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RD's Message



We, in DILG Region V, faced a challenging and fulfilling 2011.

Under the leadership of a fellow Bicolano, Hon. SILG Jesse Robredo, we underwent a shift in management direction and became more resolute in the promotion of good local governance focused on transparency and accountability. ARD's Message



The year 2011 was, for us, a year marked by change anchored on effective advocacy on the flagship programs of the Department and provision of technical assistance and capacity-building interventions.

In response to the government's call for "Tapat na Palakad, Bayang Maunlad", the Department implemented the Full Disclosure Policy to encourage transparency in governance. At the close of 2011 we have obtained the support and commitment of local government units in Bicol as evidenced by an almost 84% level of compliance, leading to the conferment of the Seal of Good Housekeeping to 79 LGUs and Gawad Pamana ng Lahi to the province of Albay, city of Ligao and municipality of Tiwi and the grant of financial subsidy to compliant LGUs by way of the Performance Challenge Fund (PCF) allowing LGUs to implement projects towards the attainment of the Millennium Development Goals. These recognition and grant of incentives is the Department's way of helping deserving LGUs and LGUs that can be trusted with people's money for the benefit of their constituents.

Capacity development trainings on upscaling BPLS reforms, Community-based Monitoring System (CBMS) and disaster-risk reduction and climate change adaptation were undertaken under the Phases II and III of the Strengthening of Local Governments in the Philippines (SLGP) project that benefited not only the 55 SLGP LGU-partners but also non-SLGP beneficiaries. And because of exemplary performance in SLGP activities, five LGUs received an infrastructure grant – the ComTrade Center for Tiwi, Albay, Level II Water System for San Miguel Island, Tabaco, Albay, Bagsakan Center and Cold Storage Facility for Iriga City and Ecology Park for the municipalities of San Andres and San Miguel in Catanduanes.

We are forever grateful to the Spanish government through the Agencia Espanola Cooperacion Internacional para el Desarollo (AECID) and the Local Government Academy (LGA) for the trust and support they have extended to DILG V that greatly helped us in attaining our program targets.

The Department has also been at the forefront of promoting private-public partnership and institutionalizing such partnership by engaging Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) and National Government Organizations (NGOs) in the implementation of DILG programs.

Complementing our program partners are the ever reliable and committed workforce of the DILG RO V who in one way or another humbly contributed to what the Department's accomplishments for 2011. Altogether, we have identified issues and problems within the organization and used it as input as we crafted our common roadmap to change towards adopting a more PERFORMING, ACCOUNTABLE, PERFORMING AND TRANSPARENT system of internal governance making DILG a more effective developmental partner of the local government units and other stakeholders. Our governance practice must be rooted in these same values and principles. In doing so, we challenge ourselves to improve constantly for our clients, our shareholders and our partners because the DILG is a purpose-driven organization that is capable of continuing to accomplish great things.

IMPLEMENTATION OF BNEO COMPONENT II

he Barangay Newly Elected Officials (BNEO) Training Program Component 2: Laying the Foundation was conducted regionwide during the first semester of 2011 to equip barangay officials with knowledge on the basics of barangay governance and administration specifically on their duties and functions and the role of the barangay. Barangay officials collectively formulated their respective statement of Barangay Vision, Mission and Objectives; came up with the list of priority programs and projects; and formulated their barangay agenda for governance and development (Barangay AGAD).

The roll-out training for the provinces of Albay, Camarines Norte, Catanduanes, Masbate and Sorsogon were clustered in every municipality and the training was conducted on-site within the 1st and 2nd quarter of 2011. For Camarines Sur, a general orientation for all Punong barangays was conducted.

A total of 30,105 barangay officials or 78.8% were trained region wide from 3,280 barangays.

The scope of the BNEO training covered discussions on defining the roles and functions of barangay officials under the LGC of 1991; importance of barangay planning, legislation and finance; identifying the basic principles on community mobilization; importance of mobilizing citizens' participation in governance, enhancing the performance of the barangay through the Barangay Governance Productivity Measurement System (BGPMS); importance of the formulation of the Barangay Agenda for Governance and Development (AGAD) and Capacity Development (CAPDEV) Agenda; importance of RA 9485 or the Anti-Red tape Act (ARTA) and crafting of the Barangay Citizen's Charter.

As an output of the BNEO training, a total of 2,999 Barangay AGAD or 86.4% were formulated.

The Provinces of Catanduanes and Sorsogon and the municipalities of Prieto Diaz, Sor., Pandan and San Andres, Catanduanes attended the "Sharing of Disaster Risk Reduction—Climate Change Adaptation Good Practices" on March 1-2, 2011 in Malolos, Bulacan

To ensure continuity, the DILG V GO-FAR team monitored the replication of the Albay Public Safety and Emergency Management Office (APSEMO) best practice by the provinces of Catanduanes, Pampanga, Sorsogon and Saranggani.

STRENGTHENED CBMS IMPLEMENTATION

ILG V has partnered with the National Anti-Poverty Commission (NAPC) through the anti-poverty convergence program which strengthened the CBMS project implementation in the region. Twenty-two LGUs enrolled in the CBMS program in 2011 increasing the total CBMS implementers to 104. The CBMS implementation of 19 LGUs are funded by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) through NAPC in collaboration with the Community-Based Network Team, the Department of the Interior and Local Government and the Department of Social Welfare and Development. Three (3) LGUs are implementing the project utilizing LGU funds.


The DILG CBMS Technical Working Group rendered technical assistance to these LGUs during their module trainings. Other LGUs that were previously enrolled but have just completed the requirements for Modules 2 & 4 were likewise assisted in the conduct of the particular module trainings.

The Regional DILG CBMS Team likewise rendered technical assistance to LGUs in the preparation of their Work and Financial Plans and database management.


In addition to Minalabac, and Lupi, Camarines Sur and Libon, Albay, the municipalities of Milaor and Canaman, Camarines Sur submitted their individual Barangay and Municipal Profiles.

Forty-four or 42.30% of LGUs in the region implementing the CBMS are without external financial aid.

CBMS Status of Implementation










Participants comparing notes during simulation

Il CBMS projects in Camarines Norte are implemented using LGU funds. 54% of the LGUs in Camarines Sur, 40% in Sorsogon and 33% in Albay are without external fund source. For Masbate and Catanduanes LGUs, CBMS project implementation were foreign assisted.

Advocacy and orientation briefing to local officials and functionaries were strategies adopted by the DILG V for CBMS. The municipalities of Irosin, Sorsogon and San Jose, Camarines Sur were oriented on the project on April 15 and June 27, 2011, respectively. The LGU-partners under the convergence program from the Provinces of Albay, Catanduanes and Sorsogon were oriented on the project at Likas Ridge Hotel, Irosin Sorsogon on October 3-4, 2011. The same activity was conducted for the target LGUs from Camarines Sur at Villa Caceres Hotel on October 5-6, 2011.

MOVING TOWARDS THE ATTAINMENT OF MDGs

he department endeavored to simplify and enhance the existing forms and corresponding system to capture the initiatives and progress of the LGU in the achievement of MDG targets. This was an effort to address the low turn-out of MDG reports in 2007 using the original tracking forms developed by the Department in collaboration with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and De La Salle University.

The instrument has been adopted as the official tracking system for the MDG per DILG MC 2011-141 dated September 20, 2011.

Series of trainings were attended to and conducted by the MDG Regional Team, namely:

- 1. Administration of the enhanced Millenium Development Goals Monitoring and Evaluation
- 2. Training on the actual filling-out and encoding of the tracking forms for UNFPA
- 3. Training on Encoding, Consolidation and Analysis of the enhanced MDG M&E Tracking Forms 1-6 for the members of the Local Finance Committee and DILG personnel
- 4. Pilot testing and Encoding using the LGUs CBMS data and SLGR as inputs.

MDGF 1919: ENHANCING ACCESS TO AND PROVISION OF SAFE AND POTABLE WATER

ow on its third year of implementation, several activities were undertaken in 2011 involving the municipalities of Basud and Capalonga in Camarines Norte and Siruma and Garchitorena in Camarines Sur.

LOCAL GOVERNANCE WATER FORUM

The Project Development and Mangement Unit spearheaded the conduct of the Local Governance Water Forum on January 6-7, 2011 at the Ateneo de Naga University with a call to action and support for our national leaders to address prevailing issues and concerns on water as raised by local chief executives, local water service providers, NGOs and NGAs during the forum.

IEC SKILLS TRAINING

A three-day training workshop on the development of localized information, education and communication (IEC) materials was held at Villa Caceres Hotel, Naga City last February 9-11, 2011 to equip the members of the Municipal Water Sanitation (WATSAN) Council of Garchitorena and Siruma (Camarines Sur) and Capalonga and Basud (Camarines Norte) with relevant skills in preparing advocacy materials for the promotion of MDGF 1919 project.













MW4SP PREPARATION

To come up with the Municipal Water Supply, Sewerage Sector Plan (MW4SP) for the municipalities of Basud, Capalonga, Siruma and Garchitorena, the DILG V Regional WATSAN team assisted the consultants from the National Water Resources Board and Office of Project Development Services (OPDS) in gathering and validation of relevant data.

The Project Development Management Unit (PDMU) RO V in coordination with the WSSU-OPDS conducted the consultation and validation of technical assessment of the MW4SP for the MDGF 1919 beneficiaries.

WORLD WATER DAY CELEBRATION

In coordination with the Department of the Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) V, the DILG V took part in the activities conducted for the World Water Day Celebration held on March 22, 2011.

High school and elementary students from the four MDGF 1919 LGU-beneficiaries participated in the postcard making contest with the theme "Water is Life to Me" sponsored by the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA). Cyen Esclanda, a Grade IV elementary student from Cabusao, Camarines Sur and Sheena May O. Lopez, from Basud, Camarines were chosen to read their water stories before President Benigno Aguino via teleconferencing during the WWD celebration held at Bicol University Amphitheater, Legazpi City.

Training-Workshop on Good Water Governance and Strategic Communication for **WATSAN Teams/Councils**

This training was conducted on August 23-26, 2011 at the Macagang Business Center, Nabua, Camarines Sur and was participated in by the Water and Sanitation (WATSAN) Teams of the four MDGF 1919 LGU-beneficiaries. The WATSAN Councils formulated their respective Communication Plan containing therein the communication activities for the advocacy of the MDGF 1919 program and objectives.

Partnering with CBDI for Community Organizing

The Coalition for Bicol Development, Inc. (CBDI) was commissioned under MDGF 1919 Programme to undertake the community organizing activities covering the beneficiary barangays to contribute to the attainment of the Millenium Development Goals (MDGs) by reducing to half the number of people without access to safe and potable water.

Program Orientation and Preparation of Simplified Feasibility Study

The municipalities of Mandaon, Milagros, Placer, Cataingan, Cawayan and Uson in Masbate were identified by the NAPC as beneficiaries of the Sagana at Ligtas sa Tubig sa Lahat Program for 2011.

As part of the implementation of the Salintubig Program, selected Local Chief Executives and LGU personnel of the LGU beneficiaries attended the program orientation and skills training on the preparation of simplified project feasibility study on June 15-17, 2011 at Puerto Vista Resort, Sto. Domingo, Albay.

After completing the requirements, the LCEs of the LGU beneficiaries under the Salintubig Program entered into a memorandum of agreement with the DOH and the DILG for the implementation of said project. The MOA signing was held at Daguinsin Hall, Department of Health V, Daraga, Albay on June 25, 2011.

The NAPC also identified the Province of Albay, the municipalities of Guinobatan, Camalig, Daraga, Legazpi City, Sto. Domingo in Albay and San Jacinto, and Claveria of Masbate as beneficiaries of the Salintubig Program based on thematic concerns such as poorest barangays and waterless communities. As such, the officials of these LGUs attended the training on advocacy and skills enforcement in the preparation of simplified F/S.

DILG V assisted the local government units and concerned agencies in the following activities related to HIV-AIDS control and prevention:

- 1. Getting to Zero Infection Policy Congress
- 2. Enhanced Comprehensive STI Case Management and 100% Condom Utilization Program (CUP) of the Provincial Government of Sorsogon.
- 3. Adoption of the ordinance promulgating policies and measures for the tract infection (RTI) HIV/AIDS and creating a Municipal Council on RTI Control
- 4. Roll out training of RHU personnel (15 RHM, 2 RSI & 3 Nurses)
- 5. Out reach cum learning group sessions in Lady Anne and D8
- 6. Provided AIDS 101 to Parents Effectiveness Service (PES) and Day Care Parents in barangays Cagbacong, Gogon, Banquerohan, Taysan, Puro, Lapu-Lapu, Sampaguita Taysan, Homapon, Bagacay, San Francisco and Bogtong, RFSWs, MSMs, CLSWs, housewives and pregnant women.
- 7. AIDS Orientation to Bicol University and Aquinas University students.

























STRENGTHENING PARTNERSHIP WITH CSOs/POs/NGOs

n order to strengthen and institutionalize the Department's partnership with CSOs/POs/NGOs and LGUs, an assessment and planning workshop was held at La Piazza Convention Hall, Legazpi City on September 6-7, 2011.

The event was made possible through a memorandum of agreement between the DILG, the Caucus of Development NGO Networks (CODE-NGOs), Transparency and Accountability Network (TAN), and Task Force-Participatory Local Governance (TF-PLG).

Altogether, the DILG, CSOs, POs, LGUs identified the factors that either reinforce or hinder the partnership and the output of which was the formulation of a Mutual Plan of Action creating the rules of engagement that will define the partnership. The Mutual Plan of Action contains the things to be done to promote good governance in the Region.

The workshop also served as an entry point for possible involvement of civil society organization in pursuit of nationwide developmental goals through Public-Private Partnership (PPP).


METRO NAGA DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL: SHOWCASE OF LGU ALLIANCE

MNDC held the following activities:








MEASURING LGU PERFORMANCE THROUGH LGPMS

or CY 2011, DILG V satisfactorily achieved 100% data completion and online data entry for both the LGPMS and DOH-LGU Scorecard on Health sub-system and 91.67% for the DOT-Local Tourism Statistics System. High participation rate of the local government units were attributed to continuous program advocacy, provision of appropriate technical assistance and strong partnership and coordination with all the LGU stakeholders and concerned government agencies involved in the program particularly the Department of Health (DOH) and Department of Tourism (DOT).

Fifty-one percent 51% of the local government units in Bicol conducted the utilization conference for CY 2010 with submitted minutes and post activity report on the conduct of the activity.

LGUS WITH THE SEAL OF GOOD HOUSEKEEPING

he Seal of Good Housekeeping (SGH) involves an assessment of LGU performance in terms of fiscal management highlighting the absence of adverse COA opinion on the LGUs financial statements and transparent and accountable governance.

During its first implementation by the Department in 2010, 30 municipalities nationwide have been conferred with the seal including Camaligan, Camarines Sur, Sto. Domingo, Albay and Mobo, Masbate.

For 2011 assessment, 79 LGUs passed the criteria for the SGH. The first implementation covered 4th to 6th class cities and municipalities while 2nd round covered 1st to 3rd income class cities, HUCs and provinces.

Regionwide assessment and validation was conducted in three levels:

- 1. Assessment and validation done by the Cluster Team with NGO/CSO participation using the filled up data capture form submitted by the MLGOO.
- 2. Assessment and validation by the Prov'l Validation Team with NGO/CSO participation
- 3. Assessment and validation by the Regional Validation Team with participation from JCI representative and Legazpi Pastoral Council

Based on the table review conducted by the regional focal person, the regional validation team conducted field validation and assessment to LGUs using the filled-up DCF submitted by the provinces. LGUs that passed the validation and assessment of the regional validation became the Regional SGH passers.

GIVING LGUS ACCESS TO PERFORMANCE CHALLENGE FUND (PCF)

onferment of the Seal of Good Housekeeping entitles the LGU to access the Performance Challenge Fund.

The PCF is a subsidy for LGUs to be used in implementing projects to achieve the MDGs, boost local economic development, promote adaptation to climate change, disaster preparedness and solid waste management.

In 2011, Region V had a total of 19 LGU recipients of the PCF subsidy. These LGUs were the SGH passers for its first round implementation, the Regional winners of the 2011 Gawad Pamana ng Lahi for the provincial, city and municipal category and LGU identified by NAPC with high poverty incidence. Out of these 18 LGUs, 3 or 16.6% have already started their project implementation while 6 LGUs or 33.34% have conducted the preparatory activities such as bidding, mobilization, etc. and the remaining 9 LGUs or 50% have just claimed or received their respective checks.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT SUPPORT FUND (LGSF) GRANT

third round of assessment on the Seal of Good Housekeeping was conducted to give opportunity to other LGUs to avail of the LGSF using the same assessment criteria for seal of good housekeeping.

There was a remarkable increase in the total number of LGU passers. Of the remaining 93 LGUs representing 77.5% of the total non-passers, 55.91% or 52 passed the assessment to include the provinces of Camarines Norte, Catanduanes, Masbate and Sorsogon, cities of Naga, Iriga, Tabaco, and Masbate and 44 municipalities distributed in the six provinces.

These LGUs were entitled to access the LGSF Fund amounting to not more than 50% of the total IRA deducted from them. The Fund will be released to LGUs by the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) upon endorsement by the DILG of the LGU's proposed project to be funded by the LGSF. The amount to be received varies depending on the total IRA deducted from individual LGUs.

PROMOTING TRANSPARENCY THROUGH FULL **DISCLOSURE POLICY**

n support of the national government's campaign "Kung walang corrupt, walang mahirap", the Department implemented the Full Disclosure Policy mandating all local government units to make public documents pertaining to LGU budget, expenditures and procurement in a conspicuous place within the municipal hall, in the LGU website or DILG website and in print media.

For 2011, 84 LGUs out of 120 have fully complied with the full disclosure policy. Compliance to Full Disclosure Policy has been integrated in the 2011 General Appropriations Act making it a mandatory requirement for the availment of the Performance Challenge Fund incentive under the Seal of Good Housekeeping, Gawad Pamana ng Lahi and the Local Government Support Fund (LGSF) grant and P10 million grant for water system under the Sagana at Ligtas na Tubig sa Lahat (SALIN TUBIG) Program.

In a nutshell, the Full Disclosure Policy is our initiative to promote transparency and accountability of LGUs.



The Full Disclosure Policy also mandates all barangays in the country through the Punong Barangay to post Barangay Budget, Statement of Income and Expenditures and other Financial Transactions and Annual Procurement Plan in conspicuous places within their respective localities and in website, if available.

As of December 2011, 46% barangays have disclosed their Annual Budget; 40% Itemized Monthly Collections; 43% Summary of Income and Expenditures; 39.5% Component of the IRA Utilization; 28% Annual Procurement Plan; 25.5% Items to Bid; 23% Bid Results on Civil Works and Goods and Services; and 23% Abstract of Bids as Calculated.

ENHANCING DRRMC CAPACITY

he DILG V is at the forefront in ensuring the organization of Local Disaster Risk Reduction Management Council (LDR-RMCs) at all levels as mandated by R.A. 10121.

The LDRRMCs are basically tasked to:

- 1. Approve, monitor and evaluate the implementation of the Local Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Plan and annually review, test and develop the plan consistent with other national and local planning programs;
- 2. Ensure the integration of disaster risk reduction and climate change adaptation into local development plans, programs and budgets as a strategy in sustainable development and poverty reduction;
- 3. Recommend the implementation of forced or preemptive evacuation of local residents, if necessary; and
- 4. Convene once every three (3) months, or as necessary.

In Region V, all LDRRMCs adopted the intergovernmental approach and teamwork strategy to minimize devastating effects caused by any kind of disaster.

UPSCALING BPLS REFORMS

ifteen (15) pilot LGUs launched/re-launched the Business One-Stop-Shop (BOSS) during the business renewal period in January 2011. The BOSS was established in such a way that offices concerned in the business application process were gathered in one area for easier access on the part of the clientele.

The launching of the BOSS in these LGUs was also highlighted by the awarding of 10 top grosser's in terms of payment of taxes, early bird award for prompt taxpayers for the past 2-3 consecutive years and the first business permit issuance award for 2011 for being the first in securing a business permit for 2011.

The capacity building training on BPLS reforms was funded by the Agencia Española de Cooperacion Internacional para El Desarollo (AECID) through the SLGP. Upscaling BPLS reforms program was started in 2010 requiring all local government units in reforming the country's business registration process. 

Strengthening Local Governments

BPLS ROLLOUT TRAINING WORKSHOP ON UPSCALING BPLS REFORMS

As a continuing effort to streamline reforms in the business permit and licensing system of LGUs, a BPLS roll out training was held to strengthen the participants' appreciation of the BPLS upscaling or streamlining reforms and its corresponding advantages to the LGU's business registration system.

CDP ELA FORMULATION AND UPDATING For LGU San Miguel and San Andres, Catanduanes, and Tiwi, Albay

The training on CDP ELA Formulation and Updating for LGU San Miguel in Catanduanes and Tiwi, Albay was funded under the SLGP to enhance the knowledge and skills of the members of the five (5) sectoral/functional committees of the Local Development Council (LDC) and define their respective roles in the comprehensive development process.


CEREMONIAL TURNOVER OF SLGP PHASE 3 GRANTS

September 15, 2011, DILG Regional Office 5, Legazpi City

In a formal ceremony held last September 15, 2011, infrastructure and IT grants were officially turned over by the Ambassador of Spain to the Philippines, His Excellency Jorge Domecq, to LGUs Tiwi, Tabaco City, Iriga City, San Miguel and San Andres.

TURNOVER OF IT EQUIPMENT TO SLGP PARTNER LGUS UNDER THE BPLS STREAMLINING PROGRAM, December 12, 2011, DILG Regional Office 5, Legazpi City

Seventy five (75) desktop computer units were distributed by the DILG Regional Office V to SLGP partner LGUs under the SLGP Phase III Project being implemented by the Local Government Academy (LGA) and funded by the Spanish Cooperation (AECID) in the Philippines. Formal turnover of the IT equipment were made during the ceremonial turnover of SLGP Phase III Grants and turnover of IT equipment to SLGP Partner LGUs held last September 15, 2011 and December 12, 2011, respectively, at the DILG Regional Office V, Legazpi City. The IT support was granted in-line with the BPLS streamlining program. Brought about by the reforms being initiated in the business permits and licensing system of the LGUs, said ICT equipment distribution is initiated in pursuance of the results of the continuing effort of the Project to create business friendly environment that fosters sustainable climate for financing and investment.



The increasing demand for skilled workers is a beneficial scenario for local overnment units to initiate development interventions to enhance and upgrade their local workers' competency. Various training programs and seminars are being offered by relevant government agencies, however, such activities are conducted either out-of-town or in crowded venues. This is the situation that the project seeks to address, to have a permanent venue for training and seminars in the constant skills learning process for Tiwi residents and neighboring localities. Specifically, the project aimed to accommodate lectures, training and seminars pertaining to ceramics craft industry, abaca products industry, charcoal briquetting, candle making, food processing and other microbusiness initiatives, carpentry, electrical and welding works, pipe fitting, automotive mechanics, heating and air conditioning and plumbing trades.

CONSTRUCTION/IMPROVEMENT OF WATER SYSTEM

Barangays Visita, Sagurong, Rawis, Hacienda, Agnas San Miquel Island, LGU Tabaco City

Results of the Community Based Monitoring System (CBMS) which was first conducted in 2008 revealed that the residents of barangays of Visita, Sagurong,

Rawis, Hacienda and Agnas of San Miguel Island have the least access to safe potable water which the Tabaco City government sought to address. By providing access to safe and potable water supply to the residents of San Miguel Island, water-borne diseases can be reduced and health promoted. Ease of access to safe potable water can impact on the productivity of residents, more particularly women, and ultimately improve their quality of life as they use their available time for the family, recreation and participation and engagement in community activities such as poverty reduction projects.

CONSTRUCTION OF BAGSAKAN CENTER AND COLD STORAGE FACILITY LGU Iriga City

Majority of Iriga City's population is largely dependent on agriculture. Marketing and trading of farm produce is a daily preoccupation among farmers, traders and buyers who conduct their trades most particularly and most often, along main thoroughfares and streets of the City. This project is aimed to address this scenario. Aside from providing the farmers with suitable infrastructure facilities and services for their produce, agricultural and livestock, Bagsakan center will also provide traders the proper venue where they can properly transact business with farmers. Correspondingly, the City Government can effectively monitor their marketing and trading practices and thereby provide relevant interventions to further enhance economic benefits to the community. To minimize and abate spoilage of products and irregular fluctuation of supplies and prices of fish, meat, fruits, vegetables a cold storage facility is integrated into the project. This will basically relieve produces of some of their post harvest problems on handling, preservation and storage.

CONSTRUCTION OF ECOLOGICAL PARK, LGU San Andres, Catanduanes

The San Andres Ecological Park is a project in compliance to Resolution No. 26 of the National Solid Waste Management Commission requiring LGUs to have ecology park or eco-park as an option for waste disposal instead of the sanitary landfill. One of the priority projects of LGU San Andres, the eco-park envisions a zero waste, carbon credit, greening of the municipality, and more livelihood projects by the year 2013. The eco-park composition includes material recovery facilities, composting facilities, garden and nursery, residual management facilities, livelihood and post harvest facilities.

CONSTRUCTION OF ECOLOGICAL PARK, LGU San Miguel, Catanduanes

Environmental management, protection and sanitation belong to the major thrusts and priority programs of the LGU. The Local Government Unit of San Miguel identified in particular the open dumping of waste as one of the pressing issues that needs its immediate attention. Selected as one of the municipalities qualified to receive infrastructure support from SLGP Phase III, the LGU decided to construct their very own EcoPark not only in compliance to the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000 but also in response to their pressing need for proper waste disposal system and facility. In particular, the EcoPark Project aims to provide residents with waste disposal site for residual waste, a material recovery facility for non-biodegradable waste, a composting facility to process biodegradable waste, and a nursery for the propagation and distribution of free seedlings for environmental protection program.
