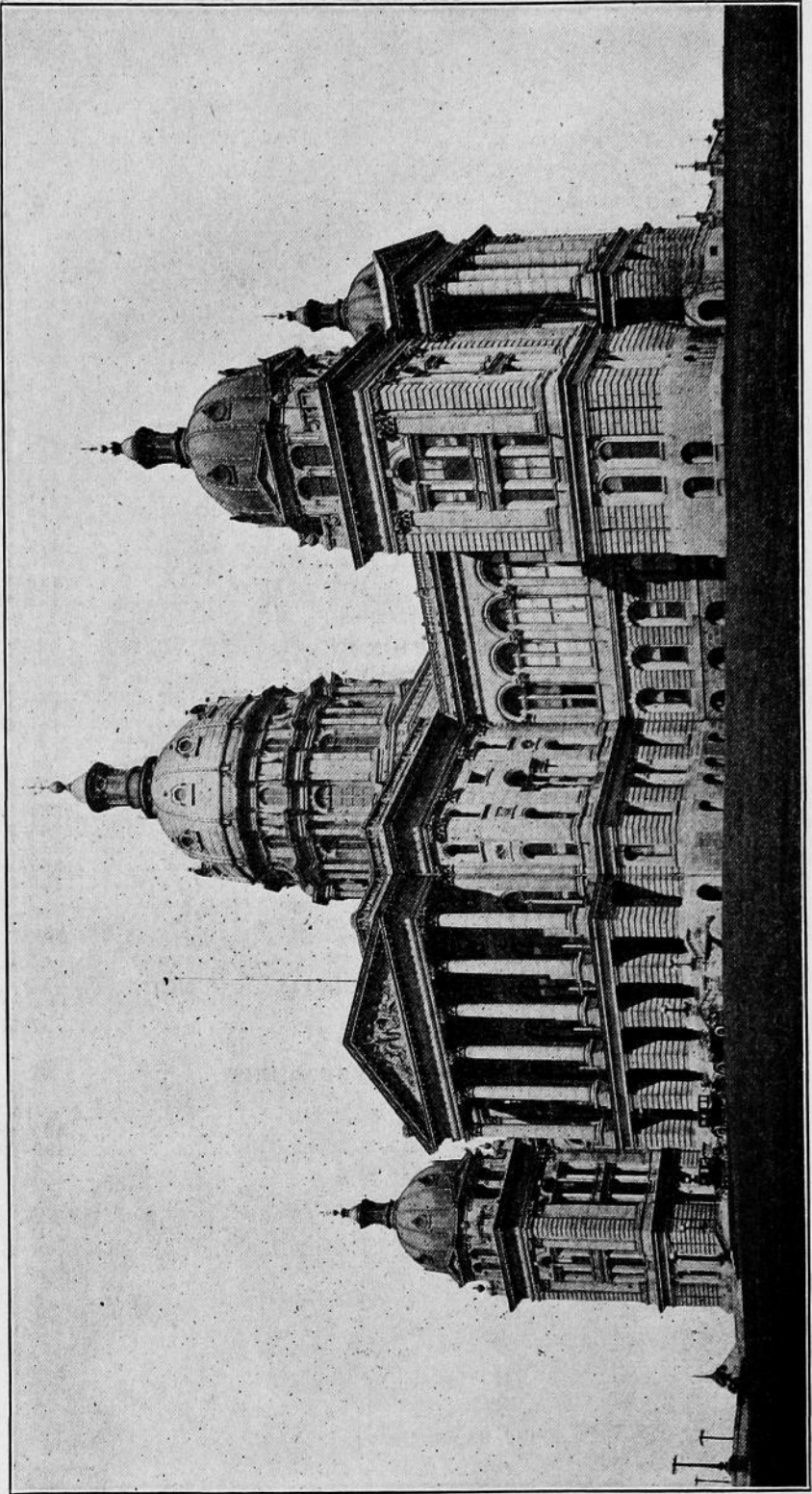

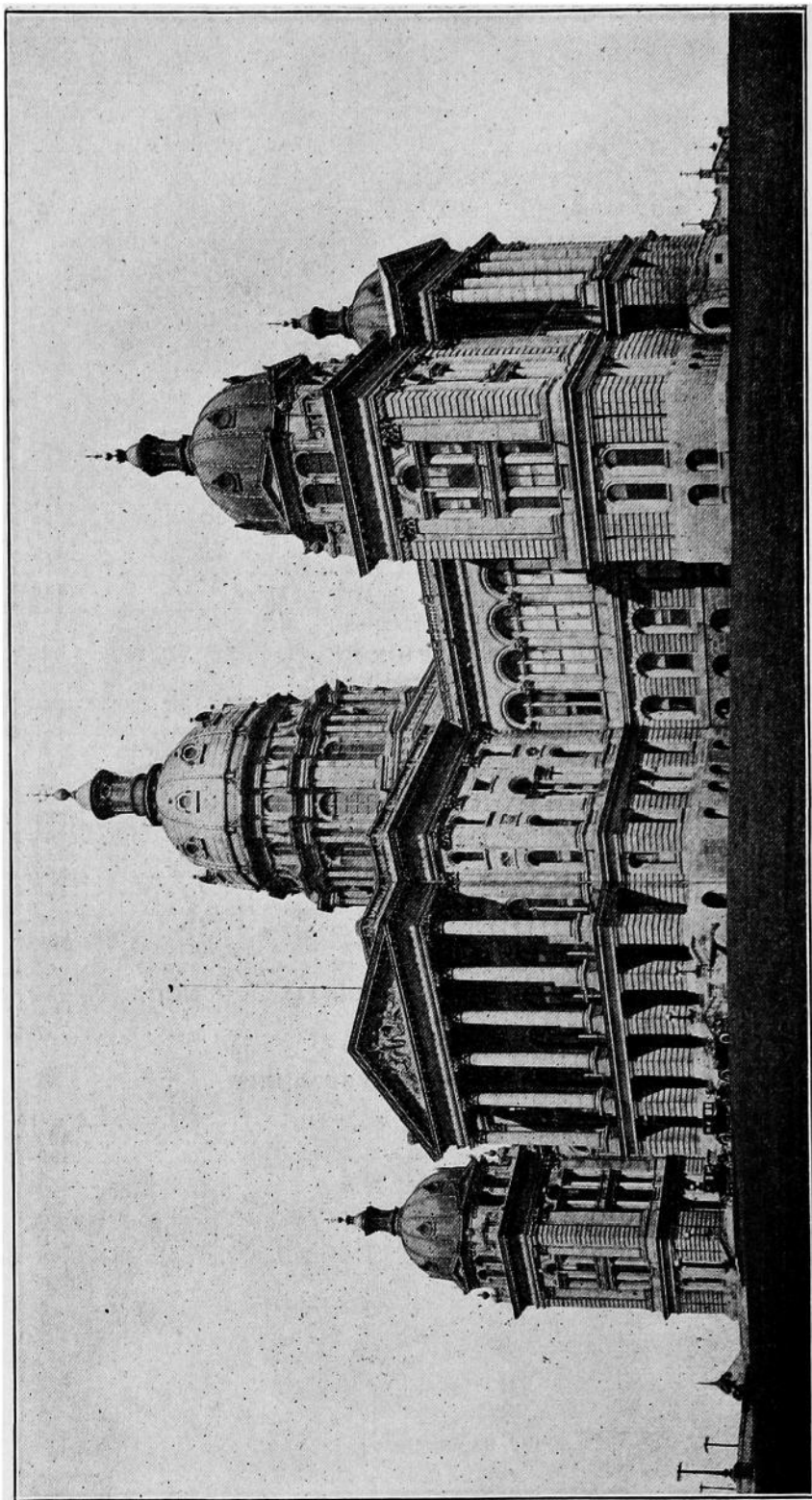

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

In Congress, July 4, 1776.

THE UNANIMOUS DECLARATION OF THE THIRTEEN UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

(Adopted by the Continental Congress July 2, and authenticated and proclaimed July 4, 1776.)

When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident: That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; that to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such forms as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a desire to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies, and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world:

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained, and, when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature—a right inestimable to them, and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the repository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused, for a long time after such dissolution, to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large for their exercise; the state remaining, in the meantime, exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these states; for that purpose obstructing the laws of naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislature.

He has affected to render the military independent of, and superior to, the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution and unacknowledged by our laws, giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation—

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us;

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these states;

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world;

For imposing taxes on us without our consent;

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury;

For transporting us beyond seas, to be tried for pretended offenses;

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province; establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies;

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments;

For suspending our own legislature, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here by declaring us out of his protection and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is, at this time, transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun, with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow-citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian savages whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes, and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress, in the most humble terms; our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attention to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts, by their legislature, to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity; and we have conjured them, by the ties of our common kindred, to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They, too, have been deaf to the voice of justice and consanguinity. We, must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, enemies in war, in peace friends.

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these united colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political connections between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

[Recommended by the convention of the states to congress Sept. 17, 1787, and by it submitted to the states for ratification, which by the concurrence of nine states, was consummated and proclaimed and on March 4, 1789, the government commenced operations under the new constitution.]

We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I.

SECTION 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives.

SEC. 2. (1)* The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states; and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

(2) No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

(3) [Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons.] * * The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty thousand, but each state shall have at least one representative, and, until such enumeration shall be made, the state of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

*The figures in brackets are inserted for convenience of reference; they are not in the original.

**The foregoing clause included in brackets is amended by SEC. 2 of the 14th amendment.

(4) When vacancies happen in the representation from any state, the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

(5) The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

SEC. 3. (1) The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, chosen by the legislature thereof for six years; and each senator shall have one vote.

(2) Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year, of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year, and of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second year; and if vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, during the recess of the legislature of any state the executive thereof may make temporary appointments until the next meeting of the legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies.

(3) No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen.

(4) The vice-president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote, unless they be equally divided.

(5) The senate shall choose their other officers and also a president pro tempore, in the absence of the vice-president or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

14th amendment, *post*.

(6) The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

(7) Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.

SEC. 4. (1) The times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof, but the congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

(2) The congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

SEC. 5. (1) Each house shall be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

(2) Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

(3) Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

(4) Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

SEC. 6. (1) The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall in all cases, except treason, felony and breach

of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the sessions of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

(2) No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased, during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

Sec. 7. (1) All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

(2) Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate, shall, before it become a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such reconsideration two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the congress by their adjournment prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

(3) Every order, resolution or vote to which the concurrence of the senate and house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

Sec. 8. The congress shall have power:—

(1) To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debts and provide for common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States.

(2) To borrow money on the credit of the United States;

(3) To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, with the Indian tribes;

(4) To establish an uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States.

(5) To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

(6) To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting and securities and current coin of the United States;

(7) To establish post offices and post roads;

(8) To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times to authors and inventors the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;

(9) To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;

(10) To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses against the law of nations;

(11) To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water;

(12) To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years;

(13) To provide and maintain a navy;

(14) To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;

(15) To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions;

(16) To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States; reserving to the states, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by congress.

(17) To exercise exclusive legislation, in all cases whatsoever, over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states and the acceptance of congress, become the seat of the government of the United States, and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards and other needful buildings; and—

(18) To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

SEC. 9. (1) The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

(2) The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when, in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

(3) No bill of attainder or ex post facto law shall be passed.

(4) No capitalization or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

(5) No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state.

(6) No preference shall be given by any regulation of commerce or revenue to the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.

(7) No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law, and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

(8) No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States; and no person holding any office of profit or trust under them shall, without the consent of the congress, accept of any present, emolument, office, or title, of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

SEC. 10. (1) No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility.

(2) No state shall, without the consent of the congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts, laid by any state on imports or exports, shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws shall be subjected to the revision and control of the congress.

(3) No state shall, without the consent of congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state, or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. (1) The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the vice-president chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

(2) Each state shall appoint in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of senators and repre-

senatives to which the state may be entitled in the congress; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

The electors shall meet in their respective states and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all persons voted for, and of the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of them for president; and if no person have a majority then from the five highest on the list, the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the votes shall be taken by states, the representation for each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case, after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors shall be the vice-president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice-president.

[The foregoing clause has been superseded and annulled by the twelfth amendment, *post.*]

(3) The congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

(4) No person except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years, and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

(5) In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice-president, and the congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation or inability, both of the president and vice-president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed or a president shall be elected.

(6) The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States or any of them.

(7) Before he enter on the execution of his office, he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the constitution of the United States."

Sec. 2. (1) The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion in writing of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

(2) He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint, ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States, whose appoint-

ments are not herein otherwise provided for and which shall be established by law. But the congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

(3) The president shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions, which shall expire at the end of their next session.

SEC. 3. He shall from time to time give to the congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them and, in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper. He shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

SEC. 4. The president, vice-president, and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III

SECTION 1. The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior; and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

SEC. 2. (1) The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity arising under this constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made, under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state, or the citizens thereof, and foreign states, citizens or subjects.

(2) In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be a party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases, before mentioned, the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under regulations as the congress shall make.

(3) The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury; and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the congress may by law have directed.

SEC. 3. (1) Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

(2) The congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attained.

ARTICLE IV.

SEC. 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the congress may, by general laws, prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

SEC. 2. (1) The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

(2) A person charged in any state with treason, felony or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another state, shall on demand of the

executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

(3) No person held to service or labor in one state, under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.

SEC. 3. (1) New states may be admitted by the congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states, or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned as well as of the congress.

(2) The congress shall have power to dispose of, and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular state.

SEC. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in this Union a republican form of government, and shall protect each of them against invasion; and, on application of the legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

ARTICLE V.

The congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this constitution, or, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which, in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of this constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; *provided* that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

ARTICLE VI.

(1) All debts contracted and engagements entered into before the adoption of this constitution shall be as valid against the United States under this constitution as under the confederation.

(2) This constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land; and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

(3) The senators and representatives before mentioned and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this constitution; but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the conventions of nine states shall be sufficient for the establishment of this constitution between the states so ratifying the same. Done in convention, by the unanimous consent of the states present, the seventeenth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven, and of the independence of the United States of America the twelfth. In witness whereof, we have hereunto subscribed our names.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

(Proposed by congress, and ratified by the legislatures of the several states, pursuant to the fifth article of the original constitution. For dates of ratification see foot note.*)

ARTICLE I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

ARTICLE II.

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

ARTICLE III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

ARTICLE IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated;

*The first ten of these amendments were proposed by congress to the legislatures of the several states September 25, 1789, and were ratified by all of the states, except Connecticut, Georgia and Massachusetts, before the end of the year 1791, thereby becoming a part of the organic law, pursuant to the fifth article of the original constitution.

The eleventh amendment was in like manner proposed March 5, 1794, and was in a message of the president to congress, January 8, 1798, declared to have been duly ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states.

The twelfth amendment was in like manner proposed December 12, 1803, in lieu of the original third paragraph of the first section of the second article, and September 25, 1804, was proclaimed by the secretary of state to have been duly ratified.

The thirteenth amendment was proposed February 1, 1865, and was December 18, 1865, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The fourteenth amendment was proposed June 16, 1866, and was July 28, 1868, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The fifteenth amendment was proposed February 27, 1869, and was March 30, 1870, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The sixteenth amendment was proposed July 12, 1909, and was February 25, 1913, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The seventeenth amendment was proposed May 18, 1912, and was May 31, 1913, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The eighteenth amendment was proposed December 17, 1917, and was proclaimed by the acting secretary of state on January 29, 1919, to have been duly ratified.

The nineteenth amendment was proposed June 5, 1919, and was proclaimed by the secretary of state on August 26, 1920, to have been duly ratified.

and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

ARTICLE V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject, for the same offense, to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled, in any criminal case, to be a witness against himself; nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

ARTICLE VI.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

ARTICLE VII.

In suits at common law where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved; and no fact, tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

ARTICLE VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

ARTICLE IX.

The enumeration in the constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

ARTICLE X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the state respectively, or to the people.

ARTICLE XI.

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

ARTICLE XII.

SECTION 1. The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for president and vice-president, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as vice-president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president, and of all persons voted for as vice-president, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate; the president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three, on the list of those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall

choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president, whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice-president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

SEC. 2. The person having the greatest number of votes as vice-president shall be the vice-president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice-president; a quorum for that purpose, shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

SEC. 3. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice-president of the United States.

ARTICLE XIII.

SECTION 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XIV.

SECTION 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States, and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States, nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, nor deny to any person within the jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

SEC. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice-president of the United States, representatives in congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.

SEC. 3. No person shall be a senator or representative in congress, or elector of president and vice-president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any state, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But congress may, by a vote of two-thirds of each house, remove such disability.

SEC. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

SEC. 5. The congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

ARTICLE XV.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

SEC. 2. The congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XVI.

The congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

ARTICLE XVII.

SECTION 1. The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

SEC. 2. When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

SEC. 3. This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the constitution.

ARTICLE XVIII.

SECTION 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

SEC. 2. The congress and the several states shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

SEC. 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the constitution by the legislatures of the several states, as provided in the constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the states by the congress.

ARTICLE XIX.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

LAW AS TO PRESIDENTIAL SUCCESSION.

The presidential succession is fixed by chapter 4 of the acts of the Forty-ninth congress, first session. In case of the removal, death, resignation or inability of both the president and vice-president, then the secretary of state shall act as president until the disability of the president or vice-president is removed or a president is elected. If there be no secretary of state, then the secretary of the treasury will act; and the remainder of the order of succession is as follows: The secretary of war, attorney-general, postmaster-general, secretary of the navy, and secretary of the interior. The acting president must, upon taking office, convene congress, if not at the time in session, in extraordinary session, giving twenty days' notice. This act applies only to such cabinet officers as shall have been appointed by the advice and consent of the senate, and are eligible under the constitution to the presidency.

THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA**Historical Review**

Iowa, "beautiful land," as the Indians called the region, was first seen by white men when Marquette and Joliet touched the west bank of the Mississippi river near the mouth of the Des Moines in 1673.

Marquette, a Jesuit priest, and Joliet, a fur trader, entered the great Father of Waters by way of the Wisconsin river, June 17th, and traveled down stream several days before noting the first sign of habitation. They had almost reached what is now the southern boundary of the state when near the confluence of the Des Moines and Mississippi rivers they discerned footprints on the west bank of the Mississippi and a path leading through the woods. Following the path they came to an Indian village and met friendly Indians. History thus records the first visit of white men to the country which many years later became the state of Iowa.

In 1803 the famous Louisiana purchase was made of the territory of which Iowa was a part and gave to the territory thus secured its first government. The United States then acquired a region of 875,025 square miles, containing 560,016,000 acres, for the sum of \$15,000,000.

One year later congress passed an act dividing the territory along the thirty-third parallel, the northern part being named the district of Louisiana and the southern part the territory of Orleans. In 1812 Orleans became a state called Louisiana and the region of which Iowa was a part, the Missouri territory.

In 1821 Missouri assumed statehood, leaving the region of which Iowa was a part without any organized form of government, but in 1834 it was joined with the territory of Michigan. The territory of Wisconsin was formed in 1836, including the areas later divided into the states of Wisconsin, Minnesota and Iowa. Iowa was organized as a separate territory July 4, 1838, including the portion of the Wisconsin territory west of the Mississippi and north of the state of Missouri.

The territory of Iowa was the ancient abode of the Sac, Ioway, Dakota and Fox tribes of Indians, and did not have any permanent settlers until 1833. The Indians refused permission to white settlers to come in to mine and farm, and the United States troops protected their rights until 1832. The Black Hawk war resulted in letting white men in, for its conclusion in 1832 brought about the cession of thousands of square miles of the eastern part of Iowa. During the next few years, practically the whole of the Iowa territory was secured from them through treaties.

The frontiersmen rushed in to farm and mine. The population increased very rapidly with the influx of prospectors and homeseekers from all parts of the union. During the ten years from 1836 to 1846 the increase in inhabitants was from 10,531 to 102,388.

Government was established among the early settlers by voluntary associations. They selected their own homes and began improving them, building huts and clearing and breaking the ground. "Claim associations" and "land clubs" were formed for the protection of their claims to the land they worked. These organizations were the only government they had and their proceedings were later recognized by the United States government.

The Act of Congress of 1838, entitled "an act to divide the territory of Wisconsin and to establish the Territorial Government of Iowa" gave the Territory of Iowa its constitution. Until the formation of the State in 1846, this constitution was its fundamental law.

Iowa having separated from Wisconsin in 1838 for the want of sufficient courts for judicial relief, the question of applying for admission into the Union as a state was recommended as early as 1839. The first recommendation brought no result, and in 1840 the question of calling a constitutional convention was voted on by the people. It was defeated by a large majority, as it was again in 1842 by those who most wished to avoid an increase in taxes. In 1844, however, the vote was in favor of a convention. Application for a state government was made. The question of boundaries, a result of the question of slavery, held back its admission as a state until 1846, when on the 28th day of December it was admitted into the union on an equal footing with the thirteen original states. It was the sixteenth state so admitted.

The first constitutional convention was convened at Iowa City, October 7, 1844. The constitution adopted by this convention was twice voted on and each time defeated in the year 1845.

At a second constitutional convention at Iowa City, May 4, 1846, a constitution was approved. It was adopted by the people at an election held on the 3rd day of August, 1846, there being 9,492 votes cast "for the constitution," and 9,036 votes cast "against the constitution." This constitution was presented to congress in December, 1846, and on the 28th day of the same month an act was passed for the admission of Iowa into the union.

A third constitutional convention was authorized by the people by a majority of over eighteen thousand, for the purpose of revising and amending the constitution. At the November election, 1856, delegates to the convention were elected; and the convention met at Iowa City in January, 1857. The constitution adopted by this convention was adopted by the people at an election held on the 3d day of August, 1857, there being 40,311 votes cast "for the constitution" and 30,681 votes cast "against the constitution." It took effect by proclamation of the governor September 3, 1857. A copy of this constitution, taken from the original records, is contained herein.

The constitution of Iowa has been amended ten times since its adoption all of which amendments are contained herein.

PREAMBLE.

We, the people of the State of Iowa, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free and independent government, by the name of the State of Iowa, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, at a point due east of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines river, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river, to a point on said river where the northern boundary line of the State of Missouri—as established by the constitution of that state—adopted June 12th, 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river; thence westwardly along the said northern boundary line of the State of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river then up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri river to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux river, according to Nicollett's map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux river, according to said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes north latitude; thence east along said parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, then down the middle of the main channel of said Mississippi river to the place of beginning.

ARTICLE I—BILL OF RIGHTS.

SECTION 1. All men are by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights—among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

SEC. 2. All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right, at all times, to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

SEC. 3. The General Assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates for building or repairing places of worship, or the maintenance of any minister or ministry.

SEC. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office, or public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law, or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceeding shall have the right to use as a witness, or take the testimony of, any other person not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

SEC. 5. Any citizen of this state who may hereafter be engaged, either directly, or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal, or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the constitution and laws of this state.

SEC. 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the general assembly shall not grant to any citizen, or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which, upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

SEC. 7. Every person may speak, write, and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the truth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appear to the jury that the matter charged as libelous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

SEC. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable seizures and searches shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

SEC. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the general assembly may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in inferior courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

SEC. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life, or liberty of an individual the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him, to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and, to have the assistance of counsel.

SEC. 11. All offenses less than felony and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisoned for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a justice of the peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under oath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offense, unless on presentment or indictment by a grand jury, except in cases arising in the army or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

SEC. 12. No person shall, after acquittal, be tried for the same offense. All persons shall, before conviction, be ballable, by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

SEC. 13. The writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, or refused when application is made as required by law, unless in case of rebellion, or invasion the public safety may require it.

SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the state in time of peace; and in time of war, no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

SEC. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 16. Treason against the state shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open court.

SEC. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishments shall not be inflicted.

SEC. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made, or secured to be made to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.*

SEC. 19. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in any civil action, on mesne or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a militia fine in time of peace.

SEC. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives and to petition for a redress of grievances.

SEC. 21. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

SEC. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this state, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment and descent of property, as native born citizens.

SEC. 23. There shall be no slavery in this state; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of crime.

SEC. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent, or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

SEC. 25. This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

ARTICLE II—RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE.

SECTION 1. Every white** male† citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of this state six months next preceding the election, and of the county in which he claims his vote sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

SEC. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such election, going to and returning therefrom.

SEC. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war, or public danger.

SEC. 4. No person in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this state by being stationed in any garrison, barracks, or military or naval place, or station within this state.

SEC. 5. No idiot, or insane person, or person convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

SEC. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.†

ARTICLE III—OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS.

SECTION 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments—the legislative, the executive, and the judicial; and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The legislative authority of this state shall be vested in a general assembly, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives; and the style of every law shall be, "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Iowa"

SEC. 2. The sessions of the general assembly shall be biennial, and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the governor of the state shall, in the meantime, convene the general assembly by proclamation.

SEC. 3. The members of the house of representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of their respective districts, on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the presidential election, when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November; and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.‡

SEC. 4. No person shall be a member of the house of representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty-one years, be a free white male citizen of the United States, and shall have been an inhabitant of this state one year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the county, or district he may have been chosen to represent.*

SEC. 5. Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years, at the same time and place as representatives; they shall be twenty-five years of age, and possess the qualifications of representatives as to residence and citizenship.

SEC. 6. The number of senators shall not be less than one-third, nor more than one-half the representative body; and shall be classified by lot, that one class, being as nearly one-half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

SEC. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

SEC. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

SEC. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules of proceedings, punish members for disorderly behavior, and, with the consent of two-thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense; and shall have all other powers necessary for a branch of the general assembly of a free and independent state.

SEC. 10. Every member of the general assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from, or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public, or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

SEC. 11. Senators and representatives, in all cases, except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the general assembly, and in going to and returning from the same.

SEC. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the governor or the person exercising the functions of governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

SEC. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasions, as, in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

SEC. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

SEC. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses shall be signed by the speaker and president of their respective houses.

SEC. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the general assembly, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if, after such reconsideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, by a majority of two-thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him, Sunday excepted, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the general assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the general assembly, shall be deposited by him in the office of the secretary of state, within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disapproves thereof.

SEC. 17. No bill shall be passed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the general assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

SEC. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws, at every regular session of the general assembly.

SEC. 19. The house of representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

SEC. 20. The governor, judges of the supreme and district courts, and other state officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance in office; but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust or profit, under this state; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment, according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the general assembly may provide.

SEC. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this state, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

SEC. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this state, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the general assembly; but offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster whose compensation does not exceed one hundred dollars per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative.

SEC. 23. No person who may hereafter be a collector or holder of public moneys, shall have a seat in either house of the general assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this state, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

SEC. 24. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

SEC. 25. Each member of the first general assembly under this constitution, shall receive three dollars per diem while in session; and the further sum of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled, in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no general assembly shall have power to increase the compensation of its own members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation, as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

SEC. 26. No law of the general assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session, shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment of the general assembly by which they were passed. If the general assembly shall deem any law of immediate importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the state.

SEC. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the general assembly.

SEC. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this state; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

SEC. 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title.

SEC. 30. The general assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

For the assessment and collection of taxes for state, county, or road purposes;

For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;

For changing the names of persons;

For the incorporation of cities and towns;

For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;

For locating or changing county seats.

In all the cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the state; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, cast for and against it.

SEC. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into; nor, shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject matter of which shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local, or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim, be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the general assembly.

SEC. 32. Members of the general assembly shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear, or affirm (as the case may be), that I will support the constitution of the United States, and the constitution of the state of Iowa, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of senator (or representative, as the case may be), according to the best of my ability." And members of the general assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

SEC. 33. The general assembly shall, in the years one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, one thou-

sand eight hundred and sixty-five, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all the white inhabitants of the state.*

SEC. 34. The number of senators shall, at the next session following each period of making such enumeration, and the next session following each United States census, be fixed by law, and apportioned among the several counties, according to the number of white inhabitants in each.†

SEC. 35. The senate shall not consist of more than fifty members, nor the house of representatives of more than one hundred; and they shall be apportioned among the several counties and representative districts of the state, according to the number of white inhabitants in each, upon ratios to be fixed by law; but no representative district shall contain more than four organized counties, and each district shall be entitled to at least one representative. Every county and district which shall have a number of inhabitants equal to one-half of the ratio fixed by law, shall be entitled to one representative; and any one county containing in addition to the ratio fixed by law, one-half of that number, or more, shall be entitled to one additional representative. No floating district shall hereafter be formed.‡

SEC. 36. At its first sessions under this constitution, and at every subsequent regular session, the general assembly shall fix the ratio of representation, and also form into representative districts those counties which will not be entitled singly to a representative.§

SEC. 37. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district.

SEC. 38. In all elections by the general assembly, the members thereof shall vote viva voce and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

ARTICLE IV—EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The supreme executive power of this state shall be vested in a chief magistrate, who shall be styled the governor of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 2. The governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place of voting for members of the general assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

SEC. 3. There shall be a lieutenant governor, who shall hold his office two years, and be elected at the same time as the governor. In voting for governor and lieutenant governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as governor, and for whom as lieutenant governor. The returns of every election for governor and lieutenant governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of government of the state, directed to the speaker of the house of representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both houses of the general assembly.

SEC. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes for governor and lieutenant governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal and the highest number of votes for either office, the general assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons governor, or lieutenant governor, as the case may be.

SEC. 5. Contested elections for governor, or lieutenant governor, shall be determined by the general assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of governor, or lieutenant governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the state, two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

SEC. 7. The governor shall be commander in chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this state.

SEC. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

SEC. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

SEC. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor shall have power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which shall expire at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

SEC. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have been convened.

SEC. 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

SEC. 13. In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor shall have power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

SEC. 14. No person shall, while holding any office under the authority of the United States, or this state, execute the office of governor, or lieutenant governor, except as hereinafter expressly provided.

SEC. 15. The official term of the governor, and lieutenant governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The lieutenant governor, while acting as governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for governor; and while presiding in the senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a senator, and none other.

SEC. 16. The governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting, when the general assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reason therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeitures shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

SEC. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of the office for the residue of the term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve upon the lieutenant governor.

SEC. 18. The lieutenant governor shall be president of the senate, but shall only vote when the senate is equally divided; and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of governor, the senate shall choose a president pro tempore.

SEC. 19. If the lieutenant governor, while acting as governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or die, or otherwise become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the president pro tempore of the senate shall act as governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the president of the senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of governor, the same shall devolve upon the speaker of the house of representatives.

SEC. 20. There shall be a seal of this state, which shall be kept by the governor, and used by him officially and shall be called the great seal of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the State of Iowa, sealed with the great seal of the state, signed by the governor, and countersigned by the secretary of state.

SEC. 22. A secretary of state, auditor of state, and treasurer of state, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

ARTICLE V—JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the general assembly may, from time to time establish.

SEC. 2. The supreme court shall consist of three judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold court.

SEC. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the state, and shall hold their court at such time and place as the general assembly may prescribe. The judges of the supreme court so elected, shall be classified so that one judge shall go out of office every two years; and the judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be chief justice of the court, during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each judge of the supreme court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The judges of the supreme court shall be ineligible to any other office in the state, during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 4. The supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery, and shall constitute a court for the correction of errors at law, under such restrictions as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; and shall have power to issue all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties, and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals throughout the state.

SEC. 5. The district court shall consist of a single judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the district in which he resides. The judge of the district court shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of judge of the supreme court, during the term for which he was elected.

SEC. 6. The district court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 7. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be conservators of the peace throughout the state.

SEC. 8. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Iowa," and all prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

SEC. 9. The salary of each judge of the supreme court shall be two thousand dollars per annum; and that of each district judge, one thousand six hundred dollars per annum, until the year eighteen hundred and sixty; after which time, they shall severally receive such compensation as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 10. The state shall be divided into eleven judicial districts; and after the year eighteen hundred and sixty, the general assembly may reorganize the judicial districts and increase or diminish the number of districts, or the number of judges of the said court, and may increase the number of judges of the supreme court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one district, or one judge of either court, at any one session; and no reorganization of the districts, or diminution of the number of judges, shall have the effect of removing a judge from office. Such reorganization of the districts or any change in the boundaries thereof, or increase or diminution of the number of

judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.*

SEC. 11. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each judge shall commence on the first day of January next after his election.

SEC. 12. The general assembly shall provide, by law, for the election of an attorney general by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

SEC. 13. The qualified electors of each judicial district shall, at the time of the election of district judge, elect a district attorney, who shall be a resident of the district for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.†

SEC. 14. It shall be the duty of the general assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article, and to provide for a general system of practice in all the courts of this state.‡

ARTICLE VI—MILITIA.

SECTION 1. The militia of this state shall be composed of all able-bodied white male citizens, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, except such as are or may hereafter be exempt by the laws of the United States, or of this state, and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the general assembly may provide by law.§

SEC. 2. No person or persons conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace: Provided, that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

SEC. 3. All commissioned officers of the militia (staff officers excepted), shall be elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the governor.

ARTICLE VII—STATE DEBTS.

SECTION 1. The credit of the state shall not, in any manner, be given or loaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the state shall never assume, or become responsible for, the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

SEC. 2. The state may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 3. All losses to the permanent, school, or university fund of this state, which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement or fraud of the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the state. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the state, in favor of the respective fund, sustaining the loss, upon which not less than six per cent annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.*

SEC. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or defend the state

in war; but the money arising from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 5. Except the debts hereinbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this state, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law, shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each county, if one is published therein, throughout the state, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

SEC. 6. The legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may, at any time, forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability, which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrepealable, and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

SEC. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or revives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

ARTICLE VIII—CORPORATIONS.

SECTION 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the general assembly shall provide, by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

SEC. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit, shall be subject to taxation the same as that of individuals.

SEC. 3. The state shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

SEC. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

SEC. 5. No act of the general assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

SEC. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the general assembly may also provide for the establishment of a state bank with branches.

SEC. 7. If a state bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills, and other issues intended for circulation as money.

SEC. 8. If a general banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning, by an officer of state, of all bills, or paper credit designed to circulate as money, and require security to the full amount thereof, to be deposited with the state treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest paying stocks of states in good credit and standing, to be rated at ten per cent below their average value in the City of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of said stocks, to the amount of ten per cent on the dollar, the bank or banks owning such stocks shall be required to make up said deficiency by depositing additional

stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of all stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

SEC. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held for all of its liabilities, accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

SEC. 10. In case of the insolvency of any banking institution, the billholders shall have a preference over its other creditors.

SEC. 11. The suspension of specie payments by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

SEC. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the general assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two-thirds of each branch of the general assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

ARTICLE IX—EDUCATION AND SCHOOL LANDS.

1st. Education.

SECTION 1. The educational interest of the state, including common schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a board of education, which shall consist of the lieutenant governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the state.

SEC. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said board who shall not have attained the age of twenty-five years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the state.

SEC. 3. One member of said board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold the office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this constitution, the board shall be divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years; and one-half of the board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

SEC. 4. The first session of the board of education shall be held at the seat of government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the general assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

SEC. 5. The session of the board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions, when, upon the recommendation of two-thirds of the board, the governor may order a special session.

SEC. 6. The board of education shall appoint a secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the board, and the laws of the state. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the general assembly.

SEC. 7. All rules and regulations made by the board shall be published and distributed to the several counties, townships, and school districts, as may be provided for by the board, and when so made, published and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

SEC. 8. The board of education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to common schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the school or university fund of this state; but all acts, rules, and regulations of said board may be altered, amended, or repealed by the general assembly; and when so altered, amended, or repealed they shall not be re-enacted by the board of education.

SEC. 9. The governor of the state shall be, *ex officio*, a member of said board.

SEC. 10. The board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of money. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the general assembly.

SEC. 11. The state university shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the university fund shall be applied to that institution and no other.

SEC. 12. The board of education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the state, through a system of common schools and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three months in each year. Any district failing, for two consecutive years, to organize and keep up a school as aforesaid may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

SEC. 13. The members of the board of education shall each receive the same per diem during the time of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the general assembly.

SEC. 14. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation, or law, for the government of common schools or other educational institutions, shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays on the final passage. The style of all acts of the board shall be, "Be it enacted by the Board of Education of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 15. At any time after the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the general assembly shall have power to abolish or reorganize said board of education, and provide for the educational interest of the state in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.*

2nd. School Funds and School Lands.

SECTION 1. The educational and school funds and lands, shall be under the control and management of the general assembly of this state.

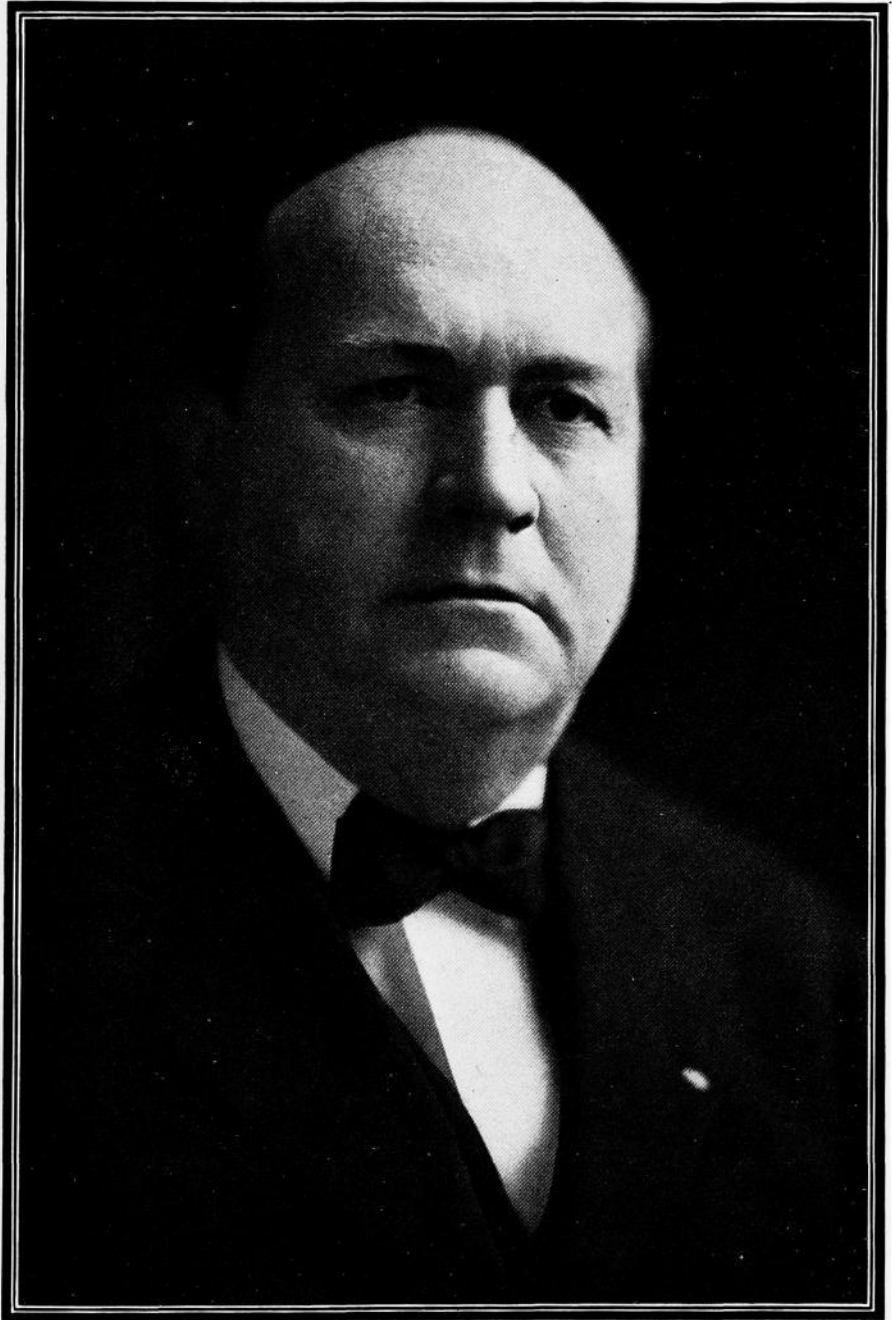
SEC. 2. The university lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all moneys belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the state university. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said university.

SEC. 3. The general assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of intellectual, scientific, moral, and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been, or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this state, for the support of schools, which may have been, or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new states, under an act of congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several states of the union, approved in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and all estates of deceased persons who may have died without leaving a will or heir, and also such per cent, as has been or may hereafter be granted by congress, on the sale of lands in this state, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which, together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the general assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of common schools throughout the state.

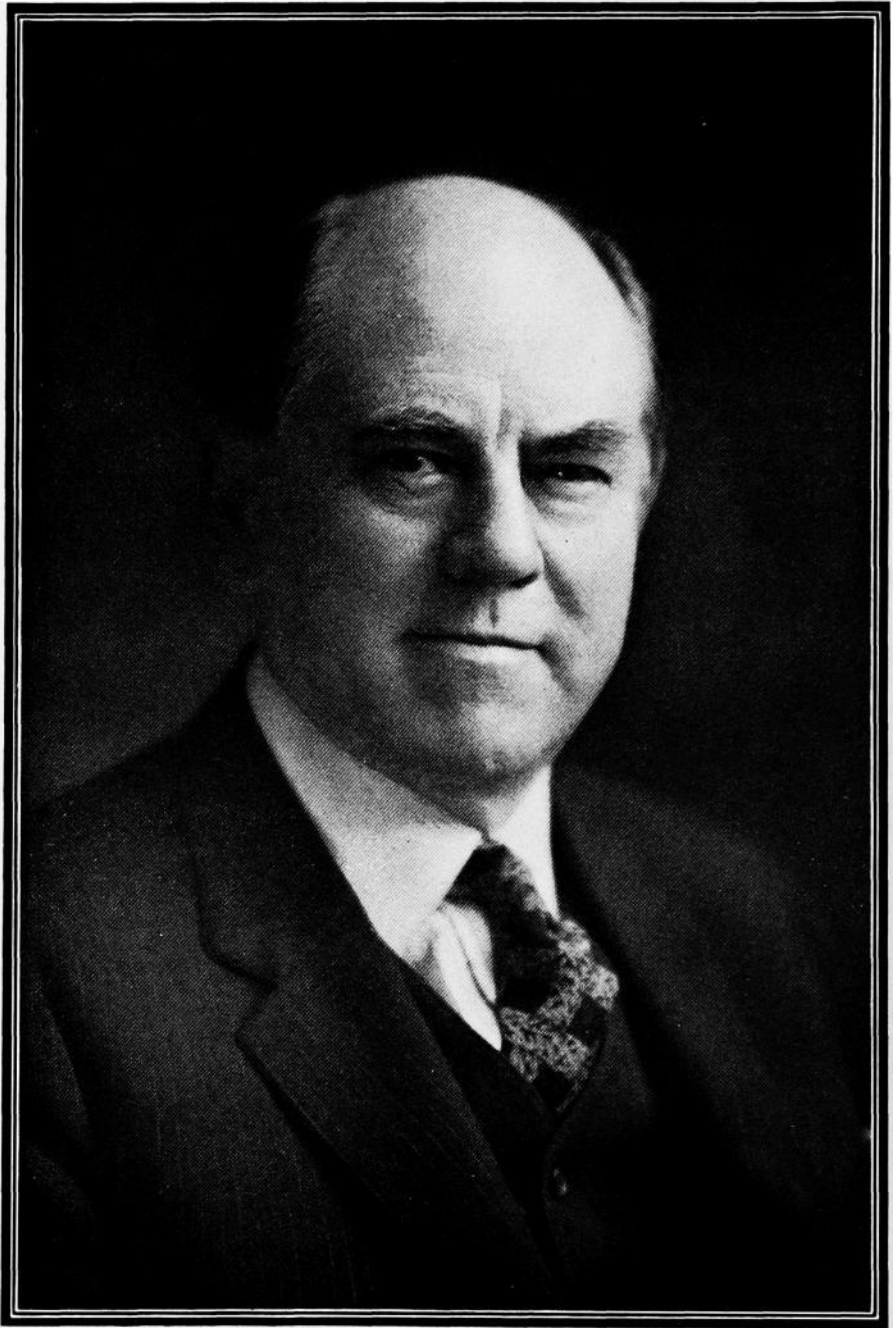
SEC. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent for exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied, in the several counties in which such money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support of common schools, or the establishment of libraries, as the board of education shall from time to time provide.

SEC. 5. The general assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons, to this state, for the use of the university, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose aforesaid, shall be,

Married Jennie Hearn, June 22, 1897, and has a family of four boys and two girls. Elected to United States senate in 1922 to fill unexpired term of Senator Kenyon. Lost in contest for seat with Daniel F. Steck following election in 1924. Re-elected in 1926.

and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the support of said university, for the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences, as may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the general assembly as soon as may be, to provide effectual means for the improvement and permanent security of the funds of said university.

SEC. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same, that by law, receive and control the state and county revenue for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

SEC. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of common schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youths, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, in such manner as may be provided by the general assembly.

ARTICLE X—AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SECTION 1. Any amendment or amendments to this constitution may be proposed in either house of the general assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the general assembly so next chosen as aforesaid such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to, by a majority of all the members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the general assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people, in such manner, and at such time as the general assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the constitution of this state.

SEC. 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall vote for or against each of such amendments separately.

SEC. 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the general assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election, for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a convention for such purpose, the general assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such convention.

ARTICLE XI—MISCELLANEOUS.

SECTION 1. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend to all civil cases, (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to real estate may arise,) where the amount in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding three hundred dollars.

SEC. 2. No new county shall be hereafter created containing less than four hundred and thirty-two square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the county of Worth, and the counties west of it, along the northern boundary of this state, may be organized without additional territory.

SEC. 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last state and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SEC. 4. The boundaries of the state may be enlarged, with the consent of congress and the general assembly.

SEC. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the

constitution of the United States, and of this state, and also an oath of office.

SEC. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 7. The general assembly shall not locate any of the public lands, which have been, or may be granted by congress to this state, and the location of which may be given to the general assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupant, so exempted, shall not exceed three hundred twenty acres.

SEC. 8. The seat of government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law, at the city of Des Moines, in the county of Polk; and the state university at Iowa City, in the county of Johnson.

ARTICLE XII—SCHEDULE.

SECTION 1. This constitution shall be the supreme law of the state, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The general assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this constitution into effect.

SEC. 2. All laws now in force and not inconsistent with this constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

SEC. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, complaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law; and all offenses, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial and punishment, in the same manner as they have been, had not this constitution been made.

SEC. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures due, or to become due, or accruing to the state, or to any county therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the state, county, or school fund, in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 5. All bonds executed to the state, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

SEC. 6. The first election under the constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, at which time the electors of the state shall elect the governor and lieutenant governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such state senators as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and the members of the house of representatives, who shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the session of the general assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

SEC. 7. The first election for secretary, auditor, and treasurer of state, attorney general, district judges, members of the board of education, district attorneys, members of congress and such state officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, (except the superintendent of public instruction,) and such county officers as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, except prosecuting attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight: *Provided*, That the time for which any district judge or other state or county officer elected at the April election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, shall not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

SEC. 8. The first election for judges of the supreme court, and such county officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

SEC. 9. The first regular session of the general assembly shall be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

SEC. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by vote of the general assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed, to any such office, before the taking effect of this constitution, (except as in this constitution otherwise provided,) shall continue in office until the term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire; but no such person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this constitution prescribed.

SEC. 12. The general assembly, at the first session under this constitution, shall district the state into eleven judicial districts, for district court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the general assembly, in accordance with the provisions of this constitution.

SEC. 13. This constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the several election districts in this state. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the constitution, "New Constitution—Yes." Those against the constitution, "New Constitution—No." The election shall be conducted in the same manner as the general elections of the state, and the poll-books shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twenty-fifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the secretary of state, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of state officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this constitution are in favor of the same, the governor shall immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such constitution shall be the constitution of the state of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation.

SEC. 14. At the same election that this constitution is submitted to the people for its adoption or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word "White" from the article on the right of suffrage shall be separately submitted to the electors of this state for adoption or rejection in the manner following—namely: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box; and those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the article on the right of suffrage? Yes." And those given against the proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the article on the right of suffrage? No." And if at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this constitution, then said word "White" shall be stricken from said article and be no part thereof.

SEC. 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the county of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth judicial district of this state.*

Done in convention at Iowa City, this fifth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the eighty-first.

PROCLAMATION

Whereas an instrument known as the "New Constitution of the State of Iowa" adopted by the constitutional convention of said state on the fifth day of March, A. D. 1857, was submitted to the qualified electors of said state at the annual election held on Monday the third day of August, 1857, for their approval or rejection.

And whereas an official canvass of the votes cast at said election shows that there were forty thousand three hundred and eleven votes cast for the adoption of said constitution and thirty-eight thousand six hundred and eighty-one votes were cast against its adoption, leaving a majority of sixteen hundred and thirty votes in favor of its adoption.

Now therefore I, JAMES W. GRIMES, Governor of said state, by virtue of the authority conferred upon me, hereby declare the said new constitution to be adopted, and declare it to be the supreme law of the state of Iowa.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the great seal of the state of Iowa.

Done at Iowa City this third day of September A. D. 1857 of the Independence of the United States the eighty-second and of the state of Iowa the eleventh.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA

from 1857 to 1919

AMENDMENTS OF 1868

1.

Strike the word "white" from section 1 of article II.

2.

Strike the word "white" from section 33 of article III.

3.

Strike the word "white" from section 34 of article III.

4.

Strike the word "white" from section 35 of article III.

5.

Strike the word "white" from section 1 of article VI.

NOTE—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1866; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1868; ratified at the election of November 3, 1868, and proclaimed adopted on December 8, 1868.

Sections 34 and 35 have been amended twice. The present amendment was adopted in 1904.

AMENDMENT OF 1880

1.

Strike out the words "free white" from the third line of section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1878; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1880; ratified at the election of November 2, 1880, and proclaimed adopted on December 3, 1880.

AMENDMENT OF 1882.

Add as section 26, to article I of said constitution, the following: No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

NOTE—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1880; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1882, ratified at a special election held on June 27, 1882, and certified adopted on July 23, 1882. On April 21, 1883, the supreme court in *Koehler and Lang v. Hill*, 60 Iowa 543, held that owing to certain irregularities the amendment was not legally submitted to the electors, and thence did not become a part of the constitution.

AMENDMENT OF 1884.

1.

The general election for state, district, county and township offices, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

2.

At any regular session of the general assembly the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized and the number of the districts and the judges of the said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.

3.

The grand jury may consist of any number of members, not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.

4.

That section 13 of article V of the constitution be stricken therefrom, and the following adopted as such section.

Section 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter, elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

NOTE—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1882; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1884; ratified at the election of November 4, 1884, and certified adopted on December 10, 1884.

AMENDMENTS OF 1904.

1.

Add as section 16, to article XII of the constitution, the following:

SEC. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one

thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.

2.

That sections thirty-four (34), thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa, be repealed and the following be adopted in lieu thereof:

SEC. 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census.

SEC. 35. The house of representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three-fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

SEC. 36. The general assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as herein before required.

NOTE.—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1902; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1904; ratified at the general election of November 8, 1904, and certified adopted on November 29, 1904. Section 16 is a new section.

AMENDMENT OF 1908.

Add to section 18 of article I of the constitution the following: The general assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The general assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1906; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1907; ratified at the election of November 3, 1908, and certified adopted on November 23, 1908.

AMENDMENTS OF 1916.

Repeal section 7 of article II and enact in lieu thereof the following:

SEC. 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1913; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1915, and ratified on November 7, 1916.

AMENDMENT OF 1917.

That the following amendment to article one (1) of the constitution of the state of Iowa be and the same is hereby proposed: To add thereto following section twenty-six (26) thereof and as section twenty-seven (27) of article one (1) of said constitution the following, to-wit:

SEC. 27. The manufacture, sale, or keeping for sale, as a beverage, of intoxicating liquors, including ale, wine and beer, shall be forever prohibited within this state. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1915; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1917; defeated at the special election October 15, 1917.

Yes: 214,693; no, 215,625—932.

AMENDMENT PROPOSED 1919.

1.

Joint resolution proposing that section 1 of article II of the constitution be repealed, and the following enacted in lieu thereof, to-wit:

SECTION 1. Every citizen of the United States of the age of twenty-one (21) years, who shall have been a resident of this state six (6) months next preceding the election, and of the county in which he or she claims his or her vote, sixty (60) days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

Resolved further, that the foregoing proposed amendment be, and the same is hereby referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election for members of the next general assembly, and that the secretary of state cause the same to be published for three (3) months previous to the day of said election as provided by law.

NOTE.—This amendment in substantially this form was proposed by the general assembly 1913; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1915; but was not adopted by the people. It was again proposed by the general assembly of 1917, but was not published as provided by Sec. 1 of Art. X of the constitution and Sec. 55 of the code of Iowa, which caused its second defeat. The present amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1919.

NOTE.—The general assembly was convened in special session on July 2, 1919, for the purpose of considering the proposed amendment to the constitution of the United States providing that the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

Federal amendment ratified on said date which made further action on the "Amendment Proposed 1919" unnecessary.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

At the general election on the second day of November, 1920, in pursuance of the law as found in section 1061 of the code and in article X, section 3 of the constitution of Iowa, there was submitted to the electors the following question:

"Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution and amend the same?"

Yes: 279,652; no: 221,763—57,889.

Thirty-ninth general assembly failed to provide for constitutional convention.

AMENDMENT OF 1926.

Strike out the word 'male' from section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1923; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1925; ratified at the election held November 2, 1926.

The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor, whose term of office is two years. He receives an annual salary of \$7,500.

No person is eligible who has not been a citizen of the United States and a resident of this state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

He is commander-in-chief of the military forces of the state.

He transacts all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

When any office, from any cause, becomes vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor has power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which expires at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation and shall state to both houses when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have convened.

He is required to communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and may make such recommendations to the body as he shall judge expedient.

In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor has power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

All bills must be submitted to him for approval, and a two-thirds vote of both branches of the legislature is required to pass a bill over his veto.

The governor has power to grant reprieves, commutation and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he has power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting. He has power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation or pardon granted, and the reason therefor.

He appoints all principal officers of the state not elected by the people, and certain officers connected with the state government, by and with the consent of the senate.

He signs patents for state lands, and appoints and commissions notaries public and commissioners in other states to take acknowledgment of deeds for this state.

He may demand fugitives from justice from the executives of other states, and may issue warrants, upon the requests of other governors, for fugitives found in this state.

LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR

Term of incumbent ends January, 1929.

CLEM F. KIMBALL, Council Bluffs. Born in Iowa.

The lieutenant-governor is elected for a term of two years and is required to have the same qualifications, as to age and residence, as the governor. He does not give bond.

In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of that office devolve upon the lieutenant-governor, for the residue of the term, or until the governor shall be acquitted, or the disability removed.

The lieutenant-governor is president of the senate, but can only vote when the senate is equally divided. In case of his death or other disability incapacitating him from discharging the duties of his office, the same devolve upon the president pro tempore of the senate.

He receives the same mileage and double the compensation of a senator. He maintains an office at the capitol building during the meetings of the general assembly.

The secretary of state is the head of the department of state. He is elected by the people for a term of two years, and receives a salary of \$4,000 a year.

*Additional employes of the motor vehicle department to the number of 30 to 35 are regularly employed at from \$85 to \$100 a month.

He is ex officio a member of the executive council. He is also ex officio a member of the board of trustees of the state library and the historical department of Iowa, of the state board of health, and of the state printing board.

The secretary of state countersigns all commissions and proclamations issued by the governor, and keeps a record thereof in the executive register.

The enrolled copies of the constitution and the laws of the state, the authenticated copies of the journals of the senate and house of the general assemblies, and many other legislative and state papers are filed in his office.

Certificates of nomination and all papers and records pertaining to the nomination, election and qualification of state and district officers are filed in his office.

All papers relative to the incorporation of cities and towns, the annexation or severance of territory, and the consolidation or abandonment of municipal corporations are transmitted to him and preserved as a part of the permanent records.

Articles of incorporation of both domestic and foreign corporations, as well as all amendments thereto, are filed and recorded and certificates of authority to transact business within the state of Iowa are issued by him. Applications for the registration of trade-marks, labels and forms of advertising are made to him and certificates issued thereon.

The records, files, field notes and plats of survey, and other papers and documents of the state land office, are in his custody.

Iowa corporations organized for pecuniary profit, and all foreign corporations authorized to do business in this state, are required to report annually, in July, to the secretary of state and pay him an annual fee of one dollar each. The secretary of state is required to send, during May and June of each year, to each corporation of record in his office, a notice, advising as to the provisions of the law, and a blank for use of the corporation in making report. On receipt of annual report and fee, the secretary of state is required to issue to the corporation an annual permit.

The registration in the office of the secretary of state and the filing of a \$1,000 bond is required to be made of all charitable organizations soliciting public aid in the state and a permit must first be procured from his department before any such organization, its agents or representatives may lawfully solicit public donations in any county, city, or township in Iowa except within the county in which such person resides or in which such association or institution is located or in an adjoining county if location or residence is within six miles of such adjoining county.

An important branch of the work in the office of the secretary of state is that relating to the administration of the so-called Blue Sky Law, the same being an act passed by the thirty-sixth general assembly to prevent fraud in the sale and disposition of stocks, bonds and other securities.

A record of the registration of motor vehicles is also kept by him, his office being a clearing house for the motor vehicle registration in each of the ninety-nine counties of the state.

The auditor of state keeps the accounts between the state and the United States, or any state, public official or person; makes settlement of accounts with county treasurers and receivers of state revenues; keeps accounts of all revenues, funds and income of the state and of all disbursements; settles accounts with public debtors for debts due the state; settles claims against the state treasury; superintends and enforces payment of moneys payable into the state treasury; superintends the fiscal affairs of the state and furnishes forms for reports to be made by county officials to the state; issues all warrants on the state treasurer of money directed by law to be paid out of the treasury; has custody of all books, securities, bonds, etc., pertaining to the fiscal affairs of the state, where such are not required to be kept in some other office; reports to the governor biennially as to the revenues, funds, income, taxable property, also as to expenditures and estimates expenditures for the biennial period following; makes apportionments of interest on the permanent school fund among the counties and directs the payment of the proceeds of escheat estates to the school fund.

The auditor of state also has charge of the municipal finance department, the county accounting department, as well as having supervision of companies selling bonds on the installment plan, and building and loan associa-

tions; he appoints the building and loan examiners, the county examiners, and the examiners of municipal accounts. All reports by any of the companies or associations above named are made to him, all fees, except fees for incorporation, are paid to him, and all deposits required by law of any such companies or associations to be made with the state are deposited in the auditor's office. None of the companies or associations named can transact business in the state until they have received a certificate of authority from the auditor.

In addition to the above he is a member of the executive council of the state, which body constitutes the board of assessment and review and also has general supervision of the state's business, is a member of the state printing board, the geologist board, the bonus board, and ex-officio member of the state board of health. He is also ex-officio secretary of the state board of audit.

The state board of audit consists of the auditor of state, the attorney general or one of his legal assistants, and the director of the budget.

This board audits all claims against the state except those for salaries of various officers which are fixed by law and claims on account of the institutions under the control of the board of control and the board of education.

The board is authorized and directed to formulate such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary to enable it to determine; that services charged for were actually performed; the time necessarily devoted to such service and the exact and necessary expenses incurred in the performance thereof.

The auditor of state and the director of the budget are ex officio members of this board. The third member is designated by the attorney general from among his assistants.

The public revenues of the state are received and disbursed by the treasury department; books are kept in which are recorded the names of all persons from whom money for any purpose is received, the date received, the purpose for which the money was remitted, and the amount thereof. Receipts in duplicate are issued for each item received, and the duplicate is filed with the auditor of state. When remittance of state dues is made by bank draft, check or certificate of deposit, such draft, check or certificate must be deposited for collection in some bank in the city of Des Moines which has been previously designated as a depository for state funds, and no receipt for any sum remitted by check or draft is issued by the treasurer until the depository receiving deposit notifies the department of the collection thereof.

All county recorders and superintendents of schools are required to remit to the treasurer of state on or before the 15th of each month all state moneys received by them during the preceding calendar month. All county treasurers are required to remit to the treasurer of state on or before the 15th of each month for the per capita costs of patients maintained in the various state institutions and who are residents of their counties, as certified to him by the county auditor, and to report to the treasurer at the same time the collection during the preceding month of taxes belonging to the state. The law provides that when the cash balance of general revenue funds in the state treasury is reduced below \$2,000,000.00 the treasurer of state may draw upon each county treasurer in proportion to the amount in his possession, a sum sufficient in the aggregate to increase said cash balance to an amount not to exceed \$3,000,000.00. The same provision governs the primary road fund except that the minimum is \$100,000.00 and the maximum \$500,000.00. The soldiers' bonus tax fund, collected by county treasurers, is drawn into the state treasury only at such times and in such amounts as is necessary to pay the interest and bonds as due.

All elective and appointive state officers, boards, commissions, and departments, except the state fair board, the state board of education, and the board of control of state institutions, are required to within ten days succeeding the collection thereof, deposit with the treasurer of state 90% of all fees, commissions and moneys collected or received. The balance actually collected

in cash, remaining in the hands of any officer, board or department cannot exceed the sum of \$5,000.00 and no money collected is authorized to be held more than 30 days. Each deposit must be accompanied by an itemized statement of the sources from which the money was collected and showing the funds to be credited.

The treasurer of state, with the consent of the executive council, may designate banks in the state of Iowa as depositories of state funds in amounts not exceeding the limits to be fixed by said council. Each bank so designated shall pay interest on daily balances at the rate of 2½% at such times as may be agreed upon by the banks and the treasurer of state, with the approval of the executive council.

Disbursements from the state treasury are made only upon warrants issued by the auditor of state. A record is kept of each warrant paid, showing date of issue, date of payment, to whom paid and upon what account drawn. During the last biennial period the disbursements amounted to \$86,983,544.14 and the receipts were \$91,387,800.87.

An act of the forty-first general assembly requires the treasurer of state to collect from distributors a license fee of two cents per gallon on all gasoline used in the state for any purpose whatsoever. Provision is made for the refund of the license fee paid when the gasoline is used for certain purposes. One-third of the proceeds is distributed to the primary road fund, one-third to county road fund and one-third to township road fund. The forty-second general assembly authorized an additional license fee of one cent a gallon, effective July 4, 1927; the proceeds to be added to the primary road fund after deductions to cover certain bridge refunds to counties.

The state treasurer is the custodian of the permanent endowment fund of the state agricultural college. This fund amounts to about \$680,000.00 and is loaned at not less than five per cent, secured by first mortgages upon real estate in Iowa. The interest only may be used by the college. This interest is payable to the state treasurer and is by him paid to the treasurer of the college. The accounts of the department are inspected quarterly under the direction of the governor.

The treasurer also handles funds which may be diverted under the public funds deposit guaranty act of the forty-first general assembly for covering losses of public funds deposited in any bank which may be placed in the hands of a receiver for liquidation.

The attorney general is elected for a period of two years.

It is the duty of the attorney general to appear for the state, prosecute or defend all actions and proceedings, civil and criminal, in which the state shall be a party or interested, when requested to do so by the governor, executive council or general assembly or he may so appear on his own motion; and shall prosecute or defend for the state all causes in the supreme court in which the state is a party or interested.

The attorney general is given supervisory power over county attorneys and in a general way looks after the enforcement of the law over the entire state.

He shall also, when requested, give his opinion in writing upon all questions of law submitted to him by the general assembly or any state department.

It is also his duty to prepare drafts for contracts, forms and other writings which may be required for the use of the state, and shall at the close of each biennial period report to the governor the condition of his office, the opinions rendered and the business transacted in the office.

The attorney general is chairman of the state board of law examiners, ex-officio a member of the state printing board, and chief of the bureau of investigation.

The state board of law examiners was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly which went into effect on the 4th day of July, 1901.

The attorney general is, by virtue of his office, chairman of the board, and the other members are appointed by the supreme court.

The members of the board are paid as compensation fifteen dollars per day out of the fund arising from examination fees. The supreme court may appoint temporary examiners to serve for one examination.

Every applicant for admission to the bar must pass an examination by the board as to his legal attainments, and also as to his preliminary educational qualifications, unless he furnishes proof of such qualification by presenting a diploma or certificate that he is a graduate of a college, high school, normal school or academy, or that he has regularly and in good faith pursued and successfully completed four years of the regular course of an accredited high school, or the certificate of the state board of educational examiners that he has successfully passed an examination by that board, or the certificate of the president of the state university or of any college in this state having an equivalent collegiate or liberal art study, that he has been found on proper certification or examination to be entitled to admission, without condition, as a student of such university or college, for which admission the applicant must have actually and in good faith acquired a general education substantially equivalent to that involved in the completion of a high school course of study of at least four years extent.

If the applicant fails to pass the examination he may not take a second examination within three months after such failure. Examination fee, \$5; certificate fee, \$1. Persons admitted on motion from other states, \$10.

The fortieth general assembly passed an act consolidating into one department, to be known as the state department of agriculture, the following administrative agencies of state and the laws governing same, to wit:

1. The former department of agriculture with all its statutory activities and duties, except such as relate to the state fair.
2. The dairy and food department and all the administrative agencies connected therewith.
3. The animal health commission and veterinary department and all their administrative agencies.
4. The petroleum inspection service and hotel license and inspection, and all matters pertaining thereto.
5. State horticultural society.
6. Iowa corn and small grain growers' association.
7. Iowa beef and cattle producers' association.
8. Iowa state dairy association.
9. The state weather and crop service.
10. Iowa state poultry association.

Also the office of secretary of agriculture was created, whose duties are in addition to any other duty which may be prescribed by law:

1. To encourage, promote and advance the interests of agriculture, including horticulture, live stock industry, dairying, cheese making, poultry raising, bee keeping, forestry, production of wool, and other kindred and allied industries.
2. To promote and devise methods of conducting said industries with the view of increasing production and facilitating an adequate distribution of the same at the least cost to the producer.
3. To compile statistics and information, in cooperation with the federal government, relative to crop production, farm economics, the production and marketing of beef, pork, mutton, wool, poultry, milk, butter, cheese and all other agricultural products, in so far as such statistical information may be deemed of value to agriculture and its allied interests in the state, which statistics, when published, shall constitute the official agricultural statistics of the state.
4. To cooperate with the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts in all ways that may be beneficial to the agricultural interests of the state.
5. To include in his compilation and publication, the reports of agricultural, horticultural, live stock associations and other like associations or societies organized for the promotion of the agricultural interests of the state.
6. The forty-second general assembly provided that the state entomologist shall be responsible to and under the authority of the secretary of agriculture in the issuance of all rules and regulations, the establishment of quarantine and other acts. The sum of \$200,000 was provided to fight the corn borer.

The state superintendent is the official head of the public school system of Iowa; president of the board of educational examiners, member of the Iowa library commission, and president of the state board of vocational education. As president of the board of educational examiners, the issuance of all licenses to teach are under her personal supervision.

She must render opinions in writing upon questions of school law when requested by school officials, publish the school laws with explanatory notes on the same and after each session of the legislature prepare and publish a pamphlet containing changes and additions to the school laws. The final appellate jurisdiction on questions of a quasi judicial nature appealed from the decision of the county superintendent is vested in the superintendent of public instruction who must hear the appeal and render a written decision thereon.

The superintendent of public instruction has general supervision over the county superintendents of the state. She may arrange for teachers' institutes and must approve institute faculties, prepare questions for teachers' examinations, read and grade the papers and issue teachers' certificates.

She is required by law to publish and distribute pamphlets on courses of study, outlines for the teaching of American citizenship, American history, civics of the state and nation, social problems and economics.

She establishes the educational standards for teachers in approved high schools and designates normal training high schools for the training of teachers, approves their course of study, their teaching corps, and determines the branches to be covered in the written examinations for normal training certificates.

The superintendent of public instruction may appoint a deputy who must be approved by the governor, an inspector of grade and high schools, an inspector of consolidated schools, an inspector of normal training high schools, an inspector of rural and standard schools and an inspector of mining camp schools. These inspectors visit each school in the state as often as possible, check the work that is being done by the teachers, the equipment provided, and such general conditions as are necessary to aid in the classification and approval of the schools. Under her direction, the examination questions for eighth grade graduation are prepared. She also apportions the state aid to standard schools, to mining camp schools, to consolidated schools and to normal training high schools.

All teachers' certificates are issued by the board of educational examiners. There are three series of certificates, viz., (1) state diplomas and state certificates, (2) high school normal training certificates, (3) uniform county certificates.

State certificates are issued upon (1) graduation from accredited Iowa colleges; (2) graduation from colleges and normal schools of other states which meet the Iowa standard; provided the applicants file proofs of two years' successful teaching; (3) state certificates of other states which meet the Iowa standard; (4) examination. The state diploma is issued only upon examination.

High school normal training certificates are issued upon graduation from approved normal training high schools and examination.

Uniform county certificates are issued only upon examination.

The board of educational examiners makes regulations for the granting of certificates to graduates of the regular and collegiate courses of the state university, the state teachers' college, and the state college of agriculture and mechanic arts, and determines what other colleges and normal schools are entitled to like recognition.

The statute makes it a duty of the board of educational examiners to prepare and publish a list of books suitable for rural school libraries, from which list the library committee of all rural schools must make selection when purchasing books for their libraries.

Among the duties placed upon the executive council by the laws of Iowa, are the following: to purchase all stores, supplies and furniture for state departments and officers; the execution of contracts for fuel, lights, repairs:

the approval of articles of incorporation and by-laws of building and loan associations, and plan for liquidation of said associations; the custody of supplies for state officers and commissions; the assessment of railway, express, sleeping and equipment car, telegraph and telephone properties; the classification of railways; the making of tax levies for state purposes and the certification of the same to the several county auditors; the certification of tax valuations, fixed by the executive council, to the several county auditors; the adjustment of property valuations between counties; the canvass of votes cast for state and district officers; the compilation of a state census once in ten years; the declaration of changes in classification of cities; the compilation and publication of annual reports of (a) railway, express, sleeping and equipment car assessments and (b) telegraph and telephone assessments; the determination of the territory outside of Iowa in which Iowa life insurance companies may loan money; the making of annual settlement with all state officers, under section 161-a of the supplement to the code 1913; the assignment of office rooms to state officers in capitol building; the appointment of the board of examiners of mine inspectors; to dispose of state documents which the state librarian, curator of historical department and curator of law department may certify are not required for state uses; to approve rules for uniformity of assessments in counties; to approve claims for the expenses of collection of inheritance taxes and for the repayment of such taxes when wrongfully paid; the approval of plans for buildings at the state educational institutions, under certain conditions; to determine the value at which property may be taken by Iowa corporations and the amount of stock which may be issued on account thereof; the development of the capitol grounds extension. The secretary of the executive council is also secretary of the board of conservation and of the board of engineering examiners.

CUSTODIAN

The thirty-ninth general assembly adopted an act providing that the executive council shall appoint a custodian of public buildings and grounds, but failed to provide compensation. In this situation the council designated its secretary for the place without additional pay. The forty-first general assembly made provision for an annual salary of \$2,700 beginning July 1, 1925.

The powers and duties of the board of railroad commissioners are: To generally supervise all railroads in the state, both steam and electric, except street railroads; to inquire into any neglect or violation of the laws of the state by any railroad corporation doing business therein; to make examinations and inspections of the physical condition, conduct and management of such railroads and report their condition to said companies; to stop and prevent railroad companies, under certain circumstances, from running or passing their trains over unsafe bridges; to adjudge changes in station houses, rolling stock and rates of fare; to pass on necessity for spur tracks to be constructed and maintained not exceeding three miles in length to an exist-

ing industry under terms and conditions approved by the commission as set out by law; to make reasonable rules for the crossing of steam and interurban railways and to require, when necessary, interlocking switches at railroad crossings; to make report on first Monday in December in each year to the governor of its doings for the preceding year, accompanied with appropriate suggestions and recommendations; to receive, tabulate and report upon the annual reports filed with it by railroad companies; to examine any of the books, papers or documents of any such corporation; to examine under oath employes of such corporation; to issue subpoenas, administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses; to make and fix maximum schedules of freight rates for such corporations, such schedules to be deemed reasonable until disproved; to examine into rates in force, upon complaint that the rate charged by a railroad company, or that the maximum rates fixed by the commission are unreasonably high or discriminating, and to fix the rate again, which must not be higher than any rate established by law, such decision of the commission is prima facie evidence that the rate so made is a reasonable maximum rate; to bring suits to enforce its orders; to inquire into the management of the business of such carriers and to obtain from them full and complete information necessary to enable the commissioners to carry out the objects of the law; to hear, investigate and determine all complaints alleging unreasonable rates; unjust discrimination, undue preference, violation of the long and short haul clause, or other infractions of the commission law, and make proper orders thereupon; to establish joint through rates, upon application, over two or more connecting lines; and to have the same authority over express companies as the act confers concerning railroads.

Before a railroad company may appropriate coal, coke or oil received for shipment, it must first secure the written consent of the railroad commission.

Before any railway company may condemn lands for additional depot grounds, or for straightening or relocating track, the permission of the board must be obtained. Interlocking switches may be placed at grade railroad crossings or draw bridges, thus obviating the necessity of stopping trains before passing over such grade crossings or draw bridges, but before the interlocking switch may be used, consent of the board must be obtained.

The thirty-fifth general assembly gave to the commission the power to grant to individuals or corporations "engaged in the manufacture, sale, or distribution for sale of electric current for light, power, or heating purposes, the right within the state, except in cities and towns, to erect and maintain poles, wires, towers, fixtures and other necessary construction for the purpose of conducting electricity for lighting, power and heating purposes over, along and across any public land, highways or streams or the lands of any person or persons, and to acquire the necessary interests in real estate therefor." It also provided that transmission lines proceeding under the provisions of the law should be subject to "such reasonable regulations as the commission may from time to time, prescribe."

The board is directed by an act of the thirty-ninth general assembly to "undertake and carry forward such investigation and preparation as shall be necessary to properly represent the interests of the state in connection with the valuation of the property of common carriers now being conducted by the interstate commerce commission."

The thirty-ninth general assembly authorized the railroad commission upon application to them to issue to any warehouseman a license for the conduct of a bonded warehouse under the provisions of chapter 119, laws of the thirty-ninth general assembly, and such rules and regulations as might be made thereunder.

The fortieth general assembly conferred on the commission the power to issue certificates authorizing motor carriers to operate over the public highways of the state, upon a showing that the proposed service would promote "the public convenience" and authorized the board to prescribe rules and regulations for the operation of motor vehicles used by such carriers "for

the protection and safety of the public." The forty-first general assembly revised the laws on this subject, but left their administration with the railroad commission.

The thirty-fourth general assembly created the office of commerce counsel, to be appointed by the board of railroad commissioners for a term of four years, subject to confirmation by senate. The law provides that the counsel may appoint assistants, subject to the approval of the board of railroad commissioners. The duties of the office briefly are as follows:

DUTIES OF COMMERCE COUNSEL

The legal advisor of the board of railroad commissioners. To investigate and present matters with reference to interstate rates to the board of railroad commissioners, prosecute the same before said board, or before any court to which same may be taken. To investigate on his own motion, or at the request of the board, all matters involving interstate rates in which the people of Iowa are interested, and present the same to the interstate commerce commission and prosecute same to the final determination. To act as attorney for and represent the board of railroad commissioners in all courts of this state or of the United States, in which the validity of any order of said board is in issue; to institute and prosecute in any of the courts any and all suits necessary to the proper enforcement of any rule or order of said railroad commissioners or make defense therein wherever said rule or order may be called in question.

The commissioner of insurance is the executive head of the insurance department of Iowa and has direction of all insurance business transacted in the state and the execution of laws relating to insurance.

The commissioner is authorized to conduct examinations of insurance organizations transacting business in the state. Domestic companies, associations and societies are required to be so examined at least biennially. The companies are visited and the audits made in their offices.

All deposits required by law to be made with the state by any such company, association or society, are directly in charge of the commissioner and a careful record is kept thereof, showing each item. The amount of approved securities representing capital stock and the legal reserve value of policies of Iowa life companies and associates on deposit in this department on January 1, 1927, was \$253,645,603.58.

All fees due the state from insurance companies and associations are paid to the commissioner of insurance and turned over to the treasurer of state and placed in the general funds.

The commissioner passes upon the articles of incorporation of new insurance organizations. He has entire control over the organization of new insurance companies in the state. No policies may be sold in the state until the policy forms have been approved by him, and all agents appointed by the companies and associations to represent them in the state must be licensed by the insurance department.

The office of director of the budget was created by the fortieth general assembly, extra session, effective May 2, 1924. The director of the budget is appointed by the governor subject to confirmation by the senate.

The law provides for a state budget, for the examination, by the budget director, of the accounts of departments of state, for a review of public contracts and bond issues in certain cases, and for local budgets. The director is authorized to prescribe methods for enforcing and carrying out all of the provisions of the law, and to conduct hearings on all matters within his jurisdiction and render decisions thereon.

The first budget report to be prepared under the law was submitted to the governor and forty-first general assembly in January, 1925.

The budget report sets out in detail the actual expenditures for the preceding two bienniums, the estimated expenditures at the close of the biennium, the departmental askings for the succeeding two years and the budget director's estimates for the same period together with the governor's approval.

There is also submitted a state appropriation bill.

The director is a member of the state board of audit whose duty it is to audit claims for money due from the state.

The law further provides for an appeal board which shall consist of the director and two additional members. The two members to serve with the

director are appointed by the governor in the same manner required for the appointment of the director and the term of office is four years. The director is chairman of the board. The board considers and determines appeals from the action of the state board of education, the state board of control and the state fair board, in respect to letting of contracts for buildings or other improvements in which the amount involved is in excess of \$25,000.

The superintendent of banking is the head of the banking department of Iowa and has general control, supervision and direction of all banks and trust companies incorporated under the laws of Iowa and he is charged with the execution of the laws of the state relating to banking, including the public funds deposit guaranty act passed by the forty-first general assembly.

The deputy superintendent and bank examiners are appointed by the superintendent of banking, and their salaries are fixed by him within certain limits prescribed by law. One examiner to each one hundred banks or major fraction thereof and one clerk to each two hundred banks or major fraction are allowed by law. Additional examiners and office help may be employed and increases in salaries made with the approval of the executive council. The banking department is self-supporting.

The superintendent of banking is ex-officio a member and chairman of the state banking board created by act of the forty-first general assembly. This board acts in an advisory capacity concerning all matters pertaining to the banking department and the Iowa banking laws. There are four other members, appointive by the governor, with compensation of \$10 a day and expenses while engaged in the state's business.

The work of the department of banking has increased greatly during the last few years on account of the superintendent of banking being the official receiver of all closed state and savings banks and trust companies. The total expense of all receivership trusts averages four and three-tenths per cent on the amount collected. The interest collected on notes and bank balances has been more than the total expense.

The duties of the reporter and editor are:

1. To submit such recommendations as he deems proper to each general assembly for the purpose of amending, revising and codifying such portions of the law as may be conflicting, redundant, or ambiguous, and to lay said recommendations before the presiding officers of each house.

2. To edit and compile the code after each even-numbered session of the general assembly so that the same may be printed.

3. To edit and prepare for publication a series of annotations of the statutes of Iowa containing annotations of all such statutes as have been construed by the supreme court of this state or the federal courts, and cause the same to be printed in separate volumes arranged in the same manner as the titles, chapters and sections of the code.

4. To prepare and cause to be published immediately following the issuance of the code in 1927, and every four years thereafter, a volume which shall by proper annotations show the construction placed by the supreme court of this state and the federal courts on all statutes of this state since the then existing permanent volume of annotations. The edition of 1931 and all subsequent volumes shall constitute a cumulation of the edition of 1927 and shall be so continued until said cumulation shall reach a size sufficient for a permanent volume.

5. To promptly prepare syllabi for all opinions of the supreme court and an index and proper tables for each volume of the reports.

The clerk of the supreme court acts as secretary of the board of law examiners. All applications for admission to the bar are filed and recorded by him and certificates of admission to the bar are issued by the clerk. Each applicant for admission to the bar shall pay to the clerk of the supreme court an examination fee of \$5.00. Foreign attorneys admitted to the bar of this state on motion pay a fee of \$10.00. Out of the fees for the bar examination the clerk pays the board of law examiners their per diem on certificate of the attorney general.

This department has jurisdiction in all matters pertaining to the adjustment of claims for personal injuries arising out of and in course of employment, where the same is not agricultural or domestic in character. All settlements between employer and employe are subject to approval by the industrial commissioner. The deputy commissioner is vested with full authority in administration. Arbitration is exercised where parties fail to agree, and such decision is subject to review by the industrial commissioner and to appeal to the courts. Where employers fail to carry compensation coverage they are personally held in statutory payment for compensable injuries. Upon financial showing satisfactory to the insurance and industrial commissioners employers may be authorized to carry their own insurance.

The staff of the commander-in-chief consists of an adjutant general, with rank of brigadier general, who is chief of staff and acting quartermaster general, an assistant adjutant general, with rank of major, and twelve aides who have the rank of lieutenant colonel, except that any person so appointed, who has held a higher rank for a period of one year or more in the guard may be appointed with the rank of the highest rank so held by him, or the twelve aides may be detailed for such service from the active membership of the guard, but if so detailed they hold their rank in the guard and shall perform the duties of aide in addition to their regular duties.

The adjutant general is appointed by the governor. He issues and transmits all orders of the commander-in-chief and keeps a record of all appointments of officers commissioned by the governor, of all the general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military force and his duties. He holds office for a period of four years, first period starting July 4, 1915, and also performs the duty of quartermaster general in addition to his duties as adjutant general. He has charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes and receives and issues all

quartermaster and ordnance stores and camp equipage upon the order of the commander-in-chief. He furnishes at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as are approved by the commander-in-chief. In each year, preceding a regular session of the general assembly, or at any other time the governor may direct, he makes out a detailed report of the transactions of this office, the expenses thereof and such other matters as shall be required by the commander-in-chief for the period since the last preceding report.

All muster rolls, reports, returns, enlistments, discharges and complete records of the organized militia are filed and made a matter of record in his office. The records of Iowa soldiers of the Civil and Spanish-American wars are on file in his office and all information desired from such records is furnished by him. Certificates of military service of Iowa soldiers of the late wars or past service in the organized militia are given by him under the seal of the state. He is the disbursing officer of all state appropriations for the use and support of the organized militia and as acting quartermaster general all military property is committed to his custody which he is required to issue for the use of the militia, keeping an account of the same. He is required to furnish such reports of the organized militia of the state as the secretary of war may from time to time require. As chief of staff he is to perform his duties as such officer as directed by the commander-in-chief or required by the laws of Iowa governing its organized militia or by orders and regulations.

In addition to the duties above defined, the adjutant general also has the direction of the compilation of the roster for soldiers, sailors and marines in the Mexican border service of 1916-1917, and the World's war, 1917-1918 and 1919, and other historical data in connection with the World's war.

The soldiers' bonus law, chapter 332 Acts of the Thirty-ninth General Assembly voted on and carried at the November election, 1922, provides for a bond issue of \$22,000,000.00 for the purpose of paying all honorably discharged veterans of the World war, who were residents of Iowa at the time of entry into service, a bonus of fifty cents a day for each day of active service, the maximum payment to any veteran not to exceed \$350.00.

The law further provides that December 31, 1924, be the final date for filing claims and that any surplus not in excess of \$2,000,000.00 shall constitute an additional bonus and disability fund for the relief of disabled veterans who come within the provisions of section four of the act.

The auditor of state, treasurer of state, the adjutant general and the adjutant of the Iowa department, American Legion are named as members of the board.

The statutes of Iowa provide the sentence of a prisoner convicted of a felony shall be for the maximum term provided for the crime committed thus leaving to the court imposing the sentence no discretion as to the time of confinement. The board of parole is given authority to release on parole outside the prison, all prisoners, except those sentenced for life terms. Rules and regulations are provided which must be observed by the man while on parole, and for the violation of which he may be remanded to prison.

IOWA STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION

The highway commission was first established in Iowa under chapter 105, acts of the thirtieth general assembly, which directed the Iowa State College as an institution to act as the highway commission for the state. In 1913 the thirty-fifth general assembly reorganized the entire system of road administration and created a highway commission of three members, one of whom should be the dean of engineering at Ames. In 1927 the forty-second general assembly increased the number of members of the commission to five and passed what is known as the state control law giving the commission full control over construction and maintenance of the primary road system and the primary road fund.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

The state department of health is headed by a commissioner appointed by the governor for a term of four years, and confirmed by two-thirds vote of the senate. The department is aided by an advisory body known as the state board of health, which body is headed by the commissioner. Members of the state executive council are ex-officio members. Also there are five members appointed by the governor. The terms of the incumbents expire the second Tuesday in January. They are: H. L. Saylor, M. D., Des Moines; D. C. Steelsmith, M. D., Dubuque; H. E. Sugg, M. D., Clinton; W. D. Hayes, C. P. H., Sioux City; A. A. Robertson, M. D., Council Bluffs. These five appointive members receive no compensation but are allowed traveling expenses.

POWERS AND DUTIES OF COMMISSIONER

The commissioner of public health as head of the state department of health exercises general supervision over the public health, promotes public hygiene and sanitation and unless otherwise provided enforces the laws relating to same. He makes investigations and surveys in respect to causes of disease and epidemics and the effect of locality, employment and living conditions upon the public health. Also inspects sanitary conditions in any locality of the state upon written petition of five or more citizens and may issue directions for improvement of same.

He shall establish, publish and enforce a code of rules governing the installation of plumbing in cities and towns and amend the same when deemed necessary. He must exercise general supervision over the administration of the housing law and give aid to local authorities in enforcement of same. He must establish stations for the distribution of antitoxins and vaccines to physicians, druggists, and other persons at cost; exercise general supervision over the administration and enforcement of the venereal disease law; he has sole jurisdiction over the disposal and transportation of the dead bodies of human beings; he must exercise general supervision over the administration and enforcement of the vital statistics law and must establish and maintain such divisions in the department as are necessary for the proper enforcement of the laws administered by it.

POWERS AND DUTIES OF BOARD OF HEALTH

The board must recommend policies and practices to the department relative to any duty imposed upon it by law, which recommendations shall be given due consideration by the department; it must advise the department relative to causes of disease and epidemics, sanitary conditions, contagious and infectious diseases, venereal diseases, antitoxins and vaccines, housing and vital statistics; to advise or make recommendations to the governor and general assembly relative to public health, hygiene and sanitation.

The forty-second general assembly passed a bill requiring the licensing of barbers, and also one requiring the licensing of cosmeticians. Administration of these measures was placed under the board of health.

FUNCTIONS OF STATE FAIR BOARD

The Iowa State Fair as an institution has existed since the first fair was held at Fairfield October 25-26 and 27, 1854, but it remained for the fortieth general assembly in 1923 and the extra session thereof to set out the Iowa State Fair Board as a separate and distinct department.

Previous to 1923 the fair was operated under the state department of agriculture. The fortieth general assembly, however, created a new department of agriculture, consolidating therewith a number of other departments and at the extra session the law was passed creating the state fair board, effective October 23, 1924.

The law provides for a state agricultural convention to be held at the state capitol in Des Moines on the second Wednesday in December of each year. The delegates to this convention are the officers and members of the state fair board; the president, secretary or *accredited* delegate of each of the county and district fairs; the president or accredited representative of the following organizations; each farmers' institute organized according to law and receiving state aid; the State Horticultural Society; the Iowa State Dairy Association; the Iowa Beef Producers' Association and the Iowa Corn and Small Grain Growers' Association. In counties where no fair is held the board of supervisors may appoint a delegate.

The convention elects a president and a vice president for a term of one year, and a director from each congressional district for a term of two years. The directors from the even numbered districts are elected on the even year and those from the odd numbered districts on the odd year. The secretary and treasurer are elected annually by the state fair board. The law fixes the compensation of the president, vice president and directors at ten dollars (\$10) per day and expenses while in attendance at board and committee meetings. The law also fixes the maximum amount to be paid the treasurer at \$250 and the secretary at \$4,000 annually.

By statute the state fair board is made the custodian of the state fair grounds and the board of managers of the annual state fair. The state makes no regular appropriations for the operating expense of the board and the state fair or the maintenance of the fair grounds and buildings. The law specifically provides that all operating expense, maintenance, etc., shall be paid out of the receipts of the state fair unless there is a special appropriation providing for same. The law also provides that the state will not be liable for any expense or liabilities incurred by the board. The state has appropriated since 1902, \$817,000 for buildings, \$83,013 for additional land, \$14,000 for sanitary sewer system, and \$28,280 for paving assessments against the grounds. In the same period \$106,700 has been appropriated for insurance premiums and maintenance of grounds and buildings. In addition to the above, the Forty-second General Assembly appropriated \$250,000 for the construction of a combination grand stand and educational building.

During this same twenty-five year period there has been expended from the fair receipts, \$810,436 for buildings and other improvements, \$200,626 for insurance premiums and maintenance of grounds and buildings, and the entire operating expense of fair amounting to \$4,266,102.

The inventory taken November 30, 1926, shows the present value of the grounds and buildings to be worth \$1,678,788. This inventory takes into consideration the original cost of all permanent buildings and other improvements with the usual annual depreciation. It is safe to say that the replacement value of buildings and other improvements would be more than double the amount carried in the inventory.

The title to the state fair grounds and all property is held in the name of the state of Iowa and all deeds and abstracts are on file in the auditor of state's office.

The general assembly in 1884 provided for the creation of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the appointment of a commissioner, defining his duties, and his tenure of office. The work as outlined was purely statistical and was designed for the purpose of making inquiry into the conditions surrounding the employment of labor, its connection with the development of industries both mechanical and those arising from the natural resources of the state, the advantages and inducements offered in various localities for the establishment of desirable industries, the extent and productive value of industries already established and information relative to the home life and general welfare of the workers.

The inspection of factories, mercantile establishments, theaters, buildings, etc., embracing employment of over a half million workers, is one of the most important services the bureau renders to the state.

Under jurisdiction of the Bureau of Labor are laws relating to health and safety in factories, work shops, mercantile establishments, theaters, elevators, etc., the fire escape law, child labor law, inspection of employment bureaus, both public and private, arbitration and conciliation, report of accidents.

Another service of the bureau is that rendered by the state free employment bureau. Through cooperation of the state and federal governments under direction of the labor commissioner the state-federal employment service referred 63,012 applicants to jobs of whom 61,411 were actually placed during the biennial period ending June 30, 1926. Of these 10,173 were placed in farm jobs.

The office of state fire marshal was created by an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly. The principal duties of the fire marshal are to investigate the cause, origin and circumstances of every fire occurring in the state; to determine if any buildings or structures, by reason of want of proper repair

or by reason of age and dilapidated conditions, are especially liable to fire and to order their repair or removal; to require teachers in public and private schools to have at least one fire drill a month and instruct the pupils at least four times a year in the causes and dangers of fires; to make an annual report to the governor. For the purpose of enforcing the orders of the fire marshal suitable penalties and fines are provided and he and his deputy are empowered to administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses. If the state fire marshal shall be of the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arson or criminal conduct in connection with any fire he shall cause such person to be arrested. Reports are required to be made to the fire marshal by all chiefs of fire departments of each and every fire, and where there is no established fire department the report is to be made by mayors and by township clerks outside of incorporated cities and towns. For the two-year period beginning July 1, 1925, the fire marshal has an allowance of \$6,600 for traveling expenses and \$6,400 for mileage and reporting fees.

The accession list of the general, law and legislative reference departments of the state library on the first day of July, 1926, included 193,994 volumes, an increase of 128,961 volumes in the last twenty-seven years. The total accessions of the biennial period ending June 30, 1926, were 8,314 volumes. The mission of the general library as a reference library is that of a final resort for information in science, the mechanic arts, the fine arts, biography, general history, literature and philosophy. A department of economics and sociology was created by the fortieth general assembly, an outgrowth of the legislative reference bureau—which bureau is now a part of the law library. The use made of the new department by legislators, legislative committee clerks, students of economics and sociology, and other persons interested, is steadily increasing. Annual appropriations for the several departments are as follows: the general department, \$5,000; law and legislative reference, \$6,000; medical, \$2,000; economics and sociology, \$1,000.

The medical department has been in operation six years with a trained medical librarian in charge, and with about 8,136 volumes of books and periodicals on its shelves. By the utilization of traveling library methods of reaching remote localities and in other ways the department has become highly serviceable to the medical profession. Physicians, surgeons and medical students from all parts of the state are availing themselves of its books and periodicals.

The Iowa Library Commission was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly in March, 1900. Two years later the traveling library previously under the state library was transferred to the commission.

The executive officer of the commission is the secretary who also bears the title of director of library extension. The activities of the commission consist (1) of the work of extension and supervision carried on by the secretary assisted by the organizer.

This consists of help given by personal correspondence and visits in the inaugurating of library projects and the arousing of interest in the submission of the question of tax support in communities without public libraries,

and of advice and help in the selection of building plans, equipment and furniture, books, etc.

The second activity of the commission is the traveling library, books from which go out (a) in fixed groups of 50 volumes each as general reading by adults and children. These groups become small libraries in the communities to which they go. (b) In selected groups for reading or study in numbers to meet the needs of borrowers. Books are loaned to organizations of all kinds, to schools and to individuals. For the two-year period beginning July 1, 1925, the library commission has an allowance of \$18,500 for maintenance and operation.

The department, founded July 1, 1892, has for its chief purpose the collection of historical data relating to Iowa and the territory of the middle west, the care-taking of the public archives and the stimulation of private and public enterprise in noting and commemorating through artistic means notable achievements of Iowa citizens. The department publishes the *Annals of Iowa*, an illustrated quarterly historical magazine of eighty pages. It also issues from time to time publications of historical interest. Portraits of distinguished Iowans are secured and hung in the art gallery, some 3,000 half-tones of Iowa citizens and of historic scenes have been collected, original cartoons of J. N. Darling are preserved and a collection of autograph letters of distinguished men are filed, as well as historic original manuscripts. Motion picture films of many of the historic events since 1913 have been obtained, particularly relating to the World war, and notable public assemblages.

Since January, 1918, the department has engaged in assembling original materials relating to the contribution of Iowa in the late war and the collections include invaluable material on the following phases: a biographical census of men and women serving their country during the World war; Iowa's honor roll, records and pictures; Iowa's decorated men and women, records and pictures; navy records; council of defense activities; Red Cross activities; pictures, souvenirs and relics of World war veterans.

In the library division of the historical department special efforts are made to collect works of state and general western history, biography and genealogy, war histories, works relating to the North American Indians, county histories, maps, Iowa pamphlets, biographies, documents relating to early settlers and settlements and every species of data which can throw light upon local, state, or western history.

The museum includes many remarkable specimens of mammals and birds mounted by the director who is a taxidermist. The mammals include moose, buffalo, elk, deer, wolves, foxes and other animals. There are several large cases of mounted birds such as eagles, pelicans, loons and wild turkeys. Indian relics and handiwork, weapons used in the nation's wars, historic medals, pottery and many other items are preserved. For lack of space many World war trophies are still stored at Camp Dodge.

NEWSPAPER DIVISION

Special efforts are made to collect Iowa newspapers from the earliest dates to the present time. Three hundred weeklies and thirty dailies are currently received and the department endeavors to acquire all Iowa newspapers. It has ceased the collection of papers from other states, with the exception of the *New York Times*.

PUBLIC ARCHIVES DIVISION

The public archives material is derived from the state departments, boards, bureau, etc., and dates from 1838 down to a ten-year period prior to the date of removal. These materials are taken from the vaults, garrets and storage places and in most cases they are a chaotic mass covered with dust and dirt. These must all be read, classified, cleansed, repaired, filed and indexed.

The thirty-seventh general assembly created the state board of conservation consisting of four members of which the curator of the state historical department was an ex-officio member. Subsequently the legislature amended the act, providing a board of five members appointed by the governor. The secretary of the executive council is ex-officio secretary of the board.

The state board of conservation makes recommendations for the purchases of park areas and has entire charge of the management of these parks. The executive council either approves or rejects the recommendations. The board also has jurisdiction over the meandered streams and lakes in the state, the construction of dams and the improvement of lakes.

The parks are created for three purposes: first, recreational; second, scientific; third, historical. Donations have been made by public spirited citizens as at Ft. Atkinson, Eldora, Pine Creek, Lacey-Keosauqua, Lepley, Pilot Knob, Ledges, Dolliver Memorial, Farmington, Hamburg, Hawarden, Pallsades, Medium Lake, Merrick, Guthrie county, Wild Cat Den, Algona, Bixby and other parks.

Fee examination and certificate, \$10.00. The license fee for itinerant vendor of drugs is \$100 a year, and they are transferable upon assignment and payment of a fee of one dollar to the secretary of the board. The penalty for selling without a vendor license is \$10 to \$100.

The state board of vocational education was established by the thirty-seventh general assembly in the act accepting the terms of the federal law on vocational education commonly known as the Smith-Hughes Act.

The membership of the board is ex-officio. The board co-operates with public schools in formation of day classes in agriculture, trade and industry, and home making. Also in each of these lines part-time and evening classes are conducted by public schools working with the board.

In all cases mentioned above the districts receive reimbursement on teachers' salaries from federal funds alone.

The board also co-operates with the proper authorities at Iowa State College at Ames in preparing teachers of the above subjects.

The thirty-ninth general assembly approved the federal law of June 2, 1920, called the industrial rehabilitation act, for operation in Iowa. By the federal law the state board for vocational education became the board for conducting rehabilitation for all eligible disabled cases excepting those coming directly under the federal government for persons disabled as a result of enlisted service in army and navy.

The members of the board receive as compensation \$10 per diem for the time actually employed and necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties.

Under the provisions of the law, the board meets at least once annually to examine persons desiring to practice in Iowa as certified public accountants and issues certificates to those qualifying. The office of state mine inspector was created by the eighteenth general assembly in the year 1880. At that time the mining of coal in this state was in its infancy. But few large mines were in operation and the tonnage of coal was small as compared to that of the present time. Then but one inspector was needed. Owing to the growth of the coal industry, the twenty-first general assembly amended the mining law and provided for three inspectors, and gave the governor power to divide the state into three inspection districts. Today the entire time of the three inspectors is taken up with the work of inspecting the mines of the state and seeing that they are worked in conformity with the mining laws of the state as regards safety to the employes therein, proper ventilation, condition of the shafts, escape ways in times of danger, safety catches on cages, condition of the cables for hoisting men and coal, and everything that would tend to guard against accidents to men employed in the mines.

A general office for the inspectors is maintained in the state house and a complete record is kept therein of all inspections, accidents, etc., in record books for that purpose. A monthly report of the general conditions of all mines is made to the mine inspectors and a general report of the conditions of the mines of the state, tonnage, accidents, number of employes, and other information relative to the coal industry, is published every two years. Copies of the state mining laws are also published and circulated. Blue prints of maps of all mines in the state, brought up to date once each year, are on file in the offices of the mine inspectors subject to public inspection. A secretary, elected by the inspectors, has charge of the general correspondence and books in the office, as the duties of the three inspectors keep them almost constantly in the field.

The state board of mine examiners was created by the twenty-second general assembly, and is composed of five members; two coal operators, two miners, and one engineer. Their duties are to examine and issue certificates to those qualified to act as state mine inspectors, hoisting engineers and mine foremen. An examination for state mine inspectors is held the first Monday in March in even-numbered years in the office of the state mine inspectors in the state house. Examinations for hoisting engineers and mine

foremen are held at various times during the year in different parts of the state. A fee of two dollars for registration, and an additional fee of two dollars is required of those taking and passing the examination for mine foremen and hoisting engineers. The law requires that each certificate issued by the board shall be recorded in the office of the examining board, and shall show the name, age, residence and years of experience of the person to whom it was issued.

Organization. Pursuant to a call signed by D. F. Wells, then of the Muscatine schools, and seventeen others, a number of teachers met in the courthouse at Muscatine, May 10, 1854, and organized the Iowa State Teachers' Association, adopted a constitution and elected the following officers: President, J. A. Parvin, Muscatine; Vice President, Rev. Daniel Lane, Davenport; Recording Secretary, D. Franklin Wells, Muscatine; Corresponding Secretary, Rev. Samuel Newberry, Dubuque; Treasurer, G. W. Drake, Oskaloosa; Executive Committee, Rev. Samuel Newberry, Dubuque; G. B. Denison, Muscatine; Rev. W. W. Woods, Iowa City; D. S. Sheldon, Davenport, and H. K. Edson, Denmark.

The real work of the association began with its second session, which convened at Iowa City December 27th and 28th of the same year. After a very important meeting, this session adjourned to meet at Davenport September 4, 1855. When the time came for this meeting, so few were present it was abandoned.

An educational convention was called to meet at Iowa City June 16 to 18, 1856. At this meeting a permanent organization was effected and the consti-

tution of the association of 1854, somewhat modified, was adopted. Since that time a session has been held each year.

At the session in December, 1905, the semi-centennial anniversary of the association was celebrated by a special campfire program, which was participated in, either in person or by letter, by many of the veterans in education in Iowa.

In the fall of 1917 a reorganization of the association was effected by the incorporation of the five district or section associations with the Iowa State Teachers' Association and the establishment of a permanent office in the city of Des Moines with a permanent secretary in charge.

The present geological survey was organized in 1892 and since that time has been engaged in two lines of research. The first of these is the detailed study of the geology of the state by counties. In this work all the natural features of interest and value are studied and described, such as the general character of the surface, its soils, water courses, deposits of valuable minerals and other topics.

The second line of work has been that of special investigation of the minerals of the state. In this work studies have been made of the coal and peat beds, lead and zinc, gypsum, clays and shales, limestone and sandstone, and the surface and underground water resources. The different geological formations are being studied as units.

For several years past the state survey has co-operated with the national survey in the making of topographic maps of the Des Moines valley. These maps show the character of the surface, the drainage, and elevations above sea level, as well as cultural features. They are of especial value in coal prospecting, engineering and drainage prospects.

The Iowa commission for the blind was created by the Forty-first General Assembly. Under the law the commission "shall consist of the superintendent of the state school for the blind and two other members to be appointed by the governor." The commission must prepare and maintain a complete register of the blind of the state; assist in marketing products of blind workers; ameliorate the condition of the blind by promoting visits to them in their homes for the purpose of instruction; make inquiries concerning causes of blindness to ascertain what portion of such cases are preventable; discourage begging; provide for suitable vocational training whenever the commission shall deem it advisable and necessary and establish workshops for the employment of the blind.

The board of control of state institutions was created under the provisions of chapter 118, laws of the twenty-seventh general assembly, which, with the amendments thereto, clothes the board with full power to manage, control and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in the act, the following named institutions:

Soldiers' Home at Marshalltown; Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Davenport; Institution for Feeble-Minded Children at Glenwood; State Sanatorium for the Treatment of Tuberculosis at Oakdale; Training School for Boys at Eldora; Training School for Girls at Mitchellville; Mount Pleasant State Hospital at Mount Pleasant; Independence State Hospital at Independence; Clarinda State Hospital at Clarinda; Cherokee State Hospital at Cherokee; Hospital for Female Inebriates at Mount Pleasant; Hospital for Male Inebriates at Independence; State Penitentiary at Fort Madison; Men's Reformatory at Anamosa; Women's Reformatory at Rockwell City; Hospital

for Epileptics and School for Feeble-Minded at Woodward; Juvenile Home, Toledo.

The board is required to inspect county and private institutions in which insane persons are kept, associations and societies receiving friendless children and detention homes provided for juvenile offenders.

Prior to July 1, 1898, the foregoing state institutions, except the reformatory and penitentiary, were in charge of separate boards, each of which had its officers and each had a secretary and treasurer.

The board of control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control, as provided by statute, on July 1, 1898, of the institutions subject to its control. At that time the various boards of trustees and commissioners ceased to exist.

The board is required to investigate the management and financial condition of the state institutions under its control, to determine questions as to the sanity of patients in state hospitals, and to determine when persons shall be admitted to them as state charges, and is required to divide the state into hospital districts. It is required to make biennial reports to the governor and legislature showing the cost of operating the institutions for the preceding two years and to visit all institutions twice each year. Some member of the board or its agent is required to visit each hospital for insane once each month. The board is required to meet the superintendents and other heads of institutions in quarterly conferences, to gather statistics, to publish a bulletin, to require official bonds of certain institution officers to make a semiannual invoice of all the stores of the institutions, to fix annually the salaries of officers and employees not fixed by law, and to perform other duties provided by law.

SOLDIERS' HOME—MARSHALLTOWN

The United States government pays to the state of Iowa the sum of \$120 per year for each male inmate of the soldiers' home who served in any war in which the United States was engaged, which amount is used as a part of the support fund of the institution. Persons who have sufficient means for their own support may be admitted to the home on payment of the cost of their support, if there be room, but pension money received by any member of the home from the United States government may not be taken from him for his support in the home.

SOLDIERS' ORPHANS' HOME—DAVENPORT

There is in connection with this institution a school building. A kindergarten is operated for young pupils. The age limit beyond which children are not kept in the home is sixteen years. Fewer than 20 per cent remain to the age limit. A library of well selected juvenile literature is maintained. Much of the clothing of the children is manufactured at the home, the large girls assisting in the work. Each county is liable to the state for the support of its children to the extent of one-half of the actual cost, except soldiers' orphans, who are cared for at the expense of the state.

INSTITUTION FOR FEEBLE-MINDED CHILDREN—GLENWOOD

The purpose or object of this institution is to provide special methods of training for the class of children deficient in mind or marked with such peculiarities as to deprive them of the benefits and privileges provided for children with normal faculties. The object is to make each child as nearly

self-supporting as practicable, and to approach as nearly as possible the movements and actions of normal people. It further aims to provide a home for those who are not susceptible of mental culture, relying wholly on others to supply their simple wants.

The object of the institutions is the reformation of juvenile delinquents. They are not prisons but compulsory educational institutions where wayward boys and girls are brought under the influence of Christian instructors and taught by example, as well as precept, the better ways of life and where the moral, intellectual and industrial education of the child is carried on at one and the same time.

Any boy or girl over ten and under eighteen years of age, excepting married women, prostitutes, or any girl who is pregnant, found guilty in any court of record of any crime excepting that of murder, may be ordered committed, if a boy to the school at Eldora, and if a girl to the school at Mitchellville. Any boy or girl may be discharged, or paroled from the school, at any time after one year's training, upon satisfactory evidence or reformation. They may also in exceptional cases be paroled or discharged in less than one year.

IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF—COUNCIL BLUFFS

HISTORICAL

The Iowa School for the Deaf was founded in 1885 in answer to the demand that the deaf children of the state be given the same opportunity for an education that was provided for those who could hear. Because such deaf children are fewer and very much scattered, as well as to secure better grading, it was found more economical to get them together and provide board as well as tuition. The school was first located at Iowa City and later moved to Council Bluffs. In 1902 fire completely destroyed the main building. A new modern, fireproof structure has arisen in its place where sufficient room is provided for 300 pupils. A separate building to accommodate forty-five of the younger pupils is also provided.

IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND—VINTON

Superintendent, Francis Eber Palmer; physician, J. E. Luckey, M. D.; and visiting ophthalmic surgeon, L. W. Dean, M. D., state university.

The aim and purpose of the Iowa School for the Blind is purely educational. The course of study includes not only the subjects required for admission to the colleges and the university of the state, but also subjects that aim to prepare our students for some of the occupations in which it has been demonstrated that the blind are usually successful. After a pupil of this school reaches the high school department, he is given some latitude in the choice of courses of study, and in the making of his choice he always has the guidance and advice of teachers and matrons. However, the courses are so arranged that a student who chooses one course, say, one of the vocational courses of study, has the benefit of subjects in other courses. In fact, both literary and industrial work is required of all students.

SUPREME COURT OF IOWA

ORGANIZATION

The supreme court consists of eight judges, five of whom constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but one alone may adjourn from day to day, or to a particular day, or until the next term.

The judge whose term first expires is the chief justice, and so on in rotation, except when the terms of two of the justices expire at the same time the senior in age serves first as chief justice.

JURISDICTION

The supreme court has appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery and constitutes a court for the correction of errors at law. It has appellate jurisdiction over all judgments and decisions of all courts of record, except as otherwise provided by law.

An appeal may also be taken to the supreme court from:

1. An order made affecting a substantial right in an action, when such order, in effect, determines the action and prevents a judgment from which an appeal might be taken.

2. A final order made in special actions affecting a substantial right therein, or made on a summary application in an action for judgment;

3. An order which grants or refuses, continues or modifies a provisional remedy; grants or refuses, dissolves or refuses to dissolve an injunction or attachment; or grants or refuses a new trial; or sustains or overrules a demurrer;

4. An intermediate order involving the merits or materially affecting the final decision;

5. An order or judgment on habeas corpus.

If any of the above orders or judgments are made or rendered by a judge, the same are reviewable, the same as if made by a court.

The supreme court has power to issue all writs and processes necessary to secure justice to parties, and to enforce its appellate jurisdiction, and it may exercise supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals.

It may enforce its mandates upon inferior courts and officers by fine and imprisonment, which imprisonment may continue until mandates are obeyed.

TERMS

There are three regular terms in each year, held as follows, to wit: The first term beginning with the second Tuesday in January and ending with the first Monday in May; the second beginning with the first Tuesday after the first Monday in May and ending with the third Monday of September, and the third beginning with the first Tuesday after the third Monday of September and ending with the third Saturday of December.

The time allotted to each term is divided as nearly as practicable into periods of four weeks each, the first part of each period is devoted to the argument and submission of cases, and the second to consultation and the preparation of opinions. Cases assigned for each period are called in their order as shown on the term docket but no more submissions are taken for one period than in the judgment of the court can be properly considered and determined before the next succeeding session. All causes on the docket are heard at each term unless continued or otherwise disposed of by order of court.

The regular public sessions of the court are held in the supreme court room at the capitol, commencing at 9 o'clock a. m., standard time. On Tuesday of the first and second week of each four weeks' period submission of motions are taken before calling the calendar. Motions noticed for a day when the court is not sitting are taken on the next motion day on which the court sits.

Judgments of affirmance, rulings and orders in causes submitted and orders authorized by law are made at any time regardless of the term of court.

APPEALS IN CIVIL CASES.

Appeals from the superior, municipal and district courts may be taken to the supreme court at any time within four months from the rendition of the judgment or order appealed from, and not afterwards. No appeal shall be taken in any causes in which the amount in controversy between the parties, as shown by the pleadings does not exceed one hundred dollars, unless the trial judge shall, during the term in which judgment is entered, certify that the cause is one in which the appeal should be allowed, and upon certificate being filed the same shall be appealable regardless of the amount in controversy, but this limitation shall not affect the right of appeal in any action in which an interest in real estate is involved, nor shall the right of appeal be affected by the remission of any part of the verdict or judgment returned or rendered.

APPEAL IN CRIMINAL CASES.

Appeals from the final judgment of the district court may be taken in all criminal cases within sixty days after the judgment is rendered; and either the defendant or the state may appeal. Upon appeal the supreme court may affirm, reverse or modify the judgment or render such judgment as the district court should have done. It may order a new trial or reduce the punishment, but cannot increase it. If the state appeals, the court cannot reverse or modify the judgment so as to increase the punishment, but may affirm it and shall point out any error in the proceedings and its decision shall be obligatory as law.

SALARY.

The salary of each justice is six thousand dollars (\$6,000) a year, to be increased to \$7,500 a year by act of the forty-first general assembly, applicable to judges elected or reelected after July 4, 1925. Each general assembly also appropriates sufficient funds for the payment of stenographers, bailiffs and such other incidental expenses as may be incurred by the court.

THE DISTRICT COURT OF IOWA

There are at the present time sixty-nine judges of the district court of the state of Iowa. The state is divided into twenty-one judicial districts and each district is entitled to from one to six judges, the number being fixed by statute. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary of \$4,000; also actual and necessary hotel and living expenses not to exceed \$3 per day when away from home, and transportation expenses. Each judge appoints a shorthand reporter, who receives \$10 per day for each day's attendance upon said court, and in case the per diem does not equal \$2,400, then the county or counties composing the district make up the deficiency in proportion to the number of days of court held in such county or counties.

The following is in sections 10761 and 10766 of the code governing the jurisdiction of the district court.

The district court shall have general original and exclusive jurisdiction of all actions, proceedings and remedies, both civil and criminal, except in cases where exclusive or concurrent jurisdiction is or may hereafter be conferred upon some other court or tribunal by the constitution and laws of the state, and shall have and exercise all the powers usually possessed and exercised by courts of record. It shall also possess and exercise jurisdiction in all appeals and writs of error taken in civil and criminal actions and special proceedings authorized to be taken from all inferior courts, tribunals, boards or officers, under any provisions of the laws of this state, and shall have a general supervision thereof, in all matters, to prevent and correct abuses, where no other remedy is provided.

The district court of each county shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction to probate the wills of, and to grant administration upon the estates of, all persons who at the time of their death were residents of the county and of nonresidents of the state who die leaving property within the county subject to administration, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

To appoint guardians of the persons and property of all persons resident in the county subject to guardianship, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

It shall have jurisdiction in all matters in relation to the appointment of executors and trustees, and the management and disposition of the property of and settlement of such estates; *provided*, that where jurisdiction has heretofore been acquired, the same shall be retained until such estate is closed.

The district court shall succeed to and exercise full authority and jurisdiction over the records of the circuit court, and may enforce all judgments, decrees and orders thereof in the same manner and to the same extent as it may exercise like jurisdiction and authority over its own records, and for the purpose of the issuance of process, and of any and all other acts necessary to the due and efficient enforcement of the orders, judgments and decrees of the circuit courts the records thereof shall be deemed records of the district court.

Transcripts and process from the judgments, decrees and records of the circuit court shall be issued by the clerk of the district court and under the seal of his office.

MUNICIPAL COURTS

Any city, whether organized under a special charter, commission form of government or the general law for the incorporation of cities or towns, now or hereafter having a population of five thousand or more, as shown by the last preceding state or United States census, may establish a municipal court. All civil townships in which said city or any part thereof is located shall constitute the municipal court district.

The salary of municipal court judge is \$3,000 in cities with population less than 30,000, \$3,400 with population between 30,000 and less than 75,000, \$3,600 with population 75,000 or over. Compensation of court reporter is fixed by the judge at not to exceed \$8.00 per day. Salary of clerk is \$1,800, \$2,200 and \$2,600 according to population of city as above indicated.

Jurisdiction. Municipal courts have concurrent jurisdiction with the district court in all civil matters, where the amount in controversy does not exceed one thousand dollars, except in probate matters, actions for divorce, alimony, separate maintenance, those directly affecting the title to real estate, and juvenile proceedings unless otherwise authorized.

In all criminal matters the court shall exercise the jurisdiction conferred on justice of the peace courts, mayors' courts, and police courts, except that the mayor's court of any incorporated city or town within such municipal court district other than the city in which said court is established shall have exclusive jurisdiction of prosecutions for violations of city ordinances.

In all matters of which the municipal court has jurisdiction, it has the same powers in reference to injunctions, writs, orders and other proceedings in and out of court as are possessed by the district court and the judges thereof.

SUPERIOR COURTS

The statutes provide that any city containing four thousand inhabitants, may establish a superior court. There are at present six such courts, located as follows: Cedar Rapids, Grinnell, Keokuk, Oelwein, Perry and Shenandoah. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary, which is paid quarterly, the first two quarters being paid from the city treasury and the last two quarters from the county treasury of the county in which court is located. Salary of judge, \$2,000 per annum in cities up to 25,000 population; \$3,000 in cities of 25,000 up to 40,000, and \$3,750 in cities of 40,000 or more.

The judges appoint a shorthand reporter, whose compensation is fixed by order of the court not exceeding \$8.00 per day for the time actually employed.

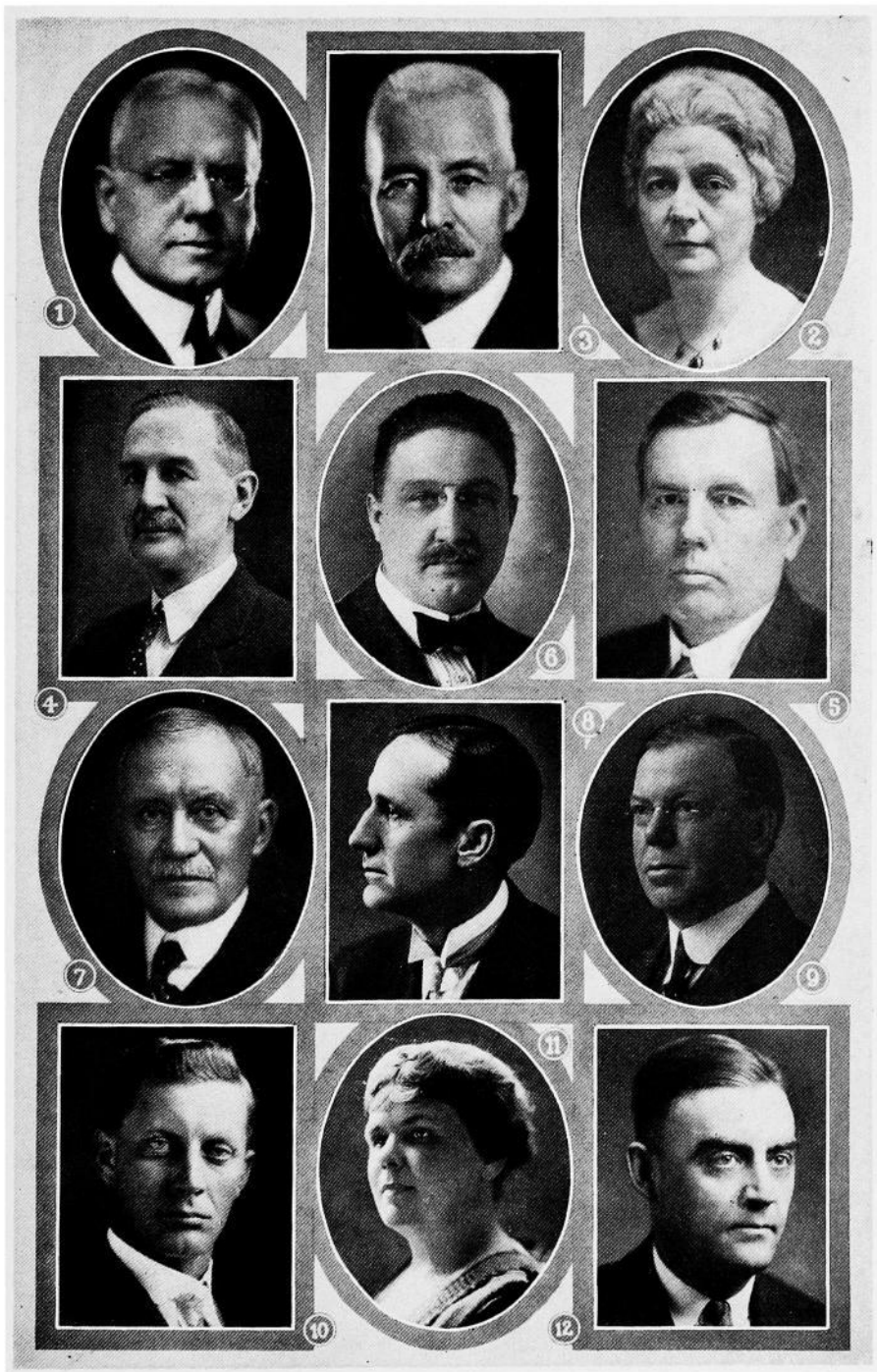
The following is a copy of sections 10704 and 10705 of the code, governing the jurisdiction of the superior court:

Said court shall have jurisdiction concurrent with the district court in all civil matters and actions for divorce, alimony, and separate maintenance.

It shall have exclusive original jurisdiction to try and determine all actions, civil and criminal, for the violation of city ordinances and all jurisdiction conferred on police courts as now or as may hereafter be provided by law and concurrent jurisdiction with justices of the peace.

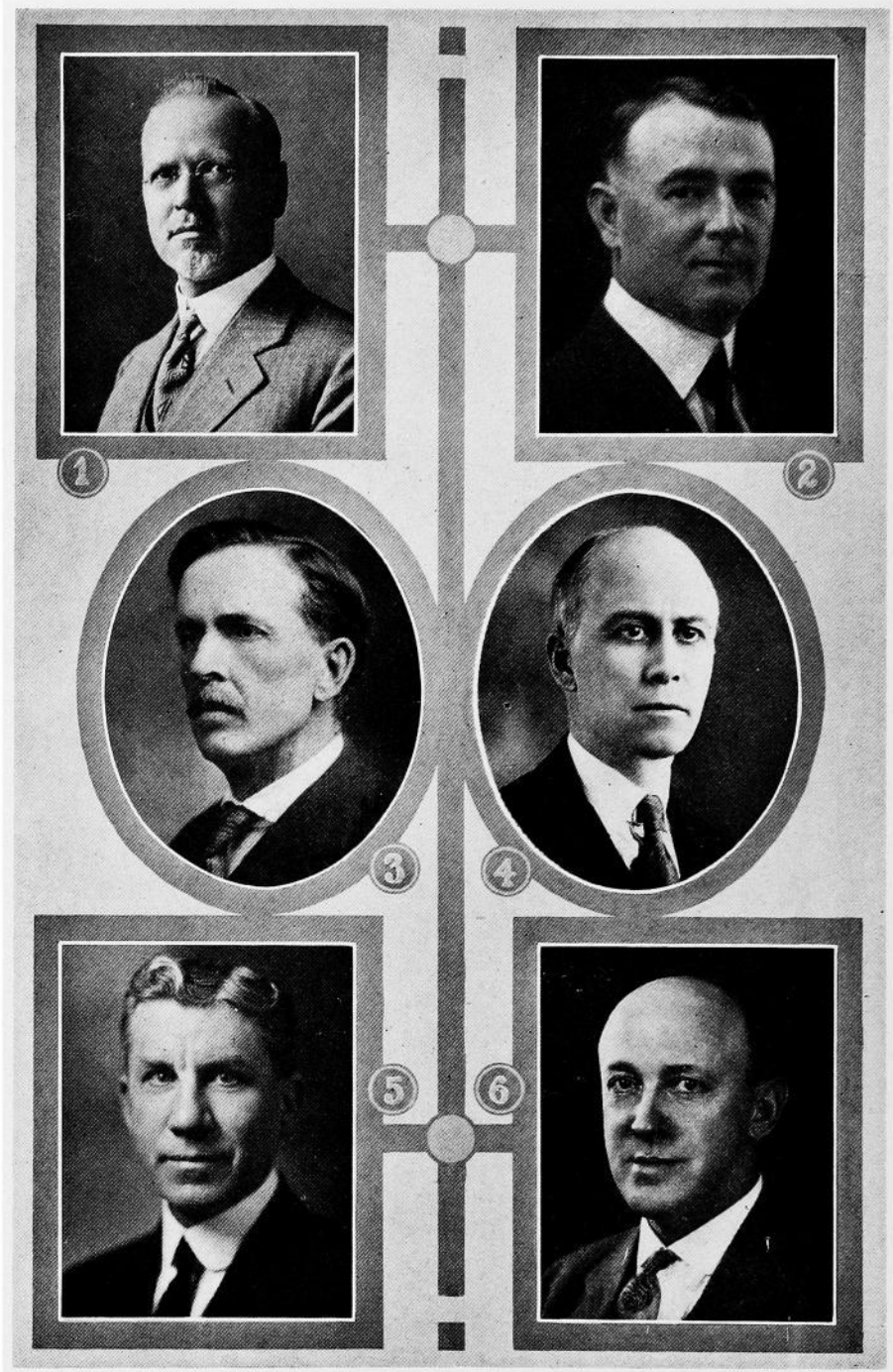

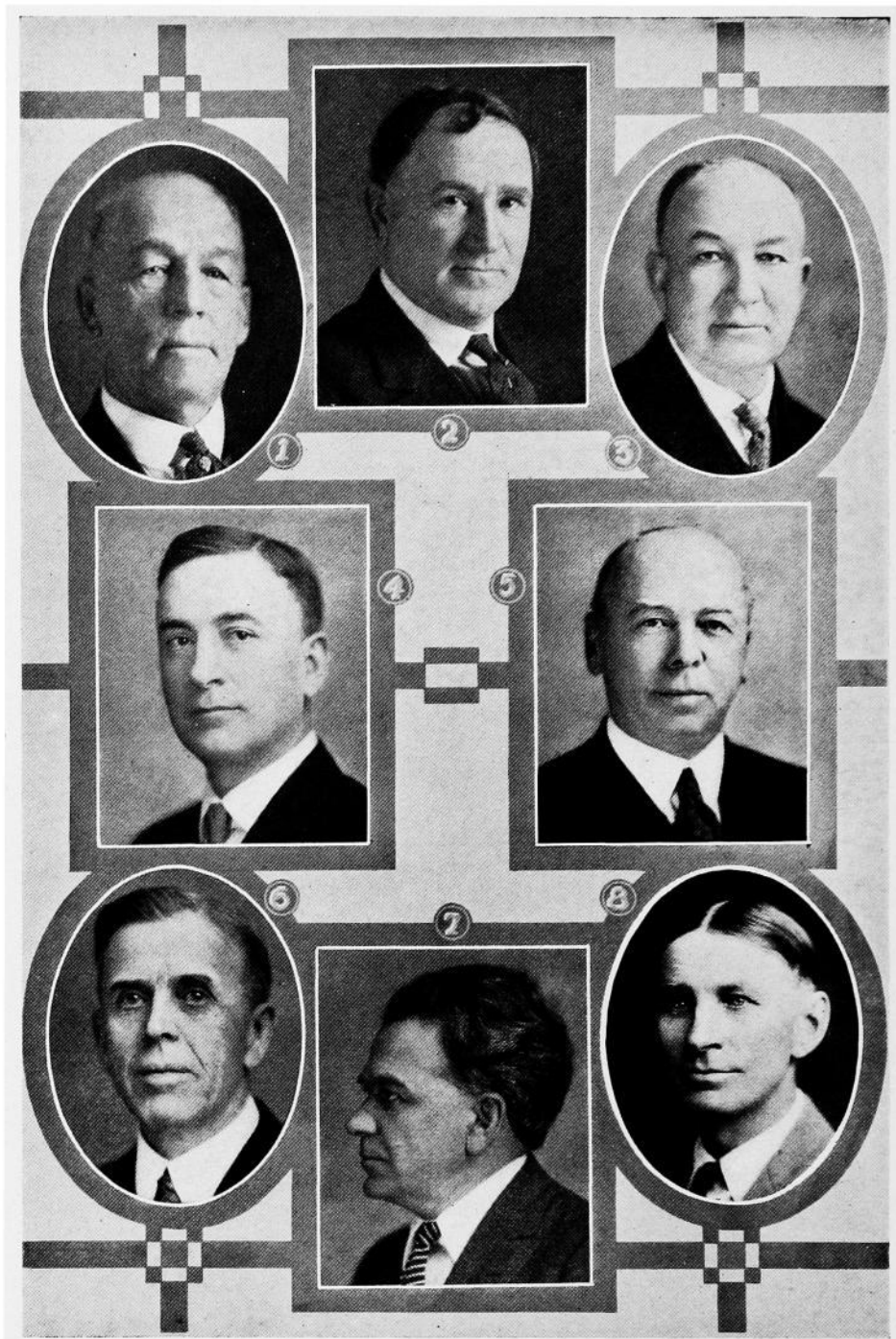

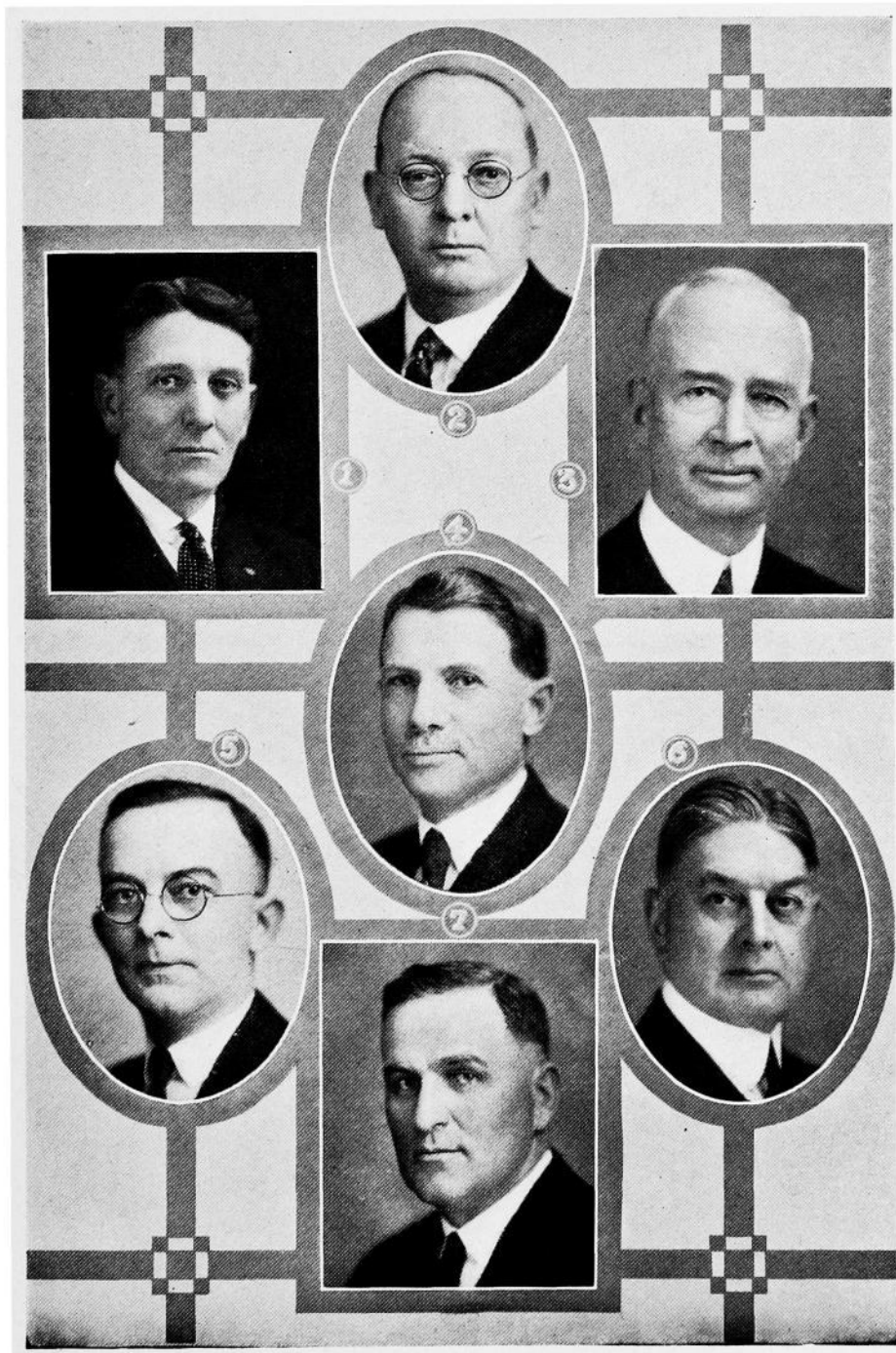
MEMBERS OF STATE BOARD OF CONSERVATION

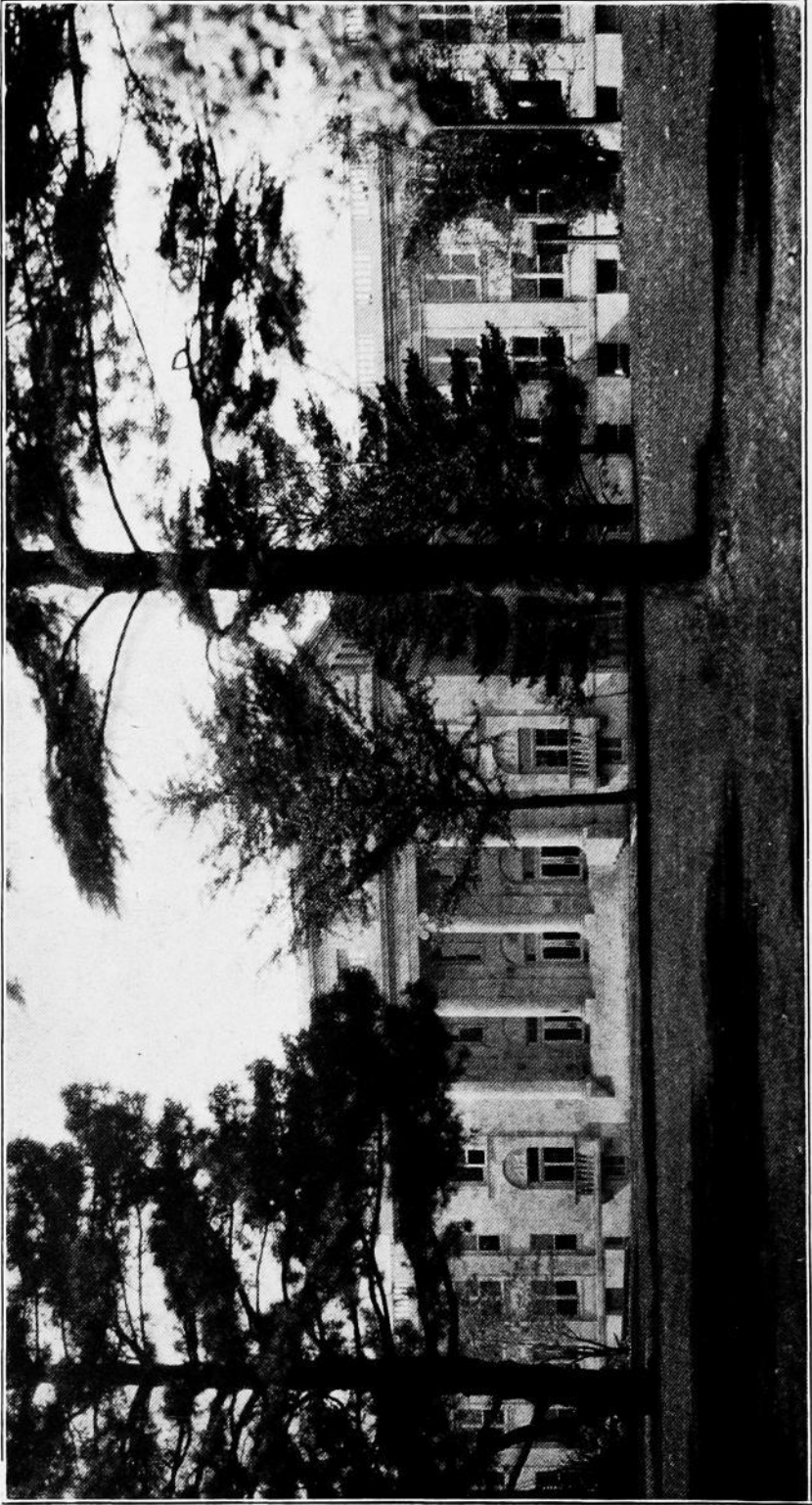

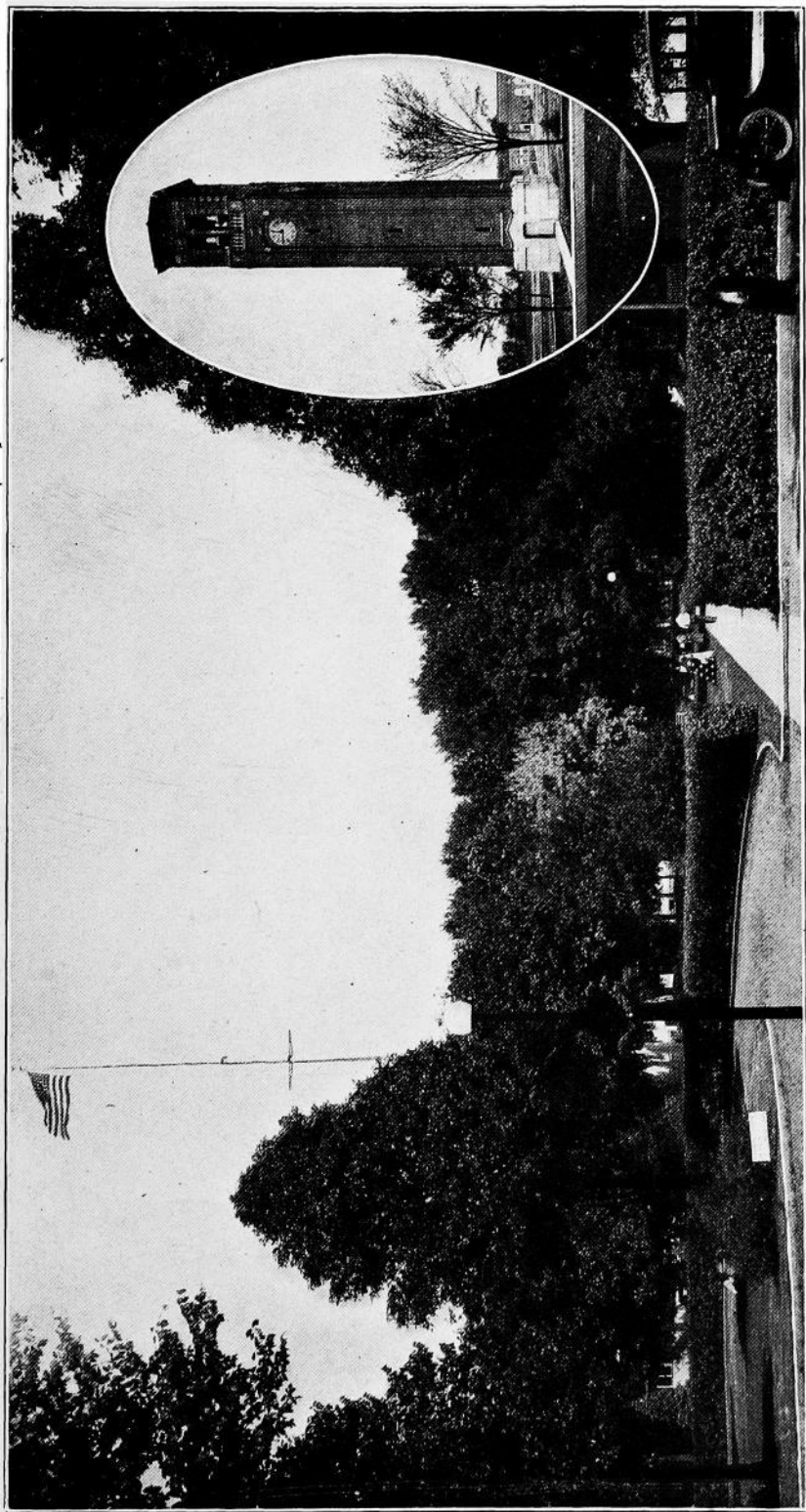

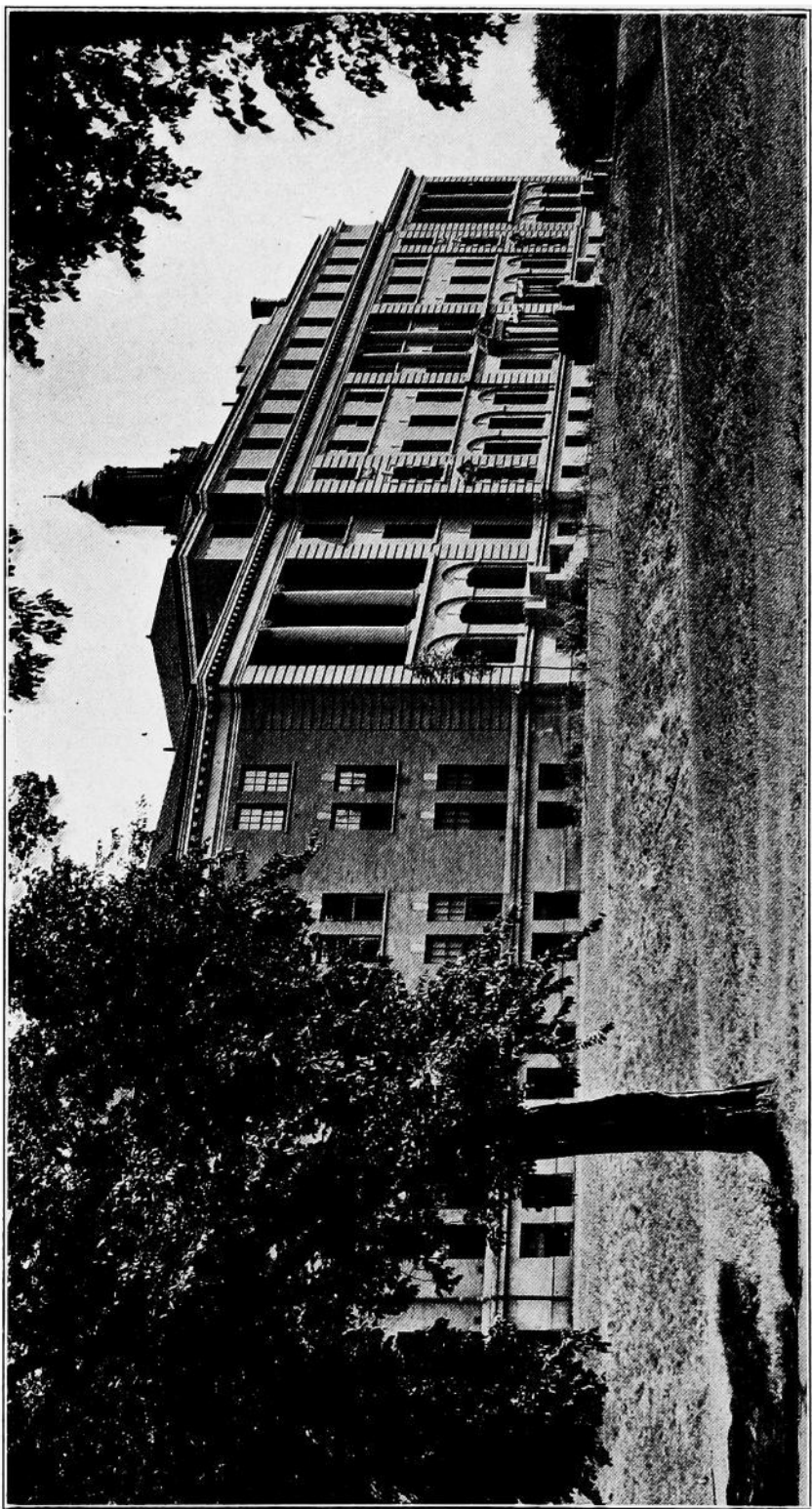
AIRPLANE VIEW OF CAMPUS, STATE UNIVERSITY, IOWA CITY



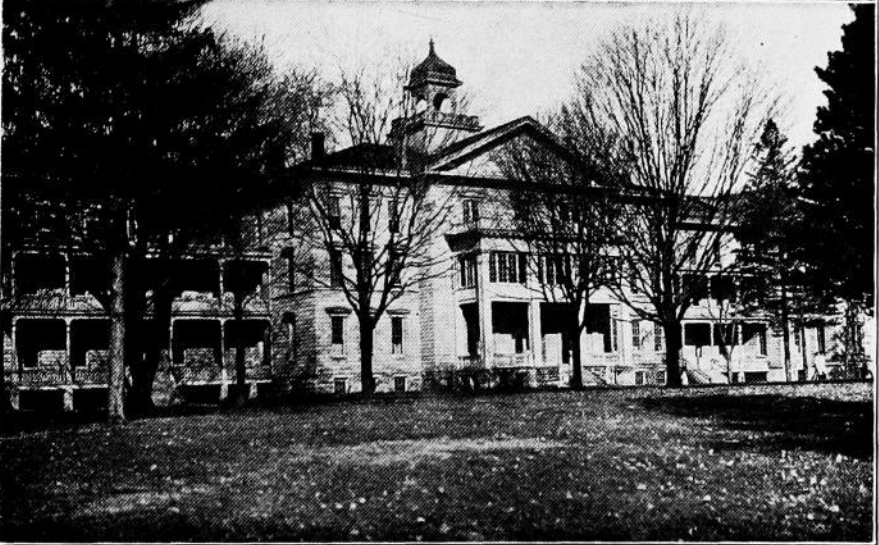
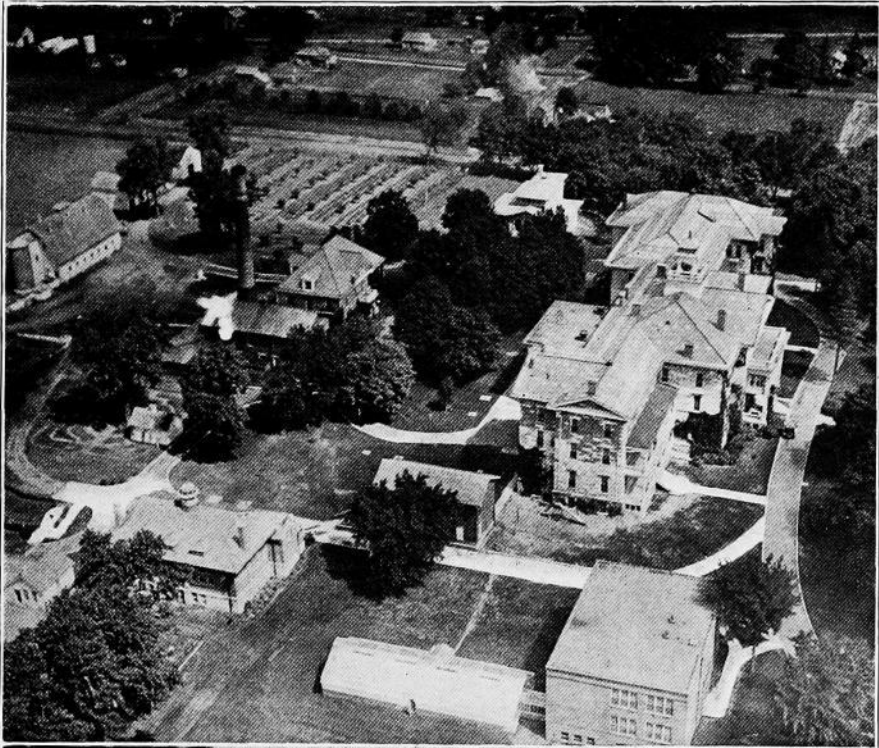
A PORTION OF NEW HOME ECONOMICS BUILDING, IOWA STATE COLLEGE, AMES



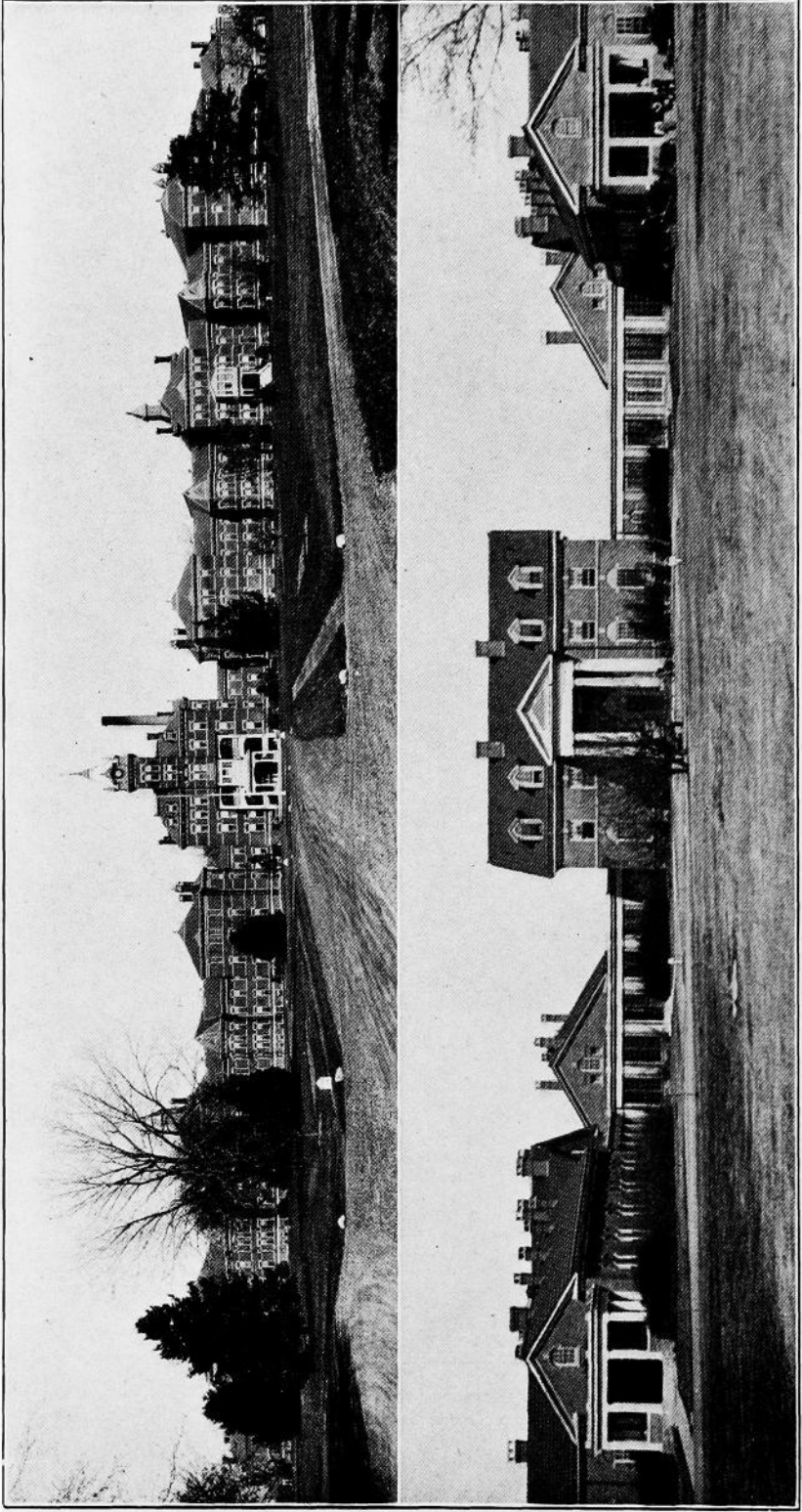
FRONT DRIVE, TEACHERS COLLEGE, CEDAR FALLS, WITH INSET SHOWING ALUMNI CAMPANILE



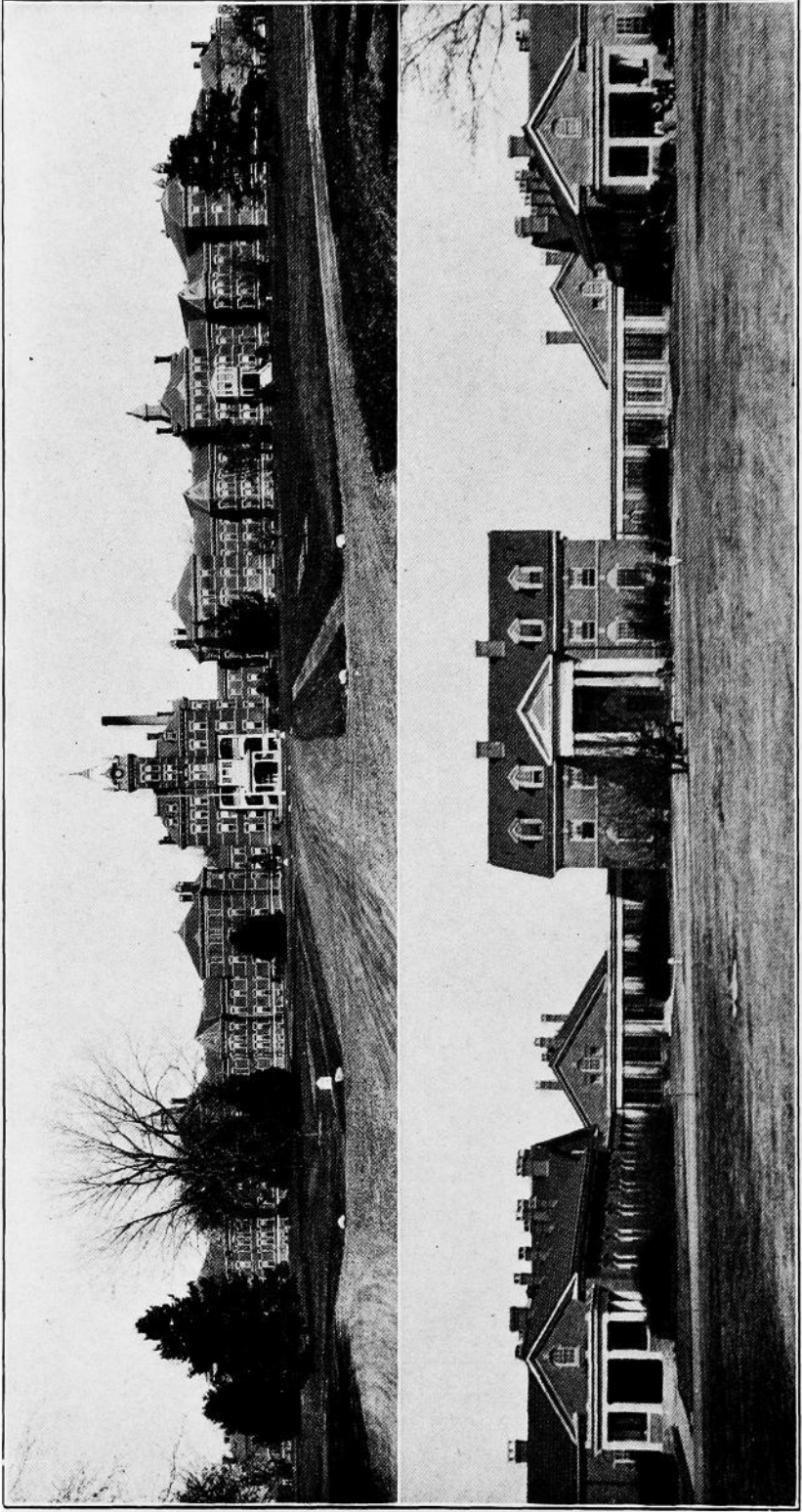
GLIMPSE OF MAIN BUILDING, IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF, COUNCIL BLUFFS



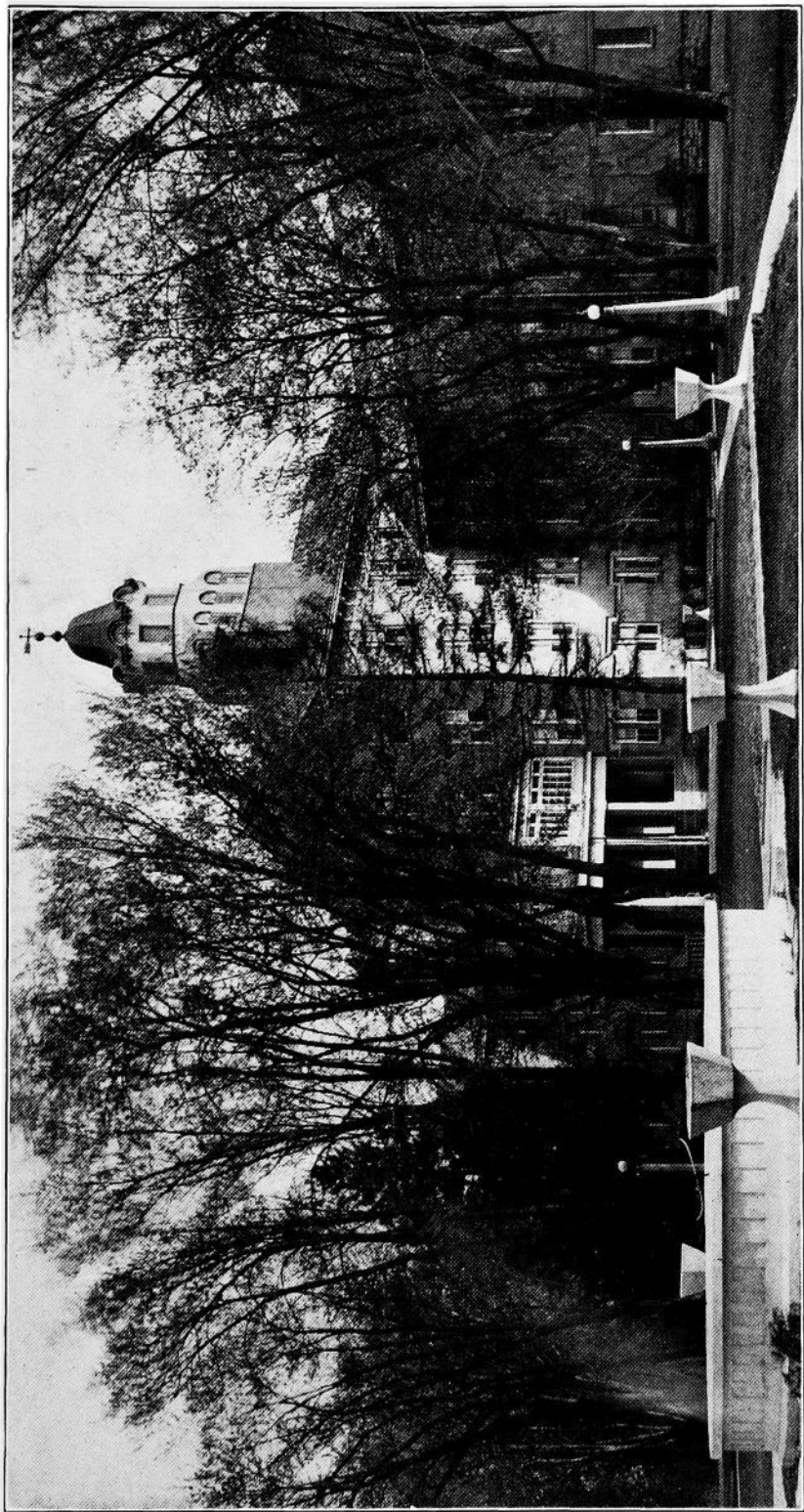
AIRPLANE VIEW ABOVE AND MAIN BUILDING BELOW OF IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND, VINTON

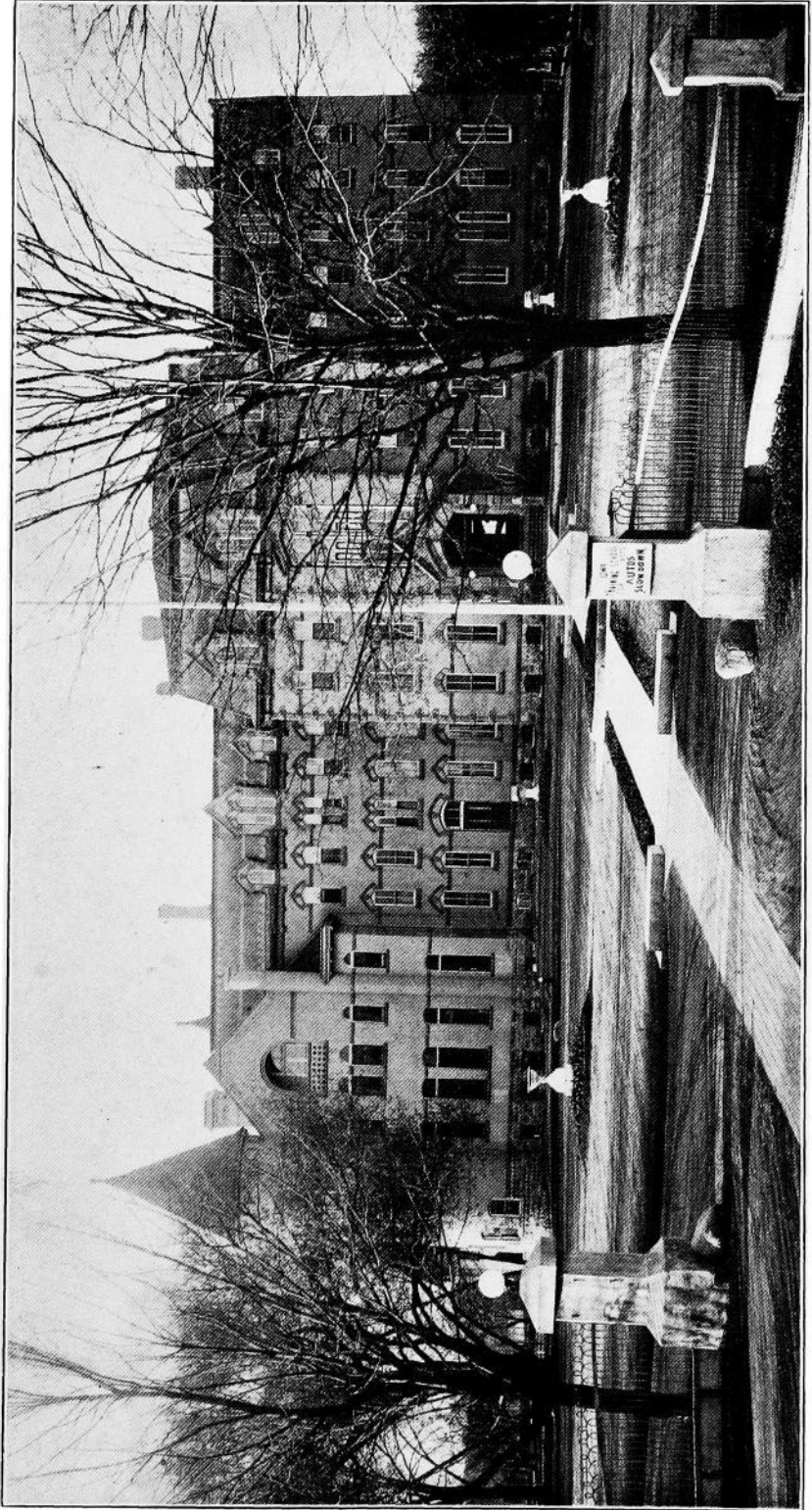

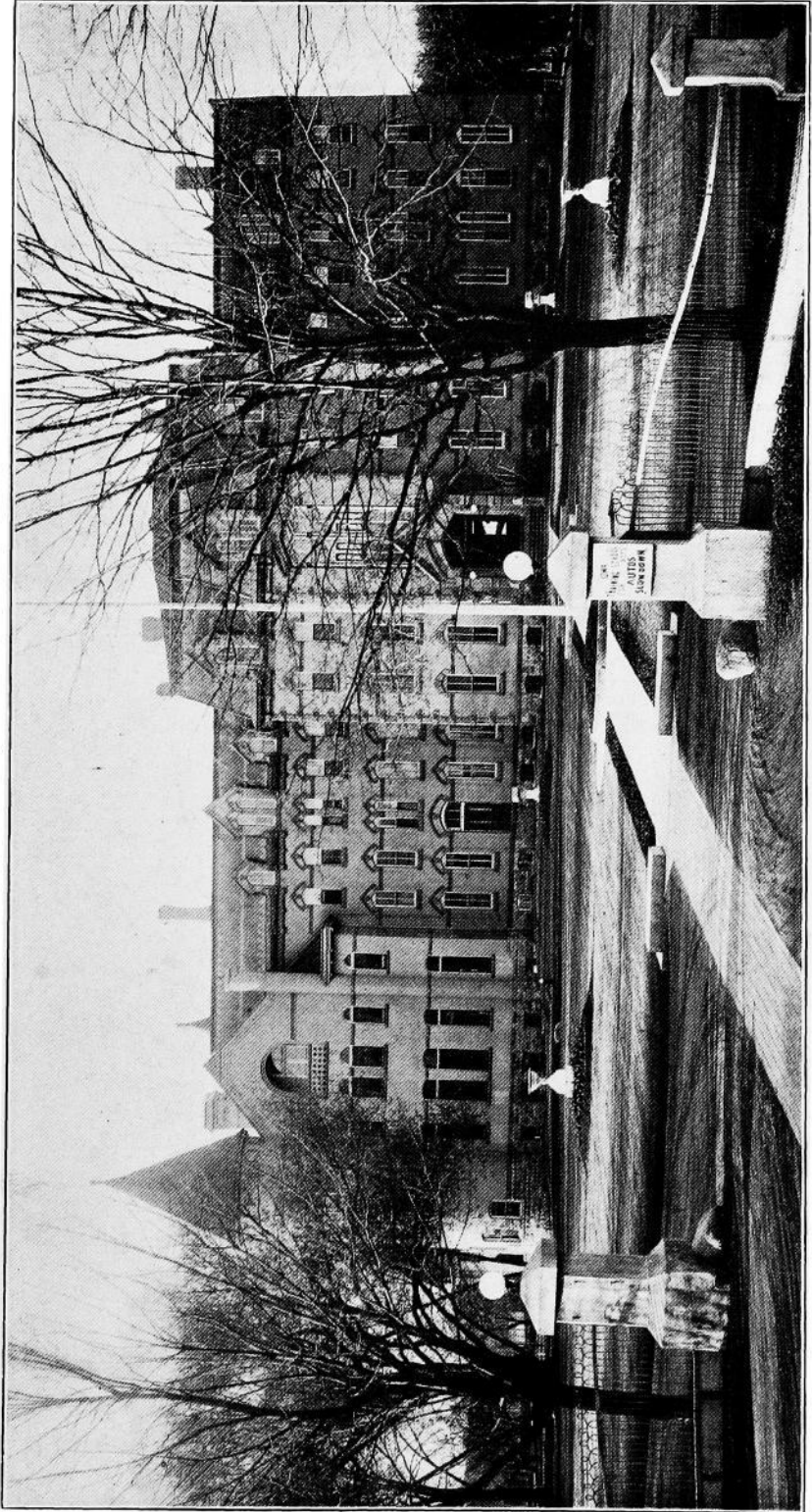

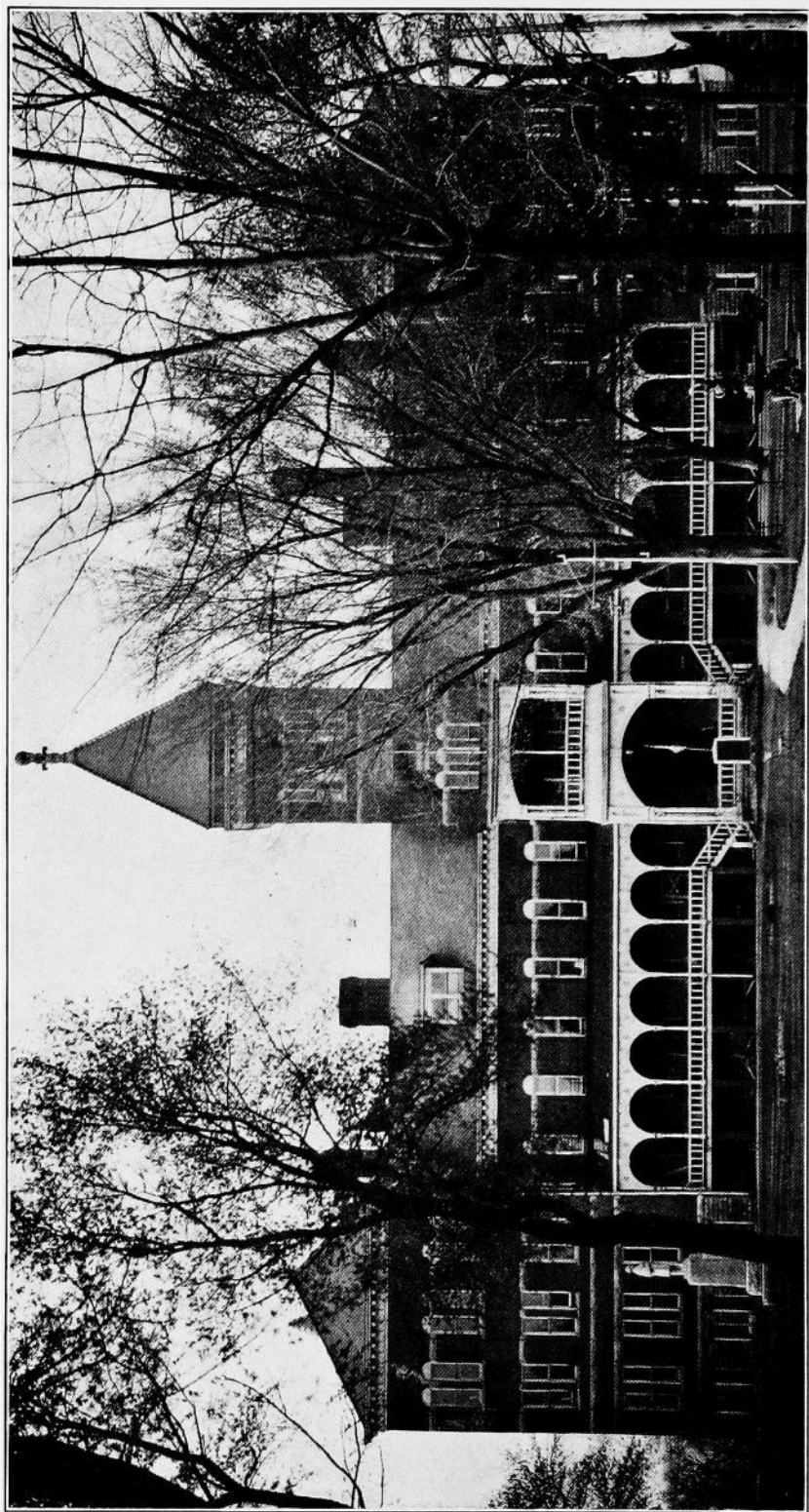

THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

The legislative department of the state of Iowa is vested in a general assembly, which consists of a senate and house of representatives.

The senate consists of fifty members. Senators are elected for terms of four years; twenty-one senators being elected at one general election and twenty-nine at the next.

The house of representatives consists at present of one hundred and eight members, who are elected for a term of two years.

Sessions of the general assembly are held biennially in the odd numbered years, and they commence on the second Monday of January.

The compensation of the members of the forty-second general assembly was \$1,000 for the session. This is in accordance with an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly which went into effect July 4, 1911. They were also allowed five cents a mile from their homes to the capital and return for traveling expenses. Members are permitted to draw such stationery as they need during the session, the cost to the state for the supplies varying from \$1.50 to \$14.00 per member. No allowance is permitted for postage.

The lieutenant governor is the presiding officer of the senate. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session of the forty-second general assembly.

The speaker of the house is chosen by the members from among their own membership. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session.

The lieutenant governor appoints all committees in the senate and the speaker of the house all committees in the house.

In the regular proceedings of the senate motions made by members are not seconded but are put directly by the presiding officer, the formality of a second being waved. In the house all motions are seconded before being placed before the house by the speaker.

Sessions in both branches of the general assembly are opened by prayer. No regular chaplains are employed, but ministers from Des Moines and elsewhere over the state are assigned dates for these services and are allowed \$5 for each opening prayer.

Bills passed are re-written (enrolled) by the enrolling clerk of the branch of the general assembly where the bill originates; they are then signed by the president of the senate and speaker of the house in presence of these respective bodies, in open session; then by the governor, if meeting with his approval, and then are filed with the secretary of state. Following adjournment they are printed under the direction of the superintendent of printing.

BIOGRAPHIES

BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE OFFICERS

JOHN HAMMILL.—Governor, was born in Linden, Iowa county, Wis., October 14, 1875. Attended the common schools of Wisconsin until 1889, when he moved with his parents near Britt, Hancock county, Iowa. Graduated from Britt high school in 1895. Graduated from the law department of the state university of Iowa in June, 1897. Engaged in the practice of law at Britt, Iowa. He was married to Fannie B. Richards on June 7, 1899. Elected county attorney in 1902, serving two terms. Was elected as a member of the state senate in 1908. Elected lieutenant governor in 1920. Re-elected in 1922. Elected governor in 1924. Re-elected in 1926. A republican in politics.

CLEM F. KIMBALL.—Lieutenant Governor, was born August 11, 1868, at Anamosa, Iowa. He attended the public schools of Anamosa until the spring of 1886, not quite finishing his high school course. He then entered the State College at Ames and took a mechanical engineering course, graduating in 1889. He engaged in engineering work and teaching until 1893, when he entered the University of Michigan, taking law and specializing in the literary department. He graduated from the University of Michigan in 1895 and began the practice of law in October, 1895, at Council Bluffs, Iowa. He was married to Carroll Williams of Wyoming, Iowa, in 1892. He is a member of the Congregational church, Masonic lodge, Knights of Pythias, Elks and several other organizations. He is also a member of the Country Club of Council Bluffs, and of the Lions Service Club. In 1899 he was appointed assistant county attorney of Pottawattamie county and held the office for two terms. In 1906 he was elected city solicitor of the city of Council Bluffs and served three consecutive terms. In 1912 he was elected to the state senate and served in the 35th, 36th, 37th and 38th general assemblies. He has always been a republican in politics. He has two children, a boy practicing law with his father's firm and a girl in college. He has been an active practicing attorney in southwest Iowa, and is interested in farming operations in Monona and Madison counties.

WALTER C. RAMSAY.—Secretary of State, was born in Ford county, Ill., August 15, 1878. His parents were natives of Ohio, both being of Scotch-Irish lineage. Received his early education in the graded schools of Paxton, Ill., and the high school at Owatonna, Minn. He came to Iowa in 1895, locating at Garner, Hancock county. Taught a country school four years and moved to Belmond, Wright county, Iowa, in 1901, and engaged in newspaper work. Served as postmaster, mayor, and on the school board of Belmond and as chief clerk of the Iowa house of representatives in the thirty-sixth, thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth general assemblies. Appointed by the governor April 3, 1919, and assumed office July 1, 1919. Married October 4, 1904, to Miss Una Ames, of Minneapolis. A republican in politics.

J. W. LONG.—Auditor of State, was born on a farm in Ringgold county, Iowa, June 26, 1873. He received his early education in the rural schools, attended Simpson College, Indianola, Iowa, and Western Normal College, Shenandoah, Iowa, graduating from the latter in 1896. He taught in rural schools two years; served as superintendent of city schools for five years; and was elected county superintendent of Decatur county, Iowa, in 1906; reelected in 1908 and again in 1910. Moved to Ames, Story county, Iowa, in 1916, and became a traveling salesman for county officials' supplies, until elected auditor of state November 2, 1926. He was married June 22, 1898, to Emma M. Laney, of Decatur, Iowa, and has a family of three sons and one daughter. He is a member of the Methodist church and the Masonic order. A republican in politics.

RAYMOND E. JOHNSON.—Treasurer of State, was born in Wilton Junction, Muscatine county, Iowa, March 26, 1886. Son of Silas L. and Nellie E. Johnson. Moved to Muscatine in 1894 and graduated from public schools there. Appointed deputy treasurer of Muscatine county January, 1908, and in January, 1910, was appointed county treasurer to fill vacancy. He served as treasurer of Muscatine county for five terms and resigned February 1, 1920, to accept the position of secretary of the state executive council. Elected treasurer of state in November, 1924. Married May 22, 1907, to Edna I. Ryan of Muscatine, Iowa. Has one son, Charles S., and one daughter, Janet. A republican in politics.

M. G. THORNEURG.—Secretary of Agriculture, was born in Linden, Dallas county, Iowa. Educated in country school in Dallas county and the Des Moines high school; entered Iowa State College in 1900, spending two years. Married Blanche Scholes, April 27, 1904. From 1902 to 1908 associated with his father in farming and stock business. Re-entered college in 1908, graduating from the animal husbandry course of Iowa State College in 1910. As a student was a member of the Royal and International live stock judging teams. Received professional degree of master of agriculture in 1920 from the same institution. Member of the animal husbandry faculty of Iowa State College. Enlisted in world war in March, 1918. Commissioned captain remount service in August. After being discharged in March, 1919, took up the management of several farms in Palo Alto county. Appointed assistant secretary of agriculture in June, 1923. Appointed by Governor Kendall as secretary of agriculture in July, 1924, to fill the office made vacant through the death of Raymond W. Cassady. Elected secretary of agriculture, general election in the fall of 1924, and re-elected in 1926. Republican in politics.

JOHN FLETCHER.—Attorney General, was born in Scott county, Iowa, January 5, 1876. Educated in a country school, the Iowa State Teachers College, and the law department of the state university. Admitted to the practice of law in 1899. Practicing attorney at Avoca for ten years, during which time he held the positions of city attorney and mayor. In 1910 he moved to Des Moines as assistant attorney general to Attorney General H. W. Byers. He continued to serve as assistant attorney general to Attorney General George Cosson, and later with Attorney General Ben J. Gibson. In May, 1925, he was appointed by Governor Hammill as a judge of the district court of Polk county, Iowa, where he presided over the court of domestic relations. He was married June 14, 1905, to Miss Marie D. Schmidt, of Avoca, Iowa, now deceased. He has three children, Maurice, Warren and Margaret. Republican in politics.

AGNES SAMUELSON.—Superintendent of Public Instruction, was born in Page county, Iowa. Her professional record includes graduation from Shenandoah high school, Western Normal College, and State University of Iowa, and attendance at George Peabody College for Teachers and Nebraska State University: Teaching experience in rural and high school work, superintendency of Page county schools, extension service specialist in rural schools from Iowa State Teachers College, service on national committees for the study of county superintendent's problems, for the study of rural teachers' problems; secretary of the county superintendents' section of the rural department of the National Educational Association; institute lecturer; speaker at educational meetings in this and other states.

WILLIAM D. EVANS.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in Marquette county, Wis., 1852. In 1858 he came with his parents to Williamsburg, Iowa. Here he attended the public schools. In 1873 he entered the state university. While a student at the university he taught school and was an instructor in a number of teachers' institutes during vacation. He graduated from the liberal arts course of the university in 1878 and the following year took the law course from which he graduated in 1879. Following his admittance to the bar in 1879, he located at Hampton. In 1902 he was elected judge of the district court for the eleventh judicial district. During the year 1907-8 he was law lecturer at the state university. In September, 1908, he was nominated for judge of the supreme court by the republican state convention to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Charles A. Bishop. He was elected at the general election and

by reason of statute served as chief justice of the supreme court in 1909, 1916, 1921, 1922 and 1927. Was re-elected in 1910, again in 1916, and again in 1922. Grinnell College conferred the degree of LL.D. upon him in 1916. He is a republican in politics.

ELMA G. ALBERT.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born June 5, 1866, near Gettysburg, Pennsylvania; came to Iowa in 1870. Graduated from the law department of Drake University in June, 1891, and entered upon the practice of law. County attorney of Greene county, Iowa, for six years commencing January 1, 1900. District judge of the 16th judicial district from January 1, 1915, until elected to supreme bench in November, 1924.

LAWRENCE DE GRAFF.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born at Apple River, Illinois, June, 1871. Educated at Morgan Park academy, Dixon College (A.B.), University of Chicago (Ph.B.), Northern Illinois college of law (LL.M.). Began the practice of law in Chicago, and removed to Des Moines in 1898 as secretary and instructor in the Highland Park college of law, and entered upon the practice in Des Moines with the firm of Miller, Wallingford and De Graff. First assistant attorney general of Iowa under Hon. Chas. W. Mullan, 1904-1907. County attorney, Polk county, Iowa, 1907-1910. District judge, ninth judicial district, 1910-1921. Elected justice of the supreme court 1920; re-elected second term 1926. Married Grace L. Clark August 4, 1901; two children, Lawrence Jr., age 17, and Barbara, age 11. Author of several legal textbooks. Republican in politics. Resides at 4920 Country Club boulevard, Des Moines, Iowa.

FREDERICK F. FAVILLE.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Mitchell county, Iowa. He attended the public schools at Mitchell, Iowa, and later the Cedar Valley seminary at Osage, Iowa. He attended Iowa state college at Ames, from which he graduated with the degree of bachelor of science. He attended the law department of the university of Maryland at Baltimore and completed his course in law at the state university of Iowa in 1891. After being admitted to the bar, he began the practice of law at Sioux Rapids, Iowa, and moved from there to Storm Lake in 1895. He served two terms as county attorney of Buena Vista county. He was presidential elector from the eleventh congressional district in 1904. In 1907 he was appointed by President Roosevelt as United States attorney for the northern district of Iowa, and served in that office over six years. In 1918 he moved to Fort Dodge, Iowa, and continued the practice of law. In 1920 he was elected to the supreme bench, and re-elected in 1926. By reason of statute chief justice in 1925. Republican in politics.

EDGAR A. MORLING.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born at Boonville, New York, April 21, 1864. Graduated Albany Law school and admitted to the bar at Albany, New York, 1886. Practiced one year in New York state. From 1887 to 1889 engaged in legal editorial work at St. Paul, Minnesota. Came to Emmetsburg, Iowa, in 1889, and has ever since resided there, engaged in the practice of law until appointed to office of justice supreme court October 1, 1925, by Governor Hammill. Elected 1926 to fill balance of term of the late Justice Arthur. Married 1888 to Flora B. Tripp, who died October 6, 1920. Four children, William E. Morling (died October 29, 1926), Mrs. Ruth M. Shover, Max M. and Maynard A. Morling.

TRUMAN S. STEVENS.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in Tama county, Iowa, in 1868. Attended the public schools, the Guthrie county high school; graduated from the law department of the state university and in 1892 located at Hamburg, Fremont county, where he still resides. Was appointed judge of the fifteenth judicial district February 1, 1917, and to the supreme court May, 1917. Was elected to said office in 1918 and re-elected in 1922. Has held no other public office except that of county attorney of Fremont county for one term. Was married in 1893 to Miss Cora Patterson. They had one daughter born to them, Velma, who died December 14, 1910, at the age of thirteen.

CHARLES W. VERMILION.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born at Centerville, Iowa, November 6, 1866, son of the late W. F. Vermilion and Mary A. C. (Kemper) Vermilion. Married Clara Eloise Biddle June 2, 1897. Attended De Pauw university, and graduated from the law department of the University of Michigan

in 1889. Upon graduation, entered the practice at Centerville with his father. Elected county attorney of Appanoose county in 1892, re-elected in 1894. Appointed to the district bench of the second judicial district by Governor Leslie M. Shaw January 1, 1902, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Hon. T. M. Fee. Remained in that position until appointed by Governor Nathan E. Kendall, November 15, 1923, to fill the vacancy on the supreme court caused by the death of Hon. Silas M. Weaver. Elected to fill the unexpired portion of that term in 1924. Re-elected for full term in 1926.

JAMES W. KINDIG.—Judge of Supreme Court. Born at Welton, Clinton county, Iowa, December 3, 1879. Moved to Woodbury county with his parents in March, 1887, and attended the public schools. Graduated from Morningside Academy in 1902, and received the degree of A.B. from Morningside college in 1906, and the degree of LL.B. from the University of Washington in 1907. Entered the practice of law at Sioux City in June, 1907. Was assistant county attorney of Woodbury county and advisor of the board of supervisors from January 1, 1915, until August 1, 1917. Was assistant attorney general of Iowa under Hon. H. M. Havner in 1917 and 1918, and then again entered the general practice of law in Sioux City. Was appointed justice of the supreme court April 19, 1927. Married Gertrude Crossan September 3, 1908. Has two children, Burdette and Lowell. Republican in politics.

ULYSSES GRANT WHITNEY.—Reporter of the Supreme Court and code editor, was born July 10, 1864, on a farm near Union, Iowa. Was admitted to the bar in June, 1890. Was county attorney in Sioux City for ten years. Was a member of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth general assemblies from Woodbury county. Was appointed by the judges of the supreme court to his present position in 1914, reappointed in 1918, 1923 and 1927. Was a member of the Iowa code commission in 1919.

BURGESS WILSON GARRETT.—Clerk of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Van Buren county, Iowa, February 24, 1872. When a child his parents moved to Davis county, and later, to Decatur county. Mr. Garrett was educated in the public schools, Simpson college and St. Joseph university, from which institution he graduated. He educated himself, being dependent upon his own resources from the time he was fourteen years of age. He taught school for a number of years, being principal of the Decatur high school. Has been chairman of the county central committee; member of the senatorial and congressional committees. He was pardon secretary to Governor Cummins. Served in that capacity until July 1, 1907, when he became the first secretary of the board of parole. He resigned to become a candidate for the office he now holds. The office being made appointive, he has three times been appointed by the court. In November, 1926, the supreme court elected him to a fifth term. He has been active in politics, church and benevolent activities. Was president of the state missionary board of his church for seven years. Was temporary chairman of the republican state convention in 1916. A republican in politics.

A. B. FUNK.—Iowa Industrial Commissioner, administering workmen's compensation service. Born in Adams county, Ill., January 12, 1854. Came to Hamilton county in 1865. Identified with the Spirit Lake Beacon for thirty-five years. Established the Enterprise at Flandreau, Dakota, in 1878. In 1879 elected first mayor of Flandreau, and, returning to Spirit Lake, was in the same year chosen as its first mayor. Postmaster at Spirit Lake, 1882-5. Delegate to republican national convention in 1884. State senator 1888-1900. For three sessions president pro-tem and chairman of ranking committee. President capital improvement commission by appointment of Governor Cummins. For six years vice president of state board of education under two appointments by Governor Carroll. Resigned to accept present position upon resignation of Hon. Warren Garst January 1, 1916, by appointment of Governor Clarke. Reappointed 1919 by Governor Harding and in 1925 by Governor Hammill.

ERNEST LINCOLN HOGUE.—Director of the Budget. Born in Monroe county, Iowa, August 31, 1861. When two years old his folks moved to Warren county

and located near Norwalk. Educated in the common schools and moved to Monona county in 1885. Has resided there since, engaged in the farming and live stock business. Served in the state senate in the twenty-ninth, thirtieth and thirty-first general assemblies. Chairman of the Iowa-Nebraska Boundary Commission from 1921 until July 1, 1924. Republican in politics. Married and has three children and four grandchildren.

DWIGHT LEWIS.—Commerce Counsel, born in Oskaloosa, Iowa, where he first attended school. Later removed to Des Moines, where he continued his education, graduating from Drake university (law) in 1893, when he was also admitted to the bar. Secretary of railroad commission 1899 to 1911. Assistant commerce counsel, 1911 to 1917. Appointed to vacancy on commission January 3, 1917; elected to full term 1918, and re-elected 1922 and 1926. Made commerce counsel for term starting July 1, 1927. President of National Association of Railway and Utilities Commissioners 1922-1923. Republican.

CHARLES WEBSTER.—Railroad Commissioner, was born on a farm in Waucoma, Iowa, and still resides on the old homestead entered by his father from the government in 1854. Married Dolly G. Potter of Lawler, Iowa. Three children were born to this union, Joe C., Neil A. and Bennet A. Webster. Was appointed first station agent and telegraph operator at Waucoma, formed a partnership with his brother Ace under the firm name of Webster Brothers who have since been extensive raisers and shippers of live stock, grain, and produce, as well as dealers in lumber. President of several retail lumber companies. Has been extensively interested in the building of telephone lines and exchanges. Has promoted and built gas and electric companies in Arizona. Delegate to the national republican convention in 1908. Member of the state council of defense during the war and federal fuel administrator. Was appointed railroad commissioner by Governor Harding November 5, 1917, and has been elected three full terms since that date.

B. M. RICHARDSON.—Railroad Commissioner, residence Cedar Rapids. Born at Brighton, Iowa, February 19, 1896. Attended Washington county schools and academy at Pleasant Plain. Married September 22, 1917, to Indamae Sieg of Topeka, Kansas. Has one son, Donald. Traffic and transportation experience; has been general clerk, chief clerk, freight inspector, transit auditor and special representative. Eight years with Western Railway Inspection Bureau. Served in world war. Is member of American Legion, Mason and Knight Templar. Republican in politics. Elected for full term as member of railroad commission, November 4, 1924.

GEORGE T. BAKER.—Member of Board of Education, was born July 9, 1857, on a farm in Iowa county, Iowa. He was educated in the district schools of Iowa, Hall's school for boys, at Ellington, Conn., McClain's academy at Iowa City, and the Iowa state university. He remained one year at the state university and then completed four years of special work in civil engineering at Cornell university, Ithaca, class of 1879. During the years from 1879 to 1889 he was engaged in railway location, construction and maintenance work, after which he was chief engineer for the high bridges built across the Mississippi river at Muscatine and Clinton, and consulting engineer of the high bridge at Winona, Minn. From 1893 until January, 1910, he was engaged in general construction work on railways, paving, sewerage, water works, and heavy building construction. Served as a member of the general assembly in the twenty-sixth regular and special session, was a member of the house of representatives from Scott county, was elected mayor of the city of Davenport in 1898, serving two years and was delegate at large to the democratic national convention in 1900. A democrat in politics.

PAULINE LEWELLING DEVITT.—Member of Board of Education, born April 10, 1877, in the girl's department of the Iowa State Reform school which her father and mother, Lorenzo D. and Angie Cook Lewelling had recently organized near Mt. Pleasant. In 1887, shortly after the death of Mrs. Lewelling, Mr. Lewelling, then president of the board of the State Teachers college, moved his family to Kansas of which state he was elected Governor in 1892. The daughter, Pauline, was graduated from the Wichita high school and from the State University of

Kansas, then taught for four years in the high schools of that state. In 1901 she was united in marriage to James Arthur Devitt of Oskaloosa, Iowa, at that time county attorney for Mahaska county. To this union was born three children who have the distinction of being third generation Hawkeyes. Mrs. Devitt was president of the Iowa Equal Suffrage association in 1919 when a special session of the legislature ratified the federal suffrage amendment. During the war she was appointed by Governor Harding a member of the state council of defense and served also as sixth district chairman of the liberty loan committee. In 1920 she was delegate-at-large to the national republican convention. At the time of her appointment to the state board of education in 1921 she was a member of the local school board in Oskaloosa. In 1926-27 she served as vice president of the state conference of social work and in 1927 was reappointed by Governor Hammill to the state board of education.

GEORGE W. GODFREY.—Member of Board of Education, residence Algona, was born at Luverne, Iowa, in 1833. Graduated from Luverne high school in 1899, from Cornell college academy in 1905, and from Iowa State college in 1909. Received master's degree in agriculture from Iowa State college in 1921. Awarded master farmer medal by Wallace's Farmer in 1927. Except for one year teaching at Iowa State college, 1919-20, and three winters in agricultural extension work, chief vocation has been farming.

ANNA B. LAWTHER.—Member of Board of Education, born in Dubuque, Iowa, the daughter of William Lawther and Annie Elizabeth (Bell) Lawther. Her grandparents were among the earliest settlers of the state. Received early education in public schools of Dubuque and prepared for college at Miss Stevens' school, Germantown, Pa. Received her bachelor of arts degree from Bryn Mawr college in 1897. The year following her graduation she became assistant bursar of Bryn Mawr college. From 1904 to 1905 she was the warden of Merion Hall, Bryn Mawr college, and from 1907 to 1912 she was the secretary of Bryn Mawr college. After resigning her position at her alma mater Miss Lawther returned to Dubuque where she became interested in local activities. During the campaign for equal suffrage in the spring of 1916, Miss Lawther was the chairman of the Dubuque County Equal Suffrage league and in the autumn of the same year was elected president of the Iowa Equal Suffrage association and was twice re-elected to that position. She was a member of the state council of defense during the war. When presidential suffrage was granted to the women of Iowa by the thirty-eighth general assembly, Miss Lawther was made the democratic national committeewoman for Iowa. Was sent as a delegate to the democratic national convention at San Francisco in 1920. She is at present the democratic national committeewoman for Iowa.

CLAUDE R. PORTER.—Member of the Board of Education, was born at Moulton, Iowa, July 8, 1872. Educated in the Centerville schools, Parsons college at Fairfield and St. Louis law school. Admitted to the bar in 1893. Practiced law in Centerville for years, became prominent as a worker in the democratic party. Member of the Iowa house of representatives 1896 to 1900 and of the Iowa senate 1900 to 1904. Democratic candidate for secretary of state in 1898, for governor in 1908, 1910 and 1918 and for United States senator 1908, 1909, 1911, 1920 and 1926. U. S. attorney southern district of Iowa, 1914-1918; assistant attorney general in charge of criminal business 1918, 1919; chief counsel federal trade commission July, 1919 to October 1, 1920. Removed to Des Moines and engaged in the practice of law. Member of the Presbyterian church.

EDWARD P. SCHOENTGEN.—Member of Board of Education, born August 16, 1873, in Council Bluffs. Attended local school until 12 years of age. Then attended an academy in Milwaukee, Wis., later entering the manual training school in Washington university, St. Louis. In 1891 he entered the Massachusetts Institute of Technology at Boston, taking the course in architecture, receiving the degree of S. B. in architecture in 1895. He then studied abroad two years in Paris, France, at the Ecole des Beaux arts as a pupil of Jean Louis Pascal, Member L'Institute, and a government architect. The balance of the time was spent in the French provinces and Italy. Returning to this country, he was identified with architectural work in St. Louis and in 1899 opened an office in

Council Bluffs, practicing in that city during the next ten years. He then relinquished the practice of his profession and became actively connected with the wholesale grocery firm of Groneweg & Schoentgen company. He was married in 1901 to Miss Mable Pratt, of Des Moines, daughter of M. M. Pratt. In 1901 appointed a member of the capitol commission by Governor A. B. Cummins. Appointed to the board of education in 1909 by Governor Carroll. A democrat in politics.

HENRY C. SHULL.—Member of Board of Education, was born January 16, 1892, at Sioux City, Iowa, son of Deloss Carlton and Francis Edith Shull. Was educated in the Sioux City public schools and graduated from the Sioux City Central high school in June, 1910. Collegiate education University of Chicago, 1910 to 1914 (Ph. B. 1914). Legal education Harvard Law School and University of Chicago Law school (J. D. 1916). Began the practice of law in Sioux City. In August, 1917, enlisted in the service of the navy and was discharged February, 1919, retiring as an ensign, U. S. N. R. F. Returned to Sioux City and entered the law firm of Shull, Stilwill, Shull and Wadden, of which he is now a member. Was married in August, 1921, to Alice Lincoln, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. A. Lincoln, Alton, Iowa. A member of Monahan Post No. 64 of the American Legion, the Masonic fraternity, and the First Baptist church. A republican. A member of the Iowa State Bar association and the American Bar association.

WILLARD C. STUCKSLAGER.—Member of Board of Education, born in the town of Lisbon, Linn county, Iowa, October 24, 1869. Graduated from the high school at Lisbon in 1886. Entered Cornell college at Mount Vernon, Iowa, and in 1893 Chicago university. In 1894 engaged in the banking business at Lisbon, Iowa, entering the Stuckslager-Auracher bank, founded by his father in 1874. At present president of the bank and also of the Mount Vernon bank. Is interested in educational matters and has been a member of the board of trustees of Cornell college for the past twenty-two years, fourteen years of which time he has been a member of the executive committee. Elected representative in 1899 and served during the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth general assemblies. In 1903 he was elected to the senate and served during the thirtieth, thirty-first, thirty-second, thirty-second extra, thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM R. BOYD.—Chairman of the finance committee of the Board of Education, is a native of Iowa, having been born in Lisbon, Linn county, May 19, 1864. His boyhood was spent in Tipton, Iowa, where he attended the public schools. He was graduated from the college of liberal arts of the state university in June, 1889, having earned his way by teaching school and clerking in a store. He was principal of the school at Mechanicsville, Iowa, two years. He was editor of the Tipton Advertiser two years, editor and associate editor of the Cedar Rapids Republican sixteen years. Mr. Boyd served as postmaster of Cedar Rapids from 1899 to 1909, resigning this office to accept his present position. He has long been interested in educational matters, and was for several years a member of the board of trustees of Coe college, and for a time lecturer on political economy in that institution. Mr. Boyd is a director of the American Trust and Savings bank, and president of the Perpetual Savings and Loan association, both located in Cedar Rapids. A republican in politics.

W. H. GEMMILL.—Secretary of the Iowa State Board of Education, was born in Ontario, Canada, March 14, 1871. In September of that year his parents moved to Keokuk county, Iowa, and settled on a farm near South English. He attended the rural schools and graduated from the South English high school in 1889. He entered the Iowa state college at Ames and graduated in November, 1894, with the degree of bachelor of science. During these years, he taught several terms in country schools. He has taken educational work in history and economics in Highland Park college, Drake university and Des Moines college. He was principal of schools at Gibson, Iowa, two and one-half years; county superintendent of Keokuk county four years; superintendent of schools at Dallas Center 1901 to 1911, and superintendent of the Carroll schools 1914 to 1917 and

resigned to become secretary of the board of education. He was married in 1895 to Birdie D. Richards. They have four children, Agnes, John, Helen and Iva.

JACKSON W. BOWDISH.—Member of the finance committee of the Iowa State Board of Education, was born in Merwinsville, Litchfield county, Connecticut, on the border line between New York and Connecticut. His parents and all the other members of the family except himself were natives of New York state. When he was a child his parents moved from Dutchess county, New York, to Linn county, Iowa, and located on a farm in Maine township. He resided on the farm until after he was of age, having completed his education at Cornell college, Mount Vernon, Iowa. He left the farm to enter the banking business, which he pursued the greater part of his life. In 1880 he was engaged in the banking business in Canistota, New York, where he married Charlotte Allison. On his return to Iowa in 1886, he was elected clerk of the district court of Linn county, after which he followed the grocery business for a short time. In 1892 he assisted in the organization of the Bohemian American State Bank, and the Iowa Savings Bank of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, which, by merger, became the present American Trust and Savings Bank. In politics he is a democrat.

ANTHONY M. MCCOLL.—Member of the Board of Control of state institutions, was born in Caledonia, Livingston county, N. Y., May 19, 1858. He moved with his parents to Iowa in 1876. For many years he was engaged in farming and the lumber and grain business at Woodward, Iowa, and for three terms was clerk of the district court of Dallas county. Was elected state senator from the seventeenth district in 1910 and re-elected in 1912. Appointed a member of the board of control by Governor Clarke to succeed Gifford S. Robinson, whose term expired June 20, 1913. Appointed by Governor Harding for a term of six years ending June 30, 1925, and reappointed by Governor Hammill for full term ending June 30, 1931. A republican in politics.

J. H. STRIEF.—Member of the Board of Control of state institutions, was born in Galena, Illinois, August 21, 1865. His parents located at Dubuque, Iowa, in 1866, a few years later moving to Chicago, Ill., and residing in the latter city until 1876; in August of that year again taking up residence in Iowa, at LeMars, Plymouth county, where he learned the printer's trade and conducted a weekly newspaper. Published a weekly newspaper at Kingsley, Iowa, establishing the Times during the pioneer days of that town. In the years since 1876 he has been a continuous resident of Iowa. He later located in Sioux City and for years was connected with the daily newspapers of that city. Was president of the Iowa State Federation of Labor from 1913 to 1917. He married Miss Helena Bastian, of LeMars, and has two sons, Harry J., and William B. A republican in politics. Legal residence, Sioux City, Iowa.

G. NORMAN CLARK.—Member of Board of Control of state institutions. Born January 1, 1875, on a farm in Grundy county, Iowa, near Parkersburg, to which town he moved with his parents in 1883. Attended the public school in Parkersburg and after finishing was engaged in the retail drug business for eighteen years. In 1910 moved to Mason City, Iowa, and engaged in real estate business and the operation of farm lands, which vocation has been followed successfully for the past seventeen years. A democrat in politics. Appointed member of board of control by Governor Hammill for six-year term, to succeed John B. Butler, retiring member.

ERNEST C. HAMILTON.—Member of Board of Parole, was born in Walnut township, Madison county, Iowa, August 1, 1889. Attended the rural schools and graduated from Winterset high school. Graduated from State University of Iowa in 1914. For fifteen years he has been associated with his father, J. E. Hamilton, in the real estate and farm loan business. During the past ten years has been actively engaged in farming. World War 15th Detachment, A. S. A., delegate in 1924 to American Legion National Convention at St. Paul and democratic national convention at New York. Democrat in politics. Appointed to the board of parole June 16, 1924, by Governor N. E. Kendall to fill the unexpired term of J. R. Murphy, which expires July 1, 1929.

HIRAM KINSMAN EVANS.—Member of Board of Parole, son of Capt. Hiram and Sarah Jane (Robinson) Evans, was born on section 9, Walnut township, Wayne county, Iowa, March 17, 1863, and has lived in the same county continuously for more than sixty years. Attended the country schools, Seymour Academy, Seymour high school, and the Allerton high school, graduating from the latter in its first graduating class in 1883, and from the State University of Iowa, class of 1886, with the degree of LL.B. Admitted to practice law before the state and federal courts, 1886. Served as county attorney, 1891-1895; house of representatives, twenty-sixth general assembly of Iowa, 1896-97; board of regents, State University of Iowa, 1897-1904; elected judge of the district court of the third judicial district, 1904, and reelected five times, serving eighteen and one-half years and until he resigned on his election to the sixty-eighth congress at a special election held June 4, 1923, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Hon. H. M. Towner on his appointment as governor of Porto Rico. Married to Harriett Belvel, January 1, 1891. Mrs. Evans is also an attorney, having been admitted to practice before the supreme court of Iowa and the United States supreme court. They have two daughters, Portia, married to Judge James D. Cooney of West Union, Iowa, and Genevieve, married to Vincent Starzinger of Des Moines, Iowa. Declined to be a candidate for nomination or election to the sixty-ninth congress. Engaged in the general practice of law at Corydon. Was appointed a member of board of parole by Governor John Hammill for the term commencing July 1, 1927. A republican.

RAY YENTER.—Commissioner of Insurance, was born on a farm near Oxford in Johnson county, Iowa, August 17, 1837. Is a lawyer by profession, having practiced at Iowa City, Iowa. He was representative from Johnson county during the thirty-ninth, fortieth, fortieth extra, and forty-first general assemblies of the state of Iowa. He served as captain of cavalry in the Iowa National Guard prior to and during the Mexican border trouble in 1916 and 1917, and served during the world war as captain field artillery in the United States army. He assumed his duties as Commissioner of Insurance of the state of Iowa, March 1, 1926.

JOHN WILLIAM STROHM.—State Fire Marshal, was born in Clinton county, Iowa, July 16, 1837. He received his education in the Lyons public schools, and commenced his political career in 1914, when he was elected county recorder. Serving in that office two terms, until 1918, he was elected county auditor, and at the time of his appointment to the office of fire marshal was serving his fifth consecutive term as auditor. Is married. Affiliated with the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, and of the DeMolay Consistory No. 1, A. A. S. R., and of the Order of the Mystic Shrine.

ROBERT HENDERSON.—Superintendent of Printing and ex-officio secretary of the state printing board, was born at Burlington, Iowa, in 1874, and has lived all his life in Iowa. Is married and has three children, a daughter born in 1907, a son born in 1910, and a daughter born in 1914.

EDGAR RUBEY HARLAN.—Curator, son of Samuel A. and Marinda E. (Rubey) Harlan; born of Kentucky Quaker ancestry at Spartansburg, Ind., February 28, 1869; brought to a farm in Cedar township, Van Buren county, Iowa, in 1873; attended "Morris" district and Keosauqua high school, graduating 1889, and Drake university, completing the law course with degree of LL.B., A.M.; admitted to the bar June, 1896; practiced law at Keosauqua ten years, serving as county attorney 1898-1902; admitted to United States Supreme Court, 1922; appointed by Charles Aldrich assistant curator of the historical department of Iowa, 1907; acting curator after death of Mr. Aldrich, March, 1908, until appointed curator by Governor Carroll, October 1, 1909; elected curator by board of trustees, June, 1913; honorary member Iowa chapter, American Institute of Architects; honorary member National sculpture society; member American Historical association; a founder and member of board of directors, Mississippi Valley Historical association; member and secretary Iowa Flag commission; member and secretary Allison Memorial commission; member Iowa Board of Conservation, Plant Life commission; member and director Des Moines Fine

Arts association; member American Civic association and delegate to Germany, France and England, tour 1913.

L. A. ANDREW.—Superintendent of Banking, was born in Ashland, Wisconsin, November 29, 1876. He has been in the banking business twenty-five years and is president of the Citizens Savings Bank of Ottumwa. He was married June 8, 1904, to Hazel Summerwill at Newton, Iowa. They have one son, born January 23, 1908. Mr. Andrew was president of the Iowa Bankers Association in 1920 and 1921, and served three years on the executive committee of the American Bankers Association. He is now a member of the executive committee of the state bank section of the American Bankers Association.

W. C. MÉRCKENS.—Secretary of the State Executive Council. Born at Lockridge, Jefferson county, Iowa, October 18, 1882. Education—high school and business course. Enlisted in World War as private, December 2, 1917, and discharged June 19, 1919, as lieutenant. Overseas 15 months. Married. Republican in politics.

LOUIS G. LASHER.—Adjutant General of Iowa, was born in Davenport, Iowa, March 17, 1873. His education was acquired in the grade and high schools of Davenport, and the military school Kemper Hall, and Griswold college. His business career began as a traveling salesman in 1891, and in 1897 he accepted the position of manager of the provision business of Swift & Co., at Alleghany City, Pa., from which place he rejoined Company B, 50th Iowa Volunteer infantry in May, 1898, for duty in the Spanish-American war. He served from May 12 to November 30, 1898, in Des Moines, Iowa, and Jacksonville, Fla. On January 5, 1899, he enlisted in the 12th U. S. infantry for service in the Philippines, and was discharged January 4, 1902. On his return to the United States, he traveled until July, 1905, when he helped organize the Lasher Manufacturing Co., of Davenport, Iowa. September 1, 1906, he accepted the general managership of the C. O. D. Cleaning & Dyeing Co., of Davenport, Iowa, and in 1910 became the president and general manager of that firm. On July 24, 1915, he was appointed by Governor Clarke as a lieutenant colonel and A. D. C., and was reappointed to the same position by Governor Harding on February 1, 1917. On July 20, 1918, he was appointed colonel and assistant adjutant general of Iowa, and on September 1, 1918, he was promoted to be brigadier general, and adjutant general of Iowa, to fill out the unexpired term of Adjutant General Logan. A republican in politics.

W. W. HAIRE.—Pharmacy Examiner, was born at Fort Dodge, October 27, 1869. Attended public schools. Started as clerk in drug store July 4, 1887. Attended Iowa state university college of pharmacy 1890-91. Member of executive committee of Iowa State Pharmaceutical association, director in Druggists' Mutual Insurance association of Iowa, acting postmaster at Fort Dodge from October, 1918, to May, 1920. Appointed commissioner of pharmacy by Governor Harding April 24, 1920.

GEORGE JUDISCH.—Pharmacy Examiner, was born near Muscatine, Iowa, in 1869. He attended the public schools of Muscatine and began his apprenticeship in 1884. He has served for more than twenty years as instructor of pharmacy and materia medica in the veterinary division of Iowa State college. Member of the pharmacopoeial convention, 1910 and 1920. Received honorary degree of doctor of pharmacy, Highland Park college of pharmacy, June, 1919. President Iowa Pharmaceutical association, 1921 and 1922. Appointed pharmacy commissioner by Governor Kendall, April 22, 1922. Reappointed by Governor Hammill July, 1925.

J. W. SLOCUM.—Pharmacy Examiner, born in Adair county, Iowa, August 23, 1874. Attended high school at Fontanelle. Graduated from a four-year collegiate course and also a business course at Simpson college, Indianola, in June, 1898. Residence, Indianola. Has been in the drug business about twenty-five years. Served as mayor of Indianola four terms. Appointed April 23, 1923, as pharmacy commissioner by Governor N. E. Kendall to succeed F. E. Farr, resigned. Reappointed by Governor Kendall in April, 1924. Elected secretary of the Iowa Pharmaceutical association in July, 1924.

HENRY ALBERT, M. D.—Commissioner of Health, was born at Walcott (Scott county), Iowa, October 11, 1878. Moved with his parents to Grundy county when three years of age. Graduated from the Reinbeck (Iowa) high school in 1896, and from the University of Iowa with the degree of B. S. in 1900, and the degrees of M. S. and M. D. in 1902. Spent two years in Europe, chiefly in Vienna, studying pathology, bacteriology and public health. Was professor of pathology and bacteriology at the University of Iowa, college of medicine, from 1905 to 1920, and director of the laboratories for the Iowa State Board of Health from their establishment in 1906 to 1920. Throat trouble caused him to go west in 1921. He was director of the Nevada state hygienic laboratory at Reno, Nevada, four years, or until September 1, 1926, when he was appointed commissioner of health by Governor Hammill. He was married to Edith Whiteis in 1905.

WILLIAM DUKE HAYES, M. D.—Member of the Iowa State Board of Health, was born February 7, 1888, at Bowling Green, Kentucky. Attended public schools, the Southern Normal School, Bowling Green, and Kentucky State Normal School at Bowling Green. Later attended medical college, University of Colorado, getting a C. P. H. degree in public health at that institution. Was with the state board of health of Kentucky from 1909 to 1914, first as assistant chemist and later as chemist and bacteriologist and assistant state sanitary engineer. Was with the state board of health of Florida from 1914 to 1915 as assistant state bacteriologist and chemist. Connected with the Sioux City board of health since 1916, with the exception of the latter half of 1918 at which time he taught hygiene and sanitation or preventive medicine to prospective officers at Iowa City until the armistice was signed, returning to Sioux City at that time as health commissioner.

A. A. ROBERTSON, M. D.—Member of Iowa State Board of Health, was born April 6, 1878, at Washington, Iowa. He graduated from the University of Nebraska medical college in 1901, and has practiced medicine in Council Bluffs for the last eleven years where his father, Dr. James C. Robertson, practiced for many years. Was married to Miss Claudia Ward of Neola, Iowa, and has two daughters. Dr. Robertson is a member of the staff of the Jennie Edmundson hospital, has served many years as local surgeon for the Union Pacific, Rock Island and Illinois Central railroads and is now serving his second term as city health officer of Council Bluffs, Iowa. A thirty-second degree Mason and member of the Mystic Shrine. Republican in politics.

H. L. SAYLER, M. D.—Member Iowa State Board of Health, was born in Illinois in 1870. Received a high school, college and medical education, graduating in medicine in 1898. Came to Des Moines in 1908. City health officer for the past seventeen years. Appointed to the Iowa State Board of Health in the fall of 1924.

D. C. STEELSMITH, M. D.—Member of the Iowa State Board of Health, residence Dubuque. Born in Grundy county, Iowa, June 11, 1877. Completed medical course in State University of Iowa in 1902. Began practice of medicine at Melvin, Osceola county. Member of Iowa house of representatives from that county in thirty-fifth and thirty-sixth general assemblies. Was graduated from Harvard Institute of Technology, June, 1917, with degree of D. P. H. In charge of county health department, Tuscaloosa, Alabama, 1917 to 1919. Was for a year instructor of health and sanitation at State University of Iowa, director of health one year in Columbus, Georgia. Came to Dubuque in 1921 as county-city director of health and agent of the United States public health service, in which work he is still engaged. A democrat in politics.

HERBERT R. SUGG, M. D.—Member of the Iowa State Board of Health, was born July 20, 1874, at Preston, Iowa, of American parentage. For generations back his father and grandfather were physicians. With his parents he moved to Sabula, Iowa, in 1880 and to Clinton in 1892, where he has since resided. Graduated from the Sabula high school in 1892 and the following year from the Clinton high school. Completed his medical education at Rush medical college in 1896 at the age of twenty-one, and for the following year was house

surgeon at the Chicago Polyclinic Hospital, Chicago. Has been in active practice in Clinton since 1898. Was married in 1901 to Florence Olney of Clinton. They have one son. Is a member of the staff of Jane Lamb Memorial Hospital and is past president of the staff and of the county medical society. President of the Wapsipincon club, member of the Clinton Country club, Rotary, De Molay Consistory and other civic organizations. Was instrumental in organizing the Red Cross chapter during the war, and has served continuously on the executive board. From 1907 to 1915 was a surgeon in the Iowa national guard. Elected health officer of Clinton in 1912 and has been reelected every two years excepting for the period of 1920-1922 while the farmer labor party was in control. Appointed a member of the Iowa State Board of Health in November, 1924; reappointed by Governor Hammill in 1927. He is a republican.

WILLIAM S. BAIRD.—Senator from the nineteenth district, composed of Pottawattamie county, was born in Council Bluffs, June 3, 1863. Parents native of Pennsylvania. Father, Rev. Samuel Baird, Methodist preacher. Mother, Matilda Hanks (Akers) Baird. Married Anne E. Wood, now deceased, of Logan, Iowa, January 9, 1895, daughter of John W. and Eliza A. Wood. Children, John W. (William S., Jr., deceased), Lucy W. (deceased), Robert M., Donald P. and Margaret (deceased). Graduated from high school, Council Bluffs. 1880. Graduated from Cornell college, Mt. Vernon, Iowa, 1884. Admitted to practice law, 1887. Trustee free public library, Council Bluffs. Member of Masonic order and Knights of Pythias. Elected senator, 1920, reelected 1924. A republican in politics.

FRANK M. BEATTY.—Senator from the twelfth district composed of Keokuk and Poweshiek counties, is a lawyer by profession and is engaged in practicing law at Sigourney, Iowa. He is a graduate of Iowa Wesleyan college and of the Northwestern University law school. A republican in politics.

C. A. BENSON.—Senator from the thirty-sixth senatorial district, Clayton county, was born on a farm in that county, where he is now engaged in general farming, cattle feeding, and breeding of pure bred Shorthorn cattle, in partnership with father and two brothers under firm name of August Benson and Sons. Received his early education in the country grade school, and took a course in banking at the Capital City Commercial College, Des Moines, Iowa. He graduated in agriculture in 1914 at Iowa State college, Ames, Iowa. Served as deputy clerk of the district court, as secretary and manager of the Elkader Fair Association, as secretary and manager of the Highland Telephone Company, as president of the Clayton County Shorthorn Breeders Association, and as secretary of the Clayton County Farm Bureau from the time of its organization until he resigned to run for the office of senator, to which office he was elected in 1924. He is a member of the Lutheran church, a Master Mason, and a republican.

A. H. BERGMAN.—Senator from the twenty-ninth district, composed of Jasper county, was born March 12, 1872 on a farm, eight miles north of Newton, Iowa, and lived on the farm for twenty years, graduating from the rural school. After leaving the farm he attended Capital City Commercial College at Des Moines, Iowa, and graduated in the year 1890. He then engaged in the implement business in Newton, Iowa, and in 1893 in the manufacturing business—manufacturing what was known as the Parsons band cutter and self-feeder. In 1900 he engaged in the washing machine business and has lived in Newton ever since, being interested in manufacturing, banking and farming.

CHAS. D. BOOTH.—Senator from the eighteenth district, comprising Cass and Shelby counties, was born in Stockton, California, January 2, 1870. In 1871 the family moved from California to a farm two miles east of Harlan, Shelby county, Iowa, where they lived until 1881, at which time they moved to Harlan. He graduated from the Harlan high school in 1888, and afterward finished one year's work at the Iowa State college at Ames. Following this he assisted his father

in the farm machinery business in Harlan, and when of age was made partner in the business. He still holds a substantial interest in the business, which is continued under the name of The Booth Motor Company. Although living in Harlan he operates four hundred acres of land which is well stocked. Has served as township clerk of Harlan township, and city councilman of Harlan, and ten years in the Harlan volunteer fire department, two years of which he was chief. Has been president of the Harlan Commercial Club, the Kiwanis Club, and the Masonic Temple Association. Has served as presiding officer of all the Masonic bodies up to and including the Commandery. Was director in the Shelby County Farmers Mutual Telephone Company for fifteen years. County chairman of three successful war drives. Married October 31, 1895, to Edith Pickard of Harlan, and they now have one daughter, Estella May, who is attending high school. Has been a consistent republican in politics, county chairman from 1920 to 1926. Elected to senate in 1926.

W. J. BRAKENRIDGE.—Senator from the forty-seventh district comprising Palo Alto, Kossuth, Emmet, Clay and Dickinson counties, was born in 1892 in Wright county, Iowa. Moved to Tama county two years later where he was raised and educated in the country schools of north Tama county at Dinsdale. Was graduated from the Traer high school and from the Iowa State college in 1915. Member of the Gamma Sigma Delta honorary agricultural fraternity. Since 1915 has been active in operating from one to five farms and has given much time to farm organization activities. Served as county agent in Cherokee county in 1918 and as president of the Tama county farm bureau in 1919. Moved to Palo Alto county in 1920 to operate a seven hundred acre farm. Served as president of the Palo Alto county farm bureau from 1921 to 1925. Member of the school board and cooperative elevator board. Chairman of the republican county committee. Elected to the state senate in 1924. Married October 20, 1915, to S. Edith McMillan of Traer and has four children, three boys and one girl. Member of the Masonic lodge and the Congregational church.

A. T. BROOKINS.—Senator from the forty-fourth district, composed of Floyd and Chickasaw counties, was born December 16, 1883, at Ionia, Chickasaw county, Iowa; graduated from the high school at Charles City in 1902; taught in rural and high schools; engaged in farming and stock raising in Chickasaw county; was married to Ruth Dodge of Orchard, Iowa, July 24, 1907; left the farm to accept position in First Savings Bank at Ionia, Iowa; a member of St. Charles Lodge 141 A. F. & A. M.; Almond Chapter 53 R. A. M.; Joppa Commandery 55 K. T.; A. :A. :O. :N. :M. :S. of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. A republican in politics.

CHARLES STEERE BROWN.—Senator from the twenty-third district, composed of one county, one of the oldest in the state, was born June, 1875, at Baldwin, Iowa, where he acquired his education in the public schools. American-born parents. Always lived in the county of Jackson, state of Iowa. Taught school at the age of 18 years. Buyer and feeder of live stock and farm owner. Never held an office of any description up to the year 1920. Eligible to the Sons of the American Revolution. Always a republican in politics.

S. A. BRUSH.—Senator from the Tama-Benton senatorial district, was born in Winneshiek county, March 19, 1873. In the fall of 1874 the family moved to a farm a few miles south of Chelsea and in 1877 to a farm in southern Richland township, Tama county. He received his education in the district school and graduated from the Chelsea high school. After graduating from high school he taught six terms of school and later spent a year studying law at the State University at Iowa City. He was married to Catherine Wilkinson, August 8, 1900, and has a family of five children, Mrs. Harold B. Cobet, Cecil W., Merle, Amber and Burnell. The family home was on a farm near Chelsea until 1914 when Senator Brush sold the farm and moved to Chelsea. He has since been engaged in the coal, grain and feed business. Is also operating a farm near Chelsea purchased in 1919. Member of the Masonic fraternity and past master of Zenith Lodge No. 581. Member of the Methodist church, serving the official board of his home church. Has been a member of the school boards in the districts in which he has lived for twenty-nine years. Mayor of Chelsea from 1914 to 1918

and has since been a member of the town council. Elected state senator in 1926. A republican in politics.

ED H. CAMPBELL.—Senator from the Cherokee, Ida and Plymouth county district, was born on a farm near Battle Creek, Iowa, on March 6, 1882, son of Romeo and Hattie Campbell, pioneers of Ida county, Iowa. Attended the rural schools until fourteen years of age. Graduated from the Battle Creek, Iowa, high school in 1900. Graduated from the University of Iowa in 1906, law department. Served as mayor of Battle Creek three terms. Member of the house of representatives of the thirty-fourth general assembly. Senator for the forty-sixth senatorial district in the thirty-eighth, thirty-ninth, fortieth, fortieth extra and forty-first general assemblies. Served in the infantry in the World War. Member of the American Legion. Married Esta Fein in Los Angeles, Calif., on October 25, 1913. Son Romeo Ed Campbell, born August 31, 1915. Republican in politics. Member of the law firm of Campbell & Campbell, being associated with his twin brother, Jed H. Campbell.

WILLIAM CARDEN.—Senator from the tenth senatorial district including Washington and Henry counties, was born on a farm near Middletown in Des Moines county, Iowa. Attended the country school, later took a course at the state normal school and finished his education at Parsons college, Fairfield, Iowa. Mr. Carden taught school for about three years and then entered the hardware and implement business at Winfield, Iowa. He served as postmaster under President Taft, after which he engaged in the insurance and loan business. He is a member of the different lodges of his town, as well as having been active in its civic affairs. He is a member of the Presbyterian church and has been moderator of the Presbytery as well as vice moderator of the Synod of Iowa. He was first district manager of the Coolidge campaign in 1925. Has previously served in the lower house and is now serving his first term in the senate.

E. E. CAVANAUGH.—Senator from the twenty-seventh senatorial district, composed of Calhoun and Webster counties, was born July 29, 1881, in Lehigh, Webster county, Iowa. Attended the grade schools and graduated from high school of that city, in 1900. Graduated from Tobin college, normal school, Fort Dodge, Iowa, in 1901. Taught school in the rural districts and was superintendent of the Lehigh schools for two years. Married to Belle M. Ingalls, of Lehigh, Iowa, in June, 1906. Elected county superintendent of Webster county, 1906. Served two terms. Entered the University of Iowa in the school of law. Graduated from the law school, University of Iowa, in 1910. Elected county attorney in 1912, and served two terms. Elected senator, November, 1924, on the republican ticket and re-elected in 1926.

W. A. CLARK.—Senator from the fifteenth district composed of the counties of Marion and Monroe, was born on a farm near Gallipolis, Gillia county, Ohio, April 22, 1867; where he attended public schools, came to Marion county, Iowa, in the year 1886 where he has since resided with the exception of two years spent in Warren county, Iowa. He was married to Edna McQuerry in 1890. To this union three children were born, only one living to maturity, Callie E., now Mrs. H. H. Phillips of Pleasantville, Iowa. He spent several years in the mercantile business and in the year 1900 moved to the farm where he resided for twenty years. He was deputy county auditor in 1895-96; was treasurer of Marion county from 1921 to 1925 and took the oath of office as state senator January 12, 1925. A republican in politics.

GEORGE M. CLEARMAN.—Senator from the twenty-fifth district comprising Johnson and Iowa counties, was born on a farm in Johnson county, October 5, 1870. Was educated in the public schools. Has been engaged in farming and stock raising in the same locality all his life. Was married in 1892 and has three children, Ray, Harold and Stella. A member of the Episcopal church and a thirty-second degree Mason. A republican in politics.

H. A. DARTING.—Senator from the eighth district, was born in Harrison county, Iowa, February 5, 1873. Moved with his parents to Thayer county, Nebr. Returned to Harrison county in 1881. Received his education in the rural schools.

Moved to Mills county in 1911. Is a member of the Christian church. An Odd Fellow, a York Rite Mason, including the Shrine. Elected senator in 1920, re-elected in 1924. Appointed member of state highway commission by Governor Hammill and confirmed by senate April 15, 1927. Republican in politics.

HERBERT E. DEAN.—Senator from the forty-ninth district comprising Osceola, Lyon, O'Brien and Sioux counties, was born in O'Brien county, Iowa, December 5, 1872, of American parentage. Attended school at Primghar, and Morningside college, Sioux City, Iowa. Served two years as deputy clerk of the court of O'Brien county, under J. W. Walter. Entered the Northern Indiana Normal school at Valparaiso, Indiana, and graduated with the class of 1896. Entered the law department of the State University of Nebraska and graduated with the class of 1898. Was married to Estella M. Bowser of Fort Wayne, Indiana, and has two sons, Wilbur M. and Forest C. Moved to Harris, Iowa, in 1899, and was elected president of the school board. Moved to Ocheyedan, Iowa, in 1901. Was once appointed and three times elected mayor of that town. Devotes most of his time to his farm interests. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. Elected senator in 1924. Appointed member of state highway commission by Governor Hammill and confirmed by the senate in 1927. A republican in politics.

A. G. DOTTS.—Senator from the fourth district which includes Wayne and Lucas counties. Residence, Corydon. He was born on a farm near Bethlehem, Wayne county, Iowa, May 24, 1870. Received his education in the rural schools of that community. Engaged in farming, stock raising and banking. Elected county auditor in 1908, serving four years. Employed as assistant bank cashier for three years. Member Corydon lodge I. O. O. F. Elected representative in 1922. Elected senator in 1924. A republican in politics.

LLOYD ELLIS.—Senator from the third Iowa district, consisting of Appanoose and Davis counties. Was born in Appanoose county, May 29, 1883. Lives in Moulton, Iowa. Spent most of his life in Appanoose county. Was married to Miss Blanche McCoy, July 2, 1906. Has two adopted children, Helen Virginia and Betty Jeanne. Attended the public schools of Appanoose county and Drake University at Des Moines, Iowa. Holds degree of A.B. and A.M. Has been actively engaged in the ministry for a number of years. Is a Knight Templar Mason. Was elected state senator on the democratic ticket in 1924.

SAMUEL EDWIN FACKLER.—Senator from Adams county, was born in Ohio in 1867. Was educated in the public schools and high schools in Ohio and Iowa. His occupations have been farm operator and merchant. Was married in Ogallala, Nebr., to Mayme Allen. They have two children, Samuel Edwin and Theodore Allen. He served as mayor of Prescott two terms and as a member of the Prescott school board nine years. Has been secretary, auditor and president of the Prescott Telephone company. A member of the Masonic order, Elks, M. W. A. and A. O. U. W. Member of the Christian church. Served as member of the house of representatives in the thirty-ninth, fortieth and fortieth extra general assemblies. Elected to the senate in 1924. A republican in politics.

JOSEPH R. FRAILEY.—Senator from the first district, composed of Lee county, was born in Ft. Madison, March 2, 1876. Graduated Ft. Madison high school in 1893; State University of Iowa, liberal arts, 1898; law, 1900. Second Lieutenant, Company F, Fiftieth Iowa Infantry, United States Volunteers, during Spanish-American war, and up to the time this regiment was mustered out of service. City solicitor of Ft. Madison from 1905 up to the time he took his seat in the senate, at which time he resigned. Served as a member of the state senate from Lee county in the thirty-sixth, thirty-seventh, thirty-eighth and thirty-ninth general assemblies. Connected with the legal department of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad from 1900 to 1905. Practiced law in Ft. Madison since 1905. Is married. Republican in politics. During the political campaign of 1920, he spoke for the republican national committee in Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Nebraska, Missouri, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, California and Colorado, and during the national campaign of 1924 in Illinois, Indiana and Ohio. He is trustee of the Cattermole Memorial

Library in Ft. Madison, and one of the trustees of the \$250,000 gift of Alexander Coleman, Esquire, for the purpose of building a road in Lee and Henry counties, Iowa.

CHARLES J. FULTON.—Senator from the second district, composed of the counties of Jefferson and Van Buren, was born in Jefferson county, Iowa, January 27, 1860. His parents were American-born. He attended both common and private schools and was graduated in 1883 from Parsons college. Remained on the farm until the winter of 1891-92, when he became a member of the Loudon Machinery company. Was mayor of Fairfield from 1903 to 1907 and again in 1920. Served as chairman of the local exemption board for Jefferson county during the World War. Was president of the Fairfield Chautauqua association for thirteen years. Is a trustee of Parsons college and a trustee of the Fairfield free public library. Was a member of the house of representatives in the thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies. Elected senator in 1920 and re-elected in 1924. A republican in politics.

FRED C. GILCHRIST.—Senator from the fiftieth district, was born in Pennsylvania in 1868, removed to Iowa 1871, and has lived here since. Educated in common schools and at state teachers' college. Taught school two years and was county superintendent of Pocahontas county 1890-92. Completed law course at state university of Iowa in 1893 and was admitted to the bar. Married Ellen Hurley in 1896 and has three children. Was a member of the house in the twenty-ninth general assembly. Elected to the senate in 1922 and re-elected in 1926. A republican in politics. Residence, Laurens.

O. E. GUNDERSON.—Senator from the forty-first district, composed of Mitchell, Winnebago and Worth counties, was born in Worth county, Iowa, February 25, 1875. He was educated in the rural schools, St. Ansgar Seminary and Institute, and the Northern Illinois Normal School. For several years he was engaged in farming, merchandising and teaching. In 1903 was elected county superintendent of Worth county and served nine years. He moved to Forest City in 1913 and has been interested in farming and banking, being now an active officer of the Forest City National bank. The communities in which he has lived have called upon him to serve as town clerk, councilman, member of the county fair board, of the city commercial club and as president of the board of trustees of the city library. In 1897 he married Gurine Finnesgard of Kenyon, Minnesota, and has two children, Esther and Harvey. Another son, Maurice, accidentally drowned at Clear Lake, August 4, 1924. Elected senator in 1924. A republican in politics.

GEORGE S. HARTMAN.—Senator from the fortieth district, composed of Allamakee and Fayette counties, was born November 13, 1871, in Sharon, Wis., and moved to Iowa in the fall of 1877, locating at Fayette. He received his education in the public schools of Fayette. In 1892 he entered the mercantile business at Fayette with his father and brother under the firm name of M. J. Hartman & Sons, which continued until the death of his father in 1915. The sons still continue the business under the firm name of Hartman Brothers. Senator Hartman has served on the city council and as chairman of Fayette county republican central committee and is director and vice president of the First National bank of Fayette. He was married to Miss Gertrude Clothier, of Rockford, Ill., in July, 1907, who died in February, 1920. He has two sons. Is a member of the Modern Woodmen, Elks and Yeomen. He was elected senator in 1920 and re-elected in 1924. A republican in politics.

WILLIS G. HASKELL.—Senator from the twenty-ninth district, composed of Linn county, was born June 5, 1857, in Bradford, Chickasaw county, Iowa. Some three weeks before the session of the forty-second general assembly closed he was taken ill of influenza but continued his duties until about a week before the session closed, when he became worse and was confined to his bed. He failed to rally and his death took place April 17, 1927, at Des Moines. Senator Haskell's education was secured in the grade schools of Cedar Falls, Charles City and Independence. As a young man he was employed as telegrapher, station agent and traveling freight and passenger agent. In 1893 he entered the wholesale and

retail coal business in which he was engaged at the time of his death. He was also interested in the manufacturing business and real estate business. Was a director of the Merchants National bank of Cedar Rapids for a number of years. Served as alderman of Vinton and of Cedar Rapids. Was chairman of the park commission of Cedar Rapids, member of the republican state central committee, president of the Cedar Rapids Commercial club and postmaster there from 1909 to 1913. Was married June 15, 1881, to Mae E. Williams and had four children, two boys and two girls. Was a member of the Masonic, Knights of Pythias and B. P. O. E. lodges. Elected senator in 1916, 1920 and 1924.

CHARLES FREDERIC JOHNSTON.—Senator from the forty-third district, composed of Franklin, Cerro Gordo and Hancock counties. Resides at Sheffield, Iowa. He was born January 17, 1866, on a farm two miles east of Hampton. His father was Irish, coming from the County Cavin, Ireland, and his mother a native of Ohio of Scotch parents. He is a graduate of the Hampton high school. Following graduation he attended the law school at the state university. Was admitted to the bar in 1891 and is at the present time engaged in banking and the practice of law in Sheffield, Iowa, being president of the Citizens bank of that place. He was married June 29, 1892, to Delle Haecker. They have two children, a son, C. F., Jr., now associated with his father in the bank as vice president, and a daughter, Winifred. He was a member of the house in the twenty-sixth, twenty-sixth extra and twenty-seventh general assemblies and was the first native son to occupy the position and is the first native son to occupy a similar position in the senate. Is a member of the K. P. lodge and the Elks, also a member of the Methodist Episcopal church. A republican in politics.

CHARLES B. KERN.—Senator from the eleventh district, which includes Clark and Warren counties, was born at Norwalk in Warren county, February 1, 1867. His parents, John and Miriam Black Kern, came from Ohio to Iowa in the year 1857 and settled in Linn township, Warren county, on the farm now owned and occupied by Senator Kern and family. He lived on the farm, spent his school days in the country district school, Indianola public schools and Simpson college. Married August 25, 1893, to Mary Frances Spring. They have four children, all of whom are living. He is actively engaged in farming and feeding. Represented his county in the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth general assemblies. Was elected to the state senate from the Clark-Warren district in 1924. A republican in politics.

DAVID W. KIMBERLY.—Senator from Scott county, was born in Deadwood, S. D., August 6, 1878. When he was six years old his parents moved to West Liberty, Muscatine county. He has lived on the farm most of his life. He received his education at the West Liberty, Springdale high school and Bryant-Strattons business college of Chicago. He was married to Elsie King, of Chicago. He is a member of the Mystic Shrine, Knights Templar, Scottish Rites, Mohassan Grotto, Eastern Star, Elks, Owls, Odd Fellows and Turner society. Was elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916, and to the senate in 1918, 1922 and 1926. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM H. KLEMME.—Senator from the forty-second district, composed of Winneshiek and Howard counties, was born in Franklin county, Ind., February 17, 1849. He came to Iowa with his parents in the spring of 1862 and located on a farm of 200 acres, which his father purchased from the government in 1857 for a dollar and a quarter per acre. He remained there until he was twenty-one years old. He was married to Mary Augusta Bolles in 1870. They have one daughter, Mrs. J. G. Parker, of Fayette, Iowa. He was postmaster during McKinley's term of office, and justice of peace in Lincoln township for thirty-two years. He was a member of the house of representatives during the twenty-fifth, twenty-sixth and twenty-seventh general assemblies and the extra session. Elected senator in 1926. Has been engaged in the lumber and coal business since 1873. A republican in politics.

OTTO F. LANGE.—Senator from the thirty-fifth district, composed of Dubuque county, was born February 16, 1869, in Dubuque, Iowa, and has always lived

there. He is the son of Robert W. and Otilie Lange. Robert W. Lange, Senator Lange's father, settled in Dubuque in 1854. Senator Lange became a commercial traveler at the age of eighteen and followed that occupation until 1907, when he became the general agent of the Royal Union Life Insurance company of Des Moines at Dubuque, which position he still holds. He was married to Lyde Brendel of Galena, Illinois, August 29, 1892. Has three children, Harvey Malcolm, Philo Brendel and Neva Hope Lange. His election as senator is his first venture in politics. He is a republican.

JOHN N. LANGFITT.—Senator from the sixteenth district, composed of Adair and Madison counties, was born in Scott county, Iowa, May 9, 1866. On his father's side he is of Scotch-Irish descent. His mother was of English descent. His early education was received in the rural schools. He also attended Wilton academy and Davenport business college. When twenty-one years of age he went to Adair county. Four years later he married Clara A. Martin, daughter of W. B. and Lucy E. Martin of Greenfield. Mrs. Langfitt died July 14, 1924. There are four surviving children, Harry M. of Chariton, Iowa; Bernice Louise of Des Moines; Clara Mildred and John N., Jr., students in college. He lived for several years in western Washington but returned to Adair county in 1898, purchasing the family homestead on which he still resides. In religion, a Presbyterian. He is a blue lodge and thirty-second degree Mason. He was representative from Adair county in the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth general assemblies and was elected senator in 1924. In politics, a republican.

ARCH W. McFARLANE.—Senator from Black Hawk-Grundy district, was born in Waterloo, Iowa, April 14, 1885, educated in the public schools and was graduated from high school in 1904. Was married April 6, 1908, to Miss Elsie V. Hawkins. He is now engaged in the wholesale fuel business, with headquarters at Waterloo. Is a member of the Christ Episcopal church, being a vestryman of that church. Is a member of the Knights of Pythias, B. P. O. E., El-Kahir Shrine, and a supreme officer of the United Commercial Travelers. Elected a member of the Iowa house of representatives in 1914, re-elected in 1916-1918 and 1920. Was speaker pro tem of the thirty-seventh general assembly; speaker of the house of the thirty-eighth, thirty-eighth special and thirty-ninth general assemblies. In politics he is a republican.

WM. E. McLELAND.—Senator from the twenty-eighth district, was born in Van Buren county, Iowa, April 16, 1867. In 1869 he moved with his parents to Marshall county, Iowa, and has been a resident of that county ever since. He was educated in the public schools and in the Marshalltown high school. He was elected and served as county auditor from 1903 to 1907, and again in 1916 to 1919. Was married to Minnie M. Robinson January 25, 1889. They have four children, two boys and two girls. He is a farm owner and is engaged in general farming and breeding of registered Shorthorn cattle. Elected to the state senate in 1924. A republican in politics.

J. G. MERRITT.—Senator from Sac, Greene and Carroll counties, was born at Findlay, Ohio, September 29, 1870, moving with his parents to Glidden, Carroll county, March 17, 1880, and thence to a near-by farm where he made his home for forty years. He moved into Glidden six years ago, but continues to operate the home farm known as Maplehurst Farm. Was married January 19, 1898, to Laura B. Elwood, daughter of Dr. Thomas Elwood, first resident physician of Carroll county. He has been active in business affairs, particularly insurance, as well as farming. Was elected state secretary of the Farmers Cooperative Elevator Mutual Insurance association and is now serving his seventeenth year as secretary of the Farmers Mutual Fire and Lightning Insurance association of Carroll county. Has been on the board of the Glidden Farmers Elevator company since its organization in 1905, and for fifteen years its president. Is now president of the Farmers Grain Dealers association of Iowa, vice president of the Farmers National Grain Dealers association and president of the North Glidden electric line. Has served his local school district both as director and treasurer, was city councilman and since 1919 has been a member of the Carroll county board of education. Was vice president of the county farm bureau, director of

the Red Cross and for six years republican county chairman. Elected state representative in 1924 and state senator in, 1926.

REDFIELD C. MILLS.—Senator from the seventeenth district, composed of Dallas, Guthrie and Audubon counties, was born January 22, 1891, in Redfield, Iowa. Married Ella Frances Shaw in Redfield, December 30, 1920. Has two sons, Clipper Eugene, born March 26, 1923, and Milton Loche, born July 30, 1925. Attended both the country and town schools. Has lived about equal portions of his life on farm and in town. He farmed three years in North Dakota. Graduated from the Kansas City Veterinary college in 1915. He started practice in Redfield, Iowa. On July 24, 1917, he entered the United States army as veterinarian and first lieutenant, serving in the army twenty-two and one-half months. Following discharge from service re-entered the practice in Redfield, Iowa, in which place he is still practicing. Has never before held a public office. He is a member of the Knights of Pythias, Sons of Veterans and American Legion. Has always attended the Methodist church. Elected state senator November, 1924. A republican.

JOHN M. RAMSEY.—Senator from the thirty-ninth district, composed of the counties of Butler and Bremer, was born at Clarksville, Iowa, his present home. He is a republican in politics. He was educated in the public schools, high school and private college. Early in life he learned the printer's trade and for thirty-five years, almost continuously, he has been connected with the Clarksville Star, of which he is at present editor and publisher. He was clerk for several years of his home town, assessor for ten years, and deputy county treasurer for one term. He was reared in the Presbyterian faith, and is of Scotch-Irish descent. He is a Canton Odd Fellow, thirty-two years has been a Knight of Pythias. He married Della Shafer, and they have two daughters, Georgia Edna, now Mrs. Gay Jackson, and Alice Lavon. Was elected state representative in 1920 and re-elected in 1922. Elected senator in 1924.

C. L. RIGBY.—Senator from the twenty-fourth district, composed of Cedar and Jones counties. Was born in Stanwood, Iowa, February 20, 1874. Received his early education in the Stanwood public schools. Attended Cornell college, from which he graduated in 1894. Member of the Sigma Nu fraternity. Immediately after graduation started farming and is still engaged in that occupation. Married Jennie Davis Billings, to which union was born two children, Edward and Isabel. Has been actively engaged in banking for about twenty-five years, and has been president of the Union Trust and Savings bank at Stanwood for the past eighteen years. Is a trustee of Cornell college, and a member of the Masonic and Knights of Pythias lodges. Elected senator in 1924. Republican in politics.

H. GUY ROBERTS.—Senator from Ringgold county, was born of American parents in Liberty township, Ringgold county, April 13, 1878. He attended the public schools until he was twelve years old; he attended Humeston Normal college for two months when he was called home by the death of his mother. Later he attended Highland Park Normal college at Des Moines for six weeks, but returned home on account of sickness. He was married September 18, 1902, at Grand Island, Nebraska, to Minnie E. McDonald. He held various township offices before his election to the thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh general assemblies as a representative from Ringgold county. He is a member of the Methodist church and a republican in politics. He is a farmer by occupation. He was elected to the senate in 1924 from the fifth senatorial district, composed of Decatur, Ringgold and Union counties.

J. O. SHAFF.—Senator from the twenty-second district, Clinton county. Born January 6, 1885, at Shaffton, Iowa; graduate of Iowa State college and University of Wisconsin; married Gladys Melick, 1908, since deceased; married Evelyn Lillie Purcell July, 1921; member of the house in thirty-seventh general assembly; member of the senate in fortieth, fortieth extra and forty-first sessions. Is engaged in farming and the dairy business, specializing in Holstein cattle; operates grain elevators at Shaffton, Princeton and McCausland. President Citizens Savings bank, Low Moor, Iowa, and director City National bank, Clinton, Iowa. Actively interested in republican politics for the past twelve years.

FRANK SHANE.—Senator from the thirteenth district; born May 16, 1875, in Mahaska county, Iowa. Graduated from the Letts high school in 1892, attended Iowa Wesleyan college, Mt. Pleasant, and College of Physicians and Surgeons, Keokuk; taught school in Appanoose, Van Buren and Lee counties. Started in the retail drug business at Stockport in 1900; moved to Eldon in 1902, where he owned and operated a drug store until 1912. During his residence in Eldon he served as a member of the school board, as justice of the peace and as mayor, and was elected representative from Wapello county in the thirty-fourth general assembly. He also served as president of the Iowa Pharmaceutical association. Moved to Ottumwa in 1913 and engaged in the insurance business. Is vice president of the Royal Union Life Insurance company of Des Moines, Iowa. Served as county chairman of the Wapello county republican central committee two terms. Elected state senator in 1922 and re-elected in 1926. Is a member of the Masonic and Knights of Pythias fraternities. Also a member of the Rotary club and Wapello club. Married to Gail Walker of Chariton, Iowa, in 1899. Two children, George W. and Elise. A republican in politics.

A. J. SHINN.—Senator from the thirty-fourth district, composed of Harrison, Crawford and Monona counties; was born in Pottawattamie county, Iowa, November 7, 1866. In February, 1880, he moved with his parents to a farm in Harrison county, in which county he has since resided. In 1889 he married Margaret Whiteside and to them were born two daughters, Ada and Edith. He received his education in the rural schools. Has been engaged in farming for many years. In 1901 he was elected sheriff of Harrison county, serving two terms. Also served as trustee a number of terms. Elected to the senate in 1922. He is a Mason. A republican in politics.

LARS JOHAN SKROMME.—Senator from the thirty-first district which includes Boone and Story counties. Residence, Roland. He was born in Norway in 1879. He immigrated to the United States in 1885 with his parents, settling on a farm near Roland, Story county, Iowa. He received his early education in a one-room country school, attending school about three months during the winter and working on the farm the balance of the year. He studied at Highland Park college, now Des Moines University, Des Moines, Iowa, Red Wing Seminary, Red Wing, Minnesota, and Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois. He has served as pastor of the Lutheran church at Eagle Grove, Iowa, and Pontiac, Illinois. He has been at different times engaged in the real estate business at Clarion, Iowa, and Thief River Falls, Minnesota. Immediately following the entry of the United States into the World War he enlisted as a private in the Iowa National Guard and was later mustered into federal service. After the armistice he received honorable discharge, having attained the rank of first lieutenant of the infantry. Since the war he has been engaged in farm operations and in the seed business at Roland, where he organized the Skromme Seed Company of which he is now president. Elected to the senate in 1924. Republican.

GEORGE F. SLEMMONS.—Senator from the thirty-third district, including Buchanan and Delaware counties. He was born on a farm in that county on August 17, 1875. Received his education in the rural and graded schools of the county, and at Lenox college, Hopkinton, Iowa. He has spent his entire life on a farm. Was married on June 1, 1904, to Miss Mabel L. Thompson of Buchanan county. To them were born two children, John W. and Ruth Gertrude. Has held office of township trustee, assessor, bank director and numerous other offices. Served on local school board twenty-five years. Member of Odd Fellows, Masonic and M. W. A. lodges. Presbyterian in religion. Republican in politics. Elected representative in 1920. Re-elected in 1922. Elected senator in 1924.

F. C. STANLEY.—Senator from the fourteenth district, consisting of Mahaska county, was born November 26, 1881, on a small farm near Ackworth, Warren county, Iowa. Moved to Indianola in 1890. Attended the district school. Graduated from Indianola high school in 1899. Interested in general stock farming three or four years. Graduated from Simpson college in 1907 with a degree of B.S. A partner in the Indianola Herald. Read law at odd times with O. C.

Brown of Indianola. Attended the University of Wisconsin, 1909-1910. Head of the department of chemistry, Penn college, from 1910 until the present time. During the year 1916-1917, was engaged in the financial interest of the college. Spent the year 1913-1914 in Europe on leave of absence, specializing in chemistry at the University of Berlin, Berlin, Germany. Traveled extensively through Europe, Egypt, Palestine and Turkey. Was married July 27, 1915, to Ada C. Whitney and has four daughters, Isabel, Kathryn, Margaret and Barbara. Was elected senator in 1924. Republican in politics.

BERTHEL M. STODDARD.—Senator from the thirty-second district, consisting of Woodbury county, was born at Minonk, Ill., January 21, 1871. Graduated from Illinois college, Jacksonville, Ill., in 1891. Engaged in the grain business at Toluca, Ill., for seven years, moving to Sloan, Iowa, in 1901. He was married in 1897 to Wilhelmina E. Simater. They have a son, Bela M., and a daughter, Jane M. He has been a member of the school board for twenty-five years, a member of the county board of supervisors, drainage trustee, chairman of the local board for Woodbury county, county chairman for the Y. M. C. A. and Red Cross drives, the United War Service fund, and the third and fourth liberty loan campaigns. With his son he operates grain elevators at Sloan and Owego, Iowa. They are also engaged in farming and stock raising. He was elected in 1918 to fill the unexpired term of Senator C. F. Lytle, resigned. He was re-elected in 1920 for the full term and again in 1924. He has always been a republican.

RALPH U. THOMPSON.—Senator from the twentieth senatorial district, composed of Muscatine and Louisa counties, was born October 29, 1878, on a farm in Louisa county, Iowa. At the age of ten years, his parents moved to Muscatine, Muscatine county, Iowa. He attended rural school in Louisa county and grade and high school in Muscatine. Was graduated from the college of law at the University of Iowa in 1903. In June of that year he opened a law office, in partnership with his brother, Herbert G. Thompson, in Muscatine, where he is still engaged in practice of law. Was married to Gertrude M. Carter on June 9, 1902. In 1907 acted as assistant city attorney of the city of Muscatine, and as assistant county attorney for two successive terms. In 1917 was elected city attorney of Muscatine and was re-elected for a second term. Received the nomination on the democratic ticket as a candidate for congress in the second congressional district in 1924. At a special election, held on March 18, 1927, he was nominated by petition on the progressive independent ticket and was elected state senator to fill the unexpired term of the late Samuel E. Wilson of Louisa county.

CLYDE H. TOPPING.—Senator from ninth district, Des Moines county, was born on a ranch near Utica, Ness county, Kansas, January 8, 1884. His parents returned to Van Buren county, Iowa, in 1888, and then moved to Burlington in 1896. Attended grammar and high school there and went to the State University of Iowa in 1903. Left the university in 1906 and with his father operated a ranch near Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada, in connection with a colonization project of theirs. Was married in 1908 to Miss Helen Welsh Young of Burlington, Iowa, and they have three children, Alice Hamilton, Eugenia Young, and Clyde H., Jr. After the disposal of the Canadian ranch he entered the employ of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and was connected with the sales organization of the land department of that railway at Calgary, Alberta, for ten years, leaving the Canadian Pacific Railway in 1921 to again engage in the real estate business with his father at Burlington, Iowa. He was elected to the Iowa senate in 1926. Republican member from Des Moines county. He is a member of the Congregational church.

OSCAR ULSTAD.—Senator from Hamilton, Hardin and Wright counties, was born at Leland, Illinois, October 30, 1867. At the age of five years he moved with his parents to Lee county, Illinois, where he resided until twenty years of age. He then moved to Wright county, Iowa, where he has since resided. Received his education in the rural schools of Illinois. Was engaged in the mercantile business at Holmes, Iowa, for fifteen years, retiring in 1913. Has lived on a farm adjoining Holmes since that time. Was postmaster at Holmes for seventeen years, township trustee four years, township clerk two years and was president of the school board. Is married and has five children. Elected represen-

tative in 1916, 1918, 1920, 1922 and 1924. Elected senator in 1926. Speaker pro tempore of the forty-first general assembly. Chairman of the republican central committee of Wright county. A republican in politics.

DENVER L. WILSON.—Senator from the seventh district, was born at Clarington, Ohio, 53 years ago. His parents both died when he was a mere child. When he was fourteen years old he went to Nebraska and worked on a farm until he was twenty, when he entered school at the old western normal at Shenandoah, Iowa. From then until he was thirty he alternately went to school and taught until he completed his law course at the state university of Nebraska. He entered the practice of law at Shenandoah in 1901, where he has continued to reside. He was married to Miss Dora Dunbar in 1897. To this union two children have been born, Ruth and Ivan. Was never a candidate for office until his candidacy and election as senator in 1926, although he has always taken an active interest in politics. He is a republican.

GEO. A. WILSON.—Senator from the thirtieth district, Polk county, Iowa. Born on a farm in Adair county. Youngest son of James H. Wilson and Martha G. Wilson. Married Mildred Zehner, December 8, 1922. Graduated from Menlo high school, attended college at Grinnell, graduate of the law school of the State University of Iowa in 1907. Began practicing law immediately in the city of Des Moines. Was elected county attorney for one term. Served as judge of the district court of Polk county, Iowa, for a period of over two years, resigning from this position to again enter the practice of law. Republican in politics.

SAMUEL F. WILSON.—Elected state senator November 2, 1926, from the twentieth district, composed of Muscatine and Louisa counties, passed away at his home near Morning Sun, Iowa, February 21, 1927. He was able to serve but a few days, being compelled to return to his home because of illness. He was born September 2, 1869, on the homestead which his grandfather procured from the government in 1839. He lived near Morning Sun all of his life, having purchased a part of the homestead in 1902, on which farm he resided at the time of his death. On March 4, 1897, he was united in marriage to Almina Elliott of Morning Sun, who survives him. Two children were born to this union, Harold E. Wilson, now an attorney at Muscatine, and Samuel Kenneth Wilson, residing on the home farm. He was active in public affairs, was for twenty-five years an elder in the United Presbyterian church, and served as township trustee, county supervisor, president of the board of education of the Morning Sun consolidated schools and as an organizer of the farm bureau movement in Louisa county. A republican in politics.

BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE REPRESENTATIVES

JOHN H. AIKEN.—Representative from Ida county, was born at Iowa City, March 27, 1875. He was taken by his parents, Benjamin Franklin Aiken and Patience (Williams) Aiken, to Ida county in 1876, where he has since resided. In October, 1903, he was married to Henrietta Hass, of Holstein, Iowa. Mr. and Mrs. Aiken have three daughters, Patience Louise, Thelma Norine and Virginia Helen. Mr. Aiken is a republican in politics and was elected representative in 1920. Re-elected in 1922, 1924 and 1926.

LOUIS L. AKIN.—Representative from Carroll county, was born in that county, November 29, 1890; has resided on the farm of his nativity nearly all his life. Received his education in the rural schools of Carroll county, graduated from the Glidden high school in 1909; entered the State University of Iowa the same autumn, where he remained for about three months. He left the state university and enrolled at Drake University of Des Moines, Iowa, in which college he spent about five years in the liberal arts and Bible departments. Was married to Clara M. Olson of Goldfield, Iowa, November 20, 1912. Four sons were born, three of whom are now living. Besides having been an active farmer for thirteen years, he has also been a minister, having been so recognized by the Christian church in the spring of 1910. He later became state editor for the state organ of that church. Has been an active member and officer of the Farmers Cooperative

association, Farmers Union, and the Farm Bureau, and is now a member of the school board and of five Masonic fraternity bodies. Elected representative in 1926. Republican in politics.

BYRON G. ALLEN.—Representative from Pocahontas county, seventy-seventh district, was born at Laurens, Iowa, September 13, 1901. He is the son of ex-Senator Joseph H. Allen, who served the fiftieth senatorial district from the thirty-second to the thirty-seventh general assemblies, and is the nephew of Senator F. C. Gilchrist, who now represents the same district. Educated in the public schools of Pocahontas and graduated from West high school, Des Moines, and Pocahontas high school in 1919. Attended the State University of Iowa for one term and was a student in the agricultural economics department at Iowa State college from 1920 to 1924. Upon leaving college he returned to Pocahontas and engaged in farm management work. On December 18, 1926, he married Miss Elsa Erickson of Laurens, Iowa, whom he had met in college. A republican in politics but was elected to the forty-second general assembly as an independent candidate.

C. C. ANDERSON.—Representative from Montgomery county, was born in Sweden, June 8, 1873. Received his early education in the rural schools of that country. Came to the United States in 1890 and worked as a farm laborer in Mills county. Was naturalized and cast his first vote for president in 1896. In 1901 he bought a farm in Montgomery county, on which he is still residing. He was married to Miss Mary Jones, August 25, 1897. His wife lost her life in an automobile accident April 20, 1914. He has one son and four daughters. Served on township board eight years. Member of the M. E. church and Masonic lodge. Elected representative in 1924. Re-elected in 1926. Republican in politics.

J. PARK BLAIR.—Representative from Buena Vista county, was born March 17, 1864, at Newport, Pennsylvania. When he was a year old the family moved to the Shenandoah valley, West Virginia, and when six years old to Bedford, Indiana. Until he was twenty-one he lived near Bedford, obtaining his education in the county schools and at the southern Indiana Normal school at Mitchell. He taught school two years. Moving to Arcola, Douglas county, Illinois, he was married to Clara Belle Louthen. Four children were born of this union, one dying at the age of seven years. For fourteen years he engaged in farming in Illinois, moving to Storm Lake in 1901, where he purchased a farm of 320 acres, selling it a year later. For fifteen years he was engaged in buying and shipping live stock and in the past twelve years has been operating his eighty-acre farm adjoining the city of Storm Lake. Has served on the board of supervisors of Buena Vista county, has been township trustee, school director, and city councilman of Storm Lake. Was elected member of the legislature in 1926.

S. A. BARNES.—Representative from Wright county, born in Kendall county, Illinois, June 22, 1877. Moved to Minor, S. D., in 1882, living upon the farm, going to school in the winter and tilling the soil in the summer. Educated in the public school and high school of Howard, S. D. Came to Iowa in 1897. He worked in his father's printing office, learning the printer's trade. In 1900 was appointed to a government position at Washington, D. C., through the courtesy of Speaker David B. Henderson, holding this position four years. In 1905 was elected cashier of the Security Savings bank at Eagle Grove, Iowa, resigning that position May 18, 1925, and retiring from the banking business. He received the republican nomination for state representative June 7, 1926, and was elected the following November. He is a bachelor. Republican in politics.

J. C. BAUER.—Representative from Washington county, was born in Germany, April 19, 1868. Came to Iowa in 1885, locating in Washington county. Attended the rural schools and also Elliott's Business college at Burlington. Has been actively engaged in farming since that time. Was married in 1892 to Victorine Davis. They had five children, four of whom are living. Has held the various township offices. A member of the Methodist church, also a Knight of Pythias. Elected to the legislature in 1924, re-elected in 1926. Republican in politics.

H. S. BERRY.—Representative from Monroe county, was born on a farm in Wapello county, Iowa, July 22, 1857, moving with his parents to Monroe county in 1865. Received his education in the country schools; taught school four years; served as member of the board of supervisors six years; served as mayor of the city of Albia eight years. Is married and has three children. His occupation is that of a farmer and live stock dealer. Elected representative in 1920, re-elected in 1922, 1924 and 1926. A republican in politics.

JOHN M. BIXLER.—Representative from Adams county, was born on a farm in that county December 23, 1867, the son of John and Savilla Bixler. His parents were pioneer residents of Adams county, settling there in 1854. Attended the rural schools and later the Western Normal college at Shenandoah, Iowa. Graduated from Highland Park college, now known as the Des Moines University, in 1891. Was elected county superintendent of schools in Adams county in 1892, serving two terms. Was journal clerk in the house of representatives in the 26th and 26th extra sessions. Married Miss Fannie L. Day, March 13, 1892. AARON VALE BLACKFORD.—Representative from Van Buren county, born on a farm near Hillsboro, Iowa, December 18, 1871. His parents, natives of Pennsylvania, came to Iowa in the early '60s and settled in Van Buren county. His father, John W. Blackford, was a member of the thirty-fifth general assembly representing Henry county. He was graduated from Iowa Wesleyan college in 1897, and is a member of the Beta Theta Pi fraternity. After leaving college, he taught school for a few years, then entered the hardware, implement and automobile business at Bonaparte, Iowa, in which he is still engaged. He is also engaged in farming on the stock-partnership plan, and is vice president of the Bonaparte State bank. For a number of years he has served on the Bonaparte school board, is active in the Methodist church, of which he is a member, is a thirty-second degree Mason, a Knight Templar, a member of the Mystic Shrine and the Order of the Eastern Star. Admitted to Illinois bar 1916, and practiced law a short time in Chicago. Married Bertha von Schrader of Jackson county, Iowa, 1916, and has three children. Member of Presbyterian church and Masonic Order. Elected to the legislature in 1924, reelected in 1926. A republican in politics.

R. M. BUCHMILLER.—Representative from Greene county. Born on a farm in Greene county, Iowa, January 12, 1880. Of American parentage. He lived on this farm until 21 years of age. Attended the rural school. On January 30th, 1901, was married to Miss Sadie Downing. Continued farming until the present time. In 1911 was elected a member of the school board and in 1912 elected member of board of trustees, serving two terms. In 1920 was chosen president of the local shipping association, serving five years. In 1924, elected president of county farm bureau, serving two years. Republican in politics.

C. C. R. BUSH.—Representative from Cherokee county, was born in Sandy Creek, N. Y., September 30, 1882. In 1884 he moved with his parents to a farm near Washta, Cherokee county, Iowa, which farm he now owns and operates. He received his early education in a rural school, graduated from the Washta high school in 1903, taught school and farmed. Graduated from Iowa State college in the department of animal husbandry in 1909; worked for the agricultural extension department from September 1909 until September 1910, also during the winter months of 1910-11 and 1911-12. Has been continuously a member of his local school board or secretary since 1912. Helped organize the Cherokee county farm bureau and was vice president of that organization for several years. Member of the Unitarian church and Masonic and Eastern Star

orders. Married Jessie B. Fogleman of Washta, March 20, 1912. Has two sons; Kenneth L. and Donald M. Was elected representative in 1926 on the democratic ticket.

L. V. CARTER.—Representative from Hardin county, was born on a farm near New Providence, Iowa, January 30, 1879. They have three children—James, John and Martha. He taught school in New Providence and Oskaloosa for a few years. He was director and secretary of the Lawn Hill Lumber company for twelve years; a township trustee for many years; has been a member of the New Providence school board continuously since 1908; was a member of the Hardin county board of education four years; was president of the Hardin county farm bureau two years; and for many years has been a member of the board of trustees of Penn college. Is a member of Friends church and of the Masonic order. Elected to the legislature in 1920, reelected in 1922, 1924 and 1926. Chosen speaker of the house of representatives of the forty-second general assembly. Republican in politics.

CLYDE B. CHARLTON.—Representative from Polk county, Iowa, was born on a farm in Pocahontas county, January 10, 1899. He graduated from high school at Rolfe, Iowa, and was graduated from the colleges of Liberal Arts and law at the University of Iowa in 1923. He has engaged in the practice of law in Des Moines since 1923. Republican in politics.

GEORGE W. CHRISTOPHEL.—Representative from the seventy-second district, Bremer county, Iowa, was born December 7, 1881, in Pilot township, Kankakee county Illinois. He attended school in that county and later taught in the school from 1902 to 1905. He was married to Miss Edith Wehling of Reddick, Illinois, on January 23, 1906, when he moved to Iowa on a farm near Bremer, Bremer county. Has four children, Floyd, Clarence, Mildred and Luella. In 1913 he moved to a farm two miles northwest of Waverly. Elected secretary of the Bremer Creamery company for two years; made president of the Bremer county farm bureau two years and vice president two years. Elected twice to the Iowa federation. Awarded a gold medal January 13, 1927 in master farmer's contest. Chosen state representative in the fall of 1924 and reelected in 1926. A republican in politics.

C. G. COLE.—Representative from Delaware county, was born on a farm near South Owego, Tioga county, N. Y., October 4, 1890. Attended public school at Greeley and Dr. Holbrook's school at Ossining, N. Y. Graduated from Wesleyan University at Middletown, Conn., June, 1916. Enlisted in the navy and was aboard the U. S. S. Aurora. Returned to Greeley where he is actively interested in Delaware county land. Is president of Delaware Savings bank, a member of the board of directors of Security Savings bank at Greeley, and treasurer of Delaware county farm bureau. A republican in politics.

DR. E. J. COLE.—Representative from Harrison county, was born in Harrison county, January 24, 1865. Attended the public schools in Woodbine, Iowa State college at Ames and Rush Medical college, Chicago, where he graduated in medicine in 1889. Has practiced his profession at Woodbine, since that date. He is interested in farming and the banking business and is president of the First National and the Peoples Savings banks of Woodbine. In June, 1891, he was married to Maude Allen. They have four children, a son and three daughters. He is a Mason and a Knight of Pythias. A democrat in politics.

HARRY F. COPELAND.—Representative from Dallas county, was born on a farm near Chenoa, McLean county, Illinois. He attended country schools in Illinois; moved to Waukeo, Dallas county, Iowa in 1894. Was married to Abbie E. Jones, March 24, 1904, who died January 6, 1926. They had two children, Wilma A. and Ralph C. Has been actively engaged in farming and feeding stock since moving to Iowa. Held office of township trustee for three years and was member

of county board of supervisors for six years, of which he was chairman three years. Elected February 7, 1927 to the house of representatives to fill vacancy caused by the death of D. H. Miller. A democrat in politics.

COR CRAIG.—Representative from Warren county, was born at New Athens, Ohio, in 1858. Came to Iowa in 1864. Was a farm hand for five years, then bought and operated a farm. In 1900, married Anna E. Kitchell. Has one daughter and three sons. Served two terms as county supervisor. Member of Presbyterian church. Republican in politics.

R. B. CRONE.—Representative from Emmet county, born in 1871 in Cedar county, died March 30th, 1927, in a Des Moines hospital, having been taken ill the previous evening. Funeral services were held in the house chamber the morning of April 1. Representative Crone's early education was secured in the rural schools in Tama county. He was graduated from the Dysart high school and the State University of Iowa. After his graduation from the state university he was superintendent of schools of Churdan, Fonda, Tipton, Washington and Fort Dodge. In 1912 he was elected president of Hastings college, Hastings, Nebraska. He resigned this position in 1920 and after twenty-five years in educational work returned to Iowa to take possession of his farms in Emmet county. He was president of the Emmet county farm bureau three years. Was a member of the Presbyterian church and of the Illinois branch of the sons of the American Revolution. His family consisted of a wife and three children.

WILL H. CROZIER.—Representative from Mahaska county, was born on a farm in the county he now represents, December 18, 1870. Received his early education in the rural school and after finishing high school in Oskaloosa, completed a course in Highland Park college, Des Moines, Iowa. Has been engaged in farming and stock raising continuously ever since. Has held a number of offices in his township and served on his local school board twenty-six years. Was married to Lillie B. Zaring of Fremont, Iowa in 1898. They have two sons, Ralph W. and Glen A. He is a member of the Presbyterian church and a republican in politics.

R. B. ECKLES.—Representative from Butler county, was born on a farm in Marshall county, Iowa, August 6, 1876. He was educated in the rural schools, and graduated from the Iowa State college in 1896. He was married to Ena M. Burnham in 1899. They have three children, Lester, Gordon and Dotha. He taught dairying and animal husbandry for two years at Doyleston, Pennsylvania. Engaged in farming and livestock feeding since 1900 near Aplington, Iowa. Justice of the peace for many years, a member of the Aplington consolidated school board for twelve years, being president of the board at this time. A member of the Presbyterian church. Elected representative in 1924 and reelected in 1926. A republican in politics.

JOHN EDEN.—Representative from Clinton county, was born December 25, 1870, on a farm in Clinton county. He lived on a farm continuously until 1921, when he moved to Calamus, his present home. Served as road boss for two years, president of school board two years, director of a rural school, three years, president of Red Cross five years, president of Farmers Elevator company four years, county supervisor six years, and town councilman. Elected to the legislature in 1924 and reelected in 1926. Received his education in the rural schools. On October 3, 1895, married Agnes B. Kuebler, to which union were born three sons, Lester J., Richard J., and Bernard William. Mr. Eden is a Thirty-second degree Mason, a member of the Modern Brotherhood of America, the Modern Woodmen of America and the M. E. Church. He is a republican in politics.

GEORGE W. EDGE.—Representative from Jasper county, was born on an old soldier's claim in Saunders county, Nebraska, March 27, 1872. Has resided in Iowa since 1877 and in Jasper county since 1883, owning and operating a quarter section of land in that county. Was married September 1, 1897, to Anna Friend. They have two children, Margaret, who is married, and Everett, who is still at home on the farm. His education was procured in the rural schools and in the Hazel Dell academy at Newton. Was in the Iowa National Guard five years, discharged in 1895, with the rank of sergeant. Belongs to the Modern Woodmen

of America, Subordinate Grange, Jasper County Pomona Grange, Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks and Independent Order of Odd Fellows, in which latter order he has been department aide to the department commander of the patriarch militant branch with the rank of major. A member of the Sons of the Veterans and of the Methodist church. Politically a republican. Elected representative in 1922 serving in the fortieth general assembly and the extra session. Re-elected in 1924 and in 1926.

ELMORE A. ELLIOTT.—One of the representatives from Polk county, was born on a farm near Louisville, Kentucky, and spent the early years of his life farming. Worked his way through school, entering Westfield college, Westfield, Ill., at the age of 23 where he spent two years, later entering old Western college at Toledo, Iowa, where he finished his education. Married Lola Shepherd of Des Moines. Elected a member of the city council of Des Moines in 1918, reelected in 1920, serving both terms as finance commissioner. With state board of health one year. Is a minister in the Congregational church. A member of the Masonic order, the I. O. O. F., K. P., L. O. O. M. and Hapac Grotto. Elected in 1924 and reelected in 1926. A republican in politics.

JAMES D. FLEMING.—Representative from Crawford county, Iowa, was born September 26, 1884, of Scotch parentage. His entire life has been spent in Stockholm township, Crawford county, Iowa, where he now owns and operates a two hundred-acre farm. He received his early education in the rural schools, attended and graduated from the Denison Normal college in 1907. He taught school for three years and has been actively engaged in farming since then. In August, 1913, he was married to Lillie I. Carlson and has three children, Ruth Mae, Charlotte Marie and Paul James. The family are members of the Presbyterian church at Denison, Iowa. Mr. Fleming has taken an active part in matters of public interest in his home community. He has been assessor and road superintendent for a number of years. He is now a member of the school board and president of the Farmers Elevator at Deloit. He was president of Crawford County Farm Bureau for two years. Elected state representative in 1924 and 1926. In politics he is a republican.

L. B. FORSLING.—Representative from Woodbury county, was born in Sioux City, March 23, 1890. Attended grade and high school in Sioux City, graduated in law from Cumberland university; general practice in law in Sioux City since 1915. Police judge of Sioux City, 1918. Married Lillian Nash, February 12, 1914. Elected representative, 1920; reelected 1922, 1924 and 1926. Republican in politics.

WM. T. GILMORE.—Representative from Cedar county, was born in Bellefontaine, Ohio. He was graduated from Iowa State college. Taught country school for two terms; afterward engaged in the clothing business for some years. Is now connected with the Cedar county state bank as vice president. Is a member of the Knights of Pythias, Consistory, Mystic Shrine, State Historical society and the farm bureau. Served on the city council for five years and was an alternate to the republican national convention in 1920. Elected representative in 1920, reelected in 1922 and in 1926. Republican in politics.

H. M. GREENE.—Representative from Pottawattamie county, was born on a farm near Avoca, Iowa, September 6, 1882. He attended rural school and Avoca high school; graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1906. He was admitted to the bar the same year but returned to farming, at which he is engaged at the present time. He enlisted as a private in L company, 168th infantry, Rainbow division, and was later made a sergeant. He was twice wounded. He is a charter member and first commander of Fred Funston Post, American Legion at Avoca, Iowa. He is a Mason, a Shriner, and in politics a republican.

EDMUND A. GRIMWOOD.—Representative from Jones county, was born on a farm in Allamakee county, on December 8, 1863, of English parents. Secured only those advantages which come through the common schools. Engaged in the drug business at Oxford Junction, Iowa, in 1887, after three years of

apprenticeship at Independence, Iowa. After thirty-three years in this business, disposed of same on July 1, 1920, and was elected to the house in November of that year. Was reelected in 1922, 1924 and 1926.

DAVID M. GRISWOLD.—Representative from Madison county, was born in Marion county, Ohio, September 5, 1863. Came to Madison county in 1866 where he has resided since, excepting ten years during which time he has served as secretary of the Hawkeye Telephone company. He attended the public schools of the state and taught in the public schools for several years. He has served in all of the different township offices and served as clerk of the district court for eight years. Is now engaged in farming. Is a director of the Citizens National Bank of Winterset. Married Lulu E. Piatt of Madison county on March 11, 1891. To this union a son and daughter have been born. A member of the Knights of Pythias, a Republican in politics.

J. H. HAGER.—Representative from Allamakee county, was born in that county, August 30, 1871. Received his education in the rural schools and at the Breckenridge Preparatory and Business institute of Decorah, Iowa. Was quartermaster sergeant, company I, 49 Iowa Vol. infantry, during the Spanish-American war. In 1895, he engaged in the farm implement business at Waukon, and in 1908 added the Buick line of cars and is continuing in that business at the present time. Was married June 14, 1905, to Grace Falby, formerly of Burlington, Vermont. Member of the Presbyterian church, Shrine consistory and K. P. lodge, a charter member of the Kiwanis club and served three years as president of the chamber of commerce. Elected representative in 1924 and 1926. Republican in politics.

LENUS HAGGLUND.—Representative from Page county, Iowa, was born in Sweden, May 11, 1864. He came to Illinois, Henry county, with his parents, August, 1867. Then moved with his parents in the spring of 1876 to a farm near Essex, Page county, Iowa. He has always lived on a farm since coming to the United States and the farm on which he is now living has been owned and occupied by him for thirty-three years. Attended the rural schools and one winter attended the Western Normal college at Shenandoah. Has always taken an active part in church, schools and public affairs. Has served as township trustee, school director, president of the school board, school secretary and treasurer, member of the county board of education, president of the Page county farm bureau and also treasurer of same. Was married to Alice Seablom, March 19, 1891. To this union five children were born, four sons and one daughter. All living except one, who was killed in an accident on the harvest field August, 1919. He is a member of the Presbyterian church. Elected representative in 1926. Republican in politics.

JOHN F. HALE.—Representative from Howard county, was born on a farm near Le Roy, Minnesota, June 27, 1871. He lived in Minnesota until the year 1904, then moved to a farm in Howard county, Iowa, and has lived in Howard county since that time. Received his education in the common schools, also the high school at Spring Valley, Minnesota. Was township trustee from 1905 until 1917, at which time he was elected a member of the board of supervisors of Howard county, serving nine years, eight years as chairman. Was elected representative in 1926. Republican in politics.

ROY HANEY.—Representative from Mills county, was born July 28, 1878, in the same county he represents. Was educated in the rural schools in his county, later attended business college, was vice president of the Glenwood Granite Works, director of the Mills County Building and Loan Association and for the past sixteen years has been engaged in the real estate and exchange business. Treasurer of the board of education and mayor of the city of Glenwood. This position he resigned after being elected as a member of the forty-first general assembly. He was reelected to the forty-second general assembly. Was married January 16, 1907, to Pearl Mintle, Glenwood. Member of the M. E. church, is a Mason, O. E. S. and Odd Fellow; also a member of the chamber of commerce of Glenwood. A republican in politics.

JOHN T. HANSEN.—Representative from Scott county, was born in the city of Davenport, Iowa, November 28, 1858. He attended the rural schools and afterwards received some private instruction. Learned the blacksmith trade, but went to farming when he became of age. Was married March 12, 1887, to Emma Harst of Scott county, who died October 6, 1897. There were born to them four children, two boys and two girls. Both boys are World War veterans. One served with the 88th division in France. Has served on the board of education of Sheridan township, one term as justice of the peace and as vice president of the Scott county farm bureau. A member of the Iowa farm bureau federation. Served in the thirty-seventh, thirty-eighth, fortieth, forty-first and forty-second general assemblies. A member of the Woodmen of the World. A republican in politics.

HENRY N. HANSON.—Representative from Winnebago county, was born on a farm in Webster county, Iowa, September 3, 1876. He received his education in the rural schools of his county, in Luther Academy at Bode, Humboldt county, Iowa, and at the Humboldt college, Humboldt, Iowa. He engaged in the general merchandise business with his father in 1893 until moving to North Dakota in the fall of 1902, filing on a homestead on which he lived and proved up in 1909. He then returned to Iowa and settled on a farm in Winnebago county. He served as a member of the board of supervisors, resigning to better look after his duties on the farm. Since 1914 he has acted as auditor of the co-operative elevator and creamery association at Leland, secretary of the school board, and has held other public offices in his township. In the fall of 1924 was elected to the legislature and re-elected in 1926. Is a republican in politics.

F. M. HARRISON.—Representative from Clarke county, was born on a farm in Clarke county, his father having settled on the old homestead in 1856, on which farm his mother still resides. He attended the public schools, also Simpson and Humboldt colleges, and later taught in the public schools of Clarke county. In June, 1916, enlisted in Company B, 3rd Iowa Infantry at Camp Dodge, Iowa, and was sent to Brownsville, Texas, where he was stationed from July 24, 1916, to February 1, 1917. Discharged at Fort Des Moines, February 20, 1917. Re-enlisted in Co. B, 3rd Iowa Infantry, July 16, 1917, at Machinery hall, Fair Grounds, Des Moines, this organization later became the 168th Infantry, 42nd division, known as the Rainbow division. Served eighteen months overseas, returned to the United States April 25, 1919, was discharged at Camp Dodge, May 16, 1919. Returned to farming. H. C. HATTENDORF.—Representative from Osceola county, was born in Lake county, Indiana. He received his education in the parochial and public schools. Learned the carpenter trade and worked at it for a number of years. He has served as township clerk and as secretary of the school board. He was a member of the county board of supervisors for three terms and was elected twice chairman of the board and for two years he has been township assessor. He married Louisa Glade in 1892. He has been engaged in farming and stock raising ever since. He was elected representative in 1922, reelected in 1924 and 1926. A life long republican.

J. M. HEALD.—Representative from Chickasaw county, was born at Bradford, Chickasaw county, Iowa, January 26, 1861. Educated at Bradford academy and State Teachers college. Taught in the public schools of Chickasaw county for several years. Married to Alice R. Green of Winchester, Illinois, in 1886. Has engaged in farming for a large part of his life. Has always been interested in and connected with public affairs. A republican in politics.

G. E. HELD.—Representative from Plymouth county. Native of Iowa and born in Hungerford township where he now resides. Received his education in the rural schools and completed a normal course in Le Mars normal school in 1897. Is now actively engaged in farming near Hinton. In 1922 married Agnes

M. Eyres of Le Mars, Iowa. They have two children, Thomas E. and Kathrine Elizabeth. Was elected and served in the house of representatives during the thirty-ninth, fortieth, fortieth extra, forty-first and forty-second general assemblies. A republican in politics.

J. G. HEMPEL.—Representative from Clayton county, born at Giard, Clayton county, Iowa, December 9, 1860. Attended public schools and entered mercantile business in 1881. In 1887 was married to Emma J. Bickel, having three daughters, Mrs. Iowa H. Graf and Kathleen, M., living; Johnyette G., deceased when five years old. In 1892 opened general merchandise establishment at Giard, disposing of it at the end of three years. In April, 1896, opened up a clothing business at Elkader, which he has conducted successfully ever since. Served as secretary of school board, secretary of county fair, member of state board voting machine commissioners, member of state central committee, fourth district, member town council Elkader and served as county auditor eight years. Member Odd Fellows lodge, thirty-second degree Mason and Shriner. Elected representative in 1922, 1924 and 1926. Has always been a republican in politics.

LAFE HILL.—Representative from Floyd county, was born in Ringgold county, Iowa. At the age of fourteen years was thrown on his own resources. He worked on a farm, in a brick yard and on railroad construction, attending school at odd times until about the age of eighteen, when he had saved sufficient money to enable him to enter academic and college work. During that time he read law for two years with C. W. Mullen of Waterloo, afterwards state's attorney general. He then took up teaching at Troy Mills and Walker, in Linn county, and was later superintendent of schools at Seymour and other places in southern Iowa. At the close of his school work he entered the newspaper business, and is now publisher of the Advertiser at Nora Springs. His father was a veteran of the Civil war. He was married to Florence A. FRANK HOLLINGSWORTH.—Representative from Boone county, was born in Wisconsin. When two years old he moved with his parents to a farm in Dallas county, Iowa, which was his home until 1894. Entered the State University of Iowa in the fall of 1894, and graduated from the liberal arts and law school of the university in 1899. Began the practice of law at Boone, Iowa, in 1899. Married in 1901. He served as republican county chairman for many years. Was assistant county attorney of Boone county four years and elected county attorney in 1910 and 1912. City solicitor of Boone from 1917 to 1919. Served as county chairman for Boone county in liberty loan campaigns during 1918 and 1919. Aside from the law business, interested in farming and banking. A farm land owner and a director in the Boone State bank. A member of the various Masonic bodies, including the Shrine and the Consistory. Also a member of the Elks. Elected representative in 1926. A republican.

CHAS. A. HOLLIS.—Representative from Black Hawk county, born in Black Hawk county in 1867, oldest of a family of six boys and three girls. Father enlisted in the army from Troy, N. Y., and served three years. Was married in 1887 to Miss Carrie Buck of Black Hawk county and immediately went to farming for himself, at all times handling pure-bred and high-grade stock. Active in all organizations for the betterment of rural conditions. Moved to Cedar Falls in 1906 to educate his children, one boy and one girl. Traveled three years for the Independent Telephone association and promoted the first independent copper toll line between Burlington and Des Moines. Assisted in organizing and was president and manager of the Black Hawk Oil Company, Cedar Falls. At the present time is in partnership with his son in the business of raising pure-bred Holsteins. Member of the First Brethren church. Elected representative in 1922, reelected in 1924 and in 1926. Republican in politics.

GEORGE M. HOPKINS.—Representative from Guthrie county, Iowa, was born October 16, 1866, in the same county which he represents in the legislature. He attended district school during the summer and winter until he was eleven years of age, after which he attended rural school three months in the winter. At seventeen he attended one year at the Guthrie county high school. He taught three terms of rural school and attended business college at Shenandoah, Iowa. After teaching a short time he took a normal course at Valparaiso, Indiana. After finishing this course, he was elected principal of the village schools at Bassett, Nebraska, in which position he served for seven years. During this time he took a homestead near the town of Bassett. He was married in 1894 to Anna Laura Green of Kirkwood, Nebraska. They have two daughters and three sons. In 1899 he was elected county superintendent of Rock county, Nebraska, serving four terms. He has always taken an active part in politics and welfare work of his community. He was elected representative in 1926. A republican.

WILBER F. HUBBARD.—Representative from Pottawattamie county, was born on a farm near Neola, Iowa, March 24, 1885. Educated in the rural schools and the high school of Neola. Has followed the vocation of farming. Is president of the West Pottawattamie County Farm Bureau, and past master of the Masonic lodge. He was married to Vera Lynn Hamilton in 1909. They have four children, Joseph, Neal, Verna and Wilber Lynn. Was elected state representative in 1924, and reelected in 1926. A republican in politics.

CHAS. W. HUFF.—Representative from Cass county, was born on a farm near Anita, Iowa, October 30, 1873. When ten years old he moved with his parents to a farm near Massena, in the same county, where he has since resided. He received his education in the common schools, also graduating from the Iowa business college of Des Moines in 1894. Was township clerk, serving two years and county recorder four years. Elected representative in 1920 and reelected in 1922, 1924 and 1926. He is a Mason and a Shriner. A republican in politics.

RALPH R. HUNT.—Representative from Louisa county, was born in Marshall township, Louisa county, 1879. Educated in the public schools of Wapello, Iowa. Worked at printer's trade four years, taught school nine years and was elected county superintendent of schools, 1906, serving in that capacity six years. He superintended the schools at Oakville, Iowa, one year after returning to his farm, in 1912. There are two children, Reed L. and Helen D. by his first wife, Mary Pearl Parsons, who died in December, 1913. November 22, 1924, he was united in marriage to Sofie Kramer. The past fourteen years he has devoted his entire time to farming. A republican in politics.

F. D. ICKIS.—Representative from Union county, was born in Afton, Union county, December 13, 1872. He received his education in the country schools, the Creston and Afton high schools and the Afton business college. Has lived on the farm where he now resides for the past fifty-two years. Connected with the farm bureau since its organization. Director of the Farmers Cooperative company and a director of the First National bank of Creston. A republican in politics.

A. T. ISTD.—Representative from Winneshiek county, was born in Norway in 1862 and in 1869 came to the United States with his parents, who settled in Winneshiek county, where he has lived for fifty-seven years. He attended the rural school and the normal school at Decorah, Iowa, for one winter. He owned and operated a farm for thirty-five years. In 1922 he rented his farm and moved to Decorah. Has held various offices in his township and county, acting as township clerk, assessor and county supervisor. He is married to Bertha Woldt and has two daughters. Member of the Lutheran church. Elected representative from the ninety-first district in 1926. A republican in politics.

FRANCIS JOHNSON.—Representative from Dickinson county, was born in Butler county, Iowa, August 6, 1890. His parents are F. H. and Anna Johnson of Terril, Iowa. Has lived at Terril since ten years of age. He was graduated from the Terril and Spirit Lake high schools and the college of law of Iowa State University. Was admitted to the bar in 1912. Married to Sara E. Thompson in 1914. In his home county he has served as president of the farm bureau, township clerk, member of the fortieth, fortieth extra, and forty-first general assemblies. Elected to the legislature in 1922, 1924 and 1926. He is actively engaged in farming and the breeding of Poland China hogs. Is a member of the Terril Methodist Episcopal church and the Richloyd lodge of A. F. and A. M. Republican in politics.

JOSEPH H. JOHNSON.—Representative from Marion county, was born on a farm in that county July 26, 1878. Attended the district school, graduated from Central college at Pella, Iowa, in 1902, and from the law department of the University of Chicago in 1905. Engaged in the general practice of law at Knoxville. He is president of the board of education of the independent school district of Knoxville, and a member of the Masonic lodge. Married Pearl Eastburn July 31, 1907, and has four children. Republican in politics. Elected to the general assembly in 1924 and reelected in 1926.

RAYMOND JOHNSON.—Representative from Keokuk county, was born in Richland, Keokuk county, Iowa, May 20, 1875. Attended school in Richland, graduated from the Richland high school and entered Cornell college in 1892, studying civil engineering. He then went to Iowa State College at Ames, where he graduated in the veterinary department in 1895. Married Kathryn M. Conner of Savannah, Mo., March 25, 1901. They have two children, Marie C. and Raymond O. He practiced the veterinary profession until Aug. 1, 1899, when he was appointed veterinary inspector for the bureau of animal industry, U. S. department of agriculture. In December, 1912, he gave this up and returned to the practice of veterinary medicine, also entering the farming and live stock business at Richland. Has been active in political matters, is a member of farm organizations, the Methodist church, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks and Royal Arch and Scottish Rite Masonry. A republican in politics.

J. P. KENNEDY.—Representative from Lee county, was born in Keokuk, Iowa, and came with his parents to Montrose, Iowa, when six weeks of age, and has resided there ever since. Never held any political office except president of the board of education. His father came from County Mayo, Ireland, and his mother the city of Dublin. Educated in the Montrose high school, and the law department of the State University at Iowa City. Is married and has three daughters. Member of Masonic, Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias and Woodman fraternities. Republican in politics.

WM. S. KENNEDY.—Representative from Lee county, was born on a farm in that county May 16, 1879. Educated in the rural schools. Served in the Spanish-American war with the Fourteenth U. S. Infantry, being among the first troops sent to the Philippines. Took part in numerous battles and skirmishes, being wounded in a battle near Malate February 5, 1899. After being discharged worked in the mines through the western states until 1908, returning to Iowa at that time and engaging in farming in Lee county. Mar-

ried Julia T. Sullivan at Butte, Montana, February 28, 1905, who died on October 19, 1915. Married October 3, 1917, at Altoona, Iowa, to Emily Kennedy. Has four children, two boys and two girls. A member of the Belmont lodge, No. 541, A. F. & A. M. of Hillsboro, Iowa. Elected to the house of representatives in 1924. Reelected in 1926. Republican in politics.

JOHN W. KENT.—Representative from Lucas county. Born in Cook county, Illinois, March 9, 1867. Moved to Lucas county, Iowa, with his parents in 1869, where he has since resided. Educated in the public schools. A farmer, stock raiser and pure bred Hereford breeder. Owns three hundred and seventy acres of land. Republican in politics. Member of the Masonic fraternity; has been trustee of Jackson township and school treasurer for a number of years; was member of board of supervisors six years. Elected representative in 1924, and reelected in 1926.

J. A. KING.—Representative from Clay county, was born in Clay county, Iowa, April 13, 1876. Moved with his parents to the farm on which he now lives, when about three years old. Received his early education in the common schools and afterward attended Nora Springs seminary where he graduated in 1898. Taught in the country schools of Clay county three years. Was married to Effie A. Anderson, August 28, 1902. Has two children, James Russel, born August 23, 1903, and Julia Leone, born October 21, 1909. Has been actively engaged in farming since 1901 and was president of the Clay county farm bureau three years. Member of the Odd Fellows and Masonic lodges. Elected to the legislature in November, 1922, reelected in 1924 and 1926. A republican in politics.

JOHN F. KLINE.—Representative from Davis county, was born in Wapello county, March 15, 1873. He attended the country schools and the Southern Iowa Normal at Bloomfield and Highland Park college at Des Moines. He taught in the country schools in Wapello and Davis counties and spent the summer seasons farming. He located in Davis county in the spring of 1896. He was married to Miss Susie Darnielle of Fabius township, Davis county, on September 4, 1901, and soon afterward moved to Bloomfield, where he has since made his home except for a portion of the year 1910, when he lived at Newton, Iowa, and was owner and publisher of the Newton Herald. On June 2, 1908, was united in marriage with Miss Hazel Irene Wood of Mason City, Iowa. Elected in 1918 mayor of Clear Lake and served two terms. Past master Masonic lodge, past president of the Rotary club, past chancellor commandery of Knights of Pythias, past president of the Iowa Retail Hardware Association, member of the consistory, Knights Templar and Shrine (Za-Ga-Zig). Republican in politics.

THEODORE KROUSE.—Representative from Wayne county, born in Allerton, Iowa, June 8, 1881. Has resided near Allerton all his life. Educated in the public school of Corydon, Iowa. Engaged in farming. Was married in 1904 to Hallie Logan of Allerton. They have five children, three girls, Garnet, Frances and Jessie, and two boys, Theodore and Burl. Has been active in community affairs, having been county and township president of the farm bureau. He is a Mason. A democrat in politics. Elected representative in 1926.

E. P. LAUGHLIN.—Representative from Fremont county, was born May 10, 1881, on the farm he now owns where his father first broke the prairie. Completed Imogene public school and the Christian Brothers college in St. Joseph, Missouri. Taught school in Fremont county in 1900, 1901 and 1902. Was married April 20, 1909, to Theresa O'Brien. They have three children, Matthew, Lucille and Louis. Farmer and stock raiser. Started raising pure bred polled Shorthorn cattle in 1908 and has improved and enlarged the herd. In politics a democrat.

E. M. LICHTY.—Representative from Black Hawk county, was born in Orange township, Black Hawk county, Iowa, February 2, 1867. When he was six months old his parents moved on the farm where he has lived continuously ever since, and which he now owns. He received his education in the rural schools and business college at Waterloo; married in 1889 to Emma Miller of Summerset county, Pennsylvania. To this union were born seven children, one of whom died in infancy. He has made farming his life work, always raising and feeding a large number of hogs, besides dairying and cattle feeding. After being elected to the fortieth general assembly he resigned as president of the consolidated school board, secretary and treasurer of the telephone company (which office he held for twenty years), township trustee, and chairman of township farm bureau. They have seven children, Esther Bell, Freda, Gladys, Russell, Alice, Carroll Hope and Arthur. They lost one son, Kenneth. Member of the Baptist church. A republican in politics.

MARION R. McCAULLEY.—Representative from Calhoun county, was born in Calhoun county, June 4, 1894, son of F. M. and Margaret Barr McCauley. Attended and graduated from the rural schools and city schools of Lake City, Iowa. Attended Waterloo Business college, State University of Iowa, State University of Kentucky, and graduated LL.B. in 1915. In law partnership with Honorable John W. Jacobs, Lake City, since graduation. Married in 1915 to Blanche Hinton, Lake City, Iowa. Have one child, Marion R., Jr. Enlisted in regular army. World War; later commissioned as second lieutenant; holds rank of captain of infantry. Member of Masonic orders, including Shrine; Alpha Delta Sigma and

Delta Chi fraternities. Member American Legion; member school board, independent school district, Lake City. Baptist in religion. County attorney of Calhoun county two terms. Elected representative in 1924. Re-elected in 1926. Republican in politics.

AZEL H. MCILRATH.—Representative from Poweshiek county, born near Hartwick, Iowa, March 3, 1897, son of J. L. and Lizzie A. McIlrath. Graduated from Grinnell high school in 1913, and from Iowa state college in 1919. Voluntarily enlisted in army, May 11, 1918. Appointed sergeant, then first sergeant, and was discharged and commissioned lieutenant in field artillery reserve, November 26, 1918. Engaged in auctioneering beginning 1917. Made trip to France in 1919 in charge of shipment of 750 dairy cattle for French government. Associated several years in horse breeding business and in management of cooperative elevator. Married to Gay M. Huston of Grinnell, January 12, 1920. They have two children, Mildred and Paul. Following the deflation he supplemented his sale work becoming editor of the Brooklyn Chronicle, president commercial club and commander American Legion post. J. E. McMILLAN.—Representative from Benton county, was born in Benton county, Iowa, November 16, 1860. Educated in common schools. He married Nora I. Pitts, November 2, 1882, and has five children, Leslie, Lawrence, Nancy, Glen and Wilhelmina. Has taken an active part in county and community affairs for many years. Was member of board of directors of Benton county, chairman of the farm bureau most of the time since organized and for two years has served as vice president. Has been one of the leading members of the Prairie Creek Church of Christ for a good many years and is at present chairman of the board. A republican.

THEODORE MARTIN.—Representative from Jackson county. Born at Bellevue, Iowa, May 7, 1882. Farmer, breeder pedigreed Shorthorn cattle, auctioneer. Married Laura Weis at Bellevue, September 3, 1913. Has four children, one boy and three girls. Mason, member of the consistory. Served four terms as mayor. Member forty-first and forty-second legislative assemblies. Republican in politics.

HOWARD A. MATHEWS.—Representative from Des Moines county, was born on a farm September 27, 1866. He attended district school and was graduated from the Danville, Iowa, high school in 1887. He was married to Miss Emma A. Gugeler October 29, 1896. Four children were born to them, Alvin, who is now married and resides in Mountain Lakes, New Jersey, and George, Grace and Lorin at home. Taught school for twelve years in the fall and winter, working on a farm during the spring and summer. In 1899 he was elected county superintendent of schools and moved to Burlington. This office he held for nine years. He was then elected principal of the Washington school, Burlington. Was unanimously reelected the following year but gave up school work and moved to the farm in the spring of 1910, which is now his home. He was elected state representative in 1922, 1924 and 1926. Elected speaker pro tempore of the forty-second general assembly. He is a member of the First Congregational church at Danville. A republican in politics.

GLENMORE MAXFIELD.—Representative from Marshall county, born in De Kalb county, Illinois. Early education in Sycamore, Illinois, public schools; later education received at Leander Clark college and Northwestern university. Came to Marshall county in 1899. Married Grace Elliott of Marshalltown in 1905. Elected to the legislature in 1924 on the republican ticket and "pay as you go" platform. Reelected in 1926. Been active in farm bureau work. Breeder of Aberdeen Angus cattle. Of Scotch lineage and a Methodist.

DAVID HARDMAN MILLER.—Representative from Dallas county, was born October 19, 1865, at Des Moines, Iowa. At the age of seven years he moved to Adair county. Was a graduate of the Menlo high school. Spent five years teaching and saving money for college. In 1891 he entered the law department of Drake University and graduated in 1894. Commenced the practice of law at Adel, Iowa. Elected county attorney in 1903, serving three terms. Was twice married. On June 3, 1897, was united in marriage to Laura Simcoke. To this union were born two children, Beatrice and Robert. June 8, 1910, his wife passed away. On July 18, 1926, he was married to Laura E. Cousins, who survives him. He was elected state representative on the republican ticket November 2, 1926, and was serving in that capacity at the time of his death, which occurred at the Savery Hotel, Des Moines, January 20, 1927.

GEO. E. MILLER.—Representative from Shelby county, was born November 6, 1876, in the same county which he represents in the legislature. Attended the district school and completed the high school course at Harlan, Iowa. He taught school five years in earlier life; has held various offices of trust in his township and county, acting as president of school board, assessor and county supervisor for nine years. He was elected representative in 1922, serving during the fortieth, fortieth extra, the forty-first and forty-second general assemblies. Was married in 1903 to Della Ramsey of Portsmouth, Iowa. They have three daughters. Mr. Miller has been engaged in active farming ever since married. Is a member of the Masonic order and is a Shriner. A democrat in politics.

LFE NAGLE.—Representative from Johnson county, was born at Milton, Iowa, June 14, 1870. Was educated in the public schools of Milton. Served in the twenty-ninth general assembly, representing Van Buren county. Married to Elizabeth Bell in 1892 and has four children. Is at present engaged in the lumber business at Iowa City. He is a member of the Consistory and Shrine "Kaaba" Temple, and of the Methodist church. A republican in politics.

C. H. NELSON.—Representative from Hancock county, was born December 12, 1859, in Denmark. He immigrated to the United States in the year 1871. He lived on a farm near Clear Lake, Iowa, for a period of approximately fifteen years. The following are some of the offices which he has held and still holds: He has been president of the Farmers Mutual Insurance Association for a period of about thirty years. He was one of the organizers of the Farmers Elevator of Garner, Iowa, and held office continually in this association for twenty-one years. He has been holding office in the Farmers State Grain Dealers Association for fourteen years. At present he is vice president of the Farmers Elevator Insurance Association of Iowa. He was president for three years of the Farmers National Bank of Garner, and has served on the board of supervisors of Hancock county. He was assessor for two terms and also president of the educational board of Concord township for the same period of time, and vice president of the farm bureau of Hancock county. He followed the occupation of farming up to the year 1926, when he retired and moved to Garner.

C. G. OLIVER.—Representative from Monona county, was born in Monona county in 1863. Received his education in the common schools; Iowa City academy, State University of Iowa and the Cornell university at Ithaca, N. Y. He was married in 1891 to Miss Jennie Davis of Blencoe, Iowa. In 1906 he assisted in organizing the Farmers Savings bank at Holland, Iowa, and is now cashier of this bank. On December 19, 1906, he was married to Miss Sophia Frerichs of Holland. He is a member of the Baptist church, also the Knights of Pythias. Elected representative in 1920, 1922 and in 1926. A republican in politics.

G. W. PATTERSON.—Representative from Kossuth county, born at Burt, Iowa, September 4, 1887, of Scotch parentage. Graduate of Burt high school. Graduated from Iowa State College, animal husbandry department, 1909. Married December 28, 1914, to Miss Eva M. Stensrud, Lake Mills, Iowa. Has two children, Donald W. Patterson and Virginia Mae Patterson. Business, farming and stock feeding. Elected to house of representatives 1922. Re-elected in 1924 and in 1926. A republican.

H. C. PATTISON.—Representative from Jefferson county, was born on a farm near Fairfield, Iowa, March 7, 1868. Farmer. Breeder of pedigreed Shorthorn cattle. Married Eliza Stout March 17, 1896, who died August 13, 1924. Had three children, Earl, deceased, and Paul and Edna still living. Served on the county board of supervisors, was secretary of the school board, township clerk and trustee, and director and treasurer of the Farmers Insurance Company. Member of the Presbyterian church and Odd Fellows lodge. A republican in politics.

RALPH C. PRICHARD.—Representative from Woodbury county. Was born in Monona county, Iowa, and moved to Woodbury county with his parents a year later, in which county he has since resided. Was graduated from Morningside college in 1915 and from the law school of the University of Chicago in the year 1921. Spent two years in the military service during the World War, one year of which was overseas. Was commissioned first lieutenant in the infantry. Is a member of the American Legion and Masonic lodge. Has practiced law in Sioux City, Iowa, since 1921. A republican in politics.

L. T. QUIRK.—Representative from Sac county, was born in Clinton county, Iowa, January 20, 1874, and moved with his parents, in the spring of 1876 to Sac county where he has since resided. He was educated in the rural schools, Sac institute and Morningside college. He taught school for three years, then became actively engaged in farming in which he has remained ever since. Z. S. RATLIFF.—Representative from Henry county, was born November 25, 1862, in the county he now represents in the legislature. He received his education in the rural schools and Whittier college. Attended the district school and later the Rock Rapids high school. He then entered Northwestern Union college at Le Mars, Iowa, graduating after two years from their commercial course. D. FULTON RICE.—Representative from Appanoose county, was born on a farm in that county September 13, 1889, son of J. F. and Sarah E. (Hibbs) Rice. For short periods attended the state normal at Kirksville, Mo., and Drake University. Taught school five years, the last being superintendent at Dike, Iowa. Read law in the office of H. E. Valentine. Attended law school at the University of Michigan and was admitted to the bar in June, 1917. Was nominated for congress by the democratic party in 1918. Enlisted in the judge advocate general's department of the army and served in the Seventeenth division during the World War. Occupation, farming. Was married October 8, 1921, to Miss Gladys Stubblefield, Ipava, Illinois. Has one son, Paul Oliver. Elected representative in 1922, 1924 and 1926. Republican in politics.

R. L. RUTLEDGE.—Representative from Webster county, was born on a farm near Fort Dodge, Iowa, in 1888. Was graduated from Fort Dodge high school in 1908; won a scholarship to Iowa State college in the state judging contest at the Iowa state fair in 1908. Entered Ames in fall of 1908, called home by sickness of father in the spring of 1912, and has operated the farm near Fort Dodge ever since, with the exception of seven months in the aviation service in 1918. Interested in farm bureau work and agricultural activities before and since the war. Member of the international committee on agriculture of Kiwanis International. Elected representative from Webster county November 2, 1926.

JOHN RYDER.—Junior member of the house of representatives from Dubuque county, was born and reared in Dubuque, Iowa. He was educated in the parochial schools. He graduated from the Bayless Business college. For twenty-five years he was the junior member of the Ryder Brothers' wholesale grocery firm. In 1919, he organized the Ryder Realty Co., and served as vice president until January, 1925, when he retired from the firm. For the past fifteen years he has served as State Chief Ranger of the Catholic Order of Foresters of Iowa. In March, 1925, he was elected member of the board of education of the city of Dubuque, and was appointed chairman of the finance committee. He is, and has been for a number of years, a director of the Hotel Julien Dubuque. He was married in November, 1917, to Miss Anna L. Killeen, who died in May, 1923. He was elected to the general assembly November, 1924, and reelected in 1926. A democrat in politics.

Graduate public schools of Agency, Iowa, of Iowa Wesleyan college in 1914, of law school of State University of Iowa in 1920. Engaged in the practice of law in Ottumwa, Iowa, since 1920. Married in 1915 to Agnes Shank of Agency, Iowa. Has four children.

GEORGE W. SMITH.—Representative from O'Brien county, was born in Richland county, Ohio, January 24, 1868, coming to Benton county, Iowa, in 1884. REPUBLICAN PARTY STATE PLATFORM

Adopted at the state convention held in Des Moines, July 21, 1926.

NATIONAL—We, the republicans of the state of Iowa, in convention assembled, hereby reaffirm our faith in the republican party. We commend and congratulate the national administration under President Coolidge for its wise and efficient conduct of the government in accordance with republican principles; for its faithfulness to the details of administrative government; for its exaltation of efficiency in government; and for its economy in expenditures.

Its debt reductions have been sound in policy, and its tax reductions have relieved the people of many of the burdens that were imposed by war and we urge a continuance of the policy so successfully inaugurated.

We rejoice in the fact that national debts have in six years of republican administration been reduced nearly one-fifth, and per capita taxes on national account from a maximum of \$54.14 to a minimum of \$27.28. These debt and tax reducing policies of the national republican administration have been so helpful in business and so wholesome in morals that we want not only to commend them, but to hold them up as examples for state and local administrators.

AGRICULTURE—To our senators and representatives in congress and to the governor and other spokesmen of our state there is due and is here expressed our profound appreciation for their course in upholding and furthering by all means in their power the principle of stabilization of agriculture.

Such stabilization of agriculture, moreover, is justly to be regarded as not merely for regional advantage, but as of national or even larger concern. In practice it has appeared that excesses and shortages in the seasonal production of the great agricultural staples have been the occasion respectively for falls and advances in the market prices of such staples quite out of proportion to the actual variations in the crops. As a consequence, it has been quite too often true that the total market value of a small crop is greater than the total market value of a large crop of the same commodity.

The republican party of Iowa is united in its demand that the republican policy of economic equality of agriculture with other industries shall be carried into effect by the enactment of legislation which will permit the establishment of an American price level for agricultural products above the world price level, just as the protective tariff accomplishes that result for manufactured products. We rejoice in the prosperity of industrial America and insist upon the justness of our demand that equal opportunity for prosperity shall be extended to agriculture.

TARIFF ON BUTTER—We want to compliment the administration for its recent action in extending the tariff on butter from eight cents to twelve cents per pound upon a proper showing of costs of production and we are opposed to the proposed reduction in the duties on sugar, preferring the further development of sugar from American raw products to increasing the importation of them to the detriment of American producers and manufacturers. We urge upon congress the removal of all such restrictions as hamper the use of any American sugars in any way in the industrial processes.

REGISTRATION—We believe that the safety and welfare of government consists in having as large a participation by voters as possible. The present law in reference to registration of voters in cities limits the time of registration to three designated days. We recommend to the legislature of Iowa that a change be made in the law referring to registration of voters providing means by which voters may register in one of the public county offices on any day during the year at their convenience under such safeguards as the legislature may deem proper.

LABOR—We indorse the historic policy of the republican party in securing protection for labor. Under it working men receive salaries which enable them to enjoy the American standard of living which is the promise of our American government.

CHILD WELFARE—Believing that the welfare of children is a profound responsibility of the state, we commend the action of the Forty-first general assembly in supporting by legislation the recommendations of the Iowa child welfare commission, thereby raising Iowa to a high rank in her care of her children.

DEMOCRATIC PARTY STATE PLATFORM

Adopted at the state convention held in Des Moines, July 28, 1926.

The democracy of Iowa, assembling in state convention at a time when the economic life and industry of our state is wrecked through the national policy of the republican party, governed as it now is by New England domination, point in contrast and with pride to the industrial condition prevailing in our state and in the agricultural west and south under the Wilson administration.

Under a democratic administration and under its low tariff policy our nation prospered and grew in wealth in a degree never before known in its history.

Manufacturing expanded till its productive power far outran the wants of the American consumer, and under a low tariff policy our foreign trade outstripped the foreign trade of any nation of the earth.

Our national wealth leaped from one hundred forty-three billions to three hundred fifty billions. Our foreign industrial obligations were paid; a merchant marine was built equal to the requirements of our own commerce; in addition, we became the creditor to all nations of the earth.

MEMORIAL—We, the democracy of Iowa in state convention assembled, pause in reverence to the memory of the great "Peerless Leader," the champion of the common people, and defender of the tolling masses, William Jennings Bryan, who departed this life since we last convened.

AGRICULTURE—Appreciating the importance of agriculture and the fact that it is fundamental to all business in the nation, we feel that an agricultural policy for the country and agricultural relief legislation is one of the biggest problems before the country and of vital importance to every interest.

The democracy of Iowa denounces the economic policy of the Coolidge administration, and its lack of sympathy for agriculture, as an attempt to industrialize our country at the expense of agriculture, and as an attempt to forever fasten upon the American people an artificial standard of values and an increased cost of living; and as an attempt to create a high domestic price for products of domestic factories, while the same articles are sold abroad in foreign trade at a price below that paid by the American farmer.

Our last national convention favored the creation of a national export corporation, a corporation designed to handle the surplus agricultural products that this surplus might not depress the domestic price to a point which would mean ruin to our American farmers. This plank the democracy of Iowa reaffirms.

So long as tariff legislation, either for protection or for revenue, raises the domestic prices on manufactured goods over world prices, agricultural prices should in the same degree be entitled to legislation, giving our home markets to our farmers on the basis of an equal increase over world prices.

We favor an export corporation to handle our agricultural surplus in such a way as will place agricultural prices in the domestic market on a remunerative basis to the farmer, giving him a fair profit that he may enjoy the American standard of living, and we pledge ourselves, if given the opportunity, to introduce in congress and support legislation to relieve the farmer from the intolerable conditions under which he conducts his operations, legislation designed to put agriculture upon a business basis which will enable him to meet his conditions as other business men meet theirs.

We pledge our support to an agricultural policy which will insure to the agriculture of every section of the United States conditions which will guard against the agriculture of this country going down to peasantry as has the agriculture in every nation older than ours.

ROADS—We favor an aggressive road improvement program, same to be paid largely by those who use them through auto licenses, gasoline tax and federal aid.

EDUCATION—We are proud of our educational progress, especially during the last quarter of a century, and the democratic party stands ready to encourage all our schools complying with state requirements.

LABOR—The democratic party has always been the friend of labor and believes in collective bargaining. We point with pride to the passage of the Clayton act by a democratic congress and signed by a democratic president, which presents the first recognition by congress that labor is not a commodity, that the life, energy and aspirations of human beings do not come within the same classification as property and wealth. Never before or since has it attained the recognition that it received during the administration of Woodrow Wilson. For the first time it was given a place at the council table of the president.

More legislation favorable to labor was placed on the statute books during that period than any like period in the history of the nation. We, the democratic party of Iowa, condemn the practice of exploiting prison labor in the penal institutions of Iowa, as prison labor contractors are reaping profits from these unfortunate victims. We believe that the state use plan would be the best method for Iowa to employ prison labor, as under this method the state of Iowa would be benefited rather than the exploiting prison labor contractors, and we pledge ourselves to support laws that would promote the enforcement of the state use plan in the penal institutions of Iowa.

CONSERVATION—We favor the federal government taking charge of such Iowa lakes as the United States now owns and restoring and developing them for the use and benefit of the people.

We favor stringent and strict enforcement of the laws against stream and lake pollution.

We favor the acquirement and development of state parks for the use and benefit of the people of the state.

TAXATION—Whereas, the taxpayers of Iowa paid the enormous sum of 155 millions of dollars in taxes in 1925, we condemn in no unmeasured term the extravagance of the republican administration.

NONPARTISAN JUDICIARY—We favor a nonpartisan judiciary.

WOMEN OFFICE HOLDERS—Under our constitution, women may not hold state office in Iowa. We favor immediate legislation which will give to women the same privilege as that enjoyed by male citizens.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS—We deplore the burden of taxation now existent; and we favor the consolidation of boards, bureaus and commissions and the doing away with useless ones, and the economic administration of public expenditures so that expenses of public affairs may be reduced.

MINOR PARTIES IN 1926

THE COMMONWEALTH LAND PARTY

The commonwealth land party, formerly the single tax party, placed a ticket in the field for the election November 2, 1926, by filing a petition and list of candidates with the secretary of state. The platform adopted at the national convention held in New York City, 1924, reaffirmed "the principles enunciated in the platform of the single tax party at their national convention at Chicago in 1920." This platform, among other things, "declares that the earth is the birthright of all mankind and that all have an equal and unalienable right to its use; that man's need for land is expressed by the rent of land; that land rent results from the presence and productive activities of the people; that it arises as the result of natural law and that it therefore should be taken to defray public expenses." The platform further says: "We therefore demand that the full rent of land be collected by the government in place of all direct and indirect taxes and that all buildings, machinery, implements and improvements on land, all industry, thrift and enterprise, all wages, salaries, incomes and every product of labor or intellect be entirely exempt from taxation."

Reckler, Newton; for attorney general, John Hummel, Newton; for secretary of agriculture, Andrew Engle, Newton.

PRIMARY ELECTION

The term "Primary Election" is construed under the law to apply to an election by the members of various political parties for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for public office, for selecting delegates to conventions, and for the selection of party committeemen. The law provides that the primary election shall consist of an election by all political parties and shall be held at the various voting places of the several precincts on the first Monday in June, in each even numbered year, for the nomination of candidates for such offices as are to be filled at the general election in November next ensuing (except candidates for judge of the supreme court and district court, which shall be by a judicial convention), and for senator in the congress of the United States, in the years in which senators are to be elected.

The board of supervisors of each county (acting as a county board of canvassers) meets on the second Tuesday following the primary election in June and canvasses the votes cast at the several precincts and makes an abstract thereof. A separate abstract of the canvass duly certified is then forwarded to the secretary of state for the following offices:

United States senator.

All state officers.

Representatives in congress.

Senators and representatives in the general assembly.

On the second Monday after the June primary election, the executive council meets as a state canvassing board, and opens and canvasses the abstract returns received from each county in the state. Said board makes abstracts of its canvass, showing the number of ballots cast for each person voted for, and the person having the highest number of votes in the state or district (provided he receives 35 per cent of all the votes cast by the party for such office), is duly and legally nominated and is entitled to have his name printed on the official ballot for the general election.

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTIONS FROM 1789 TO 1924

AGGREGATE POPULAR VOTE AND ELECTORAL VOTE FOR CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT AT EACH ELECTION

The record of any popular vote for electors prior to 1824 is so meager and imperfect that a compilation would be useless. In most of the states, for more than a quarter century following the establishment of the government, the state legislatures "appointed" the presidential electors, and the people, therefore, voted only indirectly for them, their choice being expressed by their votes for members of the legislature. In this tabulation only the aggregate electoral votes for candidates for president and vice president in the first nine quadrennial elections appear.

*The candidates starred were elected. (a) The first Republican party is claimed by the present Democratic party as its progenitor. (e) Eleven southern states, being within the belligerent territory, did not vote. (f) Three southern states disfranchised. (g) Horace Greeley died after election, and Democratic electors scattered their votes. ELECTORAL VOTES.

1789. Previous to 1804 each elector voted for two candidates for president. The one who received the largest number of votes was declared president, and the one who received the next largest number of votes was declared vice president. The electoral votes for the first president of the United States were: George Washington, 69; John Adams, of Massachusetts, 34; John Jay, of New York, 9; R. H. Harrison, of Maryland, 6; John Rutledge, of South Carolina, 6; John Hancock, of Massachusetts, 4; George Clinton, of New York, 3; Samuel Huntington, of Connecticut, 2; John Milton, of Georgia, 2; James Armstrong, of Georgia; Benjamin Lincoln, of Massachusetts, and Edward Telfair, of Georgia, 1 vote each. Vacancies (votes not cast), 4. George Washington was chosen president and John Adams vice president.

1792. George Washington, Federalist, received 132 votes; John Adams, Federalist, 77; George Clinton, of New York, Republican (a) 50; Thomas Jefferson, of Virginia, Republican, 4; Aaron Burr, of New York, Republican, 1 vote. Vacancies, 3. George Washington was chosen president and John Adams vice president.

1796. John Adams, Federalist, 71; Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 68; Thomas Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 59; Aaron Burr, of New York, Republican, 30; Samuel Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 15; Oliver Ellsworth, of Connecticut, Independent, 11; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 7; John Jay, of New York, Federalist, 5; James Iredell,

of North Carolina, Federalist, 3; George Washington, of Virginia, John Henry, of Maryland, and S. Johnson, of North Carolina, all Federalists, 2 votes each; Charles Cotesworth Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 1 vote. John Adams was chosen president and Thomas Jefferson vice president.

1800. Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 73; Aaron Burr, Republican, 73; John Adams, Federalist, 65; Charles C. Pinckney, Federalist, 64; John Jay, Federalist, 1 vote. There being a tie vote for Jefferson and Burr, the choice devolved upon the house of representatives. Jefferson received the votes of ten states, which being the largest vote cast for a candidate, elected him president. Burr received the votes of four states, which being the next largest vote, elected him vice president. There were 2 blank votes.

1804. The constitution of the United States having been amended, the electors at this election voted for a president and a vice president, instead of for two candidates for President. The result was as follows: For president, Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 162; Charles C. Pinckney, Federalist, 14. For vice president, George Clinton, Republican, 162; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 14. Jefferson was chosen president and Clinton vice president.

1808. For president, James Madison, of Virginia, Republican, 122; Charles C. Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 47; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 6. For vice president, George Clinton, Republican, 113; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 47; John Langdon, of New Hampshire, 9; James Madison, 3; James Monroe, 3. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen president and Clinton vice president.

1812. For president, James Madison, Republican, 128; De Witt Clinton, of New York, Republican, 89. For vice president, Elbridge Gerry, of Massachusetts, 131; Jared Ingersoll, of Pennsylvania, Federalist, 86. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen president and Gerry vice president.

1816. For president, James Monroe, of Virginia, Republican, 183; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 34. For vice president, Daniel D. Tompkins, of New York, Republican, 183; John Eager Howard, of Maryland, Federalist, 22; James Ross, of Pennsylvania, 5; John Marshall, of Virginia, 4; Robert G. Harper, of Maryland, 3. Vacancies, 4. Monroe was chosen president and Tompkins vice president.

1820. For president, James Monroe, of Virginia, Republican, 231; John Q. Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 1. For vice president, Daniel D. The forty-second general assembly passed a law requiring all persons engaged in beauty parlor work technically called cosmeticians to be licensed. INTRODUCTION

It is here undertaken to present in orderly fashion the Constitution of the United States as the same is now actually in force. To this end, amendments are inserted in the original text where they seem most fitly to belong; parts of the original text that have plainly lost their relevancy to current affairs are taken out of the text and are set out only in notes; ineffective parts of the amendments are similarly treated; in the few places where an "and" or a "but" or some other verbal adjustment is needed to hitch parts in new relations appropriately together, the same is interpolated in italics; and in general, the endeavor is made to have the Constitution—without actual addition or subtraction—read logically and connectedly, for the incomparable plan of government which it is.

For deserving as was the original instrument of all encomium and all exaltation as the superlative of all political originations, it is nevertheless true that much of what is best and greatest in the Constitution now is the product of later growth and ought, in common justice and for the good of the universal understanding, to be regarded, treated and comprehended as integral in the Constitution and not as appendant thereto; and similarly it is to the service of the same ends, that matters which, in fact, no longer belong to the Constitution and are not now a part of its law should be disregarded in its text.

So it is in reverence for the Constitution and for the glorification thereof that the 29 various and vital additions to the fundamental law, as contained in the 19 amendments, are distributed through their proper places, that the 18 pieces of obsolete matter are stricken from the general text, and that sundry other, but little things, are done. All such things are, that the Constitution may appear in full symmetry and beauty, with all of its completeness and with none of its one-time blemishes; and in such spirit is this work to be understood as having been done.

PROVISIONS ACTUALLY IN FORCE
 (With Annotations)

PREAMBLE—ORIGIN AND PURPOSES OF CONSTITUTION

(1) We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America. Preamble.

ARTICLE I—THE LEGISLATIVE FUNCTION
 VESTED IN CONGRESS

(2) All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives. I: 1.

THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

(3) The House of Representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several States; and the electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislature. I: 2, 1.

(4) No person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen. I: 2, 2.

(5) Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for President and Vice President of the United States, Representatives in Congress, the executive and judicial officers of a State, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such State.* Am. 14, 2.

Par. 5. This 2d section of the 14th amendment, adopted in 1868, supplanted the original first portion of clause 3, section 2, article I, as follows:
 "Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons."

(6) The actual enumeration shall be made^a within every^b term of ten years, in such manner as *the Congress of the United States*^c shall by law direct. The number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty thousand, but each State shall have at least one Representative^d. I:2,3.

(7) When vacancies happen in the representation from any State, the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies. I:2, 4.

(8) The House of Representatives shall choose their Speaker and other officers and shall have the sole power of impeachment. I:2, 5.

THE SENATE

(9) The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislatures.* Am. 17, 1.

(10) "They shall be divided as equally as may be into three classes^b so that one-third may be chosen every second year. I:3, 2.

(11) When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies; provided, that the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.* Am. 17, 2.

(12) No person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen. I:3, 3.

(13) The Vice President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall have no vote, unless they be equally divided. I:3, 4.

(14) The Senate shall choose their other officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the absence of the Vice President, or when he shall exercise the office of President of the United States. I:3, 5.

(15) The Senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried, the Chief Justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present. I:3, 6.

(16) Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law. I:3, 7.

Par. 6. Corrections here due to lapse of time are:

a. Eliminating as obsolete, "within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and";

b. Eliminating similarly, "subsequent";

c. Substituting "the Congress of the United States" for its pronoun, "they";

d. Eliminating as obsolete, "and, until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three."

Par. 9. This provision for the popular election of Senators supplanted in 1913 the original provision for Senators chosen by the legislatures which provision was:

"Sec. 3. (1) The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the legislature thereof for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote."

Par. 10. Matters eliminated here pertained to the original classification of Senators and became irrelevant respectively in 1789 and 1795, to wit:

a. "(2) Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election."

b. "The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year, of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year, and of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year."

Par. 11. This provision supplanted in 1913 the original one for the filling of senatorial vacancies. The original provision was the concluding portion of clause 2 and was:

"and if vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, during the recess of the legislature of any State the executive thereof may make temporary appointments until the next meeting of the legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies."

The third and final section of the 17th amendment protected the senators in office at the time of the adoption of the amendment in 1913; but it became obsolete when the terms of the last of such Senators expired in 1919. This third section was:

"Sec. 3. This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution."

THE CONGRESSIONAL BODY

(17) The times, places and manner of holding elections for Senators and Representatives shall be prescribed in each State by the legislature thereof, but the Congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations.* I:4, 1.

(18) The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different day. I:4, 2.

(19) Each House shall be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each House may provide. I:5, 1.

(20) Each House may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member. I:5, 2.

(21) Each House shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either House on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal. I:5, 3.

(22) Neither House, during the session of Congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two Houses shall be sitting. I:5, 4.

(23) The Senators and Representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall in all cases, except treason, felony and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the sessions of their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either House they shall not be questioned in any other place. I:6, 1.

(24) No Senator or Representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased, during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either House during his continuance in office. I:6, 2.

THE PROCESS OF LEGISLATION

(25) All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives, but the Senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills. I:7, 1.

(26) Every bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall, before it become a law, be presented to the President of the United States; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to that House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such reconsideration two-thirds of that House shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that House, it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both Houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each House, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the President within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their adjournment prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law. I:7, 2.

(27) Every order, resolution or vote to which the concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being disap-

Par. 17. The final phrase of this clause also became inapplicable when the amendment for the election of Senators by the people, instead of by legislatures, was adopted in 1913, to wit: "except as to the places of choosing Senators."

proved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill. I:7, 3.

THE POWERS OF CONGRESS

- (28) The Congress shall have power: I:8, general.
- (29) To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debts and provide for the common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States; I:8, 1.
- (30) To borrow money on the credit of the United States; I:8, 2.
- (31) To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian tribes; I:8, 3.
- (32) To establish a uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States; I:8, 4.
- (33) To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures; I:8, 5.
- (34) To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States; I:8, 6.
- (35) To establish post offices and post roads; I:8, 7.
- (36) To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times to authors and inventors the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries; I:8, 8.
- (37) To constitute tribunals inferior to the Supreme Court; I:8, 9.
- (38) To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses against the law of nations; I:8, 10.
- (39) To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water; I:8, 11.
- (40) To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years; I:8, 12.
- (41) To provide and maintain a navy; I:8, 13.
- (42) To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces; I:8, 14.
- (43) To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the Union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions; I:8, 15.
- (44) To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States; reserving to the States, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress; I:8, 16.
- (45) To exercise exclusive legislation in all cases whatsoever, over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular States and the acceptance of Congress, become the seat of the Government of the United States, and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the State in which the same shall be, for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards and other needful buildings; and— I:8, 17.
- (46) To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.* I:8, 18.

FEDERAL RESTRICTIONS

(47) Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech

Par. 46. This general enforcement clause of the Constitution was undoubtedly intended to confer upon Congress full authority for carrying into effect all governmental purposes indicated in the Constitution; and so it has been uniformly construed by Chief Justice Marshall and his associates and successors in the Supreme Court. Hence the following little enforcement clauses are regarded here only as superfluous matter, and their proper place appears to be at the end of this note, to wit:

Am. 13, Sec. 2. "Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation."

Am. 14, Sec. 5. "The Congress shall have power to enforce by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article."

Am. 15, Sec. 2. "The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation."

Am. 18, Sec. 2. "Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation."

or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.* Am. 1.

(48) No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.* Am. 3.

(49) The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated; and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.* Am. 4.

(50) The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when, in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it (I:9, 2); nor shall any person be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.* Am. 5.

(51) No bill of attainder or ex post facto law shall be passed. I:9, 3.

(52) No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken (I:9, 4); but the Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.* Am. 16.

(53) No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state. I:9, 5.

(54) No preference shall be given by any regulation of commerce or revenue to the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one State be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another. I:9, 6.

(55) No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law, and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time. I:9, 7.

(56) No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States.* I:9, 8.

INHIBITIONS ON THE STATES

(57) No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States, nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.* Am. 14, 1.

(58) No State shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque or reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility. I:10, 1.

(59) No State shall, without the consent of the Congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts, laid by any State on imports or exports, shall be for the use of the treasury

Par. 47. The general powers of Congress having been enumerated, it seems highly appropriate that the list of "Federal Restrictions" should be headed with this 1st amendment, and thus does the amendment take the place of the original, obsolete and repealed guaranty of the African slave trade, to wit:

"Sec. 9. (1) The migration or importation of such persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person."

Par. 48, 49. The 3d and 4th amendments follow in order and spirit the 1st amendment.

Par. 50. The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus is here recited in its regular order and is followed by the final portion of the 5th amendment. The former portion of this amendment is a judicial limitation and so appears as Par. 82; but the final portion, with its guaranties of life, liberty and property, imposes restrictions upon the Government as a whole and belongs in this subdivision. In separating thus the two portions of the 5th amendment, the words, "shall any person," are brought down from the former portion to the final portion.

Par. 52. The original prohibition against the levy of direct taxes otherwise than in proportion to the census was vitally qualified by the adoption of the 16th amendment, respecting income taxes, in 1913; and the amendment here follows the original prohibition. The conjunction "but" indicates the natural relation of the old and new provisions.

Par. 56 This prohibition of titles of nobility has been followed textually by the rule that federal officeholders should not accept favors from foreign governments without the consent of Congress. This rule however, imposes no limitation upon Congress but is strictly a burden upon officeholders. Accordingly, it is put with other similar burdens as a concluding portion of Par. 101.

Par. 67. This concluding portion of the 1st section of the 14th amendment puts upon the States a limitation corresponding to that which is put upon the Federal Government by the final portion of the 5th amendment in Par. 50 preceding. The former portion of this section is the definition of citizenship appearing as Par. 88.

of the United States; and all such laws shall be subject to the revision and control of the Congress. I:10, 2.

(60) No State shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another State, or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay. I:10, 3.

(61) *But* a well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.* Am. 2.

ARTICLE II—THE EXECUTIVE FUNCTION

CHOOSING A PRESIDENT

(62) The executive power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the Vice President, chosen for the same term, be elected as follows: II:1, 1.

(63) Each State shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress; but no Senator or Representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector. II:1, 2.

(64) The electors shall meet in their respective States, and vote by ballot for President and Vice President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice President; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the Government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate; the President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted.* Am. 12, 1.

(65) The person having the greatest number of votes for President shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three, on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by States, the representation from each State having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the States, and a majority of all the States shall be necessary to a choice. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President, whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President.* Am. 12, 1.

(66) The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice President shall be the Vice President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.* Am. 12, 2.

Par. 61. This 2d amendment is argumentative and its motive not wholly obvious. It recognizes that there is to be a militia, as indicated in Pars. 43 and 44, and it implies that the inhibition in Par. 60 against the keeping of troops by a State in time of peace was not intended to apply to the militia or to the people as incidental thereto. So the conjunction "But" hangs the matters together in what seems to be the proper way.

Pars 64, 65 and 66. These paragraphs constitute what are usually printed as the first and second sections of the 12th amendment. They supplant the original provision for the election of President and Vice President, to wit:

"The electors shall meet in their respective States and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same State with themselves. And they shall make a list of all the persons voted for, and of the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the Government of the United States, directed to the

(67) The Congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes, which day shall be the same throughout the United States. II:1, 3.

(68) No person except a natural born citizen* shall be eligible to the office of President; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years, and been fourteen years a resident within the United States. II:1, 4.

(69) *And* no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice President of the United States.* Am. 12, 3.

(70) In case of the removal of the President from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the Vice President, and the Congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation or inability, both of the President and Vice President, declaring what officer shall then act as President, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed or a President shall be elected. II:1, 5.

(71) The President shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States or any of them. II:1, 6.

(72) Before he enter on the execution of his office, he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of President of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution of the United States." II:1, 7.

POWERS OF THE PRESIDENT

(73) *The President*^a shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed. *He*^b shall commission all the officers of the United States (II:3); *he*^c shall be commander in chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several States when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion in writing of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment. II:2, 1.

(74) He shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the Senate shall appoint ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, judges of the Supreme Court, and all other officers of the United States, whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for and which shall be established by law. But the Congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the President alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments (II:2, 2); *and*^d the President shall have power to

President of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the House of Representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of them for President; and if no person have a majority, then, from the five highest on the list, the said House shall, in like manner, choose the President. But in choosing the President the votes shall be taken by States, the representation for each State having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the States, and a majority of all the States shall be necessary to a choice. In every case, after the choice of the President, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors shall be the Vice President. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the Senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the Vice President." II: 1, 2. (part)

Par. 68. From this paragraph there are eliminated as obsolete the words:

"or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this Constitution."

Par. 69. The framers of the Constitution neglected to specify any qualifications for the Vice President, and the omission was cured with the final clause of the 12th amendment following the provisions as to the election of the Vice President. The clause, however, comes here more logically following the provision of the qualifications for President; and in this latter relation the introductory "But" is naturally changed to "And".

Par. 73, 74, 75, 76. The four paragraphs that pertain to the powers of the President have not been affected by time or amendment, but they are susceptible of greater emphasis and clarity through a few changes in arrangement, as shown. In making such changes the following verbal corrections become necessary or desirable:

- a. "The President" for "he";
- b. "He" for "and";
- c. "he" for "The President";
- d. "and" inserted;
- e. "and" for "he";
- f. "and" omitted.

fill up all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the Senate, by granting commissions which shall expire at the end of their next session. II:2, 3.

(75) He shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers (II:3), and^e shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the Senators present concur.^f II:2, 2.

(76) He shall from time to time give to the Congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both Houses, or either of them; and, in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper. II:3.

THE LIABILITY OF IMPEACHMENT

(77) The President, Vice President, and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors. II:4.

ARTICLE III—THE JUDICIAL FUNCTION

THE SUPREME AND INFERIOR COURTS

(78) The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one Supreme Court, and in such inferior courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior; and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation, which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office. III:1.

THE JUDICIAL POWER

(79) The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity arising under this Constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made, under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more States, between a State and citizens of another State, between citizens of different States, between citizens of the same State claiming lands under grants of different States, and between a State, or the citizens thereof, and foreign states, citizens or subjects. III:2, 1.

(80) *But* the judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another State, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.* Am. 11.

(81) In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a State shall be a party, the Supreme Court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases, before mentioned, the Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under such regulations as the Congress shall make. III:2, 2.

JUDICIAL LIMITATIONS

(82) No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject, for the same offense, to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled, in any criminal case, to be a witness against himself.* Am. 5.

(83) In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right of a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the

Par. 80. The 11th amendment adopted in 1798, made an exception in behalf of the States to the jurisdiction of the Federal courts as originally provided, and the conjunction "But" indicates the relation of the two provisions.

Par. 82. This is the former portion of the 5th amendment, previously referred to in connection with Par. 50, and like the three paragraphs here following (Par. 83, 84, and 85) it puts limitations upon the procedure and practice of the Federal judiciary. Excepting for a part of paragraphs 83, they are all from the early amendments.

Par. 83. The 6th amendment in its assertion of the right of trial by jury goes much farther and is more particular than the original clause 3 of section 2, article III, which it mostly supplants.

crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense (Am. 6); but when *the crime* not committed within any State, the trial shall be at such place or places as the Congress may by law have directed.* III:2, 3.

(84) In suits at common law where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved; and no fact, tried by a jury, shall be otherwise reexamined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.* Am. 7.

(85) Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.* Am. 8.

THE CRIME OF TREASON

(86) Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court. III:3, 1.

(87) The Congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attainted. III:3, 2.

ARTICLE IV—POLITICAL RELATIONS

INDIVIDUAL RIGHTS AND LIABILITIES

(88) All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States, and of the State wherein they reside.* Am. 14, 1.

(89) The citizens of each State shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several States. IV:2, 1.

(90) The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude (Am. 15, 1); nor on account of sex.* Am. 19, 1.

(91) Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States or any place subject to their jurisdiction.* Am. 13, 1.

(92) A person charged in any State with treason, felony or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another State, shall, on demand of the executive authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the State having jurisdiction of the crime. IV:2, 2.

STATES AND TERRITORIES

(93) The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a republican form of government, and shall protect each of them against invasion;

The latter portion, however, of the original clause, pertaining to crimes not committed within any State, is not so supplanted and is therefore regarded as an annex above to the 6th amendment, the words "the crime," for grammatical clearness being brought down from the preceding text. The original provision supplanted is as follows:

"(3) The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury; and such trial shall be held in the State where the said crimes shall have been committed;"

Par. 84, 85. See note to Par. 82.

Par. 88. This definition of citizenship is the introductory first half of the 1st section of the 14th amendment. The other half appears as Par. 57.

Par. 90. The two suffrage amendments excepting their concluding designations of citizens enfranchised, are identical in language, and this language is covered by one statement and the conjunction "nor." The phraseology that would otherwise be duplicated is:

"The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State—"

Each of these suffrage amendments, moreover, had a little enforcement clause, for which no need has ever been apparent and in respect to which notation is made in connection with Par. 46.

Par. 91. This abolition amendment had also a little enforcement clause, to which reference is also made in connection with Par. 46.

This amendment, adopted in 1865, further repealed by implication the original provision for the recovery of fugitive slaves, to wit:

"(3) No person held to service or labor in one State, under the laws thereof, escaping into another shall in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due."

Par. 93, 94, 95, 96. These paragraphs are parts, quite differently arranged, of the original Article IV, and they are here assembled reasonably under their suitable head of "States and Territories."

and, on application of the legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.* IV:4.

(94) Full faith and credit shall be given in each State to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other State. And the Congress may, by general laws, prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.* IV:1.

(95) New States may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new State shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other State, nor any State be formed by the junction of two or more States, or parts of States, without the consent of the legislatures of the States concerned, as well as of the Congress.* IV:3, 1.

(96) The Congress shall have power to dispose of and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States.* IV:3, 2.

POLICE REGULATIONS

(97) The manufacture, sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.* Am. 18, 1.

(98) The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this prohibition by appropriate legislation.* Am. 18, 2.

ARTICLE V—MODES OF AMENDMENT

(99) The Congress, whenever two-thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this Constitution, or, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several States, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of this Constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the Congress; provided* that no State, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the Senate. V.

ARTICLE V—THE FEDERAL SOVEREIGNTY

THE SUPREME LAW

(100) This Constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land;

Par. 96 had a further provision, the application of which was to unoccupied lands within the original territory of the United States. It very soon lost all its effect, if it ever had any. It was as follows:

"and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular State."

Par. 97. The prohibition amendment had originally an introductory phrase that was material from January 16, 1919, to the same date in 1920, but has since been obsolete, to wit:

"After one year from the ratification of this article—"

Par. 98. This clause differs from the other little enforcement clauses in that it confers power upon the States as well as upon Congress, and observations, therefore, in connection with Par. 46 do not here apply.

In this clause the word "prohibition" is used in place of the original word "article", which would be confusing when applied to an amendment that is itself treated as part of an article of the Constitution.

This prohibition amendment was submitted by Congress December 18, 1917, and it was ratified, as above, after a period of not quite thirteen months. The third and final section of this amendment is therefore not merely obsolete, but it never had any legal bearing, to wit:

"Sec. 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress."

Par. 97, 98. The proposed amendment, which was submitted by Congress to the States June 2, 1924, and which would have conferred upon Congress power "to limit, regulate and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age" would, if it could have been ratified, have been subject to incorporation here, following the prohibition amendment, as a further "Police Regulation."

Par. 99. The proviso in this paragraph forbade also and for twenty years any amendment of the guaranty for the African slave-trade or of the rule that direct taxes should be in proportion to the population, including three-fifths of the slaves. This limitation, however, expired in 1808, and it has since been directly contravened by the 13th, 14th and 16th amendments. The portion of the proviso thus eliminated was:

"that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and"

Par. 100. This assertion of the Federal supremacy was originally preceded in Article VI by a clause assuming the debts of the Confederation. Such matter, however, was essentially temporary, and the obligations it recognizes have long since been liquidated, so far as there is congressional

and the judges in every State shall be bound thereby, anything in the constitution or laws of any State to the contrary notwithstanding.* VI:2.

THE UNION UPHELD

(101) The Senators and Representatives before mentioned and the members of the several State legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this Constitution; but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States (VI:3); and no person holding any office of profit or trust under them shall, without the consent of the Congress, accept of any present, emolument, office or title, of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.* I:9, 8.

(102) No person shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress, or elector of President and Vice President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may, by a vote of two-thirds of each House, remove such disability.* Am. 14, 3.

(103) The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.* Am. 14, 4.

RESERVATIONS

(104) The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.* Am. 9.

(105) The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.* Am. 10.

(ARTICLE VII—SEE FINAL NOTE)

disposition to liquidate them. If the clause has yet any vitality, it is as a Reservation upon the Federal Sovereignty, with the place therefore at the end of Article VI; but more properly the matter is obsolete, as follows:

"(1) All debts contracted and engagements entered into before the adoption of this Constitution shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution as under the Confederation." VI: 1.

Par. 101. As was explained in connection with Par. 56, the inhibition against the acceptance of foreign favors by Federal office-holders is transferred from that place to this place.

Par. 102. This 3d section of the 14th amendment is more of the same subject of the supremacy of the Constitution and of the allegiance thereto that is due from federal office-holders.

Par. 103. This 4th section of the 14th amendment changes the subject from persons to finance; but it emphasizes further the theme of the "Federal Sovereignty."

This paragraph and the other clauses of the 14th amendment (Paras. 88, 57, 5, 102) are all supported in a way by the little enforcement clause of the 14th amendment, which clause is noted along with other similar clauses in connection with Par. 46.

Paras. 104, 105. These 9th and 10th amendments are the general qualifications upon the Federal sovereignty. They properly conclude the article in which that sovereignty is so generally declared. They are fairly to be regarded also as the last words of "THE CONSTITUTION AS IT IS."

FINAL NOTE—Article VII. The concluding article of the original Constitution very briefly stated: "The ratification of the conventions of nine States shall be sufficient for the establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the same."

The purpose hereof was served when New Hampshire had ratified as the ninth state in June, 1788, and there was nothing more to be done under it, when Rhode Island had come in as the last of the original thirteen states in May, 1790.

There would be nothing more of this subject, if South Carolina and other States had not, in 1860-61, claimed the right to reopen the subject and undertaken accordingly to withdraw their respective ratifications. However, in the Civil War that ensued it was practically decided that the right to secede does not exist,—in other words, that this Article VII is a closed incident.

There is still a way into the Union through the admission of new States; but there is no way out.
