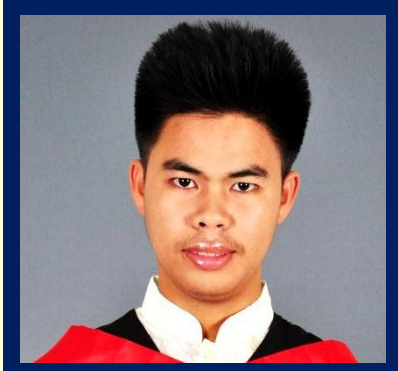

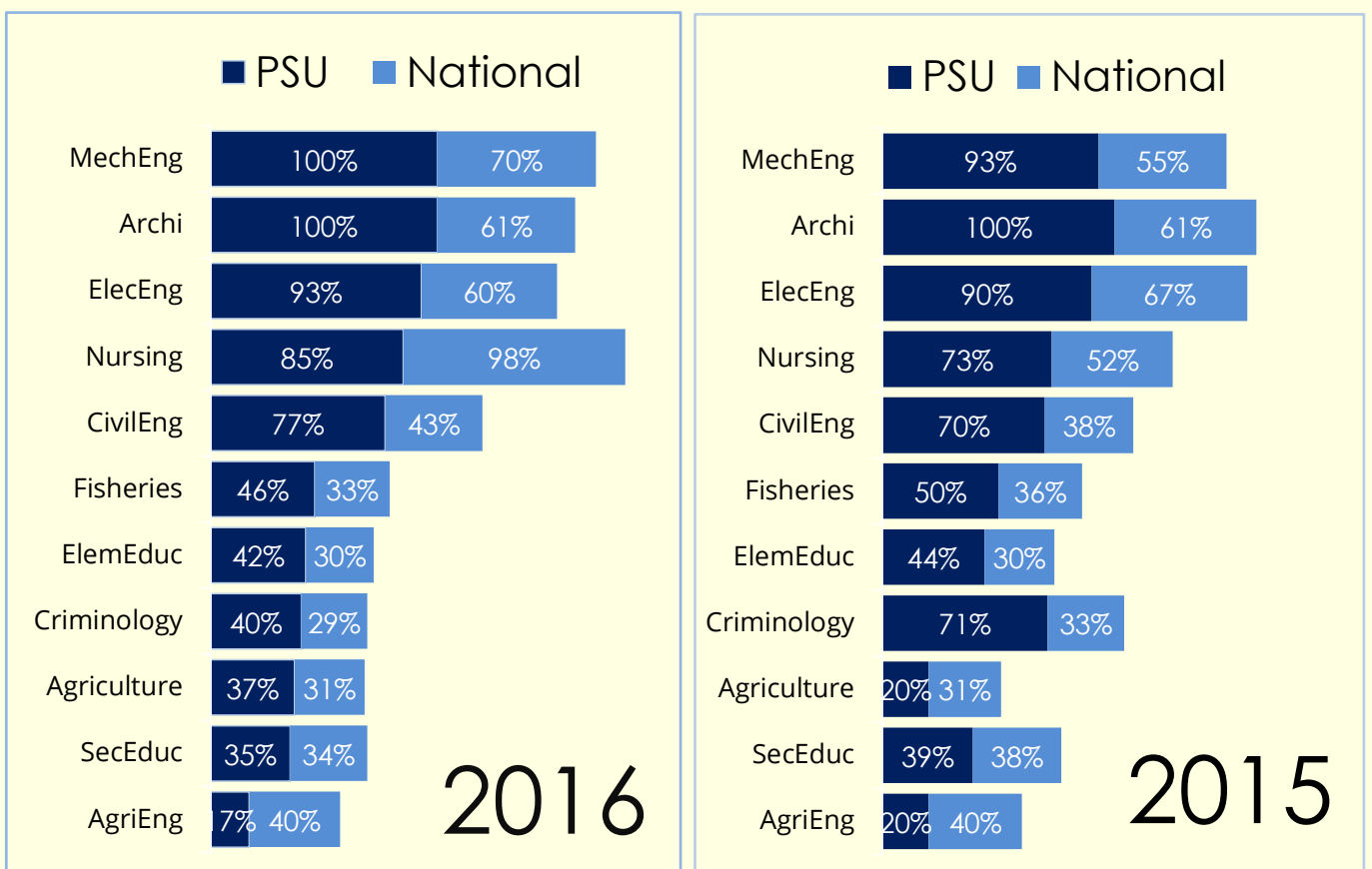

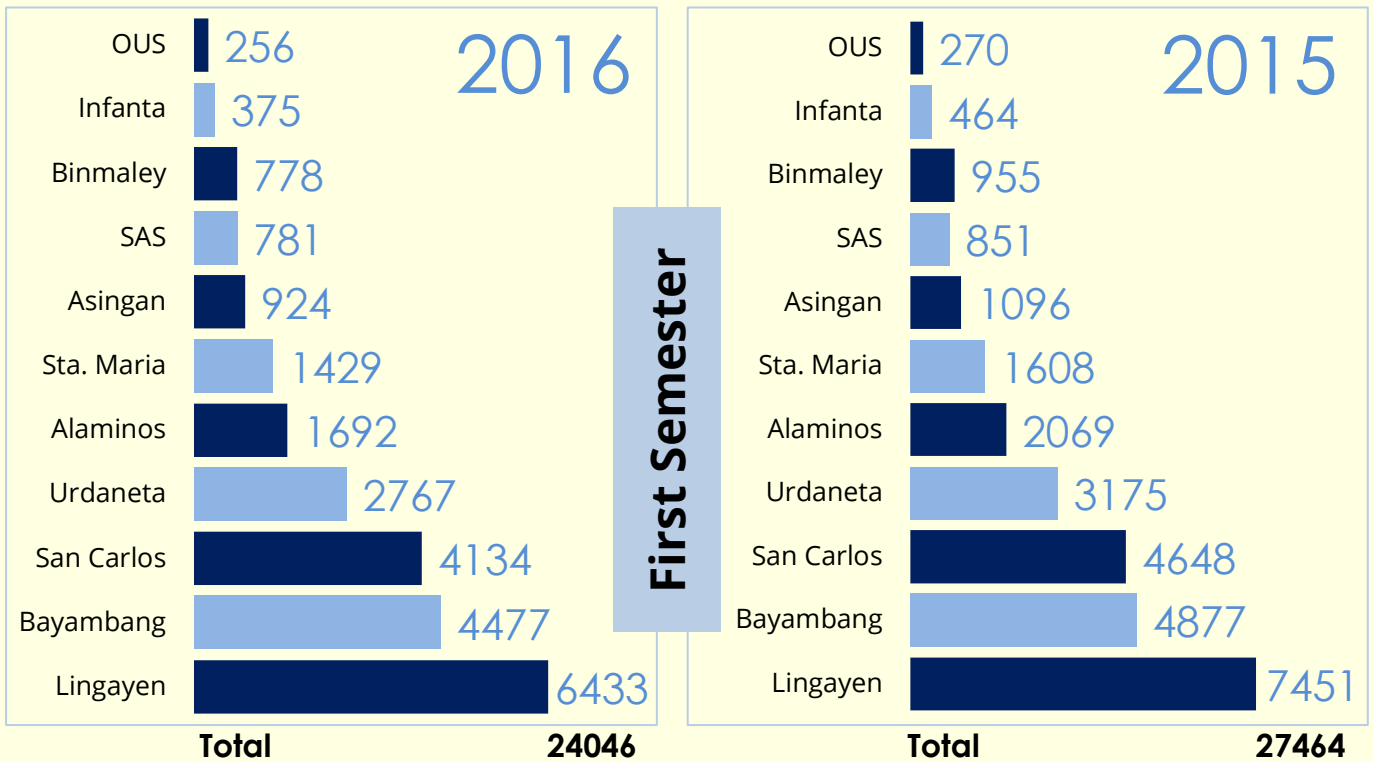

Board Examination Performance

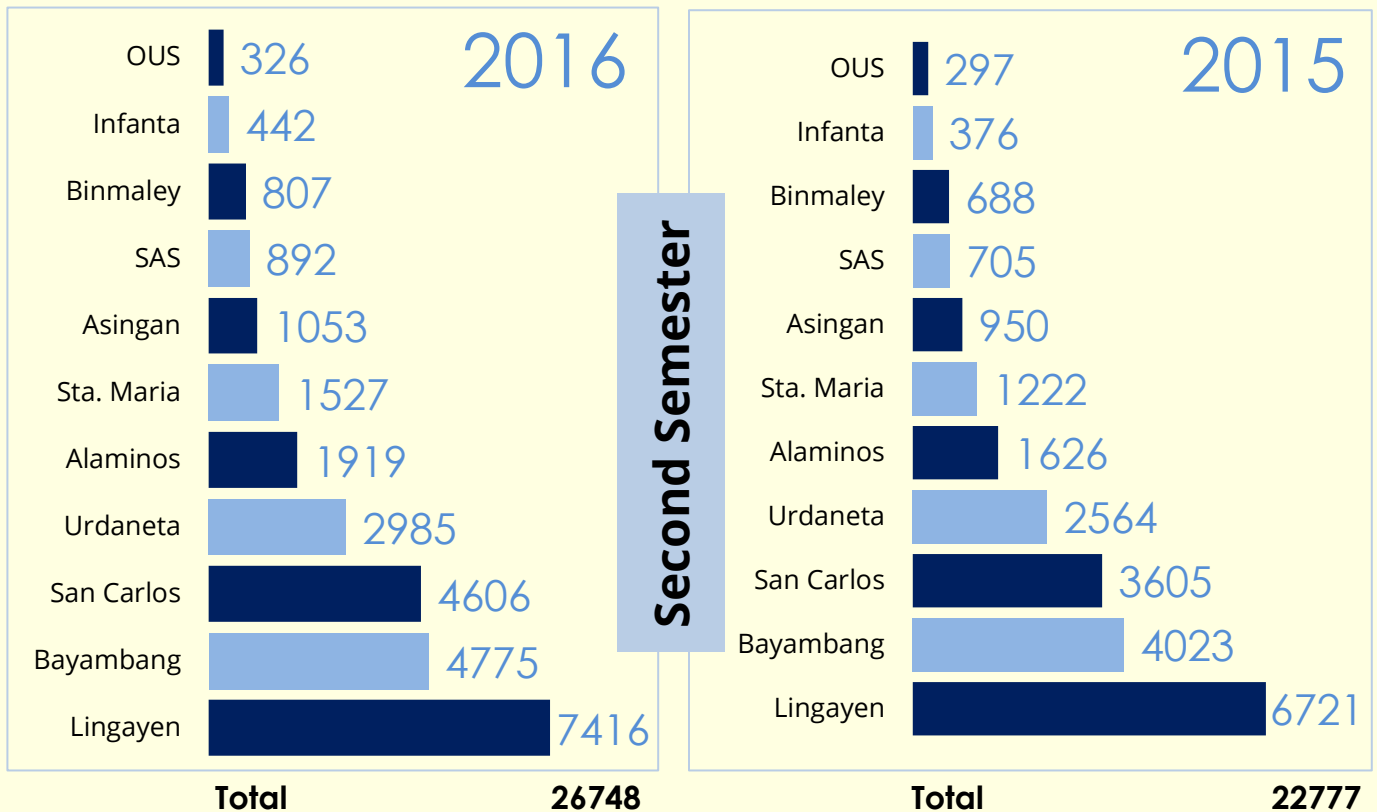


Student Population by Campus

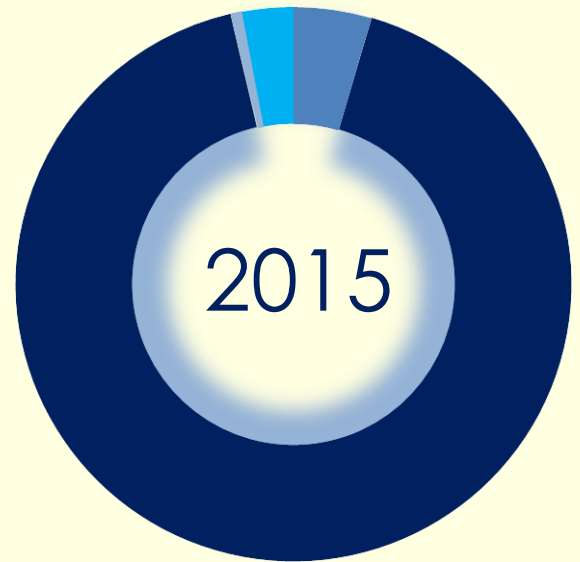
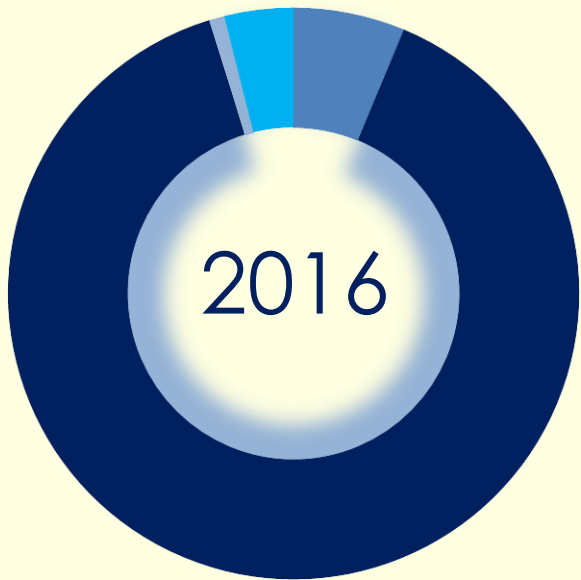

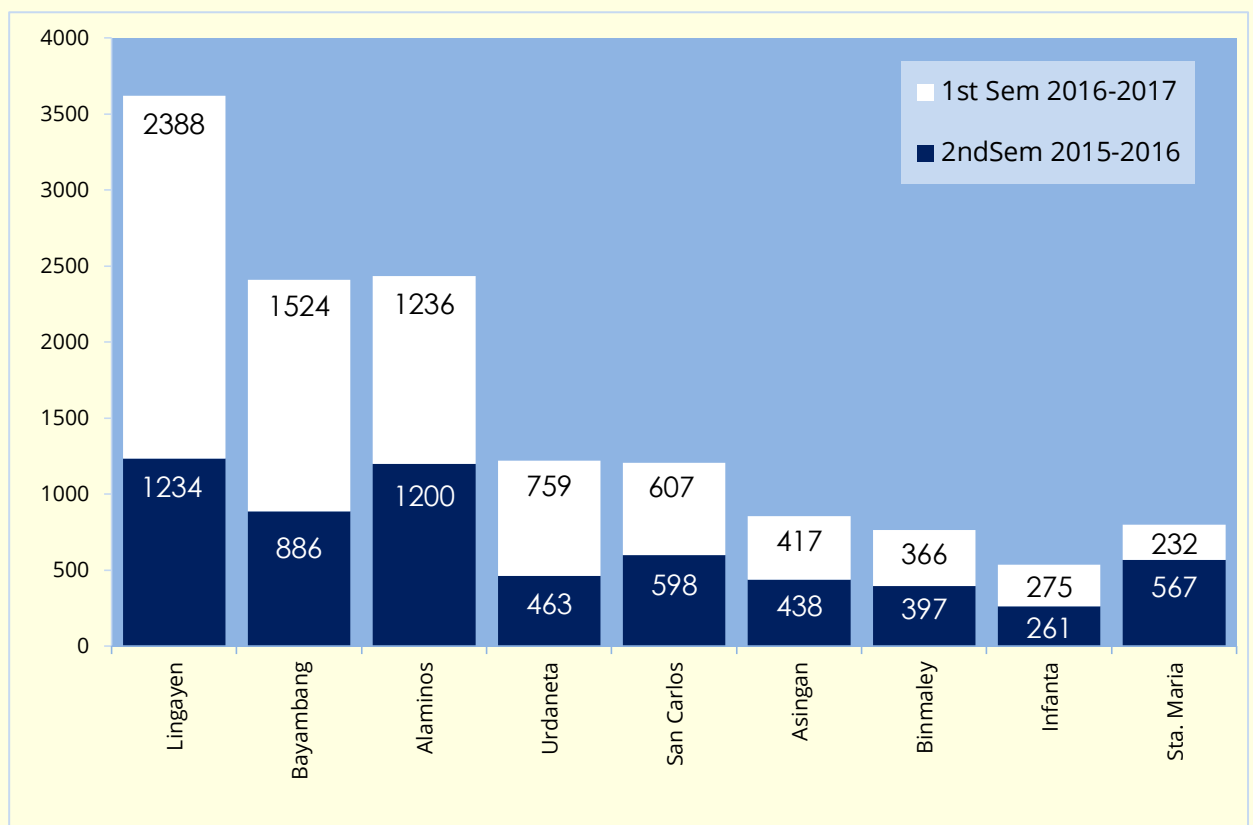
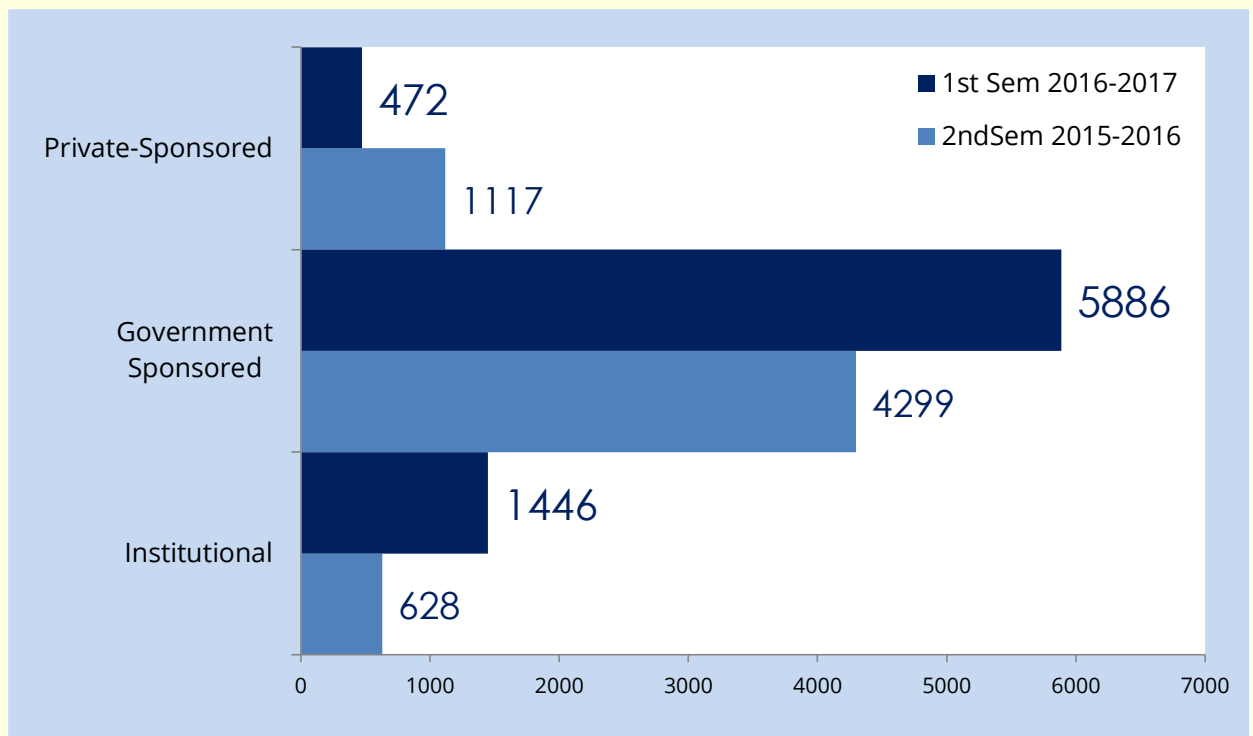
Faculty Profile by Educational Attainment



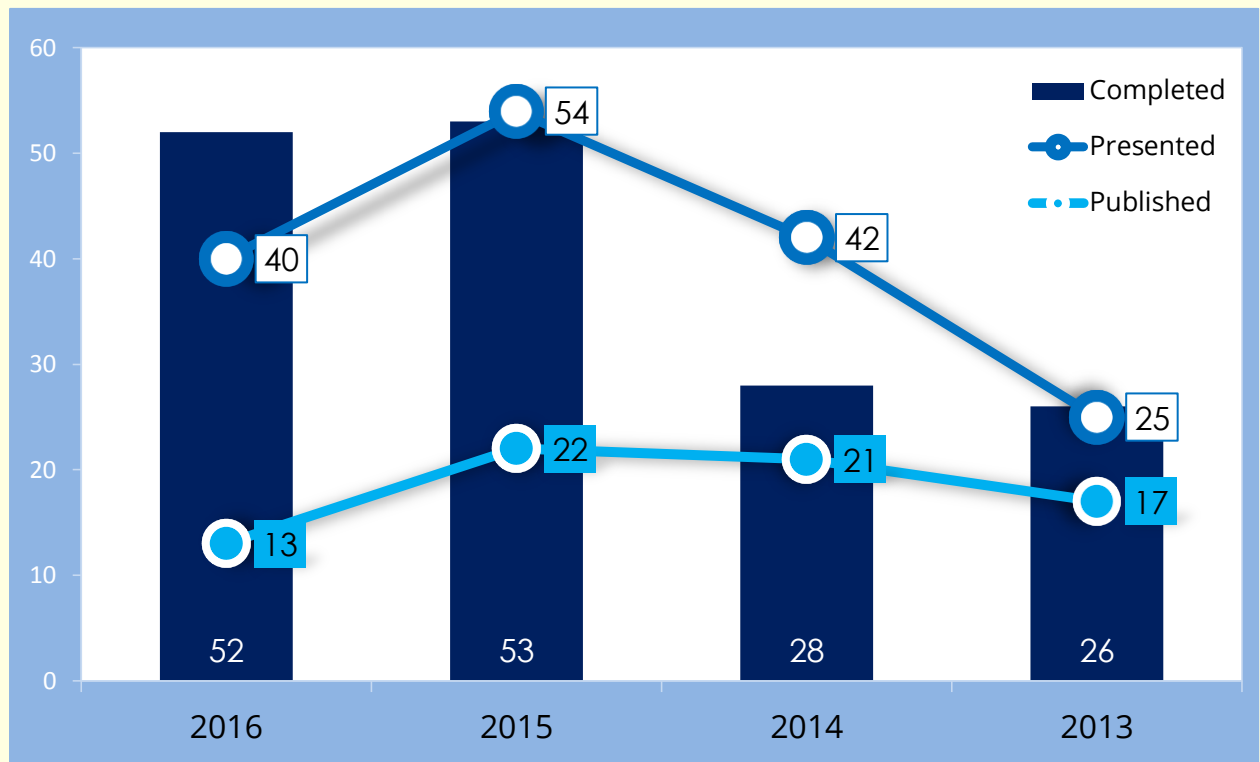

EXCELLENT STUDENT LEARNING AND CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Graduates AY 2015-2016



Pangasinan State University conducted its 37th Commencement Exercises anchored on the theme “Transformative PSUnians: Responsive to ASEAN Excellence” last June 22 and 24, 2016 with 4,399 graduates marching to get their precious diploma at the CSI Stadia in Dagupan City. Commission on Election (COMELEC) Commissioner Luie Tito F. Guia and Congressman of 6th District Pangasinan Leopoldo N. Bataoil were the Commencement Speakers, respectively.

University President Dexter R. Buted addressed the morning batch of graduating students from PSU Lingayen, Infanta, Urdaneta City and Alaminos City campuses along with the Expanded Tertiary Education Equivalency and Accreditation Program (ETEEAP). Commissioner Guia, COMELEC Chairperson of the Committee on Detainee Voting, the Committee on Voting by Indigenous People, the Committee on International Relations and the Random Manual Audit for the 2016 Presidential Elections, addressed the afternoon batch of graduates coming from PSU Asingan, Bayambang, San Carlos City, Sta. Maria and Binmaley campuses. Further, Hon. Bataoil exhorted the graduating students coming from the Open University System (OUS) and School of Advanced Studies (SAS) on June 24, 2016 at the Sison Auditorium, Lingayen. Bataoil is a Congressman in the 6th District of Pangasinan who ran unopposed, assuring the continuity of the high quality public service in his last and third term.

For Academic Year 2015-2016, the SAS produced 42 students from the doctorate programs in Education (EdD) and Development Studies (PhD), while the OUS yielded 24 students in Education (EdD). For the masterate level, 66 finished their respective MAEd/MS and MDM courses in the SAS and 72 from the OUS in the same graduate program.

In the undergraduate level, there were 4,108 students who graduated in their respective degree programs. The programs with the most number of graduates include the Bachelor in Secondary Education (BSE) with 813, Bachelor of Science in Business Management/Administration

(BSBM/BSBA) with 695 and Bachelor of Science in Information & Communications Technology (BSICT) with 520.

Furthermore, Lingayen and Bayambang campuses rendered the highest number of graduating students with 1,351 or 31% and 788 or 19 % of the entire graduating population.



In the Expanded Tertiary Education Equivalency and Accreditation Program (ETEEAP), 80 students graduated in the masterate level (MDM major in Public Administration) while 40 students finished their respective baccalaureate degrees in the different fields of specialization such as teacher education, industrial technology and fisheries.

The University produced 19 students with latin honors, four (4) of whom are magna cum laude from Lingayen campus while the rest are cum laude honorees from Bayambang with ten, Alaminos with two, Asingan, Binmaley and Lingayen with one each.

PSU produces 2016 circle of Topnotchers

Pangasinan State University (PSU) produced six (6) topnotchers this 2016 in the Electrical Engineering, Teacher Education, and Fisheries Licensure Examinations.

PSU Urdaneta City Campus registered 100% passing rate for the first time takers in Electrical Engineering and 93.33% overall rating. Also, a 96.43% overall rating in the Master Electrician examination was achieved based on the results released on September 7, 2016 by the Professional Regulation Commission.

Out of 4,115 electrical engineering graduates who took the licensure examination only 2,817 passed recording a 68.46% national passing percentage. Engr. William M. Noces, a DOST Scholar is among the examinees who conquered the grueling examinations obtaining 91.10% that placed him in the Top 2 spot. Also, Engr. Jhayson M. Onza landed in the 8th spot with 89.40% passing rate.



In the Master Electrician Examination, national passing percentage registered 68.08% where only 2,525 passed out of 3,709. Engr. Javlin D. Badua earned 90.50% with only 0.5% close to the 5th post. Engr. Noces also finished in the 10th spot with 88.50 rating.

Meanwhile, two licensed professional teachers of PSU entered the list of topnotchers for the September 2016 Licensure Examination for Teachers (LET) Elementary level. John Paul M. Flores, also a graduate of PSU Urdaneta City Campus, garnered a rating of 87.40% that placed him as top 4 together with Evangeline D. Dupale, a graduate of PSU Asingan, who landed as top 5 with 87.20%.

A total of 23,378 elementary teachers in the country out of 77,466 (30.18%) successfully passed the recently released results of LET.

Aquino ranks 6th in Fisheries Technologist Board exam

Pangasinan State University - Binmaley campus has set another milestone after this year's pride Michelle Grace B. Aquino ranked 6th in the 2016 PRC Fisheries Technologists Licensure examination held last October 13-14, 2016 in Manila.

Aquino is one of the anticipated BS Fisheries graduate to top this year's Licensure examination with 85.50 percent passing rate. Binmaley campus is producing board topnotchers in the said licensure examination for the last three consecutive years. Acclaimed as the most intelligent student of her batch, Aquino was named as the Gawad Parangal Awardee in campus level and placed 5th in rank during the search for "Gawad Parangal para sa mga Natatanging Mag-aaral ng PSU 2015." The said recognition was launched to recognize graduating students who best exemplifies PSUnian values and exhibits academic achievements beyond par excellence.

Pangasinan State University registered 46.15% University over-all passing rate surpassing the 32.85% national passing rate. The PRC and Board of Fisheries Technologists released the complete list of passers and topnotchers four working days after the examination with a total of 457 passers out of 1391 examinees. Also, 11 fresh BSF batch of graduates and 13 of the previous BSF batch of graduates passed the said exam.

Further, it can be recalled that Aquino was the former associate Editor of the Aquasounds, the official student publication of PSU Binmaley campus.

Achievements of students have fortified the status of PSU Binmaley Campus being the Center of Excellence in Fisheries and as one of the best fisheries institution in the country. Producing a total of 10 topnotchers since its humble beginnings, to name four in 2015; one in 2006 and in 2007; two in 2012 with Lemark M. Bautista who is now a faculty of PSU-BC, clutched the first rank and Marco Polo F. Dela Cruz who ranked 5th; Dante Mendoza who ranked 3rd in 2015; and recently, Michelle Grace B. Aquino who, placed 6th.

PSU honors exemplary students in Gawad Parangal

Eleven (11) outstanding students from their respective PSU campuses were honored and given recognition for their perseverance and resiliency in realizing their dreams during the University-

wide search for exemplary students who excels in academics and extra-curricular activities last May 3.

This year's Gawad Parangal para sa mga Natatanging Mag-aaral ng PSU held at the Calasiao Municipal Complex aimed to provide excellent student learning and career development reflected the university's strategic goals in achieving its vision to become an ASEAN Premier State University in 2020.

Moreover, three students were given the privilege to receive specials awards; this includes Mark Joel Aguila, BS Criminology student tagged as the "Proactive Regent of Binmaley" for the Leadership award; Gyann Garcia, BS ICT student tagged as the "Star Diva of Lingayen" for the Cultural award; and Michael John Ocampo tagged as the "Rolling Spiker of PSU" for the Sports award. Each remarkable students received a specially designed Trophy, Certificate of Recognition and a cash prize from the PSU administration.

Mark Marlon de Vera dubbed as the "Genius Scribe of Lingayen" emerged as the "Pinakanatatanging Mag-aaral ng PSU", second recipient of the said award since its launching in 2015. De Vera, a BS Mathematics student, a DOST scholar and is the current Editor-in-chief of CAST Chronicle, the official student publication of PSU Lingayen. Even so, he never imagined that he could play along with numbers and letters. He has received notable awards and also competed in the regional and national levels where he won several awards and considers every problem and drawback as a blessing.

Ranked second is Anabelle Lictao, dubbed as the "Student-Mom of Sta. Maria" is a BSEd English student and the Editor-in-Chief of the Golden Harvest. Lictao experienced unimaginable parts in her life after giving birth to two girls at the age of 16. After being abandoned by the father of her children, she remained resilient and held unto her dreams for the sake of her daughters.

John Mark Haban, AB English student tagged as the "Speech Master of Urdaneta" who is active in public speaking and social communications is the third recipient of the award. Haban believed that his life merely consisted of daily persistence. He was born and raised in Mindanao where his life was nothing but bleak. His father is a farmer and a carpenter while his mother is a plain housewife. But amidst the unfathomable plight of his family, he found comfort and solace in preaching.

The remaining awardees included Royet Cayabyab, a BSE Mathematics student tagged as the "Brain Builder of Bayambang" who had countless leadership awards; Vielarie Maye Gulla, a BSE Social Studies student who at a young age became dependent on herself and is further dubbed as the "Ink Icon of San Carlos"; Maria Corazon Juliano, a BSE English student dubbed as the "Igorotang Achiever of Asingan" who experienced being bullied and embarrassed because of her complexion but it never brought her guard down; Audiezza Radoc, the "Pen Magnet of Alaminos" is a BSE English student who is a product of perseverance and the eldest among her four



siblings; and Divine Reine Aquino, who graduated as Cum Laude with a degree in Fisheries dubbed as the “Aqua Wizard of Binmaley”.

Hon. Mark Roy Macanlalay, Municipal Mayor of Calasiao graced the occasion along with CHED Commissioner, Alex Brillantes Jr. and CHED RO1 Director, Cherrie Melanie Diego. Moreover, University President Dexter R. Buted commended the awardees for giving honor and pride to PSU and their respective families.

The 11 awardees were chosen based on their academic achievements, general leadership contributions and sheer quantity of service activities.

Raising the bar

CHED grants COEs to PSU

Two flagship programs of Pangasinan State University were granted the Center of Excellence (COE) status in Region 1 by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED).

The Fisheries program of PSU Binmaley campus has been granted the Center of Excellence status along with University of the Philippines - Visayas, Central Luzon State University, Western Philippines University, Zamboanga State College of Marine Science and Technology and Mindanao State University – Naawan Campus on December 23, 2015.



Likewise, the Teacher Education program of PSU Bayambang Campus also earned Center of Excellence status along with Mariano Marcos State University in Region 1 issued last March 31, 2016.

This is in accordance with the pertinent provisions of Republic Act (RA) 7722, otherwise known as the “Higher Education Act of 1994”, and by virtue of the Commission en Banc Resolution No. 193-2016 dated March 14, 2016 for the purpose of establishing COEs and CODs that will serve as potent catalysts for world class scholarships, best practices, innovative curriculum, research and extension and professional development in Teacher Education program. Included in the list are University of the Philippines - Diliman, Ateneo de Zamboanga University and De La Salle University-Das Mariñas, among others.

The grant of the said COE for Teacher Education in Bayambang campus as stated in the CHED Memorandum Orders No. 17 series 2016 for Teacher Education is valid from April 1, 2016 to December 31, 2018. Likewise, the grant of the COE for Fisheries in Binmaley campus is valid for three years effective January 1, 2016.

12 Curricular Programs pass accreditation

Twelve (12) programs of four campuses of Pangasinan State University passed various phases of accreditation conducted by the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACUP) on two different occasions.

PSU Bayambang campus subjected two programs for evaluation on September 5-9, 2016. Also, the following are the number of programs for each campus which were evaluated last December 5-10, 2016: three for Asingan campus, five for Lingayen campus, and one for Urdaneta City campus. The AB English Language program was evaluated on December 19th.

PSU President, Dr. Dexter R. Buted, emphasized the University's quest towards excellence in instruction, research, extension and production. Improvement of the quality of education and public accountability has been stressed in the statement of purpose during the opening program of AACUP Accreditation held last December 6, 2016.

To note, the following were the programs for each campus which had successfully passed the accreditation: *Bayambang campus* - **Level IV** Bachelor in Elementary Education and Bachelor of Secondary Education; *Asingan campus* - **Level II** Bachelor of Science in Education, Bachelor in Elementary Education, BS Information Technology; *Lingayen campus* - **Level I** BS Computer Science, BS Information Technology, and BS Hospitality Management; **Level II** BS Business Administration and Bachelor in Public Administration; **Level III** AB English Language; *Urdaneta City campus* - **Level II** BS Mechanical Engineering.

Conduct of the said accreditation seeks to confirm if the programs have substantially achieved its objectives, contributory in attaining quality education, proposing funding and other support, levelling program's standards of excellence, and reviewing administrative decision-making.

The following ten areas were assessed: I – Vision, Mission, Goals, and Objectives, II - Faculty, III – Curriculum and Instruction, IV – Support to Students, V – Research, VI – Extension and Community Services, VII – Library, VIII – Physical Plant and Facilities, IX – Laboratories, and X – Administration.



AACCUP awards BEED, BSED Level IV Phase I Accreditation Status

PSU Bayambang Campus was awarded the Level IV Phase I accreditation status for its college of Teacher Education Programs by the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP) last October 11, 2016.

Through the joint efforts of the faculty, students and different stakeholders of PSU, the Bachelor of Elementary Education (BEED) and Bachelor of Secondary Education (BSED) programs Bayambang Campus garnered grand means of 4.51 and 4.50, respectively to finally secure a spot among the only six State Universities and Colleges with such status starting from September 16, 2016 until September 15, 2016.

Renovation of the Accreditation room, library and updating of documents were done in the pursuit of Level 4 Phase 1 as well as provision of LED TVs in every classroom and computer sets in every department, proofs of the all-out support of this hardworking innovative President, Dr. Dexter R. Buted.

Because there are only few SUC's under Level IV, privileges are to be enjoyed by the graduates of BSED and BEED programs in Bayambang Campus. One of which is that when graduates of the University will apply for a job, they will earn higher points than graduates of other universities with lower levels of accreditation.

AACCUP sent seven accreditors from all over the country to conduct the 4th survey visit for the two programs on September 5-9, 2016 spearheaded by AACCUP Overall Coordinator Dr. Thelma C. Lanuza of Isabela State University, together with Dr. Leticia O. Gano also from ISU; Dr. Noralyn M. Natura and Dr. Corazon M. Cudia of Nueva Viscaya State University; Dr. Leoncio M. Matibag of South Luzon State University; Dr. Laureana M. Lingan of Cagayan State University; and Prof. Recardo G. Elizalde of Western Mindanao State University.

Among the ten (10) Area evaluated, Area 6 and 7 came out to earn many recommendations from the accreditors such as inadequate number of books in the library and impact studies of the different extension services.

PSU curricular programs undergo Preliminary Survey Visit

The Accrediting Agency for Chartered Colleges and Universities (AACCUP) has conducted Preliminary Survey Visit (PSV) of the ten (10) curricular programs of the PSU campuses on April 12-13, 2016.

PSU campuses in Alaminos City, Binmaley, San Carlos City and Urdaneta City underwent evaluation in order for their programs to be awarded a candidate status.

University President Dexter Buted, said that with these initiatives being undertaken, PSU is a step closer towards the realization of its vision of becoming an ASEAN State University in 2020.

The preliminary survey visit is primarily documents-focused which shall cover at least three years before the desired visit. Moreover, the result of the evaluation in the ten areas will determine the level of readiness of an academic program to be accredited.

PSU hosts 2nd International Academic Summit

Pangasinan State University hosted the 2nd International Academic Summit with the theme, "ASEAN U-LINK: Sustainable Partnership for Cross Border Convergence" wherein representatives from Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) of the ASEAN (Association of Southeast Asian Nations) member countries converged on June 28-30, 2016 for a comprehensive academic discussion and sharing of best practices in education necessary in setting standards for educational institutions in the region.

The three-day summit kicked-off at Don Leopoldo Sison Convention Center, Alaminos City, where 150 University officials, directors and students from HEIs in Thailand, Indonesia and from State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) in the Philippines participated. A cultural exchange highlighting the diverse heritage and artistry of various ASEAN cultures was also undertaken.

Mirador leaps for Gold

Failures in the past did not stop triple jumper Janine M. Mirador of PSU Infanta campus to win the gold at the 2016 SCUAA –I Meet held at the Narciso Ramos Sports and Civic Center.

Already in her last year in the University, Mirador's last jump attempt roared ending her drought of success as she sets her new best record at 9.93 meters. She started with a bad jump recorded as fault, nonetheless, managed to make a rise from the ground. Her recorded jumps were 9.64 meters and 9.36 meters in the second and third jumps, respectively.

This was the first gold of the lady jumper in her entire 4-year athletic stint. She also made a name for herself and the Infanta campus for being the first lady triple jumper who joined the national games in Batangas City. Likewise, Mirador landed silver in the long jump for women with her 4.60 meters record.

Alvin Caasi, a two-time SCUAA gold medalist has battled back from 2015's loss as he regained his throne in the men's high jump category during the SCUAA 2016 Regional games held at the Narciso Ramos Sports and Civic Center in Lingayen, Pangasinan.

Caasi was able to overpower University of Northern Philippines' Joshua Paiste as he set a record of 1.85 meters, thus, eliminating 11 rivals from other competing universities. This year's competition is the last chance of Caasi to reclaim his title as he is in his senior year, a goal he triumphantly attained.

It has been reported that members of the genus *Polymesoda* were resilient to adverse environmental conditions hence potential candidate species for aquaculture amidst this era of climate change.

Dulos co-chairs Canada research forum

Dr. Cristeta C. Dulos, College Dean of the Teacher Education and Technology of Lingayen Campus, shared expertise in research as one of the co-chairs and plenary speakers in the 2nd International Conference on Advances in Education, Teaching and Technology with the presentation of “The Local Erasmus Mundus Program of Pangasinan State University: A Response to ASEAN and Global Engagement” held on July 18-19, 2016 in Ryerson University, Toronto, Canada.

The research paper is based from the European Region Action Scheme for the Mobility of University Students (ERASMUS), a student exchange program in Europe, being adopted and localized in the Philippines in response to the projected student mobility in 2015 as envisioned in ASEAN cooperation of tagging one community and one identity. Pangasinan State University is a member of the National Network of Normal Schools (3Ns) in the Philippines which spearheads the said project. Furthermore, it was designed to contribute in the enhancement of students' career prospects and in the sustainable development of teacher education in the country.

Dr. Dulos presented the study to 78 participants composed of educators, graduate students, and researchers coming from different countries. Along with Dr. Dulos as plenary speaker was Prof. Michael Kyobe of South Africa with his study entitled “Empowering Education and Teaching through Technology-Present Challenges and Future Prospects.”

Mud Crab Hatchery Project

New project is set to rise in Alaminos City early in 2017 called as the *“Improved Commercial Scale Mud Crab Hatchery/Nursery System for Alaminos City, Pangasinan”* with a ground-breaking and launching event which happened on November 26, 2016.

The project is a 5-million mud crab hatchery that would be first of its kind in Northern Luzon to run by a local government unit as said by Virna Salac, the National Coordinator of DOST-PCARRD. She added that the hatchery in Alaminos City will service mud crab grow out producers in the private sector.

Dr. Rolando Cerezo, PSU Director for Special Projects and Project Leader of Mud Crab Hatchery, stated that they would use king crab as breeders that can produce 480,000 crablets per year once the hatchery is operational in a 500 square-meter lot.

PSU will supervise the project and will train technicians from the local government unit of Alaminos City.

ACCET recognizes PSU research papers

Pangasinan State University (PSU) presented two winning research papers that outbested others in the recently concluded World Conference on Educational Leadership and Management (WCELM) hosted by Asian Center for Continuing Education and Training (ACCET) Inc.

WCELM was held on August 27-29, 2016 at Venecia Hotel, Subic, Olongapo City that aimed to provide an avenue in the dissemination of cutting edge research outputs in a wide range of discipline.

Dr. Adonis S. Bautista, Dean of School of Advanced Studies, awarded 1st with the research paper entitled *“Operations Manual for the Binalatongan Community College”* aligned on technology and health category in pursuit of the theme, *“Essential leadership skills for Effective and Vibrant 21st Century Schools and Universities.”*

PSU 1st Quadcopter takes off for maiden flight



Only few people know what a quadcopter is all about. But the truth, drones have been used by many various industries for some years already. This technological invention accomplishes stunning feats which proves to be beneficial just like in search and rescue operation after natural calamity strikes.

Quadcopters are mainly used in aerial shooting. This is done by installing small camera supported by a gimbal beneath the drone. No wonder, we are often amazed by movies that use sophisticated technology such as this one to take show different angles of a certain scene.

Drones are also excellent research platforms for university students, especially for engineers in order to gain knowledge and experiment theories in different field, much as aeronautics and robotics.

Quadcopters, short for quadrotor helicopter, are multicolour helicopter propelled by four rotors. Seven students from the College of Engineering in Urdaneta campus developed the first quadcopter named "Toothless II," under the supervision of Engr. Roderick L. Calaguio, one of the instructors in the said department.

Nearly Php15,000.00 was spent for this object. Most of the materials were purchased through online shopping and were shipped from different shops in Metro Manila. A considerable amount of time was spent in choosing the materials, considering the structure of the drone.



Toothless II is different from most commercially available quadcopter. The materials were purchased separately, in contrast with the commercially available quadcopter kits, where virtually all parts are already included and designed to be compatible with each other.

It is worth mentioning also that Toothless II was manually assembled. According to Engineer Calaguio, the main frame is unique, as it's carefully crafted from as slab of aluminium. The

remaining parts of the overall frame came from recycled materials. Moreover, the circuit board for the flight controller was specifically designed too.

Its name Toothless II was named after Hiccup's Night Fury, Toothless in the movie, and how to train your Dragon. Toothless II was designed and developed by Eusebelle Zebedee D. Cayabyab, Khayzelle C. Cayabyab, Irene B. Combes, Phil Daven T. Diana, Mark John Paul Z. Francisco, Marelle Klein A. Maramag, and Junamel Ann C. Pagador.

To advocate environmental preservation and protection to the community, PSU Lingayen campus initiated the Mangrove planting project last April 26 as part of the university's mandate to adhere to its extension function in empowering the community to care for the environment.

According to Dr. Armando Junio, Campus Executive Director of PSU Lingayen, the said activity is a joint project of the Province of Pangasinan and the Municipalities of Binmaley and Lingayen that

will serve as an investment for the future generation in contributing environmental responsiveness and alleviating the effects of climate change.

Thousands of mangrove seedlings were planted in the coastal areas of Capandanan in Lingayen and Naguilayan in Binmaley which were identified by the Provincial Agriculture Office and Lingayen Agriculture Office as beneficiaries of the environmental protection that Mangrove planting provides. Local government officials, PSU employees, students, scholars of the provincial government and other stakeholders also joined the meaningful endeavour.

The students also expressed their love for nature by participating in the featured activities organized by the PSU Lingayen campus which included the Unity walk, chant for a clean environment, and the poster and slogan making contests held at the university covered court.

Mangrove plants produce trunks that contain mid-air roots which become fixed in the mud and form a tangled arrangement; this serves as a support for the tree and as a means of ventilating the root system. Because of the Mangrove's strong woody roots, it can also act as a buffer for strong winds and waves during intense tropical storms and hurricanes. It holds the soil and protects the shoreline during heavy periods of rainfall, stabilizing the shoreline remains, and reducing soil erosion. It has island forming capabilities.

Aside from the environmental protection that Mangroves provide, it can also be a great source of income. Mangrove forests are home to large variety of fish, crab, shrimp, among others. These fisheries form an essential source of food for the coastal communities.

Prof. Wilma Noble, Mr. Phillip Montano, Mr. Noli Maquio, Mr. Rogel Ballito and Mr. Mark Allen Mores, the PSU Infanta Campus implemented a project called “Natural Swine Farming and Farming System for Native Pig Production” which aims to promote sustainable livelihood through natural pig farming for the constituents of Western Pangasinan. The project will help in improving the ways of raising native pigs by disseminating information about feeding systems, construction of housing for pigs, controlling and treating swine diseases and breeding of swine.

With the establishment of facilities that will help in taking care of the native swine, its quality will be better and the demand in the market will help in taking care of the native swine, its quality will be better and the demand in the market will increase. In this way, the farmers who were encouraged will earn more money. With natural farming, it will be less expensive for the farmers in the sense that they don't have to buy expensive feeds for their native swine to get the nutrient that they need. PSU SM conduct Tutorial Outreach Project for Day Care Newbies and Mommies

One of the rights of the children, as defined by the United Nation Convention on the Rights of Child (UNCRC), is the right for education. Every child in our community starting from the age of three years old is entitled to enter day care center to develop their skills and values. It is in this stage that children are at their crucial development of cognitive abilities and values, so careful attention and wide understanding are the essential elements needed when you are teaching them.

As a university known for its strong commitment in providing the needs of community, Pangasinan State University Sta. Maria Campus established a collaborating project entitled, “AGAP”: A tutorial outreach project for day care and their mommies.

This extension project is created in partnership with Namagbagan Day Care Center of Sta. Maria Pangasinan, with the help of the day care worker, Mrs. Maribel M. Careno, and the teacher's education department of Pangasinan State University Sta. Maria campus (PSU-SMC). It aims to provide free tutorial that will increase the capability of pupils in literacy and numeracy and to provide pupils in the nearby communities the privilege of quality education, as the Namagbagan Day Care Center mandated to promote intellectual, physical, spiritual, social and socio economic development of its pupils.

As of the requirements of the subject of Remedial Instruction in English, the BSEd III – English students stood as the teachers of the pupils in the entire duration of extension project. Before their actual teaching, the student-teachers were first oriented and were given series of trainings by their subject teachers and Extension project leaders, Mrs. Jennylyn M. Bibal.

DayCare Tutorial

The tutorial project lasted for one month, starting on 5th day of July until the 28th day of the same month. The student-teachers and children meet twice a week and before the tutorials start, the children were first given various activities like dance exercises which serves as energizers to set the children's mood. After which the student-teachers facilitate the children to form a single line, with hands placed in their backs, as they enter their classroom and begin their learning session. This practice will minimize excess movements from the children and will increase their self-control and discipline. Each tutorial session was composed of storytelling activity through an Audio-Visual Presentation about fables and fairy tales which were performed by the Student-teachers. After the lesson, the children were given activities regarding the story. Activities includes tracing lines and coloring activity. The children were then guided by their student-teachers as they accomplish their task.

Each tutorial session lasted for one hour. If ever the children did not finish their activity, they could bring it home and submit it the following day.

After a week of tutorial inside the classroom, the children and the student-teachers were divided into two groups: each group was given a poem to be performed on the culminating activity. Group 1 was the Bumble Bee group and group 2 was the Angel group. Student-teachers of each group collaborated and taught the children how to master the piece.

After a week-long training, children successfully performed at the Nutrition Month Celebration held at the covered court of Sta. Maria Pangasinan on July 28, 2016.

Mommies' Time

While the children were busy learning, their mommies also had a learning session headed by the extension project leader, Mrs. Jennylyn M. Bibal. She taught them how to make a follow up in the activities of what their children were doing during the tutorial session when they are already at home.

This project does not only focus in developing children's ability in literacy and numeracy but also in promoting a good communication among the participants. First, it gave fulfilment for the student-teachers who serve as their coach for the entire period of this project, secondly, it built camaraderie between the parents and the student-teachers and between the children and student-teachers, lastly and most specially it was an opportunity for the student-teachers to touch the life of the children that may made them a better person as they grow up.

PSU-SC conducts Extension program

Pangasinan State University San Carlos (PSU-SC) conducted an extension program with the theme: Environmental Issues: Steward for change held at barangay Naguilayan, San Carlos City Pangasinan on July 19, 2016.

The extension activity was led by the PSU-SC instructors, Mr. Randy Soriano, Mr. Lazaro Millanes and Mrs. Judith Calangian and aimed to promote awareness on environmental issues and solutions.

Dr. Balbina R. Gutierrez (Coordinator Extension Services), Mr. Lorenzo Crus (Brgy. Captain of Naguilayan, San Carlos City) and Ms. Lourdes R. Pinto (General Services Officer, LGU San Carlos City), gave their welcome address.

Extension Department conducts Forage Production Technology Seminar

To develop and extend Forage-related solutions to livestock farmers, PSU Infanta conducted a seminar on forage production technology for small farmers last November 17, 2016.

Dr. Naominada C. Olermo, Campus Executive Director, delivered her lecture on forage production technology which aimed to address some problems regarding poor nutrition among animals' especially small ruminants.

According to Mr. James Paul Labindao, Project Coordinator on Developing Forage Technologies in Western Pangasinan, livestock farmers usually depend on the availability of forage resources on surroundings to feed their animals such as grass lands, weeds, crop production, residues and other sources which usually do not provide adequate nutrients essential for animal growth and development.

Procedures of the establishments of affordable or low-cost model forage farm that small holder farmers can adopt to their own areas and propagation and promotion of recommended forage grasses and legumes suited for Western Pangasinan were also discussed during the seminar.

The seminar was attended by farmers, livestock raisers of selected towns in Western Pangasinan, personnel coming from the local office of the Department of Agriculture and other stake holders.

This activity was spearheaded by Prof. Wilma S. Noble, Extension coordinator, with the assistance of Prof. Procerfina D. Vingua, Mrs. Menchie Pagud and Mr. Philip Montano, faculty members of the Agriculture Department.

SG 3 **GOOD GOVERNANCE**

Institutionalizing Quality Management System in PSU

Key Principles of Quality Management System

Performance improvement is at optimum importance in every organization. It introduces the influence to set a basis for quality management. The concept of quality management was developed in the Industrial age throughout the 19th century and for the most of 20th. There are principles evolved in quality management which served as a foundation of organizations to guide their performances' improvement.

According to the International Organization for Standardization or ISO, the main rationale of quality management system is to understand the current and future needs and expectations of customers in an organization's products and/or services. The establishments of quality policy and quality objectives are some of those key directions to provide focus in achieving the desired result to meet customer's satisfaction. Aligned policies, processes, strategies, and resources enable organization's leaders to create the unity of purpose and direction in which organization's people are engaged. Therefore, shared values, fairness and ethical models for behavior at all levels of the organization are created and sustained.

The quality management system consists of interrelated processes. Processes being employed within an organization are systematically identified and managed through the process approach for consistency and predictability of performance. Current levels of performance of an organization is able to maintain or better improve if it reacts to changes in its internal and external environment. Improvement is essential to create new ideas and opportunities. Evidence-based decision making leads to greater objectivity and confidence for better understanding of cause-and-effect relationships with all of its interested parties e.g. partner networks to optimize its impact.

Government Quality Management Program

In the Philippine government per se, quality management is seen for institutionalization to effect actual improvements in public governance. ISO standards ensures the consistency of quality processes in manifestation of products and services guarantee to the public as support to the implementation of government quality management program. It is mandated under Administrative Order No. 161 or otherwise known as the "Institutionalizing Quality Management Systems in Government" amended by Executive Order 605.

The objectives of government quality management program are as follows:

- 1) promote and enhance public sector performance through the adoption of ISO quality management system in all agencies of government most importantly to Government - Owned and/or -Controlled Corporations (GOCCs), Local Government Units (LGUs), State Universities and Colleges (SUCs), Judiciary and Legislative departments, and Constitutional offices;
- 2) develop an institutional infrastructure that provide certification with international accreditation;
- 3) establish the citizen's charter of key government offices and;

- 4) recognize citizen-driven government organizations that have attained ISO certification for other government agencies to emulate.

PSU's Quality Management System

SUC has a vital role of providing a quality education in the development of quality nation capable of transcending the socioeconomic issues that constrain the country's human development, productivity and global competitiveness. Pertinent provisions of the 1987 Philippine Constitution assert that the State "*shall protect and promote the right of all citizens to quality education at all levels...*" (Article XIV Section 1); "*establish, maintain, and support a complete, adequate, and integrated system of education relevant to the needs of the people and society*" (Article XIV Section 2); and "*exercise reasonable supervision and regulation of all educational institutions*" (Article XIV Section). These provisions are reiterated in Batas Pambansa Bilang 232 and Republic Act 7722 otherwise known as the Higher Education Act of 1994. Meanwhile, the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) issued Memorandum Order No. 46, s. 2012 or the "*Policy-Standard to Enhance Quality Assurance in Philippine Higher Education through an Outcomes-Based and Typology-Based Quality Assurance*" to enhance the quality assurance system of higher education institutions in the country through learning competency based standards and an outcomes-based system of quality assurance.

Therefore, SUC's quality management system ensures quality education for students with an adequate support services to their curricula and effective trainings in the academe and in the employment contexts. It also builds more resilient communities that makes a lasting impact in the forefront of socioeconomic growth of the nation.

PSU as the premier SUC in the region is committed to develop highly principled, morally upright, innovative and globally competent individuals capable of meeting the needs of industry, public service and civil society. In support, PSU has adopted the ISO Standards for the institutionalization of government quality management program and pursuant to the CHED Memorandum Order No. 46, s. 2012. The quality management system of the University covers the four fold provision of tertiary services in Lingayen Campus, e.g. instruction, research, extension and production. The university level management processes, performance evaluation and improvement processes, and campus support services are also included in the scope.

The Project Phases

PSU undergone four project phases in preparation for the quality assurance audit with the service of Rosehall Management Consultants Incorporated. The aforesaid corporation is engaged in consulting and training services on Total Quality Management and establishment of Management Systems for certification to standards like the ISO 9001:2015.

Phase 1: Assessment, Training and Planning.

The Rosehall facilitates workshops on the management responsibilities of the University Team and guides in setting up of functional goals and objectives.

Phase 2. System Development and Documentation

The Consultant assigned conducts visits to guide the University in the establishment of quality management system in accordance to the requirements of the ISO 9001.

Phase 3. System Implementation, Monitoring and Auditing

The documented management system is implemented. Rosehall conducts a training session on Internal Audit and consults visits to check on the implementation of the management system. The

consultant conducts supervised audit and guidance on corrective action planning for non-conformances.

Phase 4. System Certification

The University chooses a certifying body who will assess their quality management system against the ISO 9001 standard. After the certification assessment, Rosehall shall guide the University in planning for corrective actions on the non-conformances found.

The PSU Quality Policy

The Pangasinan State University shall be recognized as an ASEAN premier state university that provides quality education and satisfactory service delivery through instruction, research, extension and production.

We commit our expertise and resources to produce professionals who meet the expectations of the industry and other parties in the national and international community.

We shall continuously improve our operations in response to the changing environment and in support of the Institution's strategic direction.

PSU is now ISO 9001:2015 Certified

PSU President Dexter R. Buted, together with the entire PSU community, celebrated with so much pride when AJA Registrars Inc. has attested that PSU passed the quality assurance audit held on December 14, 2016 for the coveted ISO 9001:2015 Certification. The Seal of Excellence is expected to be awarded to PSU in 2017.

PSU established ISO Quality Management System in adherence to the Administrative Order No. 161 or otherwise referred to as the "Institutionalizing Quality Management System in Government" amended by Executive Order No. 605 as part of implementation of the Government Quality Management Program.

The PSU Board of Regents supported the endeavor through BOR Resolution No. 59E, s. 2015 during the regular board meeting on May 15, 2015. Further, Department of Budget and Management allocated a 3.5 million budget.

Requirements of ISO 9001:2015 were established under the scope of Quality Management System (QMS) covering the provision of tertiary education services in Lingayen Campus such as instruction, research, extension, and production. Also included within the scope are: university



level management processes, performance evaluation and improvement processes, and campus support services.

PSU's QMS was launched in Sison, Auditorium on October 3, 2016 attended by university officials, teaching and non-teaching personnel, and students. The Quality Management Committee was spearheaded by Dr. Manolito C. Manuel as Quality Management Representative, Prof. Elbert Galas as Internal Quality Auditor, Mr. Alex Mores as Deputy for QMS, and Dr. Ruby V. Rosa Cruz as Document Control Custodian, together with other PSU Officials.

Imperative to the CHED Memorandum Order No. 46, s. 2012 or the *"Policy-Standard to Enhance Quality Assurance in Philippine Higher Education through an Outcomes-Based and Typology-Based Quality Assurance,"* Quality Management Committee was responsible to the implementation and maintenance of the PSU Quality Management System for ISO certification.

Rosehall Management Consultants, Inc., an all-Filipino corporation engaged on Total Quality Management System training services, assisted PSU in preparation for the certification audit with the series of trainings, assessments, and consultations conducted.

PSU joins PHL Most Popular HEIs

Pangasinan State University (PSU) is now one of the frequent searched universities in the entire Philippines as evidenced of its ranking 58th in the country's Most Popular Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) in the Web Ranking Organization- University Ranking (uniRank).

UniRank formerly known as 4 International Colleges and Universities (4icu.org) is an international higher education search engine and directory that evaluates accredited HEIs in the world which include 12,358 colleges and universities in over 200 countries with the aim to provide an approximate popularity ranking of world Universities and Colleges based upon the popularity of the websites in terms of traffic, trust and quality link popularity.

Moreover, bases for HEI inclusion is dependent if Universities or Colleges: are officially recognized, licensed and/or accredited by national or regional bodies such as Ministries of Higher Education or recognized accrediting organizations depending on the country legislation; are officially entitled to grant at least four-year undergraduate degrees, such as Bachelor degrees, and/or postgraduate degrees; and provide higher education courses mainly in a traditional, face-to-face learning format through on-site facilities.

The ranking serves as an avenue for PSU to be known not just in the entire Philippines but also in the world. It encourages more HEIs and even international students to be part of PSU. Ranking was made upon an algorithm including five unbiased and independent web metrics extracted from four different web intelligence sources, namely: Moz Domain Authority, Alexa Global Rank, SimilarWeb Global Rank, Majestic Referring Domains and Majestic Trust Flow.

Evidently in two years of Dr. Buted's administration, the University has seen transformations in the physical and organizational facets which include establishment of academic buildings and other infrastructures, strengthening student learning and career development, modernization of university processes, development of strong research culture and technology. Recently, PSU had passed the Quality Assurance Audit for ISO 9001:2015.

Advancing Quality Governance in HEIs

Phil-HECS strengthens competencies of SUC Leaders, Aspirants

Improved quality of governance in Philippine Higher Education is expected as the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) operationalized this 2016 the Philippine Higher Education Career System (Phil-HECS) with the end goal of strengthening the competencies of incumbent SUC presidents and aspiring leaders.

Phil-HECS is the merit-based career system for leaders in SUCs pursuant to the pertinent provisions of RA 7722 or otherwise known as the "Higher Education Act of 1994," and in accordance to the CHED Special Order No. 26 creating the technical working group tasked for the institutionalization of the career system and, the Commission en banc adopted Resolution No. 714-2014 for the engagement of the Development Academy of the Philippines (DAP).

Said career system has two tracks: one is for the incumbent SUC presidents; and second is for the aspiring leaders. Former engaged SUC presidents on the trends, new government policies, and best practices of higher education management. Latter, however, prepared aspiring leaders to strengthen competencies for the advancement of quality governance of Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) intertwined with experiential learning activities.

Functional element dubbed Professional Advancement Program was implemented along the tracks with Presidential Leadership Program and Executive Development Program as two sub-programs intended for SUC Presidents and aspiring leaders, respectively.

Buted joins Presidential Leadership Program

PSU President, Dr. Dexter R. Buted attended two courses which form part of the Presidential Leadership Program, a continuing education program for incumbent SUC presidents to become effective and efficient leaders to their respective institution.

SUC presidents were provided a creative venue on the current and emerging trends in the HEIs through the conduct of the course entitled "Leading a globally competitive higher education institution" on July 28-30, 2016 at Limketkai Luxe Hotel in Cagayan de Oro City. Topics being discussed in the said course were: Transforming Higher Education through Information and Communications Technology; and Internationalization: Current Context and Challenges of Philippines HEIs.

Meanwhile, expectations on the quality of Instruction, Research, and Extension of the HEIs to achieve the status of Center of Excellence were focused on the course, "Nurturing a high-performing learning institution." The Course was conducted on November 16-18, 2016 with the following topics being discussed: People, Resources, and Systems: Steering the SUC towards Performance Management; and Quality Assurance in the Context of SUCs in the Philippines.

Dr. Buted said in an interview with the PRPIO that the Presidential Leadership Program opened opportunities for their growth as SUC presidents in relation to the advancement of quality governance in Philippine HEIs.

PSU, LGU Lingayen host Executive Development Program

PSU and the local government unit of Lingayen were one among the four municipalities and SUCs to hold the first batch of University Dynamics Laboratory (UDL) under the Executive Development Program held on November 21 to December 1, 2016.

Excerpt from Phil-HECS, UDL is an experiential learning activity designed to provide candidates with the opportunity to learn directly through model HEIs and their communities. It specifically intended to instill the value of social responsibility and accountability, develop competencies of aspiring SUC presidents and foster deeper understanding of the role of higher education institution towards societal transformation.

During the workshop, ten presidentiables were divided into five teams interchangeably partnered with the PSU Executives who are Dr. Dexter R. Buted, Dr. Gloria F. Domantay, Dr. Virgilio C. Barongan, Dr. Manolito C. Manuel, and Ms. Maria Corazon B. Puzon along the five-day shadowing activity. PSU Executives shared first-hand experiences of their roles and responsibilities to the candidates.

Among other locations of UDL were: Benguet State University - La Trinidad, Benguet; Central Luzon State University - Muñoz, Nueva Ecija; and Batangas State University – Batangas City.

SG 4 **SUSTAINABLE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITIES**

Coral Restoration, Crab Hatchery Projects: PSU's share to Pangasinan's Aquaculture Development

Pangasinan State University (PSU) as a higher education institution has a great impact to the contextual framework of building communities. One of the aligned commitments of PSU along with its four fold functions is to extend its hands and expertise in implementing projects that are contributory for the growth and development of grassroots lives.

In pursuit to this pledge, PSU tightened up partnership on aquaculture development projects with the Philippine Council for Agriculture, Forestry and Natural Resources, Research and Development (PCAARRD), a sectoral planning council of the Department of Science and Technology. The projects are coined "*Application of Coral Transplantation Technology to Improve Productivity of Coral Reef Resources for Responsible and Sustainable Fisheries and Harness Potentials of Alaminos City, Pangasinan for Underwater Tourism*" and "*Improved Commercial Scale Mud Crab Hatchery / Nursery System for Alaminos City, Pangasinan.*" These are being funded by the DOST-PCAARRD with the implementation of PSU and cooperation of the Local Government Unit (LGU) of Alaminos City, RVS4Star Inc., 702nd Brigade, Philippine Army and Sangkalikasan.

Coral Reef Transplantation Project

The coral reefs are said to be one of the most diverse and prolific ecological units in the globe which provide habitats to millions of marine species. Therefore, coral reefs significantly contribute to fisheries productivity. The state of Philippine coral reefs, however, is at risk as it suffers serious degradation and massive decline caused by human devious activities such as destructive fishing practices, overfishing and coastal developments. Moreover, global warming effects with the threats posed by natural calamities also contributed to ocean acidification and coral bleaching.

As a response for the enhancement of damaged reefs, mass regrowing of coral reefs was commenced in 2012 with the initiative of DOST-PCAARRD through the program entitled "*Roll-out of Coral Transplantation Technology Using Asexually Reproduced Coral to Improve Productivity of Coral Resources for Sustainable Fisheries and Enhance Competitiveness of Underwater Tourism*" with the implementation of various Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) across the country in cooperation of local government units. HEIs involved in the implementation are the University of San Carlos, Bicol University, Mindanao State University, Batangas State University, Bohol Island State University, Aklan State University, and Southern Leyte State University.

In 2014, DOST-PCAARRD contracted PSU and the LGU of Alaminos City to roll out the "*Application of Coral Transplantation Technology to Improve Productivity of Coral Reef Resources for Responsible and Sustainable Fisheries and Harness Potentials of Alaminos City, Pangasinan for Underwater Tourism Project*" in Mayor's Island, Hundred Islands National Park (HINP). There are 30,000 number of fragment for transplantation targeted for completion until the first quarter of 2017 through the use of coral nursery units (CNU) and nail and cable method technologies. The project also aims to identify and document potential stream of dive sites; develop a pool of human resources for coral restoration and eco-tourism that could jump-start coral restoration service industry; and promote science-based coral reef management.

People's Responsibility

As what the United Nations Development Institute once said, people are the subject of development. It is the people's participation which links inextricably with development. With this, people in the locality of Pangasinan have significant roles inclined with the Coral Reef Transplantation and Mud Crab Hatchery Projects toward achieving fisheries production sustainability in the locality – that is to be actively involved in all aspects of the management processes of the projects. Furthermore, the community people along coastal areas particularly the fisherfolks should be responsible of their fishing practices to avoid any obliteration that can cause or affect the productivity of the coastal waters.

Award-giving bodies credit Buted's contribution to Education

The PSU President was conferred the CMO Asia's Education Excellence Award and the Gawad Filipino Dangal ng Husay at Galing for his outstanding contribution to Education in 2016.

Dr. Dexter R. Buted received the said honors in recognition of his significant involvement to uphold excellent leadership as dynamic innovator and change-maker in the community. In his term, he steered PSU to greater purpose advocating reforms in the field of Education in response to the need of its service communities as clearly detailed in the University's eight strategic goals such as Excellent Student Learning and Career Development, Strong Research Culture and Technology Transfer, Good Governance, Sustainable Social Responsiveness, Quality Human Resource Management and Development, Efficient Management of Assets and Finances, Responsive to Globalization and Diversity and Customer Focus.

Dr. Naominida Olermo's vibrant and energetic eyes sparkle as talks about how she was able to manage her farm all by herself, recounting her experiences from tilling the soil, watering the plants, fertilizing them and to braving the typhoons that she and her farm survived.

She firmly believes that true change cannot be achieved unless one works hard for it. The model farms development started in 1996. The land is barren, dry and lifeless. Initially around 200 mango trees were planted in a once unproductive area. Although the development was slow due to financial constraints, the area gradually turned into what it is now, bursting with colours from the different ornamentals, orchids, bromeliads, anthuriums, fruit bearing trees and many others.

As a soil expert, Dr. Olermo uses her farm as laboratory area for her students in soil science, floriculture and landscape gardening, propagation and nursery management, and forage and pasture subjects were students have their hands-on activities in the farm. According to her, students, especially the females, should be properly taught to manage farms because when women are empowered and can claimed their rights and access to land, they can help our economy grow, therefore food security is enhanced and prospects are improved for current and future generations.

Dr. Naomi as she is fondly called by her friends and colleagues was born in M'lang North Cotabato and had graduated in University in Southern Mindanao with a degree of Agriculture. She acquired her Masteral and Doctoral degree at the University of the Philippines – Los Baños.

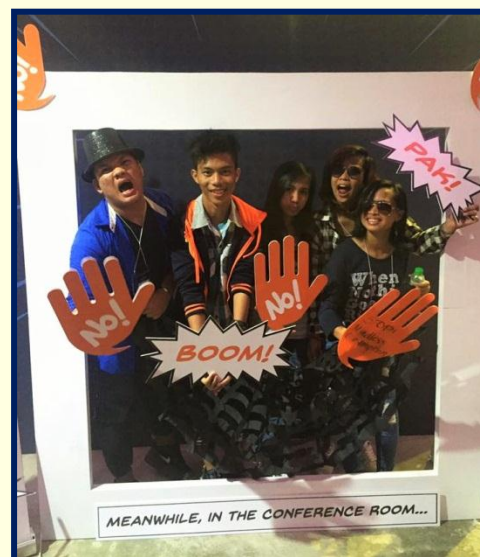

Employees receive CNA incentive

Employees of the Pangasinan State University received their Collective Negotiation Agreement (CNA) benefit or the rationalized cash incentive granted to government employees who have contributed in the productivity or cost savings in the agency.

According to Vice President for Finance, Mrs. Maria Corazon B. Puzon, the disbursement of CNA is in conformity with the Budget Circular No. 2016-7. Through (PSU) savings from the Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE), where PSU is allowed by the DBM to distribute CNA incentives amounting to Php14,000.00 to Php17,000.00 per employee.

The CNA was processed in accordance with the guidelines on the grant of CNA Incentive for Fiscal Year 2016 otherwise known as DBM Budget Circular No. 2016-7, through a Php14,205,000.00 realigned budget projection presented to the Board of Regents (BOR) and approved by the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) through the efforts of Vice-President Puzon, Dr. Dexter R. Buted, University President and Hon. Minerva Joy Pedralvez, Faculty Regent.

Observably, this year's savings is Php5,394,000.00 more higher, than the Php8,811,000.00 last year because of the institutionalized austerity measures of the administration.

CNA fund was sourced solely from allowable MOOE allotments in items defined under Government Accounting and Auditing Manual like travelling expenses, communication expenses, repair and maintenance, transportation and delivery expenses, supplies and materials and utility expenses.

The grant was made in completion with the policy guidelines and conditions such as existence of a CNA, Accomplishment of Targets and Submission of Accountability Reports which were accomplished by the administration.

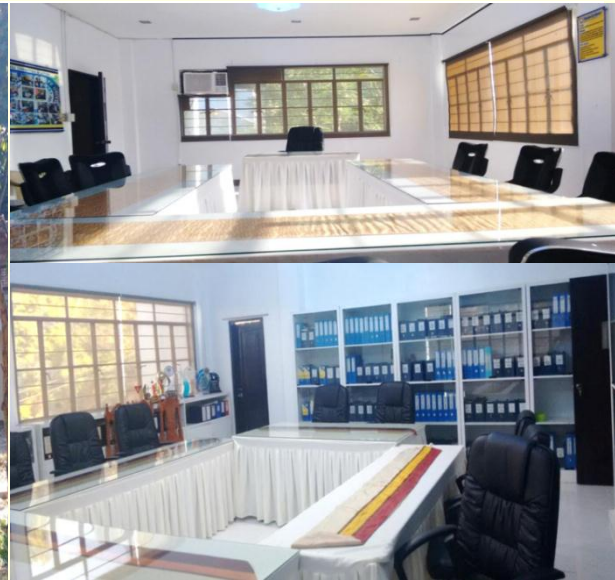

Construction of Comfort Rooms in all Campuses – P8.0M

New Dorm, inaugurated

Extending the goal to provide better services and facilities for the students, the Pangasinan State University Infanta Campus pursued the construction of its first ever girls' dormitory with the help of ABONO Party list representative, Congressman Conrado Estrella III.

Ever since the establishment of Pangasinan State University Infanta Campus in 1979, there was no single dormitory built for the students. After three years of process and waiting, the time has finally come for the school to build its first ever dormitory and experience the efficiency of having one.

The project was first spearheaded, through a resolution, by the former 2013 Campus Supreme Student Council (CSSC) President Novelyn Madarang and carried out by the succeeding CSSC leaders, headed by Geñeos Bantolino (2014) and Adrian Mara (2015).

Congressman Estrella III funded the expenses of building the dormitory amounting to Php 4,721, 842.56. The facility was divided into two units and features a receiving area, open rooms that has an estimated capacity of 10 students each, four ladies' rooms (two for each unit), a kitchen and a laundry area.



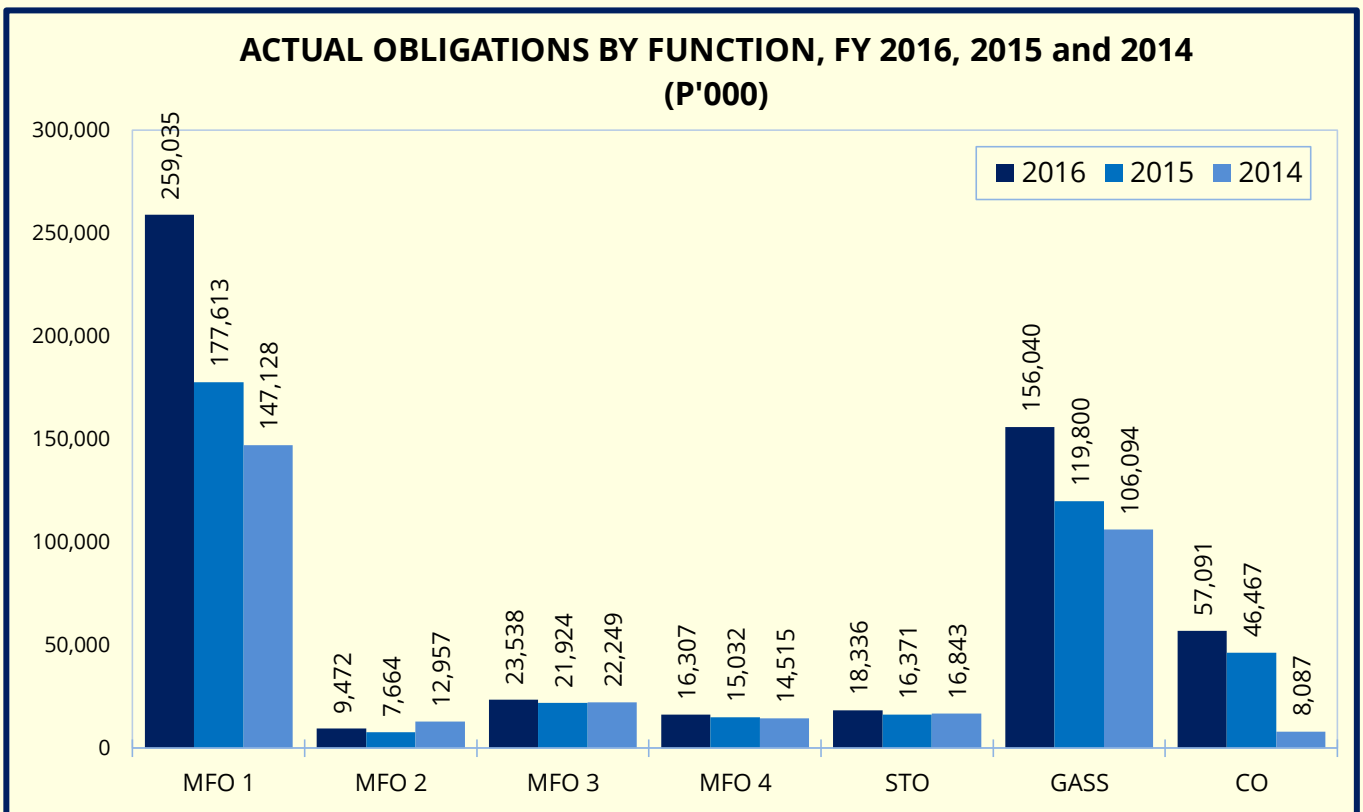
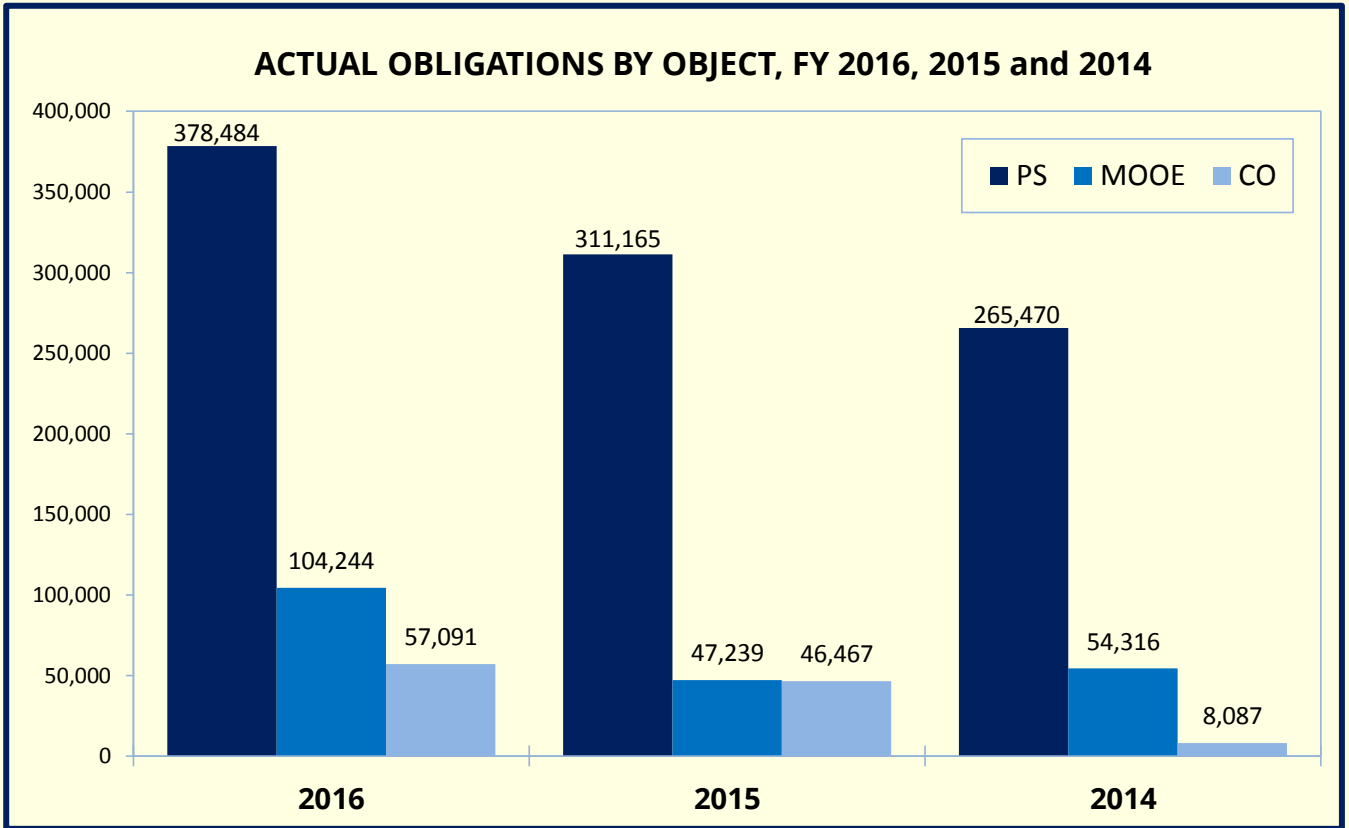

DA donates Native Pigs to PSU-SC

Raising pigs can be a good source of income. Everyone can venture in this business as long as there is available capital and place for raising pigs. Big capital may possibly ensure growth in business. But the good news in this business is that having low capital may not be the problem for production of pig. Meat of native pigs is cheaper because this animal eats grasses or tubers that are grown anywhere. At Pangasinan State University San Carlos Campus, thirty sows and two boars native pigs were given by Department of Agriculture, it is a project research of PSU-SC approved by the DA Region I to improve the genetic and phenotype traits of native pigs. According to Dr. Valentin B. Calpo, Jr., Campus Executive Director, the purpose of raising these native pigs here in PSU-SC is for phenotypic improvement of the Ilocos native pigs.

The following are the Seven Traits of Phenotypic pigs:

- 1) Black in color
- 2) Ears erected
- 3) Pointed/snub snout
- 4) White spotted head
- 5) White belly
- 6) White stockings (four white socks)
- 7) White end of the tail

The CED insisted that if these seven traits are achieved, they will be exchanged to native pigs grower so that the variety will spread.

The benefits derived from raising native pigs are not solely for income but also as good source of pork for market trade.

The food and fertilizer technology Center for the Asian and Pacific Region Experts said that native animals have provided valuable contribution in the cultural, social and economic status of farming communities in the rural areas.

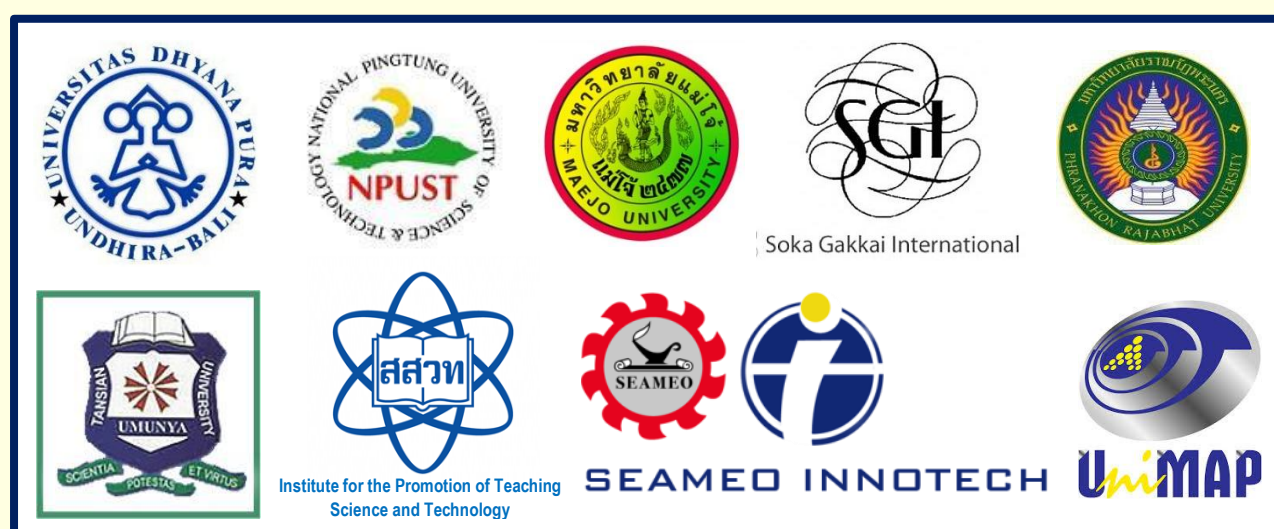

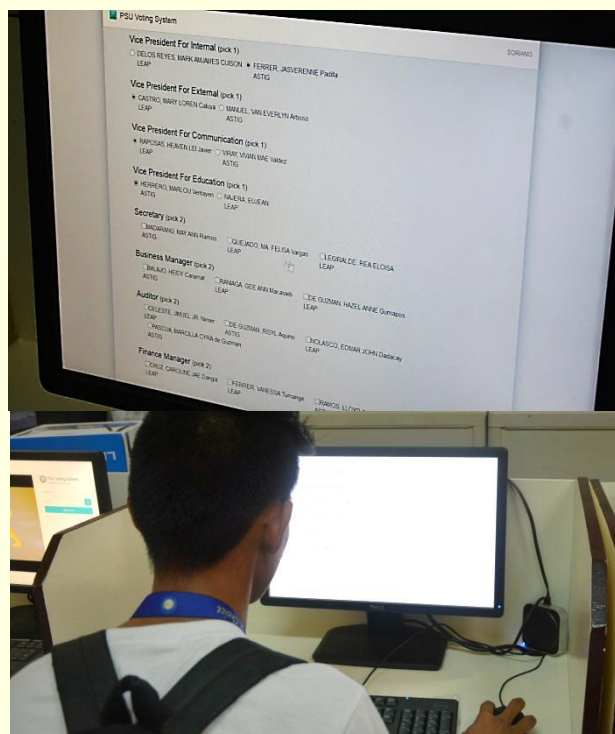
Student's Election Process streamlined **Automated Poll upsurges Voter Turnout**

The 2016 voter turnout of the Supreme Student Council (SSC) Elections in Pangasinan State University Lingayen Campus (PSU-LC) rose up by 78% through the implementation of the electronic voting system, an innovation introduced to realize a prompt, convenient and reliable student-voting system, as against the 75% voter turnout in 2014, the highest voter turnout recorded using traditional ballot voting.

The system is based from a research study entitled "GNHS Voting System" of Mr. Rufo N. Gabrillo and Mr. Renato C. Javier Jr., both graduates of PSU-LC batch 2012 with a degree of BS Computer Science. It was originally conceptualized for K to 12 Program in Public High Schools, however, a modified code was used to suit the need of the campus.

Mr. Gabrillo remarked that the success of the first automated poll system implementation in Lingayen Campus is commendable, thus, its utilization during the student council election of other campuses for the next academic year is recommended. He added that the system could also be upgraded by centralizing the election processes of all campuses.

The Management Information Services led by its Director Mr. Virgilio Aquino assisted the Electoral Tribunal in the management of the automated election. Dry runs were also organized days prior the election proper to assess the reliability and accuracy of system's voting results.



1st Youth Leaders Forum launched

Fifty students coming from different colleges of the Lingayen Campus attended the 1st Pangasinan Youth Leaders Forum (PYLF) on September 15-16, 2016 at the Sison Auditorium in Lingayen, Pangasinan.

With over 300 participants coming from various schools and universities all over the province, the said forum was successfully launched with the theme "Building Leaders of Today." The forum focused on how to become "Pag-asa ng Bayan" as Ann Morales, President of the Pangasinan Youth Leaders Association (PYLA) emphasized on her welcome address.

Chris Zuniga, a reporter from ABS-CBN-Dagupan gave the definition a responsible netizen as he delivered his discussion on the said forum. Moreover, Atty. Raul Lambino discussed Federalism, centers on the country's readiness of being a federal country.

Right after the forum, an election was done which designated two students from PSU as officers of PYLA. Mark Vince B. Ventura, a STEM student was elected as Vice President for Central Pangasinan for High School level and an AB Public Administration student was elected as the Vice President for Central Luzon for College level.

PSU hosts Forum on IL remedies for Displaced Pangasinan Fisherfolks

A forum in exploring international law remedies for displaced folks of Pangasinan was held at Pangasinan State University last September 22, 2015. The forum started with Mr. Jowe Legazpe, Barangay Kagawad from Brgy. Cato, Infanta, Pangasinan giving students, faculty and staff an overview of what is the situation regarding the displacement of fisher folks in Pangasinan, particularly at Brgy. Cato. The speakers were Atty. Marwil N. Llasos, Atty. Gilbert Andres, a trustee of the Center for International Law and Co-Counsel for the fisherman and Atty. Harry L. Roque, Jr. of UP College of Law.

According to Atty. Andres, China's violation of Philippines' sovereignty and sovereign rights over the Scarborough Shoal or locally known as Bajo de Masinloc has led to drastic economic losses for Filipino fisher folks as they were driven away by Chinese vessels. He further discussed the Economic and Social rights of the Filipino fisher folks over the Scarborough Shoal and highlighted the idea of them visiting the affected fishermen to discuss their own right, face to face.

The forum continued with Atty. Harry L. Roque, Jr. Director of Institute of International Legal Studies, presenting proofs of the Philippines' authority in owning the shoal as he tackled about international remedies for displaced fisher folks of Pangasinan.

Atty. Roque put emphasis on filing complaint against the people of China with fisherman from Subic and Masinloc, Zambales. The complaint was filed in the United Nation Committee on Economic Social and Cultural Rights (CESR), with the help of the Institute of International Legal Studies (IILS) of the University of the Philippines Law Center. They appealed to the United Nation to direct China to respect the country's rights over Scarborough Shoal. The said complaint aims to help fishermen gain back their ground and the disputed Scarborough Shoal, exercise their rights, foods and livelihood, and to regain what is rightfully for Filipinos.

PSU-CEL underwent TOEIC testing

The PSU Center for English Language (PSU-CEL) conducted a free pilot testing of the Test of English for International Communication (TOEIC) on March 3, 2016 at the PSU-Audio Visual Room.

Coordinator of CEL-Lingayen Campus, Camille Paragas explained that the CEL was established purposively to develop a high standard of English Proficiency both for the students and teachers of PSU.

Moreover, to determine the current English proficiency level in PSU, Dr. Luzviminda Q. Ramos, Director for CEL partnered with Hopkins International Partners, an internationally awarded assessment group for both the educational and corporate sectors.

Two hundred eight (208) students from the various campuses of the University and fifty-eight (58) instructors from Lingayen Campus participated in the said testing activity. Furthermore, TOEIC covers the Grammarly@edu program, an application to test the takers in terms of listening and reading comprehension.

Result of the testing activity showed that one of the participants got the international score of General Professional Proficiency, others Advanced Professional Proficiency, and Basic Professional Proficiency.

The test is designed to understand an individual's capabilities to communicate and evaluate ones strength and weaknesses.
