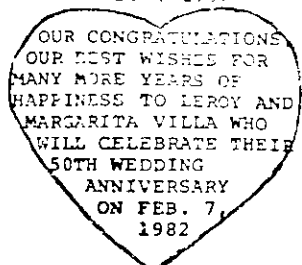

 We don't know how Margarita Delbrook Villa does it, but regardless of the extensive travelling that she and her husband are doing to exotic places, (Hawaii, Mexico, etc...) she still manages to work on her Belgian lines, her latest results show that her Squiflet ancestor, August was born in Charleroi in 1831 (son of Nicolas Squiflet and Therese Paquet) and that he married in 1859 in Gilly, Celine Quinet-born there in 1838, (daughter of Joseph Quinet and Desiree Paquet) Margarita Delbrook Villa, 1243 Diana Lane, Santa Barbara, Ca., 93103

Gretchen sent us the genealogy of Margaretha Berg (German grandmother of Grace of Monaco), which goes back to Simon Guthier/Gauthier, who was of Belgian origin and commanded in 1642/43 "Starkenburg" in Germany. About her other lines, Gretchen goes on to say: "...I found some rather startling information in the May 1978 newsletter which you sent to me. I am beginning to believe that I may have more Belgian ancestors than I realized! On page 11, there is a list of emigrants from the province of Luxembourg/Belgium and the name MARNACH appears from a town called Parethe.....I am interested in the name Marnach because my 4th Great-grandmother was a girl named Elizabeth Marnach from Luxembourg. She married my 4th ggf, Mauritz Zapp.....on 23 June 1765 in the parish of Grosskampenberg, (Germany). .....The Catholic Diocese of Trier, Germany tells me that Elizabeth is a Luxembourger. I wrote to the Grand-Duchy in 1974 about her but they replied that the name Marnach is not found in the Grand Duchy.....The second interesting thing I found in the May 1978 newsletter was the reference to Seneca County, Ohio. I have one set of great-great grandparents who emigrated from Luxembourg in about 1847 and settled in Seneca Co., Ohio. They came to central Minnesota in 1856. I have been searching for their hometown for 8 years with little luck. They did not leave behind many clues. I was quite certain about the Grand-Duchy origin because the names were so very German sounding: Hoffmann, Theisen, Marks/Marx. In addition some of the numerous THEISENS in this

area claim that Rosport and Girst/Luxembourg are the hometowns of our people. However we cannot find any records in Europe to verify this..... My Hoffmann family lived in Big Spring, Pleasant Township, Seneca Co., and they attended St. Boniface Catholic Church in New Riegel, Ohio. During their years in Ohio several babies were baptized and the names appearing as godparents were: Marks/Marx, Etgen/Eticher, Kohl, THEISEN and Ruppert." (We advised Gretchen that since the Belgian parishes of Reuland, Steffeshausen and Weveler LG, are so close to Grosskampenberg, and that at one time they were probably part of the Duchy of Luxemburg, it might be wise for her to start looking for her Marnach ancestors there first).

Barbara VanDePete checked the state census for Illinois for 14 counties for 1865, searching for the children of Pieder Van de Putte and Emily Pecor, but no luck so far. She received however copies of the christening records of the children of this couple born in Shawnee, Ks. In these records the mother's name is listed as Pecor, PeCure, Picard! According to Claudine Belva, there is a community by the name of Namur located N/W of Montreal. Belgians in Quebec are usually well integrated. Claudine learned thru Mrs. Etienne Conrath, 595-83e avenue, Chomedey-Laval, Quebec, president of the "Union Nationale Belge" that there are about 8,000 Belgians in Canada; there is also a Belgo-Canadian Club in Sabrevoix, not far from the American border.

A while back the Belvas sent an article "La Population d'Herbeumont de 1830 a 1980" written by Joseph Hardy. This article brings to light the beginning of the emigration from Herbeumont LX to the U.S. In 1845, Jean Nicolas Perlot a young man from Herbeumont, left for Paris - in 1849 he left France for California. Came back to Herbeumont in 1867 covered with glory and money made not in California's gold mines perhaps like he had hoped, but in Oregon forest land clearings and dealings. He went back to the U.S. in 1868 with a bride and a few young people - a few weeks later another group of emigrants left Herbeumont. For 40 years groups of people left Herbeumont for the U.S., mainly California and Oregon. Most if not all of the inhabitants of Herbeumont have relatives in the U.S. With the article was included a list of Herbeumont's burgomasters and priests since 1830, here they are:

THE FRENCH REPUBLICAN CALENDAR 171

My 2GGrandfather was married in Lembeke, Belgium, on "23 Prairial 5th Year of the French Republic."

It was my first encounter with the French Republican Calendar and, although I was pleased with the information, conversion of the date to the Gregorian Calendar was necessary for understanding and for my records. Fortunately, my Belgian correspondent knew how to convert the date (11 June 1797), but it was essential that I learn for myself how to equate the two calendars because I had other documents which contained French Republican dates and expected to acquire more.

Encyclopedias and an old book on the French Revolution provided broad information about the calendar but each description raised further questions. For example, I found several charts which, by the use of simple arithmetic for the conversion of days, coupled with an equating of months and years, provided an approximate converted date; however, the charts did not take leap years into account which is necessary if accurate conversion is desired. The Gregorian Years 1796 and 1804 were leap years (1800 was not a leap year), but the French Republican leap years were 3 (1794-1795), 7 (1798-1799) and 11 (1802-1803). Consequently, no simple chart can provide true conversion of dates without complicated footnotes.

The French Republican Calendar was formulated in October 1793, and instituted on 24 November 1793. However, it was made effective retroactive to the autumnal equinox of 22 September 1792, the year in which the Republic was founded. It was an attempt to apply "logic" and "reason" to a dating system in defiance of Church, State and Aristocracy, and an effort to minimize the influence of the Catholic Church in areas dominated by the French Republic, of which Belgium was a part. In its zeal to disassociate the new Republic from the Gregorian Calendar, the National Convention of Revolutionary France devised a completely new system of dating. The newly devised year was divided into twelve 30-day months with each month divided into three 10-day weeks. (The initial plan even went so far as to recommend changing clocks to reflect 100 seconds to a minute, 100 minutes to an hour and 10 hours to a day but that caused such confusion that it was put aside and ultimately abandoned in 1795). The months were grouped into seasons, and each month was appropriately named:

These twelve 30-day months accounted for 360 days. The remaining five or six days necessary to complete a calendar year received the name "Sans-culottides" (literally - "without breeches") so named in memory of the citizens who fought bravely even though they were so poor as to be lacking in certain essential clothing. In actual use, these days, which are not part of any month, were known as "Complementary Days" and will be found in documents with phrases such as "den vierden dag van Complementaire jaer thiene" (the 4th Complementary Day, year 10).

Difficulties were encountered in the use of the calendar. While it could be enforced within the French Republic, the surrounding countries still used the Gregorian Calendar. Also, there was local opposition to the new Calendar, mainly from custom and the hostility of the religious entity. Consequently, after less than fourteen years of use, the Calendar was abolished on 10 Nivose 14 (31 December 1805) and the Gregorian Calendar was restored. However, even after its abolishment, Republican dates were still used occasionally. As an example, a marriage certificate dated 25 September 1825 gave the birth date of the bride as 25 Messidor 6.

The accompanying charts allow for a true conversion of dates. Because of comparison similarities among some of the years, it is possible to consolidate the fourteen year comparisons into four charts, each chart headed by the French Republican year(s) to which it applies, together with the equated Gregorian date span. For example, Chart No. 1 must be used for French Republican Years 1,2,3,5,6 and 7. The dates adjacent to each Republican year shows the

starting and ending of the Gregorian equivalent year span. The heading "Rep. Day" on the first column is an abbreviation for "Republican Day". The headings for the succeeding columns are abbreviations for the Republican months; "COMP" meaning "Complementary Days". The underlined letters within the charts are for the Gregorian months. Do not be confused by what seems to be a duplication of Gregorian dates at the beginning and ending of Charts No. 1 and 2, and the lack of a Gregorian date at the ends of Charts No. 3 and 4. These seeming discrepancies result from leap year differences between the two calendars and pose no difficulties in the use of the charts. To convert a French Republican date to a Gregorian date, select the chart associated with the appropriate Republican year, and the junction of the Republican day and month will give the Gregorian day and month. Convert the year in accordance with the Gregorian information adjacent to the Republican year, taking particular note of the Gregorian year division.

EXAMPLE: Convert 9 Nivose 8. - Select the chart for French Republican Year 8 (Chart No 2). The junction of Rep. Day 9 and month NIVO is 30 December. The year converts to 1799. Converted date is 30 December 1799.

Although these charts simplify the conversion of dates, there may be times when the use of four charts is unwieldy, particularly when you are working in cramped space around a microfilm reader or on a crowded table. The alternative is to use one of several methods which can give you a converted date close enough for working, after which you can obtain the exact converted date at a more convenient time. A number of alternative methods have been devised, but the following two methods are suggested, either of which will provide a converted date which will be true or close enough for temporary use. Select the method which is the simpler for you.

FIRST METHOD: Use Chart No. 1 to obtain a converted day and month regardless of the Republican year involved. Convert the year from a list you prepare showing the starting and ending dates of each Republican year. (be careful with year divisions)

SECOND METHOD: Use Chart No. 5. To the day of the Republican month in the first column, add the number in the second column. If the result is equal to or less than the number in the third column, the result is the day of the Gregorian month in the fourth column. If the result is greater than the number in the third column, subtract that number and the difference is the day of the succeeding Gregorian month in the fourth column. Convert the year in accordance with the adjacent table, being careful of year divisions.

EXAMPLES:

1. Convert 6 Brumaire 5. - To the 6th day of Brumaire, add 21. The result, 27, being equal to or less than 31, the converted day and month is 27 October. Republican Year 5 converts to 1796. The fully converted date is 27 October 1796. (note that conversion by this method for this Republican date yields the same Gregorian date as if the appropriate true conversion chart had been used)

2. Convert 24 Pluviose 12. - To the 24th day of Pluviose, add 19. The result, 43, being greater than 31, subtract and obtain the difference of 12. Thus, it is the 12th day of the succeeding month, which is February. Republican Year 12 converts to 1804. The fully converted date is 12 February 1804. (note that the converted date using the appropriate true conversion chart is 14 February 1804, a difference of two days)

The French Republican Calendar is no longer the enigma that it once was. Conversions of dates to a common, more readily understood base can be quickly and simply accomplished. By means of these charts, I am able to determine for myself that my 2GGrandfather, who started this whole thing, was married on Gregorian date 11 June 1797.

During the first two weeks of July, families of Brown, Door, and Kewanee Counties were hosts to fifty-three members of the Balloune-Wisconsin Club of Namur, Belgium. Bi-annual exchange visits between the Belgians and the Peninsula Belgian-American Club have been taking place since 1974. The rapport between the groups exists not only because of common ancestry, but also because of the feelings Belgians have for America's part in liberating their country during the two World Wars.

These feelings were brought out in a speech prepared by Monsieur Robert Claprise for a Beno-Blnon family gathering on July 7 at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Defnet, Green Bay. Mr. Claprise is a retired Malqan postal worker who has studied American history and has made many Americans his friends. His words can be appreciated by everyone.

"Belgium, to which you are attached in one way or another, has a past we can all be proud of. When St. Francis Xavier was looking for an assistant to accompany him on his missionary journey to Japan said, 'Give me a Belgian!'

"Under the reign of Leopold II, your great-grandparents and grandparents left Belgium to settle in the country where you are. This brilliant king succeeded in surrounding himself with intelligent and courageous men. That is why, in the course of the first industrial revolution about the years 1860 to 1870, little Belgium was known all over the world.

"Producing steel, Belgium built various materials of interest to important companies. Let us recall the Cairo and St. Petersburg trolleys, the railways in China, the Donetz and South Russia coal mines, and the building of the city of Heliopolis in Egypt.

"Wallonia widely contributed to this fame for the coal and steel discovered in Belgium were the starting point of a great industrial drive. Thereafter, the Flemish provinces became conscious of their possibilities and took part in this development. Let us cite the seaport activities, chemical industries, and the coal mines. Those among you who are farmers no doubt are also aware that the Belgian draught horse, the most powerful for turning up the fields, is still known in the whole world.

"Belgium can also be proud because King Albert I, in 1914, held out against the first impact of the German aggression. After our neutrality was transgressed by Germany, the small Belgian army held its ground and contained the enemy the necessary time to enable French armies to organize the defense and defeat the Germans on the Marne River, and in so doing, save Luria. Thereafter, our army continued the war with the Allied forces.

"The Belgium we love was liberated twice with the help of American soldiers--in 1918 under command of General Pershing, and in 1944 under command of General Eisenhower. Everybody knows Bastogne, 60 miles south of Namur, where desperate struggles were fought during the Ardennes offensive against Von Runstedt's army. An American general said, 'Never, on any battlefield, was the American blood poured as much as in the Ardennes battle.' Personally, I still remember those twenty ambulance convoys of the American Red Cross carrying back daily from the Ardennes, the American soldiers---wounded or with frozen feet---to hospitals.

"These things, nobody can forget---neither you nor us. That is why America must remain the most powerful nation in the world to prevent war and defend every liberty against tyranny.

"From the bottom of my heart, I wish to express to you all the affection I have for you first, because you are Americans, and then, because I like to hear you talk such a pleasant language. In addition, from your country came jazz and ragtime in 1920. You gave us Gerahwin, Ben Foster, Irving Berlin, Thomas Edison, and so many scientists."

"Above all that, and most of all, I like you because your country is composed of men and women who came from everywhere and chose consolingly for a way of life imbued with freedom."
