clutter steals space, so she sometimes tucks a power strip under cabinets or under the lips of islands to provide power where it's needed, eliminating tangles of cords.

Other times she might place the power strips against the wall under the back edge of the upper cabinets, then add LED lights beneath the front edge.

Hiding the power outlets up under cabinets means you won't have wall plates breaking up the backsplash area. Suddenly, the residents have got a clean surface for the glass or metal tiles they've had their eyes on.

These are examples of under-cabinet systems that can bring style, function and options for customization:

■ **Adorne Under-Cabinet Lighting System:** This new product from Legrand includes LED lighting and power outlets, flip-down docks for tablets and smartphones and cables for recharging. There's a speaker, too.

You can choose linear lighting bars or individual pucks. The system is available in a style that can be plugged in or one that is hard-wired to your home's electric system.

Some components can be ordered from Lowes.com. The basic 27-inch track is \$99.98, a dimmable LED light bar is \$54.98 and a puck light is \$44.98. The tablet cradle is \$19.98, while the mobile phone dock is \$14.98.

There's an online tool at legrand.us that helps you measure your kitchen space and design the system you want. A retail locator can be found at adornemyhome.com.

■ **Backsplash Storage System:** The designs from Hafele



The adorne Under-Cabinet Lighting System combines power and lighting with iPad and iPhone docks, preserving space on your countertop.

America Co., a German company, feature a bar that mounts to the backsplash just beneath the upper cabinets. Individual storage components — made of plated steel in nickel matte finish — hang from the bar and can be moved and rearranged. You can get a sleek European look along with the spice rack and knife block.

Bars are available in four lengths, priced from about \$70 to \$110 at kitchensource.com, one of Hafele's online retailers. The multipurpose shelf is \$105; cookbook holder, \$120; spice rack, \$127; knife holder and block, \$135; wine bottle and glass holder, \$143.

Download a kitchen idea book at hafele.com/us.

■ **Angled Power Strip:** Standard lengths for these systems from Task Lighting are from 9 to 72 inches in brushed nickel, black, brown and white finishes. Get up to two receptacles for the shortest and eight for the longest. Custom sizes and tamper-resistant models in designer colors also are available at tasklighting.com.

You'll also find the Angled Power Strips online. The 24-inch strip is about \$200; the 48-inch model, \$275.

■ **Lighting and gadgets:** Have a long talk with your electrician. You must have appropriate power if you want to add receptacles and ultimately flip on several countertop appliances simultaneously. Also, you might need to accommo-

date transformers or drivers for LED lighting. Will those lights be dimmable? That's another issue.

A TV or other electronic component installed under a cabinet needs to flip up out of the way and rotate for convenience. Look for a separate place to permanently mount a tablet; it can be used to operate music, lights and other sys-

tems. Usually that's in a niche a few steps away from the main cooking area.

Use strip lighting for long runs of countertop and puck lights for specific work spaces. LED lights don't generate much heat and last a long time, while xenon can be less expensive. Pay attention to the quality of light. You don't want it too blue or yellow.

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Support duct work to keep cool this summer

DUCTWORK THAT IS MADE of flexible material is very popular for several reasons. It's much less labor-intensive to install and can make a full run without any joints, eliminating the risk of leaks. But the flexibility that makes it so easy to work with also is a problem if it becomes kinked so that proper air flow is diminished. One thing that you can do is make a holder or a splint where these kinks occur. Use a scrap of cardboard that can be placed under the ductwork to support it at the points where it is being held up by cables or other strapping. These splints work well and will keep you feeling cool all summer long.

DEAR CARRELLS: We had several broken windows as a result of a pretty bad storm. Because we couldn't get anyone out to replace the windows right away, we needed to try to seal them up before more rain came along. I used Great Stuff over the cracks and smaller holes. It covered easily and sealed the windows up tight. It also was waterproof. It wasn't pretty, but worked until we fi-

DEAR AL: I found this great old desk at an auction and just had to have it. After getting it home, I realized that it really needed to be stripped and stained. I love this kind of stuff, but the old finish was really tough to get off. I started off with steel wool but switched to plastic scrubbers that we use on dishes. These work a lot better and don't dis-

integrate like the steel wool. Try them the next time you are stripping furniture. They work great! — S.E.

Q: My azaleas look amazing this year. I put iron on them and can really see the difference. But I can see the iron stains on my front porch. What will remove this rusty stuff? — P.A.

A: Rust removers that contain oxalic acid seem to work the best. You can find them at most hardware stores and even grocery stores in the form of Zud or Barkeeper's Friend. Just follow the directions, and you should be able to remove these stains.

As meanings change, advertising slogans become passe

POLITICAL SLOGANS and pictures from the past can sometimes be confusing because modern times suggest a different meaning. In the 1900 U.S. presidential campaign, William McKinley used the slogans "Protection and Prosperity" and "Four more years of the full dinner pail." His campaign often pictured a workman's lunchbox as a symbol of jobs. One of his most famous buttons, if first seen today, would startle a 2013 voter. The button shows a strange boxlike container — the lunch pail of the day. Inside the pail is a building with smoke pouring from the smokestacks and the words: "Do you smoke? Yes, since 1896." The smoking chimneys on the building represent work being done inside, just as the lunch pail means jobs. Today the smoke could be misinterpreted as pollution, and the answer given to "Do you smoke?" would suggest a health problem. The rare button sold for \$1,948 at a recent Hake's Auction. It's a reminder that both language and symbols can change with

time and events, so collectors should be careful not to interpret objects or words from the past through modern eyes.

Q: My small electric mantel clock has a metal embossed design under the dial. The design includes a seaplane with a propeller that rotates when the clock is running. There's also a sailing ship, a man standing near a tepee and the words "Polar Bird." The case is Bakelite and like new. I can't find a manufacturer's name. Do you know who made it and what it's worth today?

A: A clock matching yours auctioned last year for \$119. Clocks like it, with extra parts that move when the clock is running,

are called "animated clocks." Yours probably dates from the 1930s, the decade following Adm. Richard Byrd's first flights to both the north and south poles. Some sources say the clock was manufactured by the New Jer-

sey Clock Co. of Newark, N.J., with an electric motor made by the Hammond Clock Co. of Chicago. Others say it's a Chronart clock, which may have been a trade name used by the New Jersey Clock Co.

Q: I inherited a ceramic tile mural made up of 24 4-inch tiles. The tiles are not cemented together, but when laid out they picture a large sailing ship, two smaller sailboats and a lighthouse. One tile is signed "Pillsbury." I think the tiles came from a pottery in Ohio. Any information and present value would be appreciated.

A: Hester W. Pillsbury (1862-1951) was a decorator who worked at Roseville and Weller, both Ohio potteries. Roseville Pottery was organized in Roseville, Ohio, in 1890, and opened a plant in nearby Zanesville in 1898. Roseville made pottery until 1954. Weller Pottery started out in Fultonham, Ohio, moved to Zanesville in

1882 and closed in 1948. Hester Pillsbury began working in about 1904 and worked at Weller after 1918. A tile picture like yours, made up of 24 signed tiles, could be worth \$1,000 or more.

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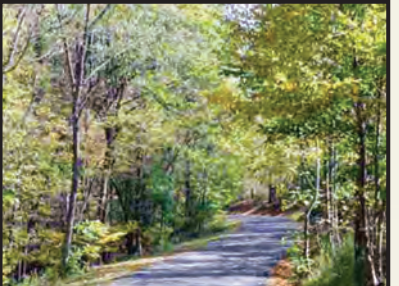

Throw out old containers, food, makeup

AARP is offering suggestions on the five old things you need to throw away during your spring-cleaning exercises this year.

Piled-up plastic containers. Years-old plastics can leak harmful chemicals into food. Recycle them and buy a new set.

Expired canned food. It doesn't last forever.

Moldy makeup. Old dried spices. After five years, most spices lose flavor, so dumping more on won't help.

Pathetic pillows. Pillows older than 18 months contain fungi, dead skin, and dust mites that can aggravate allergies, asthma, and sinusitis.

Q: My showerhead gets a coating of a pink-colored substance. I soak it in a bucket of water with bleach, which removes it, but it soon recurs. What is this and is it detrimental to my health?

A: One online source contends that the pink-colored grit is calcification caused by hard water and that soaking it in water and bleach regularly is what you have to do.

Yet "The Plumber Who Cares" website — Fogarty & Fogarty in South Carolina — talks about the pink stain or ring that "develops at the water line in the toilet, around drains, in the tub/shower area and in bathroom drinking cups."

This is caused, according to the website, by an airborne bacteria known as *serratia marcescens*. The airborne bacteria thrives in moist environments, which is why it is commonly found in some bathrooms.

Bleach doesn't allow the bacteria to form, and drying wet surfaces after use will prevent the bacteria from growing, TPWC says.

Serratia marcescens is commonly associated with urinary tract infections.

Solar-rental options help homeowners

The same pathway that has put many in the seat of a new car — the lease — is taking off as a financial vehicle for homeowners who don't have tens of thousands of dollars sitting around to buy a rooftop solar-panel system outright.

It works like this: A solar company that offers a lease option — like SolarCity and SunGevity — comes to your house to determine whether a solar array would work on your roof. If it's suitable, depending on the company, you can choose either to pay zero upfront and a regular lease fee each month, or you can pay some money up front and have lower or no monthly lease fees.

A rooftop solar system from SolarCity, for example, that's guaranteed to produce a little more than 6,000 kilowatt hours annually might cost \$63 a month with nothing up front. The payment is set to increase 2.9 percent annually, which the company says is lower than average price increases from the utilities.

Putting some money down on the system — say, \$2,500 — would lower the monthly payment to \$53 and erases the yearly per-

cent increase. The last option would be to pay the lease upfront, which would cost \$7,920 and results in no monthly payments for all 20 years of the lease.

While the solar company handles installation, does maintenance and ensures the system's productivity, it also collects the subsidies and tax credits that the state and federal government give to people willing to invest in the re-

newable energy.

The solar company, not the homeowner, owns the equipment — just like car dealership owns a leased car. And so in many cases, when it comes time for routine maintenance or repairs, the company is responsible. When the lease ends, you have the option of buying the system, renewing the lease or having it removed. If you move out, the solar systems also can be

transferred to a new owner.

SolarCity, a California solar outfit, has signed more than 40,000 leases nationwide. The company's chairman, Elon Musk, is the CEO of electric car company Tesla Motors and spacecraft firm Space Exploration Technologies, or SpaceX.

In May, Goldman Sachs said it would put up \$500 million in financing for SolarCity leases, a chunk of

the \$40 billion the investment bank plans to set aside for renewable projects in the next decade.

"The ability to get in front of homeowners is kind of the biggest hurdle," said Lee Keshishian, SolarCity's head of operations for the East Coast. "Once we get there, the vast majority decide to go with us."

On the money and billing side, with the leased system, homeowners will now get two bills a month — one for the lease payment and the usual electric bill from the utility — and the savings from the system comes when the total of those two bills is lower than previous energy bills.

Keshishian said that most customers see a 10 percent to 20 percent drop in their energy bills. And SolarCity, as well as other companies, also ensure the system's productivity for the entire 20-year lease.

Jay Pelchar, a high school math teacher who lives in Burlington, Conn., went with SolarCity after wading into the complicated world of solar systems. He researched the tax credits and the subsidies, took a step back, and sought help.

"The learning curve on this is enormous," said Pelchar, 45.

5 shrubs offer plenty of potential for showy summer

Making spring colorful with flowering shrubs is so easy. Just look around. Summer is different. Here are five flowering shrubs you can plant right now that grow well in the Piedmont and bloom in summer.

Butterfly rose

The multicolored flowers change in color as they mature from pale yellow to orange to pink to deep pink. The five petals on each bloom open in a fashion that reminds people of colorful butterflies. This is a low-maintenance, long-blooming rose that

works well as a tall hedge or against a tall wall. It grows at least 3 feet tall and can reach 6 feet, with a width of 2 to 5 feet. Grow and train it as a large shrub or a tall climber. Given full sun, the bloom show continues into autumn.

Butterfly bush

New varieties have expanded the palette into vivid purples and reds and pretty pinks and blues. This deciduous shrub — yes, butterflies love it — loses its leaves in the winter. But correct pruning in late winter produces a shrub filled with new growth that bears flowers in summer. Some are as short as 4 to 5 feet; others soar to 10 or higher.

Carolina allspice

This native shrub bears flowers of a very unusual shape with an even more unusual color. The flowers, a frilly assembly of strap-shaped petals, emerge red in late spring to early summer as reddish maroon, then become brownish around mid-summer. The brown, urn-shaped fruit that follows is also interesting and persists until fall. This plant, often on lists of old-fashioned shrubs, requires space and looks best standing alone to allow the loose and airy shape to be revealed. It grows 6 to 10 feet high and wide, will tolerate the shade of filtered sunlight.

Summer sweet

While gardenias get the most attention as perfumer of the landscape, summer sweet is even better because it blooms longer, often through June, July and August. It makes a roundish shrub. A named variety called Hummingbird grows 3 to 4 feet tall and a bit wider. This compact size and shape makes it suited for smaller landscapes and mixing with other flowering shrubs. Summer sweet is one of the few good shrubs that will tolerate wet soil. The fragrant blooms are made up of little florets arranged in an attractive elongated cone shape. It also comes in varieties with pink and

rosy-pink flowers such as Ruby Spice and Rosea.

Hardy hibiscus

The hardy hibiscus shrubs have been eclipsed in recent years. But new colors revived interest in the old-fashioned rose of Sharon, which makes a quick-growing, summer-flowering hedge that can reach 10 feet. Better pinks, glowing whites and vivid blues offer interesting and better choices to the washed-out pinks and blues of another day. And if you wish to go really vivid, there are the bright reds of Hibiscus moscheutos, named Lord Baltimore, which blooms midsummer to autumn.

Summer can inspire home's decor all year

The sun-drenched colors and inviting textures of summer provide plenty of decorating ideas. The trick is doing it right: A summer-inspired interior can become a tacky, tropical disaster if it's done with too heavy a hand.

But with a light touch and strategic choices, your home can be brightened all year long by the fleeting beauty of summer.

Above all, "do not be literal with summer," says Los Angeles-based designer Betsy Burnham. Avoid putting up a sign that says, "Gone Fishin'" or displaying a collection of seashells on a table.

Instead, try examining the colors inside a handful of shells, then decorating a room in those shades. Or upholster one piece of furniture in crisp, summery linen, rather than slip-covering an entire room that way.

Designer Joe Lucas of Lucas Studio in West Hollywood, Calif., agrees: A life preserver with the words "To the Beach" painted on it may not be something you want to hang up, he says, even if you really live a block from the beach. But a mix of sand-colored paint and ocean blue fabrics can be a tasteful reminder of summers by the shore.

Here, Burnham, Lucas and decorademon.com founder Brian Patrick Flynn offer tips on successfully using summer as your design inspiration.

Summer is relaxation

"Summery interiors are best described as relaxed," Flynn says. "While autumnal and wintry spaces are packed with rich velvets and earthy palettes, summery spaces are super-light, unstructured and pretty darn casual."

Flynn uses deliberate contrast to point up that casual feeling: "I like to juxtapose super-relaxed elements such as slipcovers or bedding made from washed linen with super-tailored elements such as tailored tartan or pinstripe accents. The result is preppy, but still casual."

Summer is color

One option is a palette of muted summer colors (sandy beiges, soft driftwood grays, nautical blues), which can be used throughout a room without overpowering it.

Lucas is a fan of very pale gray wall colors that include just a hint of green or blue. They look great alongside natural, pale wood furniture.

Flynn recommends "washed-out blue" wall colors, such as "Krypton" by Sherwin-Williams or "Drenched Rain" by Dunn-Edwards. "Blues with the perfect amount of gray in them tend to be timeless and also work as 'new neutrals' — colors with tons of personality which tend to work well with almost every other hue out there, as opposed to boring beiges and taupes."

These muted blues pair beautifully with white, he says: "The mix of blue and white together is totally timeless, plus it can be mixed up in many different ways to update the look. Almost all colors accent blue and white well."

The other summery option is to go vivid, using grassy greens, geranium reds, deep corals and the teal of tropical waters. Done right, these colors can elevate the look of a room.

"I'm a huge fan of teal and coral," Flynn says. "I especially love them together, since it strikes the perfect balance of feminine and masculine."

But tread carefully. To balance out these saturated colors, Burnham suggests bringing in plenty of crisp white.

Summer is painted wood

"People always think that they have to have their wood finished in a stain," Burnham says. "Why not a painted finish? Paint your bookcases white... It's summery, but livable year-round. Or try painting a floor somewhere in your house."

Lucas agrees: "We're always pushing clients to paint out their dark cabinets," he says. "Everyone thinks their library has to be stained a rich mahogany or dark walnut," but there are better approaches. "Paint it an off-blue-grey or lacquer it a fun, brighter color."

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Foreclosures are cheap, but pitfalls could await

Back in 2011, Christina and Brian Jenkins decided to take up a sideline as landlords. Since then, they've acquired three rental houses in the St. Louis area. Two of them were foreclosures.

They have advice for those who want to pick up a foreclosed house on the cheap, and it comes from a fairy tale.

"You have to go through a lot of frogs before you find a prince," Christina Jenkins said.

The frogs may have ripped-out plumbing, or a crumbling roof or an air conditioner that disappeared. The princes sit in nice neighborhoods and need some paint, carpeting and other minor fixes.

The princes and frogs

have one thing in common. They're usually cheap compared with houses of similar size in the neighborhood. That's what attracts landlords as well as would-be homeowners.

To a buyer, a foreclosure is a mystery house. The old homeowner is long gone, so there's no one to fill out disclosure forms listing problems with the house.

Homeowners facing foreclosure do little maintenance, and the process can drag on for more than a year. Even with the homeowner gone, the house can sit vacant for months before the bank puts it on the market — time for roofs to start leaking, thieves to rip out the copper pipes, basements to fill up with water and mold to climb the walls.

That's why buyers

should make purchase offers contingent on a professional building inspection. The banks and government agencies that own foreclosed homes generally won't make repairs. But at least the buyers will know what they're getting into.

In the Jenkinses' last foreclosure purchase, the carpet smelled and the house needed "elbow grease," Christina Jenkins said. But the hardwood floors were pretty and the Jenkinses thought renters would like it.

They found themselves in a bidding war. "There were multiple offers. We went back and forth two or three times — once after we gave them our 'best and highest' offer," she said.

Bidding wars are becoming more common on the best foreclosures, real estate agents say.

Life insurance not necessary if saving smart

Q: Is it ever too late to get life insurance? — Tiffany

A: The only time it's really too late to get life insurance is after you're dead!

But seriously, if you're older than 70, it becomes pretty difficult to get affordable coverage, because insurance companies figure you've pretty much got one foot in the grave at that point.

You can get term life insurance pretty easily up until about age 70, and there are a few policies available past that point, depending on your health situation. But you really shouldn't need life insurance when you're that age and older. Hopefully, you've invested, saved, and set aside enough money to pay burial expenses and for a spouse — if you have one — to live on after you're gone.

Q: My father is terminally ill, and my two brothers and I recently had a talk with dad about his estate. He wants everything, except his house, left to us. He would like it to go to his long-time girlfriend, but it's not written that way in the will. Should we have the will changed to reflect this desire? — Dan

A: I'm really sorry about your dad. I know this isn't easy for you guys, but I'm glad you're all working together to make things right. Yes, the will needs to be changed to reflect his wishes where the house is concerned. If he is still of sound mind and able to make that decision independently, the will should describe exactly what he wants to happen with every piece of his estate.

There is an alternative, though. It's fine if he simply wants to give her the house. But he could also leave her a life estate that says she gets the use of the home as long as she's alive. Then, upon her death, it would revert to you. Essentially, the house would be left to you, but she would have use of it during her life.

This is a more traditional approach in these kinds of situations, but it's your dad's will and his estate. He can do whatever he wants. But remember, if he deeds the house to you and you give it to her, you'll have a gift-tax situation on your hands. You don't want to get into that mess.

Workers lose ground on wages

Competition from China and other low-wage rivals, coupled with fallout from the 2007-'09 financial crisis, has put American wages under such unprecedented strain that they have shifted into reverse — not merely stagnating, but falling.

"Water finds its equilibrium, its own level," said Jeff Joerres, chief executive of Milwaukee-based global staffing giant Manpower-Group Inc., who refers to this ac-

celerating leveling of wages as "global labor arbitrage."

"It's happening so fast on a global scale that it's scary," Joerres said.

In the U.S., the phenomenon is not limited to isolated and vulnerable sectors, such as commodity manufacturing. Rather, wages have fallen across the entire national economy — down 1.1 percent in the 12-month period from September 2011 to September 2012, the most recent comparisons available.

"Average weekly wages de-

clined in every industry except for information," the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported in its latest economic census.

That quarterly report has shown year-over-year declines only six times since the data collection began in 1978 — and four of those have occurred since 2009.

Nor is the United States the only advanced economy in the world affected. The average of wages in western Europe, Japan and the U.S. fell in a "double dip," declining in both 2008 and 2011, according to the Swiss-based In-

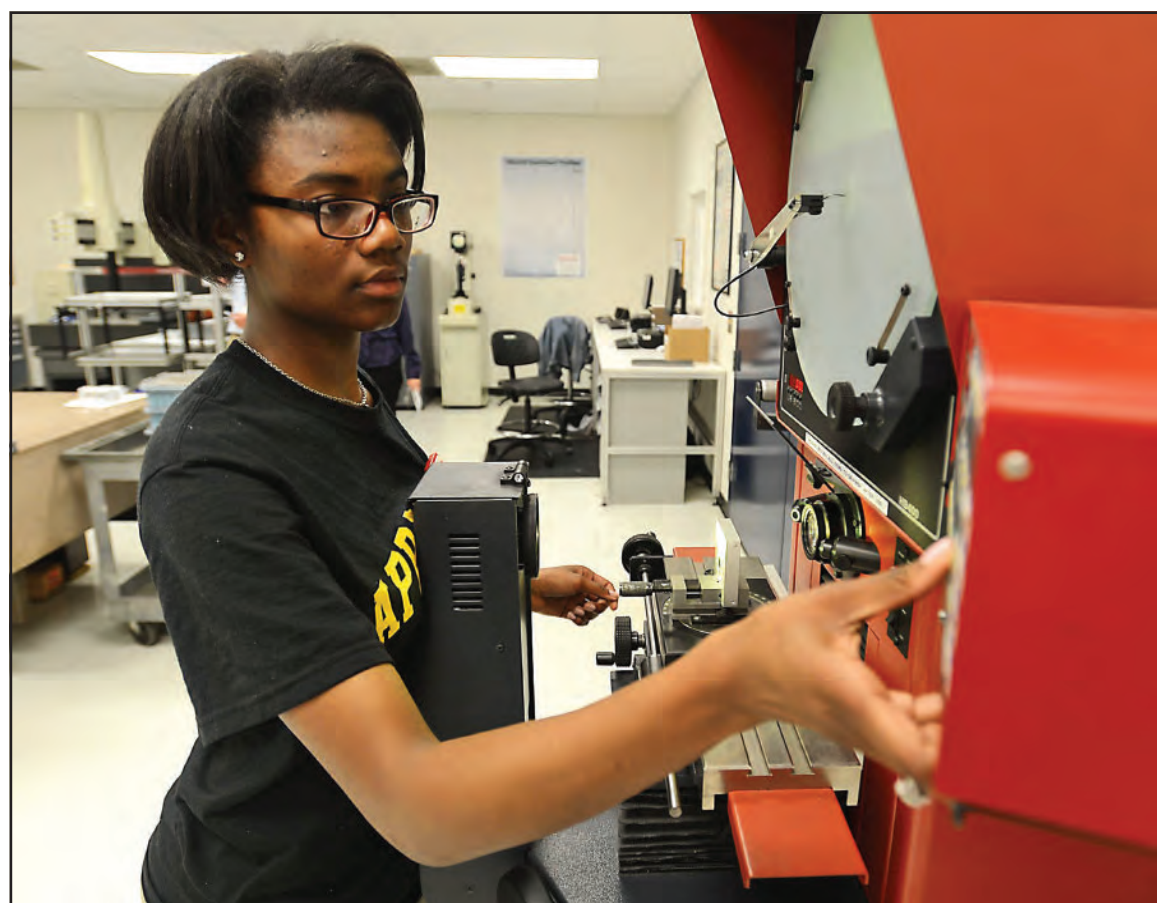
ternational Labor Organization.

In China, meanwhile, wages have roughly tripled in the past decade, leading a trend of rising wages among developing economies such as Brazil, Peru and eastern Europe, the ILO said.

"This is not a rosy path, folks," Joerres said. "We don't get to choose our borders in which we create our own rules."

The viselike pay squeeze promises to become more common as global economies become more connected — "the new normal," according to Joerres.

Apprenticeships may be the future

By springtime, a lot of high school seniors are cruising to the end of school. Maceo Rucker-Shivers can't afford to join them.

His class work at Olympic High School's math/science school in Charlotte, N.C., and his after-school job at nearby Bosch Rexroth Corp. are preparing him for work as a machinist technician. His supervisors at the German company are watching to see whether his skills and work ethic justify paying his tuition at community college after graduation.

"You have to bring your A-game every day," Rucker-Shivers said.

His career-focused studies led him to discover a passion for building precision manufacturing equipment. "Machines excite me. They really do," he said, beaming.

Rucker-Shivers may represent

the future of public education.

It's a future with closer links among K-12 schools, community colleges and private employers, influenced by the European apprenticeship model. It's one where the "college for all" mantra yields to a recognition that for many students, training for skilled jobs is more meaningful than a four-year degree. And it's one where promising students can start earning right away — sometimes while they're in high school — rather than taking on college debt.

"Pathways to Prosperity," a 2011 report from the Harvard Graduate School of Education, spelled out the challenge: America's current approach to academics is not only failing the students who drop out of high school. Almost half the students who enroll in a four-year college leave without a diploma, the report notes. For minority and low-income students, even fewer finish college.

The recommended solution: Multiple pathways to adult-

hood, with employers playing a greater role in shaping those paths. In European vocational systems, the report says, employers and educators not only develop the next generation of workers; they also help young people transition to adulthood.

Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools (CMS) Superintendent Heath Morrison is among those pushing this model. The 2013-'14 CMS budget calls for creating career-tech hubs at traditional high schools and launching new magnets focused on internships and career skills. Olympic, a model for the school district, got a head start when it split into five career-themed academies in 2006. Business partnerships, career exploration and real-life projects were central to the new approach.

"All that testing stuff and all that rote memorization stuff is not going to help you in the real world," said career development coordinator Michael Realon.

Unleash your inner Buffy on office vampires

GOOD NEWS. The vampires are back!

About a year ago, I introduced you to "emotional vampires," a term created by a West Coast clinical psychologist to describe all the nasty, terrible, irritating people who drain our will to live.

Albert Bernstein has taken his clever psychological construct and applied it to the workplace, publishing a book called "Emotional Vampires at Work: Dealing with Bosses and Coworkers Who Drain You Dry."

Bernstein's descriptions of narcissistic managers and approval-seeking co-workers are spot-on, but what's invaluable is the book's pragmatic strategies for handling the humanoids who drive us nuts.

Central to the emotional vampire idea is recognition that lying sales reps and bosses who manage via motivational aphorisms are not simply annoying — they likely have personality disorders. That means your hopes of pointing out their flaws and encouraging them to change are useless. What you must do, Bernstein says, is understand — and outthink — them.

In the book, he writes: "Emotional vampires themselves are not necessarily aware of the irrational needs that animate them. Like young children, they don't do much self-examination; they just go after what they want. This is the area of vulnerability you must exploit. If you know the need, you know the vampire. If you know what to expect, then you can defend yourself."

We have natural emotional responses to all types of vampires — the narcissist makes us angry, paranoid people make us defensive.

The key is to bypass your gut reaction and slow down your thinking.

"When somebody does something we don't like, our urge is to fight back or run away, and neither one of those works particularly well when it comes to dealing with these people," Bernstein said in an interview. "We have to think about people in a different way than we are programmed to think of them. You're not going to be able to change their view of the world or their personality. So approach them from the standpoint of what they believe."

I asked Bernstein whether he thought we'd ever rid the working world of these blood-suckers. Sadly, he predicts the nightmare is here to stay.

"All of these people with personality disorders, they aren't going to go away," he said. "They're going to find their place."

And so we must find ours, as workplace vampire hunters.

Which, when you think about it, is a pretty awesome title to have.

New college graduates find job market less than welcoming

Jackie Carter had it all mapped out. She would attend college year-round and graduate early, land a job in criminal justice, start paying off student loans, move into her own apartment and invest in her first smartphone.

But the 22-year-old Towson University graduate has seen her life after college veer off course. Carter, who graduated in December with a degree in sociology/anthropology with a criminal justice concentration, is living with her parents in Fallston, Md., working as an intern and wondering whether her original goals are forever out of reach.

"If someone had told me freshman year of college that this is where I'd be 3 1/2 years later, I wouldn't believe you," said Carter, who has applied for 20 government jobs and lost one potential offer when the position was cut. "I thought I was going to have a job last spring. I was being interviewed. Now here I am — it's May, and I'm still kind of stuck."

Though the economic recovery has led to some hiring improvements, it remains a tough time to be a new college graduate.

Armed with degrees but little experience, this year's job candidates are part of the sixth consecutive class to push its way into a labor market with elevated joblessness and depressed

wages. Federal spending cuts are making the hunt for government jobs even more competitive, and forcing some contractors and health care providers to cut back.

Recent college graduates face unemployment of 8.8 percent, compared with 5.7 percent in 2007, when the recession started. Underemployment, which adds in those who have given up searching and part-timers who want full-time jobs, has climbed to 18.3 percent for recent college graduates, compared with 9.9 percent in 2007, according to an Economic Policy Institute analysis of federal Bureau of Labor Statistics data.

"It's just bad luck, their misfortune to be born in a year that dumped them into this labor

market," said Heidi Shierholz, a labor market economist at the Washington-based institute. She doesn't expect the market to return to prerecession employment levels for at least five more years at the current rate of job creation. "The outlook for the future does not look that great."

Shierholz said more recent graduates will have trouble finding work or will find jobs that don't require college degrees. And those who are hired will have lower wages on average, she said.

Even worse, she added, "they are unlikely to recover from that bad start." It could take an additional 10 to 15 years for them to reach the wages and stability they would have had if they started out in a stronger economy, she said.

After manager leaves, keep team together

Q: A manager on my team has moved on to a different company. We have a very cohesive group; what can I do to minimize the disruption from his departure and maintain the team's strength?

A: Don't hide from the emotions, and let other team members show their strengths.

Deal with your own feelings first. When a team is running smoothly, a loss like this can be hard to take. Take some deep breaths and focus inward until you're feeling calm. You likely have a mix of emotions on behalf of your employee — while you may be happy for him for the new opportunity, you are probably sad, too, and possibly angry. These are all honest responses, so take some time to acknowledge them.

Shift your focus to your team. Consider the reactions they may be having, individual by individual, and the type of support each will need during the transition. Keep in mind that, like you, they will have a wide range of reactions. Give particular thought to the needs of people who reported to this manager.

You'll also need to determine your strategy for replacing this person and ensuring that the team's work gets done. Evaluate your team's strengths, and use this as a chance to make changes and build on your current success.

Finally, stop and think about why your team is strong and cohesive. What is the culture, and what is the role of each person in creating it? What do you bring? The departing manager? Each team member?

Your team is affected as a whole, so address the situation as a whole. Set up a team meeting to talk about the change, and the challenges and opportunities that come from it. It's important to let people express concerns openly and have them validated. At the same time, you'll want to convey a clear sense of optimism; people will follow the leadership message you send. Talk, too, about your understanding of your team's culture and the priority you place on nurturing it.

It's also important to take decisive action on hiring decisions. If this presents a realistic opportunity to promote from within the team, that will help with continuity and sends a message of growth potential. It can also add a level of challenge for the new manager — that's a topic for another column. If it's more appropriate to hire from outside the team, then you'll need to prepare yourself and the team to help the new manager with the inevitable learning curve.

This isn't a "one and done" situation; you'll want to check in with people over the next few weeks and months to be sure that the team is rebounding from the change so that you can address any issues as they come up.

You'll also need support, because your workload during the transitional period will inevitably be greater. Make a plan to manage that, getting support from your boss and colleagues, and ensure that you have sufficient stress management activities underway.

Changes can be hard, but you can lead through this one to maintain the strength of your team.

'Involuntary' part-time jobs grow

There always have been part-time jobs. Some workers want them. Some employers provide them out of financial and scheduling necessity.

Since the Great Recession began, though, the proportion of involuntary part-time employment has grown, and there are signs the Affordable Care Act is

swelling those ranks as employers prepare to reduce their health-insurance coverage responsibility for full-time employees.

When the economic collapse began in late 2007, an estimated 24.7 million Americans worked part time. That number now is 27.5 million, about one-fifth of the labor force.

A small share of the part-time growth is fueled by workers' preferences.

They're juggling school and work, or family and work, or downscaling their work lives as they near retirement. Part-time hours fit their needs.

But according to U.S. Department of Labor household surveys, most of the recent part-time job growth is not by workers' choice. In the latest national jobs report, covering April 2013, nearly 8 million workers — about one-third of all

part-timers — said they were involuntarily part time.

The Labor Department classifies such involuntary part time as "for economic reasons." That means that only part-time hours were offered because of "slack work or business conditions" or job hunters could find only part-time work.

Indications also abound that employers around the country are turning full-time into part-time jobs

to avoid employee health care coverage requirements that will kick in next year.

Beginning in 2014, businesses that have more than 50 full-time-equivalent employees must offer their full-time workers access to a qualified health care plan or pay a penalty of \$2,000 a person. The health care law defines a full-time employee as anyone working more than 30 hours a week.

According to study, nursing grads have lowest unemployment rate

About a month after passing his state licensing exam, Arthur Greenbank was cashing a paycheck in his field.

The University of Akron (Ohio) graduate is not alone: Of all the majors that students can choose, it is nursing that offers the best chance for employment.

"I tell graduates not to worry, that they almost certainly will land a job within a few months of graduating," UA nursing administrator Cheryl Buchanan said. "If they would go to Florida or Michigan, they would find a job immediately."

Researchers at the Georgetown University Center on Education and the Workforce examined 2009 and 2010 U.S. census data to determine what college majors are most likely to lead to jobs.

"People need to pay attention to this," center director Tony Carnevale said. "It tells you that if you really want to be an architect, that's fine, but you're going to have to think more about what your plan is."

"Hard Times, College Majors, Unemployment and Earnings 2013: Not All College Degrees are Created Equal" says the unemployment rate for recent nursing graduates is 4 percent. Meanwhile, the typical unemployment rate for majors in many liberal arts fields is double that, and that of architecture and fine arts graduates is more than triple at 13.9 and 11.1 percent, respectively.

What the researchers don't know is if the graduates were working in their major. Some college majors don't have clear career paths.

That was reflected in the unemployment rates for area ethnic and civilization studies (10.1 percent) and philosophy and religious studies (10.8 percent).

Other majors, such as architecture, have suffered in the economic downturn, although their unemployment is gradually getting better, Carnevale said.

In fact, only 50 to 54 percent of recent college graduates are working in their majors, Carnevale said in an interview. Only 30 percent of art graduates are, for example.

That means that some "employed" college graduates really might be working in fields once reserved for high school graduates: the proverbial English major driving a cab, for instance.

That can be an expensive outcome, given the cost of college.

"There is lots of pressure now to find out what the value of the college major is," Carnevale said.

He said that graduates with certificates in heating and air conditioning from a community college can make more than typical graduates with bachelor's degrees.

"It's all about the field of study," he said.

Buchanan, the UA nursing administrator, said all 55 of the spring 2012 nursing graduates who responded to a UA survey are working in their field or are attend-

ing graduate school.

One of those who is working is Greenbank, who landed at Akron-based Summa Health System about one month after passing his nursing boards. His odyssey to employment might have been abetted by a certification in gerontology, experience working at a nursing home and medical missions to Haiti.

"There were lots of jobs available, but there were a lot of colleges putting out students," he said.

About 20 schools and colleges offer nursing programs in Northeast Ohio alone.

Laura Dzurec, dean of the Kent State College of Nursing, said the recession has propelled some would-be retirees to stay on the job longer than they otherwise might. If the economy improves, they will retire and an even larger well will open up for new nurses — and not only in hospitals.

"The nice thing about nursing is that you can do just about anything with a nursing degree," she said.

"If you want to do research, great. If you want to work with a pharmaceutical company, great. If you want to work with patients, great."

Students have heard that clarion call: Kent State turns away 20 percent of its qualified applicants every year because it doesn't have room for them.

Although nursing might be the fastest route to a paycheck, other majors can eclipse it in salary, according to the Georgetown study.

Electrical engineering (\$57,000), mechanical engineering (\$58,000) and civil engineering (\$50,000) pay more at the start than nursing (\$48,000). Same with graduate degrees: Those in nursing earn \$81,000 compared with \$107,000 for majors in pharmaceutical sciences and administration, \$96,000 for chemistry majors and \$101,000 for economics majors.

"The variation in earnings by major has increased," Carnevale said.

Interviews must have clear ideas

Guy Horst, a sales and management professional with a 25-year career, often has job-specific questions to ask when he's in an interview. And, he says, he has ideas to share that should help his candidacy.

"But it's tough to even have the conversation with people who don't have the background," Horst told me.

The problem, he says, is inability to communicate with the human resource generalist who does the first-round interview. And he can't figure out a polite or productive way to do an end-around.

It's a challenge I hear often from mid-career professionals. They say they want to share what they know with the organization. But, sometimes, they say the interviewer simply doesn't understand the specific job.

After a recent unsatisfying interview, Horst is contemplating writing a letter to the company's vice president of sales and sharing some ideas he had tried to convey in the interview. But he doesn't want to insult the human resource department.

"I want to focus on the process, not the problem," he told me. "But how to write it without coming off as arrogant or saying, 'You're doing this wrong?'"

Horst's quandary is why many career counselors say it can be helpful to avoid the formal application/interview process. Ideally, one has contacts in the industry or the company and can make personal connection within the target department or supervisor.

Realistically, that's not always possible. So it's wise for applicants to practice interview responses so as to not "talk down" to interviewers. The goal: Explain in common language how one's skills and experience are a perfect fit for the employer.

Boss must focus on particular offense in coaching situations

Q: Whenever my employees have a complaint about a co-worker, they ask me to handle the problem without mentioning their name. If the issue is trivial, I tell them to talk with the other party directly, but sometimes there are policy matters that I need to address.

Because I did not personally observe these transgressions, I always have to explain how I learned about them. This puts me in an awkward position, since the accused co-worker immediately wants to know who told me. How do I handle this without breaking any confidences?

A: When confronted with performance issues,

employees frequently try to throw their manager off track by changing the subject. "Who said that?" is a common diversionary tactic, typically delivered in a highly indignant tone, followed by "I have a right to know who's complaining about me."

In reality, however, the person has absolutely no right to know who brought the problem to your attention. After all, this is a coaching discussion, not a trial. So you

must quickly deflect this diversion and get back to the topic at hand.

Having made a definitive statement, you must return to your coaching agenda without further debate. Should this prove to be difficult, that's a sure sign that you need to strengthen your managerial spine.

Q: The team I lead was recently given an award in a company-wide meeting. During the presentation, our group's accomplishments were never described at all. We were just called to the stage, handed the award, and congratulated by management.

This lack of appreciation was devastating

to my team members. After the meeting, one employee commented that she felt like an unwanted stepchild. How can I motivate the group after such a big letdown?

A: Seriously? Your employees are "devastated" after receiving an award in front of the entire company? Since you offer no logical reason for this peculiar response, I can only conclude that you are supervising a bunch of narcissistic whiners.

As the leader of these malcontents, you need to understand that managers often have the power to influence perception. A mature leader would try to lift their spirits by injecting a dose of reality.

For example: "Even though our accomplishments weren't specifically described in the meeting, I can assure you that management is aware of them. After all, that's why we got the award! You should really be proud of yourselves, because everyone has been impressed with your hard work this year."

Carefully consider whether your own reaction to this event may have contributed to your team's unhealthy attitude. If so, then you should immediately take steps to undo that damage.

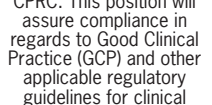

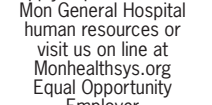

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Toyota takes sleek turn with Avalon

Toyota's flagship sedan, the Avalon, is stylishly elegant for 2013, offers more technology and safety features than ever and has a new, noticeably controlled and poised ride.

The Avalon also impresses with a base retail price that's some \$2,200 less than the starting retail price for last year's Avalon.

The price cut to a starting manufacturer's suggested retail price, including destination charge, of \$31,785, stems in part from the moonroof being removed from the list of Avalon standard equipment.

But leather seat and steering wheel trim, heated front seats and power-adjustable driver and front-passenger front seats remain on every Avalon.

The base engine — last year's smooth and powerful 268-horsepower, 3.5-liter V-6 — is still there, too, and is mated to an updated six-speed automatic.

Meantime, new standard features in the Avalon include 10 air bags, up from seven last year. There's a new eBin, too, where drivers can manage and store away plug-in devices like phone, radar detector, etc.

Perhaps best of all, *Consumer*

Toyota increased features and decreased the price for 2013's Avalon.

Reports puts predicted reliability of the new Avalon at better than average.

The 2013 Avalon is about 2 inches shorter in overall length and about an inch shorter in height than its predecessor. But it still looks generously sized, and some auto critics still refer to the Avalon as a large sedan though

the federal government continues to classify it as a mid-size.

Interior dimensions for passengers are not changed much from last year's model, save for rear-seat legroom which went from 40.9 inches in the 2012 Avalon to 39.2 inches in the new car. Cargo room in the Avalon now is a surprising 16 cubic feet vs. 14.4

cubic feet last year. Much of this space is under the rear window.

But other interior space dimensions are pretty much unchanged. For example, rear-seat headroom of 37.5 inches is nearly identical to that of last year's Avalon, and front-seat headroom of 38.5 inches is just 0.4 inch less than that in the 2012 Avalon.

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MOTORING Q&A

Fusion had ugly buildup on battery

Q: When I left my car key in the "on" position by mistake overnight, the battery naturally went dead. When a road assistance person jump-started the car, he showed me the terminals. There was enough green/blue substance to fill a small ice cream cone, and he said it was the worst he had ever seen. It took me a long time to finally clean it up. Is it routine for this to happen in a 2010 Ford Fusion or any other make of automobile?

A: Not routine, but not uncommon. The "yuck" buildup on the battery terminals is usually lead sulfate caused by the battery electrolyte — sulfuric acid — reacting with the lead battery post. A poor seal between post and plastic case can lead to this buildup, as can overcharging, loose terminal connections, dirt, moisture and salt.

It's important to recognize that this buildup is toxic — take care to avoid ingesting, inhaling or having any contact with this corrosion. I've used carbonated sugar-free soft drinks and a wire brush to remove the corrosion. Then flush thoroughly with water to dilute and remove all the sulfate. Clean, reassemble and solidly tighten the battery terminals. An anticorrosion spray, paste or even petroleum jelly can help prevent this buildup.

In the case of your vehicle, this buildup may have simply accumulated with no routine battery maintenance. But it might be worth having the charging system tested to make sure the battery is not being overcharged.

Q: We bought a used 2005 Chrysler PT Cruiser. We noticed that when we use the air conditioning, it runs cold until we stop for a red light. Then we get warm/hot air until we're moving again. Is that a quirk with the Cruisers or is it a problem we need to address?

A: Check the simple things, like the refrigerant state of charge, drive belt, cleanliness of the front of the condenser and radiator. It can be normal for the compressor clutch to cycle the A/C compressor on and off at idle, which will affect the outlet temperature.

Q: The passenger power windows on my 2004 Dodge Ram quad-cab operate properly with the driver's master switches, but the window switches in the passenger doors do not work. All fuses are good and the driver's master switch module has been replaced, all to no avail. Suggestions?

A: A careful review of this vehicle's wiring diagrams in my Alldata database confirms that each passenger power window has two sources of 12-volt power to operate the windows up and down, both controlled by the power window control module/switches in the driver's door. If the "lockout" button is activated in this module, no power will reach the individual passenger window switches, preventing them from being operated independently. In this mode, only the master switches/module on the driver's door can operate the windows.

Since the module has been replaced, I'd look for an open circuit in the harness from the module, through the door jamb and into the body harness.

Q: My 2004 Jeep Grand Cherokee with 134,568 miles runs fine, but has one scary glitch. When driving at speeds of 60 to 65 miles per hour, if you take your foot off the gas, the entire car lurches suddenly but slightly to the left. When you put your foot back on the gas, the car lurches suddenly back to the right. It seems like it is caused by torque somehow, but my mechanic doesn't have a clue.

A: I'd be more suspicious of a significant wheel alignment issue or, more seriously, a loose, worn or broken drivetrain mount or suspension/steering component. A careful inspection of the chassis, suspension and steering is the first step, and if nothing is found, perhaps a four-wheel alignment would help.

Tesla receives best-ever rating

The Tesla Model S high-end electric sedan has garnered a rare honor from *Consumer Reports*, with one significant caveat.

Consumer Reports gave the Model S its highest score, a 99 out of 100. In the past, the Lexus LS has also achieved a score of 99.

But the Tesla still has too limited a history on the road to earn

it CR's equally coveted "Recommended Buy" rating.

"Despite its stratospheric road-test score, we can't recommend the Model S until we have sufficient reliability data," *Consumer Reports* explained.

Sales of the Model S began only last summer. Business began to ramp up toward the end of the year, with the Palo Alto, Calif., automaker exceeding its

first quarter 2013 expectations by selling 4,900 of the cars.

"Slipping behind the wheel of the Tesla Model S is like crossing into a promising zero-emissions future," *Consumer Reports* said.

There is uncharacteristic gushing throughout the CR review, such as the following passage:

The car is "brimming with innovation, delivers world-class performance, and is interwoven

throughout with impressive attention to detail. It's what Marty McFly might have brought back in place of his DeLorean in 'Back to the Future.' "

CR said the car, with its lithium-ion battery, delivered road testers a consistent range of about 200 miles, running from a low of about 180 miles on cold winter days to 225 in warmer weather.

SRT Viper a thrilling neck-bender

The 2013 SRT Viper is the sort of car that should come with disability insurance for neck injuries — not only for the whiplash drivers could experience attempting to max out its 206 mph top speed, but for its many admirers who rubberneck, pivot and crane to get a better look.

In the weekend I spent with the dead-sexy, fifth-generation snake, men literally hung out their windows to take pictures. Police cars routinely tailgated and sidled me. Invariably, when I passed a BMW 3 Series on the freeway, that same car would speed up to pace me and smile, to which I responded as one would expect from a Viper — with a wave and a stomp of the accelerator.

The attention is understandable. Curvy in all the right places, if the SRT flagship were any more voluptuously alluring, it would have to be renamed Scarlett Johansson.

Returning after a three-year absence with a complete redesign billed under Chrysler's newly spun-off SRT, or Street and Racing Technology, brand, the newest incarnation Viper is skinned, for the first time, with aluminum door panels and lightweight carbon fiber on the hood, roof and deck lid — all of which contributed to a 100-pound weight savings over the fourth-generation model, which went out of production in 2010. Even the Viper logo has been redesigned with more

dramatically bared fangs, a menacing graphic that graces the one area of the car other drivers are most likely to see: its back end.

The \$99,390-plus Viper uses a slightly more powerful 8.4-liter V-10 engine mounted mid-front under a hood so dramatically elongated I had to jack up the seat just to see. A new double-bubble roof ensures that taller drivers won't inadvertently scrape their hair on the headliner. It's designed to accommodate helmets for the Viper's natural environment: slithering through S curves on a track.

Its pipes are as hypnotizing as a snake charmer's. The exhaust begins with an enticing grumble at idle. By 4,000 rpm, it's become a thrum that lodges in the base of one's brain. By 6,000 rpm, when the engine is approaching peak horsepower, it reaches its most musical, easily heard pitch. The exhaust is literally just outside the doors. It ports to the sides instead of the back.

A street-legal race car, the Viper likes nothing more than speeding into a corner at 5,000 rpm, when it reaches peak torque of 600 foot-pounds — the most of any naturally aspirated sports car in the world.

Tuned for extreme performance, with a new aluminum X brace under the hood to increase rigidity in the turns, a new dual-mode suspension system and a first-for-a-Viper stability control system, it's a machine begging to be thrashed.

For show-pony street driv-

ing, the suspension is a bit rough, even in its softer street mode, but it isn't designed to soak up road imperfections. Whether it's rolling on the track or poorly maintained asphalt, the suspension's intent is to keep the car hunkered. And it does. If the Viper were any more planted in the corners, it would be a tree.

Poised as the chassis is, no one likes to be thrown around a cabin, especially one as expensive as the Viper. While drivers have a leather steering wheel to grip, the passenger has a grab rail mounted to the center console. Both occupants are held in place with new high-performance racing seats shelled in Kevlar and industrial-strength side bolsters that keep passengers as grounded as the car in high-speed turns.

The Viper is so wide and low-slung for handling that getting in and out of the car is an art form. For 2013, the seats are situated an inch lower than the last model. Any lower, and I'd feel like a dog swiping his hindquarters on the grass.

The legroom has likewise expanded dramatically, by 3 1/2 inches — a feat enabled by pushing the cabin even further back in the Viper's long and low chassis.

Speed signs aren't a warning in the Viper. They're a dare to double them. A coiled snake tightly wound for attack, its acceleration is instantaneous, though it requires some double leg work to tap into its power.

Edmunds aims to be Amazon.com for car buyers

Edmunds.com, one of the top websites for car shopping and automotive information, is hoping to revolutionize how people buy cars, and eliminate the No. 1 most frustrating part of the car shopping process.

According to Seth Berkowitz, president and chief operating officer of Edmunds.com, 54 percent of car shoppers say they want more clarity on the exact price of a car, rather than haggle with dealers.

"It is the single largest unmet need," Berkowitz said.

To solve that problem, the Santa Monica, Calif.-based company has quietly rolled out a new product called price promise that allows customers

to ask dealers to email them an exact price for a car or truck they find through Edmunds.com, the company said this week at the Automotive Press Association in Detroit.

Customers can print out the certificate and take it with them to the dealership. The dealer is required to honor the price if the customer decides to buy the car.

Berkowitz said Edmunds.com launched price promise in March with one dealer in Portland, Ore. Since then, more than 600 dealers have signed up.

Ultimately, Berkowitz said, Edmunds.com hopes the product allows the company to become the Amazon.com of car buying.

"We think this product has a lot of legs," he said.

Edmunds.com's price-promise business model is designed to take the uncertainty out of pricing and speed up the buying process. It also comes with the expectation that the customer will be given top-notch customer service.

Dealers who have participated find that they are able to sell their cars for \$300 to \$500 above the average sale price. Customers, Berkowitz said, are willing to pay a little more than the best possible deal if they can save time, get great customer service and know they are getting a fair price.

So far, 14 percent of customers who print out a price-promise certificate follow through with a purchase of the original car or truck they looked at on the company's website, Berkowitz said.

To alleviate tech shortage, Audi eyes vets

IN RESPONSE to soaring vehicle sales and a shortage of qualified service technicians, Audi of America, based in Herndon, is launching the Veterans to Technicians Program. The new corporate initiative is aimed at recruiting former military technicians whose skills might be valuable in auto dealership service departments.

"In normal circumstances, there's always a shortage," said Bradley Stertz, communications manager for Audi of America. But Stertz said the company is expecting a technician shortage once new models arrive.

That problem is exacerbated by the brand's rising sales. Audi sold a record 139,310 vehicles in the United States last year, and is looking to boost that to 200,000 by the end of the decade. As the company's sales grow, so does the demand for service.

Audi developed the program with Calibre, an Alexandria-based company that has worked with the Department of Defense and Department of Veterans Affairs in helping with transition services.

Bernie Hyland, a retired army colonel, is the program's manager at Calibre. He became a loyal Audi owner when faced with a three-hour daily commute.

Hyland happened to meet Reinhard Fisher, the director of strategy for Audi, at a function. As they talked, they realized that they shared a common interest. Fisher had dealers who had inquired about hiring veterans, while Hyland had just met with the VA about "finding ways to put our veteran talent pool to work."

"They're growing at an extraordinary rate," Hyland said of Audi, "and in order to sustain that, they need to find the best talent where they can find it."

Veterans who apply must have an honorable discharge and three to five years of direct experience in a military unit's maintenance operations. Currently serving members of the National Guard and Reserve are eligible to apply.

Applicants must pass pre-employment screening and Audi technician skill checks. If hired, veterans complete a two-week Audi product and technology training program.

Hyland admits that Audi isn't the first company to help train and hire veterans — Wal-Mart, GE and even General Motors have done so. But it's the first among high-end European luxury brands.

Hyland sees today's vets, especially younger ones who have grown up with technology, as a natural fit. They've serviced some of the world's most advanced electronics and weapons systems under fairly adverse conditions.

"Tackling a navigation system on a car shouldn't be as tough as working on the advanced radar-jamming systems in the military," Hyland said.

"If we can put those kids in a shop environment and give them all the tools to help them succeed, they can do extraordinary things for the Audi brand."

Grand Cherokee reaches tall summit

Jeep chic baffles me, kids.

It's not that I'm some Dom Perignon-sniffing, high-rise aristocrat with an aversion to dirt and rocks and anything lacking an \$8,000 audio system.

I'm almost outdoorsy, in fact. My best back-to-Mother-Earth camping trips consisted solely of a blanket and a bunch of beer.

My minimalist mornings, I admit, could be a tad raggedy.

But Jeep's mud-spattered Western image revolves largely around the bare-boned Wrangler, a hard metal box that dances in dirt but shakes and stumbles on smooth pavement like some old heap from the '60s.

Give me the immensely capable, vastly more sophisticated Grand Cherokee anytime — especially now.

The aptly named 2014 Grand Cherokee Summit I had recently reaches for the lofty status of the BMW X5 and Mercedes-Benz M-Class — and gets close to grasping it.

Of course, with an eye-watering list price of \$54,685, it had better get really close.

My metallic black Grand Cherokee arrived with just about every option Jeep could find in its parts bins.

It had the "Quadra-Trac II" four-wheel-drive system, "Selec-Terrain" that allows you to fine-tune the power for rocks or mud or sand, Chrysler's fabulous 5.7-liter Hemi V-8 and an eight-speed automatic.

And those were just the big parts. Every mudder needs bi-xenon headlights

and a heated steering wheel, right?

Look at this way: You could be a silk-stocking survivalist in your loaded Grand Cherokee — the Disaffected Dude from Dallas.

As with all real Jeeps, the Grand Cherokee's "Jeepness" starts with its traditional seven-slot

grille, this one filled with chrome chain mesh — disco and dust, I guess.

Short overhangs front and rear and a slightly raised hood suggest that this SUV might be more than a mall-crawler.

A subtle character line beneath the chrome door handles and another more pro-

nounced line above the rocker panels gave the Grand Cherokee some muscle.

But it didn't look too happy about it. Its thin, squinty headlights always looked aggravated to me.

I also had doubts about the Grand Cherokee's high-mounted wraparound tail-lamps, which just didn't say "Jeep" to me.

Still, the body had great proportions and looked elegantly tough draped over 265/50 tires on 20-inch alloy wheels.

Do you remember when Jeep interiors appeared to have been assembled from military-surplus parts? The Grand Cherokee will forever obliterate that memory.

Get this: The interior in mine was dark brown — highly unusual in a black vehicle — and seemed to get better and classier the longer I drove it.

The dark-brown plastic dashboard, for instance, looked like leather with tan stitching on its edges, and it was pliable.

The hood over the instrument panel was also slightly soft to the touch. Sadly, it shaded lifeless video-game facsimiles of real gauges.

Why use a fake-looking speedometer and tachometer in a "real" vehicle like a Jeep?

Beats me. But every time I turned my head, I expect-

ed to hear clinging and dinging and someone urging me to deposit another quarter.

But a substantial 8.4-inch navigation screen dominated the center stack, which was outlined in decent-looking flat-black plastic.

The broad console included a "terrain" knob for sand, snow, mud and rock. I looked for a "bumps in life" setting but couldn't find it. (I haven't found it on my car, either.)

The leather-looking plastic on the dash wrapped around onto the door tops, which had center panels trimmed in coffee-colored "wood."

Smooth, dark-brown leather seats with faint stitching on them had perforated, sectioned centers, and in back, decent leg- and headroom.

Still, I would be OK with a lesser Grand Cherokee as long as a Hemi resided beneath the hood.

Rated at 360 horsepower, the deep-breathing V-8 is kind of a blue-collar brawler, with its pushrod-valve configuration.

But the engine felt as smooth and polished as most anything from Europe, and it was certainly more satisfying than the base six-cylinder engines in similarly priced BMW X5s and Mercedes-Benz MLs.

Review: Best picks among newly cheap electric cars

What would it take to get you into an electric car today?

Whether an electric car works for you depends heavily on your driving needs. These cars have limited range and they take hours to recharge. To help you decide, we have driven and ranked these three leading entrants in the increasingly competitive micro-segment of the green car world.

Here's how they stacked up:

Nissan Leaf

Although most automakers have remained wary of battery electrics, Nissan Motor Corp. has been the true believer. It paid a heavy price to bring the Leaf to market in 2011, way ahead of other automakers — about \$5 billion invested so far. But the company has acknowledged disappointing sales. Nissan has responded by attacking the car's two biggest weaknesses — price and charging time. The entry-level 2013 Leaf came down \$6,400 from the previous year, to \$28,800, the lowest sticker price in our test group. An improved on-board charger cut the Leaf's charging time in half, to about four hours. (The \$199 lease doesn't include the new charger, a \$1,300 option.)

None of those improvements, however, addresses the aesthetics of the Leaf. It remains ugly, in an eco-chic sort of way. Oblong headlights protrude like insect eyes from its short, sloped hood. Inside, even with the leather package on our test car, the Leaf had a downmarket feel. The dashboard is a large slab of hard plastic, embedded with gaudy red, white and blue electronic readouts. The dash makes funny noises too when you put the car in reverse, for instance. The beeps and burps had a video game quality, as if you are cruising in the "Super Mario" mobile chasing energy mushrooms.

The cab-forward look does pay some dividends in usable interior space, and the Leaf could function well as a five-seat family car.

In the final analysis, the Leaf is a good value for the money, after subsidies, compared to many gas-powered and hybrid economy cars. But it falls short of new electric competitors on styling, performance and price. That's a

shame, given Nissan's early and hard-charging entry into the expensive and speculative EV market.

Fiat 500e

Nothing about the 500e screams "Green car!" There's no garish "ZERO EMISSIONS" or "EV" stickers on the side. Compared to other gas-powered 500s, the electric cousin looks more mean than green, with the only styling tweak being an aggressive lower front grille.

That's not surprising, because Fiat designed the 500 as a stylish and sporty subcompact first — something to compete with the likes of the Mini Cooper — and simply fitted it with the electric drivetrain to appease California regulators.

From the moment you mash the accelerator, it's clear that electricity is a great match for the 500's tiny frame and sporting character. The car blasts out of the hole with a silent rush of torque that rips the front tires loose.

The 500e excels too on fit and finish. Its retro cabin is fitted with the same hard plastic as the Leaf, but the textures look and feel more expensive. Adding to the upscale feel, the Fiat displayed best build quality in this bunch, soaking up rough roads impressively for such a tiny car with a short wheelbase. If you want low-buck zero-emissions with no compromise in driving dynamics, buy the Fiat.

From the looks of the 500, no one will know you are driving an electric car. This may hurt the Fiat with the look-at-me, eco-self-conscious crowd, but frankly it's time to move past the era of eco-friendly cars as status symbols. With automakers rolling out a diverse cast of terrifically efficient cars —

gas, diesel, hybrid, electric, fuel cell, whatever — green has gone mainstream.

Honda Fit EV

You get no choices in the matter of the Honda Fit EV. Honda has made all the decisions for you. It comes in one color — electric blue, fittingly — and one trim level: Loaded, with navigation, three driving modes, heated seats and alloy wheels. You can't even buy the car. Honda will only lease it to you.

Still, the electric Fit delivers. Like its gas-powered cousin, it offers nimble handling, good looks, stunning interior space and utility.

The electric adds another layer of standard equipment, performance and, of course, efficiency. The Fit EV makes 123 horsepower and 189 pound-feet of torque, compared to the standard Fit's 117 horsepower and 106 pound-feet of torque.

The Fit turns zero to 60 mph in a respectable 8.7 seconds, according to *Car and Driver*. But like the Fiat, the bulk of that power is concentrated in the zero to 30-mph range, where it's appreciated most in an urban driving environment like Los Angeles.

The Fit EV does have a few quirks, as if Honda rushed it to market without some finishing touches. The big plastic dash in our test car had some sloppy gaps at the seams, uncharacteristic of Honda's typically solid fit and finish. The old-school "ignition" key seemed oddly quaint for a futuristic car in an era of push-buttons, remotes and apps.

But such nitpicking isn't likely to stop Honda from meeting its modest goal of leasing 1,100 Fit EVs combined in this model year and the next.

China slow to embrace electric vehicles

SHANGHAI — Fears that China will overtake the U.S. in the race to put electric vehicles on the road have fizzled.

Despite choking pollution in big Chinese cities, consumers here see EVs as too expensive or too difficult to recharge.

China has offered tax incentives on electric vehicles, but total sales of hybrid and electric vehicles last year were 12,791, according to the Chinese Association of Automobile Manufacturers.

In the U.S. in 2012, automakers sold 53,172 plug-in electric vehicles and 434,498 hybrids, represent-

ing a total market share of 3.4 percent, according to Hybrid Cars.com.

"I think everyone would say it hasn't really taken root yet," GM China President Bob Soica said recently near the Shanghai auto show. "Objectives are worthy, but progress is slow."

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Storied Dodge Dart reborn with frisky attitude

Still remember Dad's white '64 Dodge Dart wagon, with red upholstery, gleaming on a summer day in the driveway. It was his first wagon, and we were all thrilled to pile into it for a trip to the Jersey Shore.

Introduced just four years earlier, the Dart had already seen some radical changes. It began as a full-size car and by '64 was scaled down to a midsize. By 1969, the Dart got tougher, joining the muscle car crowd with a GTS model powered by a 440.

Fast forward 37 years: The Dart nameplate is resurrected by Chrysler/Fiat, ready to do battle in the competitive compact segment. It is not a midsize. It is not muscle-bound. And, in the early going, it has not done well on the sales graph — it has struggled against the likes of Honda Civic and Toyota Corolla.

Still, I like the young Dart's chances. It is surprisingly frisky, has good acceleration with the turbocharged engine and is quite agile on the twisty roads.

Well, wait a minute. Since it is based on the

sporty Alfa Romeo Giulietta, maybe all this shouldn't be such a surprise. There's a lot to like inside, too, with quality materials used throughout — but more on that later.

Know that this is not your father's (grandfather's?) Dodge Dart. They

took a Giulietta, widened its track and stretched it an entire foot. It has a smirky front end with sweeping headlamps that are the biggest you'll find on a Dodge. And across-the-rear taillights surely will be compared to the Dodge Charger.

Power bears no connection to your father's Dart, either, not that anyone who remembers the famous slant-6 would register a complaint about it.

This time around, though, the front-wheel-drive Dart offers an optional 1.4-liter tur-

bocharged engine that's good for 160 horsepower and an impressive 184 pound-feet of torque. With the manual tranny, it'll go 0-60 in around 8.3 seconds, among the quickest in its class.

That is the engine to get, and I'm guessing most will. The base 2.0-liter engine is rather lackluster, harnesses the same 160 horses, but manages only 148 pound-feet of torque. That will cost 1.6 seconds in the 0-60 figure, which makes it one of the slowest in its segment, according to Edmunds' testing.

And get this: The swifter choice gets the better mileage: 27 city, 37 highway for a combined average fuel economy of 31 mpg with the automatic. The 2.0 comes in at 24 city, 34 highway and 27 combined. No-brainer, right?

For the sport-driven, Dart R/T provides a 2.4-liter engine that produces 184 hp and 171 pound-feet of torque. The Alfa DNA is apparent on the road as the Dart offers an eager performance with good steering response and a nimble feel. A 6-speed automatic tranny shifts smoothly and on cue. On the open road, the

ride is nicely composed; the MacPherson struts with gas-charged shocks up front and a multilink system in the rear discipline all the bad boys on the pavement. The Dart, essentially, drives bigger than it is.

Inside, the Dart feels like a pricier car. Most of the materials look and feel richer than they should in this segment. And Dodge offers a multitude of combinations in fabric and interior colors.

The dash is clean, attractive and well organized. One should definitely opt for the 8.4-inch touch screen that accesses entertainment functions and navigation. Comprehensive menus and nice, big touch buttons make it a breeze to wade through. Seats are comfortable, and legroom is adequate in the front, substantial in the rear. A cavernous glove box is unheard of in this segment, but it's here.

This segment, by the way, is not so easy to define. Some will call it a compact, others say it borders on a midsize. Trunk space — at 13.1 cubic feet — is not up to snuff for a midsize; for a compact, it's competitive with the class.

U.S. trails in building fueling stations for hydrogen-powered cars

Hyundai Motor Co. rolled out the first 15 of its hydrogen-powered ix35 sport utility vehicles headed to Copenhagen this week. But part of the news for U.S. drivers interested in the technology was the fact that the event was in Europe and not here.

The reason could be summed up in one word: infrastructure. Europe has it for this kind of demonstration; the U.S. does not.

Europe already has a solid network of hydrogen fueling stations running from the boot of Italy northwest across the continent, through Germany and Belgium.

More stations are sprinkled across Scandinavia. Dozens more are planned throughout the continent.

Byung Kwon Rhim, president of Hyundai Motor Europe, said, "Hyundai Motor is committed to hydrogen as the fuel of the future for Europe."

Meanwhile, Hyundai says the same kind of activity in the

U.S. is a long way off.

"We anticipate more growth in stations from now until 2015, when we plan increased production and consumer purchase availability," said Derek Joyce, manager of product public relations for Motor America.

Joyce added, "We are currently exploring local commercial fleet potential for partnerships that can best leverage our Tucson Fuel Cell vehicles."

Tucson is the U.S. name for the ix35.

stations open to regular motorists in the U.S. as of March 2012, the Energy Department said.

"Most of the automakers say they plan commercial rollouts of hydrogen vehicles in 2015, some as early as 2014," said Chris White, communications director for the California Fuel Cell Partnership. "Our goal is to have stations built for that first rollout."



Sweet sound of success

Nick Lachey hosts new singing competition game show 'The Winner Is'

The heat is on in prime time. The summer season is underway, and every major network has at least one reality TV show on deck for viewers to enjoy.

Just as things wind down on the hit series "The Voice," NBC adds a twist to the summer schedule with a special preview of the reality TV-game show hybrid "The Winner Is," airing Monday, June 10, on NBC. It's a logical pairing since the network's newest offering comes from the creative minds behind "The Voice," John de Mol and Talpa Media.

The new show combines the excitement of talent search series with the thrill of game shows by giving amateur singers the opportunity to win cash almost instantly. While there isn't a big recording contract on the line as in so many other such series, the stakes are still high. Contestants compete in several rounds of competition for a panel of 101 music lovers in the hopes of walking away with a life-altering prize of up to \$1 million.

However, they'll have to resist temptation at every turn. In each episode, before the results of the panel's votes are revealed, the singers are offered \$10,000 to leave in Round 1, \$25,000 in Round 2 and a whopping \$50,000 in Round 3. Those who are confident enough to stay on course get the chance to win a spot in the finale, which will feature a show-down for \$1 million.

It'll take a cool head to corral all of the excitement on stage, and NBC has lined up a multi-platinum recording artist to take

charge. In November of last year, NBC officially announced that Nick Lachey would host the series.

"Nick is a versatile, seasoned host and we are thrilled to be working him," said NBC executive Paul Telegdy at the time. "With Nick at the helm on air and an original format from Talpa that includes surprising and competitive twists, viewers are sure to be immersed and entertained."

A former member of the popular '90s boy band 98 Degrees, Lachey has parlayed his successful music career into a career on television. Audiences first got to know the handsome vocalist thanks to his MTV reality TV series "Newlyweds: Nick and Jessica" with then wife Jessica Simpson. The show ran for three seasons, from 2003 to

2005, which was enough to make both Lachey and Simpson household names.

Since then, Lachey has landed himself several hosting gigs, including two seasons of the NBC singing show "The Sing Off." He was

also featured as a celebrity choir leader in the network's "Clash of the Choirs," which his Cincinnati, Ohio, choir won. He's co-hosted the uber-popular morning show "Live! With Kelly" alongside Kelly Ripa, and has appeared as an actor in episodes of "Hawaii Five-0," CW's past hit "Charmed" and the former ABC sitcom "Hope & Faith."

The multi-talented performer shows no signs of slowing down either, having recently reunited with his 98 Degrees bandmates to tour. He's also busy with his recent solo release, "A Father's Lullaby."

It's a good thing he has so much energy. He'll have his work cut out for him with "The Winner Is" as he deals with everyone from kids to teens to seniors. Much like NBC's other hit, "America's Got Talent," "The Winner Is" is an equal opportunity competition. Auditions were open to all, including soloists, duets, groups and even family acts with all sorts of vocal styles. The crew traveled across the country in search of average people with serious vocal talent, hitting such cities as Raleigh, N.C., Houston, Seattle and Philadelphia.

At first glance, "The Winner Is" may not seem that different from other shows struggling for a piece of the prime-time ratings pie. But, behind the scenes, the show boasts a team that's second to none. Dutch media mogul de Mol is known the world over for his television programs, including the aforementioned "The Voice," which began life as "The Voice of Holland" in 2010, and has since spawned more than a dozen versions internationally. De Mol's also the brains behind CBS's summer hit "Big Brother," and has produced such recognizable series as

"Fear Factor" and "Deal or No Deal." It's no wonder NBC snagged the producer's latest show

"The Voice" has been a huge boon for the struggling network, keeping it afloat despite waning ratings in other areas.

Craig Plestis, one of the show's executive producers, has overseen such hits as "Minute to Win It," "The Biggest Loser" and "The Apprentice." Fellow executive producer Stijn Bakkers

has also earned acclaim for his work on "The Voice."

With such an impressive team backing it up, "The Winner Is" sounds like a surefire hit, but there are already naysayers. Alex Davis of buzzerblog.com contends that neither the Dutch version or the German version of the

show have fared that well in the ratings. But NBC is likely hoping that the American thirst for reality TV, Lachey's charm and de Mol's reputation for producing hits will help the show on this side of the pond. Only time will tell. Catch NBC's "The Winner Is" in a special preview on Monday, June 10.

The chef with the distinctly spiky 'do took home the crown in "The Next Food Network Star's" sophomore season, and he's done anything but fizzle. Since his 2006 victory, he's established himself as the face of the Food Network, often filling the channel's time slots with "Guy's Big Bite," "Rachael vs Guy: Celebrity Cook-Off," with co-star Rachael Ray and, of course, "Diners, Drive-ins and Dives."

If anything, Fieri is proof that stars are made, not born. "Food Network Star" really can make a star, and this summer a new one will be crowned.

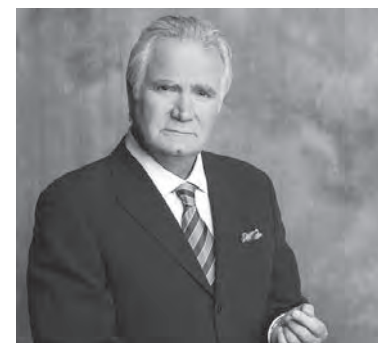

Bauer's back

Fox announces '24's' return with a new series

Bauer's back: If there's one thing that eight seasons and a TV movie taught us, it's that there's no stopping government agent Jack Bauer. Well, it appears the same thing could be said about the real-world actor who plays him.

Kiefer Sutherland is returning to the role that transformed him into TV royalty with a new special series of the previously canceled "24," which is set to hit Fox next May. Titled "24: Live Another Day," the new series will be tweaking the show's iconic structure of airing 24 one-hour episodes that are set in "real time," compressing it down to 12 episodes that will jump hours to still tell a 24-hour story.

The news of the new series came hot on the heels of the cancellation of Sutherland's "Touch" after just two seasons. Although the thriller was well received by critics, it never came close to the huge audiences that "24" pulled in during its heyday.

Always one to land on his feet, though, Sutherland is again pairing up with "24's" former show runner Howard Gordon ("Homeland"), who will be returning to produce the new series.

"24" ran for eight seasons, from 2001 to 2010, drawing huge audiences and critical praise. Its unique, real-time premise and split screens gave it an edge, and it paid off with two Golden Globes and a whopping 20 Primetime Emmys including a Best Actor in a Drama Series Emmy for Sutherland in 2006.

Bauer survived some of the nastiest surprises that terrorists

could throw at him, and it looks like Sutherland will be surviving a show cancellation just fine. Watch out for "24: Live Another Day" next spring.

A 'View' to a shakeup: Folks tuning in to ABC this fall will be catching a different view on their TV screens.

"The View," the network's popular daytime talk show in which a diverse panel of women discusses current events, is undergoing its biggest shakeup yet, with two confirmed departures from the long-running program.

Panelists since the show's debut in 1997, both comedian Joy Behar and series creator Barbara Walters have confirmed that they won't be returning for the program's 17th season. Walters plans to stay on as the show's executive producer until her full retirement from television in the summer of 2014.

This is far from the first shakeup that "The View's" panel of modern and opinionated women has been through, and the changes haven't always been easy

ones. Rosie O'Donnell's two-season tenure as moderator was often controversial, due to her outspoken and vocal debates with her fellow panelists, especially Elisabeth Hasselbeck. Longtime panelist Star Jones' sudden departure from the show in 2006 resulted in a public feud with her former colleagues, and Hasselbeck, who replaced Lisa Ling as a panelist in 2004, has often clashed with the show's more liberal women.

Walters' departure from "The View" is just the first step in her withdrawal from TV altogether. The pioneering journalist has been a crusader for women's rights, becoming America's first female co-anchor of an evening news program on any of the U.S. networks for "ABC Evening News" in 1976.

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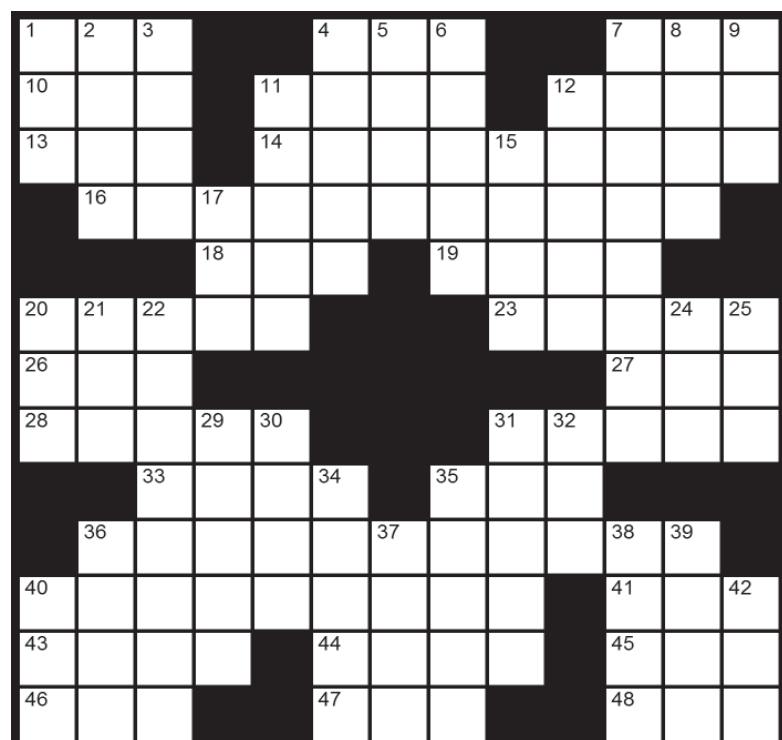
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Television Crossword

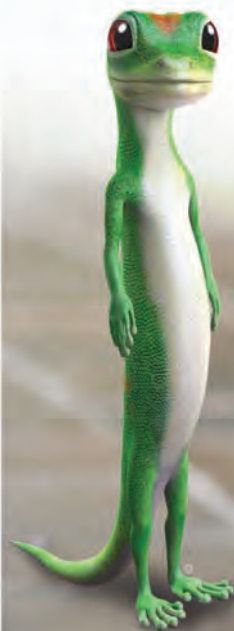
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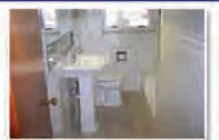
