# 24. <u>EGLI</u>

### ORIGINS

The name Egli/Egly is derived from the Swiss word "egg," meaning long ridge. The Egli family is originally from Schangnau, Trub, and other places in the Emmental, canton Bern, Switzerland. Among the Swiss Egli Anabaptists, the surname is consistently spelled "Egli". Variant spellings in records of Egli descendants include: Egle, Egele, Eagle, Eckle, Agle, Egly, Egly. (1) (see notes below)

One of the earliest Eglis found in Alsace was Rudolph Egli, a minister at Kunheim (east of Colmar, near the Rhine River). He was one of those who signed the adoption of the 1632 Dordrecht Confession of Faith in 1660 at a meeting of Alsatian Anabaptist leaders in Ohnenheim, northeast of Colmar, France. (2) Whether he was an ancestor of those who emigrated to Canada almost 200 years later is not known.

Three sons of Johannes Egli, Jacob, John, and Benjamin, as well as a Barbara Egli who married Peter Christner, settled in the Amish Mennonite community of Ontario in the mid 1800's. The Egli ancestors of those who migrated to Canada in 1847 were already found at Neu-Freistett (now known as Freistett), Baden, Germany, across the Rhine River from Strasbourg (in lower Alsace), France, in the mid-1700s. They passed rather freely across the frontier in the intervening years.

In her research of Anabaptist families in France, Neil Ann Stuckey Levine noted the Egly/Egli family, and has put together an extended family list which was published in *Mennonite Family History* in July 2003. (3) I have abbreviated this list below; much more information for the Egly family can be found in this article. Levine has chosen to use the spelling "Egly" throughout, but I change to "Egli" when I get to the family with immigrants to Canada. Either spelling is found in the original records.

## THE EXTENDED EGLY/EGLI FAMILY

Note: the surname of Maria Geisert, the second wife of Johannes Egly, was decidedly written as Geis(s)ert by persons so named who could sign French records. In the body of such records, however, the spellings Gasser and Gascho appear.

Johannes/Jean/John (German, French and English spellings) Egli was the father of the three immigrants, Jacob, John, and Benjamin, who passed through Canada. Hence we will follow his line in more detail. This Johannes Egli lived in various places -- first at Eckbolsheim, then at Niederbronn, Department of Bas-Rhin. In 1819 Johannes was employed on the estate Fleckenstein, near Lembach, also in Bas-Rhin. From 1821 to at least 1823, when daughter Barbara died, they lived on the estate Mantelhof in Uberauchen, Kirchdorf, Baden, Germany. But by the time a son Joseph was born in 1826, the family was back in Strasbourg.

THE JACOB EGLI AND BARBARA ROES FAMILY

Jacob Egli was born to Jean Egli and Catherine Muller at Molkenbronn at Eckbolsheim near Strasbourg in 1810. By the time Jacob was 26, he was employed as an innkeeper in the little hamlet of Logelbach near Colmar, France. Births, marriages and deaths of the residents of Logelbach were made in nearby Wintzenheim. It was in Logelbach that Barbara Roes, daughter of John Roes and Magdalena Gautschi, was born in 1817.

Jacob Egli and Barbara Roes had twin daughters born in 1836 and a third daughter born in 1837 before their legal marriage took place in 1838. All three of these children were born in the house of their widowed grandmother, Magdalena Gautschi Roes. The twins died shortly after birth. Jacob registered these children, declaring himself as their father and giving them his name. Jacob and Barbara remained at Logelbach for about a decade and then decided to emigrate to Canada.

## SOJOURN OF THE JACOB EGLI FAMILY IN CANADA

According to family tradition, Jacob Egli had served seven years in the French army and was determined that his sons should not have to do the same. On March 4, 1847, Jacob Egli applied to emigrate with his wife, two brothers and a domestic (servant). The party crossed the Atlantic on the Ship *Caspian*, arriving in New York on April 3, 1847. The passenger list contains the family of Jacques Egli with wife and three children, "Bergman" Egli, age 16, (probably half brother Benjamin), Jean Egli, age 25, (half brother John), and Jacques Streit, age 40 (the domestic). (5)

Barbara Roes, Jacob Egli's wife, had a brother John Roes who is believed to have come to Canada about 1843. If that is the case, then the Egli group probably chose Canada because they already had a family member here.

It did not take long for Jacob and Barbara to establish themselves in the relatively new settlement of Amish Mennonites in Oxford County. The year they arrived they leased the east half of Lot 34, Concession XV, on the 16th Line of East Zorra Township from the Canada Company. According to family tradition times were

hard due to wet weather and marshy ground. They would have gone hungry had Jacob not added to their meagre provisions by hunting wild animals. The muzzle loader he brought from France is still in the family today. (6)

Three more children were born to Jacob and Barbara during the next few years. In 1854, their lease was transferred to David Bender, and in 1855 they joined other individuals and families who were migrating to the western states. The Eglis moved to Jefferson Co., Iowa. Jacob died there in 1879 and Barbara in 1888. They are buried in the Lockridge Cemetery.

# THE JOHN EGLI AND MAGDALENA GASCHO FAMILY

As indicated earlier, John Egli most certainly accompanied his half brother Jacob's family to Canada in 1847. It is believed that in 1849 two Gascho sisters, Anna and Magdalena, arrived in Canada with their aunt Catherine Ingold, married to Christian Schantz. In February 1850 John Egli and Magdalena Gascho were married. Although they did not buy any property in East Zorra, they were listed in the census on Lot 33, Concession XVII in 1851. By that time, Magdalena's parents, sister Barbara, and brother John Gascho had arrived in Canada also and were living with the Eglis. By the 1861 census, John and Magdalena and five children were living in Hay Township, near Zurich and Lake Huron. The census taker spelled their name "Eagle." In Hay Township they also did not own any property, but the agricultural census identified their location as 85 acres of Lot 9, Concession IX.

Lot 10, to the north, was occupied by Joseph and Magdalena (Ingold) Gascho, parents of Magdalena (Gascho) Egli. The Gaschos had purchased the 100-acre lot from the Canada Company in 1856. On Lot 8, to the south, were Christian and Mary (Gascho) Steckly. Mary was also a daughter of Joseph and Magdalena. The Stecklys had purchased the north half of the lot, also in 1856 and leased the south half in 1861.

The Egli family stories included watching for bears with an old musket, but when one came around, they didn't have the courage to fire. They were also annoyed with the wolves, especially during the maple syrup season while they were boiling maple syrup in the woods at night. Trips to Waterloo were made with sled and oxen with the children wrapped in feather ticks.

On one occasion nearly the whole family was ill with typhoid fever. They did not have the services of a doctor, because it was too inconvenient to call one and there was no money to pay him. Six-year-old Barbara died during that epidemic.

Evidently the 9th concession was not very good for farming without drainage, and in the mid-1800s the settlers had not yet learned how to do that. In 1867, the Stecklys sold their property, moving to Chenoa,

Maclean County, Illinois, in 1868. The Steckly family moved to Hartford, Kansas, where Mary died in 1893. Christian and the family then relocated in Nebraska.

At the same time, John and Magdalena Egli left with their family of eight surviving children for Tazewell County, Illinois, where three more children were born. Except for a few years in Edwards Co., Kansas (1886-1888), John and Magdalena spent the rest of their lives in Tazewell County. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1900 with all of their children and most grandchildren present. (8) Magdalena died two years later -- in 1902, and John in 1907. They are buried in the Hopedale Mennonite Cemetery.

John Egli had been ordained to the ministry in the Amish Mennonite congregation in Hay Township, Huron County, Ontario. According to his obituary, he was ordained in 1861 and also served the Hopedale Mennonite Church in Tazewell Co. from 1867-1886 and from 1888-1907, when he died in his 87th year. He attended the Amish-Mennonite Ministers' meetings in 1871, 1872, 1875, and 1878. (9)

The Eglis and Stecklys may wish to note that in 1874, Father Joseph Gascho also sold his farm on Concession IX. His son John purchased Lots 13 and 14 on the 14th concession. John had married Veronica Steckly, sister to Christian who was married to Mary Gascho. John and Veronica remained with John's parents, and after the change in location, the parents lived with John and his family.

# BENJAMIN EGLI

Benjamin Egli, born in 1830, the youngest of the family of Johannes/Jean Egli and Maria Geisert, is believed to have emigrated, along with his half brother Jacob and his brother John, under the name "Bergman" on the passenger list.

A Benjamin "Eghly," age 22 was listed as a laborer with Samuel and Mary [Miller] Bender in the 1851 East Zorra census. This must surely be the brother of Jacob and John who were also residing in East Zorra. Since we have not found him in an 1861 census, he may have accompanied the Jacob Egli family to Iowa in 1855.

Philip V. Miller of Valparaiso, Indiana, has found a Benjamin Egli in the 1870 and 1880 census of Tazewell County who corresponds in age to the youngest son of Johannes and Maria (Geisert) Egli. When Benjamin was naturalized he gave his emigration date as 1847. He was married to Magdalena Shafer. Miller, however, lost Benjamin's trail after the 1880 census. (13)

Further Comments:

- a) French women used their maiden names. The persons making the lists were not accustomed to this; so without asking the children's last names, they simply gave all the children the name of the mother. Hence the children in this list are named "Roes" instead of Egli.
- b) The John Egli family has the tradition that one of the Egli boys was lost after landing in New York and was never found again. Since we seem to account for everyone on the passenger list, one does not know what to make of that story.

## THE BARBARA EGLI AND PETER CHRISTNER FAMILY

#### BARBARA EGLI

When Lorraine Roth did her research, she was not able to find much about Barbara Egli, who is supposed to have married Peter Christner about 1848 in Canada. One source gives Barbara's maiden name as Staley, but only in 2015 did we learn that it was Barbara's mother who was born Stahly. Lorraine had tried to place her into the foregoing Egli families but had not been able to find a niche for her. When, with whom, and how she got to Canada remained a mystery to Lorraine to the end of her life.

However, further research by Duane L. Egle published in 2015 solves part of the mystery and places Barbara Egli into a large Egli family. However, we still do not know how to connect Barbara' Egli family with the Egli immigrants to Canada mentioned above. [Bruce W. Jantzi]




